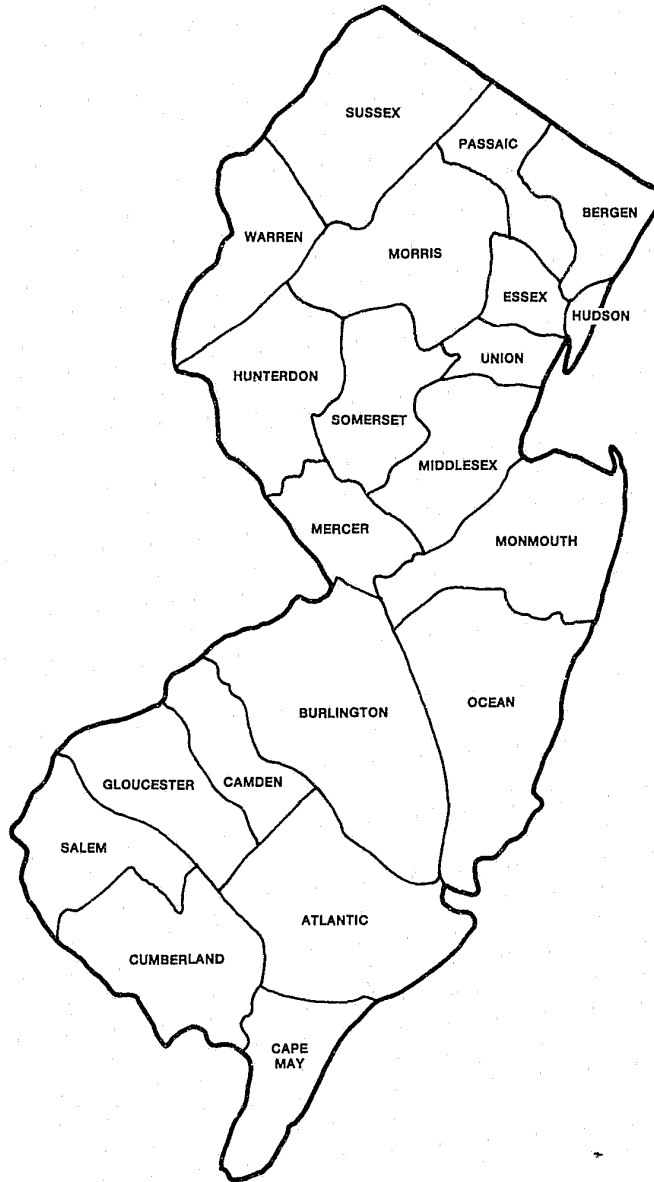

Dear Governor and Member of the Legislature:

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 52:17B-5.5, I am submitting the twenty-fourth annual report of crime in New Jersey. The annual report is based on crime statistics submitted to the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System by every New Jersey law enforcement agency for the year 1990.

Effective law enforcement requires accurate crime statistics in order to identify the extent, type and location of criminal activity. Criminal Justice administrators and planners have long recognized the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as the vehicle to accomplish this objective.

The success of the Uniform Crime Reporting System during 1990 could not have been realized without the cooperation extended by each of the 562 law enforcement agencies of the state, the New Jersey Chiefs of Police Association and the County Prosecutors Association.

It is in the interest of more effective law enforcement for over seven million residents of New Jersey that the twenty-fourth annual report is submitted.

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, i.e., felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this committee have proven valuable to the success of the program. This committee works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies, and procedures.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1990, offense and arrest data were received from 486 full-time municipal police departments, three (3) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 70 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 486 full-time municipal police departments there are eight police departments contracted by other municipalities.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data was received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors, sheriffs' departments, four (4) county police departments, and three (3) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the nine (9) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as fourteen (14) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 562 law enforcement agencies submit their reports to the New Jersey State Police.

METHOD

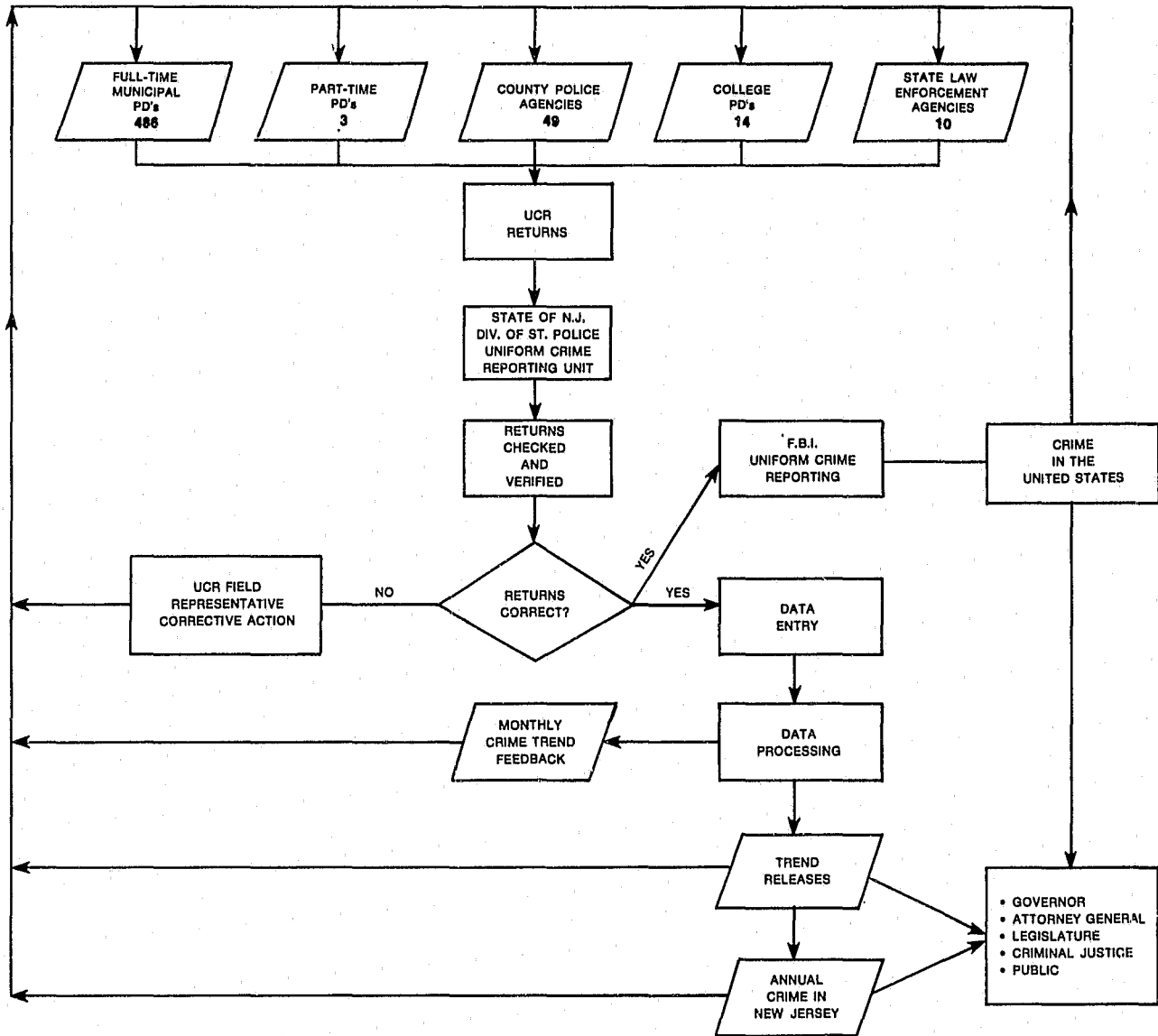
A State of New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Guide has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey" and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications

exclude manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are further referred to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "Municipal and County Offense and Demographic Data," and Section II, "State Summary and Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories is also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

VERIFICATION PROCESSES

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided each contributor, they are not the panacea for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and recordkeeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault is not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,031.3 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Labor Market and Demographic Research. The 1990 preliminary census population count was used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were initially compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN-SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding rural municipalities.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part I offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters.

Set forth below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

ROBBERY

Decreases:

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Increased communications technology has led to better communication and increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Units in high robbery areas.

Increases:

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

BURGLARY

Decreases:

- Better deployment of police manpower, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable times and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code has been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

Increases:

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas have led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied for long periods of time.

LARCENY

Decreases:

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deter criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many municipalities.

Increases:

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.
- Certain types of property such as tape decks, radar detectors and radios are popular and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicle.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.

Increases:

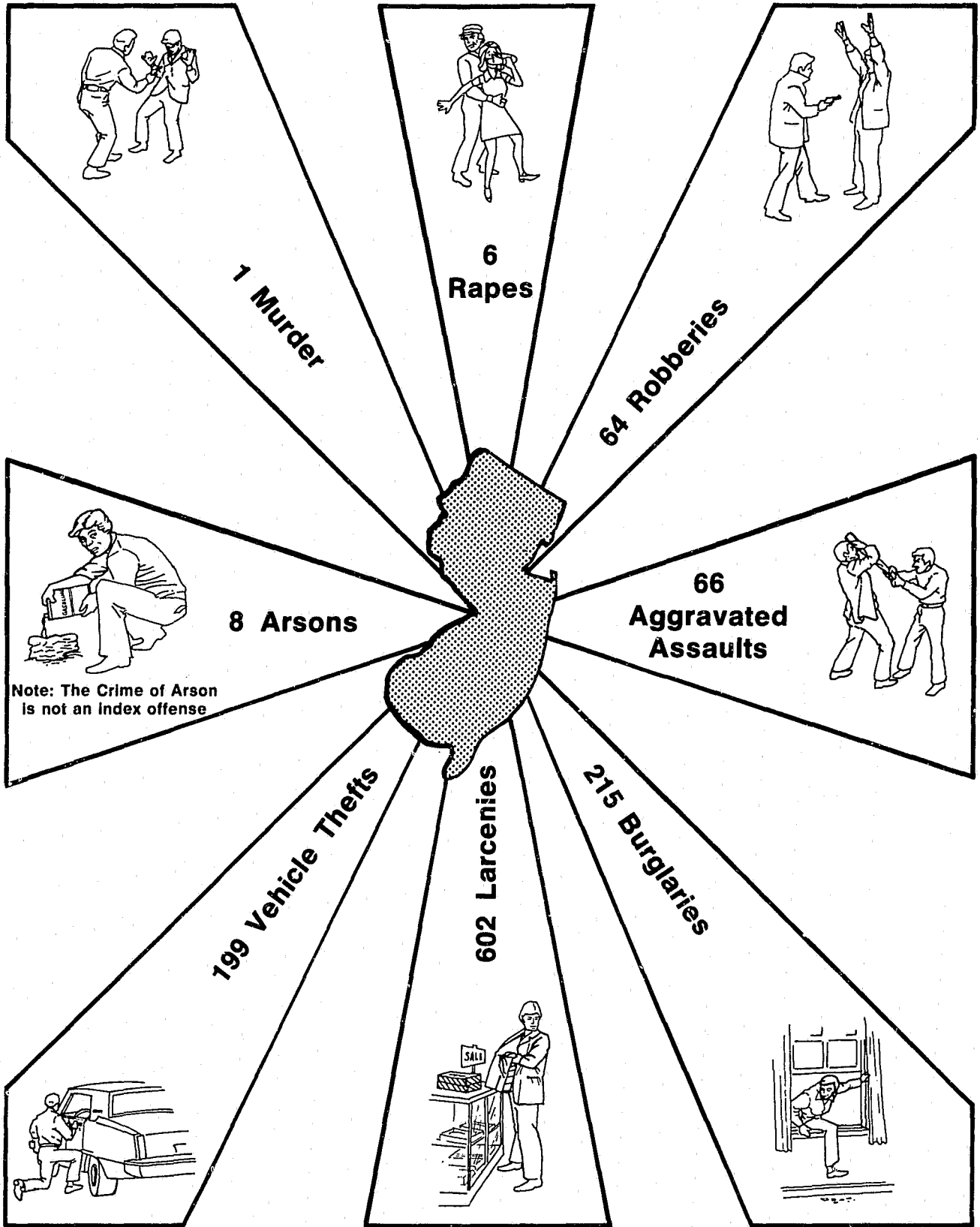
- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.

