MESSAGE FROM THE SHERIFF

1992 has been an extremely demanding year for all.

In April, tensions rose and exploded in Los Angeles and members of our Department

came together to quell the largest civil disturbance in our nation's history. Our Department also came under close scrutiny by the Kolts Committee, who participated in ride-alongs, interviewed personnel, and inspected documents and facilities. In the face of a staggering level of violence in our community, we faced a major budgetary crisis which resulted in curtailments of some of our programs and the dislocation of many of our personnel.

In spite of all the adversity and criticism, our most precious resource—the members of our Department—displayed the highest level of professionalism and dedication to successfully see us through 1992. We can all take pride in our accomplishments that have been recognized and appreciated by the communities we serve.

I am confident that the members of our Department will meet the challenges of 1993 with the same professionalism, pride, and "tradition of service."

SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT HISTORY

1992 will be remembered as a year of paradox for the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Heroic acts shared the spotlight with internal investigations and news of growth accompanied predictions of cutbacks. However, if recorded history is a representation of major events occurring within an entity, then 1992 will stand out as a year of triumph, as a year of tragedy.

Civil Unrest

On April 29th, the "Rodney King" verdicts were announced and the so-called L.A. Riots began. The Department's emergency operations plans were immediately implemented. Assistance was provided to the cities of Los Angeles, Culver City, South Gate, Pasadena, Long Beach, and Compton, and personnel strength was promptly enhanced at Sheriff's stations within the affected and peripheral areas. Within 36 hours, the most costly riot in U.S. history, in terms of lives and property, was quelled.

Kolts Committee

In December of 1991, retired Judge James G. Kolts was appointed as Special Counsel for the purpose of reviewing policies, practices, and procedures of the Sheriff's Department. The results of the Kolts staff's review were published in July, 1992, in a 359-page report. The Sheriff's Department analyzed each of the 180 Kolts recommendations and released a 300-page response in October, 1992. The Department agreed with all but 24 of the recommendations and actually had implemented or was in the process of implementing 111 of the recommendations prior to the release of the Kolts report. Although the Kolts staff made many appropriate recommendations, it was deeply disappointing that their inquiry took place during a major flood, the murders of two deputies, and the worst urban riot in U.S. history, with absolutely no mention of the extraordinary work and sacrifice of the members of our Department.

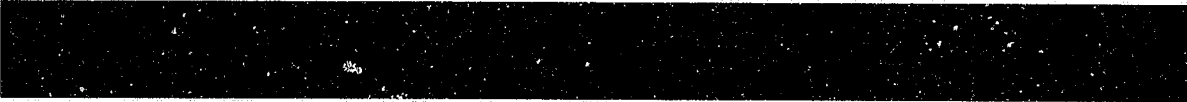
Service-Oriented Policing (SOP)

Television

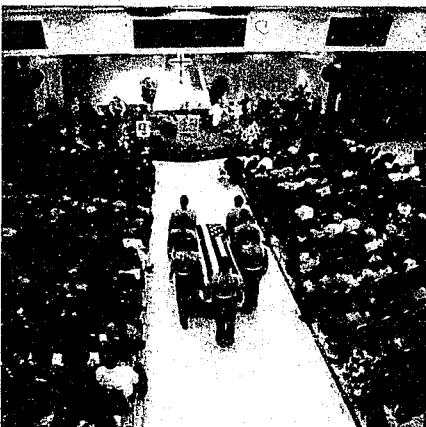
In 1992, filmmakers and television producers throughout the world continued to seek the permission of the Sheriff's Department to film deputies in the performance of their duty. Even when the good work of deputies was only secondary to the story, members of this Department made many contributions to national television news magazine shows.

Budget Challenge

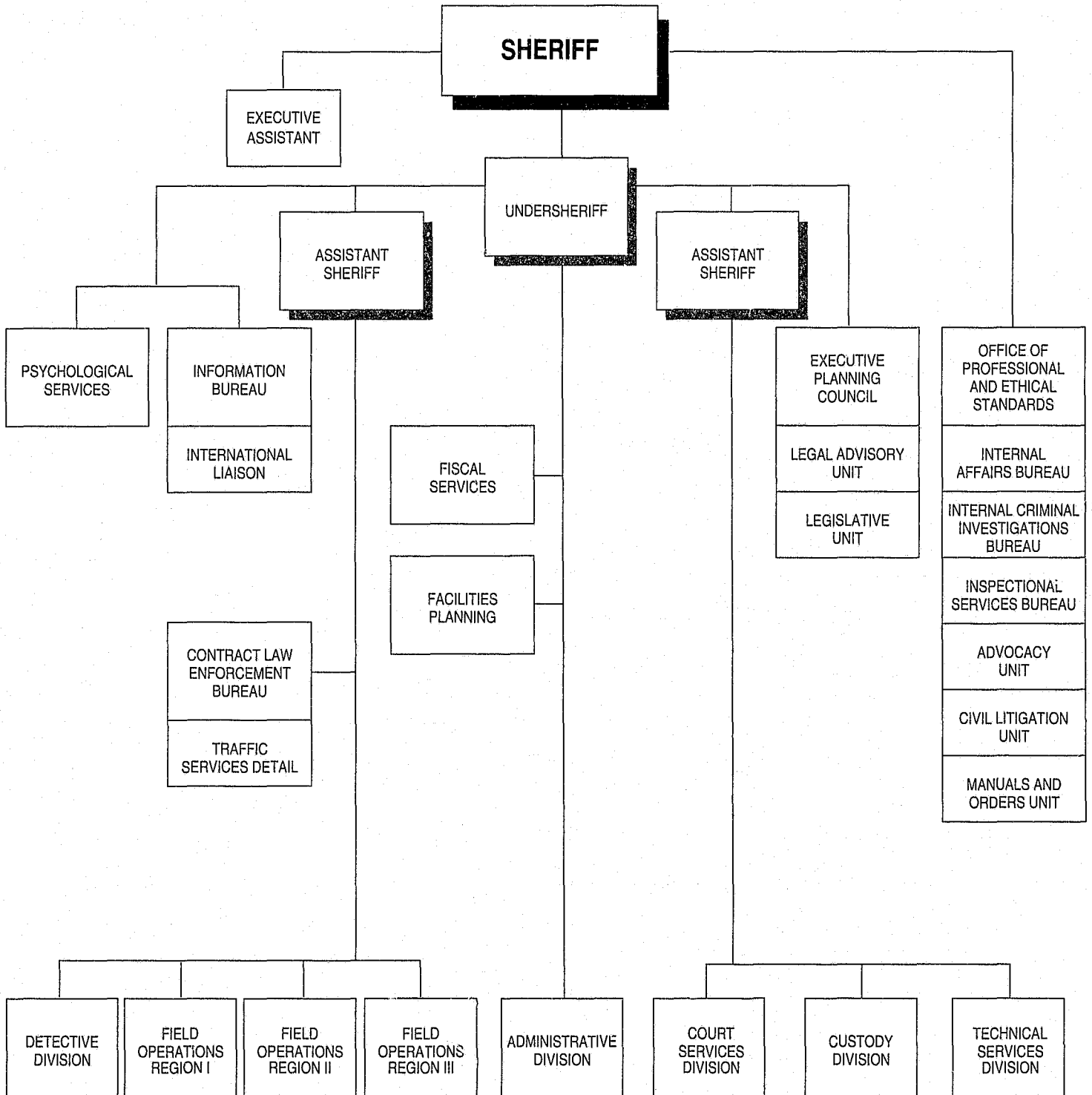
As 1992 came to a close, the Department's total number of personnel was lower than it was when the year began. Fortunately, it was due to attrition and not layoffs. The major changes included re-routing command and control of several stations, thinning out elite investigative and operational units, halting recruitment, delaying promotions, and closing down older custody facilities.

Fallen Heroes

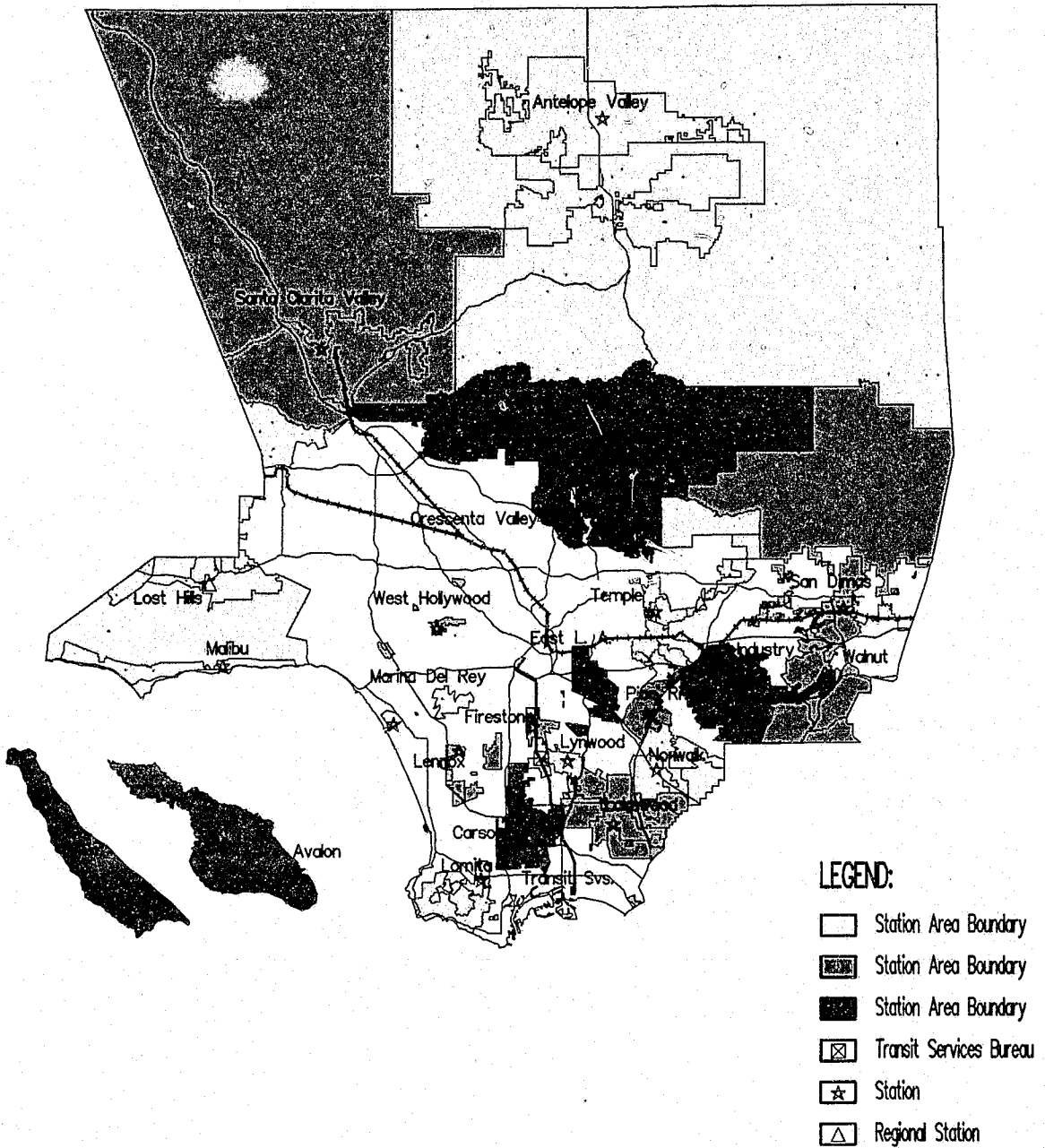
Twice this year deputies were killed in the line of duty. In March, Deputy Nelson Yamamoto exchanged gunfire with a multiple murder suspect. Nelson was critically wounded and died at the hospital two days later. The suspect eluded capture but was later shot and killed by New York State Troopers. In mid-May, Deputy Richard Hammack, working undercover, was mortally wounded during a gun battle with a parolee/drug dealer. The suspect died at the scene after being shot by assisting deputies.

PATROL AREA BOUNDARIES

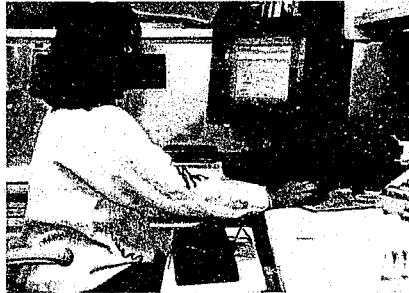

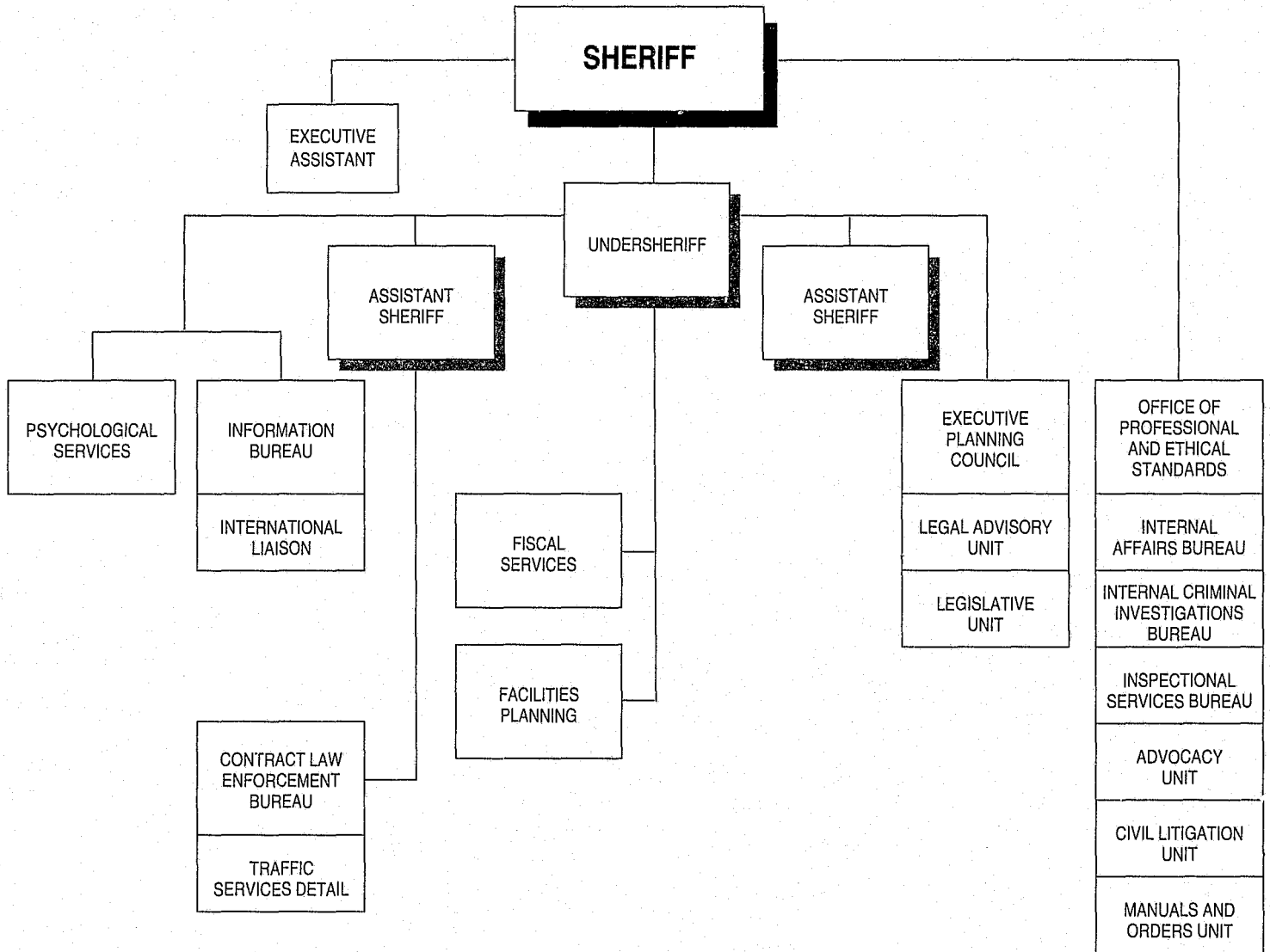

EXECUTIVE OFFICES

Executive Offices is comprised of the Office of the Sheriff, Office of the Undersheriff, and Office of the Assistant Sheriffs. Responsibilities for the Office of the Sheriff include the Office of Professional and Ethical Standards which includes Internal Affairs Bureau, Internal Criminal Investigations Bureau, and Inspectional Services Bureau. Responsibilities for the Office of the Undersheriff include Psychological Services, the Executive Planning Council, Fiscal Services, Facilities Planning, and Sheriff's Information Bureau. Responsibilities for the Office of the Assistant Sheriffs include the functions assigned to the Executive Offices Commander - Contract Law Enforcement Bureau.

Contract Law Enforcement Bureau

Contract Law Enforcement Bureau administers the Department's contractual Law Enforcement Program. The Contract Law Enforcement Program is a coordinated, well-managed, and cost efficient program designed to equally benefit those municipalities that choose to contract for Sheriff's law enforcement services. Forty-two incorporated cities with a population of over 1.5 million people are served through the contract program. Contractual law enforcement services are also being provided for the Metro Blue Line, the first operational light rail system in Los Angeles County. In October, the newest phase of commuter rail system, Metrolink, entered into a contract for law enforcement security service for passengers on this latest rail system. The Bureau's duties include monitoring all contracts to ensure proper levels of service are provided, performing cost analysis studies, and providing reports for government agencies that request information concerning contract services.

Roadside Sobriety Checkpoint Project: During the 12 months ending in September, this grant provided resources to conduct a total of 54 roadside sobriety checkpoints, utilizing fully mobile/self-contained checkpoint trailers and hand-held preliminary alcohol screening (PAS) devices. For economic reasons, 68 reserve deputy Sheriffs were trained to conduct checkpoints. Without their participation, this program would not have been as successful. Although the project has expired, the Department still retains the equipment trailers for use by all contract cities.

Facilities Planning Services

Facilities Planning Services is responsible for processing Department Capital Project requests; initiating authorizations for work performed by Internal Services Department (ISD) including Information Technology Services (ITS), Project Management, Inspection Services, and Facilities Operations Services (FOS); authorizing and monitoring/verifying of Capital Project expenditures; procurement activities; preparing documents for program/design efforts to define the scope of the work, and acting as liaison between the Department, contracted consultants, State Board of Corrections, and ISD.

There are two units in Facilities Planning Services: Project Management and Administration/Finance/Material Management.

Facilities Planning manages 28 Capital Projects and 20 Superior and Municipal Court projects. The budgets for the Sheriff's controlled projects total more than \$680.2 million including the Lynwood Regional Justice Center, with a budget of \$194 million, and the Central Jail Expansion Project (Twin Towers), with a projected cost of \$373.4 million.

Fiscal Services

Fiscal Services is responsible for a wide variety of fiscal operations including preparation of the yearly budget, conducting cost studies, monitoring unit expenditures, preparing recommendations based on fiscal analysis, reviewing fiscal legislation, and providing a liaison with other County departments and outside agencies. Among the sections in Fiscal Services are:

Accounting - General Accounting Operations (Expenditure Management): This Section maintains all budgetary accounting records and certain specialized accounting records for the Department. Responsibilities include: processing Departmental invoice billings for services provided by other County departments; reconciliation of Departmental expenditures with Countywide Accounting and Purchasing System (CAPS); and for remitting payment for evidence collection charges.

Accounts Payable Unit: This Unit maintains all budgetary accounting records and certain specialized accounting records for the Department. They are the payment processing unit, and are responsible for on-line payment processing of expenditure data resulting in the automatic issuance of warrants.

Travel and Training Unit: The Travel and Training Unit is responsible for processing expenditure claims for all Departmentally approved travel and training.

Special Fund Accounting Unit: This Unit maintains and controls the financial records related to the following funds: Inmate Welfare, Jail Stores, Automated Fingerprint Informational System, Financial Administration of Grants, Narcotic Forfeiture Fund, and Automated Countywide Warrant System.

Special and Cost Accounting (Revenue Management): This Section maintains accounting records for all billings, revenues, collections, special appropriations, other cash funds, and bank accounts. Responsibilities include: reconciling Departmental revenue collections; processing and accounting for all cash collections; maintaining detailed trust account ledgers; and processing billings for services provided to other agencies.

Central Supply: This Section issues supplies to all Department units. Responsibilities include: control of warehouse inventory, maintenance of stock at predetermined levels, conducting yearly inventory of all stock items, and advising the Uniform and Safety Equipment Committee on matters of uniforms and safety equipment.

Facilities Management: This Section coordinates the Department's building maintenance program. It has five separate regions which are; Headquarters, Central, North County (Pitchess Honor Rancho), Stations and Special Services (located at the Sheriff's Training Academy and Regional Services Center), and Power Plants. Responsibilities include: capital project development in conjunction with Facilities Planning Services as well as coordinating facility modification and new construction; and performing space utilization studies.

Facilities Upkeep: This Section interfaces and coordinates the use of inmates to perform custodial services and landscape maintenance at the Hall of Justice and Sheriff's Training Academy and Regional Services (STARS) Center. Additionally, painting and carpet laying at Sheriff's facilities are coordinated by this unit.

Budget and Staff Section: The Budget Section, in cooperation with divisional budget staff, prepares the Sheriff's Department's general and special fund budget requests which are submitted annually to the County's Chief Administrative Officer.

Internal Audit Unit: This Unit was established in July 1990, for the purpose of assuring management Departmental financial activities are being made in compliance with Government Codes, County Fiscal Manual, Departmental Manual of Policies and Procedures, and generally accepted accounting principles. The Audit Unit's main objective is to identify weaknesses and recommend practical corrective actions.

Fiscal Automation: This section analyzes, designs, develops, tests, and maintains central database application/equipment and trains the end-users in the use of the applications.

LASO Foundation

The LASO (Los Angeles Sheriff's Office) Foundation is a non-profit, public benefit corporation created in 1988. The Foundation is a vehicle through which worthy Sheriff's Department projects and

programs, for which there is insufficient public funding, can be supported. This support takes the form of management expertise, capital goods, and professional services delivered to the Sheriff through a totally private sector board of directors who are business and community leaders.

Two of the Foundation's most critical projects for 1992 were the creation of the Automated Commercial Crimes Information System (ACCIS) and the Core Values Project. Core Values is both a philosophy and a strategic plan which will result in the internalization of core beliefs and attitudes, ultimately resulting in improved practices making the Department a more effective and responsive policing agency. Information on the ACCIS system can be found in the highlighted units under Commercial Crimes Bureau (see page 64).

Legal Advisory Unit

Assigned to the Executive Planning Council, Office of the Undersheriff, this Unit is responsible for providing legal services to the Department. The Unit is staffed by Departmental personnel and Deputy County Counsels assigned to the Department. Functions of this Unit include: serving as Department liaison and providing coordination with County Counsel, interpreting and defining the impact of newly passed legislation on Department operations, responding to Department telephonic requests for legal assistance pertaining to law enforcement problems encountered in day-to-day operations, conducting research projects which address Department questions on a variety of law enforcement operations, maintaining a legal library for use by Department personnel, and assisting in the instruction of sworn personnel at Advanced Officer Training programs and Cadet Training courses.

Psychological Services

Psychological Services provides confidential counseling and emergency assistance to all Department employees, their spouses, and significant others. These services totaled over 1,000 new clients during 1992. Services were offered at the Downtown office as well as the La Mirada and Palmdale satellites.

The Unit continued its commitment to training by presenting over 30 different lectures as part of Advanced Officer Training, Recruit Training, and Unit level in-service programs. In response to recent events, the Unit produced and distributed a variety of training materials including: booklets on "Wellness in Law Enforcement," "Avoiding Unnecessary or Unreasonable Force," and "Grief Survival."

Psychological Services also participated in the Department's response to the Christopher and Kolts Commissions' reports, including development of a pilot project of on-site consultation to supervisors.

Sheriff's Information Bureau

Sheriff's Information Bureau is primarily responsible for maintaining the Department's operations log and disseminating information and news to the general public, members of the Department, and the news media. The Bureau is also responsible for evaluating proposed Department public relations programs. Bureau response is performed through the operation of a 24-hour command information center, by program evaluation and development, by continuing liaison with the press and community, and by responding to telephonic and written inquiries.

Peace Officers' Memorial Ceremony

On May 12, 1992, the Twenty-Third Annual Los Angeles County Peace Officers' Memorial Ceremony took place at the Sheriff's Training Academy and Regional Services (STARS) Center. Plaques displaying the names of the three Los Angeles County peace officers killed since May of 1991 were

Office of Professional and Ethical Standards

The Office of Professional and Ethical Standards (OPES) is comprised of the Internal Affairs Bureau, the Internal Criminal Investigations Bureau, the Inspectional Services Bureau, the Advocacy Unit, and the Civil Litigation Unit. The services of OPES are coordinated through the OPES Headquarters Unit which is comprised of an Operations Staff, Technical Crew, and Manuals and Orders Unit.

There were two organizational changes in OPES during 1992: the Advocacy Unit, which represents the Department at Civil Service Commission and Employee Relations Commission hearings, moved to OPES from Administrative Division, and the Civil Litigation Unit (CLU) was separated from the Internal Affairs Bureau.



Civil Litigation Unit

The Civil Litigation Unit was established as a separate entity for several reasons, among which are Department's emphasis on the Unit's risk management function and an expansion of its responsibilities. The Civil Litigation Unit assumed a more proactive role in claims and lawsuit management, and its personnel are prepared to respond on a 24-hour-a-day basis to incidents having the potential for high cost litigation. The Unit works closely with County Counsel to process discovery motions, civil claims, and lawsuits.



Inspectional Services Bureau

The Inspectional Services Bureau conducts inspections, audits, and analysis to assess quality control and adherence to standards and policy. The Bureau also coordinates the Department's Random Drug Testing Program.

During 1992, Inspectional Services conducted 75 inspections of Department units in the areas of manuals and orders, timekeeping, property and evidence procedures, Injury and Illness Prevention Program, Internal Control Certification Program, and bonus selection procedures.

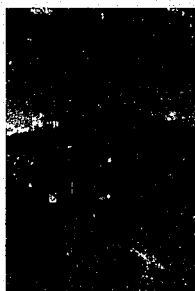
Internal Affairs Bureau

The Internal Affairs Bureau is responsible for investigating allegations of administrative misconduct involving both civilian and sworn Department employees. The IAB Officer-Involved Shooting (OIS) Team is responsible for evaluating shootings in terms of tactics procedures and policy. The IAB Force Investigation Team (FIT) is responsible for reviewing any use of force that results in the hospitalization of a suspect beyond emergency room care. These reviews also address potential civil litigation issues through immediate fact-finding and witness identification.

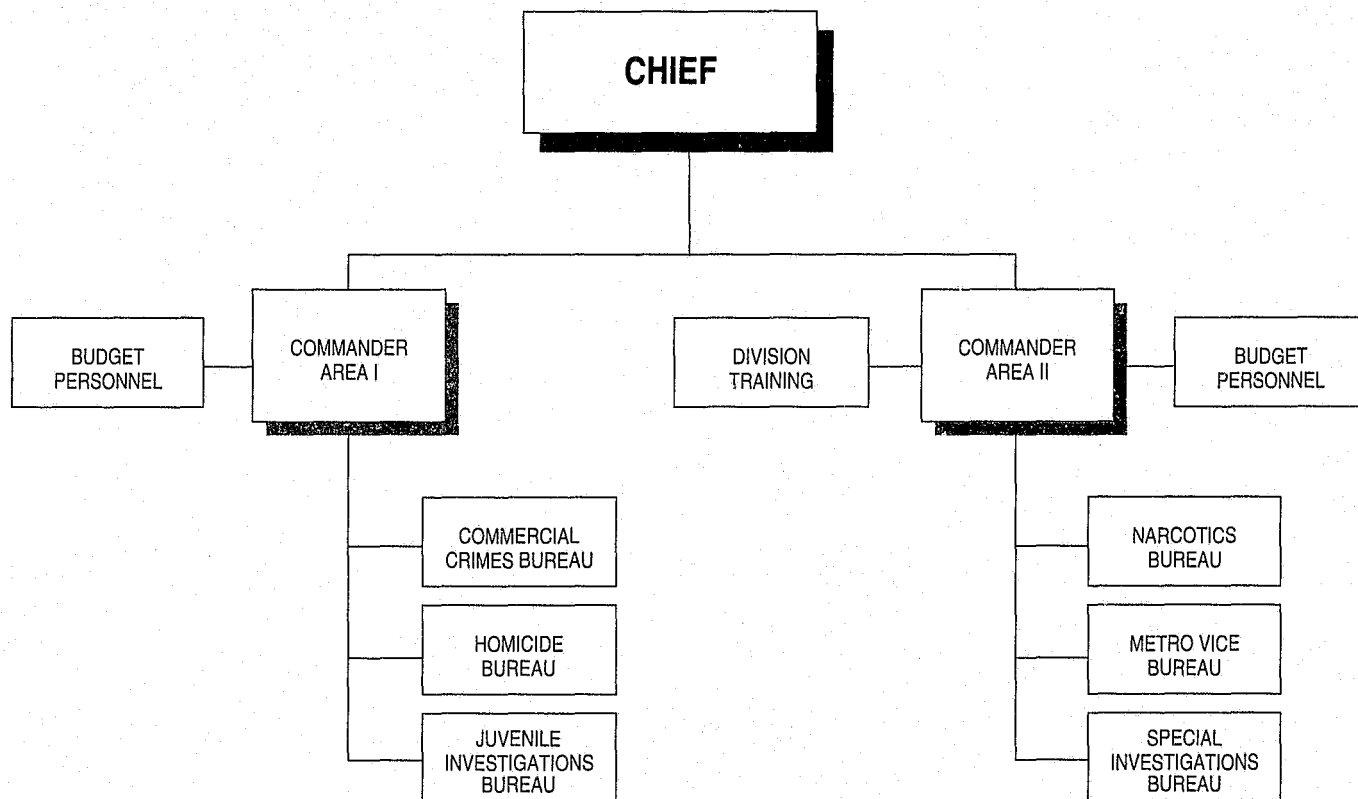
Internal Criminal Investigations Bureau

The Internal Criminal Investigations Bureau (ICIB) investigates allegations of criminal misconduct involving members of this Department when the alleged offense occurred during the course of their employment, or within the policing jurisdiction of the Sheriff's Department. The Bureau is also responsible for investigating allegations of theft or misappropriation of County funds, or equipment, involving employees of other County agencies.

This Division is responsible for the investigation of crimes, identification and apprehension of criminals, recovery of property, identification and preservation of evidence, and for assisting in the preparation of cases for court. Detective Division consists of Commercial Crimes, Homicide, Juvenile Investigations, Metro Vice, Narcotics, and Special Investigations Bureaus.

Commercial Crimes Bureau

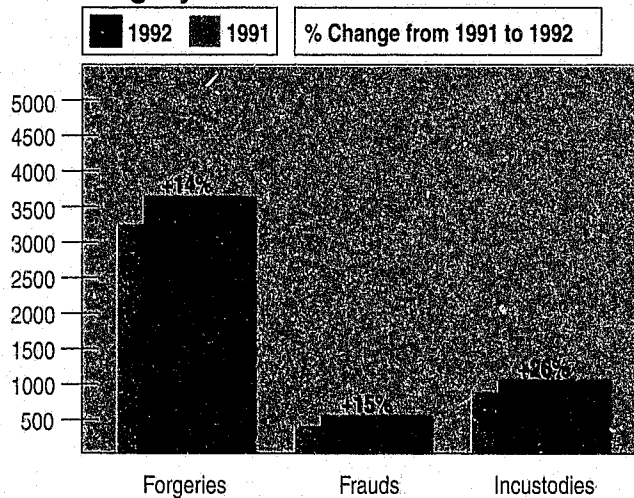

Commercial Crimes Bureau is the highlighted unit for Detective Division (see page 64).

Between 1988 and 1992, the total caseload increased from 1,958 cases to 4,202 cases, a rise of 115%. Incustodies for that same period rose from 538 to 1,028, a 91% increase.

Homicide Bureau



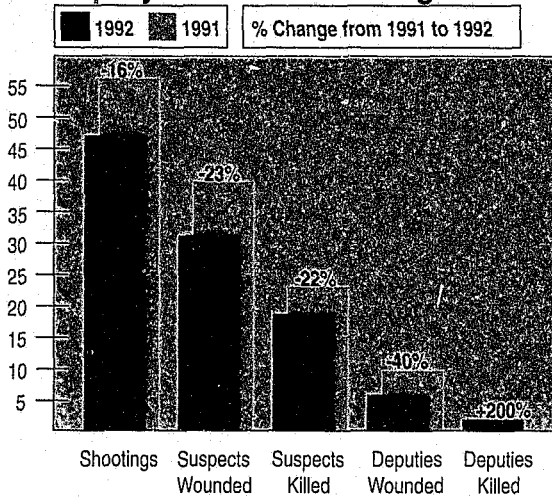

The Homicide Bureau conducts investigations into all homicides and questionable deaths which occur within the Sheriff's jurisdiction. The questionable deaths include suicides, accidental deaths, drug overdoses and infant deaths.

The Bureau is comprised of a Missing Persons Unit, an Unsolved Unit, and a Foreign Prosecution Unit. The Foreign Prosecution Unit coordinates the prosecution of foreign nationals who have committed violent crimes within our jurisdiction and fled to their homelands.

In sharp contrast to the two previous years, the number of homicide investigations rose only slightly in 1992. Of those investigations, approximately 20% were conducted at the request of independent police agencies throughout the County who ask the Bureau to investigate homicides and officer involved shootings that occur within their jurisdictions.

Deputy-Involved Shootings



The Bureau also conducts criminal investigations of all deputy involved shootings in which someone is injured or killed. Unfortunately, two of these investigations during 1992 centered around the murder of Deputy Sheriffs.

The first of these incidents occurred on March 29, when Firestone Station Patrol Deputy Nelson Yamamoto was shot while investigating a disturbance call. The shooter and a companion escaped. A massive manhunt ensued and one suspect was arrested. The primary suspect was finally located in New York State and killed in a shoot out with New York State Police.

The second incident occurred on May 11, when Deputy Richard Hammack was killed during the service of a narcotic search warrant. The suspect was also shot and killed during the incident and a companion taken into custody.

These were just two of the hundreds of tragic cases handled and investigated by the Homicide Bureau in 1992.

Juvenile Investigations Bureau

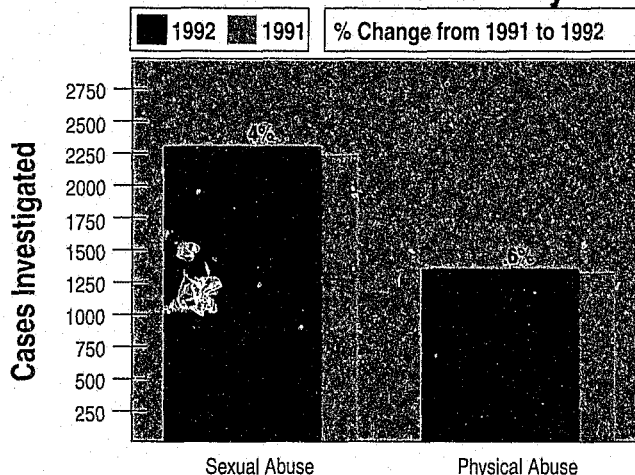
The year 1992 saw a significant reorganization within the Juvenile Investigations Bureau (JIB) which resulted in a prioritization of functions and resources. The investigation of child sexual and physical abuse is the main focus of JIB. The Bureau continues to collate statistical information on diversions, provides extensive legislative analysis to the Department, and monitors a major Office of Criminal Justice and Planning (OCJP) grant regarding community-based diversion organizations.

As a Detective Division unit, JIB serves all station areas and has the exclusive responsibility for these investigations. In the attempt to be as responsive as possible five geographic investigative teams were established.

The investigation of child abuse cases is highly specialized. Investigators assigned to JIB are recognized experts in interviewing child victims, as well as juvenile and adult suspects. Additionally, JIB personnel participate in a number of multi-disciplinary child abuse centers, located throughout Los Angeles County.

Bureau personnel are available to conduct in-service training to assist patrol personnel carry out their responsibility as first reporters in cases of suspected child abuse.

