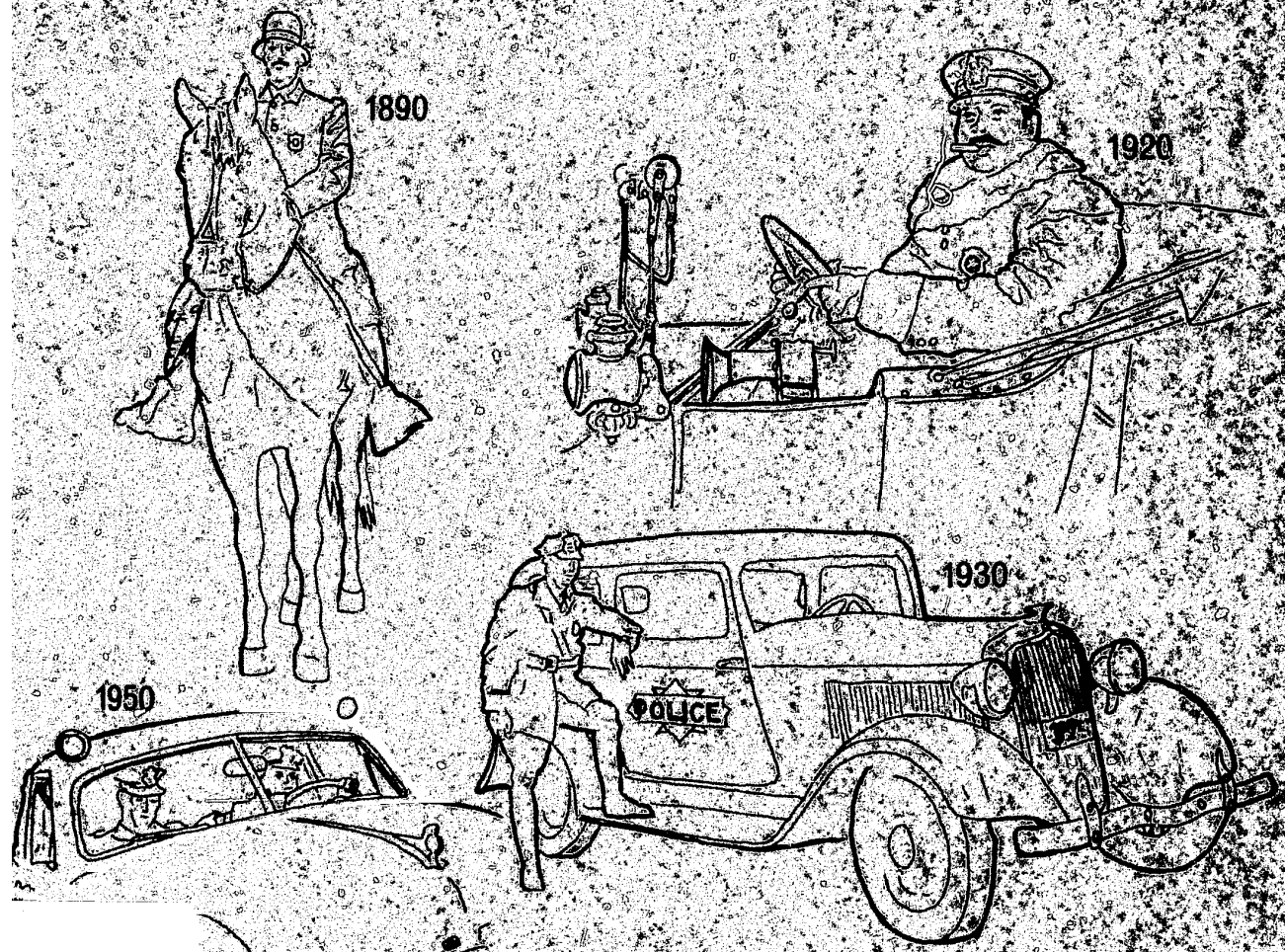

DEAR SIR:

DURING 1973 THE ST. PAUL POLICE DEPARTMENT SUCCEEDED IN ESTABLISHING A NUMBER OF NEW PROGRAMS AND MAINTAINING A HIGH LEVEL OF EFFICIENCY IN EXISTING ONES. THE TRUE TEST OF OUR WORTH, HOWEVER, IS REFLECTED IN OUR ABILITY TO PROVIDE SAFETY AND SECURITY SERVICES AROUND THE CLOCK TO ST. PAUL CITIZENS. IN THIS RESPECT WE SUCCEEDED ADMIRABLY, EVEN THOUGH OUR TOTAL NUMBER OF SWORN PERSONNEL DECREASED BY 36 MEN DURING THE YEAR. IN SPITE OF THIS DIMINISHING MANPOWER SITUATION AND A 23% INCREASE IN INCIDENTS REQUIRING POLICE ACTION, THE NUMBER OF PART I CRIMES INCREASED BY ONLY 3.56% OVER 1972.

DURING THE PAST YEAR THIS DEPARTMENT ADOPTED OR EXPANDED THE FOLLOWING PROGRAMS:

- ... WEST SIDE TEAM POLICING WAS INAUGURATED.
- ... THE CANINE UNIT WAS EXPANDED TO FIVE MEN AND DOGS.
- ... A SCHOOL LIAISON PROGRAM AND AN EXPANDED RIDE-ALONG PROGRAM WERE INITIATED THROUGH THE POLICE COMMUNITY RELATIONS UNIT.
- ... THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT WAS ORGANIZED AND STAFFED.
- ... FEMALE DISPATCHERS WERE EMPLOYED TO FREE SWORN OFFICERS FOR STREET DUTY.
- ... IN JUNE, THE DEPARTMENT CONDUCTED AN OPEN HOUSE AND ACTED AS HOST FOR THE MINNESOTA POLICE AND PEACE OFFICERS' STATE CONVENTION.