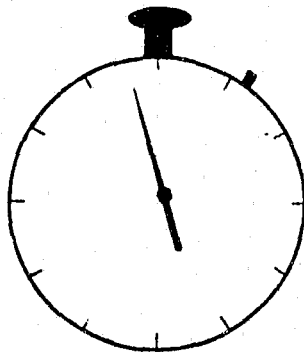

The Crime Clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the index offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of these offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

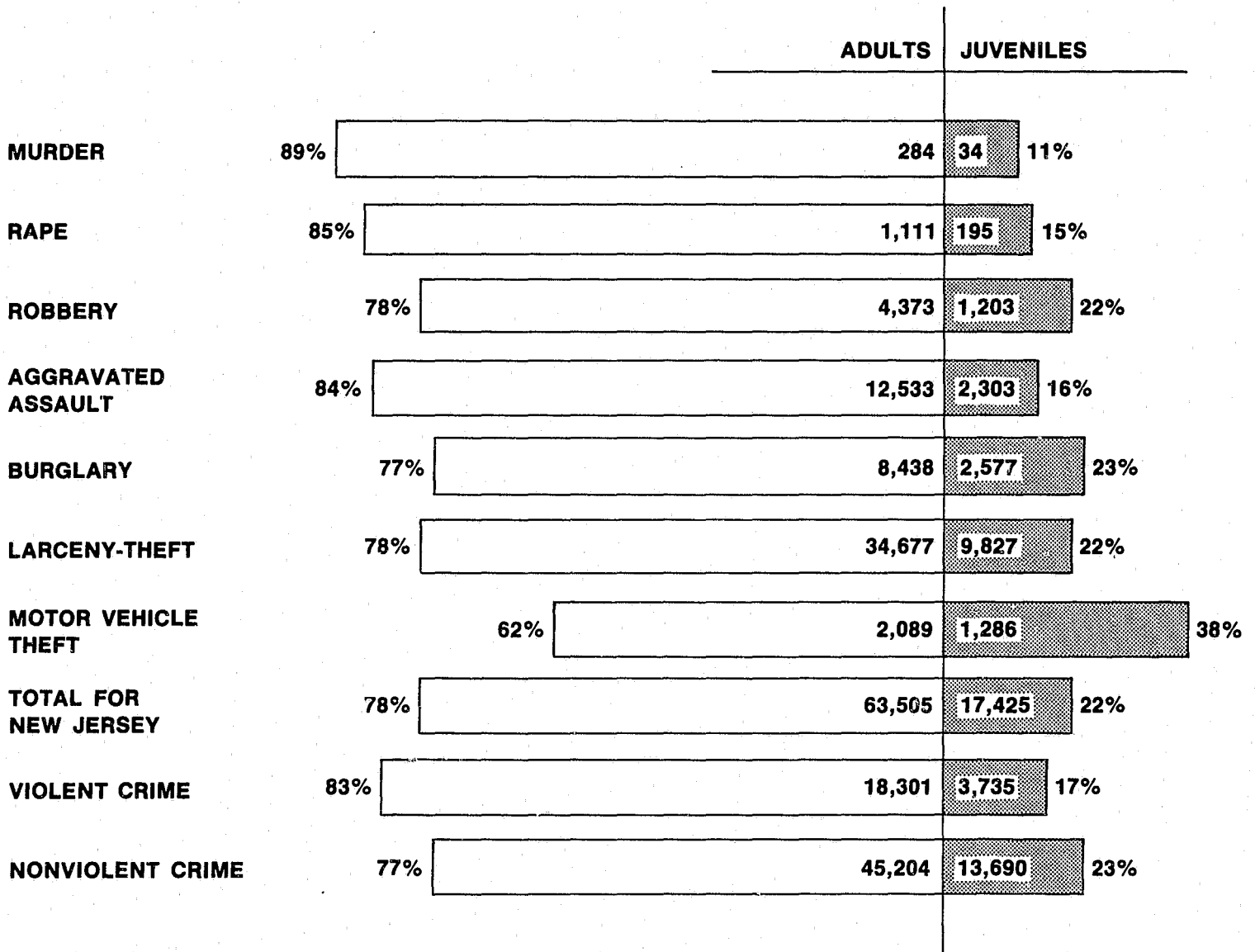

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY—1990

CRIME INDEX—VOLUME/RATE

- There were 421,034 Index offenses reported in 1990, a 3 percent increase compared to 1989.
- The crime rate of the state is 54.5 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, an increase of 3 percent compared to 1989.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 38,924 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while February was the lowest with 31,475 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$682.2 million in 1990, a 4 percent increase from 1989.
- Value of property recovered was \$345.1 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 51 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 66 percent of stolen property and 95 percent of the recovered property value.

CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 84,741 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 6 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Adult Index arrests increased 6 percent and juvenile arrests increased 9 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 19 percent of the total arrests in 1990.
- Males accounted for 79 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 21 percent.
- Fifty-two percent of the Index arrests were white, 47 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 19 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 22 percent of these clearances.

VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 50,067 violent crimes reported in 1990, a 6 percent increase compared to the violent crimes reported in 1989.
- Violent crimes accounted for 12 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate increased 7 percent to 6.5 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in June with 4,690 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 3,635.
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$16.4 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arrests for violent crime offenses increased 8 percent to 22,683.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 27 percent of the Index arrests and 5 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime increased 7 percent and juvenile arrests showed a 13 percent increase.
- Adults accounted for 77 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 23 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 88 percent and females for 12 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Forty-one percent of those arrested were white, 58 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-four percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 17 percent of these clearances.

NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 370,967 nonviolent crimes reported in 1990, a 3 percent increase compared to the 360,147 reported in 1989.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 88 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate increased 3 percent to 48.0 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 1990.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 34,578 while the lowest number was reported in February with 27,840.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$664.9 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 62,058 nonviolent crime arrests, this represents an increase of 6 percent when compared to 1989.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 73 percent of the Index arrests and 14 percent of the total arrests during 1990.
- Juveniles were responsible for 32 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 68 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests increased 5 percent while juvenile arrests increased 7 percent.
- Males represented 75 percent and females 25 percent of persons arrested for the nonviolent crime.
- Fifty-seven percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 42 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Sixteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 1990 and juveniles accounted for 23 percent of these clearances.

TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 440,534 persons arrested in 1990 which represents a 1 percent decrease compared to 1989.
- The arrest rate for 1990 decreased 1 percent to 57.0 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests decreased 1 percent to 350,269 and juvenile arrests increased less than one-half of one percent to 90,265 in 1990.
- Adults accounted for 80 percent and juveniles 20 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 35 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 82 percent and females 18 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Sixty-one percent of the total persons arrested in 1990 were white, 38 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There were no police officers feloniously killed in the line of duty during 1990 in New Jersey.
- There were 5,002 police officers assaulted during the performance of duty in 1990 in New Jersey.

CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- The Crime Index in New Jersey increased 3 percent, while the United States increased 1 percent and the Northeast Region increased 2 percent.
- Violent crime in New Jersey increased 6 percent, the United States increased 10 percent and the Northeast region increased 6 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey increased 3 percent, while the Northeastern states increased 1 percent and the United States decreased 1 percent.

MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, and assaults to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 432 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1990, a 10 percent increase compared to the 394 murders reported in 1989.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and 1 percent of the violent crime.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The age group of 25-29 accounted for 18 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 37 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 30 percent, blunt objects in 9 percent and physical force in 12 percent.
- Thirty-seven percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 14 percent were relatives, and 17 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 19 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 71 percent of the 84 felony murders.
- Saturday was the highest day of the week for reported murders with 75, while Monday was the lowest with 48.
- October recorded the highest number of murders, with 46, while April and May had the lowest with 24 in each month.
- Thirty-eight percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 27 percent in multi-family or apartment dwellings, and 18 percent in single family dwellings.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of murder amounted to \$60,433.

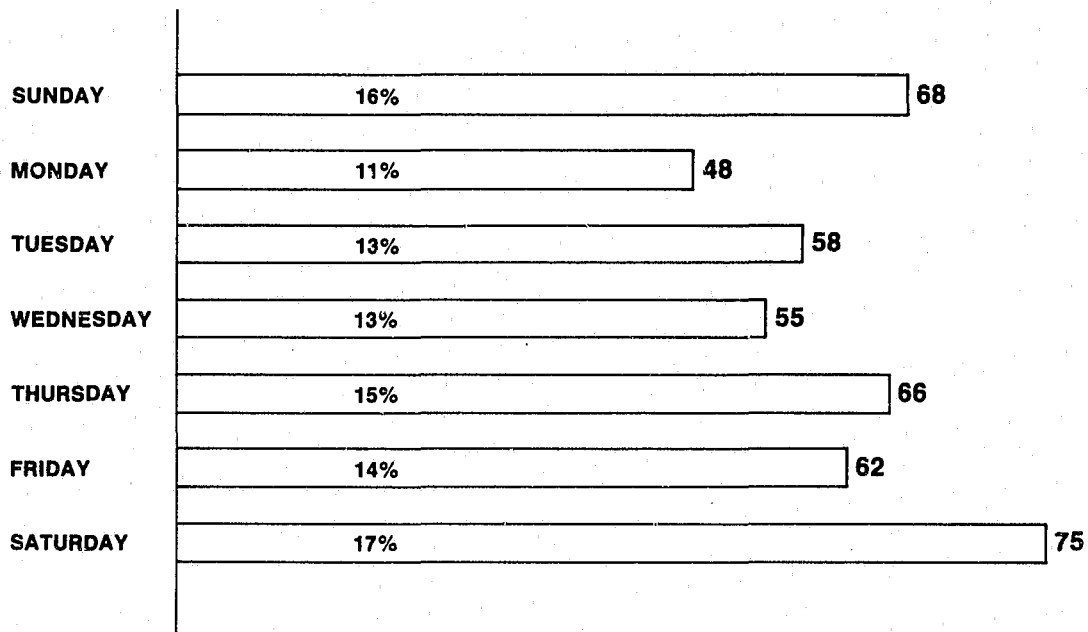
ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 375 persons were arrested for murder in 1990, a 15 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Adult murder arrests increased 12 percent (from 289 to 324) and juvenile arrests increased 34 percent (from 38 to 51).
- Sixty-two percent of persons arrested for murder were black, 37 percent were white and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-four percent of the murders were cleared in 1990 (318 out of 432). Juveniles accounted for 11 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of those arrested for murder.

