

#### INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring within the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into the issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing; serious concern has been displayed within many municipal and county agencies whereby various committees and working groups have been formed to help battle this important problem. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. As stated in the following pages, reported domestic violence acts increased ten percent over 1990. It is through analysis of this data that hopefully, the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

#### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1991 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 55,698 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 1991, a 10% increase compared to the 50,823 reported in 1990.
- Murders increased 7% in 1991 (61) when compared to 1990 (57).
- Assaults occurred in 62% (34,319) of the reported offenses in 1991.
- The total arrests for 1991 (19,127) increased 12% over 1990 (17,035).
- Arrests were made in 34% (19,127) of the offenses reported for 1991.
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (10,147).
- For the ninth consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 31% (17,008) of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 53% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 1991. Specifically, 9% (5,228) were involved and 44% (24,304) were present.
- Wives were the victims in 37% (20,632), and female friends were the victims in 39% (21,867) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1991. Overall, females were victims in 85% (47,140) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender increased from 10,695 in 1990 to 12,105 in 1991. This is a 13% increase.
- Alcohol and/or drugs were involved in 44% (24,551) of the reported offenses occurring in 1991. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 39% (21,671) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over were victims in 3% (1,659) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 1991.
- Domestic Violence does not occur at a regular frequency, but when viewed as a ratio of its occurrence to a fixed time interval, one act of domestic violence would occur every nine (9) minutes and twenty-six (26) seconds.

• Assault, criminal restraint, false imprisonment, criminal mischief, burglary and harassment reported the highest number of offenses since the inception of the Domestic Violence Program.

• Arrests for domestic violence offenses increased (12%), and reflected the highest number of arrests since the inception of the Domestic Violence Program.

• The violent crimes of homicide (61), aggravated assault (5,757) and sexual assault (82) accounted for eleven (11) percent of reported domestic violence offenses (55,698).

• Fifty-three percent (29,702) of all domestic violence complaints resulted in injury. This is a 6% increase when compared to the 27,987 that occurred in 1990.

• Of all the domestic violence offenses involving weapons (34,907), hands, fists, feet, etc. were used in 87% (30,461) of these offenses.

• Domestic violence offenses involving a gun increased 7%, from 348 in 1990 to 374 in 1991.

• There were 2,828 serious injuries reported in 1991, a 1% decrease when compared to the 2,849 reported in 1990.

For the ninth consecutive year, assault was the most prominent of the eleven types of domestic violence offenses (34,319). Females were victims in 85% (29,111) and males in 15% (5,208) of the domestic violence offenses involving assaults.

- Wives were the victims in 37% (20,632), and female friends were the victims in 39% (21,867) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1991. Overall, females were victims in 85% (47,140) of all domestic violence offenses.
- Harassment was the second highest reported domestic violence offense in 1991 (17,887).

In addition to the sixty-one (61) domestic violence homicide victims in 1991, there were nine (9) associated deaths.

• Twenty-six percent of the domestic violence homicide victims were male (16), while seventy-four percent were female (45).

Females, 60 years of age or over, were the victims in 67% (1,112) of the 1,659 elderly abuse offenses.


Persons age 60 or over were the victims in 3% (1,659) of all the reported domestic violence offenses during this period.
