Fellow Arkansans:

Fiscal year 1986-87 marked a period of unprecedented change in the Judicial Branch of your government. In November of 1986 the voters adopted Amendment 64, which markedly increased the civil jurisdiction of your municipal courts. This improvement will bring Arkansas in line with most other states in this area, and will make available for the citizens of Arkansas a relatively inexpensive, and more expeditious, forum for litigation of minor civil disputes.

In January of 1987, the Supreme Court held the existing Juvenile Court System to be unconstitutional. Subsequently, the Legislature referred to the voters a proposed constitutional amendment which, if enacted, will provide the opportunity for development of a Juvenile Court System for the future. Governor Bill Clinton appointed a Commission to assist in this effort.

These developments, along with other significant occurrences, are detailed in the major developments section of this report. Your review of that portion of this report is encouraged.

The compilation of information necessary for this report would not be possible without the continued cooperation of the many trial judges and court clerks throughout the state. I continue to appreciate their contribution to this effort. As always, I acknowledge the hard work of the staff of the Arkansas Judicial Department in its annual effort to publish this document.

**MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS  
FISCAL YEAR 1986-87**

## Juvenile Courts

The 1874 Constitution of the State of Arkansas makes no mention of juvenile courts. In 1911, the Arkansas Legislature, by way of statutory enactment, "created" juvenile courts and placed them within the jurisdiction of county courts. This arrangement was upheld in an Arkansas Supreme Court decision of 1915. On January 20, 1987, the Supreme Court of Arkansas reversed that earlier decision. In the opinion, the Supreme Court noted that proceedings involving juveniles had significantly changed over the years. Procedural due process requirements, funding sources, and other changes dictated that juvenile proceedings are more properly a state concern, hence, it was constitutionally improper for such proceedings to remain with county courts.

In response to that landmark decision, the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, during their 1987 Regular Session, enacted a package of legislation. That legislation provided

that cases involving allegations of juvenile delinquency would henceforth be filed in circuit court. Cases concerning juveniles in need of supervision, and dependent/neglected juveniles, would be filed in probate court. In most other respects, the substantive law and procedural requirements of the 1975 Arkansas Juvenile Code remained intact.

Concurrently, Governor Bill Clinton appointed a Commission on Juvenile Justice. This Commission, chaired by Senator Wayne Dowd of Texarkana, is charged with the responsibility of investigating the subject of juvenile courts and making recommendations for the benefit of the 1989 General Assembly. In this connection, the Legislature also referred to the populace a proposed constitutional amendment to be on the November, 1988, General Election ballot. This proposed constitutional amendment, if enacted, would enable the Legislature to set jurisdiction in matters concerning juvenile and paternity cases.

## Judicial Discipline

The Arkansas Supreme Court has endorsed a Code of Judicial Conduct by way of per curiam order entered on November 5, 1973. The code, through its seven canons, sets the proper standards for behavior of the judiciary in Arkansas. However, this Code of Judicial Conduct does not provide for an administrative body to enforce the provisions of the code nor does it provide specific remedies for violations. Additionally, it appears that Arkansas is one of only a few states that does not have a formal procedure for investigation of complaints against judges for violations of the Code of Judicial Conduct.

In response to these deficiencies, the Arkansas Supreme Court created an ad hoc committee on the various issues surrounding judicial discipline, suspension, removal, and disability retirement. The membership of the committee included: Associate Justice David Newbern, Associate Justice Darrell Hickman, Court of Appeals Judge Jim Cooper, Circuit Judge John Graves, Chancellor Graham Partlow, Municipal Judge Sam Ed Gibson, Juvenile Judge Joyce Warren, and Professor Howard W. Brill.

The committee made its report to the Supreme Court in January of 1987. The Supreme Court adopted the committee's recommendations for creation of a Board on Judicial Discipline, Suspension, Removal, and Disability Retirement. In a rare development, the Justices of the Supreme Court appeared before the appropriate committee of the Legislature during the 1987 General Session and requested that the Legislature refer the proposal to the voters, which they did. Accordingly, a proposed constitutional amendment on this subject will appear on the November, 1988, General Election ballot. If accepted by the voters, the amendment will provide the citizens of Arkansas with a forum for adjudication of allegations of judicial misconduct.

## Court of Appeals

During 1985, the General Assembly expanded the jurisdiction of the Court of Appeals to include review of actions of the Arkansas Public Service Commission, an administrative agency which regulates public utilities. That 1985 legislation also specified that the Public Service Commission appeals shall enjoy priority over all other civil cases except child custody, appeals under Workmen's Compensation law, and the Employment Security law. During the last fiscal year, the first appeals under that legislation began to make their way to the Court of Appeals. Although the numbers of such appeals will not be large, the complexity of issues, and volume of the record in such appeals, will cause those cases to have an inordinate effect on the Court's case load.

In recognition of the increasing Court of Appeals' case load, and the addition of the Public Service Commission appellate jurisdiction, the General Assembly also established and funded the state's first appellate staff attorney program for the Court of Appeals. The staff attorney program came into full operation during this past fiscal year.

Many other jurisdictions, particularly in the federal courts, utilize central staff attorneys in addition to traditional law clerks. The duties of the Court of Appeals staff attorneys include screening of cases, research on difficult cases, drafting assistance, docket control, and administrative duties.

A computerized docket control system has been developed and implemented with assistance from the Judicial Department, and a computer-assisted legal research project is nearing completion. The staff attorney project, along with organizational changes and major facility improvements, have enabled the Court of Appeals to reduce both backlog and delay in the appellate process.

Among the many significant accomplishments during the past fiscal year was the reduction of systemic delay. In the past, fully-briefed cases sometimes

waited over six months before submission to the Court. By the end of the fiscal year, no fully-briefed cases were over three months old. In addition, the number of cases ready for submission has been drastically reduced and numbered only sixty-two cases at the end of the fiscal year. Despite a relatively high case load, the Court of Appeals will be able to maintain good docket control in the future due to gains made during fiscal year 1986/87.

## Survey of State Case Load

With one notable exception, the filing of cases continued to increase throughout the state.

In the Supreme Court, the most significant increase in filings in some time was recorded. In particular, filings during this last fiscal year increased almost 12% over the preceding fiscal year. Although there was a concurrent increase in terminations by the Supreme Court, there remained a substantial number of appeals pending at the end of last fiscal year.

The notable exception mentioned above occurred in the Arkansas Court of Appeals where the number of appeals filed was slightly less than the same number for the preceding fiscal year. On the other hand, the number of cases brought to a conclusion during last fiscal year showed a dramatic increase of 17%. The result of these developments was a decrease in the number of appeals pending at the end of fiscal year 1986-87.

Finally, the number of cases filed in the general jurisdiction courts (circuit, chancery, and probate) continued to increase. Specifically, cases filed in all of these courts grew by approximately 3% over last fiscal year. However, that percentage of increase is, relatively speaking, a modest development. This minimal increase is a continuation of what was reported during last fiscal year. Although terminations in these courts also substantially increased, it was not sufficient to reduce the number of pending cases across the state. Those cases, which were pending at the end of this fiscal year, showed an increase of over 4%.

## Municipal Courts

The Municipal Court System in Arkansas was the subject of substantial constitutional reform during the past fiscal year. During the November, 1986, General Election, the citizens of Arkansas overwhelmingly adopted Amendment 64 to the Arkansas Constitution. This amendment increased civil jurisdiction in municipal courts from the antiquated limit of \$300.00, to the more realistic monetary limit of \$3,000.00.

The purpose of Amendment 64 is to provide the populace with a relatively inexpensive, and more expeditious, forum in which to litigate minor civil disputes. The provisions of the amendment became effective July 1, 1987. It is evident that our municipal courts will undergo a substantial influx of civil litigation.