Metro Vice Bureau

Metro Vice Bureau experienced another significant reorganization in July, due to the 1992/93 budget curtailments. The Bureau absorbed close to a \$4,000,000 budget reduction through attrition, i.e., retirements and normal transfers, as well as the participation of 40 Bureau personnel in the Temporary Overtime Reduction Assignments (TORA) program. The reorganization impact forced a critical evaluation process and re-prioritization which resulted in the following:

Vice Detail: The Detail's primary enforcement effort focuses on street prostitution, the most visible vice activity impacting the communities of Los Angeles County. Due to the 1992/93 curtailments, the following were either disbanded or eliminated:

- The individual Morals and Bookmaking Details were eliminated. The remaining personnel were combined to form a Vice Section.
- The Redlight Abatement Team, which employed the civil process to abate chronic vice operations, i.e., massage parlors, adult video arcades, etc., was disbanded.
- The Special Projects and Enforcement Team, which addresses special problems, i.e., major outcall operations, etc., was also disbanded.

Metro Detail: The Metro Detail has been reorganized into two teams of one sergeant each and twelve to ten deputies respectively (24 personnel). The Detail continues to place emphasis on the apprehension of fugitives while at the same time handling investigations of kidnapping/extortions for ransom, solicitations to commit murder, pattern and series robberies, specific assault weapon possession violations, and threats to Department employees and government officials.

During 1992, Metro Detail executed 234 extraditions, processed 754 rendition requests, and received 14,307 new Countywide Warrant System (CWS) warrants, bringing the total to 40,524 warrants assigned to Metro Detail.

Pawns and License Detail: This year, the Detail experienced a decrease in licensing activity while pawn transactions experienced a significant increase, reflecting the economic atmosphere of Los Angeles County. In addition, a major fraud investigation involving Detail personnel and the State Attorney General's Office revealed a suspect had fraudulently solicited in excess of \$260,000 from unsuspecting citizens through a purported charitable organization he managed.

Narcotics Bureau

Narcotics Bureau is responsible for the investigation of cases involving the use, possession, sale, manufacture, and transportation of controlled substances. Other responsibilities include disposal of controlled substances, providing specialized training in controlled substances, directing all financial and asset seizures/forfeitures relative to narcotic activities, public appearances, liaison with Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Commission, and participating in "narcotics task forces." The following are highlights of Bureau activities for this year.

The California National Guard assigned a military liaison officer to the Narcotics Bureau for the loan and utilization of military resources in drug interdiction operations. Another noteworthy program was Bureau participation in Operation Alliance, a Federal and State drug task force, which coordinated drug interdiction operations along the Southwest Border.

Some of the more notable narcotics crew seizures involved the East Los Angeles Station Narcotics Crew which made significant seizures during the year including 150 pounds of cocaine, 10 pounds of tar heroin, and 145 pounds of marijuana. The Lakewood Station Crew seized approximately 660 pounds of cocaine from one residence, which was a major distribution point between Mexico and Southern California.

In June, members of the Headquarters Narcotics Teams, assisted by ten law enforcement agencies, served 75 search warrants throughout Southern California. This was the largest search warrant oper-

ation and one of the most complex cases ever filed with the District Attorney's Office in recent history. The success of this operation led to the dismantling of one of the major cocaine distribution and money laundering organizations in Southern California.

Special Investigations Bureau

Special Investigations Bureau is responsible for investigations relating to criminal activities of organized crime, prison gangs, terrorists groups, and gaming and white collar crime.

Gaming and White Collar Crime Unit: This Unit investigate and monitor businesses, organizations, and crimes related to card cheating, skimmming, loansharking, money laundering, extortions, follow-home robberies, bookmaking, gambling, narcotics, cheating (bingo operations), race fixing, and slot machine operations. Additionally, the Unit is called upon to teach and give expert testimony in all aspects of gambling.

Operations Section: Operations is the Department's representative to INTERPOL and maintains a close working relationship with the California Department of Justice. They also have direct access to many public data resources.

Organized Crime Section: The Section is composed of Traditional and Asian Organized Crime Units. Examples of organizations and businesses monitored include: adult video industry; motion picture, recording, and entertainment industries; migration of East Coast and Sicilian organized crime figures to Southern California; and prolific emergence of Asian and Russian organized crime in Southern California. Members of this section also provide in-service training on Asian organized crime and gangs.

Prison Gang Section: This Section dedicates its resources to the suppression of criminal activities committed by prison and outlaw motorcycle gang members and their associates. Prison gang investigators provide the following services: furnish pertinent intelligence information on prison gang and outlaw biker-related crime; provide training in recognizing and identifying prison gang members and their associates; and conduct a full range of enforcement activities to include mobile surveillances, parole searches, search warrants, arrests, etc.

Special Investigations Section: Investigators assigned to this Section are responsible for monitoring groups ranging from international and domestic terrorism to special interest groups that become involved in criminal activity. Section investigators also provide in-service training on hate crimes, terrorism, and white supremacy groups. This Section is currently participating in the Riot-Related Task Force which includes personnel from the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Bureau, the Federal Bureau of Investigations, Long Beach, Los Angeles and Compton Police Departments, California Department of Justice, and an Assistant United States Attorney from Chicago.

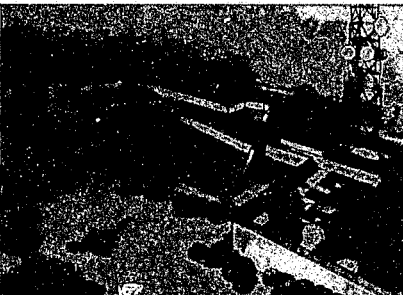
Detective Division Headquarters - Big Spender Task Force

The "Big Spender" task force was created in 1989, to investigate allegations of corruption within the Sheriff's Department's Narcotics Bureau. The task force operates under the auspices of the Federal Grand Jury and includes the United States Attorney and investigators from the Sheriff's Department, the FBI, and the IRS. In the spirit of "cleaning our own house," the Sheriff's Department has assumed the bulk of the workload.

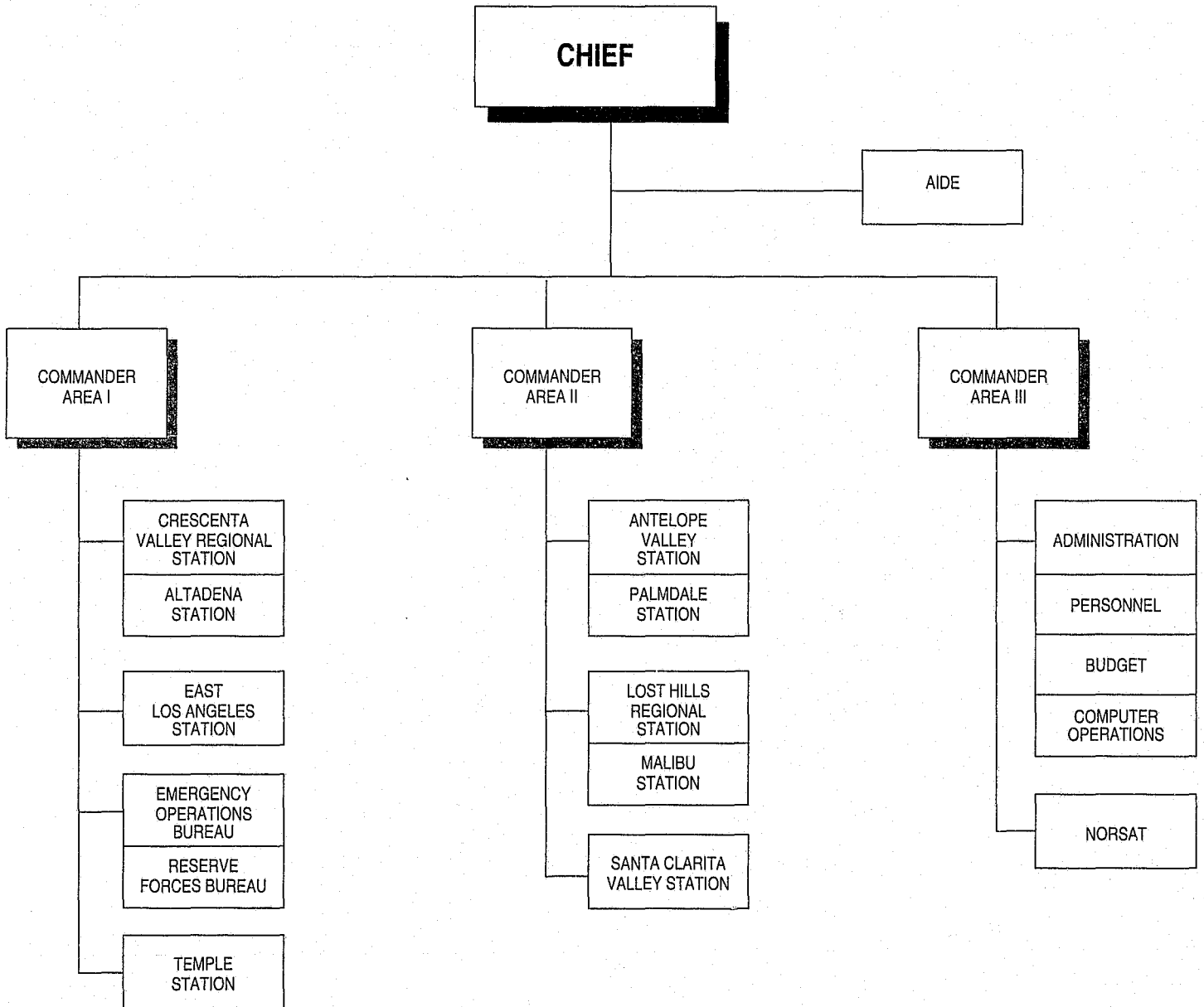
Currently, the investigation resulted in Federal Grand Jury indictments of 21 sworn personnel for various charges including theft, conspiracy, money laundering, structuring, tax evasion, obstruction of justice, perjury, and conspiracy to sell illegal drugs. Federal juries convicted 14 deputies and seven others await trial. Two additional deputies await trial in State Court for one count each of grand theft money. The investigation is continuing.

It should be noted the above statistics represent a very small percentage of our Narcotics Bureau personnel and should not reflect on the honest, hard working majority of Narcotics deputies who day in and day out do an excellent job.

FIELD OPERATIONS REGION I

Field Operations Region I is responsible for the performance of the basic police tasks of protecting life and property, preserving the peace, preventing and suppressing crime, and the apprehension of violators of the law. These functions are carried out at the following Sheriff's stations and specialized units: Antelope Valley, East Los Angeles, Crescenta Valley, Temple, Santa Clarita Valley, and Lost Hills Regional Stations; Emergency Operations Bureau; North Surveillance and Apprehension Team (NORSAT); Reserve Forces Bureau; and the Office of Special Programs.

Antelope Valley Station

Antelope Valley Station, located in north Los Angeles County, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract cities of Lancaster and Palmdale. The Antelope Valley jurisdiction is primarily rural, however, it is one of the fastest growing areas in Los Angeles County.

Palmdale Station Dedication: On February 24, 1992, the Palmdale Satellite Station was dedicated. This 5,500 square foot facility, located at 1020 East Palmdale Boulevard, Palmdale, will enhance the Department's ability to provide services to the Palmdale community. The new facility includes a staff of 70 which serves the community around the clock.

Lake Los Angeles Community Center: The Lake Los Angeles Community Center office opened April 11, 1992. This office, located at 40235 North 170th Street East, is staffed Monday through Friday, between the hours of 9 am and 5 pm. The facility allows residents of Lake Los Angeles and the communities of Llano, Pearblossom, and Little Rock the convenience of reporting crimes and receiving information about other Sheriff's Department services at a local site.

A.V.'s Most Wanted: A joint effort between the Crime Prevention Unit and the Detective Bureau led to the forming of a television project called "A.V.'s Most Wanted." With the help of Jones Intercable, who donated advertising space to our efforts, the Station was able to run pictures and information of suspects the Detective Bureau wanted for felony warrants as many as 18 times a day. So far, out of 33 wanted suspects shown on the program, 27 have been arrested, the majority of them from being seen on television.

Partners Against Crime and Operation High Desert Storm: The Antelope Valley Sheriff's Station also co-organized two programs that will help residents in the crime-ridden areas re-claim their neighborhoods. The "Partners Against Crime" program in the City of Palmdale, and the "Operation High Desert Storm" program in the City of Lancaster combines the efforts of residents, property owners, code enforcement officers, and the Sheriff's Department to use all available resources to change the environment of crime-impacted neighborhoods, making them safe for all residents.

Volunteers Organized to Improve Community Environment: The Antelope Valley Station's Crime Prevention Unit organized a volunteer citizen patrol program for the cities of Lancaster and Palmdale. The VOICE (Volunteers Organized to Improve Community Environment) program is a joint effort between the community and law enforcement to serve the special needs of the community. The program consists of civilian volunteers working together in the Sheriff's Department wearing approved volunteer uniforms and using specially marked vehicles. They conduct patrol checks in identified problem areas to reduce and prevent criminal activity, acting as professional observers and reporting their observations to the Sheriff's Department.

Crescenta Valley Regional Station

Crescenta Valley Regional Station, located in northeast Los Angeles County, provides police services for the contract city of La Canada Flintridge, portions of the Angeles National Forest, the unincorporated County areas of La Crescenta, Montrose, and through the Altadena Local Station, the Altadena area.

School Resources Officer: This vital program, which has received praise from students, teachers and parents alike, has established itself in one high school campus and one junior high campus. Thanks to Supervisor Antonovich, who located the funding to extend this program for the 1992/93 school year, a deputy continues to present an authority figure on school grounds and be available for counseling sessions. The fight to keep area children away from criminal behavior is a constant battle and this program is having a very positive impact.

East Los Angeles Station

East Los Angeles Station, located just east of downtown Los Angeles, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract cities of Commerce and Cudahy.

East Los Angeles Station continued several successful special programs in 1992, including: Neighborhood Watch, Volunteer Program, Eddie Heredia Boxing Club, and the School Resource Deputy. Project Target is still used to track and computerize on-going community problems that do not require a file number.

The East Los Angeles Youth Activities League opened a new Community Center expanding its commitment and programs to the community. Boxing, swimming, racquetball, weight training, indoor basketball, martial arts, and adult and senior programs and activities are also being implemented.

East Los Angeles Station also continued its directed patrol and team policing efforts. These programs include special problem teams for Cudahy, Commerce, and East Los Angeles unincorporated area. In addition, a community based policing program has been implemented in the City of Commerce.

Lost Hills Regional Station

The Lost Hills Regional Station, located in west Los Angeles County, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract cities of Agoura Hills, Calabasas, Hidden Hills, Westlake Village, and Malibu.

This year Lost Hills Regional Station enhanced its community involvement by initiating the following programs and committees.

Victims Assistance Program: Beginning in April, civilian volunteers were trained to contact victims of crimes via telephone. In addition to lending a concerned ear, they provide crime prevention literature and act as a referral service to other forms of professional assistance.

You, Your Kids and The Law: This program was designed to be presented to middle school students, their parents, and teachers. Numerous issues, including drugs and gangs, are discussed in a two-hour evening program held at a local school facility.

Rotary Outreach Programs Encourage Symmetry (ROPES): Local rotary clubs pooled their community involvement resources to sponsor the ROPES program in conjunction with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and the local school districts. Through a series of events from February to June, a group of 24 seventh grade students from three schools participated in outdoor activities to help young people develop leadership, decision-making skills, and enhance self-esteem. In addition, the program increases awareness of law enforcement, the community, and peer relationships.

Sheriff's personnel, school counselors, paid consultants from ROPES Institute, and rotary volunteers assist with the management and administration of the program.

Student Attendance Review Board (SARB): The Las Virgenes Unified School District conducts periodic SARB meetings. The board includes two deputies from the Station's Juvenile Intervention Team and school district employees.

Items of concern are identification of "at-risk" students whose lack of attendance at school may be indicative of family problems, criminal activity, or drug abuse. The board discusses each identified student, schedules conferences with the board, and the parents of the concerned student.

The Juvenile Intervention Team, as members of the board, provide the ability to interact with the students in settings beyond the school campus. They also provide appropriate information to the board about other conduct of an identified student that is relevant to returning the student to productive scholastic activity.

Santa Clarita Valley Station

Santa Clarita Valley Station, located in north Los Angeles County, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract city of Santa Clarita. The Santa Clarita Valley Station's jurisdiction also includes Magic Mountain Amusement Park. Along with its regular Station functions and existing programs, Santa Clarita Valley Station was involved in the following program:

Teen Survival Guide: The Crime Prevention Unit at Santa Clarita Valley Station developed a "Teen Survival Guide" for distribution to the youth of the Santa Clarita Station area.

As a result of a suggestion from a civilian employee, the Crime Prevention Unit developed a 42-page pamphlet that is distributed to the youth of Santa Clarita Valley through high school health classes and youth organizations.

The guide covers such subjects as juvenile law, gang activity, drug and alcohol abuse, and provides teen-help phone numbers. Printed through the Vocational Print Shop at the North County Correctional Facility, this guide is a success with the youth, their parents, and school counselors, who use it regularly as a reference guide.

Temple Station

Temple Station, located in northeast Los Angeles County, provides police services for a large unincorporated County area and the five contract cities of Bradbury, Duarte, Rosemead, South El Monte, and Temple City. In January, 1993, Temple Station will hold their dedication and grand opening ceremonies for the brand new facilities under construction for the past year and a half. This year special activities within the Station include:

Chaplain Advisory Panel: Temple Station created the Chaplain Advisory Panel to augment the services of Temple Station in dealing with various human crisis situations. Ten clergy members were selected from eight geographic areas served by Temple Station. They provide the community with the specialized clergy skills often needed in certain situations. The members serve on a voluntary basis and each must have a strong conviction regarding their service to the community and Temple Station. The members reduce communication gaps by acting as an informational link between the community and Temple Station.

Community Oriented Policing: As the trends of the Department and law enforcement move toward Community Oriented Policing, so has Temple Station. Community Oriented Policing programs have been initiated in each of the four major contract cities. In the initial phase, each city has designated Special Assignment and Crime Prevention/Community Relations Deputies. The Special Assignment personnel are responsible for resolving community and business related problems by coordinating the appropriate area resources to abate the identified problems. They identify and assess potential threats to the community and implement corrective measures. The Crime Prevention/Community Relations Deputy is responsible for mobilizing the community's resources in the areas of crime prevention, public education, and citizen involvement regarding community safety.

Emergency Operations Bureau

During the year Reserve Forces Bureau was merged with EOB, increasing the Bureau's overall responsibilities. Emergency Operations Bureau is the highlighted unit for Field Operations Region I (see page 66).

Reserve Forces Bureau: Reserve Forces Bureau is the administrative headquarters for the Department's Reserve Program which consists of four major components: Uniform Reserves, Mountain Search and Rescue, Mounted Posse, and the Reserve Academy. The Bureau's diversified responsibilities also include being administrative headquarters for the Explorer Program, Office of Special Programs, and the Industrial Relations Detail.

Uniform reserves are assigned to each of the Sheriff's stations in the County. They perform general law enforcement patrol duties as well as assisting in station level detective functions. Also within the uniform reserve structure are the Specialist Companies: Administrative Support, Aero Bureau, Custody, Medical, Media, Chaplains, Motorcycle Unit, Marine, Technical Services, EOB, Detective, NORSAT, Weapons Training, Transit Services, Juvenile Investigations Bureau, Narco, and Headquarters. There are currently 690 Uniform Reserve personnel.

The search and rescue teams provide services to those citizens who become stranded, lost, or injured in the mountainous areas of Los Angeles County. They assist the Department and other law enforcement agencies with specialized operations. The 120 reserves who make up the seven search and rescue teams undergo extensive mountaineering training. In addition, each member is required to be an emergency medical technician.

The Sheriff's mounted posse consists of 153 personnel assigned to 12 companies, 11 at patrol stations and the Mounted Enforcement Detail (MED) Company assigned to Special Enforcement Bureau. The posse functions as an integrated support unit to the Department in emergent situations requiring the expertise of trained horse riders in searches and rescues in terrain not accessible by motor vehicles or helicopters. The posses also routinely patrol riverbeds and hazardous mountain areas and assist as needed in certain crowd control situations. They are now being frequently used to patrol large shopping mall parking lots. Both MED personnel and regular posse members participate in numerous parades and special events throughout the year.

Collectively, the 963 reserve deputies worked approximately 290,000 hours this year which represents an approximate savings to the County of \$9 million.

The reserve academy trains non-designated Level I and Level II reserves for the Sheriff's Department and participating agencies. Academy classes are held twice a year on a semester basis.

There are currently 528 law enforcement explorer scouts assigned throughout 20 Sheriff's stations. They worked 67,500 hours in the positions that augment County employee duties. These positions are fingerprinting, bicycle licensing, and traffic control at various Sheriff's events. The explorers also participated in 58,208 hours of training/recreational activities. These activities include, but are not limited to: role players for patrol school, "Kid Prints," parades, health fairs, career days, and numerous assignments requested by contract cities in which they are assigned. Both of the above categories represent a total of 125,708 hours of explorer activity.

Explorer recruits attend an academy at either STARS Center, College of the Canyons, or South Bay for 18 consecutive Saturdays. Upon graduation they are assigned to the Sheriff's station where they originally applied.

Office of Special Programs: The Office of Special Programs supervises and coordinates the Sheriff's Department civilian volunteers who have contributed a total of 275,755 volunteer hours this year. The civilian volunteer interpreters assisted the FBI, DEA, Marshals, Courts, and other law enforcement agencies in translating various languages. Special Programs expanded the Family Abuse Intervention Resource Program to all Sheriff's Department stations. This program offers resources to the victims of domestic violence. Special Programs also implemented a new program, "Special Needs Identification Program," for persons who are physically or mentally disabled.

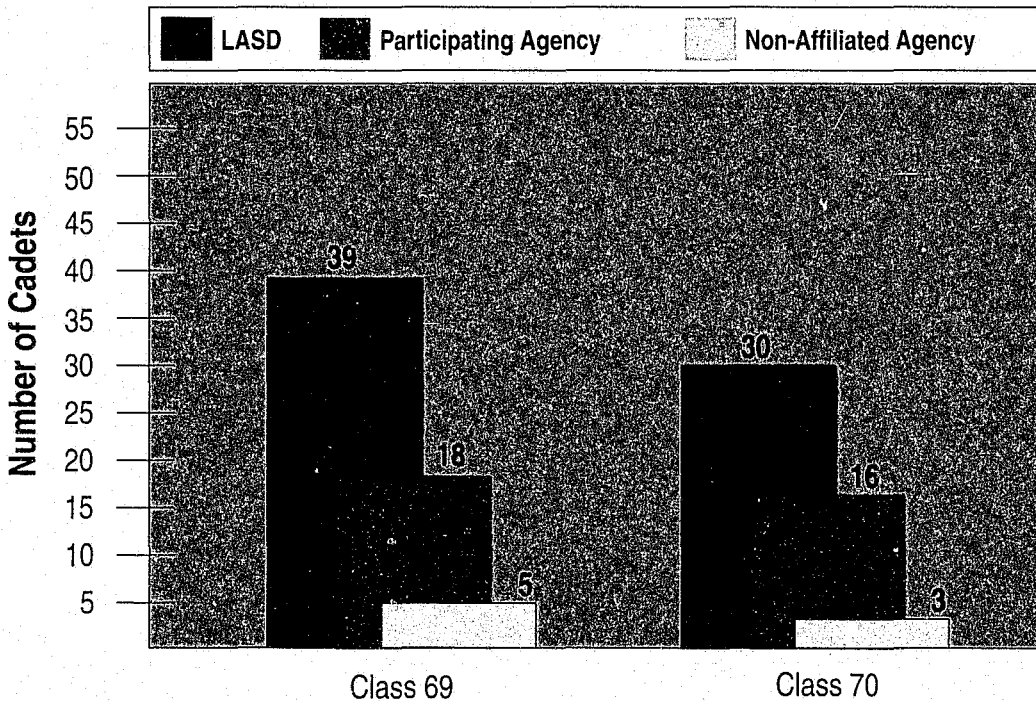
Headquarters Crime Prevention Unit: Due to the budget curtailments, the functions of the Headquarters Crime Prevention Unit was eliminated. Questions regarding crime prevention are now directed to the Sheriff's Information Bureau.

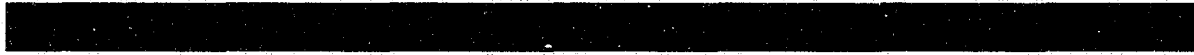
Industrial Relations Detail: The Industrial Relations Detail maintains liaison between the business and labor communities. This information is used to train patrol personnel in the handling of labor disputes and picket lines. This year the Detail was actively involved in five month work action by the drywall workers. In November, more than 30 drywall companies signed a contract with the striking drywall workers.

North Regional Surveillance and Apprehension Team (NORSAT)

NORSAT's primary objective is the abatement of major criminal activity cross-jurisdictionally within a broad geographic area. To accomplish this objective, NORSAT conducts investigations of career criminals and major pattern or serial offenders, utilizes mobile surveillance techniques, and communicates with other law enforcement agencies, probation/parole officers, and private industry to develop rapport and resources related to activity in the NORSAT area.

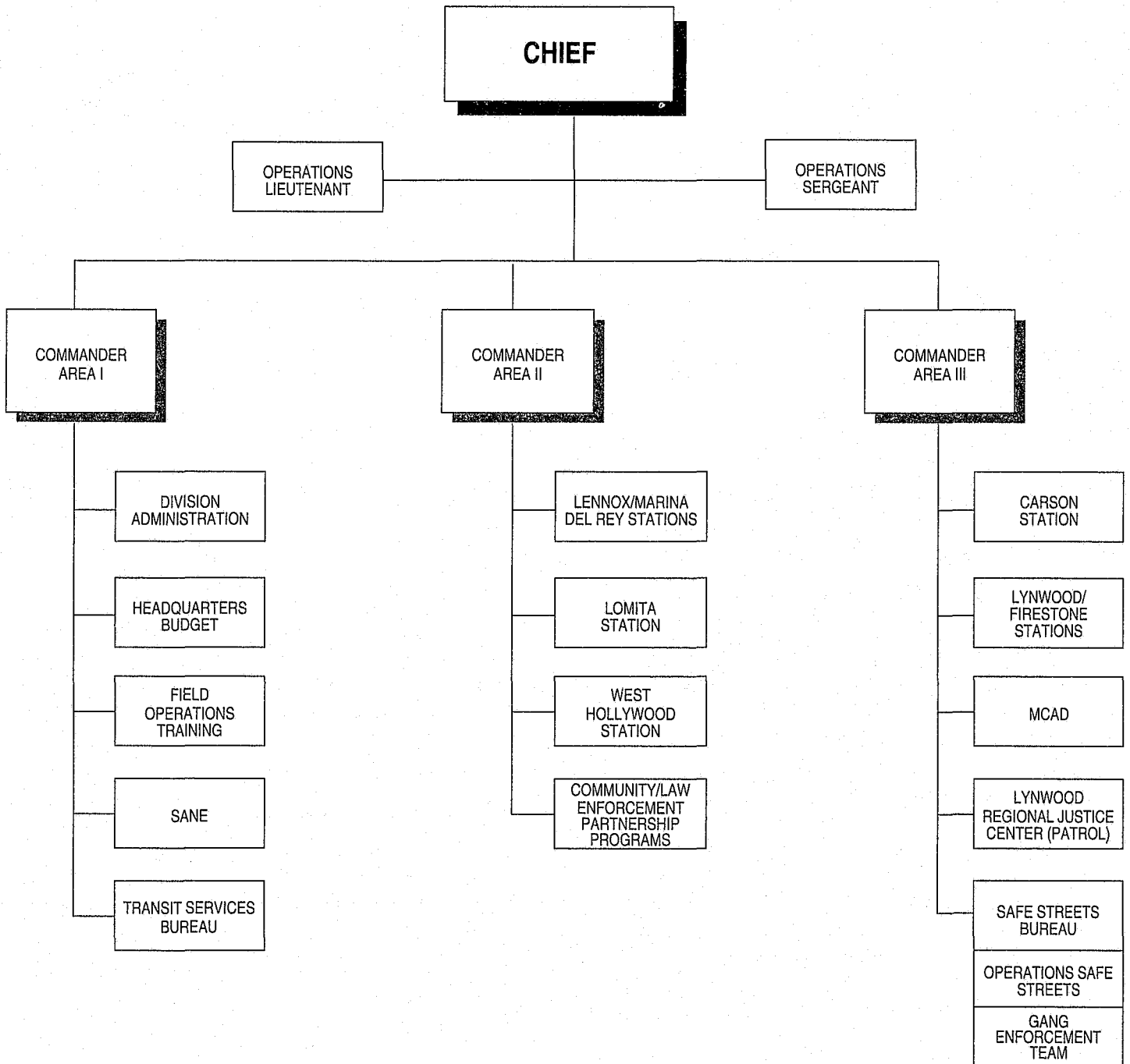

FIELD OPERATIONS REGION II

Field Operations Region II is responsible for the performance of the basic police tasks of protecting life and property, preserving the peace, preventing and suppressing crime, and apprehending law violators. These functions are carried out at the following Sheriff's Stations and specialized units: Carson, Firestone, Lomita, Lennox, Lynwood, Marina del Rey, and West Hollywood Stations; Lynwood Regional Justice Center; Multijurisdictional Criminal Apprehension Detail (MCAD); Safe Streets Bureau; Substance Abuse and Narcotics Education (SANE) Bureau; and Transit Services Bureau.

Carson Station

The Carson City Council approved a measure appropriating approximately \$11,000 of narcotic forfeiture funds to finance the purchase of baseball cards featuring photos of Carson Station deputies. Five hundred copies of 144 different cards will be produced for patrol personnel at Carson Station. These cards will be used to foster communication and positive interaction between community youth and law enforcement personnel.

Neighborhood Team Policing: The Centerview area of the City of Carson was chosen as the test neighborhood for a pilot project involving team policing. A team of six deputies were assigned to patrol the neighborhood consistently for a six-month period. During this time, the deputies actively participated in community watch meetings. Also, several team policing meetings were held with area residents to foster involvement and "team" spirit. The pilot project was extremely successful and it will be expanded to all of the station's policing areas.

Clergy Program: This year Carson Station personnel began recruiting area pastors and religious leaders for the Station's Clergy Program. They become civilian volunteers and participate in frequent patrol ride-alongs. During the ride-alongs, the clergy not only become more familiar with the station's patrol deputies, but are also available to assist patrol deputies deal with the public in stressful situations, (i.e., death notifications, domestic violence, etc.) thereby freeing deputies to devote attention to other critical tasks.

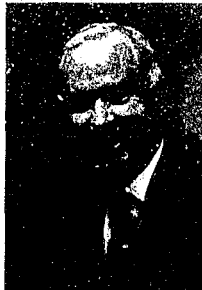
Community Crisis Hotline: In conjunction with the Clergy Program, a local religious group has privately funded a "Community Crisis Hotline" staffed by trained volunteers to assist in the communities' matters of personal crisis, i.e., contemplated suicide, domestic violence, etc. Bumper stickers were printed (via private funding) with the "Hotline" number (310-527-HELP) and placed on the Station's radio cars. The hotline is answered by these trained volunteers and clergy at the South Bay Calvary Chapel. The program has been an overwhelming success, receiving calls from cities well outside Carson Station's policing area.

Cultural Awareness Training: Carson Station is involved in the formation of the Department's Cultural Awareness Training Program. In addition to hosting the Department's first pilot Cultural Awareness Workshop, several employees at Carson Station are training to be Cultural Awareness Training Facilitators.

Lennox/Marina del Rey Stations

Lennox Station, located in southwest Los Angeles County, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract city of Lawndale. Marina Del Rey Station, which merged with Lennox Station in July of this year, is located in west Los Angeles County and provides police services for the unincorporated County area and has no contract city. The Marina Del Rey Station operates six patrol boats in the harbor and marina waters.

In November Captain Walter Lanier retired and Captain Jack Scully assumed command of the Station. There were a number of programs and events that occurred this year in the Lennox-Marina Del Rey area. Highlights for 1992 include:

Lennox Station Community Youth Center: Located at 11911 Vermont Avenue, opened in January as an additional component of the Youth Athletic League. The overall goal of the program is to reduce juvenile delinquency by providing youths viable alternatives.

The Community Youth Center currently has 25 operational programs. The programs are well diversified and include academic, cultural, recreational, social, and athletic activities. Approximately 2,300 youths were served in 1992, an increase of 80% from the 1,300 served in 1991.

Recycling Program: All governmental agencies are mandated by AB 939 to reduce their volume of trash 25% by 1995. Lennox Station was asked to develop a model Departmental recycling program which could be used at other facilities. In working with the Station's present trash hauler, Lennox was able to significantly reduce its trash (otherwise headed for the landfill) within a three month period. By established contemporary standards, paper and cardboard recycling at Lennox has saved 75-100 trees annually.

City of Hope Bike-a-Thon: This year Marina del Rey hosted the City of Hope Bike-a-Thon. Due to the overwhelming generosity of Departmental personnel, over \$19,000 was raised, plus an additional \$15,000 was generated by a fund-raiser.

Lomita Station

Lomita Station, located in the southwest Los Angeles County, provides services for the unincorporated County area and the contract cities of Lomita, Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills, and Rolling Hills Estates. Activities for the Station this year include:

Rancho Palos Verdes: A comprehensive review was undertaken to regularly update emergency coordination among the various agencies which respond to coastal emergencies. As result, notification procedures have been implemented reducing the time required to activate emergency rescue deployment from strategic points along the coastal region.

The City's Neighborhood Watch Committee was recently granted City Council authority to raise voluntary contributions for Neighborhood Watch Programs in conjunction with the Sheriff's Department. Area crime occurrences have been affected and crime trends are decreasing in the categories of auto theft and auto burglary due to more citizen crime watch involvement. Deputies attend at least two neighborhood watch gatherings per week in the City, and more meetings are planned.

Lomita: During the year, the Station intensified its network with agencies and groups in the City who have a common interest in dealing with youths who are "at risk" of getting involved with gangs and the "tagger" culture. The City of Lomita's Citizen's Committee on Gangs and Graffiti has been actively involved with crime control in cooperation with Lomita Station.

Lynwood Regional Justice Center Patrol Station

The Lynwood Regional Justice Center Project began its second year of construction during 1992. Project patrol staff continued their review of the project plans and specifications, overseeing the construction of the station. Transition issues and planning continued with the addition of joint issue meetings between the patrol staff and the newly assigned 30 member custody team. To assist the patrol team, personnel occupying key station positions were integrated into several project liaison teams.

As of December, the total project was 86% complete and about 34 days ahead of schedule. Total costs incurred to date are within the project budget. It is anticipated the project will be substantially completed during the summer of 1993 with operational occupancy occurring in the latter part of 1993 or early 1994.

Lynwood/Firestone Stations

In January, the Lynwood Station Traffic office was the beneficiary of a State grant from the Office of Traffic Safety. This grant provided a mobile DUI check point trailer and all required equipment for conducting random checks.

On June 8, 1992, Lynwood and Firestone Stations merged as a result of budgetary curtailments and the on-going planning for the opening of the Lynwood Regional Justice Center. As of November 1, 1992, the operations function and other related administrative duties were moved to the Lynwood facility. By January 1, 1993, all patrol, detective, scheduling, training, and administrative functions will be merged into a centralized operation.

On October 15, 1992, the Willowbrook Project Area Committee received the 1992 Governor's Crime Prevention Award in the community organization category. The award exemplified the efforts, contributions, and exemplary performance in the area of Crime Prevention by the community members associated with the Willowbrook Project Area.

West Hollywood Station

West Hollywood Station, located in west Los Angeles County, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract city of West Hollywood. West Hollywood's jurisdiction includes Universal Studios. This year, West Hollywood was involved in the following activities:

Gay Bashings Informational Log: Gay bashings are a valid concern among members of the gay community. In a continuing effort to minimize the occurrence of these cruel acts and apprehend offenders, the Station developed an informational log for use by the Complaint Desk staff when citizens contact the Station to relay information and other facts relevant to gay bashings. As a result of the "Gay Bashings Informational Log," information of this type can be logged and provided to Detective Bureau staff as an aid in any current or future investigations.

Special Problems Unit: The Station re-implemented the Special Problems Unit (SPU), which was temporarily disbanded for most of 1991 because of staffing shortages. This Unit consists of six deputies and one sergeant who address special crime problems within the City. As a result of several joint operations with members of the Department's Vice Unit, SPU was instrumental in arresting several hundred prostitutes earlier this year. Prior to year's end, the SPU staff succeeded in persuading the local court to apply strict conditions of probation on those arrested for prostitution, an approach certain to have a continuing, positive impact on the incidence of this crime in West Hollywood.

