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PREFACE

California Prisoners and Parolees, 1990, is a presentation of statistical data about felons, civil narcotic addicts and other populations under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Corrections (CDC). Statistical data on felons in CDC have been published since 1950 when the first issue of California Prisoners, covering the years 1945 through 1949, was released. Statistical data on civil narcotic addicts have been published since 1967 when the first issue of Summary Statistics, Civil Commitment Program for Narcotic Addicts, covering the years 1961 through 1966, was published. Beginning in 1981, the two were combined into one publication.

This publication is organized into eight chapters and a Data Section that contain information on the different types of populations under CDC jurisdiction. Within each chapter summary data are illustrated through descriptive text, charts and graphs that record trends and provide comparisons of the constantly changing CDC population. More indepth information for each chapter is provided in tables that are located in the Data Section. These tables are referenced throughout the text as the source for the charts and graphs. The last section of the book is the Reference Guide. The Reference Guide provides a list of prisons by name and location; maps that identify the counties and the areas of commitment and parole regions; a glossary of terms and acronyms used throughout the publication; and a list of statute numbers for the offense categories.

The Director of Corrections administered twenty institutions, four parole regions and thirty-eight camps during 1990. The types of commitments received by CDC are Felons, Civil Narcotic Addicts, County Diagnostic Cases (under Penal Code Section 1203.03), some Youth Authority commitments, federal prisoners and prisoners from other states. This publication contains only a portion of the data available in report format. 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HIGHLIGHTS

On December 31, 1990, the California Department of Corrections' population, including parolees, was 184,641.

The institution population at the end of the year reached an all time high of 97,309. This was an 11.5% increase from December 31, 1989.

In the last five years, the institution population increased 95.1% overall, an average of 14.2% per year.

There were 39,272 felon new admissions to CDC during Calendar Year 1990.

On December 31, 1990, there were 68,238 felons and civil narcotic addicts on parole in California, an 18.8% increase from 1989.

There were 14,070 parole violators returned with a new term (PV-WNTs) and 40,309 parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs).


82,419 felons were released to parole during Calendar Year 1990 and 3,558 civil narcotic addicts were released to outpatient (parole) status.

TOTAL CDC POPULATION


The total California Department of Corrections (CDC) population reached a high of 184,641 on December 31, 1990.

- The institution population included:
 - 93,683 in institutions and camps.
 - 3,210 in Community Based Facilities.
 - 416 in the Department of Mental Health (DMH) State Hospitals.
- The California supervised parole population included:
 - 68,238 California felons and civil narcotic outpatients.
 - 2,241 parolees from other states being supervised in California through the Interstate Compact Agreement (Cooperative Cases).

- There were 4,270 California offenders in other jurisdictions, including:
 - 2,736 inmates and parolees supervised by federal, juvenile and other state jurisdictions.
 - 1,534 California parolees supervised in the jurisdiction of other states, Interstate Parole Unit(ISPU).
- Other CDC populations totaled 12,583. There were:
 - 1,259 felons and civil addicts temporarily released to other jurisdictions.
 - 479 inmates on escape status.
 - 10,845 felons and civil addicts who absconded from parole supervision (PALs/RALs).


INSTITUTION POPULATION

The CDC institution population reached an all time high of 97,309 on December 31, 1990.

- The institution population increased 296.1% since 1980, 94.2% since 1985 and 11.5% from 1989.
- The incarceration rate increased to 324.6 per 100,000 California population. This was an all time high for CDC.
- The design capacity of CDC institutions was 52,698 beds.
- The institution population was 177.8% of the design capacity.


Institution Population

Institution Population by Arrival Status December 31, 1990



On December 31, 1990 the institution population, by arrival status, consisted of the following:

- 61,337 (63.0%) new admissions.
- 21,127 (21.7%) parole violators returned with new terms from court (PV-WNTs).
- 13,113 (13.5%) parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs).
- 998 (1.0%) civil narcotic outpatient returns.
- 734 (0.8%) others, including escape and psychiatric returns.

