Although programs funded under the VOCA are not subject to the administrative provisions of the Safe Streets Act, the Office for Victims of Crime, which administers VOCA-funded programs, requires all recipients of VOCA funding to comply with the Safe Streets Act regulations that apply to the development of an Equal Employment Opportunity Program (EEOP). Recipients of VOCA funds are exempt from the EEOP requirement, if they meet any of the following criteria: (1) the recipient is a nonprofit organization, a medical or educational institution, or an Indian tribe, (2) the recipient has less than 50 employees, or (3) the recipient received a single award or subaward for less than \$25,000.
