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This volume, *Wisconsin Criminal Justice Information, Crime and Arrests - 1972* has been developed with the philosophy that understanding problems is the first step in their solution. The following analysis is presented for the benefit of all who are concerned with the problems and progress of law enforcement and criminal justice in our state. I am certain that criminal justice administrators, elected officials, academic researchers, and an interested public will find it of unique value.

Uniform Crime Reports provide the basis for this examination of crime in Wisconsin, and 1972 was the first year in which the Wisconsin Program experienced 100 percent participation by all direct contributors. The year also saw the introduction of UCR Monthly Comparison Reports that are returned to local law enforcement administrators and the issuance of quarterly and semi-annual crime and arrests trend data.

Wisconsin's Uniform Crime Reporting Program is administered by the Crime Information Bureau of the Division of Law Enforcement Services within the Department of Justice. In addition to summary crime reporting, the Bureau operates the centralized state identification repository and the computerized TIME System. The year 1972 provided statewide advances in identification services serving all segments of the criminal justice system and the complete implementation of the TIME System, both of which are treated in more detail within this report.

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PREFACE

In response to statutes effective in November of 1969, requiring the creation of a statewide criminal justice information system in Wisconsin, the Crime Information Bureau has produced its fourth annual report - *Wisconsin Criminal Justice Information, Crime and Arrests - 1972*. It is a report to the Governor, Legislature, and the public concerning the characteristics of crime and criminal justice activity in Wisconsin. It is a detailed report which generally focuses on the entire year. Crime statistics of a summarized nature relating to shorter periods of time are published as Quarterly Releases.

This volume depicts the extent of crime and related law enforcement activity, measured in terms of arrests and clearances. Crime statistics are presented on a statewide, administrative district, county, population component and category, and local basis. Such information is essential in analyzing the crime problem and planning for and evaluating the criminal justice response.

The Crime Information Bureau is appreciative of the assistance furnished by several organizations during the preparation of this 1972 annual report. The Federal Bureau of Investigation was most cooperative in extending advice and support. The 1972 population figures used in this volume are based on estimates determined by the Wisconsin Department of Administration. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funds, made available through the Wisconsin Council on Criminal Justice, support the document. Finally, because Uniform Crime Reports form the basis for this publication, *Wisconsin Criminal Justice Information, Crime and Arrests - 1972* would not have been possible without the fine cooperation of Wisconsin law enforcement agencies in supplying data.

This report may be used to gain an overview of Wisconsin crime and to make general comparisons between jurisdictions. However, local law enforcement administrators are in a much better position to assess local crime problems than is the Crime Information Bureau, and readers desiring additional information concerning a particular community's crime should make such inquiries.

ABSTRACT

This 1972 annual report is based on information regarding offenses known to the police and arrest activity as received from Wisconsin law enforcement agencies. The three significant areas of concentration are: a general overview of criminal justice information, a summary analysis of the data, and a series of detailed reference tables. The utility of criminal justice statistics, the Wisconsin Uniform Crime Reporting Program and its limitations, and the reasons for the Wisconsin Crime Information Bureau's participation in the UCR Program are all discussed in the first section. A narrative interpretation of the data is provided for the reader who is interested in an analysis of Wisconsin crime and arrest information. The extent and nature of Wisconsin's reported crime is delineated. Crime Index offense trends, clearances, adult and juvenile arrests, and law enforcement personnel data are also discussed in depth in this portion of the report. The reference tables provide the reader with specific information on the volume, rate, and monthly trend of Crime Index offenses, arrests for Part I offenses, and arrests for Part II offenses. Also included in the reference tables are data regarding clearances, juvenile involvement in clearances, property losses, and charges and dispositions for Part I and Part II offenses. Arrest information is broken down by age, sex, and race for total, city, suburban, and rural Part I and Part II arrests. Adult and juvenile arrest tables are shown. Lastly, law enforcement management data, including assaults on officers information, are offered in the reference tables.


HISTORY AND OPERATION OF THE WISCONSIN CRIME INFORMATION BUREAU

The words "crime information" are particularly appropriate for use as part of the name of the Wisconsin state government agency whose sole responsibility is to provide information concerning crime and the administration of criminal justice. "Information" should be interpreted as including a wide range of knowledge that has an impact on the more effective functioning of the criminal justice process - from a review of the incidence of crimes in Wisconsin, to fingerprint identification and provision of Identification Transcripts, to rapid dissemination of data regarding wanted persons and stolen property. The Crime Information Bureau exists to collect, store, analyze, and disseminate information; it has no investigative or enforcement functions. There are three basic information systems within the CIB - SUMMARY STATISTICS, IDENTIFICATION, and INQUIRY (TIME).

SUMMARY STATISTICS

Wisconsin Criminal Justice Information, Crime and Arrests - 1969, the Crime Information Bureau's first annual report, was published based on data furnished by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. These statistics had been collected by the FBI under their national Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. During 1970, law enforcement agencies in our state continued to contribute directly to the Federal system, with a copy to the Crime Information Bureau. However, beginning in January of 1971 Wisconsin police departments and sheriffs' offices began utilizing Wisconsin UCR forms and sending data to the CIB. The Crime Information Bureau in turn reviews, verifies, and forwards this data to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, generally by magnetic tape.