INSTITUTION ARRIVALS

During Calendar Year 1990 there were 365,510 inmate arrivals at institutions. Of these 251,580 were CDC institution transfers. Of the other arrivals:


- Admissions accounted for 43,936. There were:
 - 39,272 felon new admissions.
 - 222 admissions of safekeepers.
 - 2,158 civil narcotic addict admissions.
 - 7 admissions from federal, CYA and other state jurisdictions.
 - 2,277 county diagnostic cases.
- Parole returns accounted for 56,892. There were:
 - 40,309 parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs) (including those pending revocation hearings) for violations of parole conditions.
 - 14,070 parole violators returned with new terms (PV-WNTs).
 - 2,114 civil narcotic addict outpatient returns.
 - 399 CYA parole returns and 13,102 returns from other jurisdictions.

INSTITUTION DEPARTURES

During Calendar Year 1990 there were 355,498 departures from CDC institutions, including 251,580 institution transfers, and:

- 82,248 offenders who paroled.
 - 78,697 felon paroles. Of these:
 - 42,101 first releases to parole.
 - 36,596 reparoles or re-releases to parole.
 - 3,551 civil narcotic addict releases to parole outpatient status.
- 207 releases to CYA parole.
- 4,256 discharges.
- 122 deaths.
- 17,085 other departures.

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PAROLE POPULATION


The parole population supervised by CDC on December 31, 1990 was 70,479.

- The California supervised parole population reconsisted of:
 - 65,420 felon parolees.
 - 2,818 civil narcotic addicts on outpatient status.
 - 2,241 parolees from other states (Interstate Compact Agreement, Cooperative Cases).


Additionally, 1,534 felons were under parole supervision in other states and 1,084 parolees were supervised by the California Youth Authority (CYA).


Felon Parole Movements

FELON PAROLE MOVEMENTS

There were 91,025 felons received on parole during Calendar Year 1990. Some of these were:

- 83,032 releases to parole.
- 7,670 reinstatements to parole status from at large status.

There were 80,988 felons removed from parole supervision.

- 15,993 were discharged.
- 17,010 felon parolees absconded (PALs).
- 33,315 parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs).
- 13,135 parole violators returned to custody with a new term (PV-WNTs).
- 1,535 removed for other reasons.

HIGHLIGHTS

Felon new admissions from court reached 39,272, an all time high for CDC.

Felon new admissions from court increased 14.7% from Calendar Year 1989 to 1990.

More than half (54.7%) of felon new admissions were under the age of 30.

The admission rate in Calendar Year 1990 was 131.0 per 100,000 California population.

The number of felon drug admissions reached an all time high of 13,741.


Admissions for the offense of driving under the influence increased from 265 in 1985 to 3,076 in 1990.

ADMISSIONS


During Calendar Year 1990 the CDC felon new admissions reached an all time high of 39,272.

- Felon new admissions increased 246.1% since 1980, 91.2% since 1985 and 14.7% since 1989. There was an average increase of 13.8% per year over the last five years.
- The number of male felon new admissions was 35,669 and the number of female felon new admissions was 3,603.
- The admission rate reached a high of 131.0 per 100,000 total California population in Calendar Year 1990. The admission rate was 47.7 in 1980 and 77.9 in 1985.

OFFENSE CATEGORIES

Drug offenses represented the largest offense category for felon new admissions during Calendar Year 1990.

- Violent offenders accounted for 26.1% (10,262) of felon new admissions.
- Property offenders accounted for 28.0% (10,990) of felon new admissions.
- Drug offenders accounted for 35.0% (13,741) of felon new admissions.
- Offenders who committed other offenses made up the remaining 10.8% (4,250).



VIOLENT OFFENSES

The number of felon new admissions for violent offenses increased from 8,029 in 1985 to 10,262 in 1990. As a percentage of all felon new admissions, violent offenses decreased from 39.2% in 1985 to 26.1% in 1990.