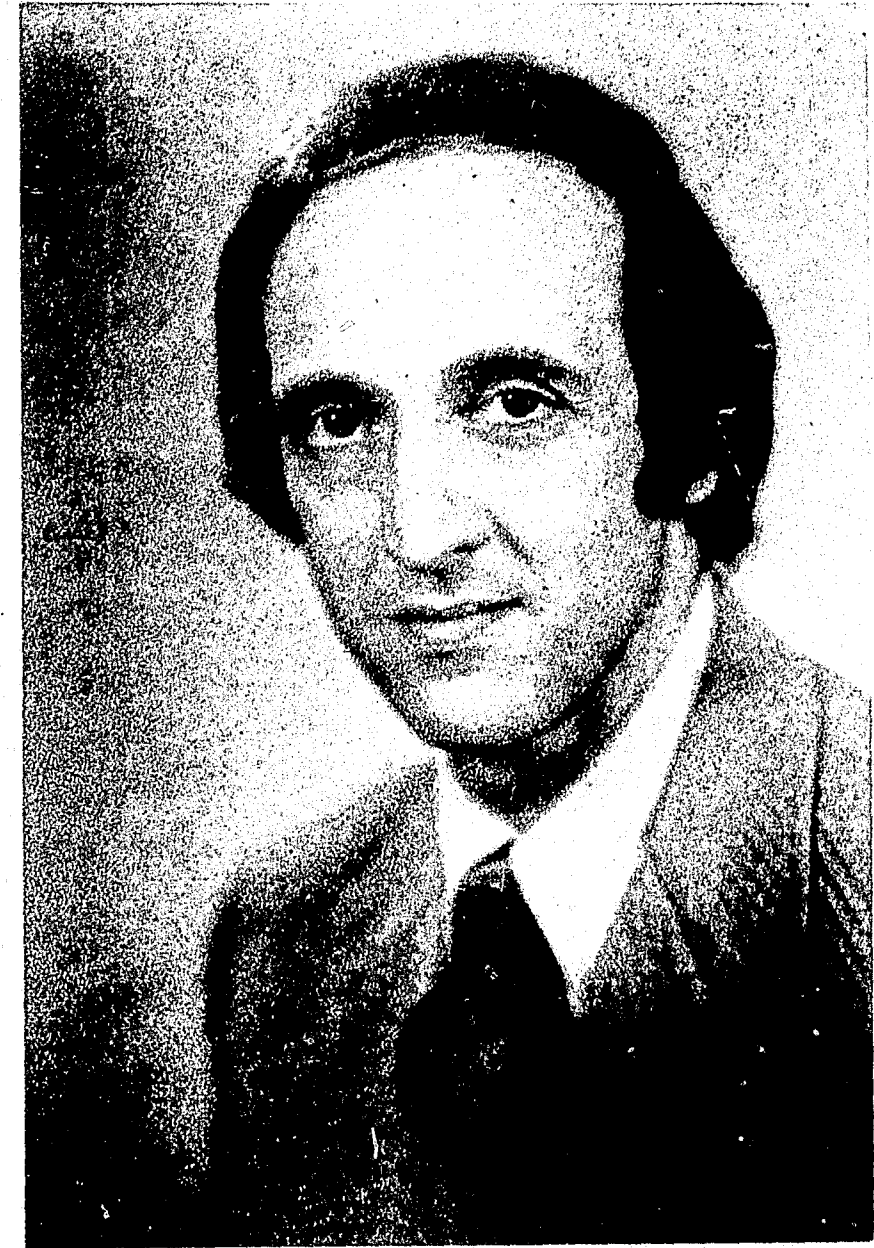
FORTUNATELY, 1973 WENT BY WITHOUT ANY MAJOR CIVIL DISTURBANCE. DUE TO THE LACK OF PERSONNEL WE WERE FORCED TO DISBAND THE 5TH PLATOON AND INCORPORATE THOSE MEN INTO THE REMAINING PLATOONS IN ORDER TO KEEP THOSE UNITS AT MINIMUM EFFECTIVE STRENGTHS. WE ALSO BECAME INVOLVED IN INVESTIGATING TWO OF THE MORE NOTABLE CRIMES IN RECENT YEARS - THE THEFT OF THE NATIONAL CUP FROM THE ARTS AND SCIENCE CENTER, AND THE KIDNAPPING OF AN INFANT FROM CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL. THE MANNER IN WHICH THESE CASES WERE INVESTIGATED AND SOLVED INDICATES THE HIGH DEGREE OF PROFESSIONAL COMPETENCE OF OUR PERSONNEL.

AS WE EMBARK ON 1974, WE ARE CONFIDENT IN OUR ABILITY TO MAINTAIN THE BEST POSSIBLE SERVICE TO THE CITIZENS OF ST. PAUL AND, HOPEFULLY, WITH THE ADDITION OF MORE MEN WE WILL MAKE THIS CITY AN EVEN BETTER PLACE TO LIVE.

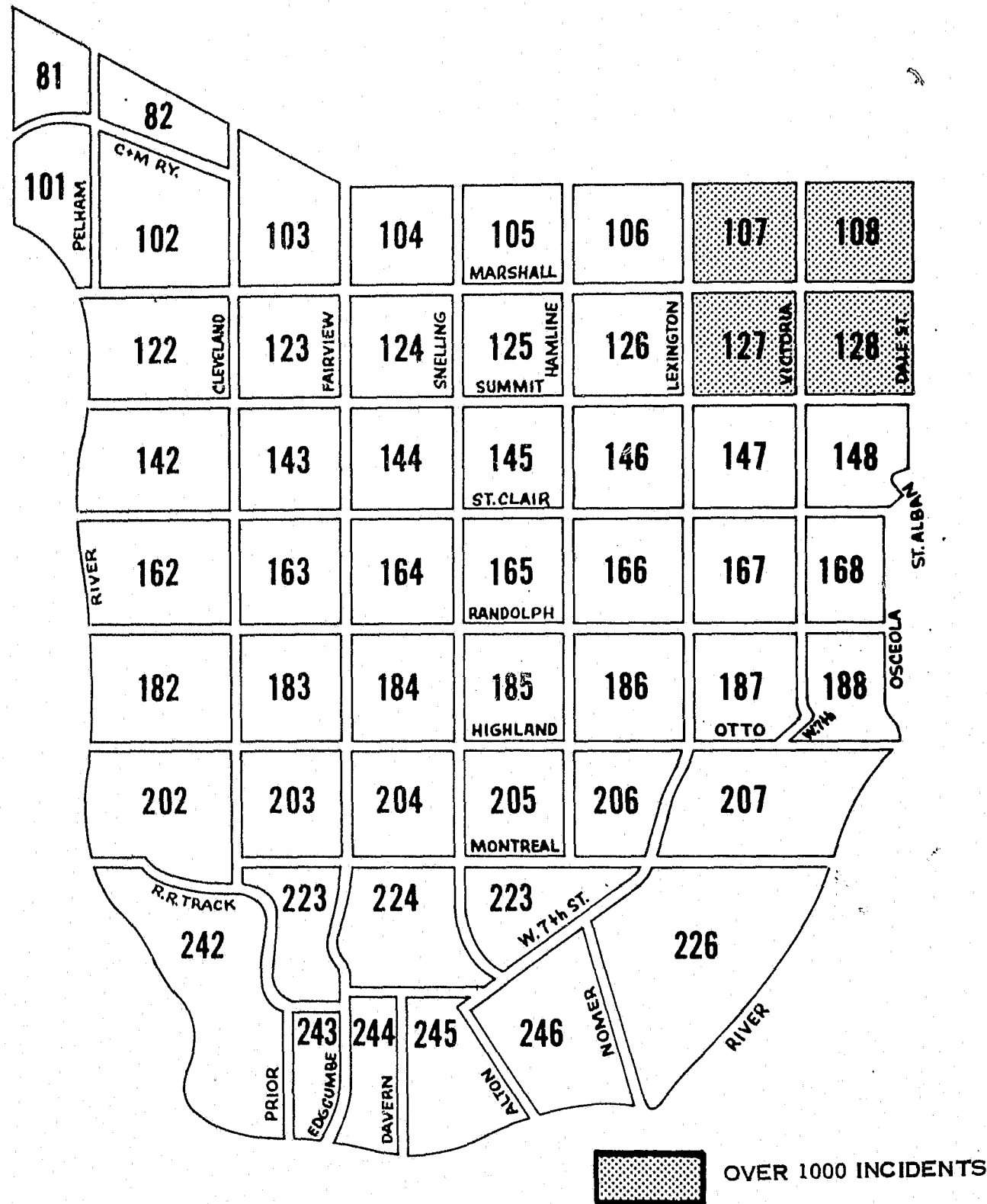
THE PATROL DIVISION'S RANGE OF RESPONSIBILITY IS AS BROAD AS HUMAN BEHAVIOR. IT SERVES PEOPLE OF ALL AGES, AND ALL CONDITIONS, ADDRESSING ITSELF TO THEIR PROBLEMS AND TRAGEDIES, CRIMINAL AND NON-CRIMINAL. IT IS DEDICATED TO THE DETERRENCE OF CRIME, BUT OF EQUAL IMPORTANCE, IT IS OFTEN THE ONLY AVAILABLE SOURCE OF ADVICE AND COMFORT AND RELIEF IN INCIDENTS AS REMOTE AS MISSING CHILDREN AND UNEXPECTED DEATH. ALL OTHER POLICE UNITS EXIST ONLY TO SUPPLEMENT AND SUPPORT ITS FUNCTIONS. WHILE IT IS A TRADITIONAL SERVICE, IT IS DYNAMIC IN TESTING NEW IDEAS AND INNOVATIVE METHODS. THE TEAM POLICING CONCEPT AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF A CANINE UNIT ARE RECENT EXAMPLES OF THE DIVISION'S EFFORT TO DO A BETTER JOB AND ACT AS WORTHY CUSTODIANS OF THE POLICE "IMAGE", DESPITE A SUBSTANTIAL SHRINKAGE OF PERSONNEL STRENGTH FROM 368 TO 339 IN THE LAST YEAR.