Panhandler Abatement Program: The Panhandler Abatement Program was developed by members of the West Hollywood Chamber of Commerce in concert with the Station's crime prevention staff.

Deputies, working with the Chamber and other similar organizations, educate merchants on the various methods they can employ to discourage panhandling. The result has been the virtual alleviation of panhandling from the main boulevard of West Hollywood.

Meet-A-Deputy Program: West Hollywood is home to a large percentage of Russian immigrants, a group long associated with traditional distrust of authority. The "Meet-A-Deputy Program" was initiated to insure ongoing positive contacts between deputy personnel and members of the Russian community. Patrol deputies are assigned to meet with Russian groups. Through the assistance of a translator, the deputies discuss what it means to them to be a deputy and provide a little personal history. The deputy then discusses safety concerns and answers any questions from the audience. As a result, the residents quickly perceive the differences between local law enforcement and that of their country of origin, enhancing the level of trust in their deputies.

Multijurisdictional Criminal Apprehension Detail

MCAD is one of the highlighted units for Field Operations Region II (see page 68).

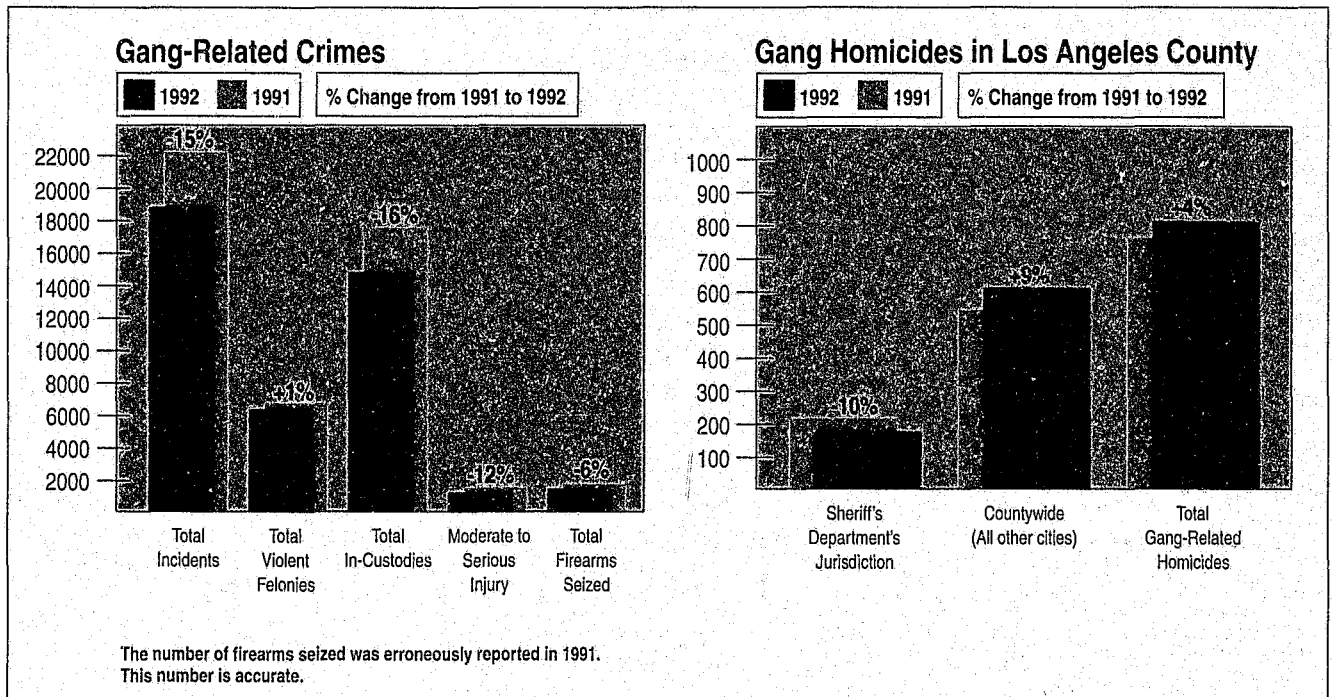
Safe Streets Bureau

The Safe Streets Bureau is comprised of two details, Operation Safe Streets (OSS) and the Gang Enforcement Teams (GET). The OSS teams are charged with the investigation of cases involving targeted gangs within specific station areas. The GET teams provide directed uniform in most active or violent gang areas. Due to the extraordinary budget crisis suffered by the Department, the GET teams were temporarily reassigned for a four-month period. In November they were re-established within the Bureau.

Gang Activity: In 1991 gang members were responsible for 771 gang-related homicides throughout the County. This figure increased to 801 Countywide in 1992, a 4% increase over the previous year's total.



SANE Bureau

The Substance Abuse Narcotics Education (SANE) Program completed its seventh year of teaching elementary students (4th, 5th, and 6th graders) throughout Los Angeles County. The SANE Bureau has 47 sworn personnel teaching in 406 schools in 51 school districts. In addition, two school districts are currently including the program in the 7th and 8th grades for the 1992/93 school year.

CIDAP: The CIDAP (Curriculum Integrated Drug Abuse Prevention) Program, which reinforces and augments the SANE Program, is currently used in each district. The Sheriff's Youth Foundation purchased the software and donated sets of the software disks and related manuals to each school district interested in the program. The curriculum is available to other interested school districts.

SANE Fun Run: The first SANE 3k/5k/10k Fun Run and Open House was held in June at STARS Center. The SANE Fun Run Committee presented a check to the Sheriff's Youth Foundation in the amount of \$10,602.92 to help support the SANE Program.

Also in June, the Bureau captain presented a special recognition certificate from the Sheriff to Sixto Perez, an 11 year old fifth grader from Los Robles Elementary School in the Hacienda La Puente Unified School District. Sixto, who comes from an impoverished home and has learning disabilities, refused the overtures of a man trying to get him to sell drugs. The event gained national recognition through the media and a story was published in October's *Reader's Digest*.

Transit Services Bureau

The Transit Services Bureau is responsible for policing the 22 miles of rail corridor comprising the Metro Blue Line and over 140 miles of rail lines used by the Metrolink System. Transit Services Bureau is one of the highlighted units for Field Operations Region II (see page 70).

Field Operations Regions Training Unit

The Field Operations Regions Training Unit celebrated its 11th anniversary this year. "Excellence in Training" is our motto as well as the reason for our existence.

During the year, the Field Operations Regions Training Unit developed more than 18 newsletters, five training video tapes, seven new Field Operations Directives and the revision and updating of the 112 existing Field Operations Directives. Additionally, the Unit coordinates Advanced Tactical Communications Workshops, the inspection of all station training programs, recordation of this training, coordinating and hosting station "STC" Jail Training, and the inspection of all station jails and station scheduling procedures.

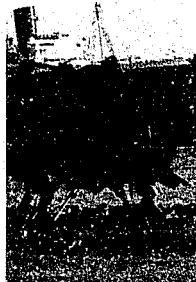
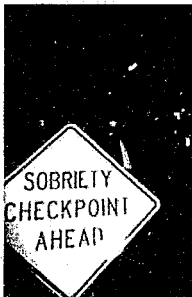
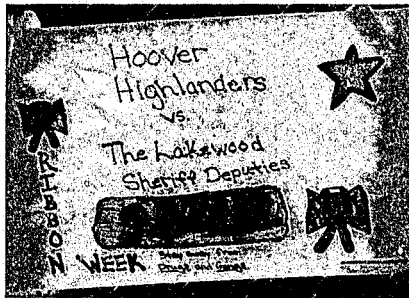
The Field Operations Regions Training Unit serves as the training coordinator for the three Field Operations Regions and is further responsible for the curriculum of all Field Operations Schools, such as Lieutenant, Sergeant, FTO, and Patrol School.

The Mentor Sergeant Program was also developed and coordinated by the Unit. Begun this year, this program was designed to assure newly assigned sergeants are given direction and provided with the necessary background to effectively handle their responsibilities.

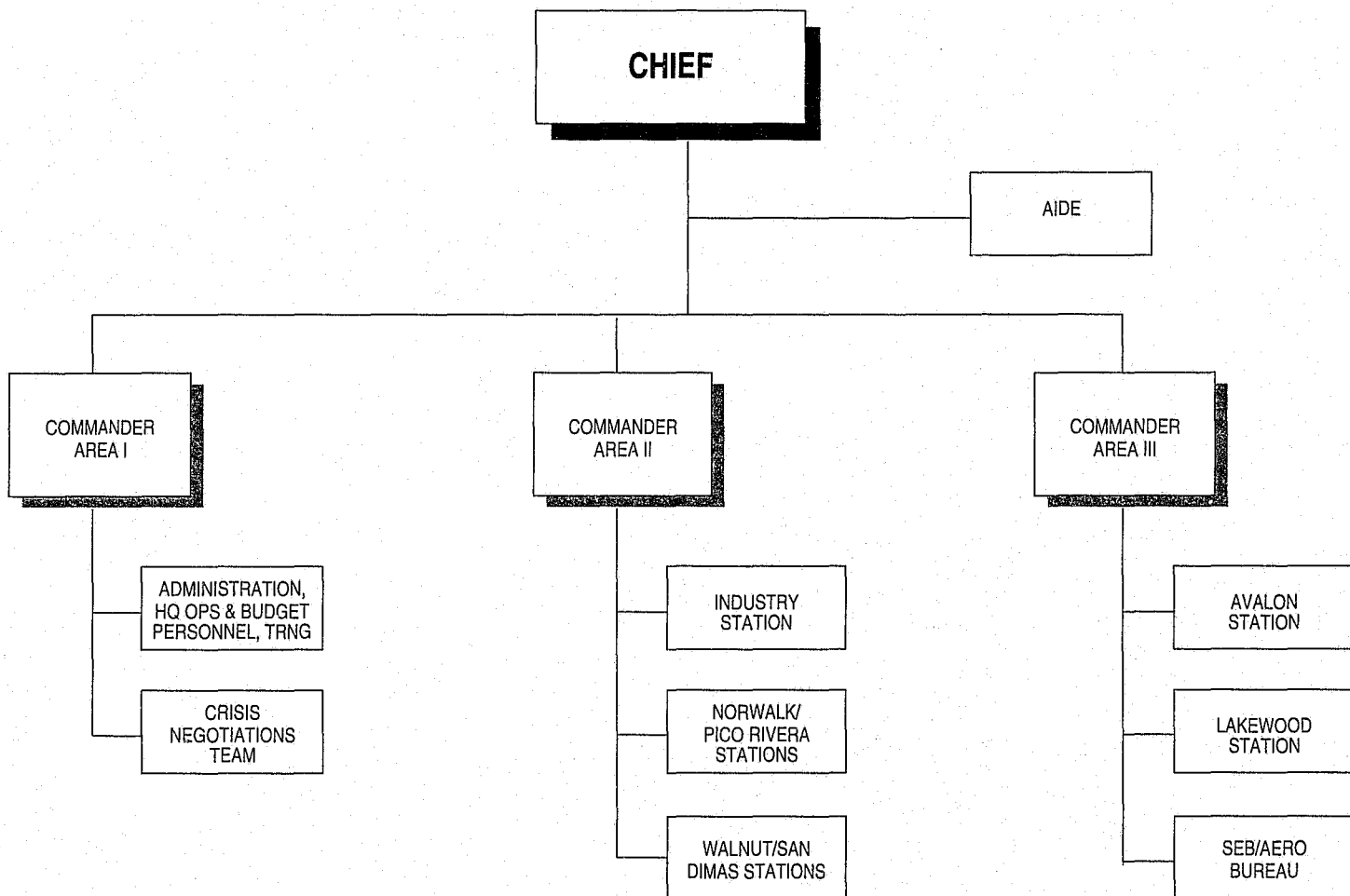
In an effort to provide an additional margin of safety and enhance the Field Training Program, the Field Operations Regions Training Unit initiated the DocuCam Pilot Project involving the use of video recorders in patrol cars. Also implemented during the year was the "Pepper Mace" Pilot Project. Its primary goal is to test the feasibility of utilizing a new generation of incapacitating less-lethal aerosol sprays. This product, a pepper mace spray (oleoresin-capsicum extracted from the cayenne pepper), provides an additional alternative tool in the escalation of force.

FIELD OPERATIONS REGION III

Field Operations Region III is responsible for the performance of the basic police tasks of protecting life and property, preserving the peace, preventing and suppressing crime, and the apprehension of violators of the law. These functions are carried out at the following Sheriff's Stations and specialized units: Avalon, Industry, Lakewood, Norwalk Regional/Pico Rivera Local Stations, and Walnut Regional/San Dimas Local Stations; Special Enforcement and Aero Bureaus; and the Crisis Negotiations Team.

Avalon Station

Avalon Station, located on Santa Catalina Island, off the coast of Los Angeles County, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract City of Avalon as well as the island of San Clemente. The following represents significant events that took place at Avalon Station during the year:

- The Station began a program with the local cable television channel wherein a list of warrant suspects and property crimes is broadcast periodically each day with the list being changed monthly. This program resulted in a number of warrant suspects either surrendering themselves or being arrested. Additionally, a number of crimes were solved by persons coming forward and supplying information concerning the property crimes.
- Avalon Station received in excess of \$72,000 as a result of a boat and US currency seizure, following the arrest of a narcotic and illegal weapons suspect. The money is being used to enhance the Station's SANE Program and other local law enforcement efforts.
- Avalon Station participated in the local Chamber of Commerce's "Adopt-A-Class" program at the local school. The Station "adopted" the Junior and Senior Social Studies Class. It involves providing educational support to the class in the way of Station personnel teaching monthly classes having to do with law enforcement topics.

Industry Station

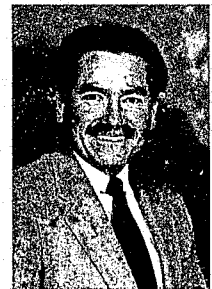
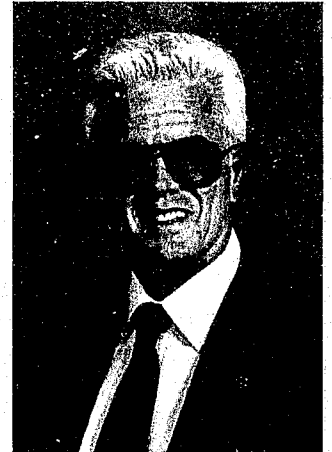

Industry Station, located in east Los Angeles County, provides police services for the unincorporated County area and the contract cities of Industry, La Habra Heights, and La Puente. This year, the Station was involved with the following:

"*999" For Kids 5k/10k Run and Festival: The "*999" For Kids 5K/10K Run and Festival enjoyed tremendous success this year. Over \$26,000 was raised through this event sponsored by Challenge Cup Relay through funds generated by "*999" for Kids teams from the Hall of Justice, Mira Loma, and Industry Station. Industry Station's 5K/10K event raised \$9,100 which will be used to purchase medical equipment, toys, and other necessities for the 400 severely handicapped and abused children assigned to the Department of Children's Services, Medical Placement Unit.

Sobriety Checkpoints: As a part of the Office of Traffic Safety Grant, Industry Station acquired a Sobriety Checkpoint Equipment Trailer. The checkpoint program began mid-year 1992, and is still going strong. It is designed to educate motorists as well as to arrest drivers under the influence. The five Sobriety Checkpoints conducted this year resulted in over 8,000 contacts, 3,500 drivers being screened, and 16 driving under the influence arrests. A total of 18 checkpoints are scheduled for the upcoming calendar year.

Station Level Incremental Computerization Program (SLIC): The first year of the Station Level Incremental Computerization Program (SLIC) ended in October. The SLIC pilot program computerized the collision reporting process for 10 of the 16 field traffic units. When the one-year test period expired in October, statistics indicated the time spent on collision reporting was reduced by 30% for those utilizing the computer program. Not only does the program reduce the time spent on the initial report, it produces a neat document that can be stored, retrieved, or corrected easily.

Youth Employment: Through the established training and placement programs in place in the school districts, we are actively identifying and seeking employment opportunities for at-risk youth. These employment programs are available in nearly all school districts and are known as Workability, Job Link, and the Summer Youth Employment Training Program. High school students have been working at the Station performing clerical tasks since the third month of Operation COURAGE (Community Opposition and United Resistance Against Gang Evils). One of these students has become a regular County-paid student worker.

Gang-Tip Hotline: One of the major difficulties in successfully combating gang crime is gathering information. Individuals generally feel intimidated by gangs and fear retaliation if they are identified as the source of information which leads to the arrest of a gang member. Looking at the success We-TIP has enjoyed for many years in acting as a clearing house for crime information of all types, a hotline was established specifically for reporting information about gang crime and activity.

Lakewood Station

Lakewood Station, located in southeast Los Angeles County, provides general and specialized community oriented law enforcement services for approximately 370,000 people in the contract cities of Artesia, Bellflower, Cerritos, Hawaiian Gardens, Lakewood, Paramount, and Long Beach (Districts 5, 8 and 9). Lakewood Station's jurisdiction includes the largest number of contract cities at one station. While this was a most difficult budgetary year for all of the cities, the Station realized additional contract items and growth in community based efforts through its relationship with its cities.

Artesia: In an extended effort to continue its control of gang activity in some of its neighborhoods, and also in adjacent cities, the City of Artesia contracted for an additional two special assignment deputies bringing their total to four. The four deputies made a positive impact on gang related crime and also created positive interaction with the community with foot patrols in the parks and business centers.

Bellflower: Although it was faced with severe budgetary constraints, the City of Bellflower continued to contract for three special assignment deputies, demonstrating its commitment to addressing specific problem areas. Directed patrol missions (utilizing bicycles) were recently initiated through a joint venture involving law enforcement, the City of Bellflower, and a community based group known as "BAG" (Bellflower Against Gangs), which provided funding for these and other special operations. The highly acclaimed "Project Success" program was expanded into the Bellflower School District as a cooperative effort between the district, the City, the "BAG" group and the Sheriff's Department. The City is also part of a four-city regional contract program providing 24-hour service to the community.

Cerritos: Among the new programs within the City of Cerritos is the Parolee Tracking Program, instituted with the cooperation of the State Parole Board. Parolees living in the City are identified, which allows the City's special assignment deputies to make periodic contact with the individuals. The Park Patrol Program, assigning a deputy to work local parks exclusively, has proven very successful in reducing incidents of loitering, vandalism, and alcohol related crimes within City parks. School truancies were reduced significantly since the Truancy Patrol Program was instituted. As the number of truants returned to campus increased, incidents of daytime residential burglaries decreased.

Hawaiian Gardens: In an effort to better address the issue of gangs and crime, and bring the Department and the community closer together, the City of Hawaiian Gardens added two special assignment deputies to their contract for a total of four. They maintain a flexible schedule working in cars, on foot, and on bicycles. This allows them to address directed patrol assignments, surveillances, service of search warrants, and narcotics and gang enforcement. They also participate in school crime prevention programs, attend council meetings, and make presentations at community meetings.

Lakewood: The City of Lakewood recently contracted for two special assignment deputies whose function is to address "hot spots" within the City. Arrests and investigations made by these deputies resulted in a significant reduction of criminal activity within the City. In addition, they provided residents with seminars on various topics related to public safety.

The Community Involved Policing (CIP) program was initiated and designed to concentrate patrol personnel to meet specific neighborhood problems and concerns. Resident audits are conducted to insure the needs of the community are being met.

Long Beach: While deputies working in Long Beach maintained a number of community partnerships to address specific neighborhood concerns, a very special one blossomed on the Jordan High School campus. Under the umbrella of Jordan High School's Law Magnet Program, a deputy was assigned to the high school for six hours a day. The deputy teaches a criminal law class touching on the technical aspects of a field deputy's responsibilities. Additionally, the deputy is available to any member of the school faculty as a guest speaker on law enforcement topics that may come up in the classroom, particularly if the topic is a local issue. Guest speakers from specialized units and bureaus of the Department interact with the students on these issues, broadening the potential for an understanding of law enforcement processes. This was very successful in dispelling myths about established law enforcement procedures.

Paramount: As the trend toward crime prevention and intervention with the City's youth continues, the City of Paramount established programs that promote these concepts. Working with school officials in the "Out of District Student Project," deputies target groups of students who bring their gang associated problems to the City and school campuses. Students not meeting residency requirements are released from school and sent back to their proper school. In an effort to proactively address the security issues at two schools, the school district and the City contracted for a "Paramount School Safety Officer." This item will allow better communication and a closer working relationship between students, the Sheriff's Department, the school district, and the City.

In an effort to improve the utilization of patrol time of the City's dedicated contract deputies, Paramount instituted Special Safeguard Saturation Patrols. These special patrols are used in response to real and perceived gang problem areas within the City. Deputies provide a very high concentration of patrol and enforcement in a specific troubled area. This program has been effective in reducing gang violence in the targeted areas.

Norwalk/Pico Rivera Stations

This year, Norwalk/Pico Rivera Stations is the highlighted unit for Field Operations Region III (see page 72).

Walnut Regional Station

Walnut Regional Station, located in east Los Angeles County, provides police services to the unincorporated County area and the contract cities of Diamond Bar, San Dimas, and Walnut. San Dimas Station is part of Walnut Regional Station.

Project Safe Communities: The East San Gabriel Valley Anti-Gang Advisory Task Force, also known as Project Safe Communities, is a consortium of approximately 35 individuals representing various governmental levels, school districts, law enforcement, service organizations, and other community groups. The task force serves as a forum where information is exchanged and assistance and guidance

is available to local entities in presenting community based programs, to address problems caused by increasing gang activity. A large proportion of the group's efforts culminate in an annual week-long Springtime event known as "Rainbow Ribbon Week". Rainbow Ribbon Week '92, witnessed the involvement of almost 30,000 school children involved in anti-gang and community safety programs and large community events within the City of San Dimas and unincorporated Rowland Heights.

Partners Against Crime: Recognizing the critical importance of the relationship that exists between law enforcement and the community's youth, Walnut/San Dimas Stations implemented a school involvement project referred to as "Partners Against Crime" in unincorporated Rowland Heights. In cooperation with the Rowland Unified School District, patrol deputies are assigned to specific elementary schools in that area. Each deputy spends time at his/her assigned school interacting with both the children and the staff. This project has proven very successful, not only enhancing the image of the deputies and Sheriff's Department among the young people of that community, but also allows better communication between school officials and Walnut/San Dimas Stations.

Patrol Deputy Tape Recorder Program: During the year approximately 80% of patrol personnel assigned to Walnut/San Dimas Stations began carrying small tape recorders while on duty. This practice has proven extremely successful in recording information which deputies find useful in their investigations and in addressing many false or maliciously based citizen complaints.

Youth Athletic League: In order to provide "at-risk" children in unincorporated Rowland Heights with a positive alternative to gang and drug involvement, a Youth Athletic League program was implemented in May. This project is co-sponsored by the Department of Parks and Recreation and has the full support of the Rowland Heights Unified School District. Within its first eight months of existence, the results of the program can be seen throughout the entire community with a substantial decrease in juvenile related offenses including graffiti, thefts and gang activity. Funding for this project was obtained through the Los Angeles County Community Development Commission with the assistance of the County Supervisor's Office and community donations.

Aero/Special Enforcement Bureaus

In May, as a result of budget curtailments, Aero Bureau was reduced by 40% of its personnel. This reduction of personnel also resulted in the transfer of the unit commander, combining Aero Bureau and Special Enforcement Bureau's command. Although two distinct and separate bureaus, they now fall under the direction of one unit commander.

Aero Bureau is currently located in Long Beach, adjacent to the Long Beach Airport. The Bureau is responsible for aerial support services using various types of aircraft. Responsibilities include: investigating the violations of regulations governing flight of aircraft and prosecution of offenders; investigating all fatal or serious aircraft accidents; providing airplanes and/or helicopters and flight crews for:

- Aerial patrol for unincorporated County areas
- Aerial patrol under contract for incorporated cities
- Search and rescue operations
- Medical evacuation flights
- Transportation of prisoners
- Aerial surveillance
- Aerial photography
- An aerial command post for a field commander during an emergency
- Missions requiring use of aircraft for the Sheriff and other County departments as directed by the Sheriff

The reduction of service resulted in the termination of fixed wing aircraft flights including prisoner transportation. Also included were the curtailment of photo flights, Catalina transportation, surveillance, and other normally scheduled flights. Patrol operations were also diminished resulting in reduced operations, however, aerial patrols assisted in nearly 1,900 felony arrests and over 550 arrests for misdemeanor crimes.

Special Events: This year's significant event for Aero Bureau was hosting the 22nd Annual National Airborne Law Enforcement Conference and Exposition at the Long Beach Convention Center. A year's worth of planning and preparation paid off in what was considered by many to be the most informative, educational, and entertaining conference in the Association's history. Occurring during the last week in August, the aviation community presented topics of vital interest to law enforcement officers assigned to aviation units throughout the Country.

Special Enforcement Bureau: The Special Enforcement Bureau (SEB) is composed of five details. This Bureau provides a variety of specialized services throughout the County with a current assigned personnel strength of 80 sworn and five civilians.

Special Enforcement Detail (SED): This Detail maintains a Special Weapons Team (SWT) availability on a 24-hour basis for handling barricaded suspect and hostage situations, and for serving arrest and search warrants in high risk or hazardous situations. The Tactical Narcotics Team (TNT) program continued to be highly successful. This program combines four to five SEB personnel (entry team) with members of the handling Narcotics Unit (perimeter security) for the service of some search/arrest warrants. It also augments station level enforcement for specific needs.

A "Mission Specific" program was established by the Detail. Its purpose is to allow for a highly concentrated patrol effort by SEB personnel against a specific problem which is identified by the requesting patrol station. The Detail will mobilize to provide a law enforcement response at the scene of civil disorders and other man-made or natural disasters and also provide dignitary/site protection and jury or suspect security as dictated by special circumstances.

Emergency Services Detail (ESD): This Detail conducts searches and rescues, including mountainous and underwater operations, provides 24-hour paramedic capabilities/services, maintains law enforcement and rescue patrol in the Angeles National Forest, conducts investigations of all SCUBA-related deaths/accidents in Los Angeles County jurisdiction, and provides paramedic support for SWT Operations. On June 28th, ESD was reduced

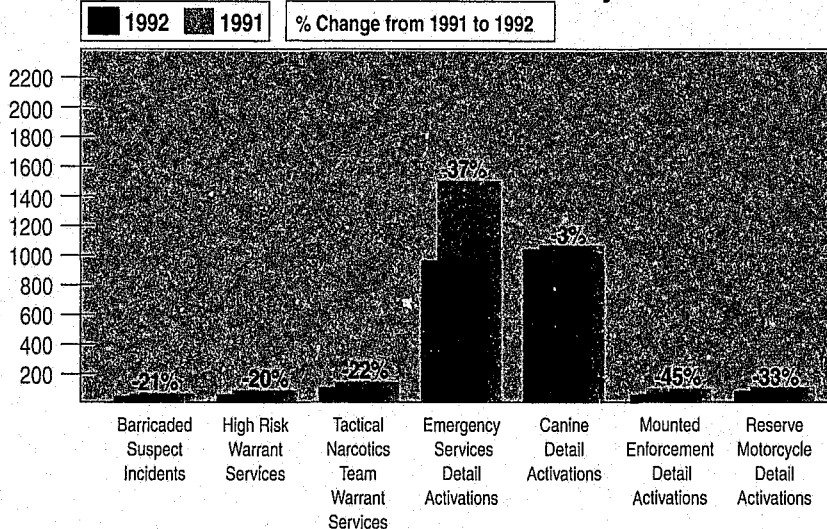
by one sergeant and ten deputies due to budgetary curtailments. Air-5 rescue operations were reduced to four days per week.

Canine Services Detail: This Detail provides 24-hour police-dog services to assist field and SWT personnel with building and area searches for armed/violent suspects, searches for missing persons, bodies or evidence, and augments station patrol efforts through high visibility patrol.

Mounted Enforcement Detail: This Detail provides mounted horseback teams to assist station personnel in crowd control, high visibility patrol of high crime/crowd areas, and with searches in difficult-to-access areas.

Reserve Motorcycle Detail: This Detail assists stations with traffic control and enforcement at major events or selected trouble spots. This year the Detail has been extremely effective combating traffic problems for patrol stations throughout the County. They also provide motorcycle escort and traffic control during specified funeral processions.

Crisis Negotiations Unit

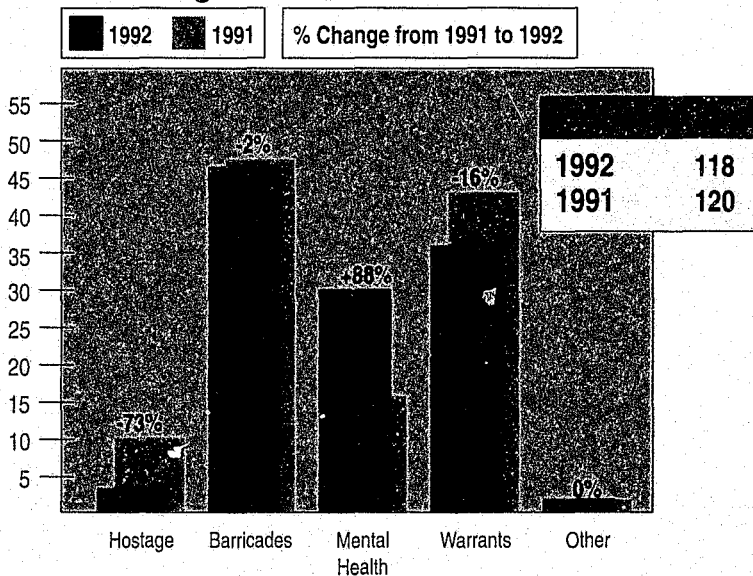
Resolution through communication is the primary mission of the Crisis Negotiations Unit. The Unit is responsible for establishing and maintaining vital communication with hostage takers, barricaded suspects, suicidal individuals, and others who pose an immediate threat to the community. It is staffed with two on-call teams, whose members are ethnically diverse representing the predominant minorities comprising the citizen population of Los Angeles County.

The composite of critical incidents handled by the Crisis Negotiations Unit changed significantly in 1992. The overall number of activations decreased slightly over 1991 (118 for 1992; 120 for

1991), but the type of incidents possibly having the highest level of lethality increased sharply. These situations, involving armed or suspected armed mentally ill individuals, accounted for 36% (42 total) of all call-outs in 1992. This is a dramatic increase from 1991 where only 17% (16 total) of the activations were for this reason. This is an annual increase of 163%. Hostage taking situations decreased from 11 in 1991 to 3 in 1992, a reduction of 73%. The added dimension of negotiating violent or potentially violent mentally ill citizens adds a new challenge to negotiators in predicting human behavior. Psychiatrists from the Mental Health Alert Team assisted with these incidents, and additional training to meet this demand is ongoing with cooperation from the psychiatric/mental health experts.

A pilot program involving the deployment of volunteer on-call chaplains was conducted in 1992. The program's purpose was to assist family members and other individuals involved with the emotional trauma that accompanies a critical incident. The chaplains were assigned to the Crisis Negotiations Team and were available 24-hours a day. The program proved beneficial in lessening the fear and confusion sometimes experienced by families and loved ones. Response from the community was very positive.

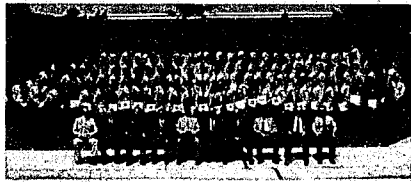

Mental Evaluation Team

In the past few years there has been a rapidly expanding population of mentally ill citizens in our communities. These individuals have been distanced from ongoing outpatient mental health services such as medication administration, case management, and patient follow-up. With State, County and private mental health systems laboring under severe budget curtailments, it has also become increasingly difficult to access mental health services in seeking placement of the chronically mentally ill. For this reason, the Mental Evaluation Team (MET) concept was developed. The MET team is expected to be fully operational in early 1993. It will be staffed by deputies and County mental health clinicians working in the field responding to assist uniformed deputies with calls for service involving the mentally ill in crisis.

A pilot project of the MET team was conducted in late 1991, in $\frac{1}{3}$ of the Sheriff's jurisdiction. The estimated savings to County taxpayers, projected out for an entire year in all three Sheriff's jurisdictions, was over \$4 million. Upon presentation of the program's benefits, the County Board of Supervisors allocated funding for the MET to operate in fiscal year 1992-1993.

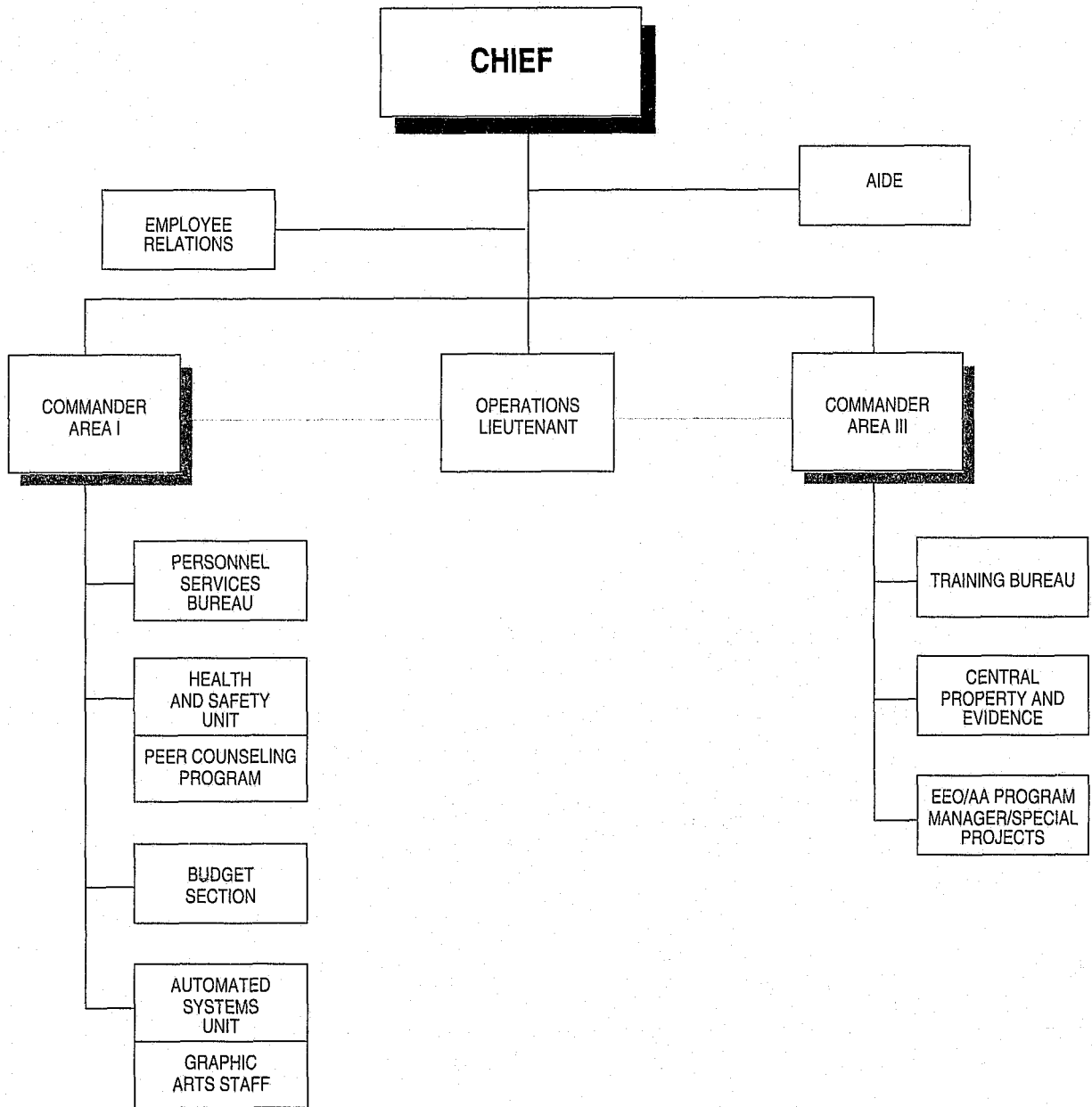

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

The Administrative Division is comprised of Central Property and Evidence, Employee Relations, Graphic Arts, Health and Safety, Personnel Services, and the Training Bureau. The Division is responsible for providing administrative staff services to the entire Department. Functions of this Division include recruitment, personnel, training, education, and employee relations. Administrative Division is headquartered at the Hall of Justice.

