Introduction

This document contains the California Department of Corrections' (CDC) projections of institution, parole, and outpatient populations for Fiscal Years 1991-92 through 1996-97. The projections are based upon the most current available data and existing law.

Factors Affecting Population Increases

Over the last ten years, the population in CDC institutions has increased considerably. On June 30, 1991, the population was 101,995 compared to 26,768 on June 30, 1981, an annual compound increase of 14.3 percent. The increase over the June 30, 1990 population of 93,810 was 8.7 percent. This recent slowdown in the growth rate is due mainly to a reduction in the growth of new admissions from court, spearheaded by a significant decline in drug-related convictions.

The increases over the last ten years are due primarily to the impact of legislative changes and a rise in reported crime, especially drug-related crime, and an increase in parole violator returns. The increases in parole violator returns result from a combination of factors, including severe crowding in local jails and court orders against such crowding, and a steadily increasing parolee population.

Over the years, voter initiatives, court decisions, legislation and administrative policy have played, and continue to play, key roles in affecting the population level of California's prisons.

Voter initiatives and legislation enacted since 1976 have significantly limited the ability of the courts to sentence certain offenders to local disposition rather than state prison, as well as increased the penalties for a great number of felony offenders. Some of the major offenses for which the possibility of probation has been restricted or eliminated include residential burglary, child molestation, specific sex offenses, arson and other offenses involving the use of a firearm. Legislation has increased sentences for committing murder, residential burglary and robbery, manslaughter, certain drug and sex offenses, crimes against defenseless victims, other crimes involving the use of a firearm, and many others.

Recent administrative policy and court decisions have also translated into stronger law enforcement and more severe criminal sanctions. Given the current tenor of the Legislature, the court system and the public-at-large, California's prison population can be expected to continue to grow in the foreseeable future.

Comparison of Fall 1991 with Spring 1991 Projections

In summary, the Fall 1991 projected institution population is significantly lower throughout the projection period than the population projected in the Spring of 1991.

The slower increase in projected institution population compared to what was projected in Spring 1991 is due primarily to lower projected new admissions. It is expected that the new admissions will still increase but at a slower pace than projected in Spring 1991, due mainly to a reduction in drug-related offenses. Other reasons contributing to lower Fall 1991 projections include special programs which are expected to reduce the number of parole violators returned to custody.

¹ The population numbers include individuals under supervision in community-based facilities, as well as those actually in prison, and inmates housed in State hospitals.

The Spring 1991 institution population projections covered the six-year period starting June 30, 1991. In those projections, the total population was projected to be 102,747 by June 30, 1991, which was 752 higher than actual for that date. This projection was then expected to increase to 163,110 by June 30, 1996. The Fall 1991 projections estimate that the June 30, 1992 population will be 105,992 (8,229 less than projected in Spring 1991), increasing to 132,972 by June 30, 1996 (30,138 less than projected in Spring 1991), and to 139,991 by June 30, 1997.

The parole population supervised in California is also anticipated to increase at a slower rate throughout the projection period than in the Spring 1991 projections. By June 30, 1992, the number of parolees and outpatients supervised in California is projected to be 83,981, increasing to 113,826 by June 30, 1997. These projections are lower than those made in Spring 1991.

The civil narcotic addict institution population has increased steadily since 1983. The total (male and female) addict institution population, which was 2,895 on June 30, 1991, is expected to increase to 3,615 by June 30, 1997. Similarly, the total number of outpatients supervised in California is expected to increase from 2,944 on June 30, 1991 to 4,179 on June 30, 1997. A summary comparison (Table A) of the Fall 1991 projections with the Spring 1991 projections is provided below.





² The population of the institutions consists of felons, civil narcotic addicts, county diagnostic cases, Youth Authority wards, persons from other states, federal prisoners, and county prisoners held for safekeeping. Felons include individuals under supervision in community-based facilities (in contract and non-contract beds) and State hospitals, as well as those actually in prison.

Figure 1 shows the actual and projected institution population, while Figure 2 shows the actual and projected California supervised parole and outpatient population, both for the period June 30, 1982 through June 30, 1997.




The Fall 1991 projections are summarized in Tables 1 and 2, and are presented in greater detail in Tables 3 through 17. Tables 3 and 4 present the quarterly institution populations, while Tables 5 and 6 present detailed projections by inmate placement needs. Tables 7 through 10 project the movement of institution (including civil narcotic addicts) populations, Table 11 presents detail on the other institution populations, and Tables 12 through 17 present detailed projections of the parole and outpatient population.

Premises

I. Admission Rates

The actual and projected male felon new admissions to prison for FY 1981-82 through 1996-97 are displayed in Figure 3. Figure 4 shows the actual and projected male felon admission rates for the same period. Table B summarizes the actual admissions to state prison for male felons for FY 1981-82 through FY 1990-91 while Table C summarizes the projected admissions for FY 1991-92 through FY 1996-97. Consistent with past practice, admission rates displayed in Tables B and C are expressed as the number of male felon admissions to prison from court per 100,000 California residents aged 18-49.