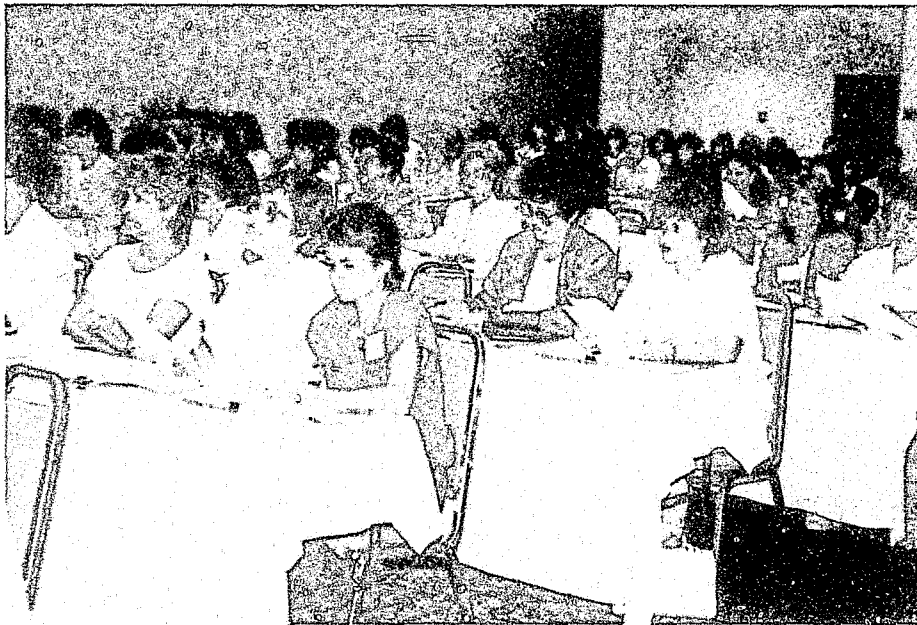
Recognizing that prospect, the Judicial Department, in cooperation with an advisory committee of municipal court clerks, developed a manual for their use. The manual includes information concerning procedures to be followed in municipal court, as well as explanations on the proper methods of service, return of service, and other rel-

evant matters. The manual seeks to encourage the use of similar forms throughout the state in municipal court. The municipal court clerks' manual represents an initial effort to lend some degree of uniformity to municipal court proceedings throughout the state.

Subsequent to the adoption of Amendment 64, it was necessary that a legislative package be adopted to implement certain provisions of that amendment. A legislative subcommittee chaired by Representative David Matthews, and with members Senator Stanley Russ and Representative Shirley Calhoun, met on several occasions with judges, clerks, and representatives of the Judicial Department. The resulting legislation, Act 430 and Act 431 of 1987, provided guidance in the implementation of Amendment 64. Of particular interest, the legislation mandated that each municipal court have a small claims division within their court. Small claims division is available for the use of non-lawyer litigants, thereby meeting the purpose of Amendment 64. Additionally, for the first time, uniform filing fees were enacted for all the municipal courts in the state.

## Judicial Personnel

The Judicial Apportionment Board, which was created during the 1985 General Assembly, considered a large number of requests for additional judgeships, or, re-districting of existing judicial boundaries. Under the Arkansas Constitution, the General Assembly has the responsibility of making decisions in connection with such requests. The Judicial Apportionment Board is created by the Legislature to assist in the deliberative process.

The Apportionment Board recommended the creation of six additional judgeships. This comparatively large additional complement of judges recognized, in the Board's opinion, the need for such judges in light of the continuing increase in filing of cases in general jurisdiction courts.

This continued growth in filings, along with additional case processing requirements placed on general jurisdiction judges, caused many judges to employ case coordinators. Such arrangements must be made on a local level with payment by the various counties in a particular district. At this writing, Judicial Department records reflect that 49 judges have full-time secretaries/case coordinators employed. This represents a 10.2% increase for fiscal year 1986-87. The Judicial Department has continued to provide training and support for case coordinators.

## Use of Computers

In the course of the annual report for fiscal year 1985-86, a reference to this subject was made. During the most recent fiscal year, utilization of computers, at all levels of court, has increased.

The computer system hardware acquired by the Supreme Court was fully installed during the course of fiscal year 1986-87. This included additional terminals for law clerks, extension of the system to the Court Clerk's Office, and inclusion of the Court of Appeals in the system. The system, known as a CPT-ODS configuration, has numerous capabilities.

Of principal interest, the computer will have the ability to store all previous Supreme Court and Court of Appeals' decisions. Through the use of the appropriate program, judges and law clerks will be able to conduct a complete search of previous decisions for relevant material. Efforts are under way to determine the most feasible method of entering that data base into the central processing unit. Additionally, this CPT-ODS system will have the capacity to record pertinent information on all pending cases, including age of cases. In this fashion, the justices of the Supreme Court will, for the first time, be able to monitor the flow of cases through the appellate process. Pending the development of that program, the Court of Appeals is utilizing a docket control system operated through a personal computer program. Finally, in the coming fiscal year, the CPT-ODS system will be programmed to provide assistance in attorney reg-

istration and notification, accounting, inventory, and perhaps, library management.

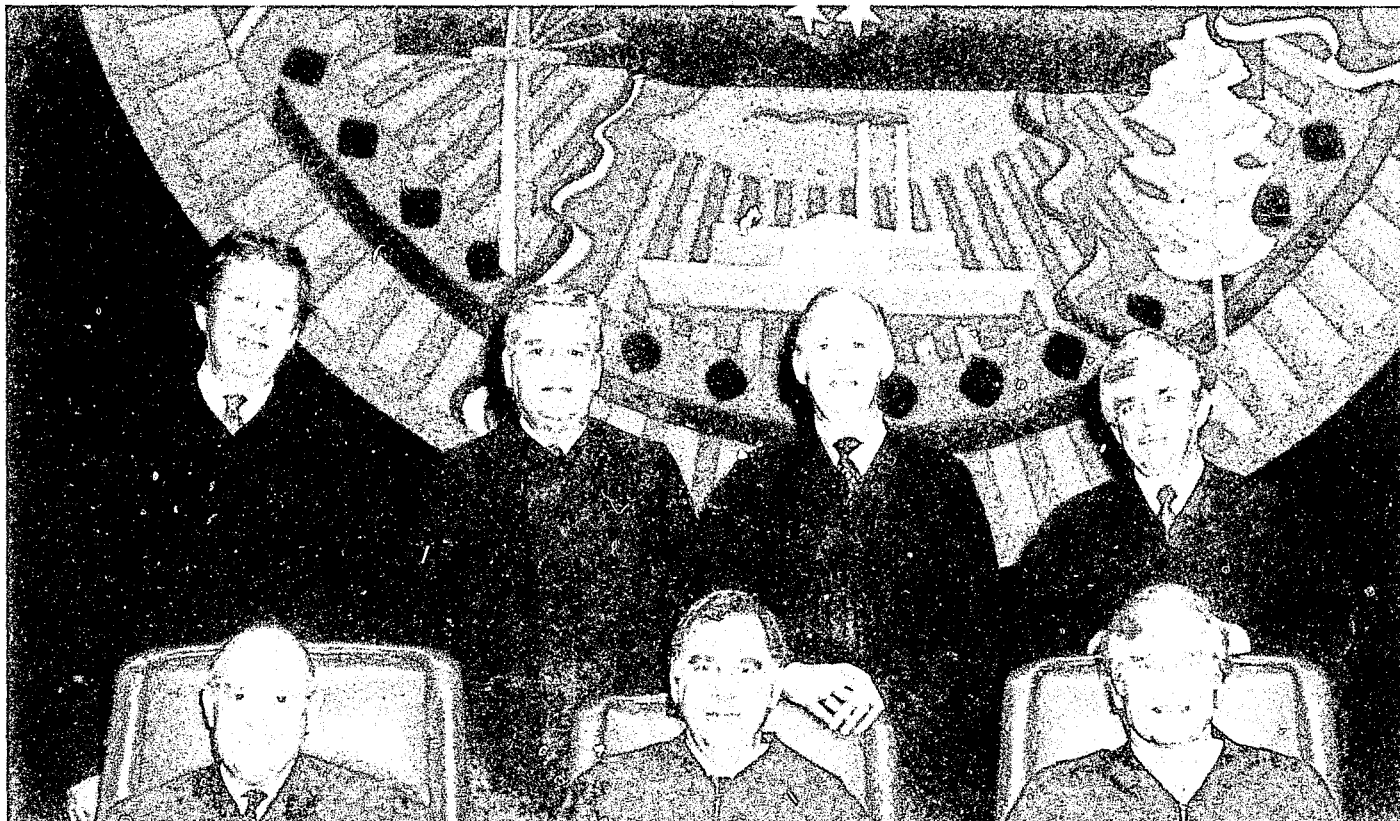
During this fiscal year, the general jurisdiction judges throughout the state continued to recognize the benefits to be derived from the use of a computer in docket control. Previously, the Judicial Department, with the assistance of a federal grant, had acquired hardware, and developed software, which was distributed to twelve circuit and chancery judges. The interest in this program has continued to grow. During this most recent fiscal year, the number of circuit and chancery judges utilizing a computer in docket control more than doubled, so that at the end of fiscal year 1986-87 thirty judges were involved. This number, coupled with the ten circuit and chancery judges in Pulaski County who utilize a central system, means that forty of our seventy general jurisdiction judges have access to a computer for docket control purposes. Efforts will continue to encourage the use of computers among our general jurisdiction judges.