MURDER BY DAY OF WEEK

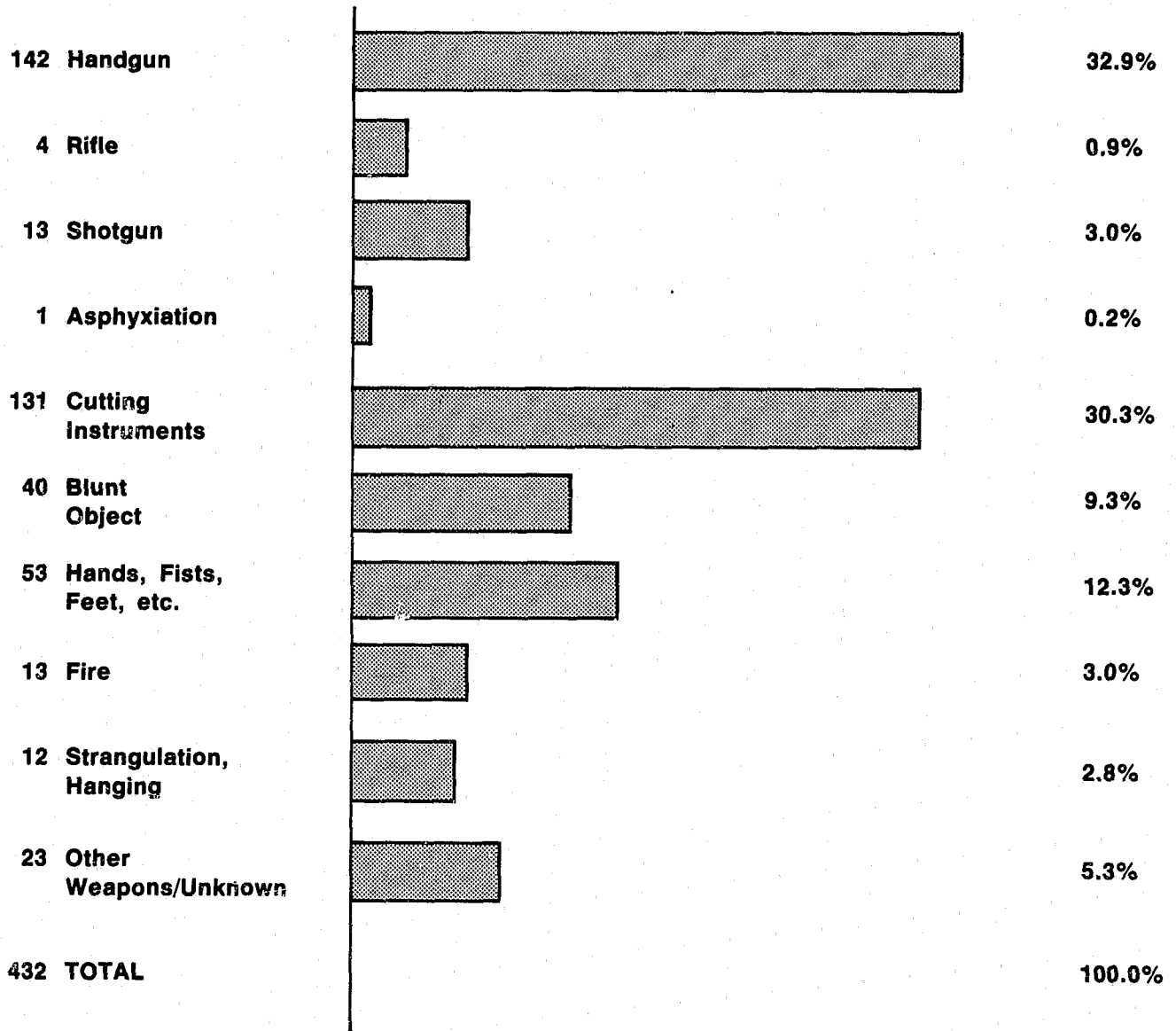

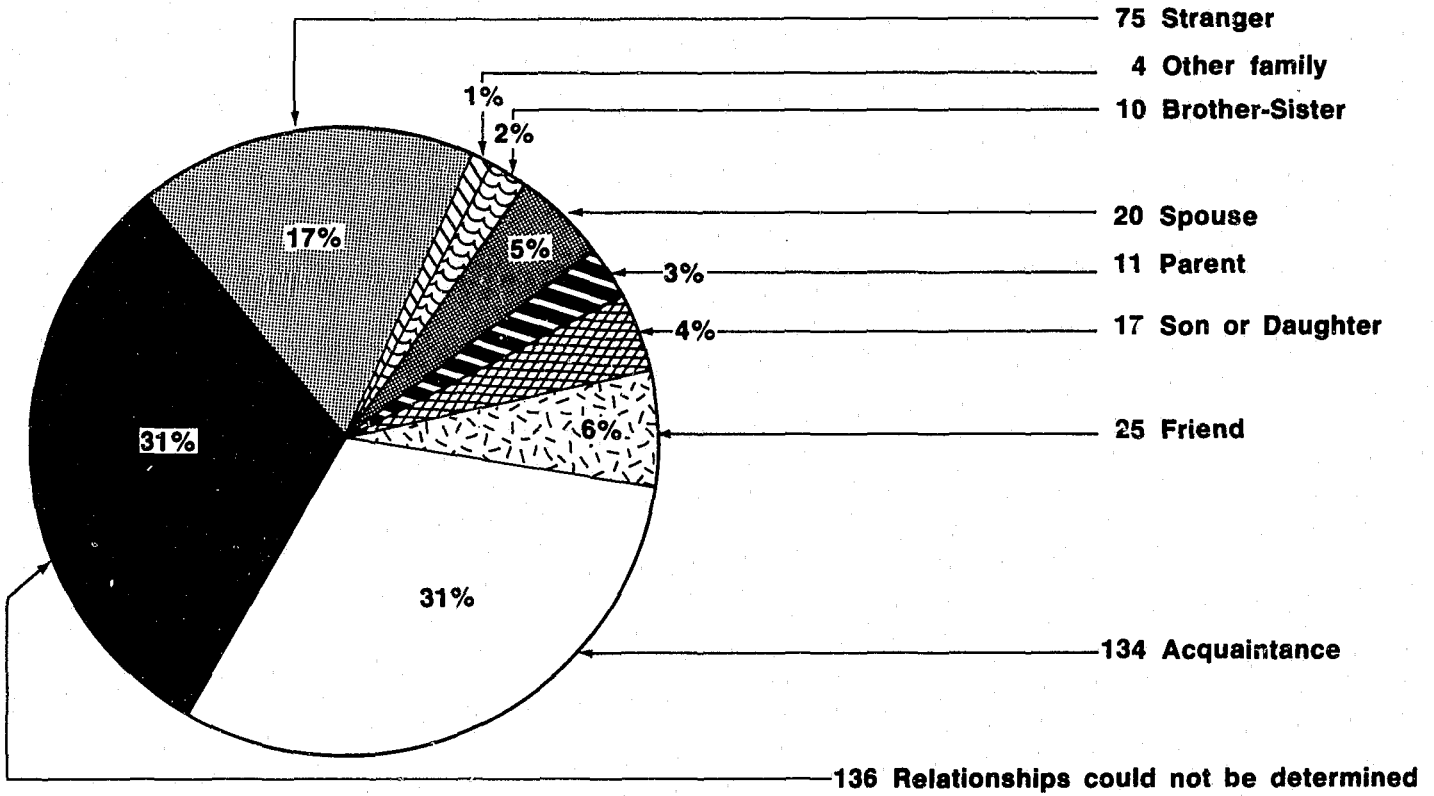

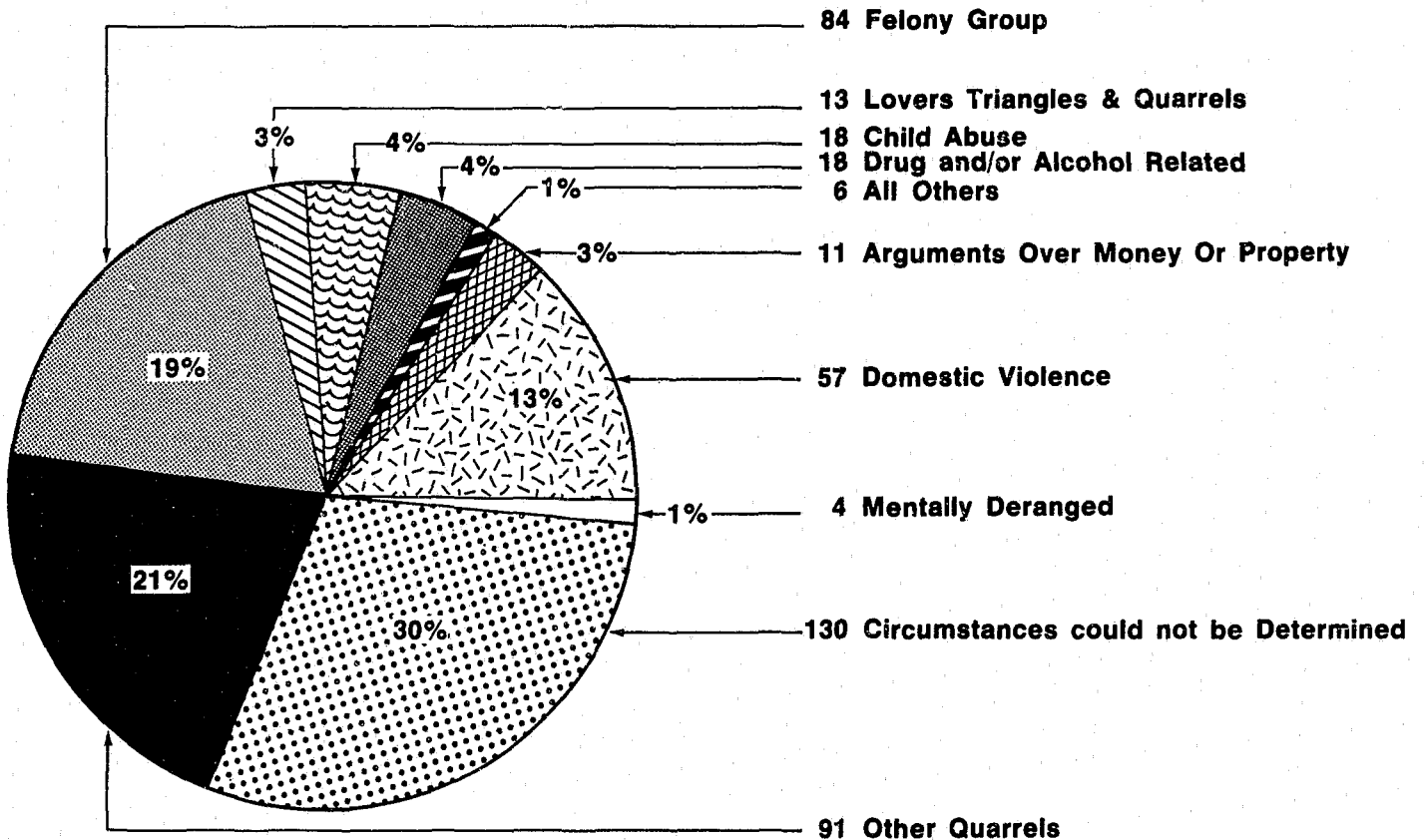
MURDER—Distribution by Type of Weapon



RELATIONSHIP OF MURDER VICTIMS TO OFFENDER

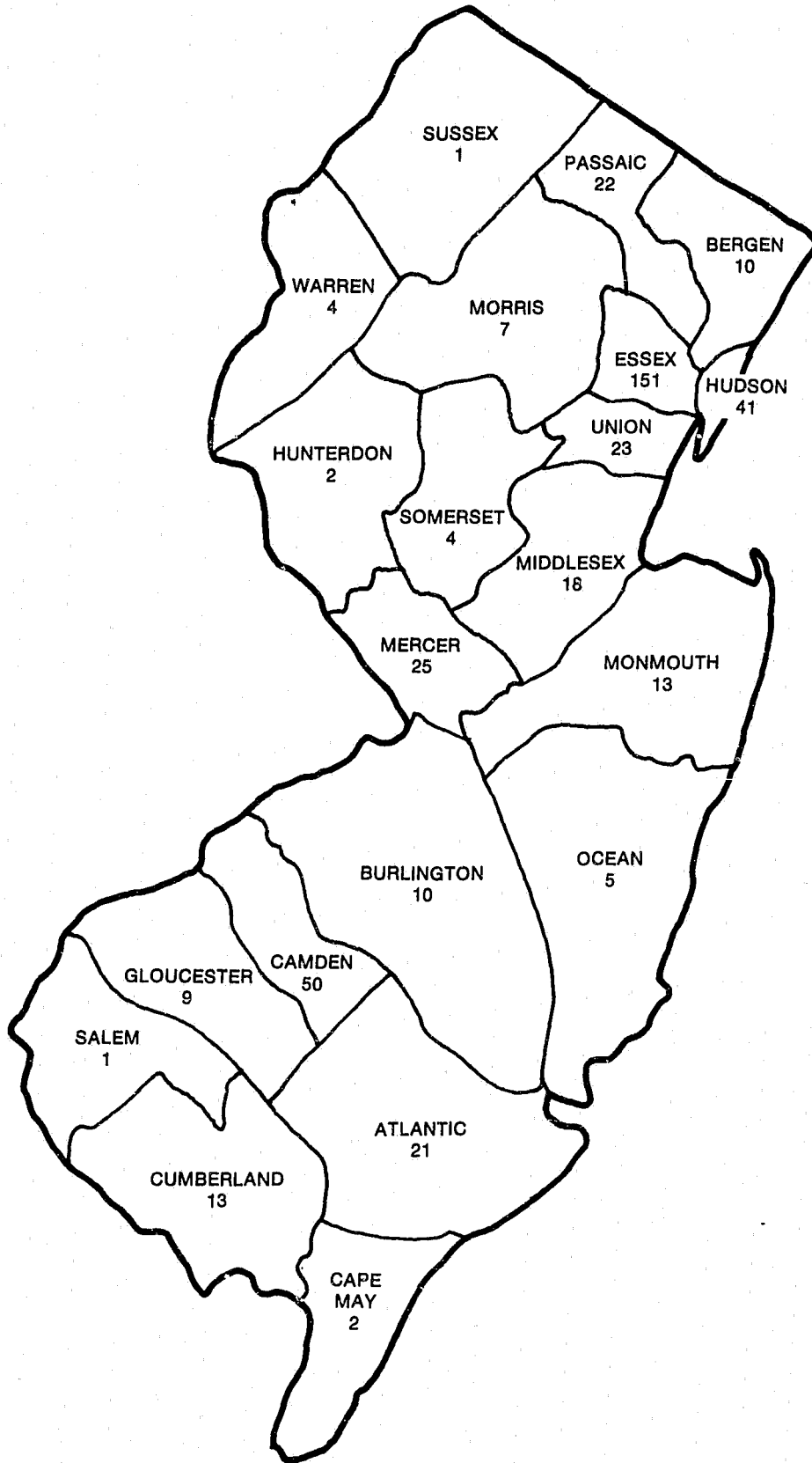


MURDER CIRCUMSTANCES

RAPE

Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,308 reported rapes in 1990, a decrease of 6 percent compared to the 2,449 in 1989.
- Rape accounted for five-tenths of one percent of the total Crime Index and 5 percent of all violent crimes.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Eighty-two percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 18 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape, amounted to \$88,573.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,290 persons were arrested during 1990, a 7 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Adult rape arrests increased 2 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 38 percent.
- Fifty-five percent of the arrested perpetrators were black, 44 percent were white and less than one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Forty percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Fifty-seven percent of all rape cases were solved during 1990. Juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those cases cleared.

ROBBERY

Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 23,268 robbery offenses in 1990, a 10 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Robbery accounted for 6 percent of the total Crime Index and 46 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 3.0 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 75 percent of all reported robberies.
- Bank robberies increased 40 percent and convenience store robberies decreased 2 percent.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$16,245,395.

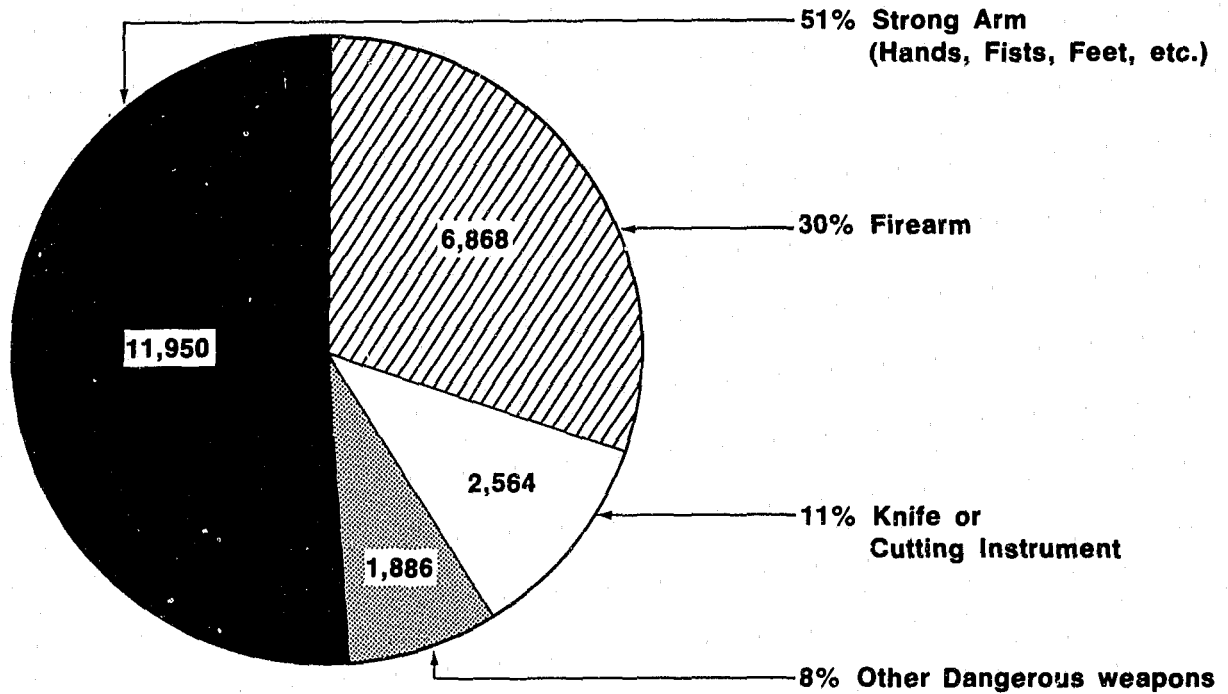

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 24,059 aggravated assaults reported during 1990, an increase of 4 percent when compared to 1989.
- Aggravated assaults accounted for 6 percent of the Crime Index and 48 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault increased 3 percent from 3.0 victims per 1,000 population to 3.1.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 31 percent, and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 32 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 14 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.

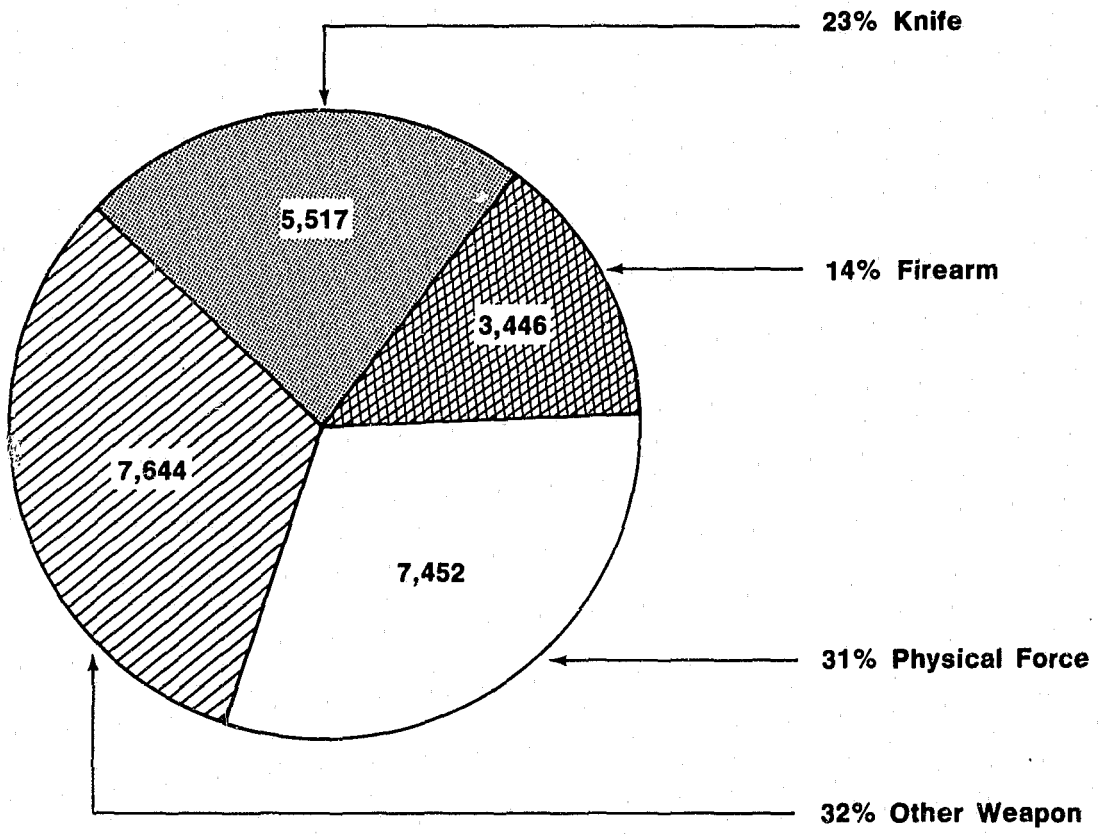

BURGLARY

Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 78,615 burglary offenses reported in 1990, an increase of 4 percent.
- Burglary accounted for 19 percent of the total Crime Index and 21 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population increased 4 percent to 10.2 in 1990.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- During 1990, 73 percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 16 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and the remaining 11 percent were attempts to forcibly enter.