Central Property and Evidence

Central Property and Evidence maintains storage and accountability for records of property and evidence received from stations and bureaus, pending final disposition as prescribed by law.

The Central Property and Evidence Section hosted the San Gabriel Valley Chapter, California Association for Property and Evidence (CAPE) meeting in January. A total of 20 law enforcement agencies participated in the meeting which included a tour of our Central Property Warehouse Operation.

Central Property assisted Special Investigations Bureau with a multijurisdictional, 40 location, warrant search, (RAID). One hundred and twelve illegal video poker machines and over \$12,000 were confiscated.

A total of 8,873 firearms, weighing 10.3 tons, were destroyed at Clean Steel Incorporated in Wilmington, California, during the Department's annual gun destruction.

This year, Central Property also received 72,655 line items of evidence which is virtually the same from 1991; however, the Unit processed 65,918 line items for disposal, an increase of 13% over 1991.

Employee Relations

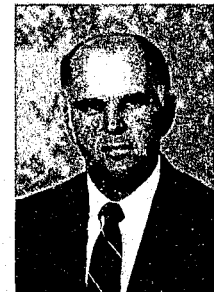

This Unit is responsible for representing the Department in all matters pertaining to employee relations. Some functions include: conferring with representatives of employee organizations regarding new and proposed policies affecting hours, wages, and working conditions; coordinating the resolution of grievances and reducing grievances wherever possible; representing the Department at hearings regarding Unfair Labor Charges and non-disciplinary arbitrations filed by the unions; maintaining a close liaison with employees, employee organizations, County Management and Sheriff's Department management to coordinate the application of employee programs; pro-actively representing Department management in negotiations with certified employee organizations in order to safeguard the Department's ability to render adequate law enforcement services to the community; interpreting the 30 Memoranda of Understanding that cover employees in the Department and assuring uniform application of policies; and interpreting provisions of the County Salary Ordinance and the Manual of Policy and Procedures.

In 1992, Employee Relations processed approximately 400 grievances. The Unit receives approximately 75 to 100 phone calls daily requesting information on a variety of subjects. They continued to monitor negotiations at several tables still negotiating contracts into 1992.

During 1992, Employee Relations won two very important arbitration cases. In one case, the arbitrator found the release of probationary employees is not arbitrable; this decision had Countywide implications. The second case dealt with an involuntary administrative transfer of a deputy. The arbitrator denied the grievance, which reaffirmed management's right to effect transfers when in the best interest of the Department. In addition, Employee Relations successfully negotiated smooth, efficient processes for mass transfers of employees as a result of budget curtailments.

Health and Safety Unit

The Health and Safety Unit provides a myriad of important services to members of our Department. This year has seen a number of dramatic changes in our responsibilities as a result of recent legislative changes. The Americans with Disabilities Act necessitated the development of a uniform mechanism to assess employees' medical restrictions for return to work evaluation and State law mandated implementation of work evaluation and of an Injury and Prevention Program at each unit.

Administrative Section: The Administrative Section processed 4,229 Industrial Injury/ Illness forms for 1992. They also processed 304 medical restriction notices and handled over 12,000 telephone inquiries.

Return to Work Section: The Return to Work Section has evolved into a viable employee service and management support system. It established itself through a positive, uniform approach of preventing losses and returning ill/injured employees to work as soon as medically possible. The members of the Return to Work Section made 554 hospital and home visits and assisted employees and surviving family members with 25 funerals.

During the past year the Senior Employee Services Representatives (SESR) successfully returned to work 24 employees.

Health and Safety Section: To address wellness and safety issues, personnel in this section work with Cal-OSHA, the City of Hope, the Health Department, and others.

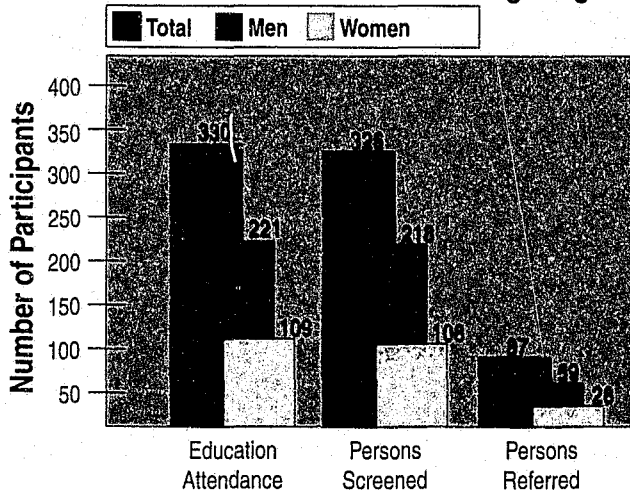
- **Wellness Program:** A Wellness Program proposal was made outlining a two-pronged, voluntary wellness program. Once the formal proposal has been approved, the program will be implemented Department-wide.

Currently Health and Safety is providing wellness information via *Star News* articles and wellness workshops. The wellness workshops are co-hosted by Health and Safety and Field Operations Region III Headquarters.

- **Injury and Illness Prevention Program:** The Sheriff's Department's Injury and Illness Prevention Program follows State laws which require employers to provide and maintain safe and healthful work places for their employees. Training was given to Sheriff's Department personnel designated by their unit as their injury and illness prevention program coordinator.

- **Bloodborne Pathogens Program:** Federal law requires employers to offer hepatitis B vaccinations, free of charge, on an on-going basis to employees who are "at risk" of contracting hepatitis B through their work duties. The Health and Safety Unit coordinated the Department's program, and over 2,500 employees received the vaccination series.

Cancer Education and Screening Program



- **Cancer Education and Screening Program:** The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, together with the City of Hope, presented the Cancer Education and Screening Program, for the second time. A summary of Department personnel who participated appears in the graph.

Discussions are currently being held with City of Hope personnel to offer this program yearly.

- **Alcohol Awareness Program:** The purpose of the Alcohol Awareness Program is to provide confidential counseling for employees with alcohol related problems, and their families, co-workers, and supervisors. The counseling services are for anyone in the Department whose life or job is affected by excessive drinking no matter who the substance abuser is.

During the last year, the Alcohol Awareness Sergeant saw 44 Department members for alcohol abuse; held 131 counseling sessions; visited hospitals on 16 occasions; made 18 presentations; and had over 1,200 contacts with clients.

- **Peer Counseling Program:** The Department's Peer Counseling Program is an employee assistance program which offers confidential support and guidance by trained peer volunteers to all Department members experiencing a personal or professional problem. Whenever possible, the trained volunteers have personally experienced the same (or very similar) problem currently affecting a co-worker.

Currently there are 57 volunteers active in the Peer Counseling Program. These volunteers made more than 300 contacts, volunteering several hundred hours throughout the year, with co-workers who were "hurting."

Personnel Services

This year, Personnel Services has been selected as the highlighted unit for the Administrative Division (see page 75).

Training Bureau

In 1992, the Recruit Training Bureau and the Advanced Training Bureau were consolidated into one unit under one Captain. The Training Bureau remains headquartered at the STARS Center in Whittier, and has again presented thousands of hours of Recruit and In-Service training to our Department and outside agencies.

The Training Bureau responded to the Los Angeles Riots in April by supplying 2 full platoons of sworn personnel to the affected areas. Included in those personnel were 61 newly sworn Deputy Sheriffs who had, only hours earlier, graduated from the Academy as members of class #279.

Training Bureau personnel, in conjunction with other Department personnel, developed a training course in Cultural Diversity. The course was presented to recruit classes in a 32 hour block of instruction, and serves as the basis for a facilitator instruction workshop to train facilitators, who will in turn present training to all Department personnel during the coming year.

Recruit Training Unit: This year, the Recruitment/Pre-Employment Unit tested 824 applicants for the position of Deputy Sheriff Trainee. Of those, 407 went through the background investigation and only 24 were hired. Since the Department ceased hiring Deputy Sheriff Trainees in mid-1992, a total of 220 applicants who were approved for hire could not be offered positions.

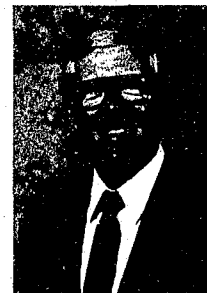
For the first time in the Department's history, the Recruit Training Unit conducted a basic Academy class exclusively for participating agency recruits. On October 20, 1992, class #281 began with 26 recruits from 12 different city police agencies within Los Angeles County.

In 1992, the Recruit Training Unit conducted four Academy classes. A total of 272 graduates successfully completed Academy training, including five graduates who were not affiliated with any department during their training.

Advanced Training Unit: The Advanced Training Unit has six specific training sections along with a centralized Operations Unit. The Weapons Training units include Biscailuz Center Range and Laser Village, in addition to the All-Purpose Ranges at the Pitchess Honor Rancho. The Emergency Vehicle Operations Center is located in Pomona on the Fairplex facility. The remaining units; Advanced Officer Training, Civilian Training, Computer Training Center, Media Resources and Operations are at STARS Center.

Over 300 Advanced Officer Training courses were conducted during 1992, lasting in length from 8 to 16-hour refresher courses to 40 or 80-hour courses. A total of 7,606 LASD personnel and 1,169 outside agency personnel participated in these training courses. A total of \$499,433 in POST (Peace Officers' Standards and Training) revenue was generated to support these training programs.

The standard Advanced Officer courses such as Patrol School, PR-24, Defensive Tactics, Instructor Update, Sergeant Supervisory School, Traffic Instruction, Drug Abuse Recognition Training, and



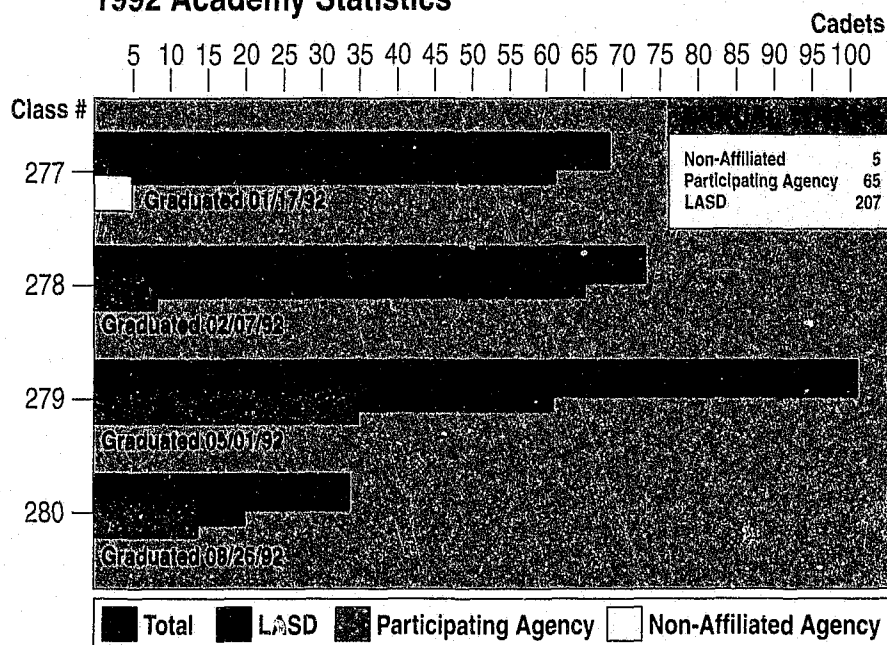

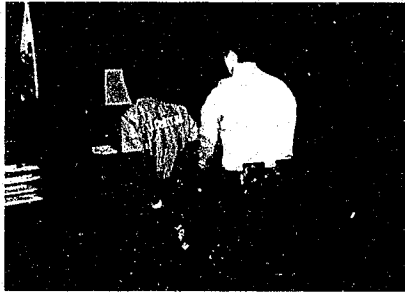
Four-Wheel Drive Training had participation of 2,520 students from LASD and 509 students from outside agencies. Seven mobile shooting ranges were in full operation during the year accommodating 43,063 qualification courses. In addition, 41,101 qualification courses were shot at the Biscailuz and Pitchess Honor Rancho ranges. Several specialized weapons training courses were developed, including three courses at Laser Village. Two of the Laser Village courses utilize the ICAT Apogee System, an interactive video for "shoot/don't shoot" training. A total of 2,180 LASD students and 133 outside agency students participated in Laser Village Training.

With the continuing automation of Department procedures, the Advanced Training Unit offered Wordperfect and other computer training which had participation of 1,120 LASD personnel and 104 outside agency personnel.

The Emergency Vehicle Operations Center (EVOC) in Pomona, conducted basic and advanced driving courses in addition to extensive vehicle and tire testing for the Department. A total of 1,036 LASD students and 403 outside agency students were trained at the EVOC course. The EVOC staff has the distinction of training instructors from other agencies in the State and the country. During September, 1992, as in previous years, the EVOC staff moved to Fox Field in Lancaster where they trained LASD personnel from North County facilities in addition to personnel from Kern County agencies.

1992 Academy Statistics

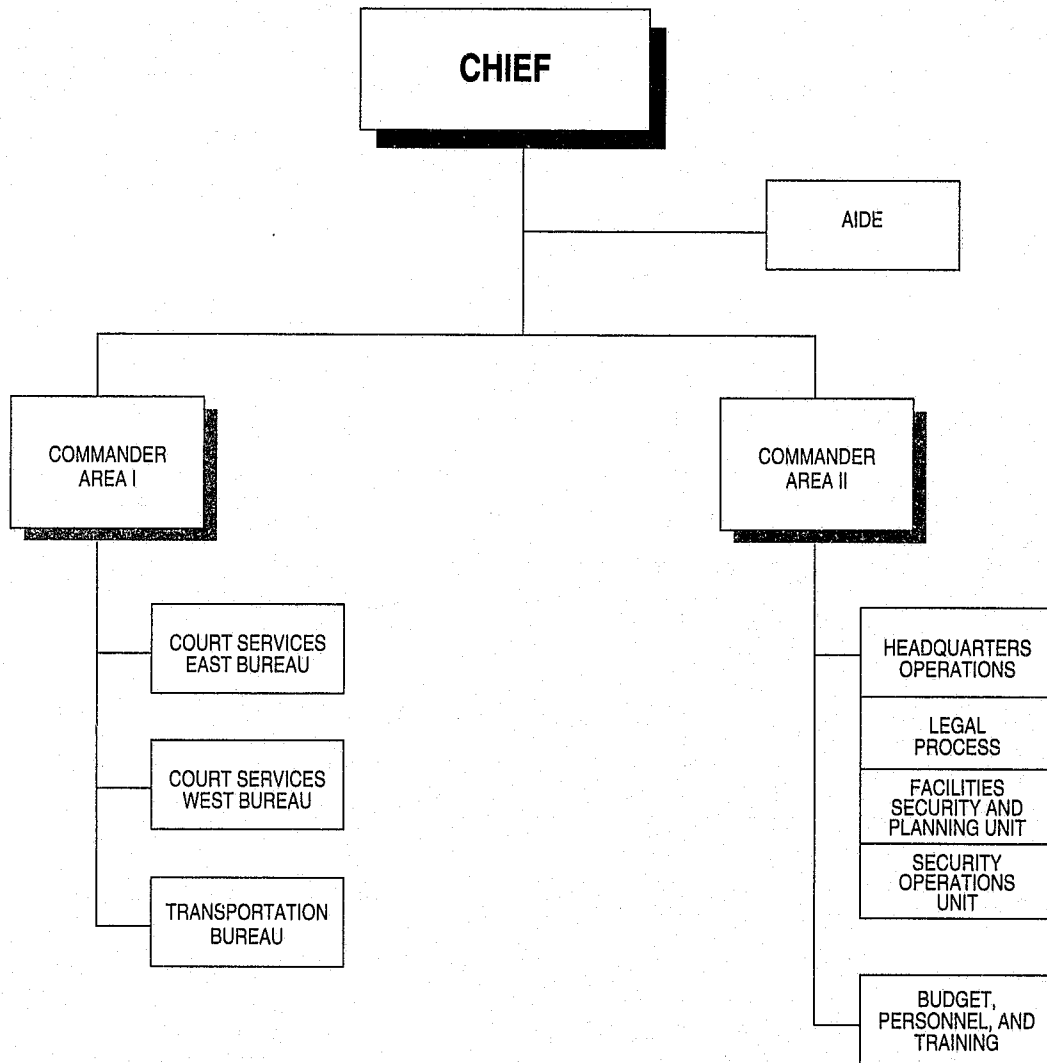

COURT SERVICES DIVISION

This Division is responsible for carrying out the duties of the Sheriff as the Chief Ministerial Officer of the Superior Court of the County of Los Angeles by serving and enforcing civil and criminal processes submitted to them by the courts, attorneys and litigants, and by providing bailiffs to the Superior and justice courts. The Division is comprised of East, West, and Transportation Bureaus and the Headquarters Unit.

Court Services East Bureau

East Bureau provides services to the following courts: Criminal Courts Building, Avalon, Compton, Eastlake, Juvenile Justice Court, Long Beach, Los Padriños, Mental Health, Norwalk, Pomona, Central Jail Arraignment Court and the new Edmund D. Edelman Children's Court. The Bureau is also responsible for the custody of prisoners at these facilities and 12 Municipal Court lockups.

Beginning in July, all Los Angeles County child dependency hearings are heard at the new Children's Court in Monterey Park. This 25-courtroom facility is the nation's first child oriented courthouse.

During the April Civil Disturbance, East Bureau provided a platoon to assist the city of South Gate in protecting the city's retail and commercial areas.

East Bureau experienced, or anticipates, expansion at several courthouses:

- Pomona Courts: The Pomona Superior Courthouse Phase III renovation is complete. Three courtrooms, a lockup addition, and a women's locker room are operational. The Municipal Courthouse addition is nearing completion. Two courtrooms and two new lockups with amenities for deputies will be completed in early 1993.
- Criminal Courts Building: Ten high security courtrooms are under construction and will be finished in early 1993.

Court Services West Bureau

West Bureau provides services to the following courts: Antelope Valley, Burbank, Central Civil West, Glendale, Inglewood, North Valley, Pasadena, Santa Monica, Sylmar, Torrance, Van Nuys, and the County Courthouse. The Bureau is also responsible for the custody of prisoners at these facilities and nine Municipal Court lockups.

During the April riot, West Bureau provided a platoon to assist Firestone Station in protecting retail and commercial areas. Personnel were also provided to assist Carson Station in protecting the Carson Mall from looters.

West Bureau experienced, or anticipates, expansions at several courthouses:

- Burbank Courthouse: Plans for a new wing containing two courtrooms and a main lockup are complete. Construction will start soon and will be completed in 1993.
- Los Angeles Municipal Court District: Two new Municipal Courthouses and a major renovation is being planned on the west side of the district. A total of 46 courtrooms and three main lockups will be built at three locations in Chatsworth, West Los Angeles, and near Los Angeles International Airports. The courts will be open between 1994 and 1996.

- Van Nuys Superior Courthouse: The first phase of renovation is finished. The final phase, including a major lockup renovation, will be completed by mid-1993.
- North Hollywood Superior Courthouse: Plans to construct a new 15 Courtroom Superior Courthouse have begun. The completion date is scheduled for mid-1996.

Transportation Bureau

The Department's fleet of buses stands at 76, of which 56 are MCI's. The Bureau fleet also includes 17 vans and 9 radio cars.

The daily average volume of inmates transported to court in 1992 was 2,560. Of this total, the North County operation, located at Pitchess Honor Rancho, transports an average of 593 inmates to court each day. In addition, Transportation Bureau's Statewide Detail transported a total of 46,094 inmates to and from State facilities throughout California.

During 1992, Transportation Bureau transported a total of 2,001,973 prisoners and logged 2,718,565 miles.

Headquarters Unit

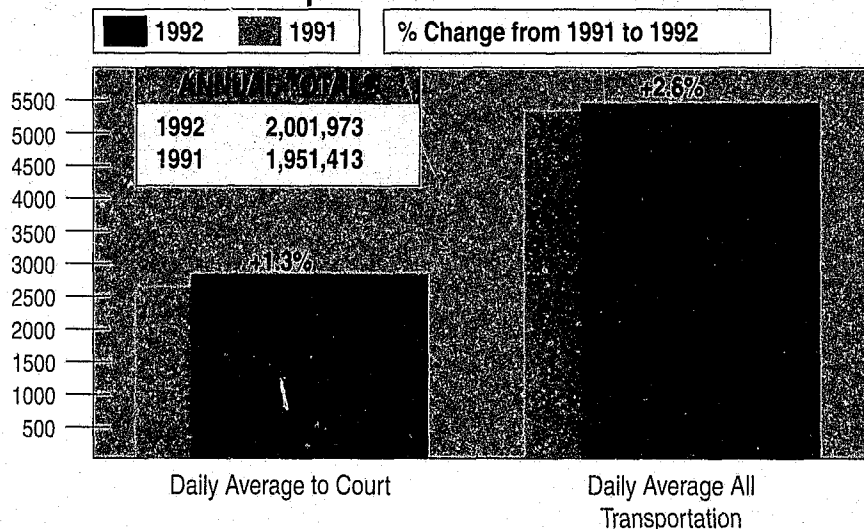
The Headquarters Unit is composed of the Process Detail, Security Operations Unit, and the Facilities Security and Planning Detail.

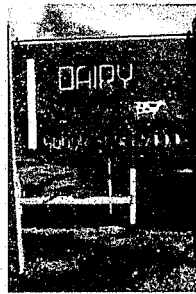
The Division is responsible for serving a variety of subpoenas and civil processes throughout the County. Along with the Headquarters Unit, the ten branch offices handled over 128,000 processes. As a result, over \$19.8 million in court-ordered collections were made and over \$700,000 in service fees were received.

The Security Operations Unit, instituted in September 1990, was significantly reduced because of Department-wide budget curtailments. This Unit deals with special security operations for the Division, as well as providing security for the Board of Supervisors. Their duties include: threat assessments, intelligence gathering, responding to disturbances involving the Board of Supervisors, providing dignitary protection, investigating threats against Superior Court Judges, and assisting in high profile/security trials.

Budgetary curtailments also affected the Facilities Planning Detail. This detail was curtailed completely. Prior to curtailment this Detail coordinated 20 new courthouse construction or renovation projects throughout the County. Fiscal Services Bureau assumed responsibility for coordinating the Department's interest in courthouse construction projects. Also prior to these curtailments, the Headquarters Unit provided a platoon to assist Huntington Park Police Department in policing their City during the April Riot.

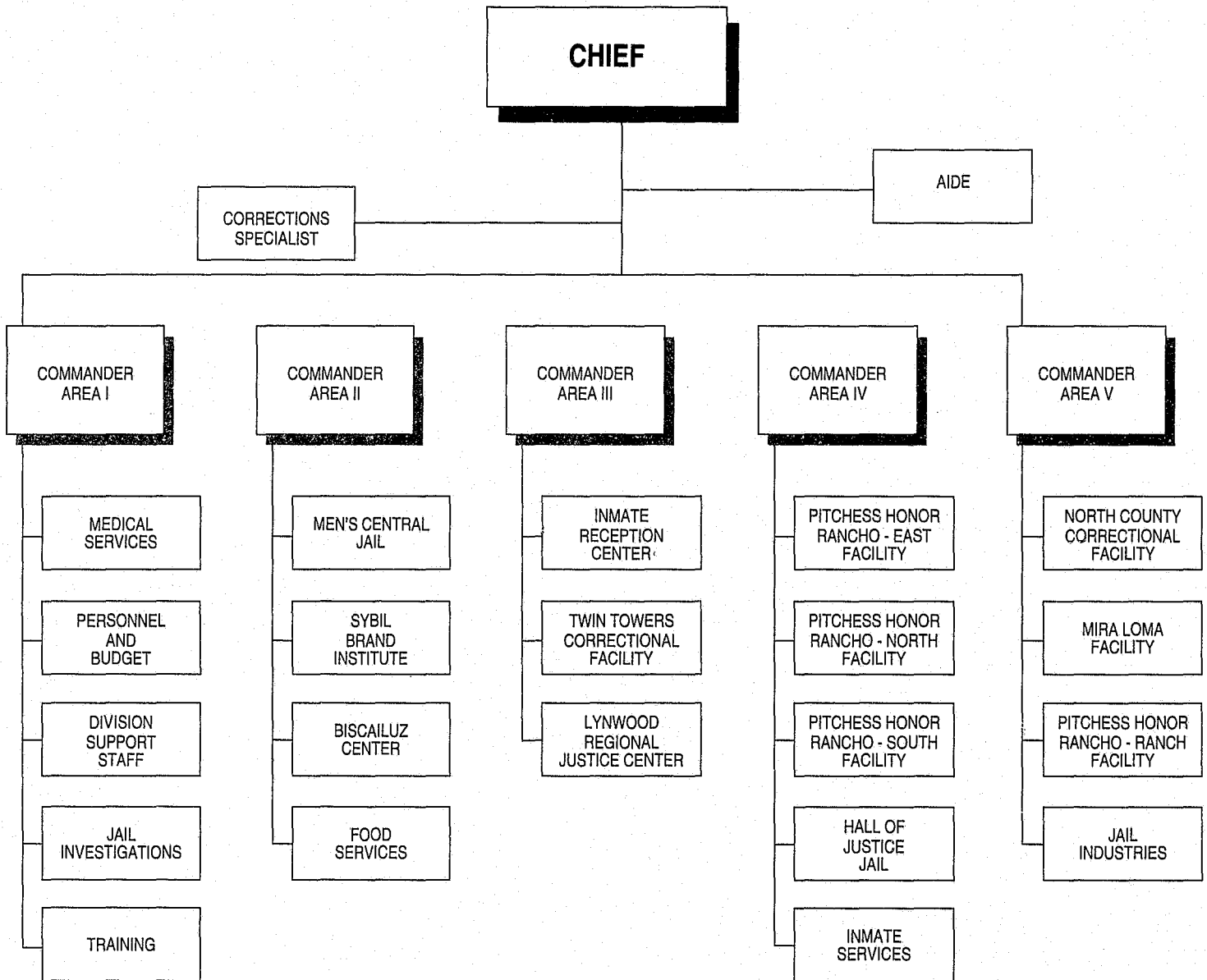

Custody Division is responsible for the operation of the County's jail system and for the custody, security, rehabilitation, and care of all sentenced and pretrial inmates held in Sheriff's custody facilities. The 11 custody facilities include: Inmate Reception Center (IRC); Men's Central Jail (MCJ); Sybil Brand Institute for Women (SBI); Pitchess Honor Rancho Facilities (PHR); East, Ranch, North, South, and North County Correctional Facility (NCCF); Mira Loma Facility, Biscailuz Center (BC); and the Hall of Justice Jail.

Jail Overcrowding Measures

The United States District Court Order regulating jail overcrowding, issued on May 24, 1988, is still in effect. This order requires the Sheriff to manage the inmate population so no facility exceeds the maximum permanent inmate capacity previously approved by the Court.

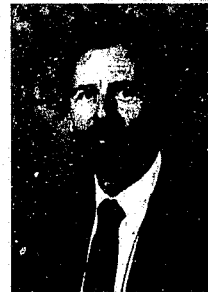
Jail Population Reduction Programs The following programs are currently utilized by the Criminal Justice System to relieve jail overcrowding.

- **Accelerated Preliminary Hearing:** A program was initiated in which inmates have a preliminary hearing within five days of arraignment, rather than 15 days.
- **Emergency Citation Release:** By authority of a Federal Court Order, this program provides for the citation release of misdemeanor bookings and/or remands with an aggregate bail amount of \$7,500 or less, or an aggregate warrant bail of \$500 or less. Under this program, citation releases were issued to 199,938 inmates from May 27, 1988 through December 31, 1992.
- **Early/Percentage Release Programs:** This program was implemented to ensure all inmates serve proportionate sentences. Through October 27, 1992, approximately 357,057 inmates have been released under this program. Up to this date, inmates have been released after serving 65% of their sentence. As of October 28, 1992, inmates are released after serving 60% of their sentence. Under this 60% program 14,522 inmates have been released through December 31st. This percentage is calculated after subtraction of all State mandated credits.

Jail Construction Projects

There are currently two jail construction projects which will add over 3,500 beds to the jail system at a cost of approximately \$490 million.

Lynwood Regional Justice Center: This facility will be the first regional jail. Scheduled to open in early 1994, this jail will provide 1,014 beds in a primarily direct supervision facility. The facility will include preliminary and arraignment courtrooms, as well as a Sheriff's sub-station. The total cost for the project is \$194 million, with the jail accounting for \$118 million.

Twin Towers Project Correctional Facility: This facility includes a new intake and reception center, a 200-bed Correctional Treatment Center, 2,216 maximum security beds, and 96 disciplinary cells, for a total capacity of 2,512. Scheduled for completion in October 1994, the total cost of this facility is projected at \$373 million.

Biscailuz Center's Mental Health Program

This innovative new program opened at Biscailuz Center in March. The basis for, and intricacies of this program appears in the highlighted section (see page 78).

Medical Services

Medical Services is responsible for providing and coordinating health care services to the more than 20,000 inmates remanded to the care of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Public health, outpatient, inpatient, and emergency care services are provided at 11 facilities in six locations throughout the County. Medical Service provided a total of 232 hospital beds for males, 28 hospital beds for females, 38 infirmary beds, three 24-hour clinics and four 16-hour clinics. This is all accomplished by a staff of 492 full-time employees.

Nursing Services: Nursing Services is comprised of: emergency care, medication administration, communicable disease control, suicide prevention, and health education. This year Nursing Services conducted studies in early detection of health problems and inpatient acuity. The Nursing Quality Assurance program was expanded to provide monitoring and improvement of care issues unique to each inpatient unit.

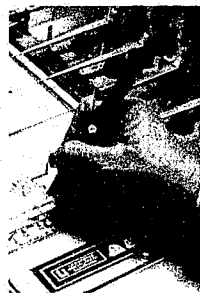
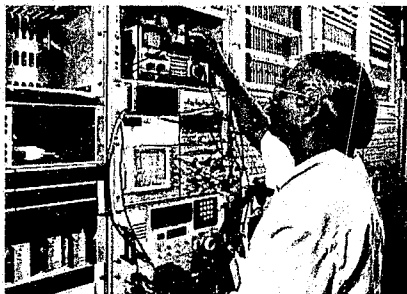
Professional Staff Association: The Professional Staff Association (PSA) is comprised of physicians, dentists, and support personnel who provide health care for the inmate population. PSA's significant accomplishments for 1992, include the initiation of *PSA Today* (association newsletter), publication of three journal articles, presentation of a research paper in Chicago, and sponsorship of the Second Annual PSA Medical Education Conference in San Diego.

Medical Support Services: Providing health care requires diverse specialty services and technical support. For example, Medical Records opens from 200 to 300 new records every day. Every month Dietetic Services checks 15,300 modified diets and 18,000 regular diets for the inpatient area alone. Over 60,000 diagnostic tests were done monthly in our laboratory. Pharmacy Services provided 2,448 unit dosages per day to patients in the hospital area. Radiology Services performed 177,417 routine examinations and special procedures last year.

The Administrative Financial Services developed, implemented, and monitored the various private contracts utilized by Medical Services. This unit is also responsible for establishing fiscal controls and developing the unit's budget allocation. Materials Management supports the entire unit through the procurement of needed equipment and supplies. They are responsible for monitoring the preventive maintenance activities throughout our facilities. Staff training and inservice are coordinated through Staff Development. Responsible for the maintenance of the 500 employee files is Medical Services' own Personnel/Payroll unit. Overseeing the environmental cleanliness of the hospital areas in both Central Jail and Sybil Brand Institute are the General Services personnel assigned to Medical Services.

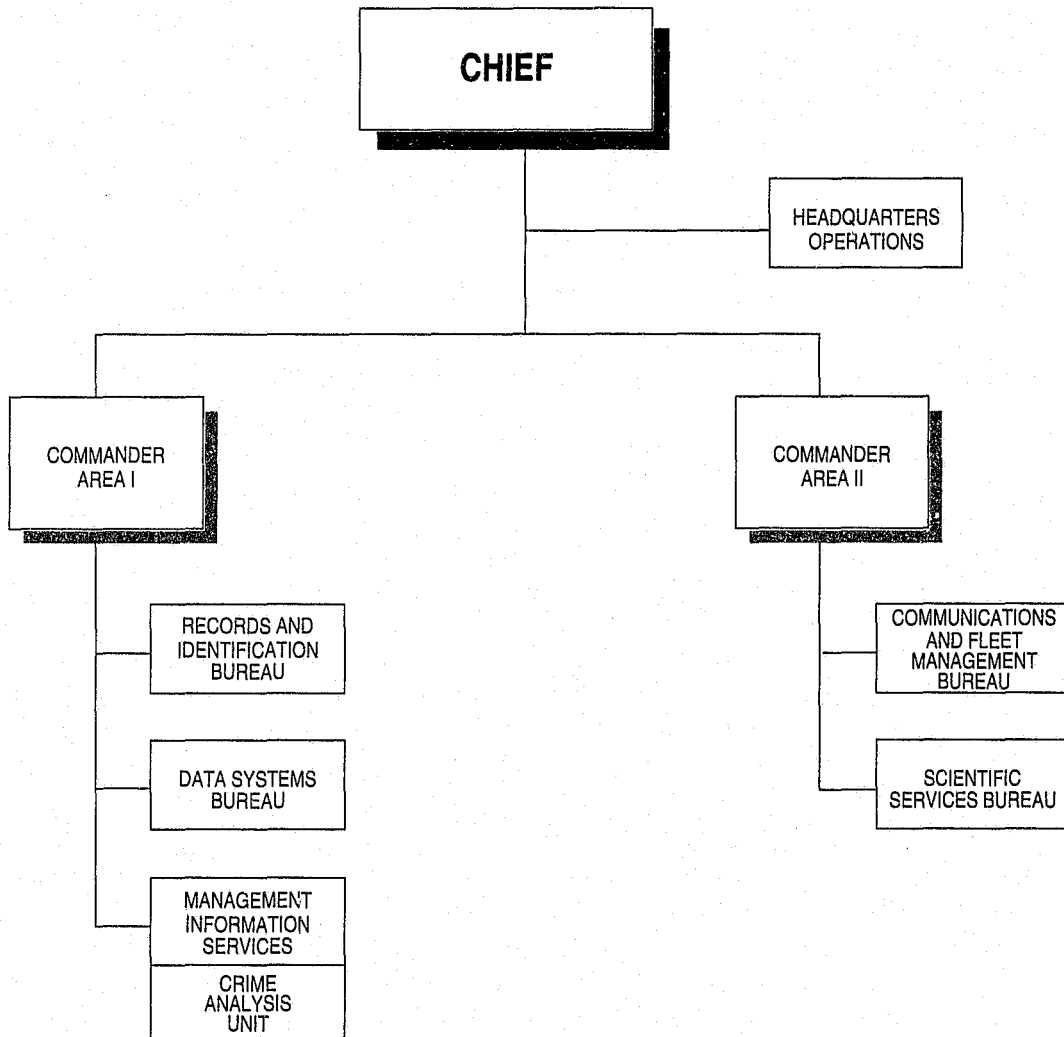
As we move closer to the 21st Century, Medical Services and Custody personnel will continue to meet the challenges and demands of those in need of medical care.

TECHNICAL SERVICES DIVISION ORGANIZATION



TECHNICAL SERVICES DIVISION

Technical Services Division is comprised of Communications and Fleet Management, Data Systems, Records and Identification, and Scientific Services Bureaus as well as Management Information Services. The Division maintains the automated system for timekeeping and personnel information, provides communications and fleet services, Countywide criminal justice data systems applications, statistical information, record keeping, warrant and identification services, and scientific/criminalistic services.

Communications and Fleet Management Bureau

The Communications and Fleet Management Bureau provides quality communications and appropriate vehicles in a cost-effective manner to support operations of the Department.

Fleet Management: During the months of July, November, and December, the Fleet Operations Unit conducted tests of 1993 model vehicles to evaluate their performance and durability. Testing procedures are nationally recognized as the standard for accepting law enforcement vehicles.

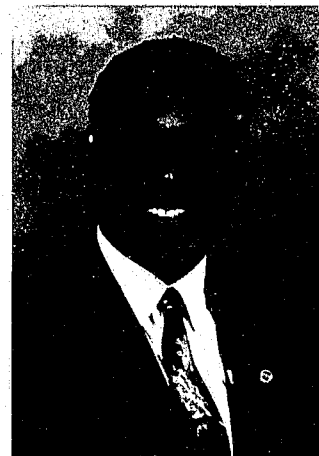
- Participated in the Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Dispatcher Course Curriculum Update Committee and the Dispatcher Test Committee. These committees standardized performance tests which

help identify candidates who possess the abilities required in the specialized field of dispatching.