The civil jurisdiction of municipal courts in Arkansas was vastly increased as a result of the adoption of Amendment 64 to the Arkansas Constitution. In preparation for the substantial increase in case load, many municipal courts also looked to computers as a management device. Several private vendors have developed software and are marketing their system throughout the state. A number of municipal courts have acquired computer systems during this past fiscal year and it is expected that the reliance on computerized docket control will continue to increase.

## Supreme Court

Arkansas' highest appellate court is the Supreme Court, comprised of the Chief Justice and six Associate Justices.

The Constitution of 1874 sets forth the powers and jurisdiction of the Court and establishes in it "general superintending control over all inferior courts of law and equity . . ."

The members of the Court are elected to staggered eight year terms by the voters of the State. The Governor fills any vacancies on the Court by appointment. When necessary, a special justice is appointed by the Governor in cases where a member of the

Court recuses, and it is decided that the participation of a special justice would be required for the Court to render a decision. Special justices who served during 1986-87 were: Thomas Burke and Thomas S. Streetman.

Justice Tom Glaze was elected to the Court in November, 1986 and was sworn in as the Court's newest member in January, 1987. Justice Glaze was elected to the seat held by George Rose Smith before his retirement.

The workload of the Court is measured in terms of appeals, petitions and motions (excluding those for time extension) of which final disposition is made during the fiscal year.

Appeals filed in the Supreme Court

totaled 459 for the 1986-87 fiscal year, an increase of 11.7% from the previous fiscal year. Appeals terminated during the fiscal year totaled 416, an increase of 30% from the 1985-86 fiscal year. Petitions filed for the same time period numbered 438, an increase of 16.5% from the previous fiscal year. Petitions terminated during the fiscal year totaled 421, an increase of 9.1% from the previous fiscal year.

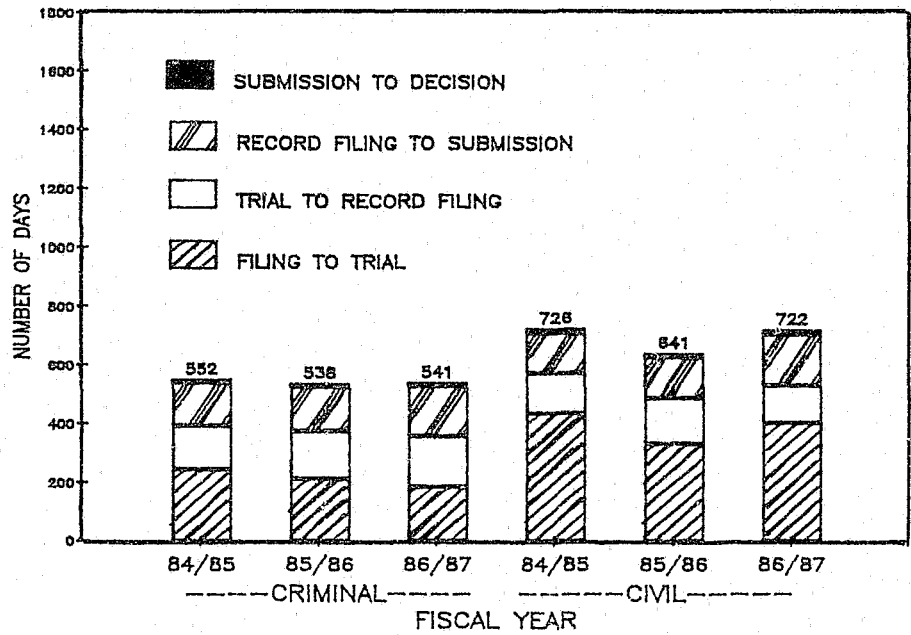
There were 207 appeals and 43 petitions pending at the end of fiscal year 1986-87. The 207 appeals pending represent a 26.2% increase from the previous reporting period.

**Supreme Court Time Study**

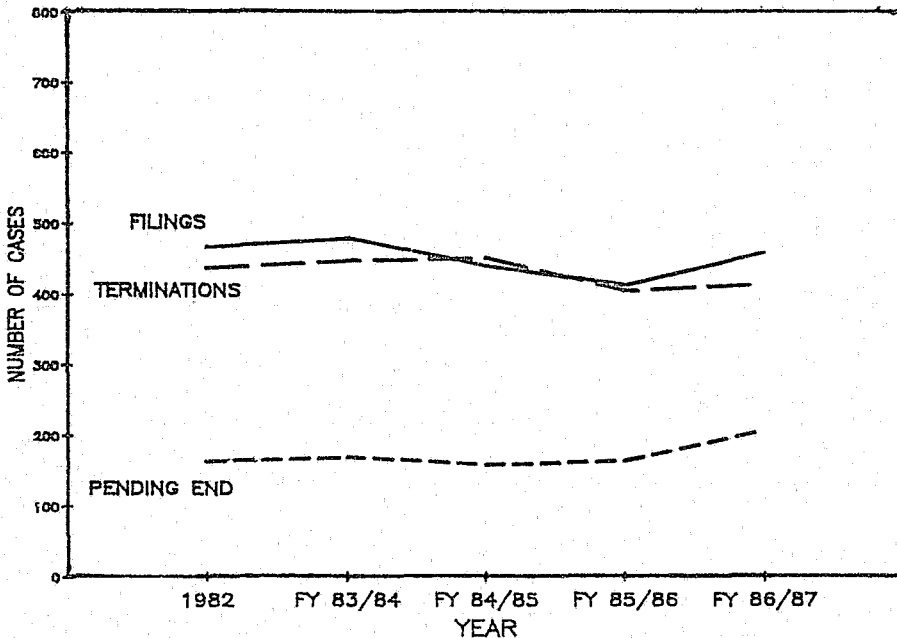
For the 1986-87 fiscal year a total of 131 criminal cases were surveyed. Nineteen of these were decided after oral arguments. For these cases, it took an average of 635 days to process each case from filing in lower court through appeal. Of the 112 cases surveyed without oral arguments, an average of 541 days elapsed from filing in circuit court to decision by the Supreme Court.

A total of 111 civil cases were surveyed for the 1986-87 fiscal year. Thirty-one of these cases were decided after oral arguments. For these cases, it took an average of 772 days to process