- Residences were targets in 65 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Sixty-three percent of the nonresidential burglaries occurred between the hours of 6:00 P.M. and 6:00 A.M.
- Stolen property value as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$89.4 million, for an average loss of \$1,137.
- The average loss as a result of a residential burglary was \$1,117, while nonresidential burglary loss was \$1,174.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests increased 6 percent with 12,456 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests increased 7 percent while juvenile arrests increased 5 percent.
- Males accounted for 95 percent and females 5 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 36 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of burglary arrests were white, 39 percent were black and less than 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Fourteen percent of the burglaries statewide were cleared and juveniles accounted for 23 percent of these clearances.

LARCENY-THEFT

Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 219,726 larcenies reported in 1990, an increase of 3 percent compared to the 213,646 in 1989.
- Larceny accounted for 52 percent of the total Crime Index and 59 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The larceny victimization rate increased to 28.4 victims for every 1,000 population in 1990. This represents a 3 percent increase over the rate of 27.7 in 1989.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 37 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Pocket-picking increased 9 percent in 1990 compared to 1989.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests increased 6 percent in 1990, with 46,164 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests increased 8 percent and adult arrests increased 5 percent.
- Males accounted for 68 percent and females 31 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-six percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 43 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Twenty percent of the larcenies were cleared with juveniles accounting for 22 percent of the clearances.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.)

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 72,626 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1990, a 2 percent increase compared to the 71,039 reported in 1989.
- Motor vehicle thefts accounted for 17 percent of the total Crime Index and 20 percent of the nonviolent crime.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 9.4 victims per 1,000 population represents a 2 percent increase compared to 1989.