- Homicides accounted for 1,701 (4.3%) felon new admissions. There were:
 - 330 (0.8%) Murder First admissions.
 - 627 (1.6%) Murder Second admissions.
 - 620 (1.6%) Manslaughter admissions.
 - 124 (0.3%) Vehicular Manslaughter admissions.
- There were 3,589 (9.2%) Robbery admissions.
- Assault with a Deadly Weapon accounted for 1,912 (4.9%) of the felon new admissions.
- Other Assault/Battery accounted for 980 (2.5%) felon new admissions.
- Sex crimes accounted for 1,882 (4.8%) felon new admissions. There were:
 - 473 (1.2%) admissions for Rape.
 - 1,088 (2.8%) admissions for Lewd Act with a Child.
 - 321 (0.8%) admissions for other sex crimes.
- Kidnapping accounted for 198 (0.5%) felon new admissions.

PROPERTY OFFENSES

The number of felon new admissions for property offenses increased by 39.3%, from 7,892 in 1985 to 10,990 in 1990. As a percentage of all felon new admissions, property offenses decreased from 38.5% in 1985 to 28.0% in 1990.


- Burglary First and Second Degree, the two largest property offense groups, accounted for 5,066 (12.9%) of felon new admissions. There were:
 - 2,815 (7.2%) for Burglary First Degree.
 - 2,251 (5.7%) for Burglary Second Degree.
- Grand Theft accounted for 1,387 (3.5%) new admissions.
- Petty Theft with a Prior accounted for 1,543 (3.9%) new admissions.
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 1,022 (2.6%) new admissions.
- Vehicle Theft accounted for 1,190 (3.0%) new admissions.
- Forgery/Fraud offenses accounted for 622 (1.6%) new admissions.
- Other Property offenses accounted for 160 (0.4%) new admissions.

DRUG OFFENSES


The number of felon new admissions for drug offenses increased by 280.7%, from 3,609 in 1985 to 13,741 in 1990. As a percentage of all felon new admissions, drug offenders increased from 17.6% in 1985 to 35.0% in 1990.

- CSS Possession accounted for 4,657 (11.9%) felon new admissions.
- CSS Possession for Sale accounted for 4,282 (10.9%) felon new admissions.
- CSS Sale accounted for 3,340 (8.5%) felon new admissions.
- CSS Manufacturing and CSS Other accounted for 543 (1.4%) felon new admissions.
- Marijuana offenders accounted for 919 (2.2%) felon new admissions.

OTHER OFFENSES


- Escapes accounted for 92 (0.2%) new admissions.
- Driving Under the Influence (DUI) offenses accounted for 3,076 (7.8%).
- Arson offenders accounted for 176 (0.4%) new admissions
- Possession of Weapons accounted for 539 (1.4%) new admissions.
- Other offenses accounted for 367 (0.9%).

RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS

Felon new admissions for Calendar Year 1990 fall into the following racial/ethnic groups:


- White admissions accounted for 29.5% (11,580).
- Hispanic (Mexican) offenders accounted for 36.2% (14,208). This represents the largest racial/ethnic group.
- Black admissions accounted for 29.7% (11,683).
- Other racial/ethnic groups accounted for 4.6% (1,801).

AGE GROUPS

In 1990 the age of felons at the time of admission was older than the age of felons at the time of admission in 1985. Over one half (54.7%) of felon new admissions in 1990 were under 30 years old. In 1985, 60.7% of the felon new admissions were under 30 years old.


- The 20 to 24 year old age group accounted for 25.4% (9,993) of felon new admissions.
- The 25 to 29 year old age group accounted for 24.2% (9,516) of felon new admissions.
- The 30 to 34 year old age group accounted for 19.9% (7,827) of felon new admissions.
- The median age of felon new admissions increased from 27 in 1985 to 29 in 1990.