Figure 1 depicts the current Summary Statistics System of the Crime Information Bureau. Monthly Comparison Reports that relate current activity to activity in relevant prior periods of time are routinely returned to agencies following submission of UCR data. A series of eight Comparison Reports are returned each month (samples are shown in Figure 2). Each contributor receives an Annual Summary Listing of its aggregated UCR data. Final national and inter-state data were unavailable at the time of this writing, but these comparisons will be published in late 1973 as a Supplemental Annual Report following release of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's *Crime in the United States - 1972*. Quarterly and Semi-Annual Reports for 1973 will also be issued. Special reports on particular crime topics have been published by the Crime Information Bureau, and the agency has responded to many individual requests for information. The *Wisconsin UCR Guide* and the *Wisconsin UCR Monthly Comparison Reports Guide* have been disseminated for instructional purposes. Crime Information Bureau Field Representatives are available to assist local and state criminal justice agencies in all phases of the CIB's programs, including Uniform Crime Reporting.

The underlying long-range philosophy of the CIB's Summary Statistics Program is to collect, analyze, and disseminate information that will present a more relevant, and more timely, picture of criminality in our state. However, the most pertinent review involves comparisons with appropriate standards. Therefore, in addition to presenting basic information reported, comparative norms or averages are also developed.

IDENTIFICATION

On July 1, 1971, the Crime Information Bureau began accepting and processing fingerprint cards, photos, and other identifying information that is extremely vital to the criminal justice function. Wisconsin law requires that all persons arrested or



taken into custody by law enforcement agencies for felony offenses, as well as misdemeanor or ordinance violations involving burglary tools, commercial gambling, gambling devices, contributing to the delinquency of a child, stolen property, dangerous drugs, marijuana, narcotics, firearms, dangerous weapons, explosives, pandering, prostitution, sex offenses where children are victims, worthless checks, disorderly conduct which relates to an act connected with one or more of these offenses, and fugitives from justice, be fingerprinted and the prints sent to the CIB. On receipt of arrest fingerprint cards and photographs, Classification Technicians in the Identification Unit of the Crime Information Bureau classify and search the identification files. Based on positive identification, notations are made on Identification Transcripts and these are furnished to the contributing and/or arresting agencies or provided upon request to bonafide criminal justice agencies for official use in investigatory, prosecutorial, judicial, or correctional activities of federal, state, and local government. The central criminal offender photograph repository enables authorized investigatory agencies to receive, upon request, photos for use in identification activities which facilitate the clearance of criminal matters throughout Wisconsin jurisdictions. Identification information is processed by the Bureau and responses are furnished promptly. Record requests by telephone, mail or teletype are received, processed, and a response provided immediately to bonafide agencies (See Figure 3).

All entries on Identification Transcripts are supported by fingerprints after positive identification of the named offender is established. The development of the centralized identification system has been a result of careful planning and it strives to provide the best service possible to law enforcement and the criminal justice process. The Crime Information Bureau meets regularly with an identification advisory committee composed of seven members of the Wisconsin Association for Identification. The committee members, who are identification officers and administrators from Wisconsin law enforcement agencies, act in an advisory manner on all matters of mutual concern.

As provided by law, but relatively new to the criminal justice system, dispositions of criminal cases are received from the agency making the final disposition. At the time of arrest, law enforcement agencies initiate a disposition report bearing fingerprint impressions which is forwarded to the prosecutor and the court along with the case papers. When final disposition is reached, whether it be by the prosecutor or by the court, the disposition report is forwarded to the Crime Information Bureau. Based again on positive fingerprint identification, offender records are updated to provide total information as to the final consequence of the criminal action. A copy of the verified disposition report is sent to the originating law enforcement agency. Wisconsin correctional agencies also report the receipt, transfer, and status of all persons under the supervision and custody of the State Division of Corrections.

The Wisconsin CIB processed approximately 4,200 fingerprint cards per month during 1972 as submitted by 250 criminal justice agencies. An exact accounting of yearly totals and monthly averages of receipts and filing entries for various identification functions is displayed in Table A. A 178 percent increase in the Master Fingerprint Card File was realized in 1972, the year beginning with 27,874 cards in file and ending with 77,626. Positive identification comparisons of newly received fingerprint cards with cards on file occurred 30 percent of the time on the average throughout the year.

1972




Figure 4 shows pictorially the monthly input of fingerprint cards and Final Disposition Reports. The collection and dissemination of factual identification information is vital to the orderly progress and future effectiveness of law enforcement. Expansion and improvement of the Wisconsin identification service envisions the utilization of modern computer technology. The Wisconsin Identification Information System is compatible with the historic identification activities of the FBI and is designed to allow for the coordinated exchange of state and national information of interest throughout the United States.


INQUIRY (TIME)

The Transaction Information for Management of Enforcement (TIME) system became operational in October of 1972. The TIME system is a data communications function that serves all state and local law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin, replacing the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Teletype System (WLETS). TIME was implemented to meet a basic need of all law enforcement agencies - the fast and efficient exchange of factual law enforcement information. The system has not only modernized the data communications capability, but also interfaces law enforcement agencies to factual data files that are centralized, complete, up-to-date, and rapidly accessible.