- Provided off-site training of the Mutual Aid Communications System to participating Los Angeles County law enforcement agencies.
- Administered entry level classroom instruction to novice communication operators and provided in-service training for experienced operators.

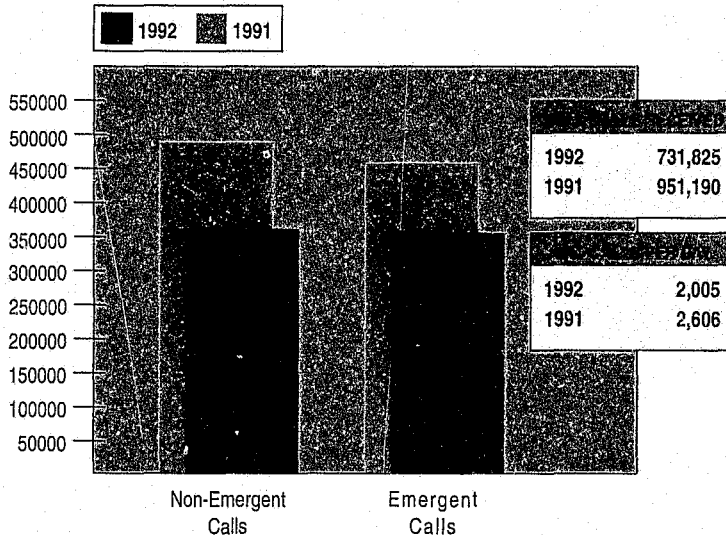
Systems Maintenance

- Maintained the equipment and software that processed approximately 1,050,000 data transactions per day without any major failures. This was a 24% increase over the 810,000 per day average in 1991.
- Maintained the Department's 3,300 portable radios; 1,300 mobile radios; 1,100 mobile digital terminals; 38 radio receiver/transmitter sites; radio and computer-aided dispatch equipment at all stations and bureaus; and all communications equipment at the Sheriff's Communications Center.
- Coordinated all movement, replacement and expansion of the Department's 7,600 line telephone system. Ongoing or new projects included the following: Lynwood Regional Justice Center, Twin Towers Correctional Facility, County Emergency Operations Center, Sheriff's Administrative Headquarters, and the remodeling of Industry and Temple Stations.
- The Stolen Vehicle Recovery Systems (LoJack and Teletrac) have assisted the Department in recovering 55 stolen vehicles since the systems were activated two years ago. LoJack has approximately 32,000 units installed in customers vehicles, while Teletrac has approximately 4,000.

Data Systems Bureau

This year necessary funding issues called for the suspension of three major development projects and a complete reorganization of the Bureau to provide a sufficient number of personnel to concentrate on the remaining prioritized projects. Projects suspended included the following:

The reorganization of Data Systems Bureau staff enabled maintenance of existing systems to continue and also to provide the opportunity to develop priority projects:

Office of Professional and Ethical Standards (OPES) and the Sheriff's Early Warning System (EWS):

The OPESII/EWS Project is a database and decision support computer application development effort. The OPES component will capture and manage data for all administrative investigations, civil lit-

igations, discovery, service comments, use of force, and deputy involved shootings. When completed, the system will use an integrated, relational database environment. It will provide data entry to be decentralized at patrol stations and custody facilities. The management of data will be centralized at OPES Headquarters. Unit commanders and authorized personnel at these decentralized locations will have information access and query capabilities. The EWS component of the OPESII/EWS project will allow LASD executives, management, and authorized staff to perform a wide range of database and decision support operations in an easy to use, graphic, icon-driven information processing environment. OPES I is featured by Data Systems Bureau in highlighted units (see page 80).

Sheriff's Information Network and Infrastructure (SINAI): The SINAI Project will define user requirements and implement a basic suite of office automation solutions for Department executives and their support units. The staffing of this unit is comprised of a Work Group Rollout Team, an Office Automation Group, and a Quality Assurance component. The Work Group Rollout Team is responsible for analyzing, assembling, and installing a standardized suite of office automation tools for the Office of the Sheriff, Undersheriff, Assistant Sheriffs, Division Chiefs, and Commanders. The Office Automation Team is responsible for analyzing, designing, and maintaining office automation tools that will evolve over time to include electronic mail, document processing and management, spreadsheet, calendaring, and scheduling for Department executives, their staff, and support units. The Quality Assurance Team is responsible for ensuring the software solutions implemented in the area of Office Automation and the Work Group Rollout meet the quality standards and measurements for all work to be performed in the SINAI Project.

Automated Timekeeping and Personnel System (ATPS)/Countywide Timekeeping and Personnel Payroll System (CWTAPPS):

The scope of the ATPS/CWTAPPS interface is four-fold: one, to clarify and validate the functional impact of changes brought about by the implementation of CWTAPPS Phase II upon ATPS and upon the Sheriff's Department; two, to identify alternatives, manual, automated, or otherwise, to address these changes; three, to evaluate these alternatives and to identify the most suitable course of action, and, four, to design, code, test, and implement any required ATPS modifications in order to provide a viable timekeeping interface.

New/Regional Allocation of Police Services (New/RAPS): The scope of this project is to develop a RAPS database using the Oracle Relational Database Management software to produce a production-ready system. The system will migrate from the existing non-relational platform to a relational,

open systems environment. The timeliness and accessibility of RAPS information will be improved by providing the ability for ad hoc reports and localized processing of downloaded data. The quality of RAPS information will be improved by enhancing the presentation and analytical value of the information.

Mainframe Systems Support Unit (MSS): Staffing of the Mainframe Systems Support Unit enables computer maintenance for five major Sheriff's systems. The systems include the Automated Justice Information System, Event Index, Countywide Warrant System, Personal History Index, and Civil Process Accounting System.

Network Administration and Technical Support (NATS): This section was organized to support newly developed systems within the Department, such as the OPESII/EWS, SINAI, and various local and wide area networks being set in place throughout the Department. This support includes networking coordination and development, systems and database administration, systems security, user assistance (Help Desk), and training in both computer familiarization and software applications. Hardware and software installation of NeXT workstations and network configuration was completed throughout the Technical Services Division, Civil Litigation Unit, Internal Affairs Bureau, and Offices of the Sheriff, Undersheriff, and Assistant Sheriffs. A Help Desk was established to assist users with the new NeXT workstations.

Management Information Services

Management Information Services (MIS) is assigned to Technical Services Division Headquarters. Established in the Fall of 1990, MIS includes the Statistics Unit, the Headquarters Crime Analysis Program, a Technical Unit, and Operations Unit. Hit heavily by this year's budget curtailments, MIS lost almost 30% of its funded items.

Statistics Unit: The Statistics Unit is responsible for gathering, verifying, and maintaining all criminal, noncriminal, and arrest statistics for the Department. The Unit is tasked with the timely analysis and distribution of this data in the Sheriff's *Monthly Statistical Report* and the annual *Year In Review* publication. The Statistics Unit liaisons with the State's Bureau of Criminal Statistics to provide all required statistics. Additionally, the staff processes all requests for statistics which includes media, public, subpoena and Departmental requests. This year, the Unit processed 405 requests for information.

Crime Analysis: The Crime Analysis Program was established in 1985, to support patrol and detective personnel by identifying crime trends, patterns, series, and possible suspects. Currently, the headquarters office coordinates and functionally supervises 19 crime analysis units located throughout the County staffed with a total of 20 crime analysts. Recent budget curtailments resulted in the loss of five budgeted items, reassignment of three analysts, and the elimination of four crime analysis units: Lennox Station, Marina del Rey Station, Metro Vice Bureau, and Pico Rivera Station. In spite of these curtailments, Unit performance was outstanding in 1992, as evidenced by the table listing assistance provided to patrol stations and select Detective Division bureaus.

Additionally, the Crime Analysis Headquarters Unit implemented a monthly newsletter for all crime analysts and unit supervisors; introduced a unit staffing model; implemented an automated Crime Analysis Unit Monthly Report system; and prepared a five year status report outlining the Program's accomplishments and challenges.

Technical Unit: The Technical Unit is responsible for providing mainframe and microcomputer support to the MIS staff. A desktop publishing function was added to create professional statistical reports, newsletters, and training manuals.

Operations: The Operations Unit is responsible for the Event Index System, reporting districts, ORI's (Originating Agency Identifier), and statistical codes. The Unit's primary task is to manage end-user requests for system enhancements and corrections. This Unit is also tasked with monitoring stations' and bureaus' compliance with the Policy and Procedures Manual requirements for processing crime report data.

Records and Identification Bureau

Records and Identification Bureau is responsible for the collection, input, and storage of most documentary and electronic records; retrieval of records; and the production of information based upon these records. Records and Identification Bureau is also the proprietor of the Los Angeles County Regional Identification System, a component of the Statewide CAL-ID system, the Countywide Warrant System (CWS), and the Personal History Index (PHI) component of the Automated Index.

CAL-ID System: The County's CAL-ID System database of fingerprint records exceeds 2.17 million, with approximately 10,000 new fingerprint records added monthly. A total of 6,581 latent fingerprint cold-search hits were made since the system became operational in December, 1987. The system software was upgraded to allow direct access to the fingerprint databases of the various Full Use Access Agencies within California as well as those states belonging to the Western Identification Network (Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, and Nevada). System users now have direct access to those agencies' databases when conducting ten-print or latent searches.

CAL-ID Live-Scan: Records and Identification Bureau staff, with the assistance of Internal Services Department, is in the final stages of a local procurement for an integrated network of live-scan booking terminals.

Countywide Warrant System: The Countywide Warrant System (CWS) currently contains 1,990,882 Los Angeles County Municipal and Superior Court warrants. Approximately 504,848 (25%) of these warrants are the result of criminal filings by the Sheriff's Department.

Scientific Services Bureau

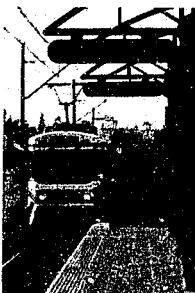
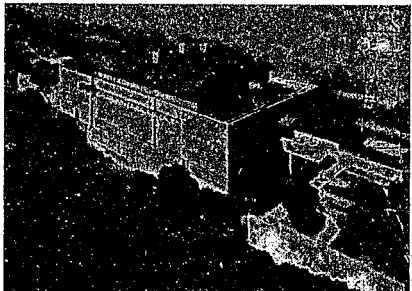
The Scientific Services Bureau is a modern, highly sophisticated crime laboratory which applies new technological advancements to support investigations for the Sheriff's Department, independent police agencies and other elements of the criminal justice system throughout Los Angeles County. The Bureau provides a full range of forensic science services including: the identification, collection, preservation, and analysis of physical evidence; photographic services; firearm and toolmark identification; polygraph examinations; collection and identification of fingerprint evidence; and questioned document examinations.

The value of properly collected and preserved evidence examined by a trained analyst is crucial in criminal investigation. Forensic science work has become an essential tool used by the criminal justice system in both routine and noteworthy cases. This year Scientific Services Bureau was involved in the following:

Intoximeter 3000: The new Intoximeter 3000 breath testing instrument is deployed at 65 locations within Los Angeles County. Each instrument is connected via a telephone modem to a centralized computer at the Crime Lab. The computer permits remote monitoring of test results, data collection, and diagnosis of instrument malfunctions. An extensive training program is ongoing to ensure deputies and police officers are trained in the proper operation of this instrument.

DNA Program Development: In January, Scientific Services Bureau received approval to purchase equipment, lease laboratory space, and receive training from the staff at the USC Medical Center towards the goal of initiating a DNA genetic testing program. This powerful new technique is capable of identifying individuals from their body fluids and tissues by the analysis of the genetic materials present. A rigorous validation of procedures and population studies are currently in progress before casework can begin.

Scientific Services Bureau's Toxicology Section is one of the highlighted units for Technical Services Division (see page 81).

COMMERCIAL CRIMES BUREAU

Commercial Crimes Bureau consists of three details responsible for the investigation of cases involving arson/explosives, forgery/fraud, and vehicle/metal theft.

Arson/Explosives Detail

The Arson/Explosives Detail is responsible for investigating the cause and origin of all fires with a value loss over \$1,500 as well as those fires which are deliberately set. It also investigates and renders safe explosive devices.

Major Investigations: The Detail was busy this year investigating 145 riot related arson fires which totaled a monetary loss of nearly \$30 million. In addition, the Detail is the lead investigative agency in a task force conducting a reevaluation of approximately 2,000 arson investigations in the Southern California area, over the past eight years, to determine if they were set by Glendale Fire Captain John Orr.

Arrests: The Detail was involved in many notable arrests during the year including: the arrest of a major fireworks distributor with over 40,000 pounds of illegal fireworks; a member of a Cuban paramilitary group with five pounds of C-4 military explosives; three teenagers, in two separate incidents, who set fire to Valinda Elementary School and Agoura High School, with a total loss of \$900,000; and a teenager who set 16 arson fires over a 13-month period in a La Mirada neighborhood.

Training: During the year, the Detail was instrumental in improving training for our personnel and those of outside agencies. The Detail was recognized nationally for being the first California agency to host an FBI Bomb Technician Recertification Class.

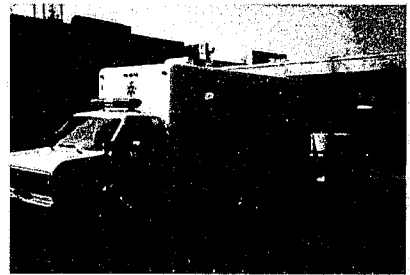
Equipment: The Detail obtained and refurbished a Special Enforcement Bureau roll-out truck that had been turned over to Fleet Management for salvage. The truck is now used as a combination bomb/robot response vehicle. This new combination vehicle eliminates responding two bomb trucks to explosives related incidents in Los Angeles County, thereby improving response time.

Render Safe: This year, bomb technicians from the Arson/Explosives Detail responded throughout Los Angeles County to over 400 explosive related incidents. Over half of these responses were to investigate and render safe suspected explosive devices or actual bombs. To accomplish their mission, the technicians used a variety of equipment, including disrupters, robots, X-rays, bomb suits, and, on occasion, high explosives. The bottom photograph depicts an incident in Santa Monica where a disrupter was used to render safe a suspicious package. The photo was taken at the time the disrupter device detonated and the package contained only video cassettes.

Forgery/Fraud Detail

The Forgery/Fraud Detail is responsible for investigating frauds reported to the Department as well as the forgery of credit cards, checks, prescriptions, and other documents. The number of forgeries and frauds exploded in recent years with a 116 percent increase since 1988.

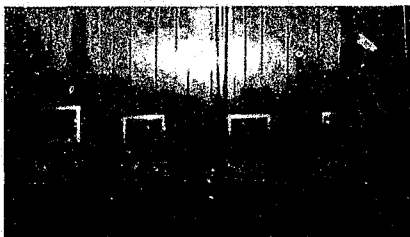
Automated Commercial Crimes Information System: In March, the LASO (Los Angeles Sheriff's Office) Foundation provided funds to develop the second phase of the Automated Commercial Crimes Information System (ACCIS) project. This system, which provides a central database for all

forgeries and frauds reported to the Department, is currently on-line and operational. Once the system is completed, ACCIS staff members will begin the process of expanding it to include other law enforcement agencies throughout the County. The system gives detectives a valuable investigative tool, provides case status and tracking for supervisors, and supplies management information for the Bureau's administration.

Investigative Information Center: In July, a new building was placed in service at the STARS Center designed to house the Computer Crimes Unit and the Division's Investigative Information Center. Currently, this modular structure houses a vast array of specialized computer equipment used by the two computer crimes investigators assigned to that unit. The ACCIS system is also located in this building, with future plans for the addition of many other systems. When complete, the Investigative Information Center will provide a central location wherein investigators will be able to quickly access a wide variety of investigative information.

Vehicle/Metal Theft Detail

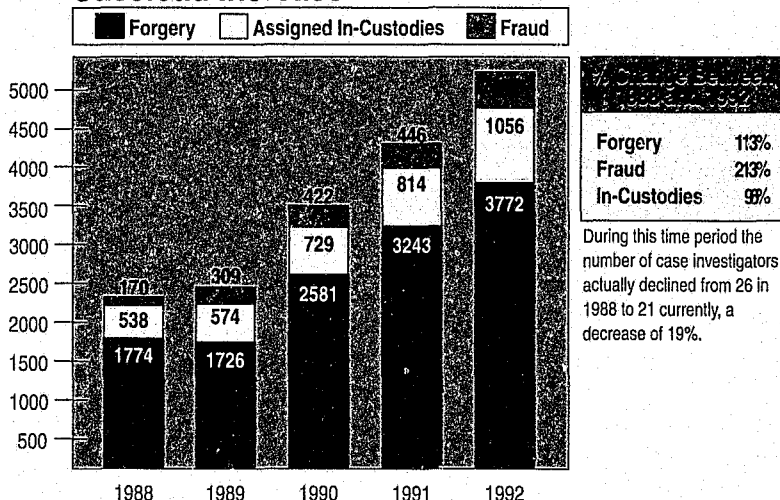
This Detail is responsible for the identification of vehicles with altered or missing identification numbers (VIN's). In addition, the Detail investigates thefts of heavy duty commercial and construction vehicles/equipment and inspects tow yards, repair shops, dismantlers, and metal and wrecking yards. The Detail also investigates major vehicle theft networks and rings.

Major Investigation: Vehicle/Metal Theft Detail detectives completed a six-month investigation concerning the theft and possession of high value Porsche automobiles and related vehicle parts. The investigation centered on East Los Angeles repair shops involved with auto theft networks. Twenty vehicles were identified and seized. Felony charges were filed on all suspects. In addition to a myriad of stolen vehicle parts, seven complete vehicles were recovered and six additional vehicles were ordered forfeited in civil proceedings.

Vehicle Theft Program: The Detail developed a Countywide multijurisdiction vehicle theft curtailment program. The program provides a regional multi-agency infrastructure that enhances law enforcement's capacity to deter, investigate, and prosecute vehicle theft crimes. The program is funded through a one dollar annual vehicle registration fee authorized by SB 2139, which will begin enforcement in May 1993.

Border Interdiction: It is estimated over 20,000 stolen vehicles are transported across our southern border into Mexico each year. Vehicle theft detectives joined with the California Highway Patrol, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Customs, the Arizona Department of Public Safety, Texas authorities, and others, in a multi-agency interdiction effort along the Mexican border. A total of 59 stolen vehicles were recovered in a two-day effort that also resulted in the arrest of 30 suspects. An additional 60 suspects were arrested for drug and other offenses. Contraband seized included 260 pounds of marijuana, 23 pounds of cocaine, six drug seizure vehicles, six illegal weapons, and \$13,000 in cash. Ninety-six illegal aliens were returned to Mexico.

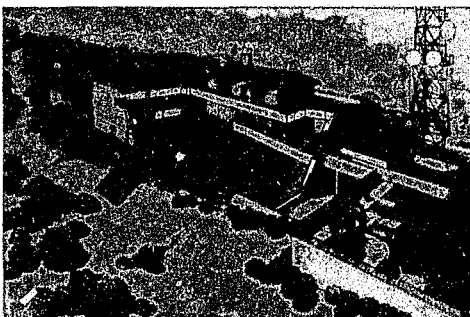
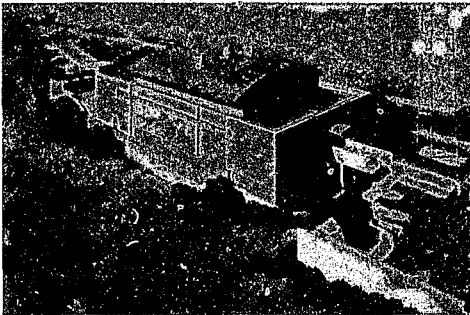


EMERGENCY OPERATIONS BUREAU


The Emergency Operations Bureau's (EOB's) responsibilities include strategic planning for emergencies; tactical planning for major Departmental events and governmental agencies; maintenance of the Department and County Emergency Operations Center (EOC); coordination of disaster preparedness plans and disaster preparedness training. The significant accomplishments for 1992 included:

- Mutual Aid coordination and training.
- Coordinating pre-riot conferences. For a period of six weeks prior to the rioting, EOB hosted meetings attended by Department executives in preparation for civil disturbance.
- Activating the EOC and coordinating the platoon assignments of over 7,000 Department personnel during the LA Riot.
- Providing a team liaison to Beverly Hills Police Department and coordinating the response to the Gay Rights demonstrations in West Hollywood and Beverly Hills.
- Activating the Department EOC and coordinating the Department's response to flooding as a result of the heavy rains and mud slides throughout the year.
- Writing the operations plan, staffing, and managing over 700 Department personnel in troubleshooting, security, and transportation of the ballots for the June Primary and November General Elections.
- Writing the operations plan, staffing, and managing personnel assigned to the Gay Pride Parade in June.

- Responding to the Landers and subsequent Big Bear earthquakes. This involved the mobilization of Departmental personnel to operate the Department EOC and provide damage assessment for the County of Los Angeles. Due to the heightened state of awareness, EOB personnel also responded to the Landers area for an on-site assessment.
- Writing an operations plan, staffing, and managing over 800 Departmental personnel during the Annual Tournament of Roses Parade. Additionally, due to intelligence information, EOB staff was instrumental in making seven arrests of animal rights activists who attempted to disrupt the parade.
- A generic form of EOP 1-7 (Incident Command System) was written to accommodate law enforcement agencies in the Southern California area and provide a more unified, cohesive operational format in the event of mutual aid operations. However, this concept is now being utilized by law enforcement agencies throughout the United States. Assistant Sheriff Harper and Lieutenants Odenthal and Beene, as representatives of the Department, have made numerous presentations on this topic throughout the United States.
- Other responses by EOB include equipment response to a plane crash in Altadena and a plane crash in Rosemead. The logistics staff responded on numerous occasions throughout the year assisting the jails due to a power outage, assisting Homicide by providing lighting for crime scene investigations and assisting GET (Gang Enforcement Team) and OSS (Operation Safe Street) on a variety of warrant services.
- The County's new EOC building is a unique project that has already received local, State, and national attention from emergency planners. The County

Emergency Operations Center will be located immediately south of the Sheriff's Communication Center. Principal features include a base isolated seismic design to ensure protection against an 8.3 magnitude earthquake and an Emergency Management Information System that will have state-of-the-art audio/visual distribution throughout the facility. This system will ensure swift, accurate data communications between the County Emergency Operations Center, stations and other County department emergency operations centers, and the State Office of the Emergency Services in Sacramento.

The County Emergency Operations Center is designed to support over 150 staff members with food and water for up to seven days, and will include redundant mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems. The building will also have daily office space for the staff of the Emergency Operations Bureau and the disaster planners from the seven other major County departments. When completed, the County Emergency Operations Center will provide the environment and technology required by the County to respond effectively to the needs of the residents in the event of an emergency or disaster.

There is no other bureau in the Department which deals with such a wide range of law enforcement issues related to emergency response and tactical planning. Inter-agency communication has become paramount, as a result of the riots of 1992.

Next year will see new emergency procedures, law enforcement mutual aid training, and exercises which will include the mobilization of hundreds of officers throughout the County. The Emergency Operations Bureau is an integral part of the Department's proactive response to providing a *Tradition of Service* to the community.

MULTIJURISDICTIONAL CRIMINAL APPREHENSION DETAIL

The Multijurisdictional Criminal Apprehension Detail (MCAD) was created in 1983. The overwhelming success of the early 1970's South Bay Burglary Team validated the multi-agency concept and demonstrated the need for additional teams to address the transient career criminal. As a result, the West Regional Burglary Team (WRBT) was formed in 1982 and the South Central Burglary Team (SCBT) was created in 1983. MCAD was formed at the same time as the SCBT to lend direction to the multijurisdictional teams by coordinating and managing their activities.

Over the next eight and a half years MCAD grew to include a total of six surveillance teams and a Crime Analysis Unit. The new teams added include the Burglary Apprehension Team (BAT), the West Criminal Apprehension Team (WCAT), and the Cargo Criminal Apprehension Team (Cargo CATs). To support these teams the South Bay Regional Crime Analysis Unit was reassigned to MCAD.



Cargo CATs is staffed by highly skilled investigators representing the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, Federal Bureau of Investigation, California Highway Patrol, Los Angeles Port Police, Vernon Police Department, and the Los Angeles Police Department.

As a longtime proponent of the multi-agency concept, MCAD's first unit commander was instrumental in the establishment of other multi-agency teams within the Sheriff's Department, including the North Surveillance and Apprehension Team (NORSAT).

The objective of MCAD's surveillance teams is to impact the activities of the transient career criminal. Traditional law enforcement operations, such as patrol and detectives, primarily react once a crime has been committed. Local investigators often obtain information on criminals, but are unable to pursue the investigation because of time and resource constraints. MCAD teams investigate any crime (except for major narcotics cases) and use a pro-active approach to impact these transient career criminals and receivers of stolen property.

The surveillance and investigative abilities of a multijurisdictional team exceed that of any single agency. Once a criminal is identified by a team member, station, or police department investigator, a surveillance is initiated. Most of the time the criminal is apprehended "in-progress" if the crime is non-violent or prior to the commission of a violent crime, if at all possible. The "in-progress" arrests strengthen prosecutions, and the majority of the suspects plead guilty at the arraignment or the preliminary hearing.

From 1984 through 1991, MCAD surveillance teams were involved in a number of significant and noteworthy cases. These included, among others, the Night Stalker case and the Joseph Wells Noble child molester case. The teams were also responsible for the arrest of a number of bank robbery suspects. During this period MCAD teams made a total of 4,437 arrests, cleared 6,726 cases, recovered more than \$42 million in stolen property, and seized more than \$19 million in illegal narcotics.

Because of the recent Sheriff's Department budget reductions, as well as the independent police department budget cuts, MCAD is comprised now of only two surveillance teams, BAT and Cargo CATs.

Although MCAD is assigned to Field Operations Region II, the teams are available as a resource for any Department unit. MCAD investigators operate under the philosophy their job is to be "problem solvers" and to assist station and bureau investigators with their caseloads.

The BAT team is housed at Lomita Station and is comprised of one sergeant and five deputies. The team conducts a variety of surveillances and undercover investigations of career criminals who are known to target these areas. This year, BAT made nearly 100 felony arrests. Of these arrests, 28 were for burglary, 15 for vehicle theft, and 11 for armed robbery. A significant number of arrests were also made for grand theft and receiving stolen property. BAT also assisted other Department units in another 22 arrests.

The Cargo Criminal Apprehension Team (Cargo CATs) was formed in January, 1990, to address the rapid increase in cargo thefts occurring in Southern California. Cargo CATs was formed on the basis of a "partnership" between law enforcement and the transportation industry working toward a common goal.

To this end, Cargo CATs is available to conduct in-depth cargo theft investigations of a highly specialized nature. Electronic surveillances and sting operations are frequently used to apprehend the cargo thief and his receiver, recover the stolen cargo, and successfully prosecute those responsible.

Cargo CATs does not assume caseload assignments, but merely augments cargo theft investigators from the local, State, and Federal law

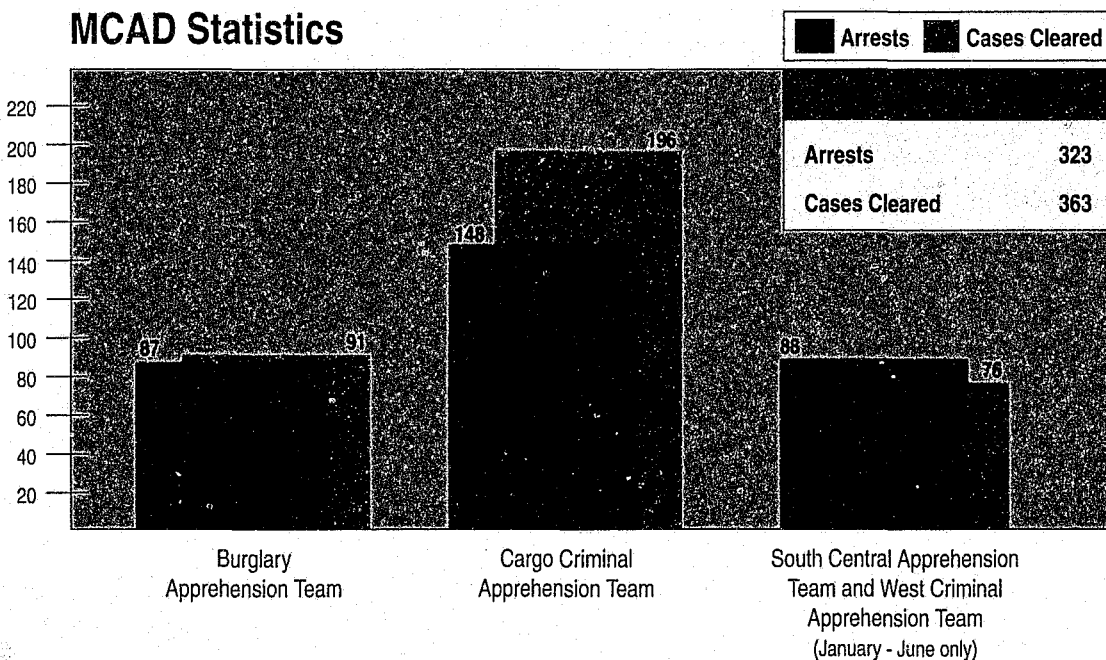
enforcement agencies. This multijurisdictional group concentrates primarily on cargo thefts occurring in Los Angeles County; however, investigations have led the team to locations throughout Southern California and as far as the state of New Jersey. Cargo CATs is now staffed by a total of 15 dedicated and highly skilled investigators representing the following agencies: Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, Federal Bureau of Investigation, California Highway Patrol, Los Angeles Port Police, Vernon Police Department, and the Los Angeles Police Department.

As a result of an ongoing close working relationship with Commercial Crimes Bureau, a sergeant from that unit is the Cargo CAT supervisor. This unique relationship has proven to be exceedingly beneficial for both Field Operations Region II and Detective Division. To our knowledge Cargo CATs is currently the only unit of its kind in the United States exclusively conducting cargo theft investigations.

Since the team's inception in 1990, Cargo CATs recovered more than \$47 million in stolen property. This year alone, the team recovered property valued at more than \$28 million.

MCAD's surveillance teams are supported by the MCAD crime analyst and a staff of 12 dedicated Sheriff's civilian volunteers. The volunteers each work at least one day per week and their efforts are greatly appreciated by all of the MCAD personnel.

TRANSIT SERVICES BUREAU

In the Fall of 1989, Sheriff Block made the decision to pursue the policing contract for the Metro Blue Line. In 1990, a multi-year contract was awarded to the Department, thus creating the Transit Services Bureau (TSB). What occurred over the next two years will go down in Sheriff's Department history as a bold move into the transit policing arena.

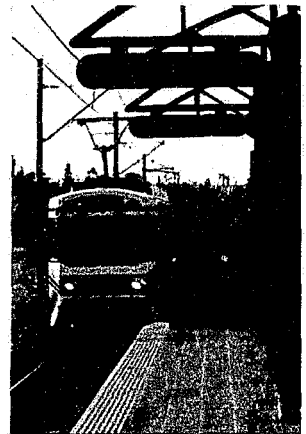
During the first two years of its existence, the Transit Services Bureau experienced many of the problems associated with the formation of a new unit. The size and physical layout of the facility was not what is required of a Sheriff's station. A training program geared specifically to train operations had to be developed and certified by POST. Deputies not knowing what to expect were reluctant to transfer into TSB. As the Bureau moves into its third year and looks forward to the fourth, many of these problems have finally been resolved. Although, there were other problems to contend with, the Bureau continued to enjoy success in the policing area of the contract. Ridership continued to increase with over one million riders currently per month. Crime is virtually non-existent and the fare enforcement activities have continued to identify passengers with improper fare media.

In Spring, TSB signed a second two year contract. In June, after several fatal traffic collisions, the Transportation Commission instituted a 90 day traffic enforcement program calling for ten traffic cars daily. The program was so successful the Commission contracted for eight traffic cars daily for the remainder of the 1992/93 fiscal year.

Additionally, in October, TSB moved into another area of transit policing when Metrolink became operational. Unlike the trains used by the Blue Line, Metrolink uses trains similar to the Amtrak system. The Metrolink system has three lines that cover approximately 140 miles of track. The central point is Union Station in the downtown Los Angeles area. From there the lines go to Pomona on the east, Santa Clarita on the north, and Moorpark on the west.

TSB's initial contract with the operator of Metrolink, Southern California Regional Rail Authority, called for a "core unit" of a lieutenant, sergeant, operations deputy, two detectives and two patrol deputies. This core unit was to be the lead agency for all law enforcement activities along the lines. Their function would be to assist police agencies from cities and counties, through which the trains pass, in investigating and prosecuting crimes committed along the train's right-of-way. The unit was also charged with investigating all crimes committed on the trains regardless of where the train was located at the time of the incident.

As this contract was being finalized in September with a start-up date scheduled for October 26, TSB again began a search for personnel to fill vacancies at the Blue Line being created with the formation of this unit. The Los Angeles Transportation Commission felt additional police coverage was needed for the portion of the Metrolink system in Los Angeles County. The Commission provided funding to the Southern California Regional Rail Authority to increase the size of the contract by providing an enforcement unit for Los Angeles County. This 13 deputy increase was approved by the Board of Supervisors on October 28, retroactive to October 26. TSB was again required to borrow personnel to fill this contract need, this time with help from Custody and Court Services Divisions.

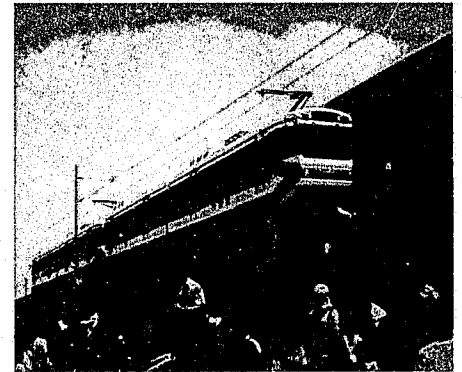

While the Department experienced many cutbacks during the latter part of the year, TSB has been fortunate to be able to increase its total personnel by 40 during the month of October.

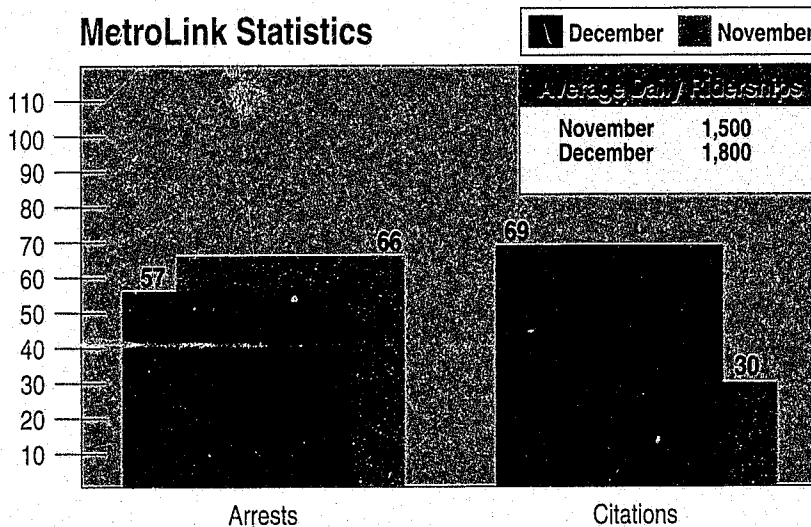
Another area of expansion in the near future will be the Metro Green Line. TSB is currently policing the Green Line construction sites on an overtime basis and is working to formulate an interim contract for policing the Green Line during the final phases of construction.

Transit Services Bureau also made a proposal to the Transportation Commission to take over policing of all buses in the eastern portion of Los Angeles County. The proposal encompasses the area east of the Long Beach Freeway (710) including Pasadena and all the foothill communities east to the County line. If accepted, this contract could provide a maximum of 60 deputy positions along with all the support personnel.

The expansion of transit policing by the Sheriff's Department will be determined in Spring 1993. The Los Angeles County Transportation Commission and the Southern California Rapid Transit District will form a combined board known as the Metropolitan Transportation Authority. This board will be required to decide what agency will be policing all modes of transportation in Los Angeles County.