Actual male admissions during the second half of FY 1990-91 were 18,054, or 1,539 (8.5 percent) lower than admissions projected in Spring 1991. The discrepancy between actual and projected admissions appears to be caused by fewer admissions related to drug offenses. Possible causes include a decline in funding of drug task forces or their reassignment toward other offense groups. There also appears to be a decline in drug usage which may be resulting in fewer drug arrests.

Admissions are projected based on two major factors: (1) long-term trends, and (2) the estimated impact of legislation, voter initiatives, court decisions, and administrative policy. As in the Spring 1991 projections, the Fall 1991 admission projections are based on a time series model which pays more attention to recent trends.

No new additional legislation has been chaptered since the Spring 1991 projections which would increase or decrease new admissions.

ii. Significant Chaptered Legislation and initiatives

Legislation listed below is included in the Fall 1991 projections. In all legislation that follows, the full impact of the law change occurs after June 30, 1991.

iii. The Inmate Work/Training Incentive Program (IWTIP)

This program allows eligible inmates to earn up to a six-month reduction per year in sentence length. The IWTIP applies to all felons who committed their offenses on or after January 1, 1983 and to those felons who committed their offenses before January 1, 1983 who chose to participate. Approximately 82 percent of the January 1, 1991 eligible population had full-time assignments and thus earned one-half sentence reduction. Due to budget constraints, IWTIP staff position cuts will result in approximately 1,500 to 2,000 fewer inmate slots and Prison Industry Authority cuts will further reduce slots by about 900. Because of the loss of day-for-day credit earning slots, it is expected that over time, the proportion of inmates earning one-half sentence reduction will decrease slightly, while those earning one-third reduction will increase by a like amount.

IV. Worktime Credits for Return-to-Custody Cases

Chapter 1435, Statutes of 1987 (SB 16, Presley), an urgency measure effective September 30, 1987, allows certain violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs) to participate in work, training or educational programs, thereby earning a reduction in confinement time. Seventy-three percent of incoming male felon PV-RTCs are expected to be eligible.

V. Mean Sentences and Preconfinement Credits

As shown in Table D, the mean sentence during last fiscal year has increased for both male and female felons who received determinate sentences of 15 years or less. (The analysis was restricted to those who received determinate sentences of 15 years or less in order to provide information relevant to the six-year projection period.) Mean preconfinement credits have remained the same for male felons but increased for female felons. The net result for felons with determinate sentences of 15 years or less should be an increase in time served in prison for males and females. (This, however, does not take into account the impact that recently chaptered legislation may have on sentence length for future new admissions.)

VI. Placement Need Projections

As in the Spring 1991 projections, projections of institution bed needs by level are based on consideration of both inmate classification score level and administrative determinants such as institutional security and public safety, as specified in Section 62010 of the Departmental Operations Manual. It is assumed that the male felon reception center population will increase proportionately with the increase in male felon intake. Medical/psychiatric and protective housing projections are included, assuming a constant proportion of the number of inmates of each classification level in each of these categories over the projection period. Security housing unit projections assume a cap of 2,500 male felon beds.

VII. Parole Violators

For the six-month period January-June 1991, there were 19,588 male felon parole violators returned to custody, 881 (4.5 percent) greater than the number of PV-RTCs for the same six-month period in 1990, and 665 (3.4 percent) greater than projected in Spring 1991. The PV-RTC rate³ for the first six months in calendar year 1991 was 54.2, 1.6 higher than projected in Spring 1991, but lower than the previous six months (56.1).

The drop in the PV-RTC rate during the past two years appears to be due to changes instituted by the parole administration. These changes place greater emphasis on consistent decision-making by staff and use of community-based management options for parolees, consistent with the protection of the public. Some examples include more review of case management decisions and development of community-oriented means to work with drug offenders. Also, there has been increased use of various survival services, including chemical dependency treatment, emergency shelter, pre-employment training and basic subsistence.

The number of parole violators returning with new terms (PV-WNTs) grew from 6,550 for January-June 1990 to 7,557 for January-June 1991, an increase of 1,007 (15.4 percent). The PV-WNT rate for January-June 1991 was 20.9, 0.1 lower than projected in Spring 1991.

For the Fall 1991 projections, it is assumed that due to two new parole programs--Revised ID/Warrants Guidelines and Community Management of Non-Criminal Violations--the PV-RTC rate will drop significantly during the current fiscal year and then continue to slowly decline in subsequent years.


Because the new parolee-at-large warrant policy requires a longer waiting period for a warrant to be requested by the BPT, there will likely be an increase in the parole population, and a decline in the PAL population.