The nucleus of the TIME System is a computer based data communications Control Center, operated by the Crime Information Bureau, housing duplexed data communications computers which handle all message switching for the system. All TIME messages pass through the Control Center computer for automatic routing wherein the computer logs all transactions on disk for 24 hours and subsequently transfers the log to magnetic tape. Traffic volume has increased to a daily average of 20,000 messages. The computer handles all polling and line control to prevent line domination by terminals, avoiding backlog of traffic and allowing for a centralized point of coordination.

The TIME Control Center is manned 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Operators on duty assist system users and coordinate trouble reports on lines and terminals. The Center assists users in arranging for training of new personnel, as well as with other problems and questions. The Control Center computer interfaces TIME terminals to the data files and provides the capability to send administrative messages terminal-to-terminal, terminal-to-multiple terminal, areawide, and statewide (regulated).

In October, 1972, all Wisconsin warrants and stolen vehicle records in the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) were converted to the Crime Information Bureau automated files. Utilizing a TIME terminal, agencies now enter, modify, cancel, and inquire on factual data in the CIB warrant/wanted persons and stolen vehicle files as required by Wisconsin law. The CIB warrant/wanted file includes names of persons with identifying data against whom outstanding court warrants or authorized wants exist in Wisconsin. Approximately 7,000 warrant/wanted records are on file. These consist of felony warrants, temporary felony wanteds, non-felony warrants - state law, non-felony warrants - local ordinance, and miscellaneous wanteds (missing, runaway, escapee, etc.). The CIB stolen vehicle file has approximately 4,900 records containing information on stolen vehicles, stolen or lost license plates, vehicles used in the commission of a felony, and stolen vehicle parts reported to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies.

The TIME system also provides users the capability to access factual data in the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) concerning stolen, missing, or recovered guns, stolen articles, wanted persons entered by other states, stolen/wanted vehicles and stolen license plate records entered by other states, and stolen/embezzled/missing securities. TIME users can also access information in the Department of Transportation automated vehicle registration and driver information files.

The TIME system currently includes 148 model ASR-35 tele-

type terminals located throughout the state and is interfaced with the Milwaukee Police Department PACS (Police Automated Communications System) which links thirty Milwaukee Police Department terminals to TIME. An interface to the Madison Police Department MAPS (Madison Area Police System) is being developed and will link department terminals to the TIME system. The National Law Enforcement Teletype Service (NLETS) is also connected to TIME.

An interface, under development for implementation in July, 1973, will join the TIME system with the Automated Law Enforcement Communications System (ALECS), which will then link eight Mid-western states. The participating states, besides Wisconsin, are Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Missouri, Kentucky, Ohio and Iowa. The purpose of ALECS is to provide any terminal on the automated system of a participating state the capability to inquire into the computerized vehicle registration and/or driver's license files of other participating states. In addition to this query capability, terminals in all participating states may communicate directly via administrative message. Participating states have jointly designed ALECS with the objective of maintaining an automated law enforcement communications system primarily dedicated to better serving the needs of field officers.

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies are now utilizing some of the most modern technology available for the exchange of intrastate and interstate factual information. Even though the state is now among the national leaders in law enforcement data communications, a continuing effort will be made to provide system enhancements that reflect the needs of modern operation and administration.

The TIME system is a remarkable tool for dealing with the crime problem. Benefits which have resulted are, without question, increasing the effectiveness of law enforcement and criminal justice throughout Wisconsin.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE INFORMATION

USES OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA

GENERAL USEFULNESS

Is crime a minor problem? Is the administration of criminal justice in Wisconsin equitable, certain and swift, efficient, and economical? Is there nothing that can be done to improve its operations? If the answers to these questions are affirmative, then there is little need for a document of this nature or for an attempt to improve our system of criminal justice. On the other hand, if we refuse to accept the present incidence and impact of crime, and believe there is much that can be done to enhance the process of criminal justice, then positive and enlightened action is called for. However, actions must be based on valid and complete measurements of the problems we face. The prerequisite for effective problem definition and analysis is information, and the areas of crime reduction and criminal justice improvement are no exceptions.

Throughout history crime has generally been perceived as a serious social problem. Criminal behavior is one of the major domestic concerns in our Nation today, and our citizens have the right to be informed of the full nature, magnitude, and trend of the crime problem. Moreover, without such a disclosure it is impossible to assess the real costs of crime to our society. For, in the final analysis, it is the public who pays the costs--psychic, physical, and economic--of criminality. They are the group who have their behavior patterns altered by their fear of attack, suffer the consequences of physical assault, and have their possessions stolen or damaged. They pay higher insurance rates because of offenses against their property, as well as a higher price for goods and services due to business losses from organized and unorganized crime. The public has a right to know the complete extent of all these costs. Through their taxes they support the institutions of our criminal justice system and, as citizens in a

democracy, they have the right and the obligation to appraise the allocation and effectiveness of limited governmental financial resources. Finally, both cooperation as individuals and group action by our citizens are required for crime reduction and the improvement of our criminal justice system. But cooperation and action will not be forthcoming unless and until they receive a more complete disclosure of the true nature of crime and criminal justice.