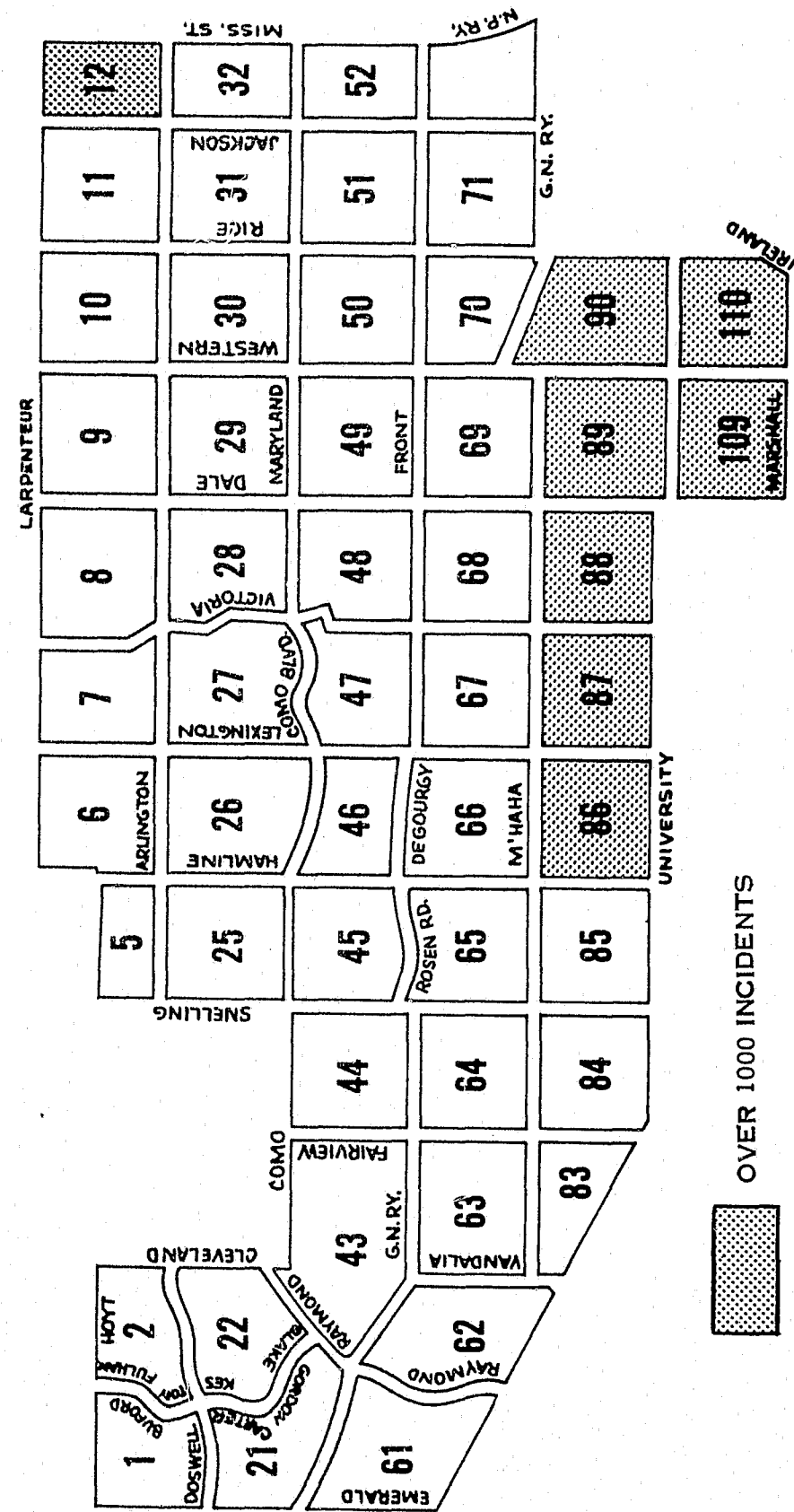

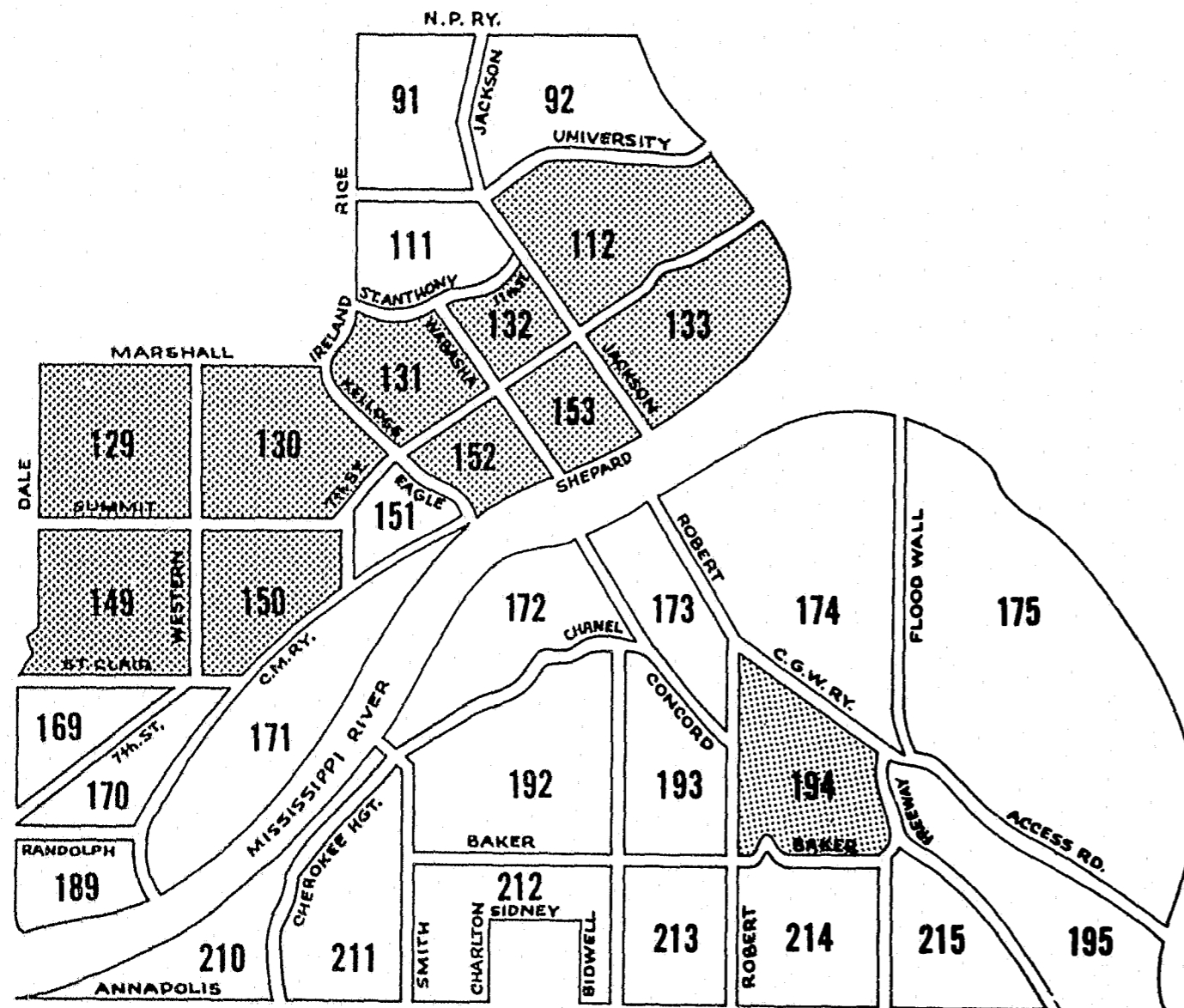
OVER 1000 INCIDENTS

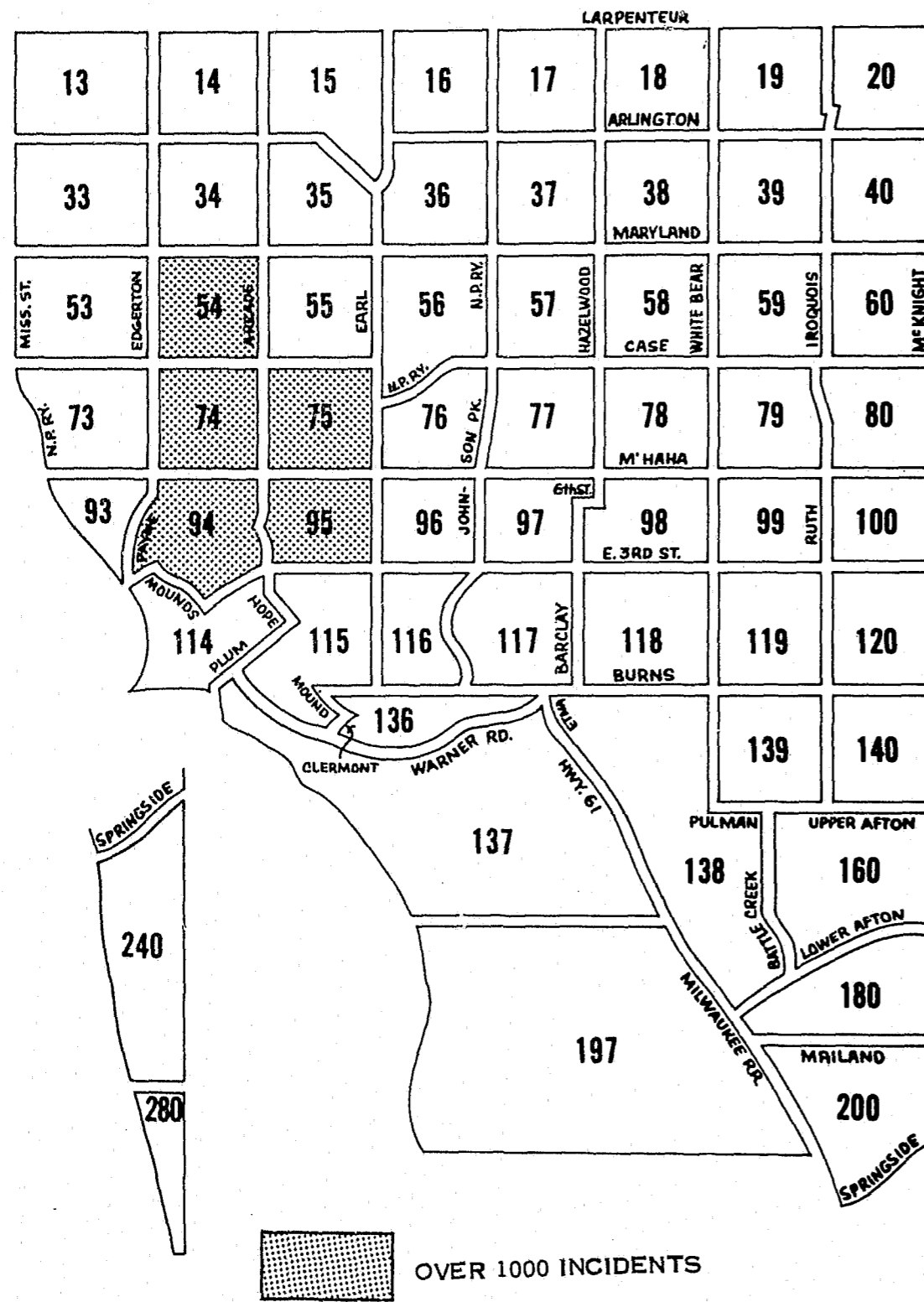

ZONE III IS THE SMALLEST ZONE IN THE CITY, WITH ONLY 32 GRIDS. ALTHOUGH 16 OF THE GRIDS DID EXPERIENCE AN INCREASE IN ACTIVITY IN 1973, THE ENTIRE ZONE SHOWED A DECREASE OF 3.50%. DESPITE ITS SMALL SIZE, ZONE III IS AN ACTIVE ZONE WITH 27.8% OF THE ACTIVITY IN 1972, AND 26.4% IN 1973.

