

## **INTRODUCTION**

Crime and Delinquency in California, 1988, Advance Release is published by the Bureau of Criminal Statistics in order to provide annual criminal justice data at the earliest possible time. Information on crimes, arrests, the juvenile justice system, and adult felony arrest dispositions is contained in this publication.

This information is based on data reported to the Bureau of Criminal Statistics for the calendar year. The more extensive and detailed report, *Crime and Delinquency in California*, 1988, will be published later this year.

The California Crime Index (CCI) comprises willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, and motor vehicle theft.

#### From 1983 to 1988:

California Crime Index offenses reported increased 2.2 percent in rate per 100,000 population.

#### From 1987 to 1988:

The California Crime Index increased 1.1 percent in rate.

The offenses which make up the California Crime Index are grouped into violent and property crime categories.

Violent crimes comprise willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crimes comprise burglary and motor vehicle theft.


#### In 1988,

Of 935,520 California Crime Index offenses reported:

- Violent crimes accounted for 28.0 percent (261,990).
- Property crimes accounted for 72.0 percent (673,530).


The CCI has increased 2.2 percent in rate since 1983.

## CALIFORNIA CRIME INDEX, 1983-1988 Rate per 100,000 Population





## CALIFORNIA CRIME INDEX, 1988 By Category





## VIOLENT AND PROPERTY CRIMES, 1983-1988 Rate per 100,000 Population



#### From 1983 to 1988:

- Violent crimes reported increased 19.8 percent in rate.
- Property crimes reported decreased 3.3 percent in rate.

#### From 1987 to 1988:

- The violent crime rate increased .7 percent.
- The property crime rate increased 1.3 percent.

In 1988,

Of 261,990 violent crimes reported:

- Willful homicide accounted for 1.1 percent (2,947).
- Forcible rape accounted for 4.5 percent (11,771).
- Robbery accounted for 32.9 percent (86,190).
- Aggravated assault accounted for 61.5 percent (161,082).

Of 673,530 property crimes reported:

- Burglary accounted for 60.5 percent (407,555).
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 39.5 percent (265,975).

The violent crime trend reflects increases in aggravated assault caused by domestic violence being reported as criminal conduct.

The property crime rate is up slightly in 1988 because of a large increase in motor vehicle theft.

#### From 1983 to 1988:


- There was a 1.0 percent decrease in the rate of willful homicide crimes.
- There was a 13.3 percent decrease in the rate of forcible rape crimes.
- There was a 10.7 percent decrease in the rate of robbery crimes.
- There was a 52.5 percent increase in the rate of aggravated assault crimes.

### From 1987 to 1988:

- There was a 1.9 percent rate decrease in willful homicide crimes.
- There was a 5.0 percent rate decrease in forcible rape crimes.
- There was a 1.0 percent rate increase in robbery crimes.
- There was a 1.1 percent rate increase in aggravated assault crimes.


Aggravated assault has the highest rate of the four violent crime offenses. The large increase from 1985 to 1986 is attributed to a 1986 law change which required reporting domestic violence incidents as criminal conduct.

#### From 1983 to 1988:

- There was a 21.3 percent decrease in the rate of burglary crimes.
- There was a 48.8 percent increase in the rate of motor vehicle theft crimes.

## From 1987 to 1988:

- There was a 5.2 percent rate decrease in burglary crimes.
- There was a 13.1 percent rate increase in motor vehicle theft crimes.

The 48.8 percent increase in the motor vehicle theft rate since 1983 has influenced both the property crime rate and the CCI.

## **ARRESTS**

#### From 1983 to 1988:

- For total arrests, there was a 4.1 percent increase in rate per 100,000 population at risk.
- There was a 4.2 percent increase in the rate of adult arrests and a 3.1 percent increase in the rate of juvenile arrests.

#### From 1987 to 1988:

- There was a .9 percent rate decrease in total arrests.
- There was a 1.1 percent decrease in the rate of adult arrests and a .6 percent increase in the rate of juvenile arrests.

### In 1988,

#### Of 1,903,067 arrests reported:

- Adult arrests accounted for 88.0 percent (1,673,864).
- Juvenile arrests accounted for 12.0 percent (229,203).