CASES WITHOUT ORAL ARGUMENTS**

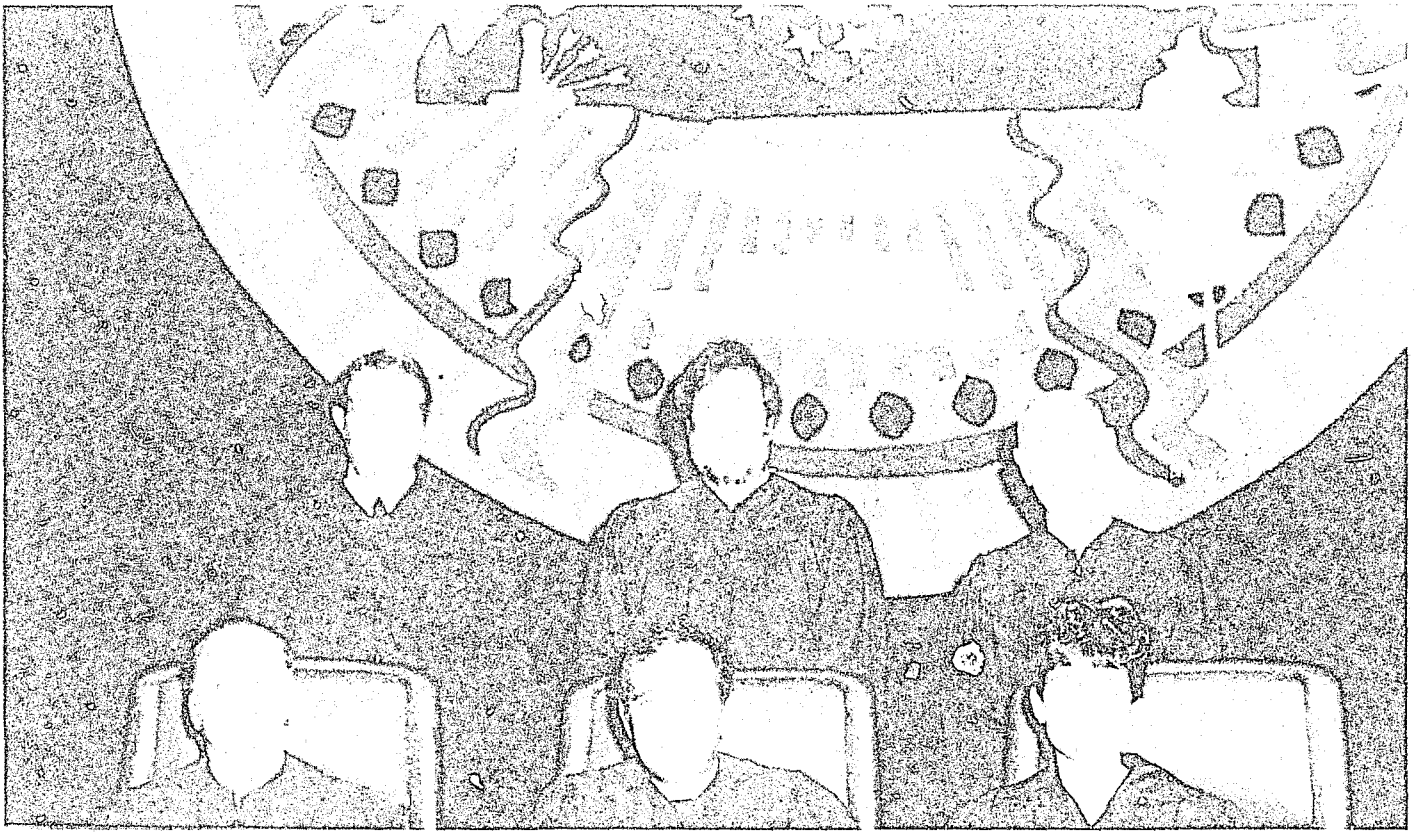


**SUPREME COURT

ess each case from filing in lower court through appeal. Of the 80 cases surveyed without oral arguments, an average of 722 days elapsed from filing to decision by the Supreme Court.

It is important to note that, on the average, approximately 70% of the time taken to process each case being appealed is spent in the lower trial court. The remaining 30% is the time that each case spends in either the Supreme Court or the Court of Appeals.

### Court of Appeals

Amendment 58 authorized the General Assembly to establish an intermediate appellate court known as the Court of Appeals. This intermediate appellate court has helped to alleviate the tremendous caseload which burdened the Supreme Court during the early and mid-1970's.

The Court of Appeals is composed of a Chief Judge and five Associate Judges. The six judges are elected for staggered eight year terms from six geographical districts. Chief Judge Don Corbin was appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court for a term of four years subject to reappointment. The Court is divided into two panels of three judges each and any

decision rendered by a panel is final, unless a single judge dissents, whereby the case is decided "en banc" by all six judges.

The Court of Appeals is authorized to correct errors in cases on appeal from the same trial courts which may appeal to the Supreme Court. Judgments of the Court of Appeals may be appealed to the Supreme Court when any one of three circumstances exists: the case was erroneously filed in the Court of Appeals; a case filed in the Court of Appeals is believed to be of paramount public interest and is "certified" to the Supreme Court; or the case was decided on a tie vote in the Court of Appeals.

Judge John Jennings was sworn in as a member of the Court of Appeals

in January, 1987, replacing retiring Judge Lawson Cloninger. Justice Tom Glaze's election to the Supreme Court in November resulted the appointment of Beth Gladden Coulson to the Court of Appeals. Judge Coulson will serve as a member of the Court until the next general election.

One special judge, Ernest L. Wright, Jr., was appointed to serve during the 1986-87 fiscal year.

The workload of the Court of Appeals is measured in the same way as that of the Supreme Court.

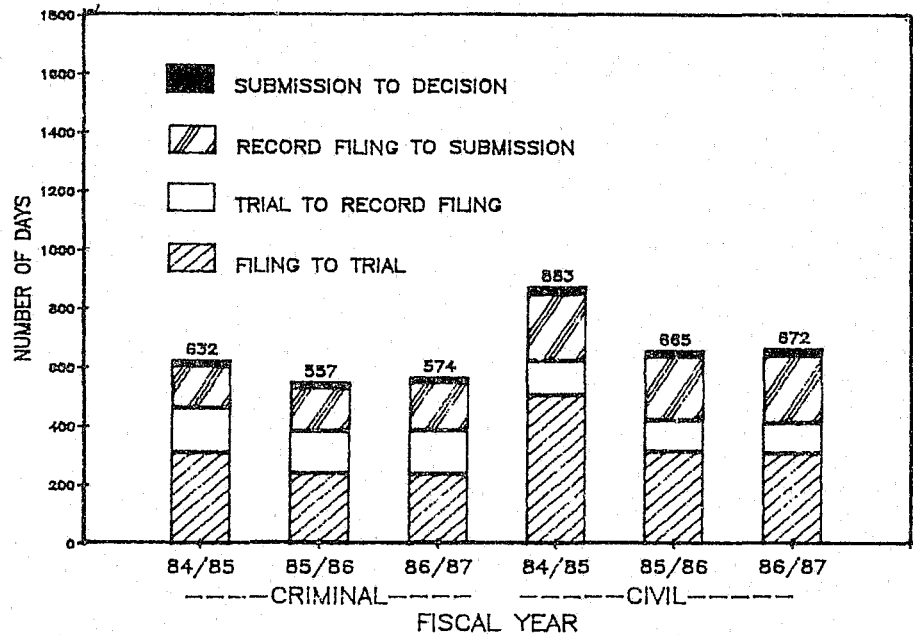
Appeals filed in the Court of Appeals totaled 949, a decrease of .2% from the previous fiscal year. Appeal terminations for the 1986-87 fiscal year were 983, an increase of 17% from the previous fiscal year. Ninety-six peti-

tions were filed in the 1986-87 fiscal year, showing an increase of 26.3% from the previous reporting period. Petition terminations for the 1986-87 fiscal year increased by 15% from 87 to 100. There were 426 appeals and seven petitions pending at the end of fiscal year 1986-87. The 426 appeals pending represent a 7.4% decrease from the previous fiscal.