AREA OF COMMITMENT

- 26,667 (67.9%) felon new admissions were admitted from Southern California counties.
- 5,770 (14.7%) felon new admissions were admitted from San Francisco Bay Area counties.
- 6,835 (17.4%) felon new admissions were admitted from the remainder of the state.


The Ten Counties with the Highest Percentages of Admissions

COUNTY OF COMMITMENT

- Los Angeles County alone accounted for 16,601 (42.3%) felon new admissions.
- San Diego was the next largest county of commitment, accounting for 2,919 (7.4%) felon new admissions.
- Santa Clara County had the most commitments from the San Francisco Bay Area counties, accounting for 1,692 (4.3%) felon new admissions.
- Kern and Sacramento counties each accounted for 3.8% of the felon new admissions.


DRUG HISTORY

During Calendar Year 1990, 72.1% of felon new admissions reported a history of drug use. Of these:

- 30.4% reported use of cocaine.
- 16.2% had a history of heroin use.
- 14.1% used marijuana.
- 7.1% used methamphetamines or amphetamines.
- The percentage of female felon new admissions with a history of heroin, cocaine and methamphetamine use was greater than the percentage of male felons who used these drugs.



ALCOHOL USAGE

Of the felon new admissions for Calendar Year 1990, 37.6% reported a history of alcohol use.

- 62.4% of felon new admissions either did not use alcohol, used only on social occasions, or use was not identified.
- The percentage of female new admissions that were under the influence of alcohol at the time of their offense was less than the male felon new admissions who were under the influence of alcohol at the time of their offense.
- 13.7% of felon new admissions were under the influence of alcohol at the time they committed their offense.



MARITAL STATUS

Felon new admissions for Calendar Year 1990 reported the following information on their marital status.

- 48.7% had never been married.
- 51.2% had been married.
 - 28.6% were married once.
 - 5.7% were married twice.
 - 0.7% were married three or more times.
 - 15.6% were divorced or separated.
 - 0.6% had spouses who are deceased.

HIGHLIGHTS

The number of PV-WNTs increased 179.1%, from 5,042 in 1985 to 14,070 in 1990.

The percentage of PV-WNTs with violent offenses has decreased from 23.6% in 1985 to 16.1% in 1990.

The number of drug offender PV-WNTs has increased 575.2%, from 666 in 1985 to 4,497 in 1990.

During the last five years the percentage of PV-WNTs who were white has decreased while the other racial/ethnic groups have increased.

Of total PV-WNTs returned to CDC, Los Angeles county accounted for 45.1%.


The median age of the PV-WNTs has gone up from 28 years in 1985 to 30 years in 1990.

During Calendar Year 1990 there were 14,070 Parole Violators Returned With a New Term (PV-WNTs).


- This represents an increase of 910.1% since 1980, 179.1% since 1985 and 27.4% since 1989.

OFFENSE CATEGORIES

Property offenders represent the largest offense category for PV-WNTs received during Calendar Year 1990.


- Violent offenders accounted for 16.1% (2,267) of the PV-WNTs.
- Property offenders accounted for 45.1% (6,345).
- Drug offenders accounted for 32.0% (4,497).
- Offenders who committed other offenses made up the remaining 6.8% (961) of the PV-WNTs.

VIOLENT OFFENSES

The number of parole violators returned with new terms (PV-WNTs) increased from 1,187 in 1985 to 2,267 in 1990. As a percentage of all returns, violent offenses decreased from 23.6% in 1985 to 16.1% in 1990.


