<sup>3</sup> The JJJPA incorporates by reference the nondiscrimination provision of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (Safe Streets Act), which prohibits recipients from discriminating either in employment or in the delivery of services or benefits on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, or sex. Recipients funded under the JJJPA are subject to the administrative provisions of the Safe Streets Act, including the Equal Employment Opportunity Program (EEOP) requirement, unless they meet any of the following criteria for exemption from the EEOP requirement: (1) the recipient is a nonprofit organization, a medical or educational institution, or an Indian tribe, (2) the recipient has less than 50 employees, or (3) the recipient received a single award or subaward for less than \$25,000.