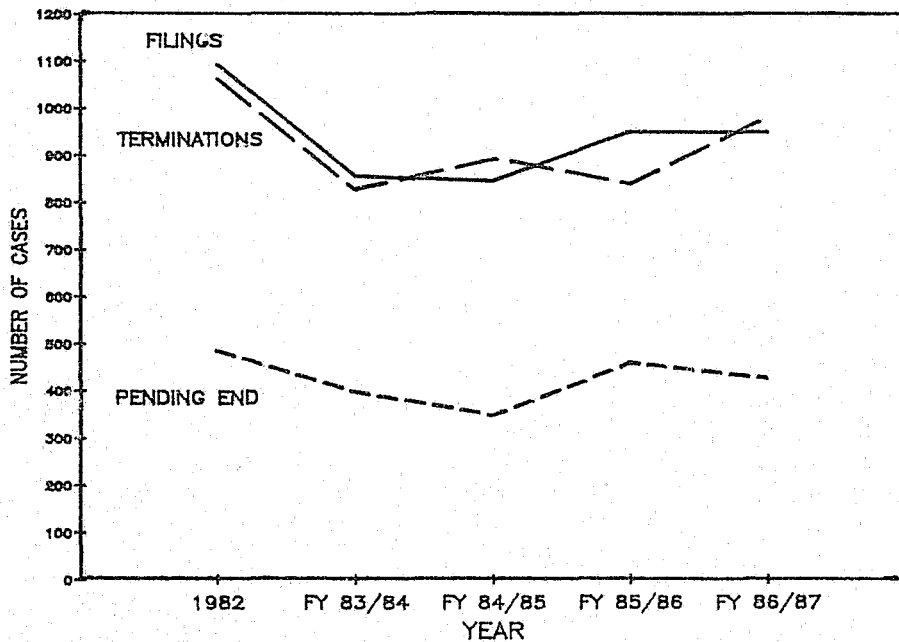
### Court of Appeals Time Study

For the 1986-87 fiscal year, 175 criminal cases were surveyed. Twelve of these were decided after oral arguments. For these 12 cases, it took an average of 739 days to process each case from filing in lower court through appeal. Of the 163 cases surveyed without oral arguments, an average of 574 days elapsed from filing in circuit court to decision by the Court of Appeals.

A total of 401 civil cases were surveyed for the 1986-87 fiscal year. Forty-six of these cases were decided after oral arguments. For these 46 cases, it took an average of 729 days to process each case from filing in lower court through appeal. Of the 355 cases surveyed without oral arguments, an average of 672 days elapsed from filing to decision by the court of Appeals.

# APPELLATE COURTS SUPPORT STAFF

## Law Clerks of the Appellate Courts

Each judge for the Arkansas Supreme Court and the Arkansas Court of Appeals has two law clerks, all of whom are law school graduates.

Law clerks assist the judges in all phases of appellate work. They prepare memoranda on the cases submitted to the court in which they research and evaluate the issues raised by the parties. Some clerks work only on the cases assigned to their particular judge, while others do memos on additional cases submitted to the court. The memos are available to the judges before the cases are formally submitted, so that the judges have the benefit of the clerks' research when considering the cases.

After the cases have been discussed at a conference of the judges, the clerks may assist in opinion drafting and do any additional research necessary for the opinions. In addition, the law clerks may prepare memoranda on motions assigned to their judge, or on other motions submitted to the Court.

Law clerks also approve headnotes, proofread advance sheets and do any research for speeches or articles.

## Court of Appeals Staff Attorneys

The Court of Appeals employs staff attorneys, in addition to their law clerks. The responsibilities of the staff attorneys differ notably from a traditional law clerk.

The staff attorneys assist the entire court by classifying and calendaring cases. Staff attorneys can aid in analysis of cases and arrange for the court to expeditiously deal with cases previously resolved or enable the court to consider different cases on the same issue simultaneously. Staff attorneys may also review case files and insure that pleadings are in order and that procedural rules have been met. If not, then the staff attorney can insure compliance before the case is submitted to the Court.

# COURTS OF GENERAL JURISDICTION

Circuit and chancery courts in Arkansas are the trial courts of general jurisdiction. The two courts have separate jurisdictions with circuit courts presided over by a circuit judge, who hears civil and criminal cases, and chancery courts presided over by a chancellor, who hears equity, divorce and child support cases and acts as the probate judge. The state is divided into 24 judicial circuits served by 32 circuit judges, 30 chancellors and 8 combined jurisdiction judges.

As was mentioned in the "Major Developments Section", during the 1987 General Assembly bills were enacted creating additional judgeships. In June, 1987 a circuit judge/chancellor was appointed in the Eleventh West Judicial Circuit. The legislation also called for elections in 1988 to fill the following positions: one circuit judge/chancellor in the Seventh Judicial Circuit; one circuit judge and two chancellors in the Sixth Judicial Circuit; and one circuit judge/chancellor in the Eighteenth East Judicial Circuit.

In fiscal year 1986-87, 124,279 cases were filed in Arkansas' general jurisdiction courts, representing an increase of 2.97% from the previous fiscal period. The percentage of increase in the circuit and chancery courts can be broken down as follows:

The courts of general jurisdiction disposed of 120,472 cases during this fiscal year, an increase of 5.96% from the previous fiscal year.

The disposition rate compares the number of terminations to the number of filings. The disposition rate for courts of general jurisdiction was 96.94%, an average of 1721 terminations per judge. (See the disposition rates by circuit in the statistical section on page 49.)

There were 90,418 cases pending in the courts of general jurisdiction at fiscal year end, representing a 4.40% increase from the previous reporting period. These cases may be broken down as follows:

