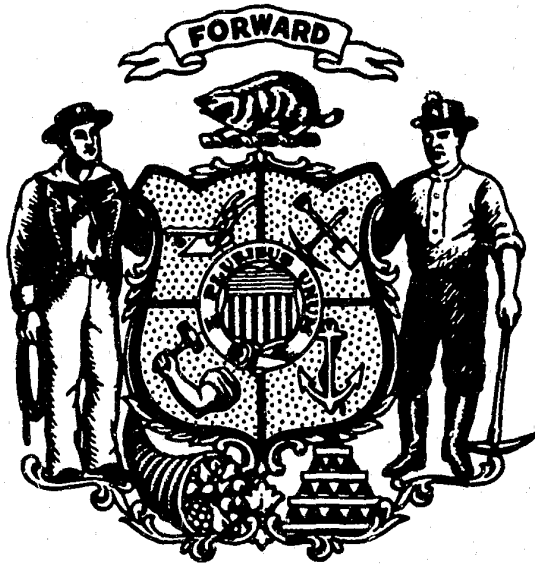

CALENDAR YEAR SUMMARY REPORT
OF POPULATION MOVEMENT
1989

This publication provides the reader with summary information about the volume and movements of offenders in the custody of the Division of Corrections, now Department of Corrections, during calendar year 1989. It is a compilation of data originally published on a monthly basis in Statistical Bulletin C-59, Report of Wisconsin Corrections Population.

HIGHLIGHTS - TOTAL POPULATIONS

- On December 31, 1989, a total of 41,817 offenders were under the supervision of the Division, now the Department of Corrections; an increase of 10.5 percent over the 37,849 offenders under supervision on January 1, 1989.
- The average daily population under state corrections supervision in Wisconsin rose 6.6 percent from 32,754 in calendar year 1988 to 34,929 in calendar year 1989.
- During the past five years average daily population under supervision have increased 19.1 percent, from 29,326 in calendar year 1985 to 34,929 in calendar year 1989.

HIGHLIGHTS - ADULT INSTITUTION POPULATIONS

- Adult institution population data includes information about offenders serving Wisconsin sentences in federal facilities, a Minnesota state prison, and in Wisconsin county jails. Information about offenders confined in these contract facilities appears in a column labeled "Contr Facil." (See Table 1)
- Offenders serving sentences at the Wisconsin Resource Center, an institution operated by the Department of Health and Social Services, Division of Care and Treatment Facilities, are not included in this publication.
- The population resident in correctional institutions for adult offenders increased 7.2 percent from 6,014 at the beginning of the year to 6,445 at the close of calendar year 1989. (See Table 1)
- The number of males resident in correctional facilities for adults rose from 5,747 at the start to 6,164 at the end of calendar year 1989; an increase of 7.3 percent. During the same time period the female resident population increased 5.2 percent from 267 to 281. (See Table 1)
- The average daily population of offenders confined in correctional facilities for adults rose from 4,876 in 1985 to 6,220 in 1989; a high for the five-year period and an increase of 25.3 percent. (See Table A)

HIGHLIGHTS - COMMUNITY SUPERVISION POPULATIONS

- Community supervision cases increased 11.5 percent from 27,033 in January to 30,155 at the end of 1989. (See Table 3)
- The number of community services cases placed on absconder status in calendar year 1989 increased 8.6 percent from 4,272 to 4,639. (See Table 4)

- The average daily population of offenders under community supervision rose steadily from 23,919 in 1985 to 28,152 in 1989; an increase of 17.7 percent. (See Table A)
- Probation supervision average daily populations increased 18.6 percent from 20,403 in 1985 to 24,207 in 1989. (See Table A)
- The average daily population of offenders under parole supervision rose 12.2 percent from 3,516 in 1985 to 3,945 in 1989. (See Table A)
- There was an overall increase of 10.8 percent in adult parole supervision resident populations from 3,167 in 1985 to 3,510 in 1989.
- The largest increase, 4.7 percent, during the five year period occurred between 1987 when the average daily population of adult parole supervision cases was 3,302 and 1988 when an average daily population of 3,456 was reported. (See Table A)
- Juvenile aftercare average daily populations, which were at a five year high of 190 in calendar year 1986, decreased 14.2 percent to 163 in calendar year 1988, and then increased 3.7 percent to 169 in calendar year 1989. (See Table A)
- The repeal of the Youthful Offender Statute, effective July 1, 1978 and a Department of Health and Social Services policy decision to discontinue provision of juvenile probation services on a state level are the factors that account for the almost complete disappearance of cases in these categories. (See Table 3, Table A)

HIGHLIGHTS - JUVENILE INSTITUTION POPULATIONS

- The population resident in correctional institutions for juvenile offenders rose from 530 at the beginning of calendar year 1989 to 578 at the end of the year; an increase of 9.1 percent. (See Table 2)
- Information about juvenile institution populations and the Youth Aids program will not appear in subsequent editions of this publication. Since January 1, 1990, juvenile correctional facilities are the responsibility of the Department of Health and Social Services' new Division of Youth Services, Bureau of Residential Institutions.