#### And.

- Felony arrests accounted for 28.9 percent (550,446).
- Misdemeanor arrests accounted for 69.8 percent (1,328,737).
- Status offense arrests accounted for 1.3 percent (23,884).

The total arrest rate registered a slight decrease in 1988 (down .9 percent).


#### **ARRESTS IN CALIFORNIA, 1983-1988**

Total, Adult, and Juvenile Rate per 100,000 Population at Risk



## TOTAL ARRESTS, 1988 By Type of Arrest




By Level of Arrest


## FELONY ARRESTS, 1983-1988 Arrest Offense Category

## **ARRESTS**

#### From 1983 to 1988:

- There was a 33.3 percent increase in the rate of felony arrests.
- Violent crime arrests increased 43.3 percent in rate.
- Property crime arrests increased 7.7 percent in rate.
- Drug law violation arrests increased 93.9 percent in rate.
- All other felony arrests increased 9.1 percent in rate.

## From 1987 to 1988:

- There was a 7.4 percent increase in the rate of felony arrests.
- Violent crime arrests increased 6.3 percent in rate.
- Property crime arrests increased 5.0 percent in rate.
- Drug law violation arrests increased 12.4 percent in rate.
- All other felony arrests increased 4.4 percent in rate.

In 1988,

#### Of 550,446 felony arrests reported:

- Violent crimes accounted for 21.5 percent (118,601).
- Property crimes accounted for 36.7 percent (202,053).
- Drug law violations accounted for 30.9 percent (170,156).
- All other felony offenses accounted for 10.8 percent (59,636).

## JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

The term "new referral" means that the juvenile was not on probation or parole at the time of referral. This does not mean that the juvenile has not had previous contact with the juvenile justice system.

#### From 1983 to 1988:

New referrals to probation departments increased 6.4 percent in rate per 100,000 population at risk.

#### From 1987 to 1988:


New referrals decreased 1.8 percent in rate.

#### In 1988.

Of 104,674 new referrals disposed of by the probation departments:


- Closed or transferred dispositions accounted for 57.1 percent (59,731).
- Placements on informal probation accounted for 13.5 percent (14,087).
- Petitions filed with the juvenile court accounted for 29.5 percent (30,856).

## PROBATION DEPARTMENT DISPOSITIONS OF NEW REFERRALS, 1988<sup>a</sup>



## JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

The term "new petition" means that the juvenile was not on probation or parole at the time the petition was filed in juvenile court. This does not mean that the juvenile has not previously had a petition filed.

#### From 1983 to 1988:

New petitions in juvenile court decreased 2.6 percent in rate per 100,000 population at risk.

#### From 1987 to 1988:


New petitions decreased 4.2 percent in rate.

#### In 1988,

Of 30,856 juvenile court dispositions of new petitions:

- Dismissed, transferred, and remanded to adult court accounted for 27.1 percent (8,349).
- Non-ward probation accounted for 6.3 percent (1,948).
- Formal probation accounted for 65.8 percent (20,300).
- Commitments to the California Youth Authority accounted for .8 percent (259).

# ADULT FELONY ARREST DISPOSITIONS

The proportion of convictions were calculated using both the total number of reported adult felony arrest dispositions and the total number of reported complaints filed.

From 1983 to 1988,

As a percent of reported adult felony arrest dispositions:

Convictions increased 2.3 percentage points (55.5 to 57.8 percent).

As a percent of reported complaints filed:


Convictions increased 1.6 percentage points (77.0 to 78.6 percent).

In 1988,

Of the 265,990 reported dispositions of adult felony arrests:


- 7.2 percent were law enforcement releases.
- 19.3 percent were complaints denied.
- 15.7 percent were dismissed or acquitted.
- 57.8 percent were convicted.





From 1983 to 1988,

Of the total adult felony arrestees convicted:

- The largest increase was for sentences to probation with jail (up 9.1 percentage points).
- The largest decrease was for straight probation sentences (down 8.5 percentage points).
- ☐ The proportion of sentences to state institutions and jail varied slightly (up 1.8 and down 2.5 percentage points, respectively).

In 1988,

Of the 153,671 adult felony arrestees convicted:

- □ 87.4 percent received incarcerative sentences.
- ☐ 12.5 percent received sentences of probation.

Since 1983, sentences to probation with jail have increased 9.1 percentage points and now account for more than six out of ten sentences.