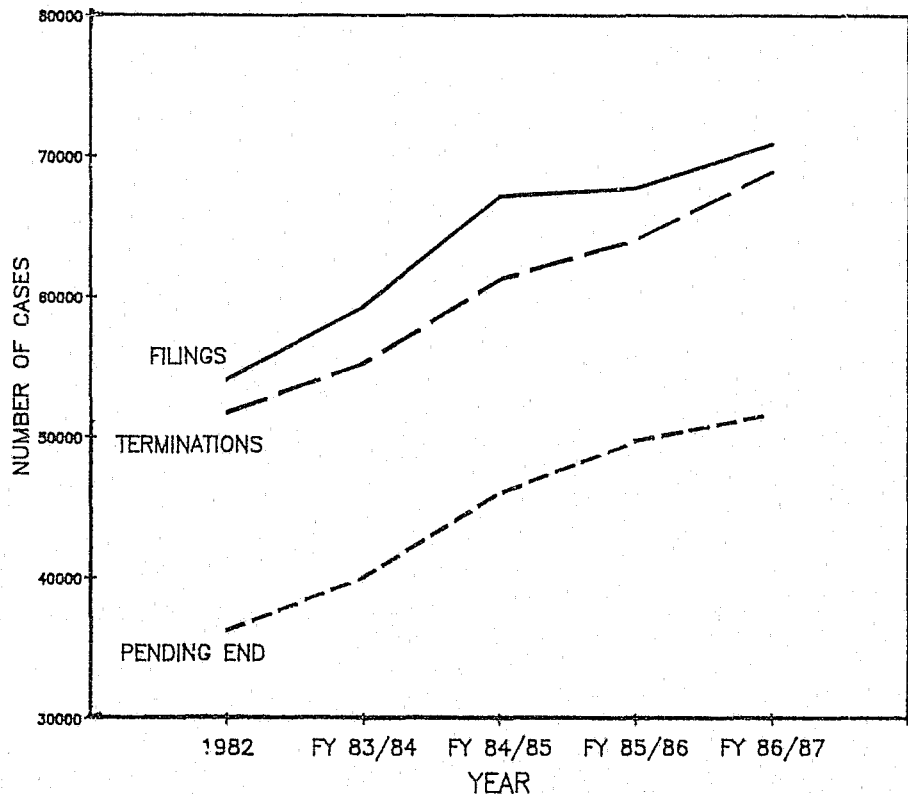

## Time Standards

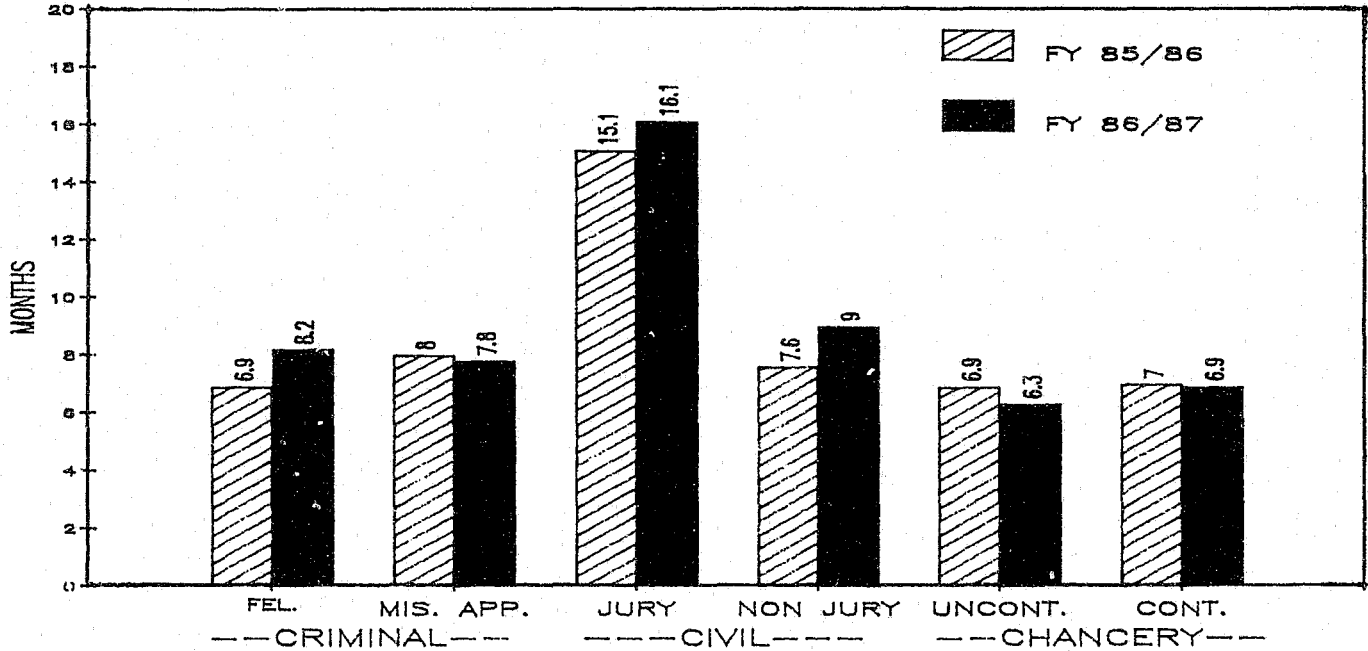
The chart on the following page compares Arkansas' court processing times for general jurisdiction courts. Processing time is defined as the average time it takes for a case or group of cases to be processed by the court system from filing to disposition. Time is expressed in months. The chart compares fiscal year 85/86 and fiscal year 86/87. Please remember that the figures presented here are statewide averages. Processing times vary widely by case and judicial circuit.

Generally, criminal and civil case processing time has increased. In chancery court, case processing time has decreased.

Cont. = Contested

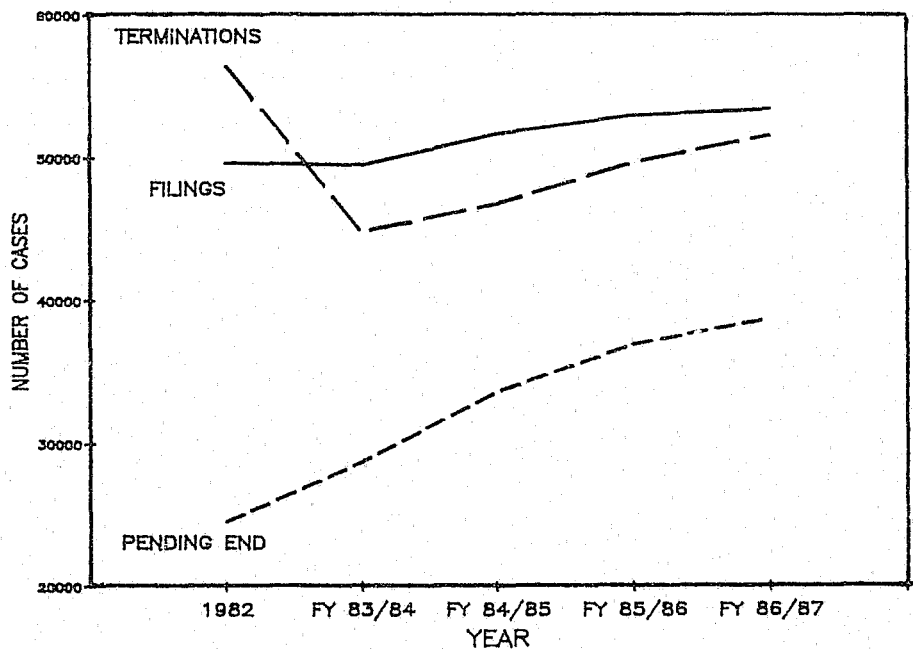
The chart reflects an increase in processing time of over one month for felony cases from last fiscal year to the present fiscal year. Misdemeanor appeals had a negligible decline.

Civil jury and non-jury cases reflect an increase in processing time. Non-jury cases increased by the larger amount of 1.4 months. Jury cases increased by one month.

Chancery cases reflect a decrease in average processing time with uncontested cases decreasing a little over one-half of a month. Contested cases decreased negligibly.

NOTE: It should be noted when examining the graph of chancery case-load activity that the sharp decline after 1982 was created by a change in reporting requirements for the probate courts.

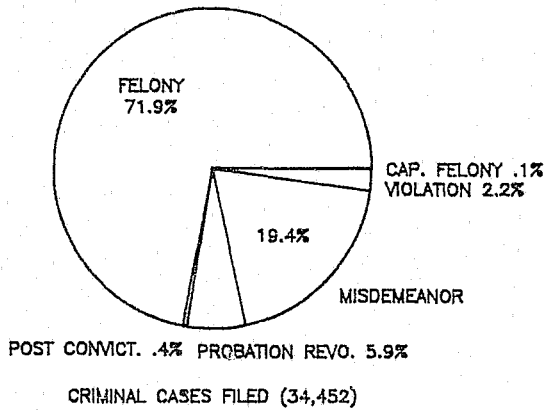

1982 - FY 86/87**



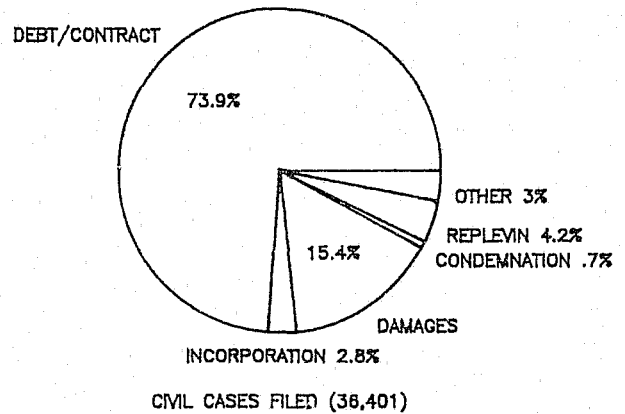

# COURTS OF LIMITED JURISDICTION

The establishment of courts of limited jurisdiction is provided by the Constitution of the State of Arkansas. At present these courts include: municipal courts, county courts, courts of common pleas, city courts and police courts.

**MUNICIPAL COURTS** - Municipal courts in the State of Arkansas constitute the principal courts of limited jurisdiction and have county wide jurisdiction. These courts, presided over in most cases by part-time judges, handle a majority of the cases filed within the state. A municipal court can be es-

tablished in one of three ways: in a "first class city" (those having a population of 2,400 or more); those cities that are the county seat; or by an act of the legislature. At present, there are 122 municipal courts in the state, presided over by 105 judges and assisted by 125 clerks. During the 1986-87 fiscal year the municipal courts of Arkansas reported 424,413 cases filed.

**COUNTY COURTS** - The county judge presides over the court and is also the business manager of the county. The jurisdiction and powers of the county courts include: original ju-

risdiction in all matters relating to county taxes, bastardy cases, paupers, apprenticeship of minors, and, in the absence of the chancellor from the county, the power to issue writs of injunction or restraining orders after an action has commenced. In the absence of the circuit judge, the county judge has the power to issue orders for injunctions.