- Homicides accounted for 107 (0.8%) of the PV-WNTs. There were:
 - 3 (0.0%) Murder First offenders.
 - 42 (0.3%) Murder Second offenders.
 - 57 (0.4%) Manslaughter offenders.
 - 5 (0.0%) Vehicular Manslaughter offenders.
- There were 1,279 (9.1%) Robbery offenders.
- Assault with a Deadly Weapon accounted for 404 (2.9%) of the PV-WNTs.
- Other Assault/Battery accounted for 265 (1.9%) of the PV-WNTs.
- Sex crimes accounted for 181 (1.3%) of the PV-WNTs. There were:
 - 59 (0.4%) Rape offenders.
 - 60 (0.4%) offenders for Lewd Act with a Child.
 - 62 (0.4%) Other Sex crimes.
- Kidnapping accounted for 31 (0.2%) of the PV-WNTs.

PROPERTY OFFENSES

The number of parole violators returned with a new term (PV-WNTs) for property offenses increased by 118.9%, from 2,898 in 1985 to 6,345 in 1990. As a percentage of all PV-WNTs, property offenses decreased from 57.7% in 1985 to 45.1% in 1990.

- Burglary First and Second Degree accounted for:
 - 978 (7.0%) Burglary First Degree.
 - 1,531 (10.9%) Burglary Second Degree.
- Grand Theft accounted for 586 (4.2%) of the PV-WNTs.
- Petty Theft with a Prior was the largest of the property offense groups with 1,574 (11.2%) returns.
- Receiving Stolen Property accounted for 620 (4.4%) of the PV-WNTs.
- Vehicle Theft accounted for 784 (5.6%) of the PV-WNTs.
- Forgery/Fraud accounted for 205 (1.5%).
- Other Property offenses accounted for 67 (0.5%) of the PV-WNTs.


DRUG OFFENSES

The number of parole violators returned with a new term (PV-WNTs) for drug offenses increased by 575.2%, from 666 in 1985 to 4,497 in 1990. As a percentage of all PV-WNTs, drug offenses increased from 13.3% in 1985 to 32.0% in 1990.


- CSS Possession accounted for 2,115 (15.0%) of the PV-WNTs.


OTHER OFFENSES

- Escapes accounted for 63 (0.4%) of the PV-WNTs.
- Driving Under the Influence (DUI) accounted for 304 (2.2%).
- Arson offenders accounted for 18 (0.1%).
- Possession of Weapon offenders accounted for 492 (3.5%).
- Other Offenses accounted for 84 (0.6%).

RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS

- The number of PV-WNTs who were White increased by 141.1%, from 1,449 in 1985 to 3,494 in 1990.
- Hispanic (Mexican) PV-WNTs increased by 196.2%, from 1,353 in 1985 to 4,008 in 1990.
- The number of PV-WNTs who were Black increased by 189.3%, from 2,108 in 1985 to 6,098 in 1990.
- The Other racial/ethnic group accounted for 470, or 3.3% of the PV-WNTs during Calendar Year 1990.


Racial/Ethnic Groups Calendar Year 1990

AGE GROUPS


During Calendar Year 1990 over half (55.6%) of the PV-WNTs were 25-34 years of age.

- The largest age group of PV-WNTs, ages 25-29, accounted for 31.3% (4,405).
- The second largest age group was the 30-34 year olds, accounting for 24.3% (3,424) of the returns.
- The smallest age group was the 18-19 year olds, accounting for 0.2% (22).
- PV-WNTs age 55 and over represented 0.7%
 (98) of those returned.

AREA OF COMMITMENT


- 9,613 (68.3%) PV-WNTs were admitted from Southern California.

Area of Commitment Calendar Year 1990



COUNTY OF COMMITMENT

- Los Angeles County alone accounted for 6,346 (45.1%) of the PV-WNTs.
- San Diego was the next largest county of commitment, accounting for 970 (6.9%).
- Alameda returned the most PV-WNTs from the San Francisco Bay Area, accounting for 678 (4.8%).
- Calaveras and Mariposa counties each returned one PV-WNT.
- Alpine, Mono and Sierra counties had no offenders returned.

The California Department of Corrections reached an all time high of 97,309 inmates on December 31, 1990.




























The Institutions with the Highest Assault Rate on Inmates per 100 Institution ADP




TIME CREDITS LOST

Information presented is based on the average credit losses for violations of the Department of Corrections Director's Rules specifying conduct.