Wisconsin's Governor, Attorney General, and Legislature, and elected representatives at all local levels, require information concerning our crime problems as a basis for determining how best to allocate limited public funds. More adequate disclosure of the extent of criminality and the workings of our criminal justice system should facilitate decisions regarding legislation and appropriations for law enforcement, prosecution, defense, courts, and corrections as opposed to concerns and allotments for other pressing social problems. Information concerning crime, criminals, and the performance of our criminal justice system is vital for such decision making but, unfortunately, available data are still inadequate.

Effective solutions to the crime problem will depend on increased research to determine and assess the causes of crime and to develop and test theories of criminal behavior. All of these efforts require comprehensive and valid criminal statistics. Social scientists and professional criminologists require quantified data that will indicate who commits what types of crimes in order to establish typical "profiles" of criminals. Such profiles can help determine the proper focus and direction of crime prevention programs. However, studies of only limited applicability have been conducted to date due to the lack of available quantified information.

Administrators at every level of the criminal justice process require information with which to measure their workloads, identify and solve operational problems, and evaluate effectiveness. The

lack of valid and complete statistics is critical when the needs of these managers are considered. Data are required for program planning, development, budgeting, and evaluation, for estimating resource requirements and for allocating manpower and equipment. Information is also required to develop comparative norms of performance, for cost effectiveness studies, and for establishing data bases with which to analyze the criminal justice system at the local level.

There is a beneficial tendency to study criminal justice programs that have been successful historically or in other jurisdictions, and analyzing these may be useful to the local executive if such information is properly employed. Consideration may be given to utilizing the types of programs and resources that have proven successful elsewhere or in the past, but only after the characteristics of current local problems have been sufficiently determined. Administrators must first define the nature of their problems and only then review potential solutions. Programs must be adapted and tailored to fit unique local conditions. Administrators can and should identify the successful methods of others but must constantly appraise their applicability. This assessment requires information.

USEFULNESS TO LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES

The primary function of law enforcement is to safeguard the lives and property of the public. However, as in other endeavors, the situation is one of determining the best allocation of limited personnel and equipment resources. Police administrators are faced with the task of making decisions to achieve efficient and economical operations in their departments, but only through the use of accurate and complete information can these decisions be made and the results determined. Law enforcement administration and operations involve management functions, and the right information in the correct form at the proper time and place is necessary for effective management. What are the elements of the management decision-making process, and what are the types of information needed?

IDENTIFYING PROBLEMS. All police executives are faced with problems, but there is a need to get at the real nature of these problems and to define them in as much detail as possible. Is the level of criminal activity increasing? If so, what crimes are on the upswing? Facts need to be known as to the character, extent, and distribution of crime--its type, its amount, its hourly, daily, and seasonal patterns, and its geographical occurrence. Facts are needed concerning the nature of persons arrested and convicted--their age, sex, race and other characteristics. Information is required to answer the questions of "what", "when", "where", "how", "who", and, in particular, "why". Information is a prerequisite for identifying and examining real problems, not just symptoms.

ESTABLISHING GOALS. When problems are detected and understood, meaningful and realistic goals should be established for their solution. Goals should be formulated in terms of the results expected, and expected results should be stated as specifically as possible to provide for both direction and concentration of effort. For example, a goal of "reducing crime" is less meaningful than one that seeks to "reduce the nighttime residential burglaries by twenty percent". When information enables goals to be properly and realistically designed, they can be the cohesive force that ties together the diverse activities of a department into a meaningful united effort. Goals can create additional commitment on the part of law enforcement officers and provide challenges through which changes and improvement may be obtained. Finally, adequately expressed goals frequently imply actions required and measures of performance.

PLANNING FOR SOLUTION. Information has facilitated the identification and analysis of problems and the development of appropriate goals. Now, plans must be prepared for achieving the established objectives (solving the problems). Skilled analysis of who is committing what crimes, and where they are being committed, will frequently suggest appropriate strategies for prevention and control. Several alternative programs may be defined. Then, based

on information as to what has worked for the department in the past, or what has proved successful in similar jurisdictions with similar problems, the best program can be determined and implemented.

ESTABLISHING FEEDBACKS FOR MEASUREMENT AND CONTROL. Enlightened police administrators do not wait until a program has run its course before receiving information regarding the degree of success or failure. Rather, they build interim measuring devices into their programs that will feed back information concerning how well the programs are doing. Specific programs may be divided into program elements, and target dates and goals may be established for each element. The administrator wants to know if his department is keeping on course toward its overall goals. If it is not, he wants to know so that corrective action may be taken before the final results are in. Then it is too late for supplemental efforts. The essence of management control is to keep the department on course toward its objectives.

EVALUATING RESULTS. At the conclusion of a program, the results must be analyzed in relation to the goals. Success or failure must be objectively determined from available information. If success was achieved, is it possible to attribute this to specific characteristics of the program? Can these characteristics be employed in other programs? If failure occurred, there is a need to find out the reasons why. Was it because the goals were unrealistically high? Was the program inadequately designed? Can methods be identified with which to improve programs in the future?