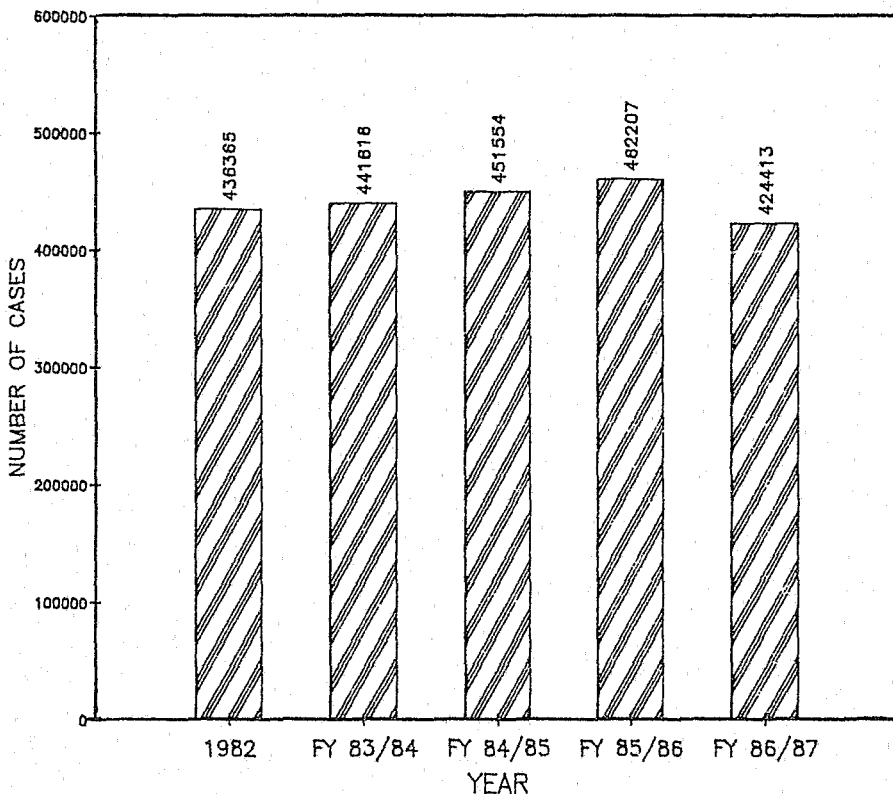
**JUVENILE COURTS** - These courts were established in 1911 by the General Assembly. The court was originally presided over by the county judge, but in 1927 an act was passed to authorize the county judge to appoint a juvenile referee. On January 20, 1987, juvenile courts were declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court and subsequently became part of the circuit and chancery courts. (See "Major Developments" section.)

**COURTS OF COMMON PLEAS** - These courts are presided over by the county judges and are limited to civil actions in which the disputed amount does not exceed \$1,000. Only thirteen counties in Arkansas are authorized to have courts of common pleas.

**CITY COURTS** - These courts, which number 94 in the state, function much the same as municipal courts with these exceptions: they are established in cities with a population of less than 2,400; they only have city wide jurisdiction; and the judge is not required to be an attorney. Established city courts are presided over by 83 judges, assisted by 94 clerks. In these courts, the judge is the mayor of the city.

**POLICE COURTS** - The jurisdiction in these courts is similar to that of city courts but the judge is elected as a judge, not as the mayor. Arkansas has 5 existing police courts.

# THE JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

The Judicial Department is the administrative office for the non-judicial business of the courts. The staff consists of: Executive Secretary, Deputy Director, the Systems Division, Deaf Interpreter/Translator, Financial Officer, Legal Research Coordinator, Judicial Education Coordinator, Mental Health Magistrate and Foster Care Magistrate.

The Executive Secretary is responsible for assisting the Chief Justice and the Supreme Court with the administration of the judicial system. He also serves as secretary-treasurer of the Arkansas Judicial Council.

The Deputy Director assists the Executive Secretary in all administrative functions and has the primary responsibility of monitoring the fiscal conditions of the courts.

The Systems Division of the Judicial Department has the responsibility for the statewide judicial information sys-

tem. The Division monitors the uniformity of the judicial statistics of the courts and makes recommendations to the Executive Secretary for improvement of the reporting and collection process.

The Systems Division also surveys the courts of record and compiles statistics reflecting their caseloads. In most instances, data is reported on paper forms completed in the clerks' offices and mailed to the division for computer entry. Several courts have begun utilizing computers and are sending reports on magnetic media, which can be fed directly into the computer.

The Deaf Interpreter/Translator is responsible for assisting the courts of the state in civil and criminal proceedings where deaf or hearing impaired people are involved. The interpreter is also responsible for developing training programs for other interpreters. During the 1986-87 fiscal year the Deaf Interpreter/Translator assisted in 93 hearings involving deaf citizens.

The Judicial Education Coordinator has the responsibility of planning and implementing seminars and programs involving the courts. During the past fiscal year, the Judicial Department has been able to assist with training to the Arkansas Judicial Council, the Arkansas Municipal Judges Council, court clerks, circuit and chancery case coordinators, juvenile referees and court reporters. The Coordinator has the added responsibility of editing the quarterly newsletter, *Friends of the Court*, and assisting with the preparation of the annual report.

The Mental Health Magistrate conducts hearings at the State Hospital for the involuntary commitment of persons to the State Hospital. This court offers services to all counties in the state except for seven counties in the George W. Jackson Hospital "catchment" area in Northeast Arkansas. The caseload statistics of this office reflect 1,633 hearings docketed during FY 86-87, an increase of 31.9% from the previous fiscal year.

The Foster Care Magistrate hears cases where the Human Services Division of the Department of Social Services files a petition for guardianship in probate courts. The Magistrate has been appointed in 62 counties statewide and travels to the various judicial circuits to hold the necessary hearings. The Magistrate's caseload statistics for FY 86-87 reflect a total of 316 hearings, for an increase of 16.8% from the previous fiscal year.

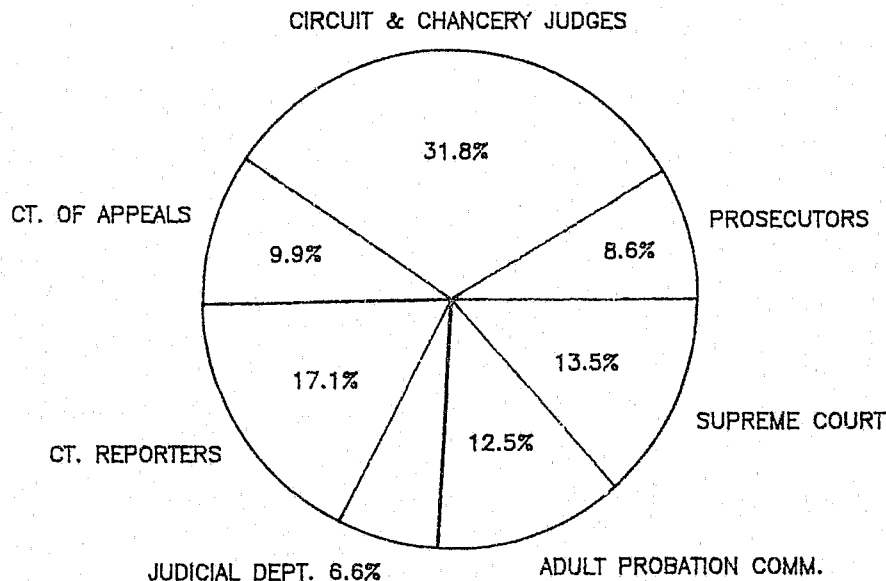
## COURT FINANCES

The state portion of the FY86-87 funding for courts is \$16,594,411. This covers only those costs that are considered a state responsibility. The state assumes salaries and expenses for cir-

cuit and chancery judges, court reporters and prosecuting attorneys. The cost of operating the Judicial Department, the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals is borne entirely by the state. This cost includes salaries

and all other expenses related to the operation of their offices. The state assumes partial responsibility for funding the Adult Probation Commission. The remainder of court funding is provided by county and city government.

## **Board of Certified Court Reporter Examiners**

The Board of Certified Court Reporter Examiners was established in 1983. This board has the primary responsibility of implementing and administering the rules and regulations of the Court Reporter Certification Program.

The Board is composed of seven members who are appointed by the Supreme Court. Four of the members are judges of the General Jurisdiction or Appellate Courts, and the remaining three members are court reporters. The members are appointed for a term of 3 years.

## **Board of Legal Specialization**

The Board of Legal Specialization is responsible for the drafting, publishing, implementation and enforcement of the standards, rules and regulations that govern how attorneys may represent themselves to the public as specialists in one or more fields of law or law practice.