NORWALK/PICO RIVERA STATIONS

Norwalk Regional Station, located in southeast Los Angeles County, provides police services to the cities of La Mirada, Norwalk, Pico Rivera, and Santa Fe Springs, as well as the unincorporated communities of Whittier and West Whittier. Norwalk Regional Station, through Norwalk Station and Pico Rivera Local Station, serves a resident population of 300,000 within a 47 square mile geographical area. This consolidated operation began mid-year, as the result of budget constraints.

Community Based Policing has become an integral part of Norwalk Regional Station and the communities it serves. In response to evolving public needs, our resources were decentralized to provide residents and the business community with greater access to the variety of Sheriff's services, as well as to increase our ability to respond to local concerns and issues.

Patrol Team Policing

Three years ago, Norwalk Regional Station organized all patrol services under the team policing/directed patrol concept to provide its communities with a more efficient and responsive means of law enforcement. All patrol functions are divided among seven patrol teams led by dedicated team leaders and supervisors. The patrol teams are: La Mirada, Norwalk-north, Norwalk-south, Pico Rivera, Santa Fe Springs, Whittier, and West Whittier. Team policing serves to provide deputies with a greater understanding and awareness of neighborhood problems while establishing them as partners with their community. The partnership between citizen and deputy is the key to the success of community based policing.

Detective Team Policing

On July 1, 1992, the Norwalk Regional Station Detective Bureau was reorganized into "city specific" investigative teams in an effort to further enhance the effectiveness of team policing. Station detective units were traditionally organized in a "crime specific" model with no geographical proprietary interest to individual communities. This model conflicted with the emerging emphasis on community based policing. With the expansion of the team policing concept to the Detective Bureau, Norwalk Regional Station now has complete law enforcement service teams for each individual community that addresses all issues affecting that community. A detective team is assigned to a specific city and is responsible for investigating all crimes within that city. Investigators gain an increased awareness of overall crime trends and activity within that particular city. Today, detective teams are being decentralized into their assigned community. The Pico Rivera and West Whittier detective teams maintain their offices at the Pico Rivera Local Station. The City of Santa Fe Springs detective team is assigned to that City's Police Services Center where they maintain their offices and conduct routine business. The La Mirada detective team works from the Sheriff's Service Center located in the La Mirada Mall. Efforts are underway to decentralize the Whittier detective team to the City/County Multi-Service Center in unincorporated Whittier. This increased availability to the community has proven to be a very positive step to enhancing our interaction with those we serve. This concept also facilitates the patrol team member who can now go to one team to seek assistance or learn crime trends within a particular city. City officials and citizens alike have enthusiastically endorsed this concept.

Santa Fe Springs Police Services Center

The Santa Fe Springs Police Services Center is a bold new approach to providing the finest in local contract law enforcement services. The Center is the local community's home for participation in community based and problem oriented policing efforts and combines the best of the Sheriff's Department's contract services with the strength of City staff, facility and equipment, while focusing on solving local community-defined law enforcement problems and service needs. This 8,000 square

foot, two-story facility contains a service/complaint desk, offices for dedicated Sheriff's supervisors, dedicated detectives, and specialized support units, in addition to the City's public safety officers, City management staff, crime prevention information, fingerprinting and bicycle licensing services, emergency communications center and a community meeting/training room. This facility was dedicated and opened for full service in February.

City/County Multi-Service Center, Unincorporated Whittier

The City of Santa Fe Springs has entered into an agreement with the County of Los Angeles to bring together a full range of resources for the residents of South Whittier by providing portable structures on dedicated land within the South Whittier community. One building houses Santa Fe Springs staff and serves as a redevelopment office. In that structure, the City assists residents with low interest redevelopment loans and assistance programs designed to improve the quality of the community. A second structure serves as a storefront Sheriff's office and is staffed by community relations personnel as well as headquarters personnel whose duties benefit the local community, such as SANE deputies and background investigators. A third structure contains representatives from the CORE Family Resource Center, Helpline Youth Counseling, Project INFO, and the Los Angeles County Department of Health Services.

Officially dedicated on September 24, 1992, this Center enhances Norwalk Station's problem oriented approach to countering community problems by organizing County and City services. The Center also provides a "one stop" service center for area residents, thereby improving the delivery of government services. The City/County Multi-Service Center is mutually funded by the County of Los Angeles and the City of Santa Fe Springs.

La Mirada Sheriff's Services Center

This 1,100 square foot facility is "home" to the La Mirada detective team, the Juvenile Gang Suppression Team, special assignment deputies, community liaison activities, and the dedicated Community Service Officer. These local law enforcement services, dedicated solely to the City of La Mirada, were brought into the heart of the community to enhance our relationship with residents and the business community as well as enhance our delivery of services.

Problem Oriented Policing

Problem Oriented Policing efforts have become a significant method in combatting specific criminal activity which has been relatively unaffected by normal law enforcement resources. Norwalk Regional Station and Pico Rivera Local Station employed several unique and effective programs designed to impact specific problem areas within our local communities.

Norwalk Neighborhood Law Enforcement Centers and Gang Task Force: These unique law enforcement vehicles are customized Silver Star trailers fully equipped as field operations centers for concentrated law enforcement efforts, community involvement, and gang intervention activities in the City of Norwalk. The two Law Enforcement Centers are an integral component to the City's Gang Task Force which focuses a variety of resources on identified gang problems and individuals. The Task Force consists of dedicated representatives from Norwalk Regional Station, OSS (Operation Safe Street), Probation Department, District Attorney's Office, Norwalk Social Services, Norwalk Public Safety Department, and School District staff in a team concept. "At risk" individuals are identified through a collaborative effort. Should intervention efforts by youth workers or probation officers fail to discourage "at risk" individuals from gang related activity, they become targets of enforcement efforts by the Law Enforcement Centers. Six deputies are assigned to the Task Force with two assigned to each Law Enforcement Center and two others working in a directed patrol vehicle. Deputies park the trailers in gang problem areas on a nightly basis with probation officers working in the Centers alongside deputies. Detained gang members and curfew violators are counseled and processed in the Law Enforcement Centers by probation officers assigned to the Gang Task Force.

Through enactment of City ordinances, the parents of detained juveniles are billed for Sheriff's services resulting from Gang Task Force activities. The deputies also perform foot or bicycle patrols from the Law Enforcement Centers and regularly interact with area residents in an effort to identify community concerns.

Santa Fe Springs Bike Team: As part of its directed patrol efforts, Norwalk Station utilizes bicycle patrols throughout the community. The Santa Fe Springs bicycle team is regularly deployed in and around local shopping malls, parks, and residential areas to supplement routine patrols. The City has also purchased a GMC van for the sole use of the bicycle team, modified to transport six bicycles and their riders to any deployment site.

Pico Rivera Operation Park Sweep: Since its beginning in July, this five-day-a-week, two-man problem oriented policing unit, augmented with two nights of bike patrol, was designed to impact target gangs in the City of Pico Rivera and has resulted in large numbers of gang members being arrested or cited. Public and City response to this problem specific program was very positive and viewed as a positive step toward returning the parks to the citizens for recreation and enjoyment.

Pico Rivera Citrus Trailer Park: This problem oriented policing effort is designed to impact ongoing problems at the Citrus trailer park in the City of Pico Rivera. The park was grossly overpopulated, the trailers all below standard with rampant crime in and around the area. A task force was formed to focus resources on combatting criminal activity within the trailer park, resulting in numerous arrests ranging from narcotics offenses to parole violations. Consisting of representatives from the District Attorney's Office, Fire Department, Health Department, Building Services, Housing and Community Development and other City departments, this task force investigates a wide array of criminal and civil violations, empowering the City to take steps to revoke the trailer park's conditional use permit.



La Mirada Team Against Special Crimes (TASC) Unit

Established in 1986, this special patrol unit targets specific crimes within the City of La Mirada that normal patrols are unable to resolve. Deployed primarily on Friday and Saturday evenings and wearing identifiable "soft" clothes, a select core of deputies representing various functions within the Station target crimes occurring around area bars, parks, and sites of frequent neighborhood parties. Since its inception, aggravated assaults declined 68%, incidents involving drunk drivers declined 21%, and La Mirada realized a significant reduction in alcohol related incidents in and around local parks. In October, 1991, the La Mirada Park/Party/TASC unit was awarded a Certificate of Commendation by the California Attorney General. In addition, the members of this team were awarded "Exemplary Service" commendations.



Norwalk Regional Station Red Ribbon Rally

For the past two years, Norwalk Regional Station has sponsored an area wide Red Ribbon Rally for children from schools throughout Norwalk, La Mirada and Whittier to encourage them to say no to drugs and gangs. The Second Annual Red Ribbon Rally, held on October 28, 1992, featured the inaugural jump of the Sheriff's Department's "Golden Stars" parachute team which opened the Rally by skydiving into Cerritos College Stadium to the enjoyment of 7,500 cheering students. Featuring special presentations, these Rallies are quickly becoming the premier anti-drug event throughout Los Angeles County.

PERSONNEL SERVICES

Personnel Services is responsible for all transactions affecting an employee during the hiring process, while in-service, the separation process, and the appropriate creation and retention of records pertaining to these matters.

Administrative Unit

The Administrative Unit is responsible for the care, maintenance, storage, and microfilming of personnel files for active, inactive, reserve, and purged files. It also is responsible for and has control of the ordering, issuance and maintenance of Departmental badges.

The Unit is comprised of three sections, the Public Information Counter, the Retirement Desk and the Vault Operations.

Alpha Processing Team

The primary function of the Alpha Processing Team is to maintain and update all personnel transactions for approximately 12,000 Sheriff's Department employees. During the year, the Team had several major projects which included the following:

Budget Curtailment Project: In August, the Team established a task force to calculate key dates used for employees in an effort to prepare for possible layoffs.

Early Separation Project: In October, the Department decided to participate in the Early Separation Program. The Alpha Processing Team approved several seminars and workshops in relation to the project. There were 70 positions made available to eligible personnel. Sixty-two elected to separate from County service on or before November 23, 1992.

Ancillary Services

Accomplishments for this year included: automation of bilingual pay records to ease the tracking of all Departmental employees receiving bilingual pay; creation of a Policy Manual for all Personnel Services employees; automation of the Personnel Services, Services and Supplies (S&S), Salary and Employee Benefits (S&EB), and Fixed Asset budgets were automated for ease of tracking; and development of a program to track out-of-service employee files which were being microfilmed by an outside vendor.

Background Investigations Unit

The Background Investigators' sole responsibility is to ensure civilian personnel hired by the Sheriff's Department are qualified. This objective is accomplished by conducting a comprehensive investigation into the record history of individuals who have applied at all civilian levels. The investigations must adhere to all Federal, State, and local statutes governing the hiring of employees.

During the year, the Background Investigations Unit processed a total of 397 applicants. Of the 397 applications, 328 were routine, 19 were high level, and 50 were security clearances.

Benefits Unit

Effective March 1, 1992, the County of Los Angeles and Los Angeles County Employees Association (LACEA), Local 660, introduced a new flexible benefit plan titled "OPTIONS." This new flexible benefit plan provided the same medical, dental, life and accidental death and dismemberment insurance benefits plus the enrollment into a Health Care and/or Dependent Care Spending Account.

In addition, the Coalition of County Unions and Los Angeles County Employees Association (LACEA), Local 660, contracted with Employee Benefit Services, a private vendor, to conduct one-on-one annual benefit election meetings. Employee Benefit Services processed each employee's benefit selection for 1993, and presented each employee with a confirmation of their selected benefits at the conclusion of each meeting.

Central Payroll Operations

This year, the Payroll Unit processed 758 outgoing lump sum payoffs for retirees and employees leaving County service and assisted retirees in setting their retirement dates. In addition, 8,500 uniform allowance checks, 2,400 mileage claims, 864 employee tax forms, approximately 7,000 employment verification forms providing information to loan companies, and 865 direct deposits were processed. Approximately 208,000 payroll warrants were sorted and released, while our special assignment desk processed 100 subpoenas.

Additionally, 9,800 cash sick reimbursements, 5,496 timerolls, monthly absence reports, current period timerolls, current period industrial injury reports, prior period industrial injury reports, and vacation pay-advances were processed. The Unit sorted and released approximately 9,000 retirement statements. Working with the Auditor-Controller, the Special Assignment Unit processed 3,370 overtime slips for special events such as the Gay Pride Parade, Rose Parade, and the June and November elections.

Classification Unit

The Classification/Compensation Unit is primarily responsible for the origination, development, classification, and reclassification of all positions within the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

In November, Personnel Services and the Classification/Compensation Unit were charged with the overall responsibility for implementing a comprehensive, Department-wide strategy to ensure compliance with all of the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Consolidated Timekeeping

During 1992, the Consolidated Timekeeping Office/Central Jail started managing the time records for Inmate Services with approximately 53 employees, Lynwood Regional Justice Center with approximately 45 employees, and Jail Construction with an additional 20 employees.

The largest project the Consolidated Timekeeping Offices had to absorb in 1992, was and continues to be the conversion into the County Wide Timekeeping and Personnel/Payroll System. More commonly known as CWTAPPS, this system is an overhaul of Los Angeles County's existing pay system. In October, an enormous training schedule for the Consolidated Timekeepers, as well as anyone involved in the Personnel/Payroll system, was undertaken.

Help Desk Function

The primary purpose of the Help Desk Unit is to provide a single point of contact for employees who have pay problems or have questions concerning their pay which cannot be resolved by the unit timekeeper.

The Help Desk implemented a new automated multi-user system to track and manage employee requests for assistance related to personnel/payroll problems. It allows multiple users simultaneous access to input and update screens, do on-line tracking and "hardcopy" reporting. The system is completely user configurable.

Since January, the Help Desk has received 38,400 calls. This averages to approximately 3,200 calls per month, 160 calls per day. Each call to the Help Desk is entered into the Task Master System.

The Help Desk personnel also have access to numerous data files either from their computer terminals or from microfiche readers. Most inquiries can be resolved by accessing these files. Other reports are provided by the Data Systems Bureau, other Personnel Services' units and the Auditor-Controller's office.

Item Control Unit

Item Control is the information source by which Personnel Services identifies, monitors and tracks employees, positions, items, and provides the Department with a status of Departmental staffing. Additionally, the Item Control Unit: assisted the Division Chief's Aides with budget and position audits; generated reports due to Phase I and II curtailments; identified and tracked sworn and civilian curtailed positions in PIMS; provided Departmental vacancy and filled counts for the Executive Planning Council as required; assisted sworn and civilian employees being reassigned due to budget curtailments; and processed 300 Civilian Certification Referral Requests and 15 referral requests from other County departments.

Recruitment and Selection Unit

The Recruitment and Selection Unit is responsible for recruiting, announcing, preparing, and administering civilian and sworn examinations for positions in the Department, certifying hire lists, and reporting statistical information about the testing process.

This year, the Recruitment Unit attended approximately 15 job fairs at various locations including high schools, colleges, and skill centers. Approximately 3,000 people are on mailing list for various positions to be notified of future examinations. The Recruitment Unit received about 15,000 applications in 1992.

A total of 776 applicants were interviewed for the Sergeant's examination in a two-week period with 15 interview boards, and the list promulgated in late February. On the Lieutenant's examination, 214 applicants were interviewed in one week, with nine interview boards, and the list promulgated in late May. For non-sworn examinations, approximately 80 examinations were requested and certification lists were promulgated.

Sworn Staffing Unit

The Sworn Staffing Unit provides personnel support services to sworn members of the Department. The unit is responsible for providing orientation to newly appointed Deputy Sheriff Trainees and newly hired Deputies. The unit is also responsible for conducting deployment of graduating classes, transfers, and promotions of all sworn ranks. The unit ensures consistency in sworn movement while adhering to Department policies. This year the unit: participated in the job fair and reassigned sworn personnel resulting from Departmental budget curtailments; coordinated the promotions and transfers of sworn personnel, including the rank of Sergeant, after a lengthy delay in certification of a new list; and deployed sworn personnel as a result of four academy class graduations.

Systems Unit

This year, the Systems Unit designed, developed, implemented, wrote manuals and trained staff for the following applications:

- Personnel Services Parking Tracking System - This system tracks all Sheriff's Department's employees assigned to the Civic Center, the parking lot and the parking decal they are assigned to, and the amount they pay each month. It also generates the required reports for the Parking Office, CAO.
- Benefit Services Tracking System - This system tracks all Benefit Enrollment Forms, Change Forms, and the Beneficiary Change Forms. It also provides all the required statistical information and generates various reports.

The Unit also started the strategy and part of the analysis study of the Administrative Division's functions in an attempt to design a Human Resources Management Information System (HRMIS).

BISCAILUZ CENTER INTERMEDIATE CARE MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

The Inception

A Mental Health Study Implementation Task Force was instituted in February of 1990, to evaluate the existing mental health program within the Los Angeles County Jail system. Mental health experts from the Maricopa County Sheriff's Department (Phoenix, Arizona), under the auspices of the National Institute of Corrections, provided some recommendations.

Among their recommendations was the adoption of a mental health program for male and female inmate/patients in a dormitory style setting within a medium-minimum security facility. This recommendation became the basis for the Intermediate Care Mental Health Facility within the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

The consultants' report recommended utilizing Biscailuz Center due to the closeness of other sites to which the inmate/patient would have to be transported, such as court, acute medical care facilities, the Inmate Reception Center, or Sybil Brand Institute.

The Effort Begins: Physical Plant Changes

Six dormitories were designated for conversion. Two dormitories were upgraded and converted into the female inmate/patient housing areas and minor modifications were added to ensure privacy. Two more dormitories were converted and upgraded to house the males. Of the remaining two dormitories, one was gutted and remodeled to accommodate the dayrooms and counseling areas for male and female inmates; the other was remodeled into offices, a locker room, and restrooms for the Department of Mental Health Staff.

Each housing area can accommodate 55 inmate/patients and five trustees. The male trustees are selected by the placement personnel at Biscailuz Center, while female trustees are assigned by placement personnel at Sybil Brand Institute.

This Program is the first of its kind in any county jail system in the nation. This new level of care offers a rehabilitative program to mentally ill inmate/patients in a medium security and less confining environment. It extends the current level of care for acutely mentally ill inmate/patients to encompass those who are mentally ill and now stabilizing. The Program is also staffed by a full complement of mental health personnel.

Goals and Inmate Criteria

The goal of the Intermediate Care Program is to enhance the rehabilitative process by treating the psychosocial problems which contributed to the inmates'/patients' criminal behavior. The Program offers a combination of group and individual psychotherapy, case management, closely monitored chemotherapy, and individualized activity therapy on a daily basis. The amalgamation of these treatment modalities with protective housing in an intermediate care setting, allows the Program to work by modifying dysfunctional behavior, and structuring reintegration back to the community. By identifying and treating these inmates/patients in this manner, the likelihood of recidivism is minimized. Also the length of stay may be reduced by lessening court continuances.

The inmates/patients selected for this Program must meet the following six criteria: a history of mental illness; has been acutely mentally ill while in jail or is in danger of decompensating into an acute episode; currently stabilized under psychiatric intervention; willing to

accept further psychiatric intervention; likely to decompensate if housed with the general inmate population; and must pass the Sheriff's classification and placement security criteria.

Once these criteria are identified, the inmate/patient is referred to the Program by the mental health staff of the respective facility. Custody Division classification personnel further screen these individuals as to the appropriate security level, and medical services personnel screen them to ensure no medical problems.

In addition, the Program was recently expanded to include inmates whose symptoms may or may not be caused by mental illness (e.g., substance abuse; developmental disability). A diagnostic work-up may be performed in order to determine cause and the most appropriate treatment plan.

Training

A two week training course was initiated which integrated all personnel involved in the inception of this Program. This included deputies, one sergeant, mental health, and medical services staff. This training included alerting all health and mental health care staff to security procedures, and conversely, all security personnel to the responsibilities and limitations of the health and mental health care providers.

The successful operation of this Program can be attributed to the attitudes of mutual, professional respect and trust on the part of both health care and custody staff. It is clear this team approach and spirit of cooperation works for the smooth operation of the facility.

Plan for the Future

It is the intent and design of both Sheriff's personnel and mental health workers that these inmates continue with the treatment they received while in custody. Moreover, the mental health staff establishes with the inmate, a linkage to outside community agencies and other support systems, prior to their release. Since this Program is essentially in its infancy, and the overall treatment process is lengthy, there is no significant data on those patients who have been successful. However, it is hoped the design of this Program will result in taking this segment of the population out of the criminal justice system and produce functional citizens that may ultimately better integrate with society.

DATA SYSTEMS BUREAU

Since 1990, the Department has taken a series of actions to emphasize its position on the use of excessive force. As new reporting requirements were put in place to hold personnel accountable, it became more apparent that an automated method of tracking incidents would be required. The Data Systems Bureau recognized its role in this Department endeavor and initiated a development effort with Internal Affairs Bureau that evolved into a project to automate functions within the Office of Professional Ethics and Standards (OPES). With limited resources available, the Data Systems Bureau diverted development staff from the Sheriff's Executive Support System to the new automation project dubbed OPES I. The title of OPES I not only acknowledged the Office of Professional Ethics and Standards, but it also took note, just as in symphonic endeavors, ultimately an OPES II would be required.

OPES I is a complete office automation environment designed to provide support to related activities in the following units: Office of Professional Ethics and Standards - Headquarters, Internal Affairs Bureau, Civil Litigation Unit, and the Discovery Unit. This project is comprised of three modules that automate all administrative investigations within the Internal Affairs Bureau, as well as Civil Litigations, and Discovery Motions coordinated by the Office of Professional Ethics and Standards. This major automation effort began in February, 1991, and was fully operational on August 10, 1992. OPES I also includes enhanced user security that restricts information access to designated users on a case-by-case basis. The system has the ability to electronically attach notes to cases or people associated with a case to facilitate communication among investigators.

The application for administrative investigations in OPES I records all information associated with investigations of this nature. The system allows users to extract information from the OPES I database rapidly and accurately. Authorized users may easily specify criteria about a case and receive immediate information about all cases that meet the specified query criteria. Information recorded about incidents electronically links all of the particulars about the incident and all involved parties as well as any lawsuits or claims filed against the incident.

The application for Civil Litigations records all information about the incident and all lawsuits filed against the incident. Information about involved parties such as plaintiffs, judges, attorneys, law firms, named defendants, claimants, and deputies can be recorded. Other information about lawsuits recorded in the OPES I database include pertinent dates, primary causes of action, unit of assignment, and judgement amounts. Custom reports can also be generated that include civil claim letters, claim summaries, and proposed settlement reports.

The Discovery Unit application tracks Pitchess Motions, general discoveries, and Subpoena Duces Tecum by providing a facility to record all important information about the particular discovery such as dates and specific parties such as defendants, plaintiffs, attorneys, judges, and County Counsel. The custom reporting feature is capable of generating Compliance Reports and Declarations.

SCIENTIFIC SERVICES BUREAU

Forensic Toxicology

In spite of the tremendous efforts law enforcement personnel exerted to limit the distribution and sale of illicit drugs, thousands of people die every year from drug overdose, and many more innocent lives are lost as a result of the erratic and uncontrollable behavior of individuals who are under the influence of drugs. Drug abuse affects all segments of society and significantly increased the role of the toxicologist within the criminal justice system. Forensic toxicologists are responsible for detecting and identifying the presence of drugs and poisons in blood and urine samples. They must be well versed in analytical chemistry, biochemistry, physiology, pharmacology, pathology, and have familiarity with legal practices and the judicial setting.

In addition to the routine work of identifying and quantifying drugs of abuse in body fluids for criminal cases, the Toxicology Section of the Scientific Services Bureau is involved in a number of innovative and important programs for the Department.

Laboratory Robotics

The Toxicology Section analyzes approximately 20,000 blood and urine samples annually for drugs of abuse. This large number of case submissions place a huge demand upon the manpower available. Since the hiring of additional staff is unlikely in today's fiscal climate, one avenue to increase productivity is to automate processes through laboratory robotics. The Zymark Robotic System, implemented in the Toxicology Section, is a computer driven multifunctional manipulator designed to do all of the time-consuming chemical procedures necessary to extract drugs from their blood or urine matrices.

With the robotics system, hundreds of man-hours are saved each year and higher productivity can be achieved through unattended operation of the system for up to 24 hours per day. All of the repetitive tasks are delegated to the robot, thus releasing the skilled scientist to do the more challenging technical jobs. Also, the precision and reliability of the robotics system in performing repetitive tasks is superior to that of a human who is subject to boredom, loss of attention, and fatigue.

The Toxicology Section's robotics system was recognized by the Los Angeles County Productivity Commission with two awards. One award was for the efficiency and productivity of the system, and the other for best use of emerging technology.

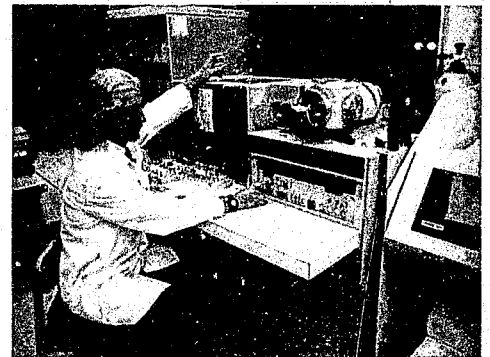
Pre-Employment/Random Drug Testing Programs

Accuracy, efficiency and confidentiality are critical requirements for these drug testing programs because of their potential impact on an individual's career. The Toxicology Section administered these programs in an exemplary fashion. Over 5,500 urine samples from these two programs were processed during the last fiscal year.

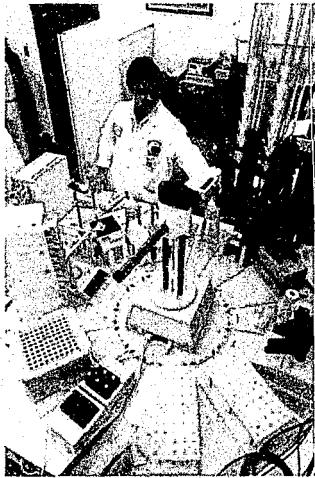
Each of these programs utilize advanced automated instrumentation for both the screening phase and the confirmation phase of the testing protocols. The instrumentation for the screening phase utilizes an immunoassay technique (EMIT) while the confirmation testing phase employs gas chromatography/mass spectrometry (GC/MS). Also, the criminalists in the Toxicology Section serve as a valuable resource for the interpretation of drug results for Departmental personnel.

Food Tampering Cases

These high visibility, food tampering cases are referred to the Toxicology Section for immediate identification before a general panic in the community is created. Food tampering cases are very difficult

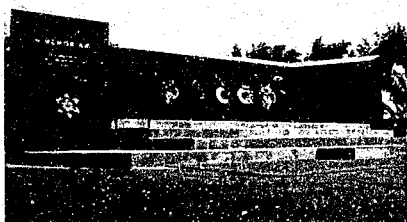
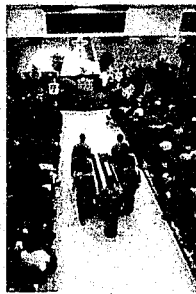
because the contaminant could be almost anything; poison, solvent, insecticide, household cleaning product, or nothing at all.

These types of cases test the skill and experience of the criminalists in the Toxicology Section as they extract the food product and test for any extraneous compounds. The Toxicology Section maintains a library that allows it to identify over 30,000 different compounds. The criminalists also work closely with the local laboratory of the Food and Drug Administration in identifying food contaminants.

Automation

With the continued pressure for demands for testing, personnel resources are at a premium. Automation has played a key role in allowing the staff of the Toxicology Section to keep abreast of the case input.

Several of the Toxicology Section's instrument packages are interfaced with computer systems with barcode reading capabilities to track evidence, collate data, and automatically print reports of analyses. This information processing is a great timesaver by itself. Other automation innovations include the instrumentation available for drugs of abuse by an immunoassay technique. This system can analyze a urine sample for up to six drugs in an unattended mode and tabulate all results. Another automation timesaver are the auto sampler systems used with our newer gas chromatograph/mass spectrometers (GC/MS). These attachments will introduce samples for GC/MS analysis in a programmed fashion that does not need human interaction. All these automation features help personnel in the Toxicology Section be more productive and use their time in the most efficient manner possible.

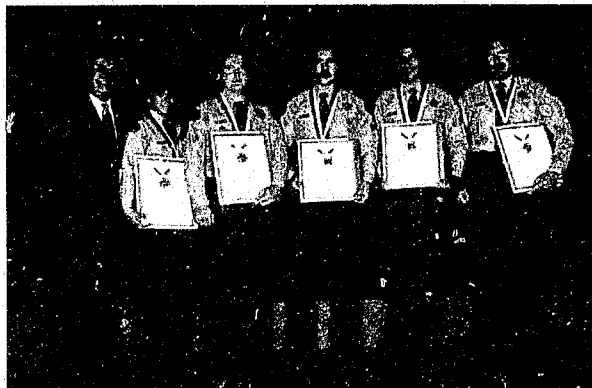

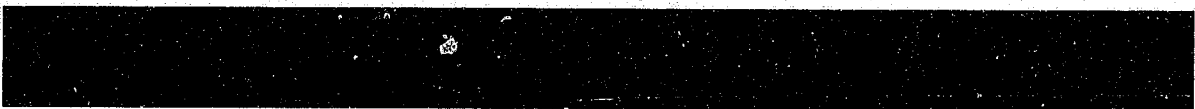

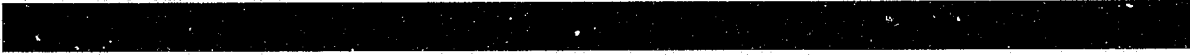

STATISTICAL INFORMATION

INTRODUCTION

The Year in Review 1992 Statistical Summary is issued by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department as a means of evaluating the effectiveness of current procedures and as a reference for future development of the Department. The following is a clarification of the terms used in the summary.

Totals may vary from previously published figures. This is due to the continual updating of Event Index System records and the efforts to present the most current data.

Crime Rates

Crime rates in this summary are based on a population of 10,000 rather than 100,000 as in the State of California and Federal Bureau of Investigation reports. This makes the rates more significant in view of the population distribution in the various Station and Contract City areas. The crime rate is calculated as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Crimes in Area}}{\text{Population in Area}} \times 10,000 = \text{Crime Rate}$$

Comparisons

Factors contributing to crime are numerous and vary from place to place. Readers are cautioned against drawing conclusions from direct comparisons of crime figures between individual communities of similar populations and size. In Los Angeles County, a jurisdiction in excess of eight million population, several factors affect the rate of crime. The factors include:

- Crime reporting practices of citizens
- Solid economic factors
- Demographics of the population, including age, sex, race, and ethnicity
- Population density and community characteristics: commercial, educational, recreational, and economic
- Public attitude toward crime and law enforcement
- Number of police employees per unit of population
- Policies of prosecuting officials and courts

In evaluating percentage changes, consideration must be given to the dates during which changes took place as well as the actual number of crimes upon which the percentage is based.

Population

Population figures were obtained from the Los Angeles County Department of Regional Planning April 1992, publication.

Area

The area adjustments are made from the data provided by the Los Angeles County Local Agency Formation Commission.

Part I Offenses

The Part I Offenses are used by law enforcement agencies in the United States to reveal the extent and trend of criminal activity. Any significant change from the anticipated pattern of the figures alerts law enforcement administrators to possible problem areas. The Part I Offenses are Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny Theft, Grand Theft Auto, and Arson.

The Sheriff's Department tabulates Part I Offenses by Uniform Crime Report standards and maintains statistical files with regard to violations, locations of occurrences, arrests by age and sex of the offenders, and by disposition of cases. Only the most serious classification is tabulated from reports with multiple classifications. For example, if a suspect is charged with Burglary and Vandalism, only the Burglary (the most serious crime) is included in the statistics. However, if several persons together commit one crime, each person is counted in "Adults Arrested" but only one crime is counted in "Cases Handled." Thus, statistics maintained by each of the stations or bureaus may differ from those recorded in this summary.

Similarly, a single case handled may have multiple assignments with the result that cases assigned will total more than cases handled. Additionally, for the crimes of Homicide, Forcible Rape, and Aggravated Assault, the "Cases Handled" column actually includes the number of victims as opposed to the number of incidents. This procedure is in compliance with the Bureau of Criminal Statistics' Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) guidelines. Finally, the statistics listed in the "Aggravated Assault" category include not only those assaults with a Felony Assault statistical code (050 series), but also those with the following Misdemeanor Assault statistical codes: 141 (Gun), 142 (Knife), 143 (Dangerous Weapon Other than Gun, Knife, Hands/Feet/Fist/etc.), 146 (Spousal Assault), and 149 (Child Assault).

Percentage Comparisons

Whenever the availability of data permits, percentage changes are indicated. These percentages reflect increases or decreases in the total number of cases. It must be noted that these changes do not adequately reflect changes in manpower expended. It is, in fact, possible for a decrease in cases to represent an increase in man-hours expended.