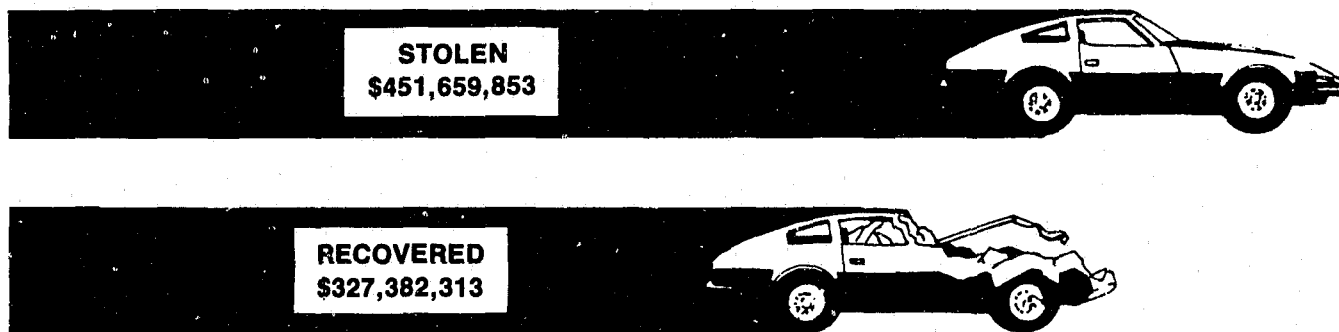

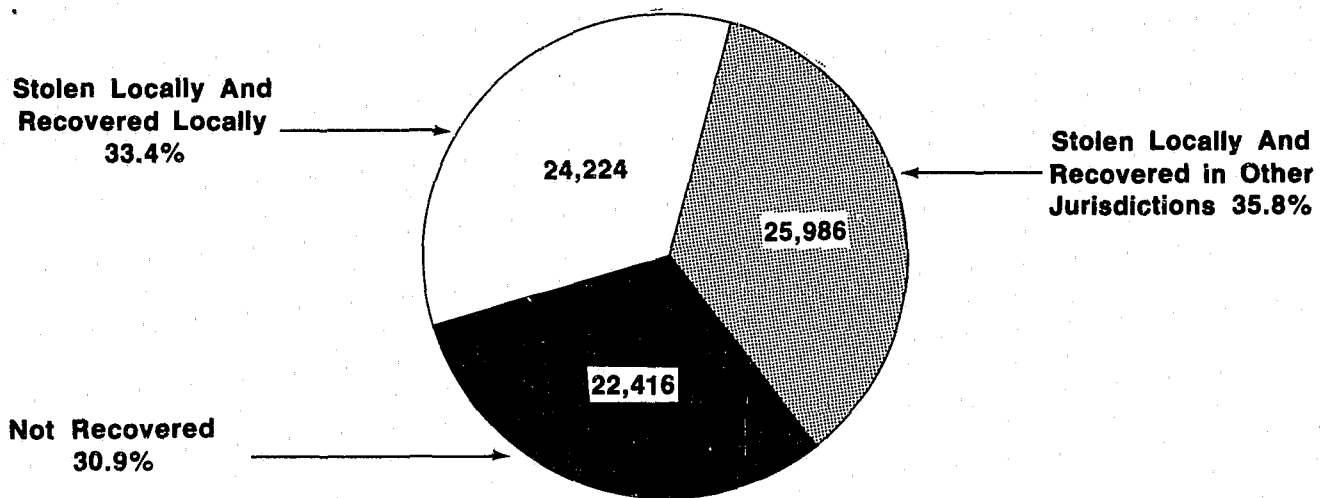

ARSON

Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,991 reportable arsons in 1990, which represents a 19 percent increase compared to 2,509 in 1989.
- The arson rate increased to 0.4 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Fifty-three percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 60 percent of that total.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 37 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 10 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson amounted to \$52.6 million for an average dollar value loss of \$17,584.
- The average residential loss was \$19,312 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$73,478.
- The average motor vehicle loss was \$4,256.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 647 in 1990, representing a 9 percent increase.
- Adult arrests decreased 1 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 22 percent.
- Males accounted for 89 percent and females 11 percent of the arson arrests in 1990.
- Juveniles accounted for 46 percent of the arson arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 27 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 21 percent and juveniles accounted for 34 percent of the clearances.

ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

MANSLAUGHTER

Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 52 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies of the state for manslaughter during the year. This represents a 30 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Adults accounted for 73 percent and juveniles accounted for 27 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 92 percent of the arrests and females 8 percent.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 38 percent were black.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 15 percent of the arrests and 85 percent were Non-Hispanic.

SIMPLE ASSAULT

Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 39,279 simple assault arrests in 1990, representing a 1 percent increase when compared to 1989.
- Of the total, 22 percent were juveniles and 78 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 81 percent and females 19 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 38 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Eleven percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 89 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

ARSON

Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 647 arrests reported for arson offenses, a 9 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Juveniles accounted for 46 percent and adults 54 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Eighty-nine percent of the total arson arrests were males while 11 percent were females.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 27 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of those arrested and Non-Hispanics accounted for 89 percent.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,575 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for forgery or counterfeiting during the year. This represents an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 1989.
- Adults accounted for 94 percent and juveniles accounted for 6 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 67 percent of the arrests and females 33 percent.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of the arrests and 88 percent were Non-Hispanic.

FRAUD

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 8,141 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to 1989.
- Adult arrests represented 97 percent and juveniles 3 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 62 percent and females 38 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 33 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Seven percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 93 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

EMBEZZLEMENT

Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 137 persons arrested for embezzlement, a 4 percent decrease compared to 1989.
- Eight-eight percent of those persons arrested were adults and 12 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 55 percent and females 45 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 34 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of those arrested and Non-Hispanics accounted for 92 percent.

STOLEN PROPERTY (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

Definition

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1990, there were 14,227 arrests reported for stolen property, a decrease of 2 percent compared to 1989.
- Of the total, 62 percent were adults and 38 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-nine percent were males and 11 percent were females.
- Forty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 58 percent were black, and less than 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests and 82 percent were Non-Hispanic.

CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Definition

Criminal/malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 13,696 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief; an increase of 6 percent compared to 1989.
- Juveniles accounted for 54 percent and adults 46 percent of persons arrested for criminal/malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy percent of the persons arrested were white, 29 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Eleven percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and Non-Hispanics accounted for 89 percent.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

Definition

Under the program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 7,129 arrests reported for weapon offenses; an 8 percent decrease compared to 1989.
- Of the total, 74 percent were adults and 26 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of those arrested.
- Fifty-four percent of those arrested were white, 46 percent were black, and less than 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of those arrested and 86 percent were Non-Hispanic.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 2,768 arrests reported for prostitution and commercialized vice during 1990, representing an increase of 42 percent when compared to 1989.
- Ninety-eight percent of the arrests were adults with the remaining 2 percent being juveniles.
- Females accounted for 55 percent and males 45 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-one percent of those arrested were white, 48 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests and 85 percent were Non-Hispanic.

SEX OFFENSES

Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,130 sex offense arrests during 1990, representing a decrease of 11 percent when compared to 1989.
- Adults accounted for 78 percent, and juveniles 22 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-five percent were males and 5 percent were females.
- Sixty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 32 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Fifteen percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 85 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

Definition

Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing, possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones).
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).

- There were 52,297 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations; a 24 percent decrease compared to 1989.
- Adults accounted for 89 percent and juveniles 11 percent of the arrests.

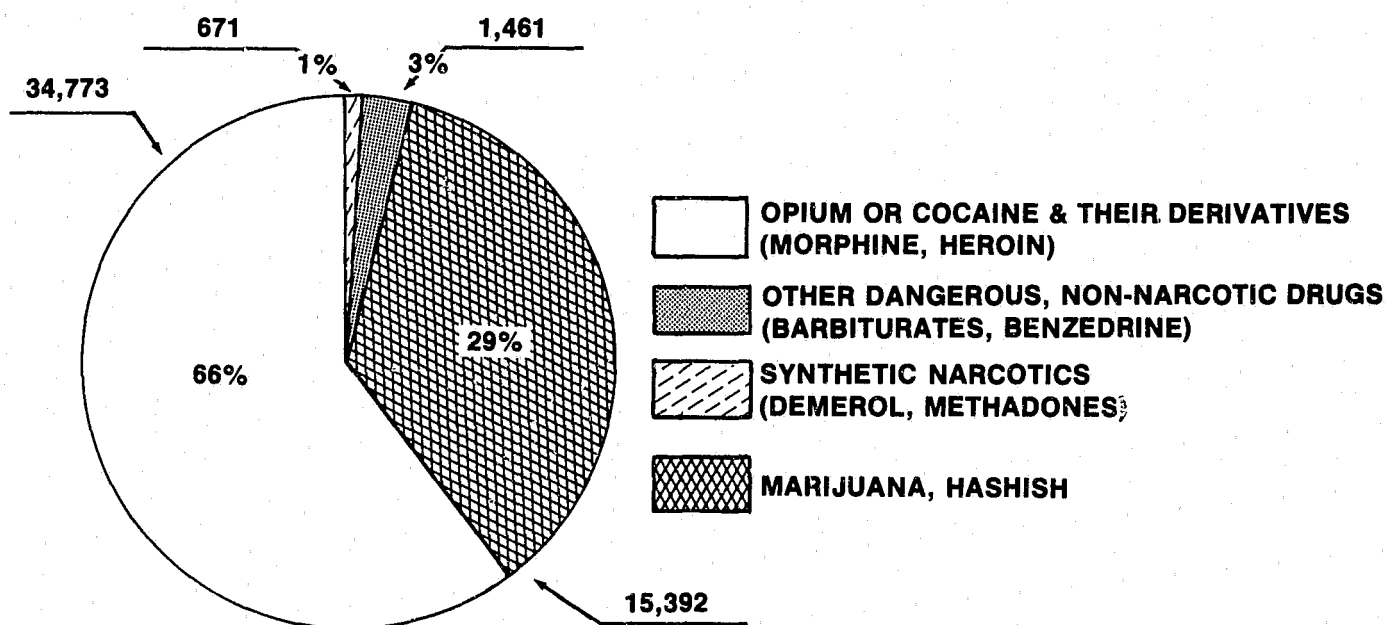
- Twenty-nine percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were under the age of 21.
- Males accounted for 85 percent of all the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 15 percent.
- Forty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 56 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of those arrested and 87 percent were not Hispanic.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 66 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 34 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for opium or cocaine and their derivatives represented 58 percent of the possession/use category and 83 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 66 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

GAMBLING

Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 1,095 gambling arrests reported during 1990, resulting in an increase of 53 percent compared to 1989.
- Eighty-six percent of the arrests were adults and 14 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 84 percent and females 16 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 11 percent were black, and 12 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests and 83 percent were not Hispanic.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

- There were 12,408 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1990, representing an increase of 37 percent from the previous year.
- Less than one-half of one percent of the arrests were juveniles, and nearly 100 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 94 percent and females 6 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 48 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests and 90 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Definition

Under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 43,252 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1990, an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 1989.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only 1 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 88 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 12 percent.
- Eighty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 12 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Ten percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 90 percent were not Hispanic.

LIQUOR LAWS

Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 17,205 arrests reported for liquor law violations, an increase of 11 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 74 percent of the arrests while the remaining 26 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 80 percent of the liquor law arrests while females accounted for the remaining 20 percent.
- Eighty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 10 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 5 percent of those arrested and 95 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 43,330 arrests for disorderly conduct in 1990, an increase of 2 percent when compared to 1989.
- Seventy-four percent of the arrests were adults while the remaining 26 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests and 90 percent of those arrested were not Hispanic.

VAGRANCY

Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 285 arrests in this category during the year, a 30 percent decrease compared to 1989.
- Juveniles accounted for 20 percent of the arrests while adults accounted for the remaining 80 percent.
- Males represented 79 percent and females 21 percent of the arrests in this category.
- Seventy-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 22 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Four percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 96 percent were Non-Hispanic.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 88,549 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1990, a 1 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Adults accounted for 87 percent and juveniles 13 percent of persons arrested for all other offenses.
- Eighty-two percent of the arrests were males while 18 percent were females.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of those arrested and 91 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 1,650 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations during 1990; this represents a 2 percent increase compared to 1989.
- Males represented 81 percent and females 19 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests and non-Hispanics accounted for 83 percent of those arrested.

RUNAWAYS

Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 5,941 runaway arrests reported in 1990, a 1 percent decrease compared to 1989.
- Females accounted for 57 percent and males accounted for 43 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty percent of the persons arrested were white, 39 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Fifteen percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 85 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS—1990

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 20 percent of the population and account for 38 percent of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period 1981-1990 and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis were initially categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) to be classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as the "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15."