## **Client Security Fund Committee**

This Committee is authorized to consider claims of clients who have suffered losses by reason of dishonesty of attorneys who represented them. The committee is authorized to pay such claims (within limits) from a fund established by the Court and supported by a portion of the annual license fee. The committee is comprised of five members. One member is appointed at large and the remainder from each Congressional District. The members are: Bobby Shepherd, Chairman; James King, Donald Raney, Meredith Catlett and Dewain Hodge.

## **Committee on Professional Conduct**

The Committee on Professional Conduct receives and investigates complaints against attorneys who are charged with professional misconduct. Activity of this committee is financed by a portion of the annual license fees.

Members of the committee are appointed by the Supreme Court to serve seven year terms. The committee is comprised of seven members. One is appointed from each Congressional District and three are appointed at large. Members of the committee are: Beryl Smith, Chairman; Sam Ed Gibson, Gary Isbell, Damon Young, Susan Miller, Nancy Wood and Darrell Brown. Mike Gaines, the only full-time employee, is the Executive Secretary of the committee.

### **State Board of Law Examiners**

This Board prepares the questions for the Bar examinations conducted twice yearly, grades the papers of those taking the examinations and certifies to the Court the names of those who pass. It also investigates and recommends applicants for admission by reciprocity.

Members of the Board are appointed for a term of three years. Two members are appointed from each Congressional District, with three

members appointed at large. Hayward Battle is the Executive Secretary. Members are: Bill Bristow, Chairman; Gale Stewart, Garland Ridenour, Ronald May, E. Lamar Pettus, Robert Hargraves, James McLarty, Roy Stanley, Martin Gilbert, James Pilkinton, Jr. and Joyce Warren.

### **Unauthorized Practice of Law Committee**

This committee has the responsibility of receiving and investigating com-

plaints against persons charged with practicing law without a license.

One member is appointed from each Congressional District. Three members are appointed at large. The at-large members of the committee are non-lawyers.

The members of the committee are: Zack Wilson, Chairman; Jerry Pinson, Kathleen Bell, John Graves, Mel Orender, Wayne Hartsfield and Ernest Matkin.

## **OTHER COMMISSIONS, COUNCILS AND BOARDS**

**(The following organizations, which are not created by Supreme Court per curiam Order, are active within the judicial branch)**

### **Arkansas Judicial Council, Inc.**

The Judicial Council consists of the Justices of the Supreme Court, Judges of the Court of Appeals, Judges of the Circuit and Chancery Court and retired judges. The Council was organized to foster and preserve the integrity, dignity and independence of the judiciary; to promote uniformity and dispatch in judicial administration; to develop, implement and maintain a program of judicial education for assisting members newly elected or appointed to the bench; to provide continuing judicial education for members, accommodating the diverse needs of chancellors, circuit judges and appellate justices; and to select members of the Judicial Retirement Board.

The Judicial Council meets in the spring and fall each year. During the meetings, educational presentations are provided and the subcommittees meet to discuss issues that might affect the Judiciary.

Officers are: Circuit Judge John Goodson, President; Chancellor Eugene "Kayo" Harris, Vice-President; Chris Thomas, Secretary-Treasurer.

### **Municipal Judges Council, Inc.**

The Municipal Judges Council was formed as a voluntary organization to: promote the effectiveness of the Municipal Courts; to provide a comprehensive educational program for all the municipal judges to meet with their peers to discuss criminal justice problems and solutions.

The Municipal Judges Council meets annually in May. Educational topics are presented and a business meeting is held to elect officers and discuss issues that concern municipal courts.

Officers of the Council are: John Crain, President; David Hale, First Vice-President; and Leroy Froman, Secretary-Treasurer.

### **Judicial Retirement Board**

The Judicial Retirement Board was created to determine the eligibility for retirement or disability of judges of the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, Circuit and Chancery Courts.

The members of the Board are selected and serve at the pleasure of the State Judicial Council. The members are: Associate Justice Robert Dudley, Gayle Ford and John Graves.

### **Judicial Ethics Committee**

The Judicial Ethics Committee was created in 1977 and became operational in December of 1978. The committee has the following powers and duties:

- 1) to investigate formal charges or complaints or alleged violations of laws, canons of judicial ethics, and the mental or physical disability of members of the Supreme, Circuit, Chancery and Municipal Courts which affect their competency or ability to perform the duties of their office.
- 2) to prepare and file with the General Assembly a bill of charges, specifying the misconduct or disability with which a member of the judicial branch is charged, whenever the committee believes there is probable cause for discipline or removal from office.

The committee is composed of five members, appointed by the Governor, Speaker of the House and the Senate Committee on Committees. The members of the committee are: George Steel, Jr., Jerry Cavaneau, Meredith Wineland, Dale Price and Don Smith. The committee employs an investigator, David Harrel.

### **Code Revision Commission**

This commission, established by statute, is responsible for publishing amendments to the statutes of Arkansas. During the 1987 legislative session the name of the commission was changed to the Arkansas Code Revision Commission and its duties were enlarged to provide for continuing review, revision, codification and updating of the statutes.

Supreme Court appointees to the commission are: William S. Arnold, Chairman; Douglas O. Smith, Jr. and William H. Sutton. Other commission-

ers are: R.B. Friedlander, Lawrence Averill, J.W. Looney, Senator Mike Beebe and Representative J.L. Shaver, Jr. Vince Henderson serves as Director of the Commission.

### **Adult Probation Commission**

The Adult Probation Commission was established to make probation services available throughout the state, to improve the effectiveness of probation services, to provide alternatives to incarceration and to establish uni-

form probation administration standards.

The commission consists of nine members, five of whom are circuit judges who hear criminal cases and four who are private citizens not employed in the criminal justice system. Members serve a term of six years. Commission members are: Michael O'Brien, Chairman; William Enfield, Cecil Tedder, John Langston, Hugh Lookadoo, Gayle Ford, James Haddock, Lucretia McDonald and H.W. Stewart, Jr. Linda Oldner serves as Director of the Commission.

## SUPREME COURT

1 Chief Justice, 6 Associate Justices

Jurisdiction:

- Appellate jurisdiction over lower court cases involving constitutional issues, acts, municipal or county ordinance, rules of courts or administrative agencies, appeals from Public Service, Transportation, and Pollution Control Commission, criminal convictions of death, life imprisonment, or more than 30 years, post-conviction relief petitions, writs of quo warranto, prohibition, injunction, mandamus, or certiorari, election cases, attorney discipline, usury cases, products liability cases, questions of oil, gas or mineral rights, the law of torts or the construction of deeds or wills, or cases in which there is a prior decision by the Supreme Court.
- Appellate jurisdiction over those appeals certified for review from the Court of Appeals.

## COURT OF APPEALS

6 Judges

Jurisdiction:

- Appellate jurisdiction over lower court cases except those appealed directly to the Supreme Court.

## CIRCUIT COURT

24 Districts, 32 Judges

Jurisdiction:

- Civil cases over \$100.
- Original jurisdiction in felony.
- Juvenile delinquency.
- Hears appeal de novo.
- Jury trials.

## 8 COMBINED CIRCUIT & CHANCERY JUDGES

## CHANCERY & PROBATE COURTS

24 Districts, 30 Judges

Jurisdiction:

- Courts of equity (land disputes, domestic relations, etc.) Hears probate matters and adoptions.
- Juveniles in need of supervision and dependency neglect.
- No jury trial.

## MUNICIPAL COURTS

122 Courts, 105 Judges

Jurisdiction:

- Contract, personal injury and property damage - \$3,000 and less.
- Felony preliminaries, misdemeanors, small claims.
- No jury trials.

## CITY COURTS

94 Courts, 79 Judges

Jurisdiction:

- Civil cases under \$300.
- Misdemeanors and city ordinance violations.
- No jury trials.

## COUNTY COURTS

75 Courts, 75 Judges

Jurisdiction:

- Original jurisdiction in county taxes, county expenditures, and claims against county.
- Bastardy proceedings.
- No jury trials.

## COURTS OF COMMON PLEAS

5 Courts, 5 Judges

Jurisdiction: Varies.

- Contracts and other civil matters under \$1,000, not involving title to property.
- Jury trials.

## POLICE COURTS

5 Courts, 4 Judges

Jurisdiction:

- Civil cases under \$300.
- Misdemeanors and city ordinance violations.
- No jury trials.