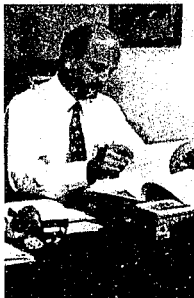

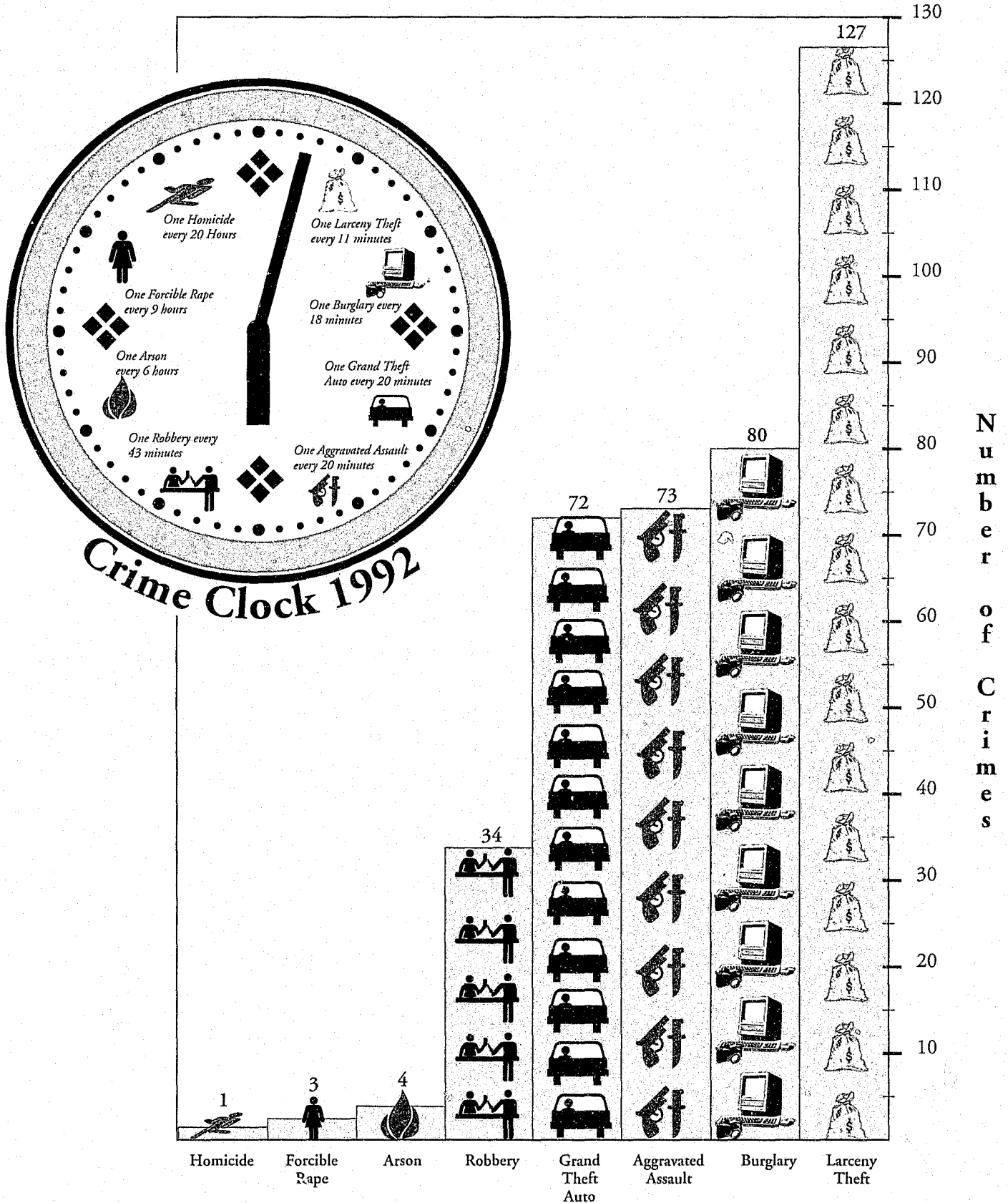

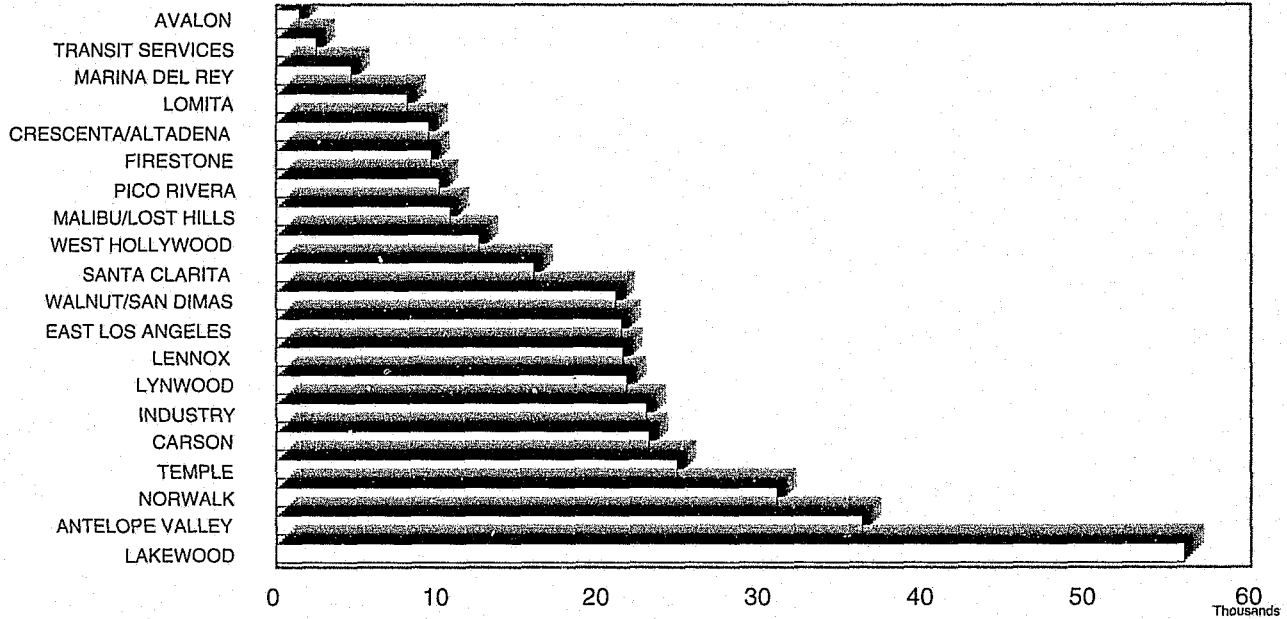

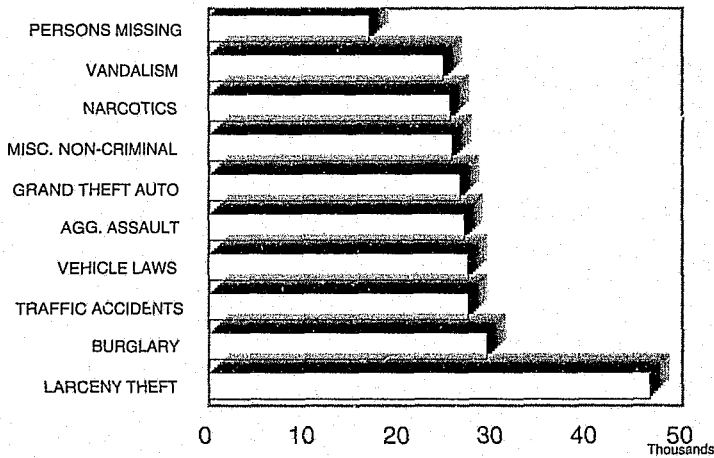

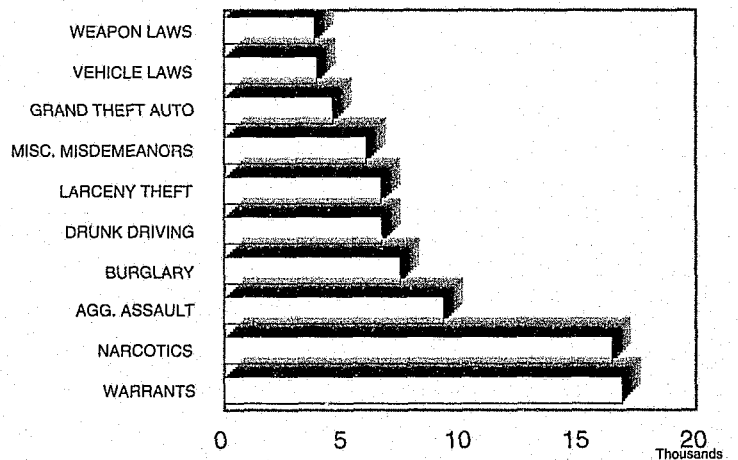
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



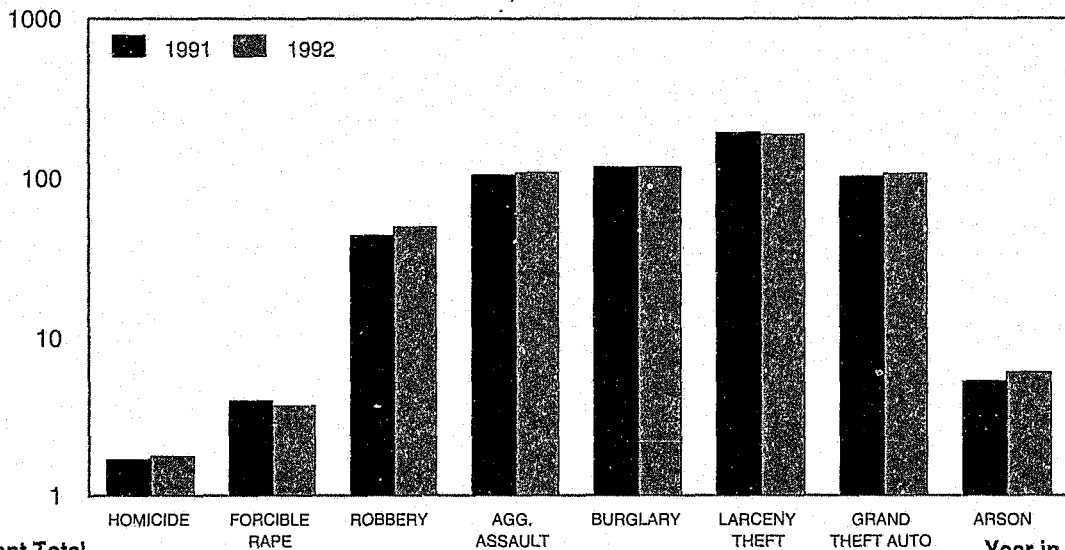
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES

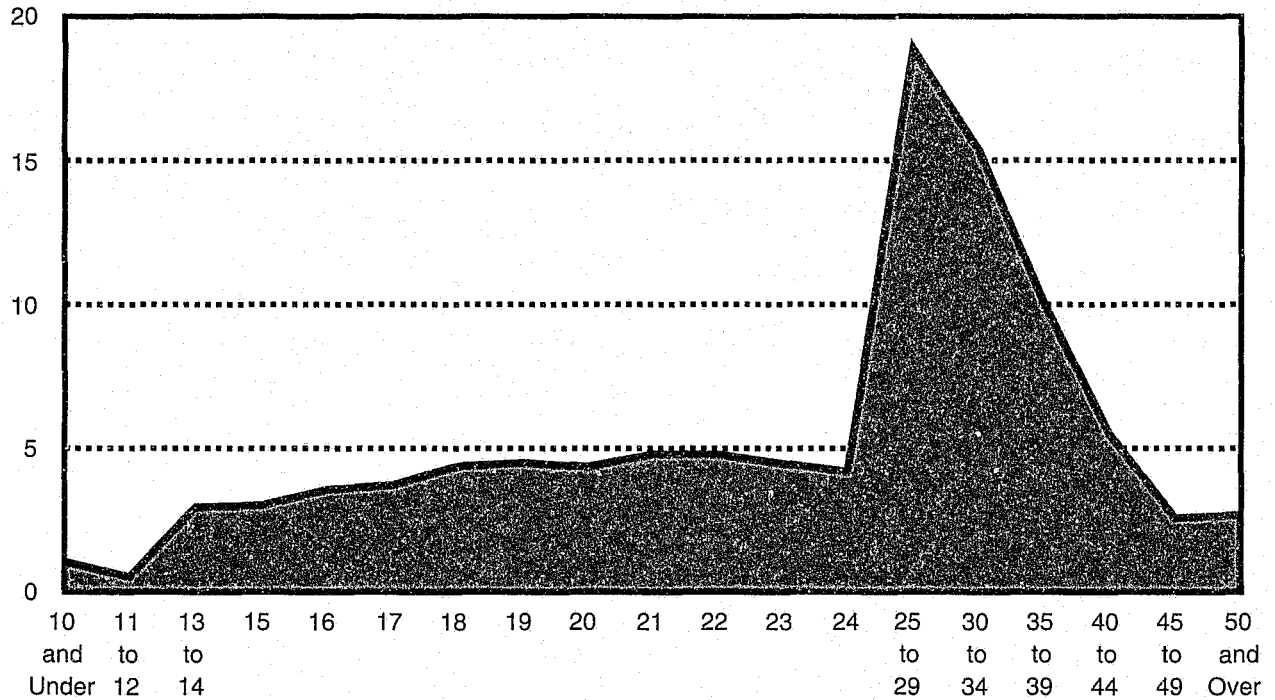

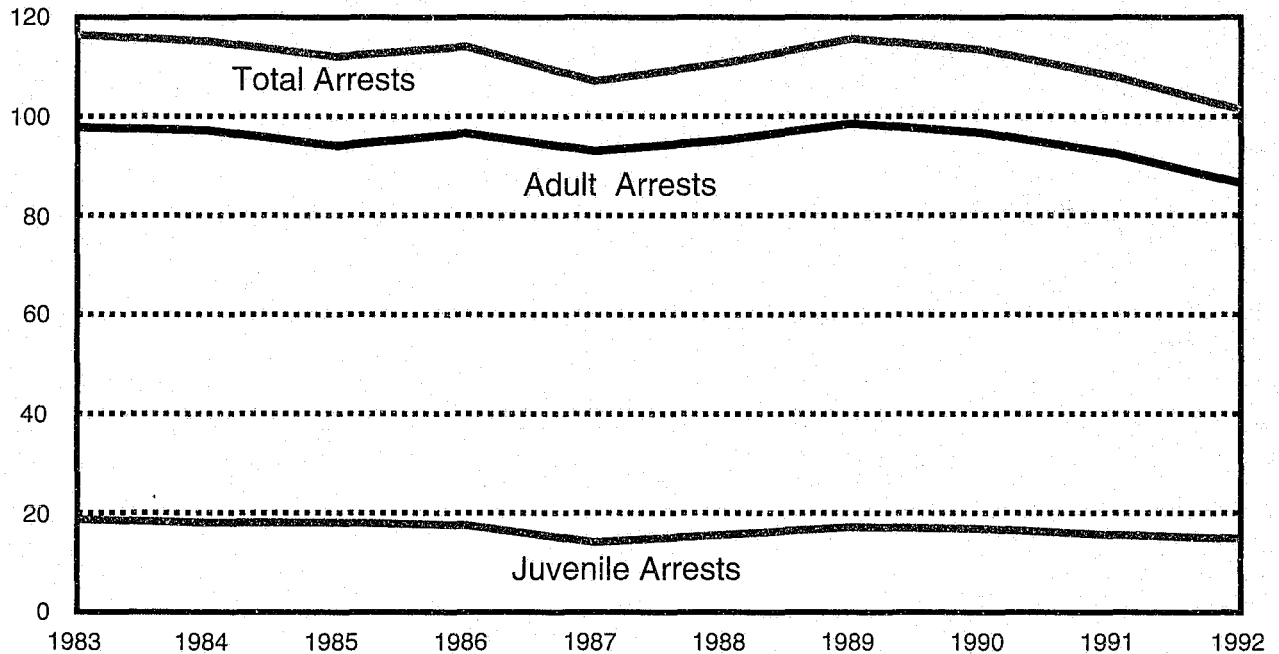
Persons Arrested for Part I Offenses by Age

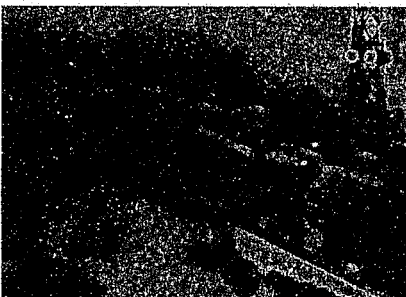

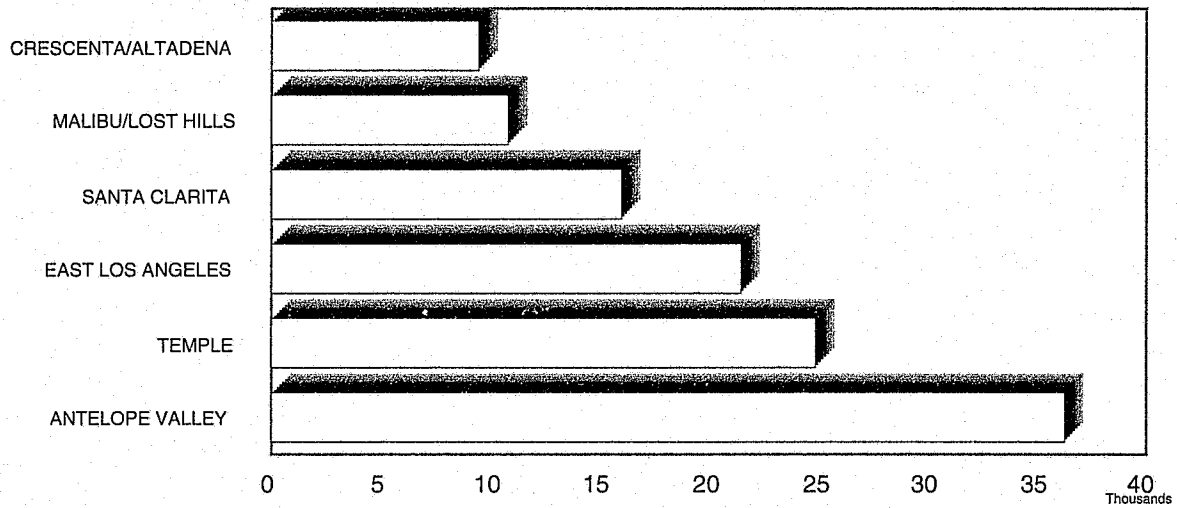

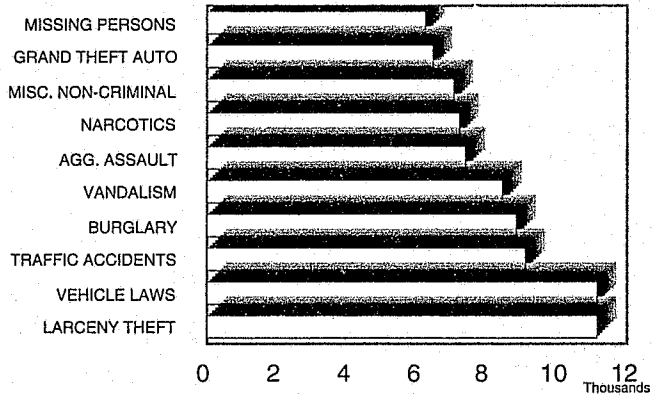


Field Operations Region I

CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION

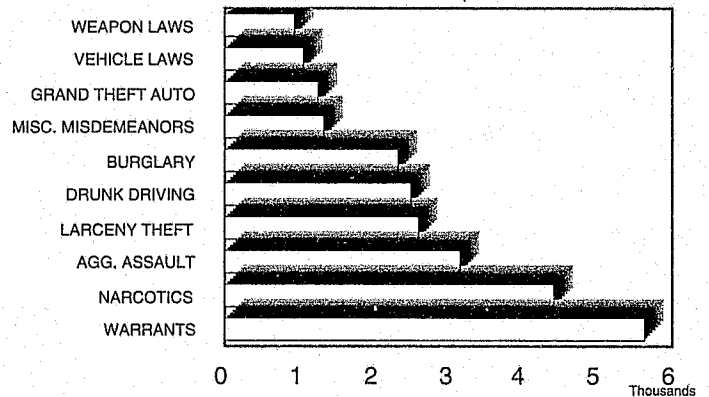


TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES

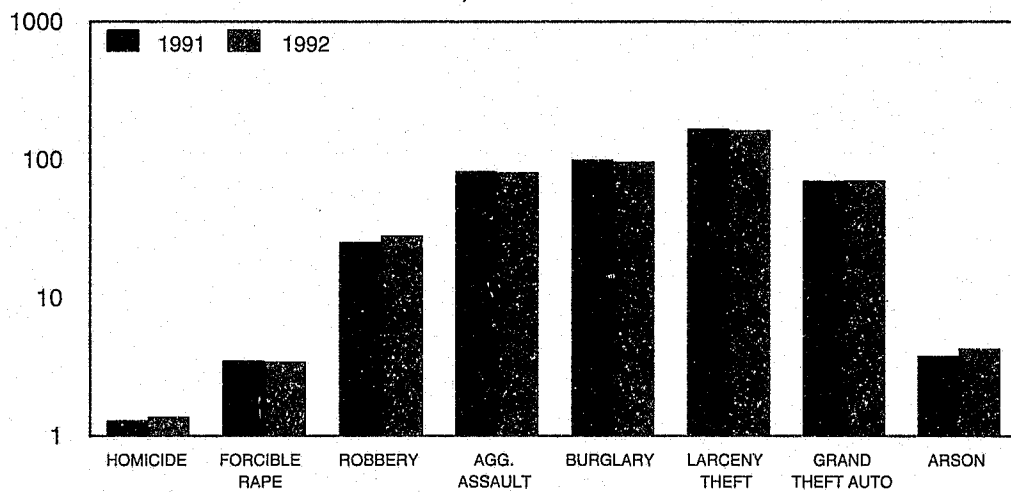



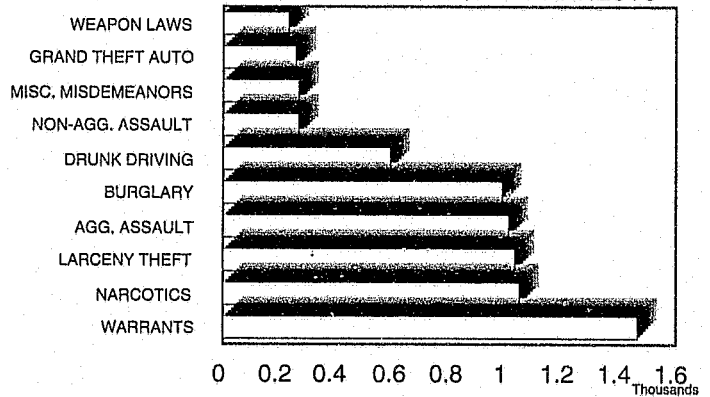
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



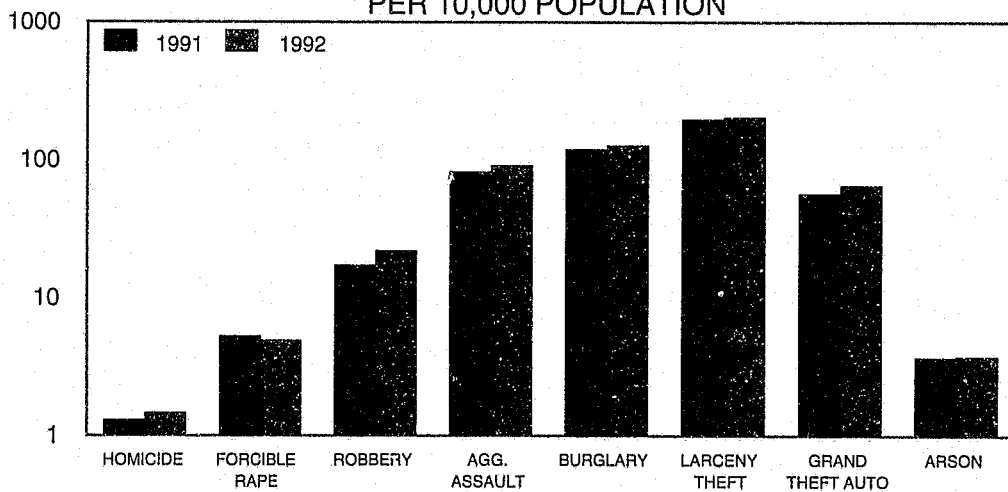
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

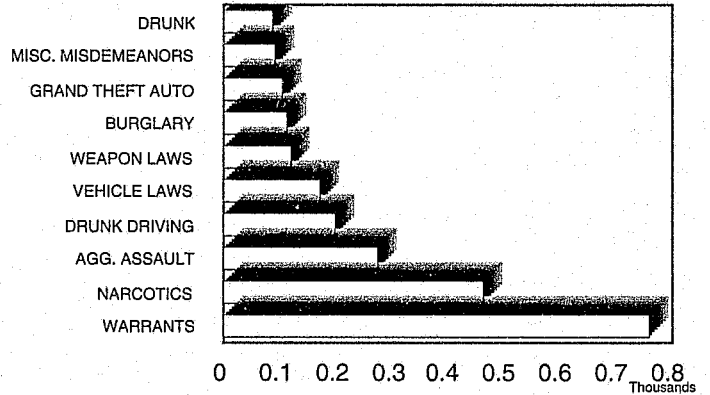
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



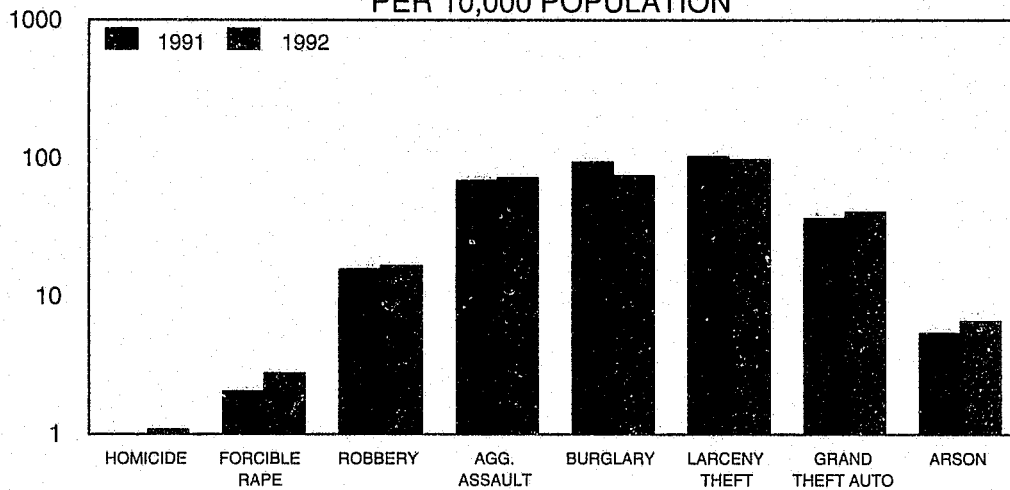
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

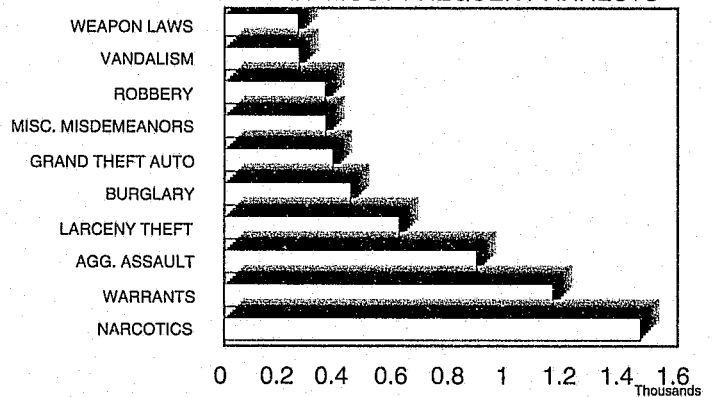
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



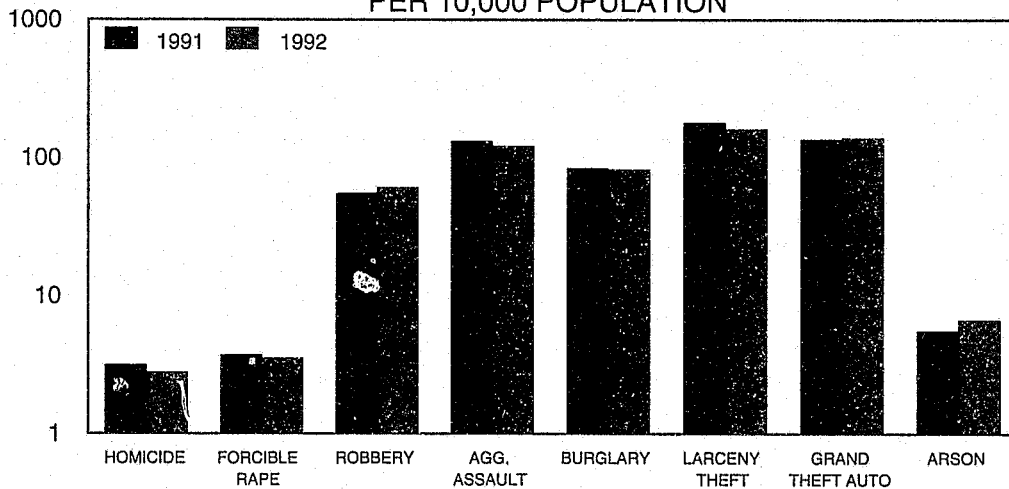
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

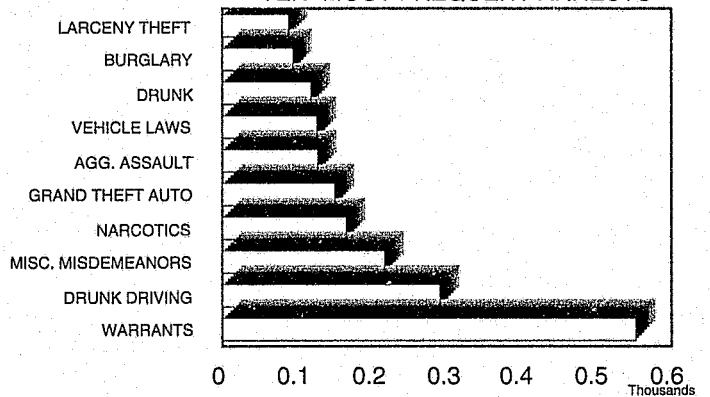
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



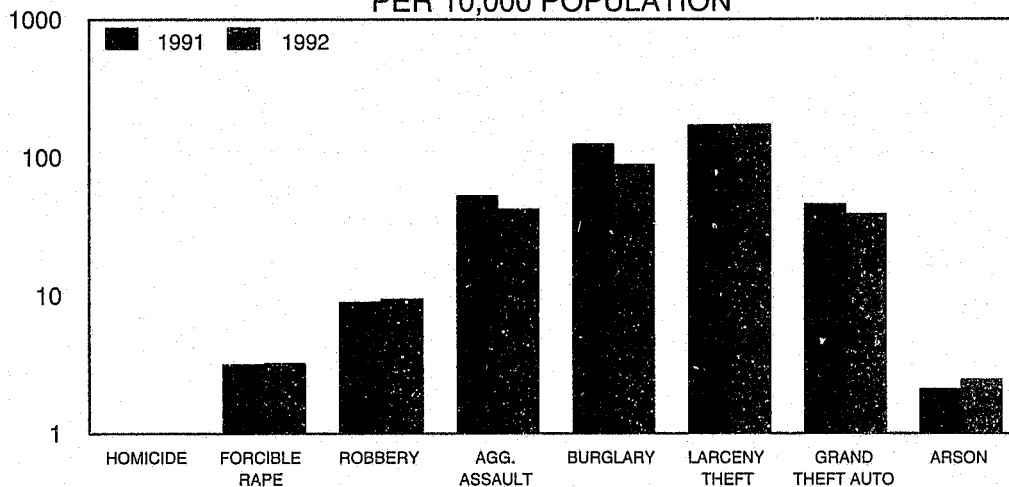
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

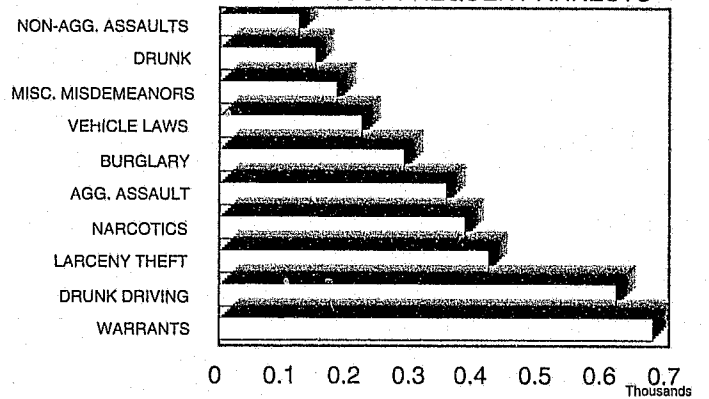

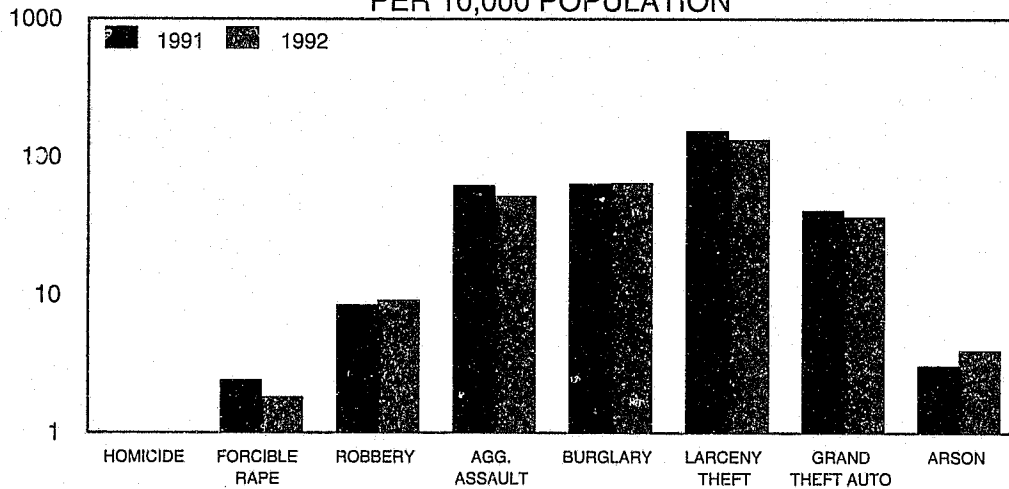
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

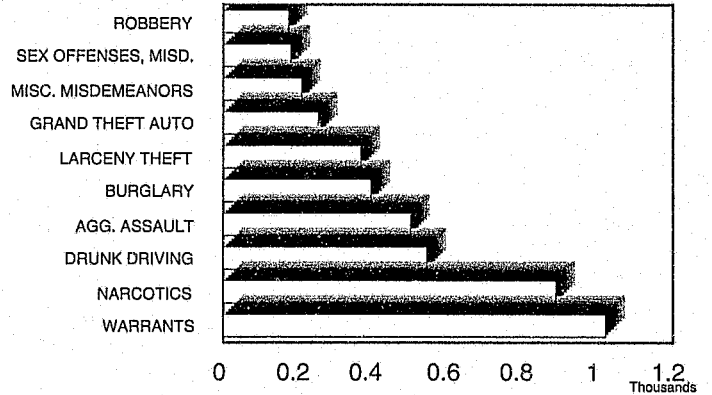
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



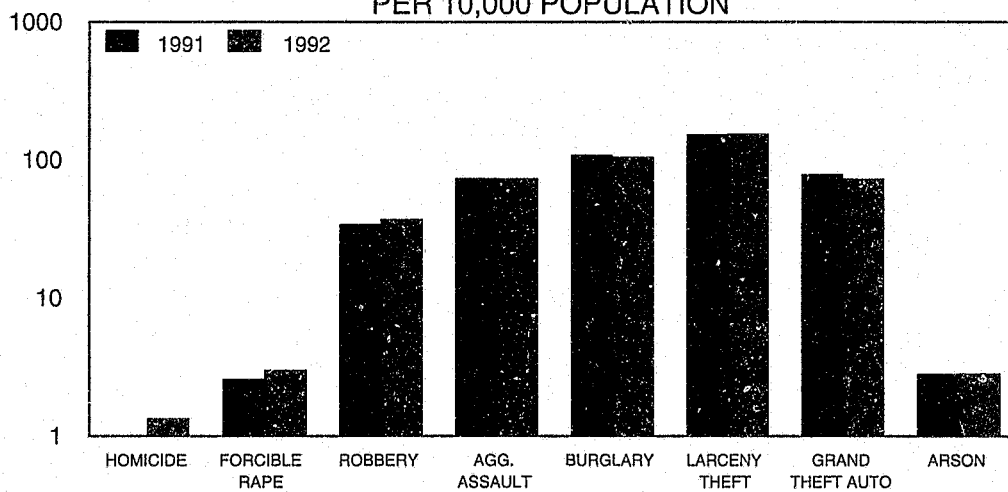
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

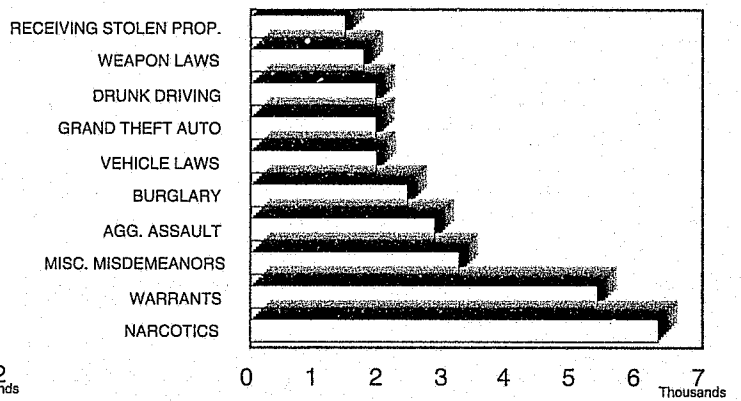

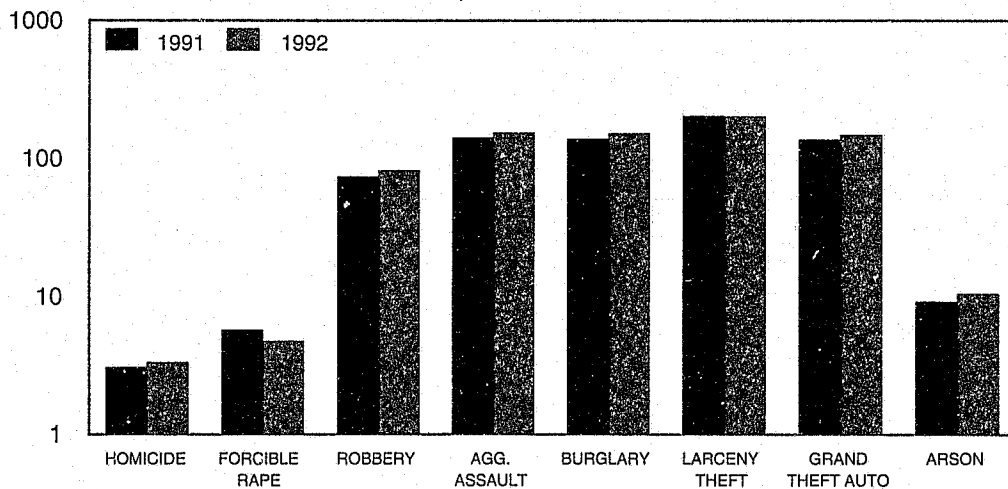

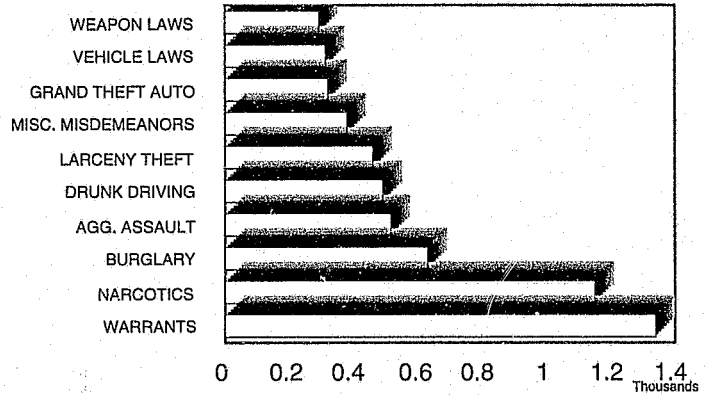

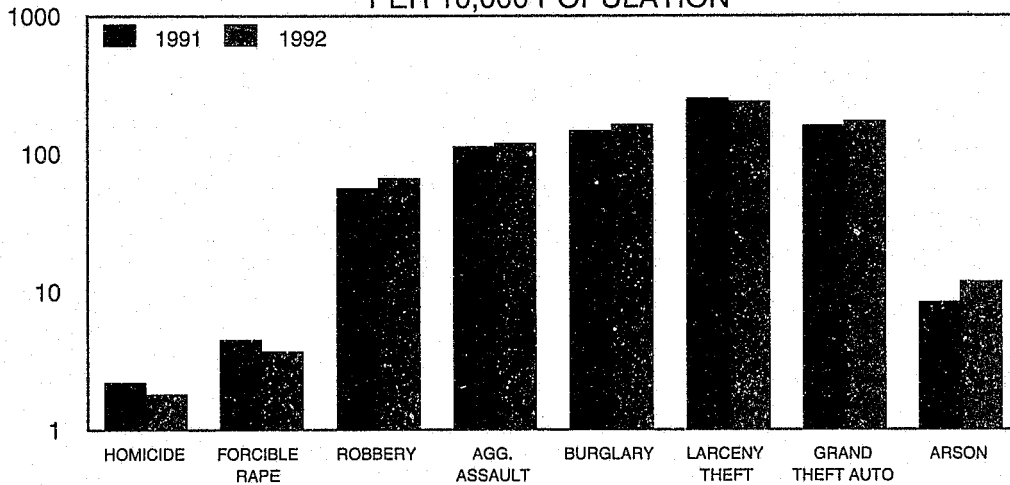
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