Distribution

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 12 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1981 through 1990 accounted for 25 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers from 1981 through 1990 accounted for 49 percent of all violent crime and 22 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 20 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1981 through 1990 these 15 urban municipalities accounted for 35 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 61 percent of all violent crime, and 32 percent of the state's nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

Percent Change

- During the ten year period 1981-1990, the Crime Index in New Jersey has decreased 8 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities increased 3 percent and the six major urban cities increased 4 percent.
- Violent crime in the state increased 7 percent, the 15 urban cities increased 8 percent and the six major cities increased 4 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state decreased 10 percent, the "Urban 15" increased 1 percent, and the six major cities increased 4 percent.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearing house for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten year period 1981-1990, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 42 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every 4 highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- More than half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Fifty-four percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1990, there were 45,935 full-time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a 3 percent increase compared to the 44,452 full-time police employees in 1989.
- The number of full-time police officers increased 3 percent, from 32,369 in 1989 to 33,333 in 1990.
- The number of full-time civilian employees increased 4 percent, from 12,083 in 1989 to 12,602 in 1990.
- Seventy-three percent were sworn officers and the remaining 27 percent were civilian employees.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1990, there were 22,052 municipal police employees, an increase of 1 percent compared to the 21,763 in 1989.
- There were 2.9 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state.
- Atlantic County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 4 percent (50 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 5.6 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.5 per 1,000 population.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there were nine other state agencies reporting to the System. These agencies consist of: N.J. Forest Fire Service, Division of Parks & Forestry, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Office of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park and N.J. Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police service rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 11,162 full-time police employees; a 9 percent increase compared to the 10,264 police employees in 1989.
- There were 5,620 sworn police officers in 1990, an increase of 8 percent compared to the 5,199 in 1989.
- These agencies reported 5,542 civilian police employees in 1990, representing a 9 percent increase compared to the 5,065 reported in 1989.
- Fifty percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 50 percent were civilians.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

- There were 3,350 municipal civilian police employees in 1990, an increase of 1 percent compared to the 3,309 in 1989.
- Fifteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 18,702 full-time municipal police officers in 1990; this represents a 1 percent increase compared to the 18,454 full-time municipal police officers in 1989.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.4 per 1,000 population; this represents no change when compared to 1989.
- Eighty-five percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.
- The largest numerical increase occurred in Essex County; an increase of 73 municipal police officers, or 3 percent.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Passaic County; a decrease of 41 municipal police officers, or 4 percent.
- Atlantic County, with 4.1 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Sussex County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal police officers with 1.3 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 7,952 full-time police employees in 1990; an increase of 6 percent compared to the 7,511 in 1989.
- There were 5,798 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 1990. This represents an increase of 7 percent compared to the 5,410 in 1989.
- The county police agencies reported 2,154 civilian police employees in 1990; a 3 percent increase compared to the 2,101 in 1989.
- Seventy-three percent were sworn personnel while the remaining 27 percent were civilians.

STATE POLICE

The State Police total includes personnel from the Marine Police, Alcoholic Beverage Control Enforcement Bureau, and Capitol Police. The breakdown for each bureau is depicted on the State Police Personnel chart.

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 4,027 full-time police employees; a decrease of 4 percent compared to the 4,204 in 1989.
- There were 2,837 State Police officers in 1990; a decrease of 4 percent compared to the 2,949 in 1989.
- The State Police reported 1,190 civilian employees in 1990; a decrease of 5 percent compared to the 1,255 in 1989.
- Seventy percent of the total State Police employees were sworn personnel, while the remaining 30 percent were civilians.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

VOLUME/TREND

- This is the third consecutive year there were no New Jersey police officers killed as a result of criminal action.
- Since the inception of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program in 1967, forty-seven police officers have been feloniously killed in the line of duty.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place. It is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

VOLUME/TREND

- There were 5,002 police officers assaulted in 1990, a decrease of one percent when compared to the 5,054 in 1989.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-eight percent (1,411) of the officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 88 percent of all police assaults.
- Thirty percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Sixteen percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the 2 hour period of 10:00 p.m. to 12 midnight.

CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 97 percent of the assaults directed at them.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 4,404 municipal police officers assaulted during 1990, a 1 percent decrease compared to the 4,439 assaulted in 1989.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 23.5; a 2 percent decrease compared to 1989.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-five percent of the municipal officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 88 percent of all municipal police assaults.
- Thirty-three percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 21 percent of municipal police assaults.

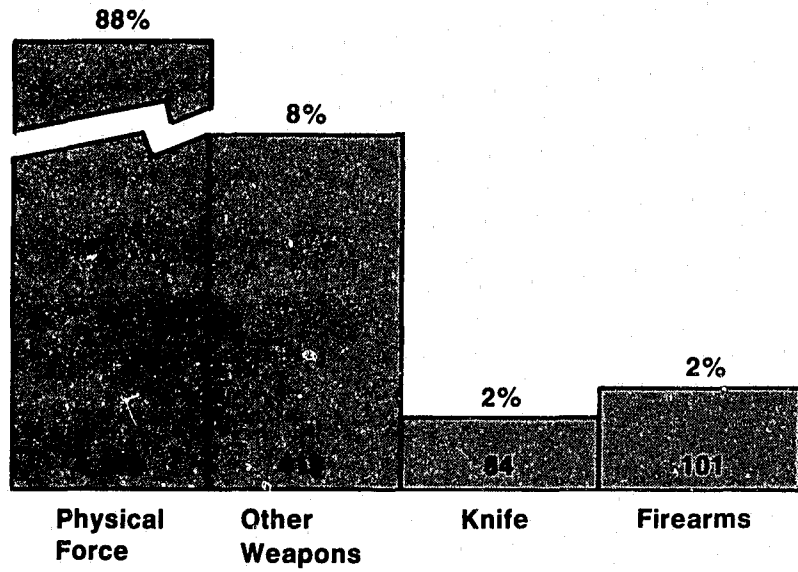
OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and, are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

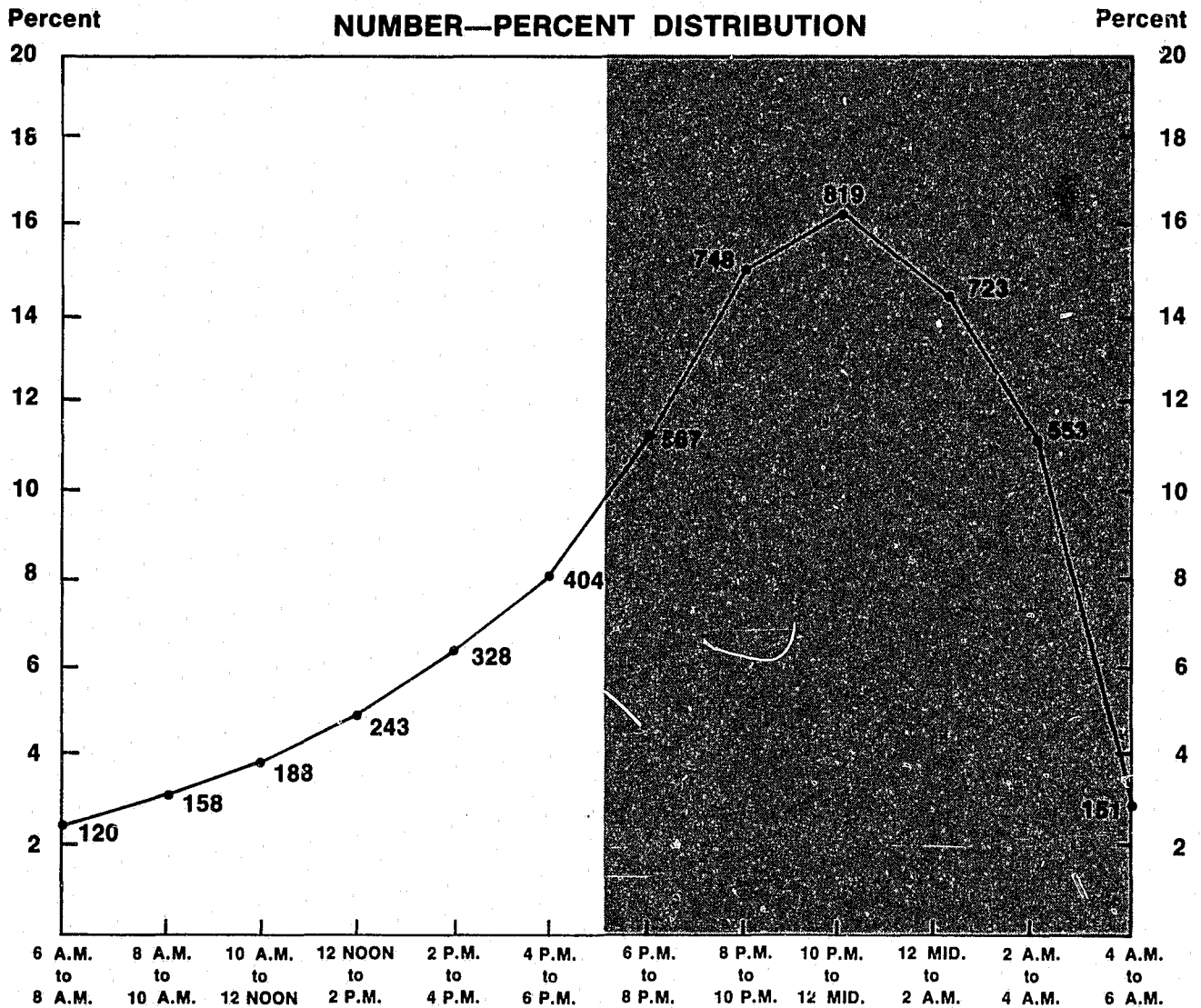
VOLUME

- County law enforcement agencies reported 220 officers assaulted, with 106 sustaining physical injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 81 officers assaulted, with 21 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 266 officers assaulted and 184 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 31 officers assaulted with 17 sustaining injury.

SECTION X
DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring within the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into the issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing; serious concern has been displayed within many municipal and county agencies whereby various committees and working groups have been formed to help battle this important problem. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. As stated in the following pages, reported domestic violence acts decreased two percent over 1989. It is through analysis of this data that hopefully, the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1990 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 50,823 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 1990, a 2% decrease compared to the 51,785 reported in 1989.
- Murders increased 16% in 1990 (57) when compared to 1989 (49).
- Assaults occurred in 63% (32,268) of the reported offenses in 1990.
- The total arrests for 1990 (17,035) increased 2% over 1989 (16,664).
- Arrests were made in 34% of the offenses reported for 1990.
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (9,570).
- For the eighth consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 31% (15,862) of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 53% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 1990. Specifically, 10% (4,934) were involved and 44% (22,203) were present.
- Wives were the victims in 39% (19,569), and female friends were the victims in 39% (19,680) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1990. Overall, females were victims in 85% (43,245) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender increased from 10,508 in 1989 to 10,695 in 1990. This is a 2% increase.
- Alcohol and/or drugs were involved in 46% (23,538) of the reported offenses occurring in 1990. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 41% (20,919) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over were victims in 3% (1,393) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 1990.
- Domestic Violence does not occur at a regular frequency, but when viewed as a ratio of its occurrence to a fixed time interval, one act of domestic violence would occur every ten (10) minutes and twenty-one (21) seconds.

- False imprisonment, sexual assault, criminal sexual contact and burglary reported the highest number of offenses since the inception of the Domestic Violence Program.
- For the second consecutive year, domestic violence offenses decreased (-2% in 1990), while at the same time arrests increased (+2%, in 1990).
- The violent crimes of homicide (57), aggravated assault (5,876) and sexual assault (84) accounted for twelve (12) percent of reported domestic violence offenses (50,823).