- The average number of days lost per felon (based on the average daily population) in 1990 was 23.7 (this average is based on both inmates who lost credits and inmates who did not lose credits).
- The average number of days lost decreased from 26.1 days in 1989 to 23.7 in 1990.
- The large increase of the average from 1982 to 1983 was partly due to an increase in the maximum penalty for violations of the Directors rules, from 45 days to 180 days. This change coincided with the implementation of the Inmate Work Training Incentive Program (IWTIP), which enabled eligible inmates to earn more credits toward reduction of the time to serve than could be earned before for good behavior.

HIGHLIGHTS

On December 31, 1990 the California Department of Corrections' (CDC) felon parole population reached an all time high of 65,420.

Felon parolees who were originally committed for property offenses made up the largest group of parolees; this group accounted for 33.2%. In contrast, the largest group in the felon institution population was committed for violent offenses.

The 1990 CDC felon parole population increased 569.5% since December 31, 1980.

The median age has changed from 29 years in 1985 to 31 years in 1990.

The 1990 year end felon parole population reached a high of 218.2 parolees per 100,000 California population, the highest in CDC history.








Violent Offenses December 31, 1990













Distribution by Region of Parole Calendar Year 1990





Average Revocation Time Assessed in Months

















December 31, 1990





Death Sentence Racial/Ethnic Groups December 31, 1990







GLOSSARY OF TERMS AND ACRONYMNS

ABSCONDER: see PAROLEE AT LARGE and RELEASEE AT LARGE

ADP: AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION.

ADMISSION: New felon commitments from the court, safekeepers, county diagnostic cases, and transfers from other jurisdictions.

ADMISSION RATE: The number of felon new admissions received by CDC from court during a specified time period, per 100,000 state or county population.

AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION (ADP): The average daily population in CDC facilities during a specified time period.

BASELINE CAMPS: see INSTITUTION BASED CAMPS.

BOARD OF PRISON TERMS (BPT): The state administrative board that has jurisdiction over the release to parole of offenders sentenced to indeterminate terms and for setting parole dates, establishing parole length and conditions, and granting, rescinding, suspending or revoking paroles.

BPT: BOARD OF PRISON TERMS.

BPT CHARGE CATEGORIES: Violations of conditions of parole that are grouped into categories based on the seriousness and type of violation, for which there are established ranges of revocation time determined by the BPT.

BPT CHARGE GROUP: see BPT CHARGE CATEGORIES.

BPT REVOCATION CHARGE: The principal parole violation for which the BPT revokes parole and returns a parolee to CDC Custody (PV-RTC). Additional time may be added for any secondary charge imposed by the BPT.

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (CDC): The state agency which has jurisdiction over the California prison and parole system.

CALIFORNIA JURISDICTION: As used in this publication, any inmate or parolee who is being supervised by CDC.

CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER (CRC): A facility operated by the CDC to house Civil Narcotic Addicts (CNA) and selected felons.

REFERENCE GUIDE

CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY (CYA): The state agency which has jurisdiction over juvenile offenders who are wards of the juvenile, municipal and superior courts.

CAMPS: Camps that house 60-160 minimum custody inmates to work on conservation projects or fight fires.

CDC: CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS.

CIVIL COMMITMENT: A type of commitment in which criminal proceedings are suspended while a defendant undergoes treatment at the California Rehabilitation Center as a Civil Narcotic Addict.

CIVIL NARCOTIC ADDICT (CNA): An offender civilly committed to CDC for treatment of narcotic addiction.

COMMITMENT RATE: The number of new felon admissions from court and parole violators returned with a new term (PV-WNTs) committed to CDC during a specified time period per 100,000 state or county population.

COMMUNITY BASED FACILITIES: County, state, and private facilities under contract with CDC in local communities to house inmates in work furlough and prison mother programs, and parole violators returned to custody (PV-RTCs) who are serving revocation time in county jails.

COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS: see COMMUNITY BASED FACILITIES.

CONTINUED ON PAROLE: (COP) Parolees returned to CDC custody, but re-released to parole after an investigation by the CDC or a hearing by BPT instead of being revoked.

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE SCHEDULE (CSS): A schedule that categorizes drugs, substances, or precursors according to their potential for abuse and providing penalties (Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11058).

COUNTY DIAGNOSTIC CASE: An offender placed by the court in CDC custody for a pre-sentence diagnostic evaluation (Penal Code Section 1203.03).

COURT COMMITMENT: A commitment imposed by the court sentencing the defendant to CDC. A commitment can be as a felon, civil narcotic addict, county diagnostic case or a CYA ward.

CRC: CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER.

CREDITS: see GOOD TIME CREDIT, INMATE WORK TRAINING INCENTIVE PROGRAM, and PRE-PRISON CREDIT.

CSS: CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE SCHEDULE.

CYA: CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY.

DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH (DMH) STATE HOSPITALS: State Mental Health Hospitals under contract with CDC to provide psychiatric treatment to inmates who require treatment that is not available in CDC facilities, pursuant to Penal Code Section 2864.

DESIGN CAPACITY: The maximum number of beds a facility was originally designed to contain, less or plus beds eliminated or added due to conversions, additions or deactivations.

DISCHARGED: When an offender is no longer under the jurisdiction of CDC due to completing a court imposed sentence or term determined by the BPT, including parole time.

FELON: An offender sentenced to CDC jurisdiction with a court imposed sentence and parole violators returned to state prison by the court with new terms (PV-WNTs).

FIRST RELEASE TO PAROLE: Includes the first release to parole for felon new admissions and parole violators returned with a new term (PV-WNTs).

GOOD TIME CREDIT: Under specified conditions, inmates sentenced under Penal Code Section 1170 for a crime committed on or after July 1, 1977 earn one day off their time to serve for every three days of good behavior or participation, if they are ineligible to earn day for day credits under the Inmate Work Training Incentive Program (IWTIP).

ICOOP: see INTERSTATE COMPACT.

INCIDENT: A violation of the law, regulations, or rules of the Director of Corrections by an inmate.

INDETERMINATE SENTENCE LAW (ISL): Prior to July 1, 1977 all terms imposed by the court were indeterminate -- not of fixed duration. Offenses committed on or after July 1, 1977 are for a period specified by the court except for offenses with 'life' penalties.

INMATE: A person committed to state prison by the court.

REFERENCE GUIDE

INMATE WORK TRAINING INCENTIVE PROGRAM (IWTIP): A program that permits inmates to earn day for day credit against their sentence by participating in a job, educational or vocational program (see also GOOD TIME CREDIT and PRE-PRISON CREDIT).

INSTITUTION: As used in this publication, an institution is a state prison.

INSTITUTION BASED CAMPS: Conservation camps that are adjacent to the California Correctional Institution (CCI), California Men's Colony (CMC) and California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).

INSTITUTION POPULATION: This population consists of felons, civil narcotic addicts and county diagnostic cases.

INTERSTATE COMPACT: An agreement with CDC and other states wherein CDC maintains their inmates in custody and supervises their parolees while they live in California.

INTERSTATE PAROLE UNIT (ISPU): The CDC parole unit that coordinates with other states the parole supervision of California parolees who reside in other states.

IWTIP: INMATE WORK TRAINING INCENTIVE PROGRAM

MEAN: The sum of individual values divided by the number of cases; the average of all values.

MEDIAN: The middle value in a distribution, above and below which lie an equal number of values.

NON-FELONS: Offenders who are admitted to CDC as civil narcotic addicts, county diagnostic cases, or safekeepers, among others.

OBIS: OFFENDER BASED INFORMATION SYSTEM.

OFFENDER: A person convicted of violating a crime or a condition of parole.