The above was a brief description of the process by which executives make problem-solving decisions. It is readily apparent that accurate and complete information is vitally important at every step. The following products of Uniform Crime Reporting and output analysis by the Crime Information Bureau provides the law enforcement or criminal justice administrator with valuable information*:

1. Crime rates.
2. The nature of robberies, burglaries, and thefts, and the average and total value stolen in robberies, burglaries, thefts, and auto thefts.
3. The type of property stolen and recovered, by value, along with the recovery ratio.
4. Percent of crimes cleared by arrest.
5. Juvenile involvement in clearances of offenses.
6. The number of arrests and the rate per 100,000 population.
7. Juvenile arrests and the rate per 100,000 juvenile population.
8. Relative number of juvenile offenders handled within the department and released, referred to court or probation department, referred to a welfare agency, or to another police agency.
9. Information regarding the final disposition of persons arrested and charged.
10. Police strength per 1,000 population.
11. The number of assaults on officers, with and without injury, and the type of weapon used.
12. Trends in the above data.
13. Analogous data for other selected agencies, or group averages, for comparison purposes.

Police administrators may wish to utilize the above types of information. If necessary management data is presently unavailable in a department, a records system should be considered that will provide the proper information in the correct form and at the right time and place to give maximum benefit in decision-making. One of the functions of the Crime Information Bureau is to give assistance to local law enforcement agencies in the area of information collection, storage, analysis, and utilization.

Law enforcement administrators will find much basic data, as

well as comparative intrastate information, in this document. Another source is the eight Monthly Comparison Reports furnished by the Crime Information Bureau to UCR contributors, which provide a rapid and in-depth review of trends.

CRIME REPORTING IN WISCONSIN

WISCONSIN UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

Section 165.83, Wisconsin Statutes, requires that the Division of Law Enforcement Services in the Department of Justice (of which the Crime Information Bureau is a part) "Collect information concerning the number and nature of offenses known to have been committed in this state, the legal action taken in connection with such offenses from the inception of the complaint to the final discharge of the defendant and such other information as may be useful in the study of crime and the administration of justice. The administrator of the division may determine any other information to be obtained regarding crime statistics. However, the information shall include such data as may be requested by the F.B.I. under its system of uniform crime reports for the United States". Section 165.84 requires that "All persons in charge of law enforcement agencies, all clerks of court, all municipal justices where they have no clerks, all persons in charge of state and county penal and correctional institutions, and all persons in charge of state and county probation and parole offices, shall supply the division with the information so requested". While such a sweeping information-gathering mandate is essential for an effective analysis of crime and our criminal justice system, the Crime Information Bureau nevertheless depends on both the cooperation and integrity of state and local agencies to submit accurate and complete data.

At this stage in the development of the Wisconsin Uniform Crime Reporting Program, form content generally matches that of the national reporting system as administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. However, there are some important differences, in particular with respect to forms required and frequency of submission. The CIB expects that data collection will be logically expanded in the future as additional relevant information needs are determined, while at the same time collecting the national UCR statistics as a minimum.

Of primary importance is the necessity that all Wisconsin police departments and sheriffs' offices contribute data. All sheriffs' offices and, generally speaking, all city, village, and township departments serving jurisdictions above 2,500 persons contribute the full complement of UCR returns directly to the Crime Information Bureau. Smaller departments complete a simplified return and submit it to their sheriffs' office. The Sheriff, in turn, prepares reports that reflect the consolidated activity of his own and these smaller agencies.

Presently, recurring statistics gathered by the Wisconsin Program fall into four basic areas: offenses, arrests, charges and dispositions, and law enforcement employees. Offense data are reported to the Crime Information Bureau on a monthly basis to indicate the numbers of murders and nonnegligent manslaughters, negligent manslaughters, forcible rapes, robberies, aggravated and simple (non-aggravated) assaults, burglaries, thefts (under \$50, and \$50 and over, in value), and auto thefts that have become known to law enforcement agencies. These crime counts are obtained from records of complaints received from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during their operations. Complaints determined by police investigation to be unfounded (false or baseless) are eliminated from the final count. Homicides classified as "justifiable" under this Program are also excluded from the final murder counts. The numbers of "offenses known" in each of the above crime categories are reported without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, or prosecutive action is taken. Data is also collected on the number of these offenses cleared by arrest, and the number of clearances involving only juveniles.

Supplementary data is collected concerning all homicides, robberies, burglaries, thefts (excluding auto thefts), and auto thefts. The homicide returns provide detailed information on the age, sex, and race of the victim, the weapon used or cause of death, and additional facts surrounding the crime in the case of all reported murders, nonnegligent manslaughters, and non-traffic manslaughters by negligence.

All agencies report the value of losses incurred in various types of robberies, burglaries, and thefts, the losses as a result of auto thefts, and the number of stolen automobiles recovered. Their returns also indicate, for certain major categories, the value of property stolen and recovered. The requirement that all Wisconsin reporters submit this supplemental data concerning these property offenses is in contrast to the national reporting program. Traditionally, cities under 25,000 inhabitants and sheriffs' offices nationwide have reported only the number of each type of theft they experienced. However, collecting the full range of data from all Wisconsin agencies permits a more complete analysis of these crimes.