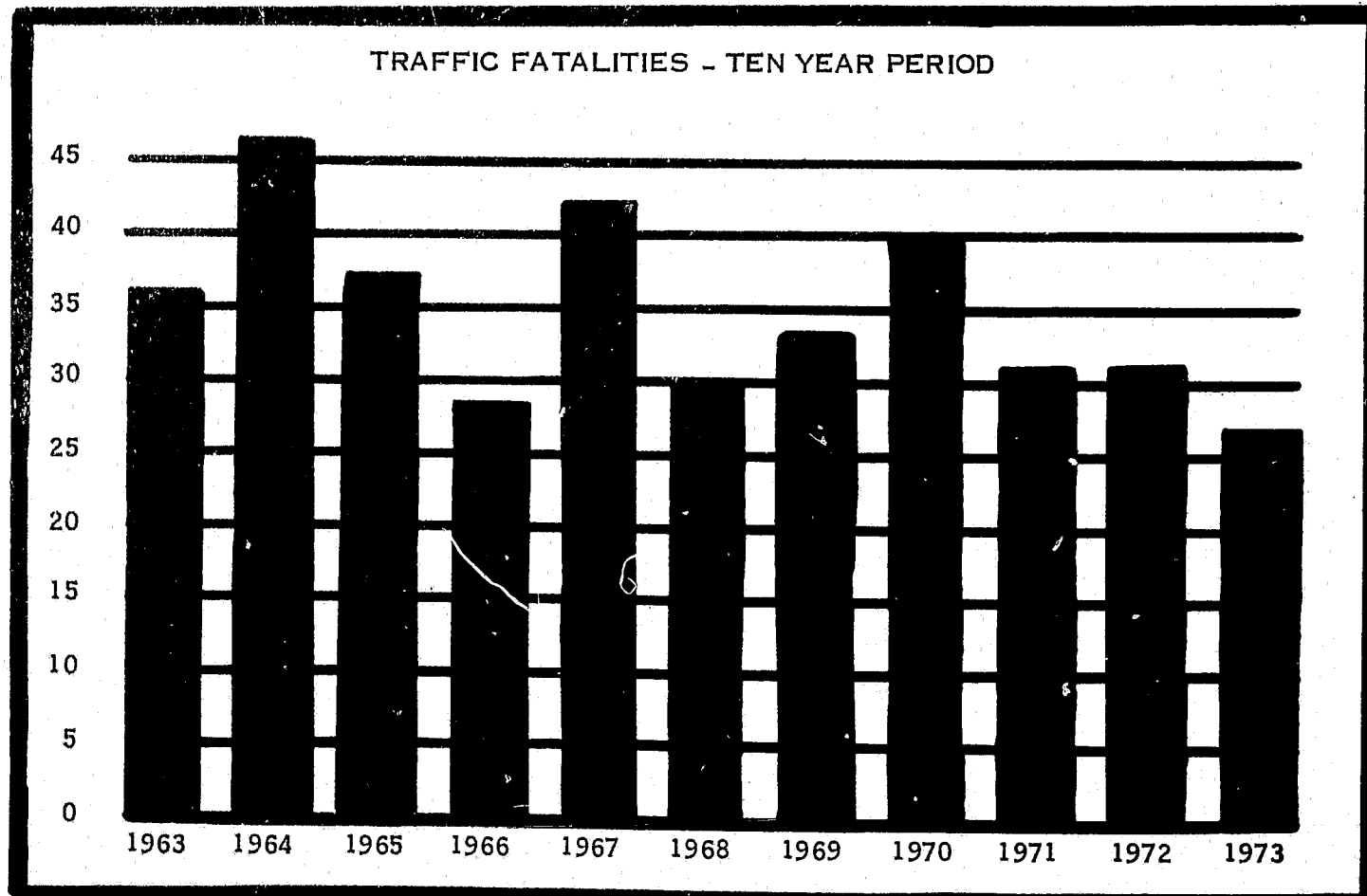

PAUL DEPARTMENT OF POLICE WITH WELL TRAINED RESERVE OFFICERS TO BE UTILIZED IN SITUATIONS THAT WILL BE OF SUCH DURATION SO AS TO DEplete THE REGULAR PATROL FORCE ON THE STREET OR THE NUMBER OF REGULAR OFFICERS ON DUTY IS INADEQUATE TO COPE WITH THE SITUATION.

THE ST. PAUL POLICE RESERVE IS MADE UP OF DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS WHO, ON THE MOST PART, HOLD REGULAR FULL TIME OCCUPATIONS AND CONTRIBUTE THEIR FREE TIME TO THE CITY OF ST. PAUL AS RESERVE OFFICERS. THESE MEN MUST EXPEND THEIR OWN FUNDS TO BECOME MEMBERS OF THE UNIT, FOR UNIFORMS AND EQUIPMENT, AND NORMALLY CONTINUE TO "PAY OUT" THEIR OWN MONEY EACH YEAR THEREAFTER TO REMAIN ACTIVE IN THE ST. PAUL POLICE RESERVE. THE AGE OF THESE MEN RANGES FROM 21 THROUGH 70 AND OVER HALF THE PRESENT UNIT HAS SERVED OVER TEN YEARS. THEIR TRAINING IS CONDUCTED BY THE ST. PAUL DEPARTMENT OF POLICE TRAINING UNIT.

POLICE RESERVE TRAINING

IN MARCH OF 1973 TWENTY-TWO RESERVE POLICE RECRUITS RECEIVED 51 HOURS OF BASIC TRAINING. INSTRUCTIONS WERE IN TWENTY-TWO POLICE SUBJECTS, INCLUDING: REPORT WRITING, BASIC CRIMINAL AND CIVIL LAW, CITIZENS' ARREST, CITY ORDINANCES, POINT TRAFFIC CONTROL, FIRST AID, PUBLIC RELATIONS AND PARKING TAG WRITING. ALTHOUGH THE POLICE RESERVE OFFICER IS PRIMARILY ASSIGNED TO TRAFFIC AND CROWD CONTROL, THE OTHER CLASSES ARE NECESSARY TO ROUND OFF A RESERVE OFFICER'S KNOWLEDGE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT.

PUBLIC INFORMATION UNIT

DURING 1973, THE PUBLIC INFORMATION UNIT WAS INVOLVED IN A VARIETY OF FUNCTIONS AND HAD ITS SCOPE OF DUTIES INCREASED.

IN FEBRUARY, THE UNIT BEGAN THE PUBLICATION OF THE SPPD REPORT. THE NINE ISSUES DURING THE YEAR WERE WELL RECEIVED, AND THE PUBLICATION SHALL CONTINUE ON A MONTHLY BASIS.