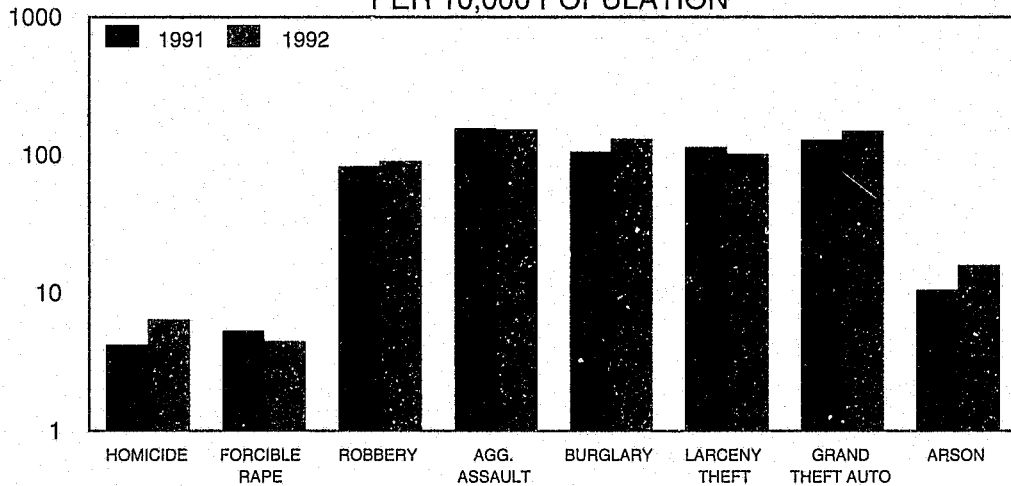
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

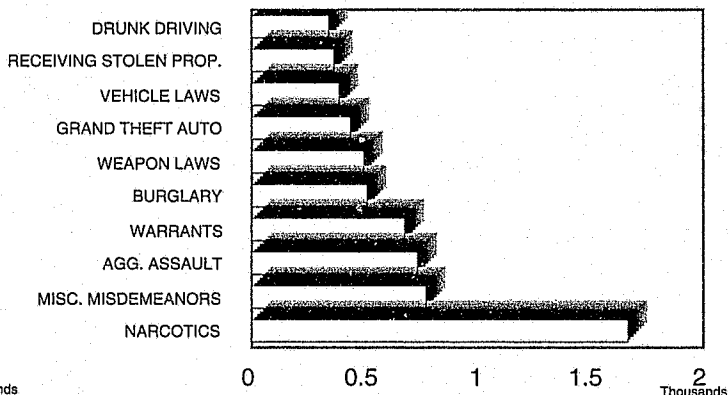
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



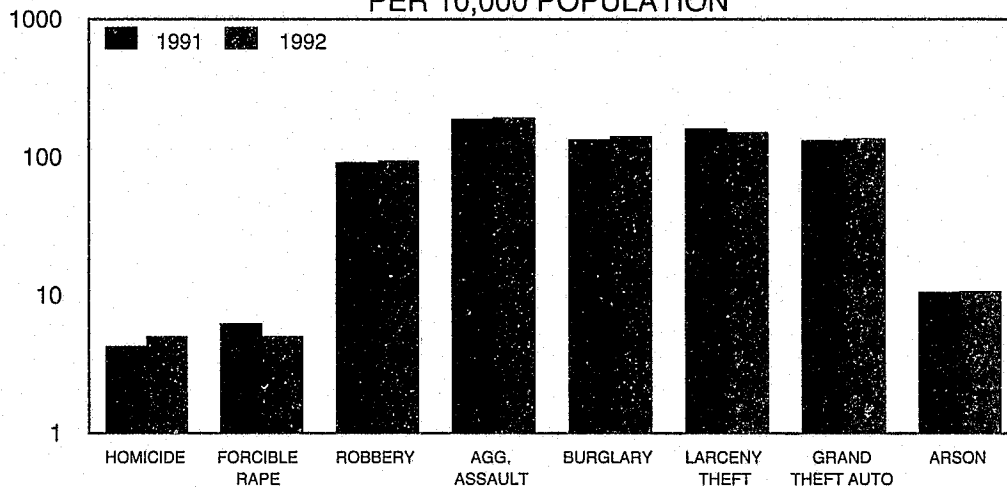
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

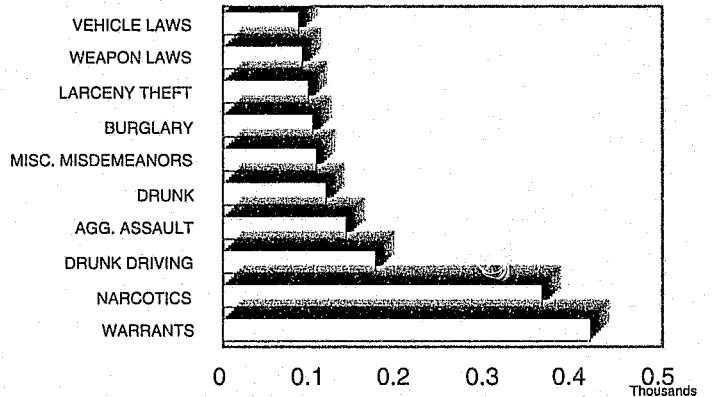
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



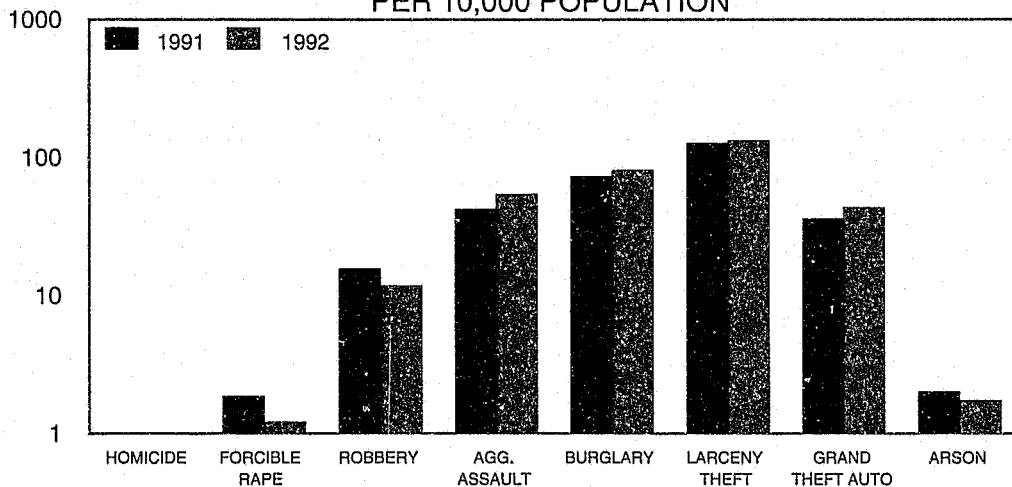
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

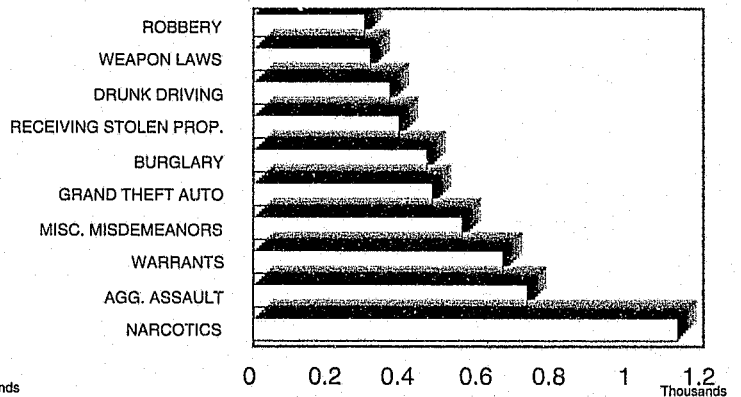
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



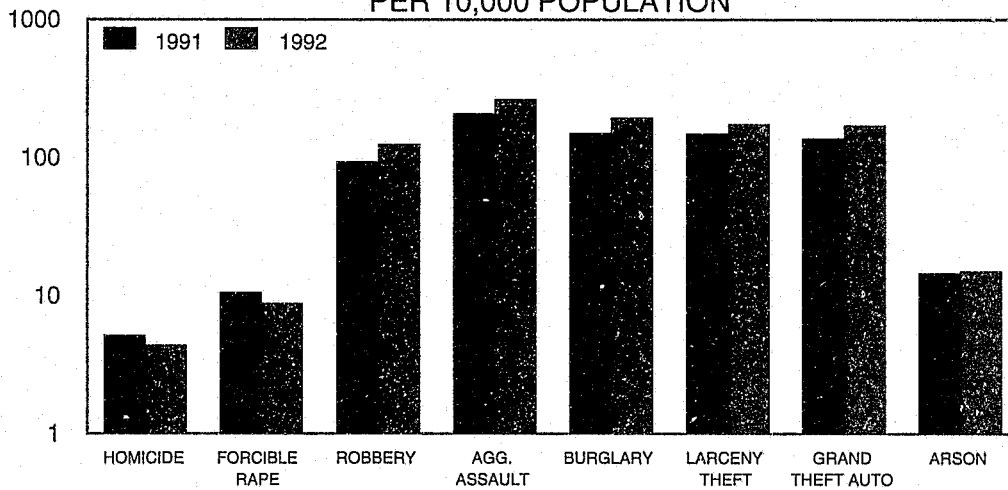
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

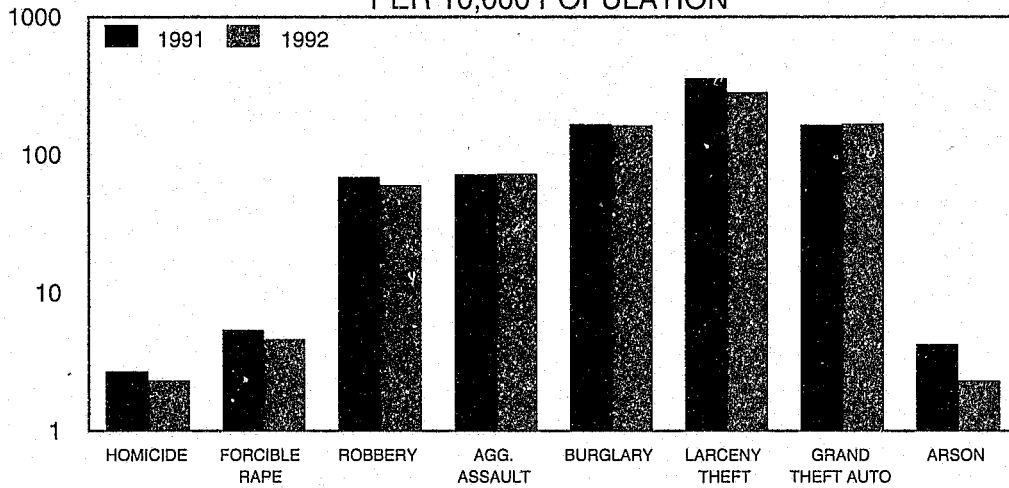
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

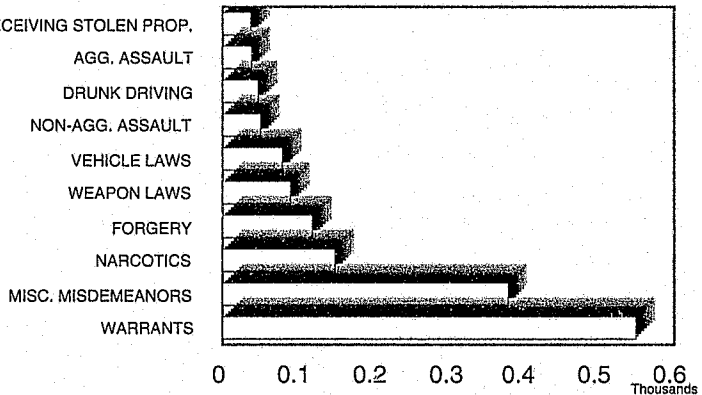
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



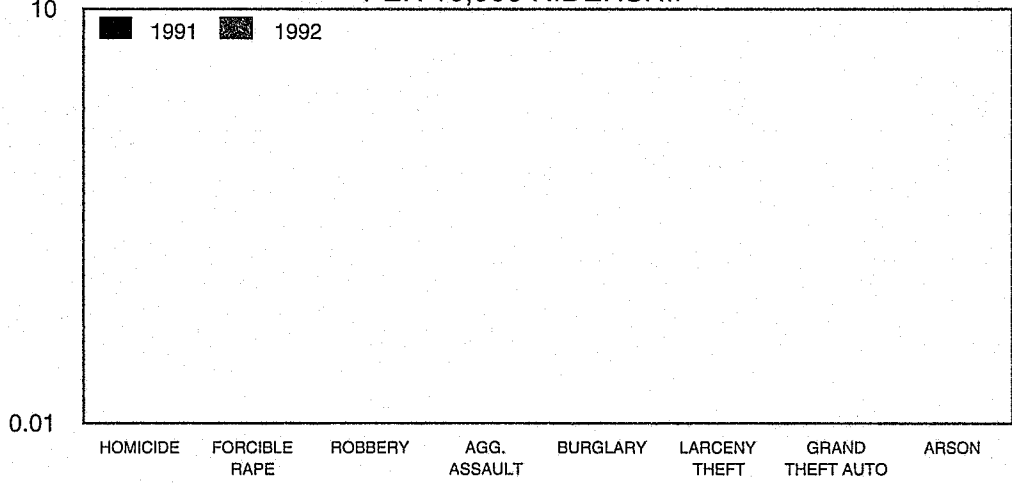
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

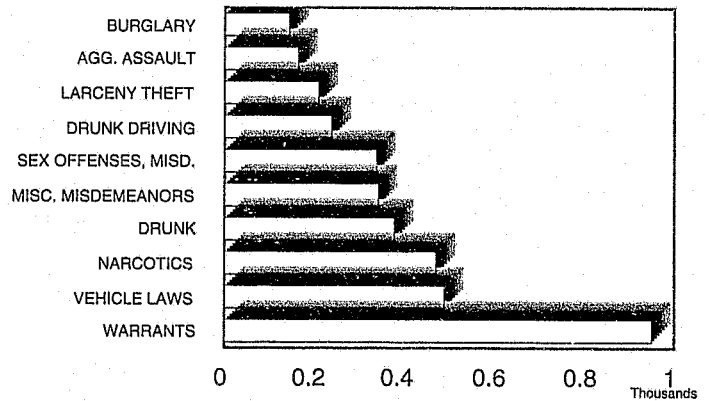
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



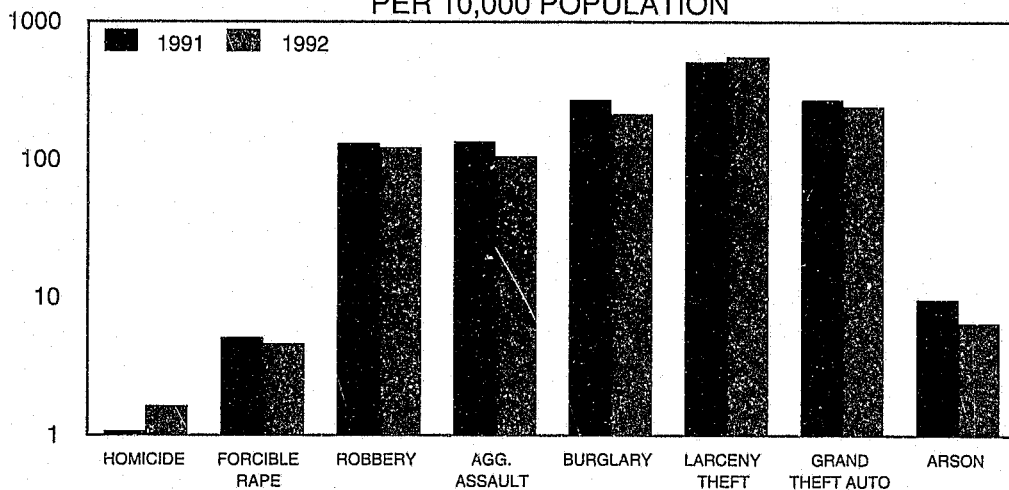
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

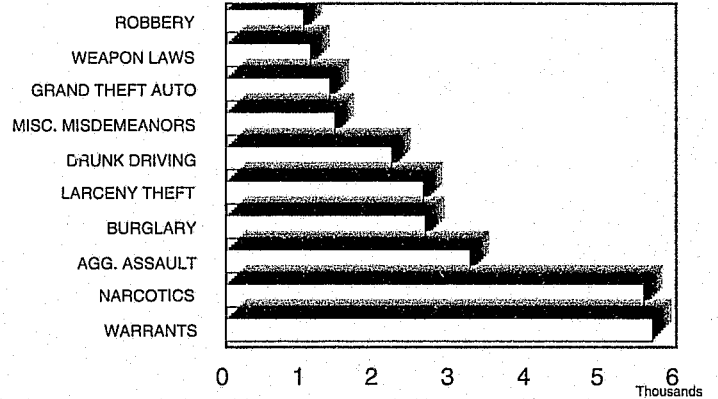

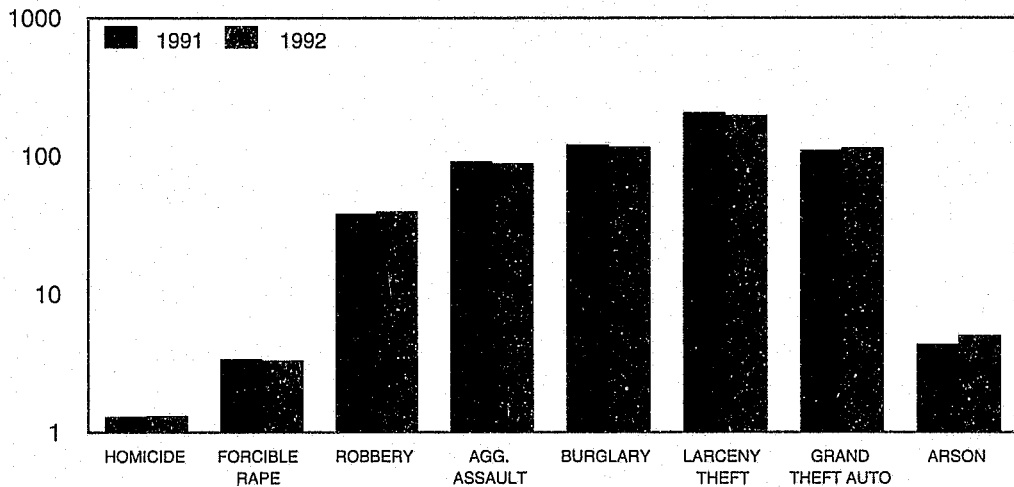

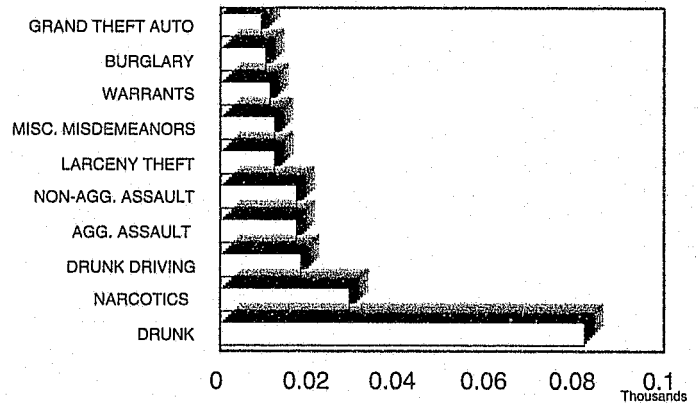

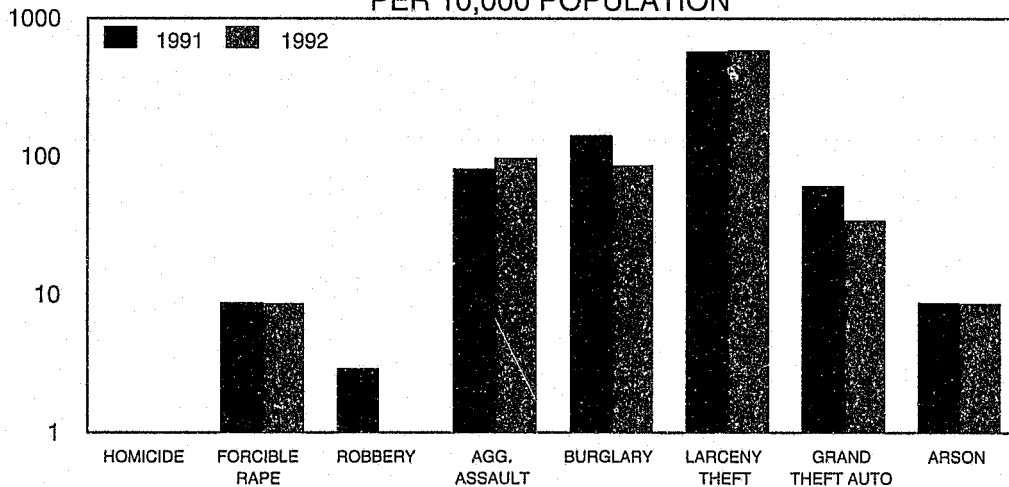
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

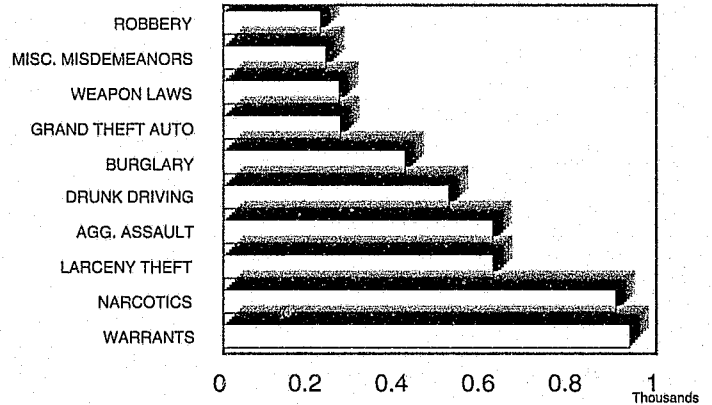
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



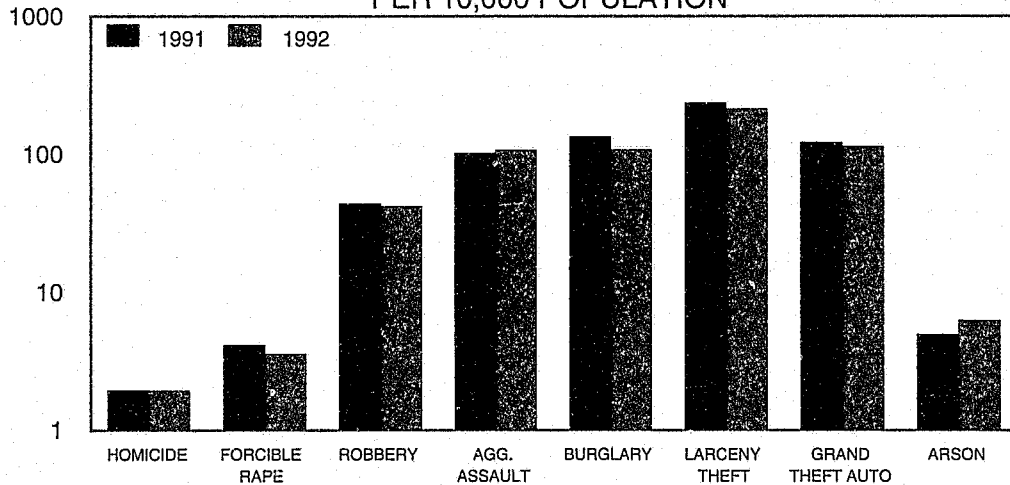
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

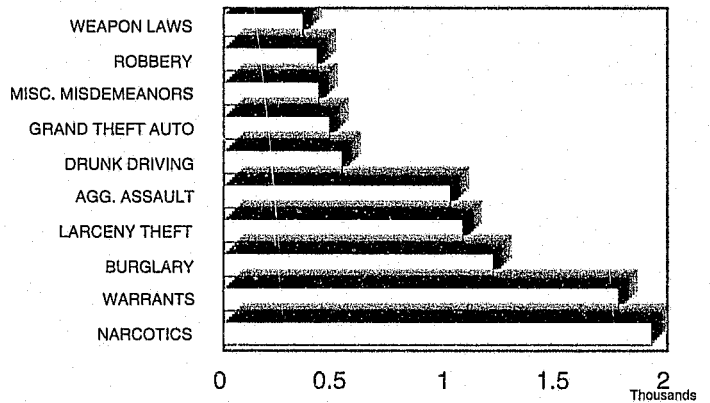
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



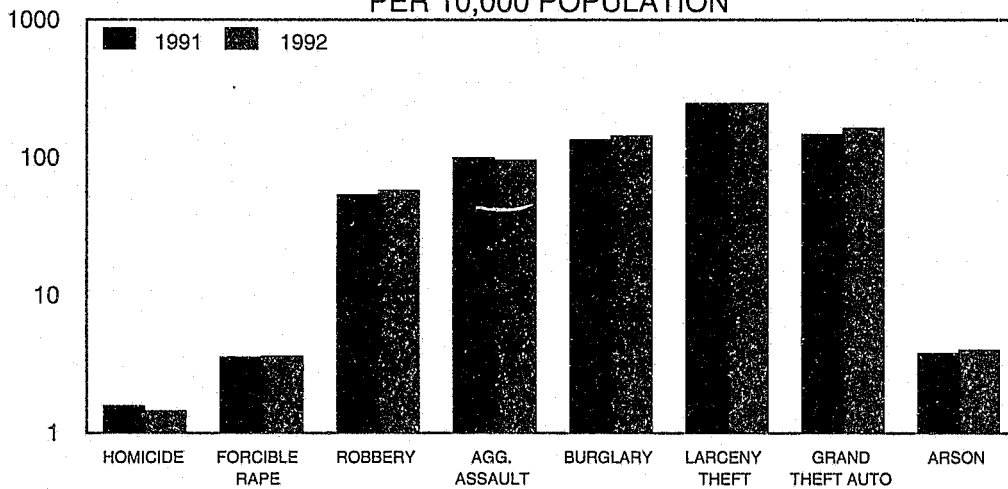
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

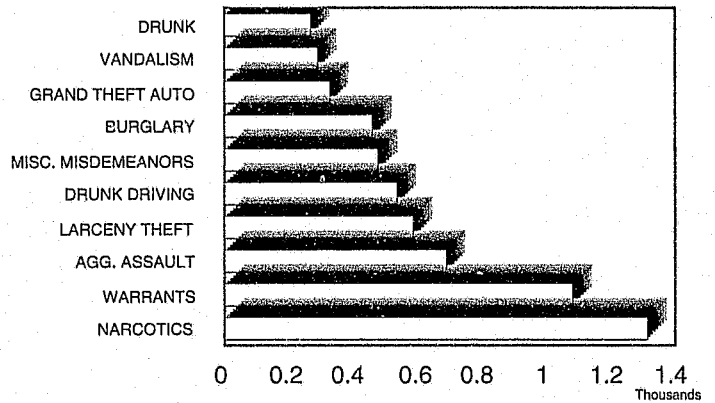
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



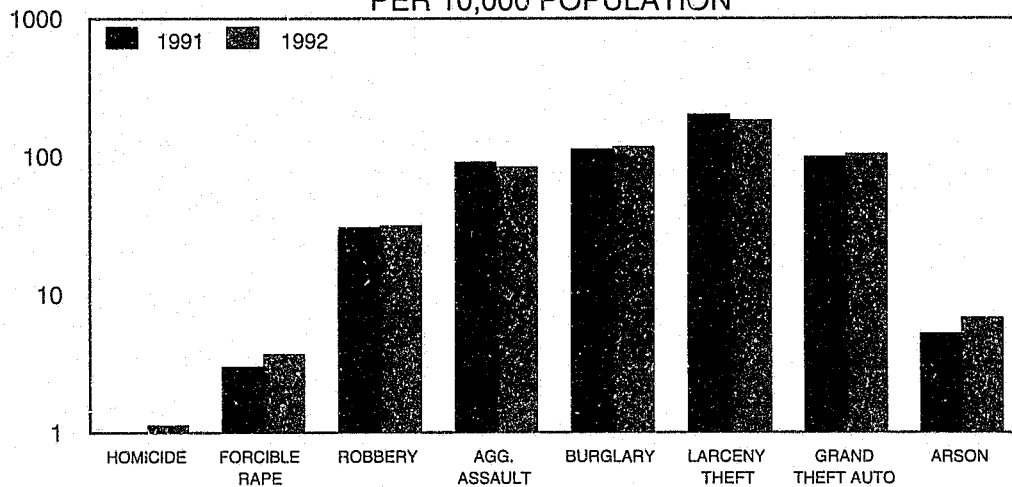
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

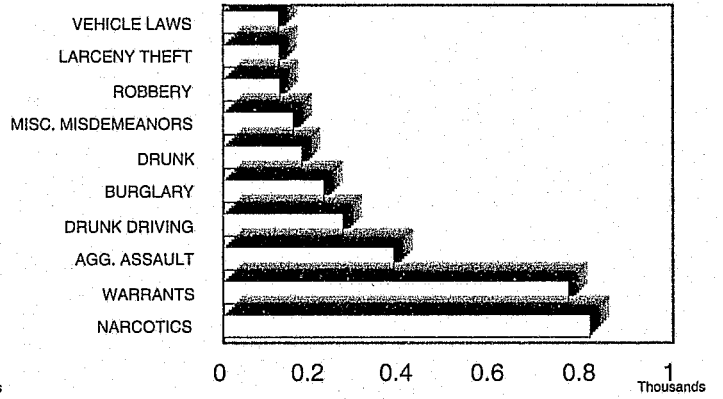
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



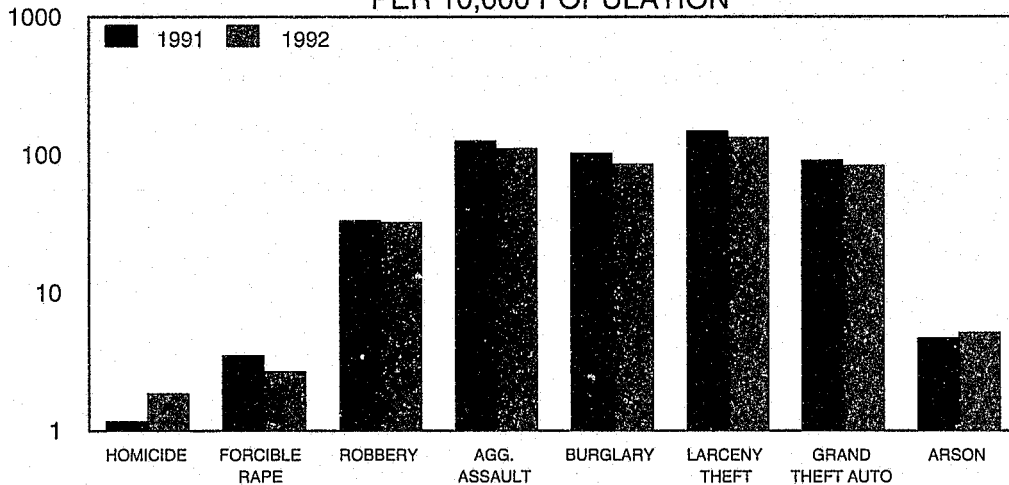
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED

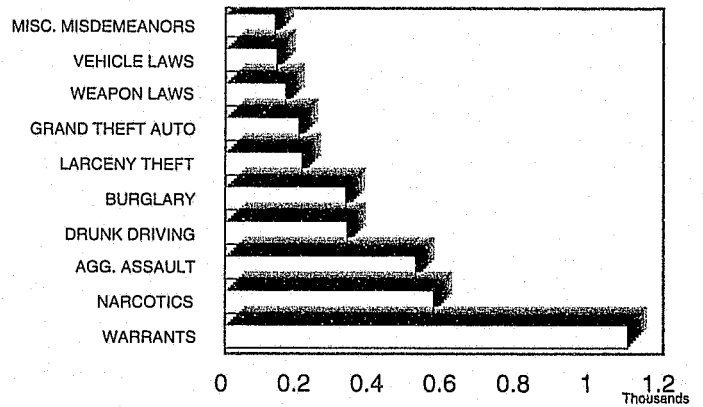
CASES HANDLED BY LOCATION



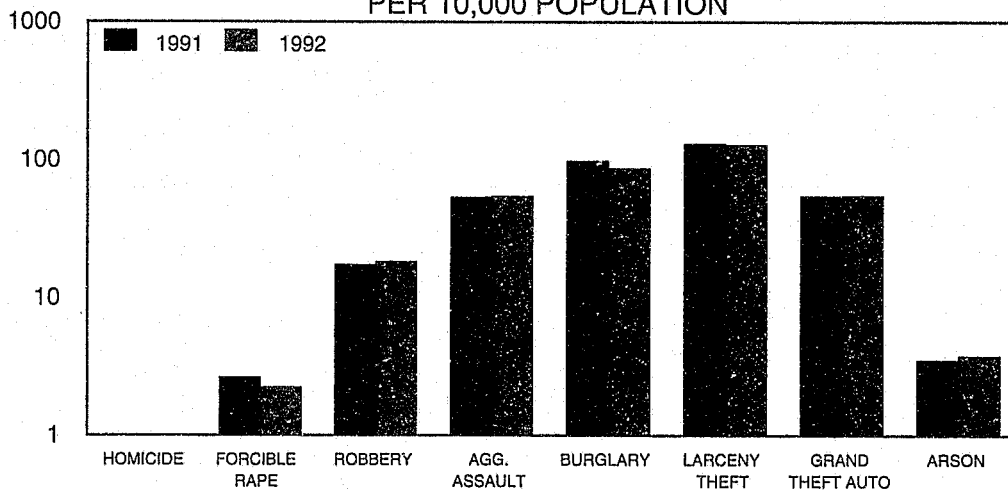
TEN MOST FREQUENT CASES HANDLED