All departments report data monthly regarding the age, sex, and race of persons arrested for each "Part I" and "Part II" offense. (See Table B for a listing of offenses included. In general, Part II crimes are those that are less severe, committed more frequently, or less apt to come to the attention of the police.) Separate returns are submitted for adults and for juveniles (under 18 years of age). In addition, the law enforcement disposition of young persons arrested is recorded on the juvenile form. Nationally, these two returns are submitted only annually, but the more frequent submission by Wisconsin agencies makes possible the analysis of monthly arrest trends for specific offenses.

The numbers of persons charged with various types of offenses are reported by direct contributors annually, along with the numbers receiving legal dispositions during the year. Dispositions are broken down according to the number of persons found guilty of the original or a lesser offense, acquitted or dismissed, or referred to a juvenile court.

Law enforcement employee information has historically been obtained annually from direct contributors. The numbers of full-time sworn officers and civilian employees were reported for 1972, as was the sex of these employees. Beginning in January of 1972, a monthly return to record the number of

assaults on officers and the number of officers killed in the line of duty was introduced. The purpose of this return is to collect detailed information relating to the type of activity in which the officer was engaged at the time of the assault, the type of assignment, the approximate time of occurrence, whether or not the officer sustained injury, type of weapon, and if the assault was cleared.

The response of Wisconsin law enforcement agencies following the Crime Information Bureau's assumption of its role as Wisconsin's centralized statewide Uniform Crime Reports collection agency has been decidedly positive - a tribute to the professionalism of these departments. Police agencies have readily complied with the basic requirements of the statute, sometimes in spite of both meager records and limited records personnel. Moreover, the statewide crime and arrest reporting program has tended to generate new or greater interest on the part of local departments in the areas of record-keeping, statistical reporting, and data analysis.

As of this writing, the vast majority of all direct reporters in Wisconsin are submitting the full range of UCR information as required on an up-to-date monthly basis during 1973. Table C summarizes reporting experience in terms of offenses and arrests. With one exception in the case of juvenile arrest data, all agencies submitted these returns as required during 1972. In addition, more than 130 other smaller police departments forwarded one or more monthly offense and arrest reports to their local sheriff during the year.

Three general goals have been established to guide the Crime Information Bureau in upgrading Wisconsin's Uniform Crime Reporting Program in the near future. One immediate objective is to eliminate any duplication in reporting. When a smaller agency receives assistance from the sheriff's office in an investigation, there is a tendency for both to report the crime. Secondly, while many of the smaller police departments in the state (non-direct contributors) have been submitting offense and arrest data to their

local sheriff for consolidation in his Uniform Crime Reports, the regular participation of every one of these agencies will be solicited. Finally, the Crime Information Bureau will continue to work with all UCR contributors, as the need arises, in the areas of improved records systems and better quality crime and arrest reporting. To this end, the *Wisconsin UCR Guide* was published in early 1972 and disseminated to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies.

LIMITATIONS OF THE WISCONSIN UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

Information currently collected by the Wisconsin Program is generally the same as that gathered by the national system, and the methods of classifying and scoring offenses and arrests are the same. This readily enables comparisons with other states and the Nation, but the information gaps present in the national program are also inherent in Wisconsin's system.

Development of the current nationwide Uniform Crime Reporting Program began more than forty years ago. In 1930, crime counts were first requested from local police departments, with the Federal Bureau of Investigation designated by Congress to collect, compile, and analyze these statistics. The Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police played a primary role in the origin and development of the UCR Program and, to this day, serves in a strong advisory capacity. Standardized offense classifications and scoring procedures to insure uniformity and consistency of data are the keynote of the reports. All of the Uniform Crime Reports have been designed so that they are a by-product of information that a law enforcement agency should routinely compile for its own efficient administration and performance. The underlying philosophy and focus is and always has been oriented toward police statistics for use by law enforcement agencies, but the unique nature of the program makes the data invaluable for use by elected officials and the American public.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program has been subject to much criticism during its history and, while many of these commentaries have been valid, at least some of the shortcomings are understandable when it is remembered that the program has been developed to furnish management information for use primarily by law enforcement agencies. The Uniform Crime Reports are not a court or corrections statistical program. They are not designed to furnish an overview of the workings of our entire criminal justice system, nor are they able to give the complete picture of law enforcement activity. The main goal of the UCR Program is to furnish police administrators with a measure of their activities and operational problems, as indicated by the number of reported offenses, arrests, clearances, and the like.

Therefore, much of the criticism of the UCR Program itself is weakened when its stated primary purpose is kept in mind. Uniform Crime Reports data are the best crime information currently available since they reflect the key events (criminal offenses)

that set in motion the various phases of our criminal justice process. The number of arrests, prosecutions, or convictions, while capable of more precise measurement, nevertheless is less indicative of the amount and nature of crime because such data are further removed from the original event. But, because the Uniform Crime Reporting Program is the only recurring crime and arrest reporting program operating on a national level, of necessity it serves as the base for assessing the many significant information gaps at the input end of the criminal justice system.