OFFENDER BASED INFORMATION SYSTEM (OBIS): An automated record keeping system for offenders under the jurisdiction of CDC.

OFFENSE: As used in this publication, the principal or controlling offense.

OFFENSE CATEGORIES: Similar offenses grouped into four major categories (Violent, Property, Drug and Other).

REFERENCE GUIDE

OUTPATIENT: A civil narcotic addict on parole.

PAL: PAROLEE AT LARGE.

PAROLE: After the prison term is served, offenders are supervised in the community by CDC for a period established by BPT up to the statutory maximum.

PAROLE REGION: There are four parole regions that administer parole supervision throughout the state. The boundaries are identified on page 4 of the Reference Guide.

PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURNED TO CUSTODY (PV-RTC): A parolee who has violated the conditions of parole and has been ordered by the BPT to return to prison.

PAROLE VIOLATOR WITH A NEW TERM (PV-WNT): A parolee who has received a court sentence for a new crime and been returned to prison.

PAROLEE AT LARGE (PAL): A felon parolee who absconds from parole supervision.

PENDING REVOCATION: A parolee who has been charged with violating a condition of parole and placed in CDC custody pending a revocation hearing by the BPT.

POPULATION AT RISK: Offenders in a population on January 1 of any given year plus offenders entering the population during the year.

PRE-PRISON CREDITS: The time credits granted by a judge at sentencing for time spent in custody and for good behavior prior to a felon admission to state prison.

PRINCIPAL OFFENSE: The controlling offense designated by the court as the base term, usually the offense that keeps the offender in custody the longest period of time. The principal offense is used for statistics by CDC.

PRISON: A state correctional facility where offenders are confined following sentencing in court.

PRISON MOTHER PROGRAM (PMP): Selected inmate mothers with small children are housed with their children in community based facilities.

PV-RTC: PAROLE VIOLATOR RETURN TO CUSTODY.

PV-WNT: PAROLE VIOLATOR WITH A NEW TERM.

REFERENCE GUIDE

RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS: Grouping of the racial and ethnic origins of inmates and parolees into four major groups, White, Black, Hispanic (Mexican) and Other, for summary statistics.

RAL: RELEASEE AT LARGE.

RATE: As used in this publication, the ratio of the number of a specific group to a population base.

REINSTATED: A parolee at large (PAL) who is reinstated to active parole status.

RELEASEE AT LARGE (RAL): A civil narcotic addict (CNA) on outpatient (parole) status who absconds from CDC supervision.

REPAROLE: When a parolee who has been returned to custody for violating a condition of parole completes the revocation time assessed by BPT and is released to serve the remaining time on the original parole period.

RE-RELEASE: see CONTINUED ON PAROLE (COP)

REVOCATION: Suspension of parole and return of an offender to custody for a parole violation.

REVOCATION TIME ASSESSED: The amount of time in custody that BPT assessed for a parole violation.

REVOCATION TIME SERVED: Calculated by subtracting the amount of jail credits and any CDC work or good behavior credits from the revocation time assessed by the BPT.

SAFEKEEPERS: County prisoners housed in state prison for hospitalization or because the county jail is unsafe or unfit.

SUSPENSION: The interruption of a parole period. Time on suspension is not credited to the period of parole.

TEMPORARY RELEASE STATUS: An inmate released temporarily from a CDC institution to court, jail, an outside hospital or medical facility, or on leave to the community.

TERM: A specific period of time the court sentences an inmate to serve in prison.

TIME SERVED: The sum of time served in pre-prison custody plus time served in state prison.

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WORK FURLOUGH: A program to assist felons in adjusting from institution life to the community. The offenders work in the community during the day and return to custody in a community correctional facility at night.

WORK FURLOUGH IN CUSTODY: A program similar to Work Furlough, but the custody location is in a county jail facility.

YOUTH AUTHORITY: CALIFORNIA YOUTH AUTHORITY.