THE UNIT ALSO PLAYED A MAJOR ROLE IN THE PREPARATION OF THE DEPARTMENT'S OPEN HOUSE, HELD JUNE 23RD THROUGH JUNE 27TH. THIS INCLUDED OBTAINING THE SERVICES OF PAUL JOHNSON TO ASSIST IN THE GRAPHIC DISPLAY OF MATERIAL. FUNDING WAS LATER OBTAINED FOR RETAINING HIS SERVICES FOR THE BALANCE OF 1973.

CRIME PREVENTION

PREVENTING CRIME, THE MOST IMPORTANT PRIORITY OF LAW ENFORCEMENT, IS THE FUNDAMENTAL PURPOSE OF THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT. THROUGH IMPLEMENTATION OF PROGRAMS DESIGNED TO EDUCATE AND ASSIST THE COMMUNITY IN MEASURES NECESSARY TO EITHER REDUCE OR REMOVE THE CRIMINAL'S OPPORTUNITY, THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT HAS REACHED HOMEOWNERS, BUSINESSMEN, AND THE CIVIC LEADERS SO THAT THEY MAY LEARN HOW TO PROTECT THEMSELVES FROM THE CRIMINAL ELEMENT.

OUR PRIMARY PROGRAM, "OPERATION IDENTIFICATION," EXPANDED GREATLY IN 1973. A TOTAL OF 8,710 RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS WERE ENROLLED, SHOWING A SIGNIFICANT REDUCTION IN BURGLARIES TO THESE PARTICULAR PREMISES. CONSIDERING THE 7% BURGLARY RATE IN ST. PAUL, THE OPERATION IDENTIFICATION ENROLLEES ONLY EXPERIENCED A .51% RATE.

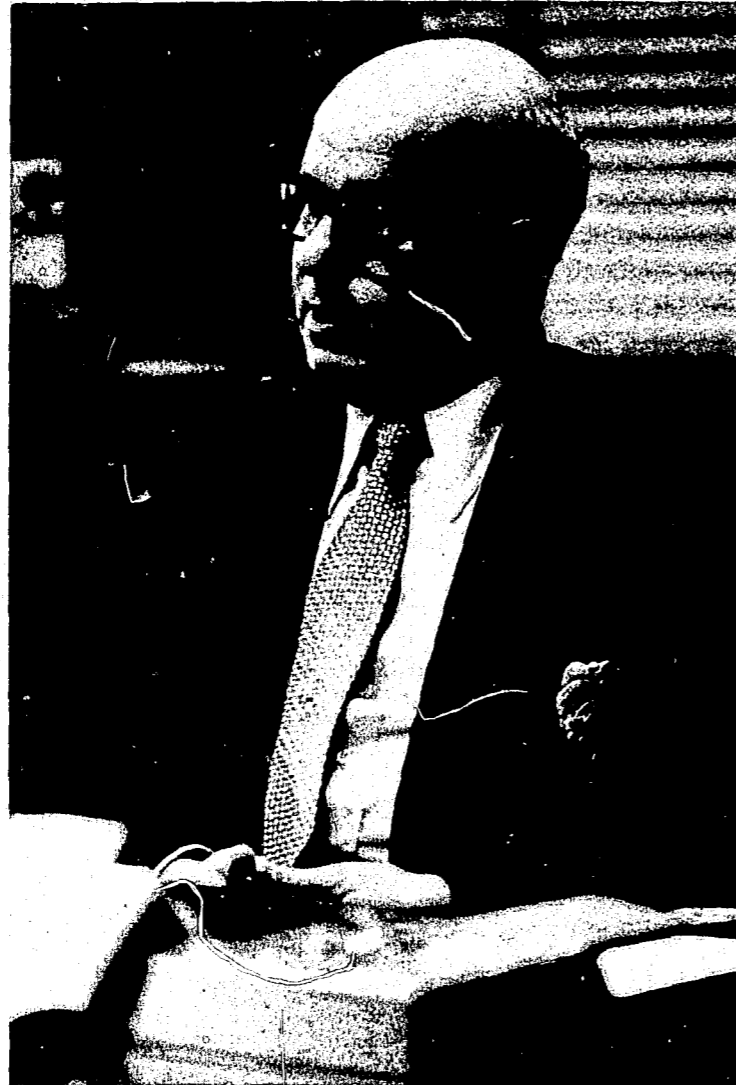
PREMISE SURVEYS, EITHER AS A FOLLOW-UP OR ON A REQUEST BASIS, WERE PROVIDED AS AN ATTEMPT TO REDUCE THE POSSIBILITY OF A HOME OR BUSINESS BEING RE-BURGLARIZED. SEVEN HUNDRED AND SIXTY OF THESE SECURITY CHECKS WERE ACCOMPLISHED, REFLECTING THE OPINIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE OFFICER, ON THE SECURITY OF THE PREMISE INSPECTED.

THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT, SINCE ITS FORMATION IN MID-AUGUST OF 1973, IS IN A CONTINUAL PROCESS OF PRESENTING THE GENERAL PUBLIC WITH THE CONCEPT OF CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT. PROGRAMS TO ALERT THE CITIZEN OF CRIME-PRONE SITUATIONS ARE IN THE MAKING.

THE MEMBERS OF THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT DEVELOP AND MAINTAIN AN UNDERSTANDING OF THE LATEST SECURITY HARDWARE, ALARM SYSTEMS, LOCKS, SAFES AND RELATED ITEMS IN ORDER TO SERVE AS A RESOURCE TO THE DEPARTMENT AND THE COMMUNITY. INFORMING THE PUBLIC THROUGH SPEAKING TO VARIOUS GROUPS HAS BECOME A SIGNIFICANT FACTOR IN PERSONAL CONTACT WITH THE CITIZEN.

THE DEPARTMENT OF POLICE CAN FUNCTION EFFECTIVELY ONLY WHEN IT HAS THE ASSISTANCE OF THOSE IT SERVES. WHEN CONCERNED CITIZENS SHOW EXCEPTIONAL COOPERATION IN ASSISTING THE DEPARTMENT, AN OFFICER MAY REQUEST THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT TO FORWARD A CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION TO THAT INDIVIDUAL. MANY CERTIFICATES HAVE BEEN AWARDED AS AN EXAMPLE OF WHAT CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED THROUGH CITIZEN PARTICIPATION.

INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

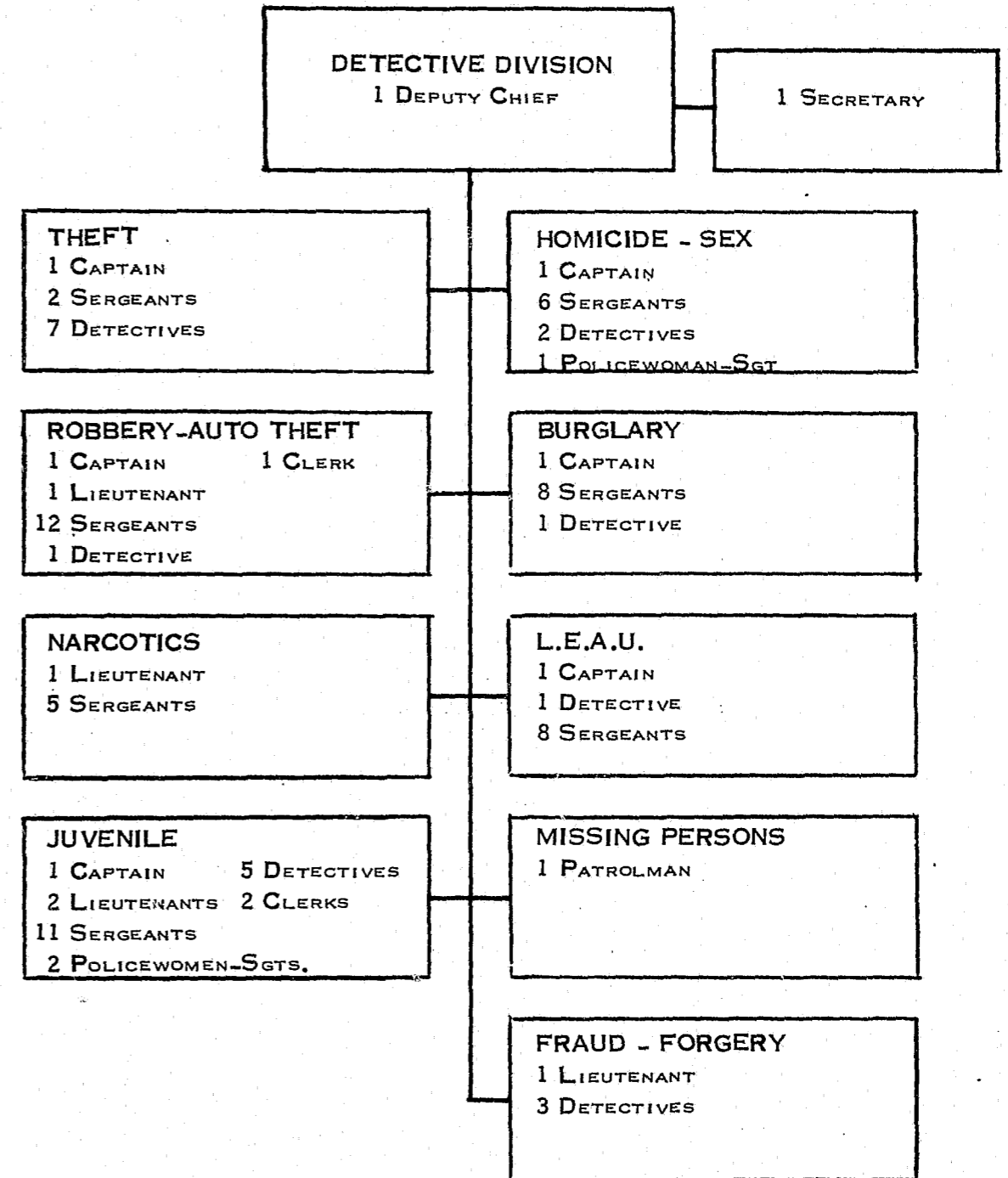

THE TEN UNITS OF THE INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION ARE STAFFED WITH 93 SWORN PERSONNEL. THESE OFFICERS HAVE THE RESPONSIBILITY TO INVESTIGATE REPORTED CRIMINAL ACTIVITY, INTERVIEW SUSPECTS AND WITNESSES, PREPARE CASES FOR COURT, PREPARE AND EXECUTE SEARCH WARRANTS, AND APPEAR AS WITNESSES IN TRIALS OF INDIVIDUALS CHARGED WITH CRIMES WHICH THE UNITS HAVE INVESTIGATED.

IN 1973, BURGLARY CONTINUED TO BE THE FASTEST GROWING CRIMINAL ACTIVITY. DEPARTMENTAL EFFORTS TO EDUCATE AND ASSIST OUR CITIZENS IN CRIME PREVENTION EFFORTS HAVE BEGUN TO TAKE SHAPE WITH THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT. CASE CLEARANCE LEVELS REMAINED STABLE IN THE FACE OF DIMINISHING MANPOWER. THE VACANCIES IN THE INVESTIGATIVE UNITS WILL, HOPEFULLY, BE FILLED WHEN PATROLMAN TESTS ARE HELD IN 1974.