A first step in the control of crime is to ascertain the true dimensions of the problem. However, present statistics as gathered by the UCR Program measure neither the real incidence of crime nor the full amount of economic loss to victims. Information regarding number of offenses and clearances is collected only for the nine Part I crimes, plus non-aggravated assault. Value and type of property stolen and recovered data is requested only for property stolen in Part I offenses. For the Part II offenses (except non-aggravated assault), the only information submitted is the number of arrests for these crimes according to the age, sex, and race of the subject. Consequently, there is no record of the actual number of these offenses occurring, nor is there a calculation made for property loss, as in cases of arson, vandalism, and embezzlement.

The returns completed by law enforcement agencies deal only with offenses that become known to them, and no data is routinely collected to measure the total amount of crime that actually occurs. Adequate research has not been conducted concerning this vital area of unreported crimes, but data indicates that perhaps half of all victimizations are not reported to the police. Generally, offenses with varying degrees of severity (e.g., assaults and thefts) are less likely to be reported when they are less serious. While the aspect of insurance recovery appears to have a positive effect on reporting the offense to the police, as in the case of auto theft, serious crimes against the person (homicide,

forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) have almost a 20 percent less chance of being reported when they are only attempts.*

There is certainly a significant amount of crime in the Nation and in our state that is not being reported. Unfortunately, when the amount of unreported crime is reduced by police action (resulting in better reporting practices or an increase in public confidence in law enforcement effectiveness which encourages citizens to report offenses) the product is still too frequently public alarm at the ensuing "crime wave".

Aside from the problem of victims not reporting all offenses to the police, as mentioned, the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, by design, receives input information on only certain crimes. If more than one of these occur in the same incident, only the most serious is scored according to a "hierarchy" of offenses.

If a murderer steals the automobile of his victim, the car theft is not scored. The "Crime Index", which is a count of the number of certain offenses, as they occur, is used as the basic measure of crime in our society. Offenses selected to comprise the Index include the "Violent Crimes" of murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault, and the "Property Crimes" of burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft. The well-known Crime Index is merely the total number of these seven offenses that have become known to the police. The rationale behind the use of the Index is that: (1) it reflects the true occurrence of crime better than any other kind of data; (2) it includes serious offenses that are most accurately reported and of most concern; (3) it only includes those crimes that can be uniformly defined; and (4) it includes offenses that occur frequently but do not have an unmeaningfully low or unmanageably high rate of incidence.

It is an open question if the relative incidence of only the seven Index crimes can adequately reflect the trend of criminality in our society. For a measure to be a valid index, its relationship to the total must be known. Unfortunately, the relationship of the Crime Index to total crime (all crime, both reported and unreported) has never been conclusively determined and, therefore, fluctuations in the Crime Index may or may not adequately reflect changes in our total crime picture. Conceivably, for example, a city can display a low or decreasing Index crime rate, and yet be dominated by prostitution, narcotics, gambling, liquor, and stolen property operations. These latter offenses are not a part of the Crime Index.

Moreover, in recent years the Uniform Crime Reporting system has taken no account of the price inflation so prevalent in our economy. During 1972, one of the seven Index offenses was theft \$50 and over in value and, between the two years 1960 and 1970, the number of these major thefts nationwide displayed a greater percentage increase than did any other Index crime. Furthermore, the numerical increase in these thefts between 1960 and 1970 amounted to 35 percent of the total increase in the level of Index crimes between the two years. But, at least a portion of these additional thefts may be accounted for by the fact that, during a period of rising prices, there are simply more articles above \$50 in value in the possession of our population and subject to the risk of theft. This particular limitation of the Crime Index no longer exists, as in 1973 theft \$50 and over was replaced with total theft as an Index offense.

The Crime Index does not explicitly take into account the varying degrees of seriousness of its seven components. Each crime receives the same weight as it is added to the Index. Consequently, an auto theft is counted the same as a murder, and an aggravated assault is weighted equally with an attempted burglary. Any review of crime must consider the volume, rate, and trend of each offense that comprises the Index, and the relationships between these seven crimes.

The Wisconsin and national Uniform Crime Reporting Programs are designed to measure offenses committed and persons arrested, and difficulty can arise if this distinction is not kept firmly in mind. Crimes relate to events, but arrests relate to persons. Unlike traffic violations where there is usually one event, with one violation and one offender, a single criminal act can involve several crimes, several offenders, and several victims. Relating specific crimes to the criminal, or specific offenses to characteristics of those arrested, is generally beyond the scope of the present Uniform Crime Reporting system.

Clearance rates reflect the proportion of criminal acts that are solved. However, the arrest, charging, and turning over to a court for prosecution, of only one of several offenders involved in a given crime is sufficient for a clearance to be scored. Therefore, clearance rates cannot be viewed as indicating the true degree of criminal apprehension.

Juvenile crime and arrest statistics are also open to question. Many juvenile offenders are handled informally and, as a consequence, inaccurate or incomplete recording of the event or action may result. Procedures for handling juveniles vary between departments much more so than in the case of adult offenders. Furthermore, the degree of juvenile involvement in solved offenses is probably seriously understated because juvenile participation in clearances is recorded only when juveniles are exclusively involved. When both adults and juveniles are subjects in a clearance, the juvenile participation is not reported.