- Of all the domestic violence offenses involving weapons (32,696), hands, fists, feet, etc. were used in 86% (28,222) of these offenses.
- Domestic violence offenses involving a gun increased 2%, from 340 in 1989 to 348 in 1990.
- There were 2,849 serious injuries reported in 1990, a 3% increase when compared to the 2,756 reported in 1989.

- For the eighth consecutive year, assault was the most prominent of the eleven types of domestic violence offenses (32,268). Females were victims in 85% (27,576) and males in 15% (4,692) of the domestic violence offenses involving assaults.
- Wives were the victims in 39% (19,569), and female friends were the victims in 39% (19,680) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1990. Overall, females were victims in 85% (43,245) of all domestic violence offenses.
- Harassment was the second highest reported domestic violence offense in 1990 (15,489).
- In addition to the fifty-seven (57) domestic violence homicide victims in 1990, there were nine (9) associated deaths.
- Thirty-three percent of the domestic violence homicide victims were male (19), while sixty-seven percent were females (38).

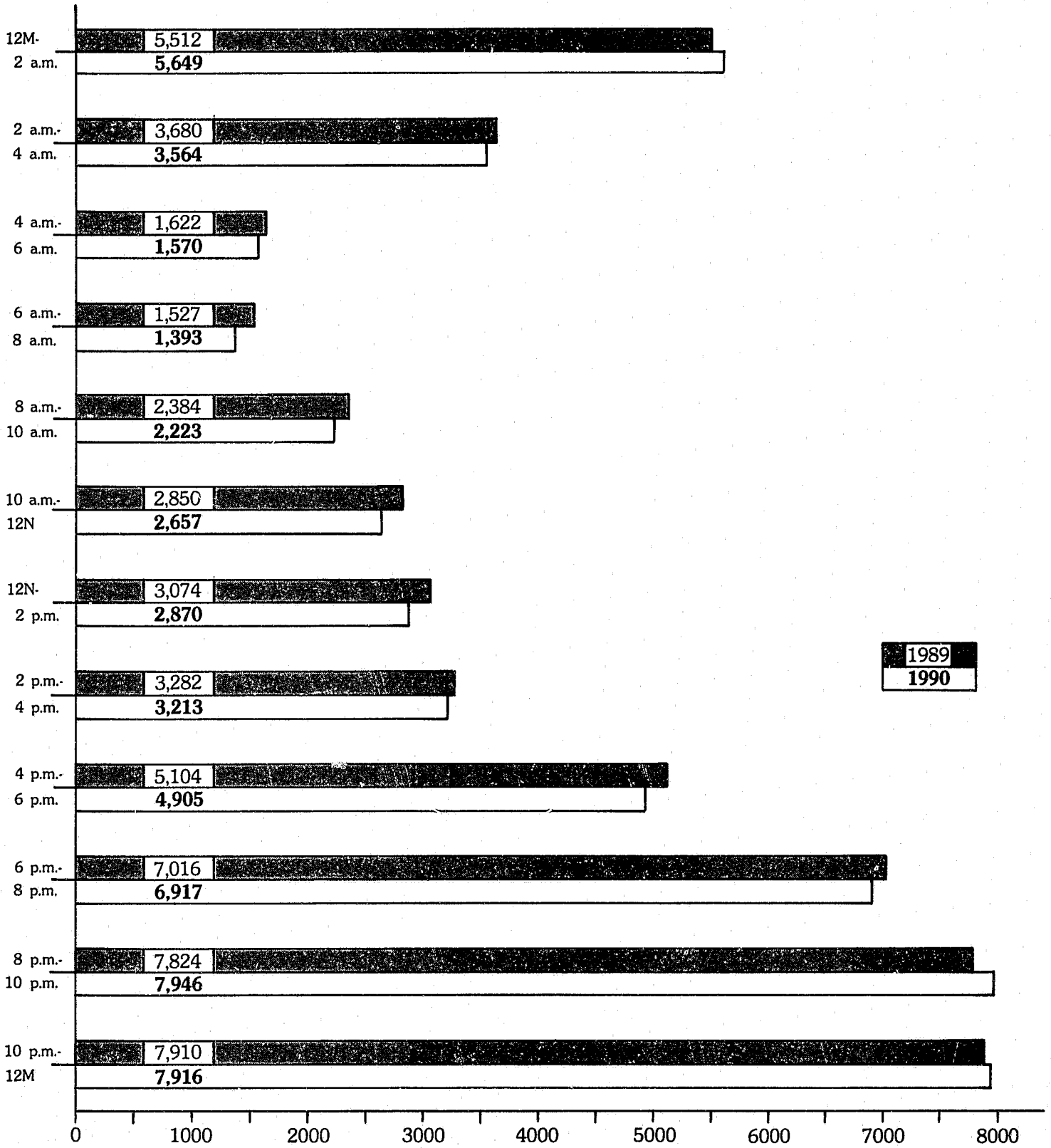

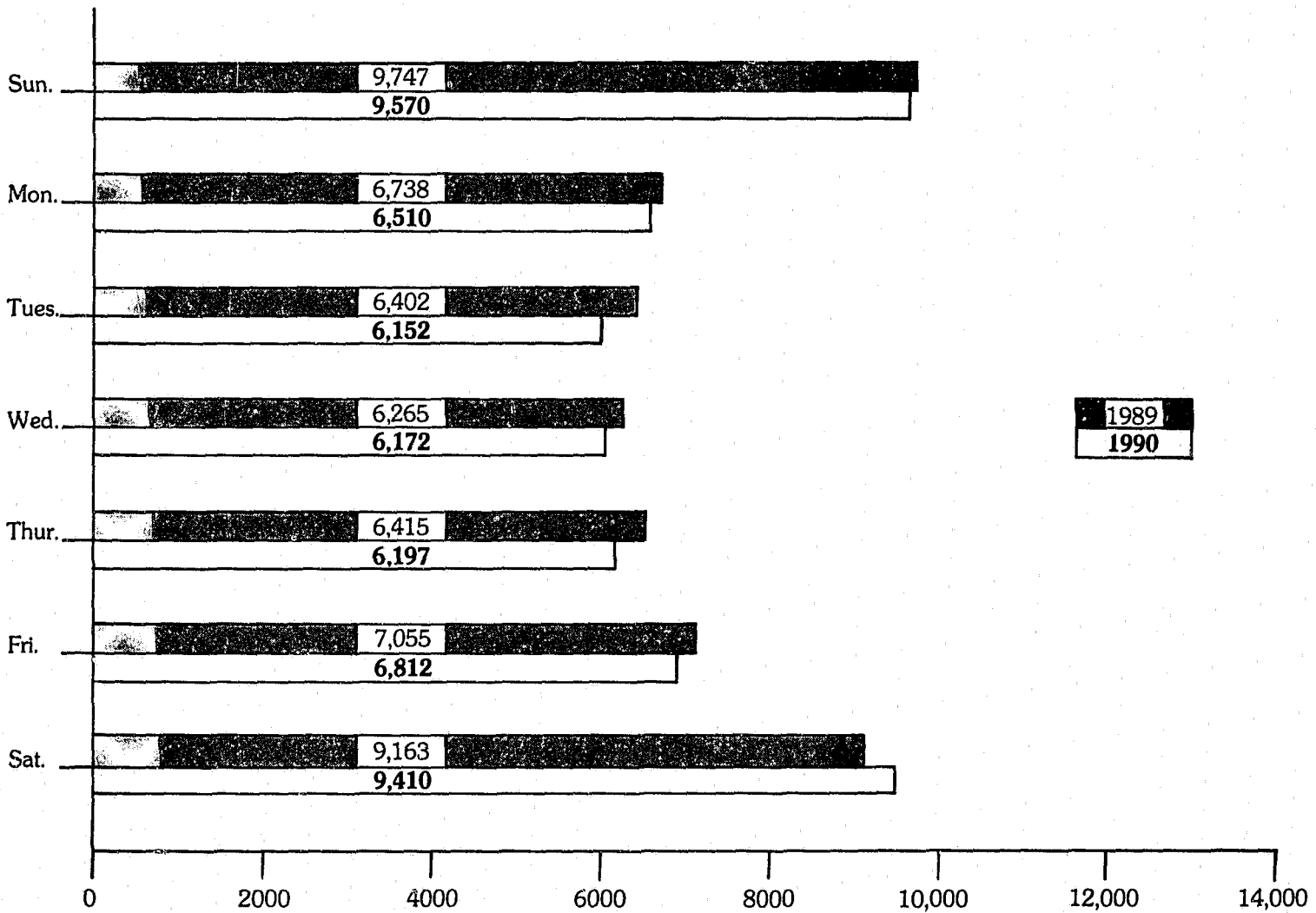
- Assaults occurred in 51% (713) of all domestic violence offenses for victims 60 years of age or over.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY TIME OF DAY 1989/1990



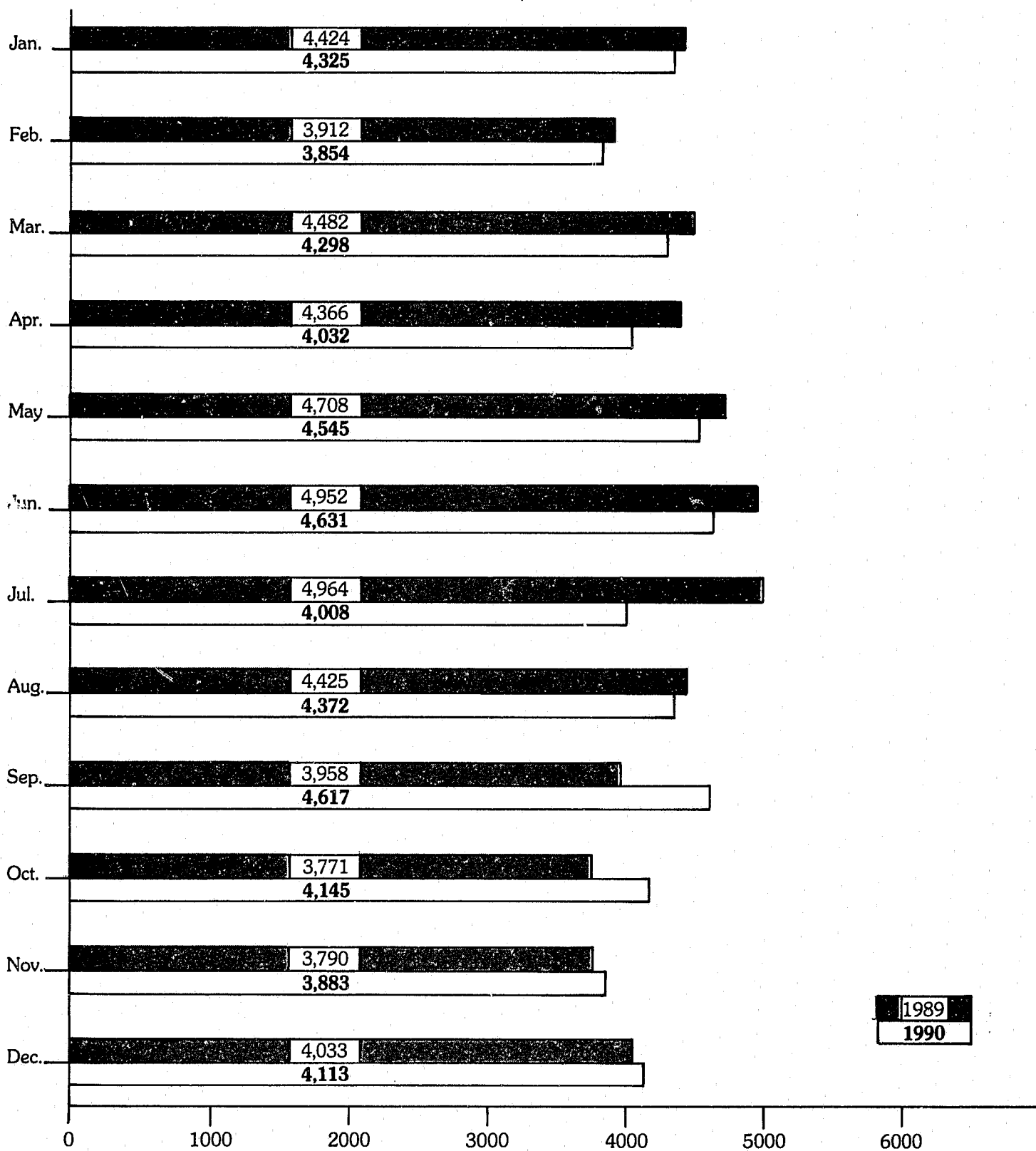
- During 1990 forty-five percent of the reported Domestic Violence offenses occurred between 6:00 p.m. and 12 Midnight.