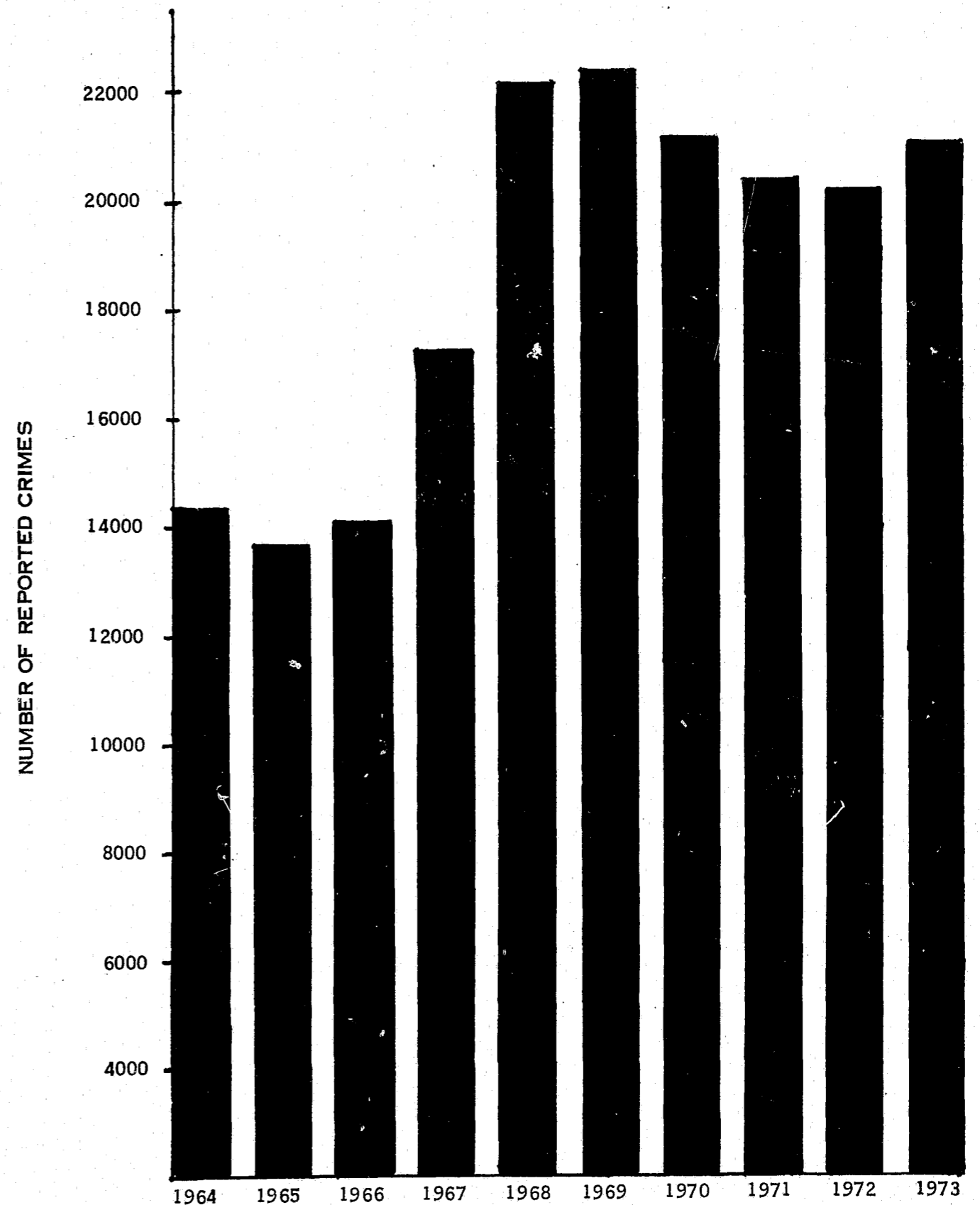

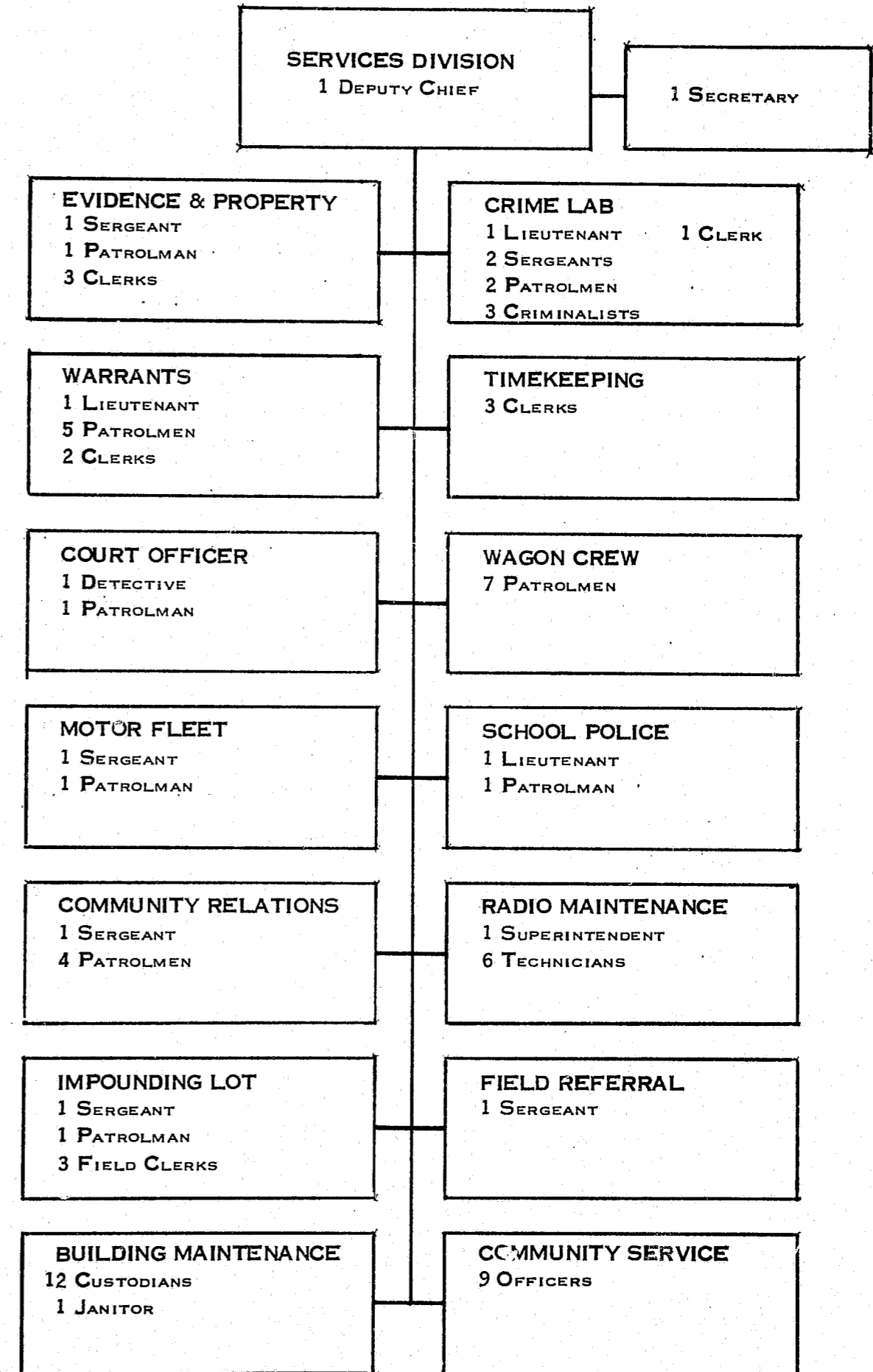

THE FOURTEEN UNITS OF THE SERVICES DIVISION ARE STAFFED WITH THIRTY-FIVE SWORN AND FORTY-FIVE NON-SWORN PERSONNEL. THIS DIVISION'S FUNCTION IS TO PROVIDE THE NECESSARY SERVICES TO ASSIST THE INVESTIGATIVE AND PATROL DIVISIONS.

BUILDING, MOTOR FLEET, AND RADIO COMMUNICATIONS MAINTENANCE ARE SOME RESPONSIBILITIES OF THIS DIVISION. OTHER SERVICES ARE THE CONTROL OF EVIDENCE AND DEPARTMENT PROPERTY, THE CRIME LABORATORY AND THE IMPOUNDING LOT. RADIO MAINTENANCE, WARRANT, AND JAIL FACILITIES ARE ALSO PROVIDED FOR SUBURBAN POLICE AGENCIES.

IN 1973, THE FIELD REFERRAL UNIT DEALT WITH MORE THAN 3,500 ACTIVITIES. THE WARRANT UNIT SERVED OVER 12,000 WARRANTS AND OVER 8,000 SUBPOENAS, AMOUNTING TO A 4% INCREASE OVER 1972. THE COMMUNITY RELATIONS UNIT BENEFITTED FROM RESOURCES PROVIDED BY COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICERS. THE REMODELLING AND UPGRADING OF THE CRIME LAB WAS BEGUN, WITH FUTURE PLANS FOR SERVICING A REGIONAL AREA.

THE RADIO MAINTENANCE UNIT PROVIDES TWENTY-FOUR HOUR, SEVEN DAY A WEEK SERVICE FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF POLICE, DEPARTMENT OF FIRE, DIVISION OF PARKS MAINTENANCE, DRIVER EDUCATION, DIVISION OF AIR POLLUTION CONTROL, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (TRAFFIC CONTROL), LIGHTING BUREAU, DIVISION OF LIBRARIES AND RAMSEY COUNTY SHERIFF. THE FOLLOWING IS A BREAKDOWN OF THE SERVICE CALLS MADE BY THE RADIO MAINTENANCE UNIT.