SECTION XI

BIAS INCIDENT SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

Crimes motivated by hate and bias tend to erode the basic fabric of society. Bias incidents having a racial, religious, ethnic or sexual component manifest themselves in a wide spectrum of criminal activities. These bias incidents jeopardize the active and open pursuit of freedom and opportunity. They attack the racial, religious and ethnic heritage and sexual orientation of our citizens. Closely linked to such heritage are individual values, beliefs and identities.

Realizing that no agency within the state was collecting complete data on bias incidents, a broad-based Ad Hoc committee was created to develop a comprehensive statewide reporting system. As a result of the committee's recommendations, Attorney General Executive Directive No. 1987-3 was issued mandating all New Jersey law enforcement agencies to begin reporting bias incidents to the Division of State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit on a monthly basis, effective January 1, 1988.

The directive was instituted to capture vital data in an effort to identify the problem. This information will permit proper evaluation of progress in preventing bias crime and assist with necessary planning for the future.

This is the third annual publication concerning bias and hate crimes, which contains comparisons to previous year statistics. The published statistics and graphs are the result of data submitted by the police community of New Jersey.

Hopefully, the information contained in this publication will be of value to various segments of society and serve its intended purpose.

BIAS INCIDENT

DEFINITION

A Bias Incident is defined as any suspected or confirmed offense or unlawful act which occurs to a person, private property, or public property on the basis of race, color, creed, ethnicity, religion or sexual orientation. An offense is bias-based if the motive for the commission of the offense or unlawful act is racial, religious, ethnic or sexual oriented in nature.

Highlights of the 1990 bias incident offense statistics are listed below:

- There were 824 actual bias incident offenses reported by the police in 1990, a 36% increase compared to 1989 (607).
- Harassment accounted for 31% (255) of all bias incident offenses.
- Bias incidents involving property damage accounted for 26% (214) of all bias incident offenses.
- Racial bias accounted for 59% (485) of all bias crimes in 1990.
- Persons were the target in 549, or 67%, of all bias incident offenses reported.
- Thirty-nine percent (323) of all bias incidents were directed toward individuals of the black race and their properties.
- Twenty-three percent (191) of all bias incidents were directed at individuals and properties representing the Jewish religion.
- The most frequent day of occurrence was Wednesday (139 incidents).
- The most frequent month of occurrence was October (108 incidents).
- The most frequent place of occurrence was a residence, where 31% (252) of all bias incidents occurred.
- Forty-six percent (380) of all bias incident offenses were cleared, with 28% (233) being cleared by arrest, and 18% (147) being exceptionally cleared.
- There were a total of 341 arrests (205 adults and 136 juveniles) made as a result of bias incidents, a 127% increase compared to the 150 (106 adults and 44 juveniles) persons arrested in 1989.
- The involvement of organized hate groups was not substantiated in any of the reported bias incidents.

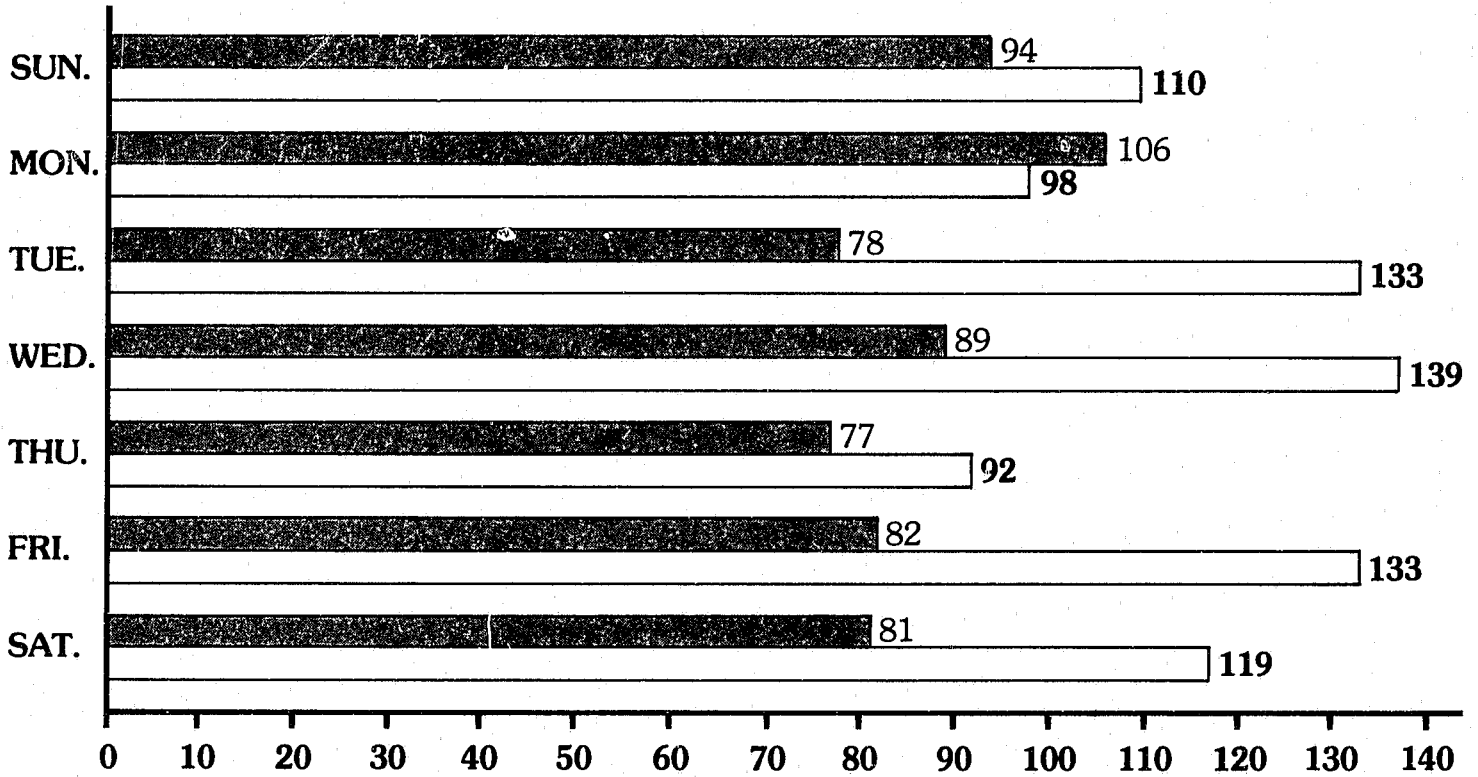

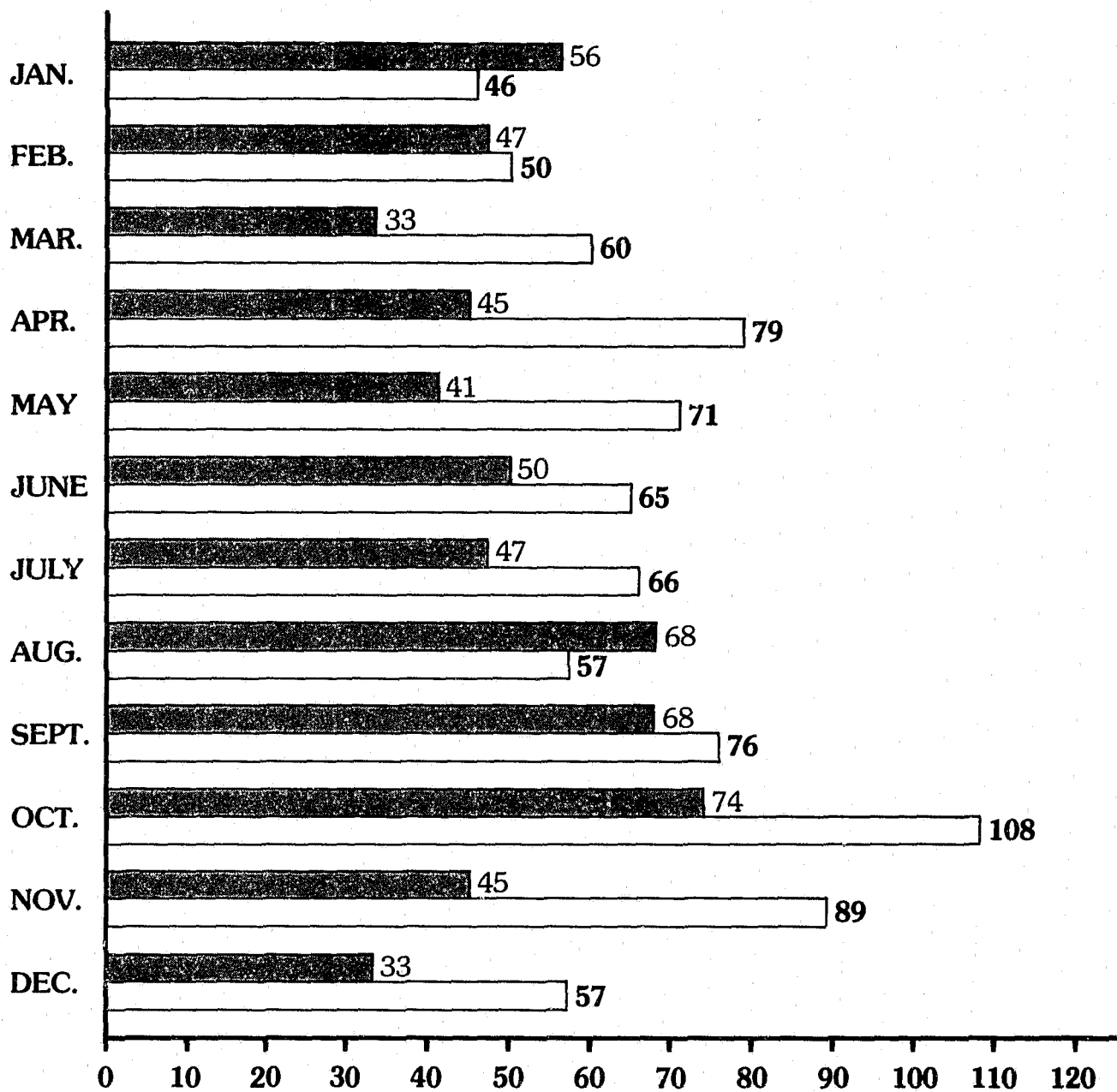

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes for example; China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from racial, linguistic, or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared in this manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond police control which prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense you recognize from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.
NIGHT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
UNFOUNDED	Classification of reported crimes that are found to be false or baseless.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
WHITE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants.

For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

2. **Crime Trend**—A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year.

For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in 1989 and 513 Index offenses in 1990. What is the percent of the increase?

$513 \text{ (1990 Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (1989 Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$

$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent Increase)}$

Note: If there were more Index offenses in 1989 than in 1990, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police Personnel Per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This is calculated in the same manner as a crime rate.

For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many police officers are there per 1,000 population?

$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

Note: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate**—This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers.

For example: A municipality with 25 officers had 5 of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 police officers)}$

5. **Clearance Rate**—This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specified period of time.

For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in 1990, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} = .185 \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$