Superficial conclusions are sometimes drawn from the UCR crime and arrest data, in particular when attempting to make comparisons between jurisdictions, because all factors that have an impact on crime problems are not measured or explicitly considered by this program. Municipal ordinances, local criminal justice administrative policies, efficiency and thoroughness of record keeping, and Uniform Crime Reporting proficiency and practices all affect

the amount of crime and arrests reported. Furthermore, socio-economic conditions and the characteristics and attitudes of the local population influence the magnitude and nature of criminal behavior in a community. General factors which can affect the amount of crime reported, and which must be expressly examined for an intelligent appraisal of interjurisdictional UCR data, are shown in Table D.

- Effective strength of the police force.
- Standards governing appointments to the police force.
- Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.
- Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

The preceding comments should not be viewed as an indictment of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program which, admittedly, is designed for the operational requirements of law enforcement agencies.

While current methods of gathering and reporting crime and arrest data provide a less than complete picture of criminality in our society, there is at present no other information system in general use that will more adequately perform this task. Many of the same criticisms may be equally applied to existing court and penal statistical information systems. For, in actuality, consistent data is not available with which to accurately assess the operation and problems of our criminal justice system. Deficiencies in information are apparent: the passage of time cannot be accounted for, and hence the degree of economy and swift justice cannot be measured; the true degree of recidivism, or recurring criminal behavior, cannot be measured; lacking data concerning dispositions at various levels of the criminal justice system, or the number of subjects passed through succeeding legal statuses, the efficiency of the process cannot be realistically evaluated. However, these information gaps will never be surmounted if we continue to view our "police", "judicial", and "correctional" statistical information systems as independent from each other. What is required is a "criminal justice" information system, with the offender passing through the criminal justice process being the unit about which all data is gathered.

REASONS FOR WISCONSIN CRIME INFORMATION BUREAU PARTICIPATION IN UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

The State of Wisconsin has legally enacted a mandatory Uniform Crime Reporting Program, and the Wisconsin Crime Information Bureau has been established as the state agency responsible for the centralized collection, analysis, and dissemination of these data. Currently, 12 other states have operational state UCR Programs and are forwarding crime statistics to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Another 21 states have programs in various stages of development. Mandatory crime reporting programs at the state level have been implemented in Wisconsin and elsewhere for several important reasons.

In the absence of a state law requiring the contribution of data, participation in the national program as conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation is entirely voluntary, and an agency may choose not to contribute. The FBI does not make estimates by state for the arrests occurring in non-reporting areas but, traditionally, estimates are made for offenses. Nevertheless, these calculations, however logical, cannot precisely indicate the level of criminal activity, and it should be remembered that the Crime Index is not based on complete reporting by all law enforcement agencies. Lack of reporting, or underreporting, may occur due to varying administrative policies or unfamiliarity with proper classification and scoring procedures. Unfortunately, record keeping and statistical tabulating often receive less attention, in the law enforcement function, than they deserve. However, a mandatory program and the involvement of a state agency should result in more departments contributing information. In particular, a state agency can establish better rapport with local departments and is in better position to overcome obstacles to reporting. Consequently, fewer of these estimates will need to be made. This has definitely been the experience in Wisconsin.

Crime Information Bureau participation should also provide for better control, and a uniformly higher quality, of crime and arrest reporting. The Federal Bureau of Investigation, receiving returns from more than 9,000 law enforcement agencies, is sometimes hard pressed to insure both the accuracy and the reasonableness of all submitted data, due to the sheer volume of their workload. Resolution of questions by both verifiers and submitting agencies is of necessity time-consuming. Hence, it is entirely logical for a centralized state agency to receive and verify UCR returns and then forward the data to the FBI.

Moreover, the involvement of an agency at the state level creates a source more responsive to the information needs of both state and local authorities. The FBI's *Crime in the United States*

report includes offense information for each state, Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area, large city (20,000 and over in population), Suburban Area sheriffs' offices, and sheriffs' offices in other populous counties. States are broken down into only Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas, "Other Cities", and "Rural". Arrest data are presented only on a national basis. However, with the emergence of the CIB as Wisconsin's centralized state data collection agency, offense and arrest statistics can be, and are, presented separately for each agency that reports directly. These departments are grouped by geography and population size into categories not presented in the nationwide document. Agencies can, therefore, better compare their workloads and performance with those of others serving jurisdictions with similar characteristics. Furthermore, during 1972 the Crime Information Bureau began supplying direct contributors with monthly and year-to-date reports that compare their current offenses and arrests with activity in relevant prior periods of time. These Monthly Comparison Reports furnish administrators with a timely analysis of trends.

Finally, the information needs of state and local officials in resource allocation decisions are acute. It is hoped that the Crime Information Bureau can serve as an objective statewide source of factual criminal justice data. These statistics can be utilized in assessing relative requirements and establishing priorities for the allocation of resources.

AN OVERVIEW

● The Crime Index. The total of seven major offenses customarily employed to measure the extent, fluctuation, and distribution of crime was 80,594 in Wisconsin during 1972, 3 percent higher than in 1971. Between 1960 and 1972 the number of Crime Index offenses rose 299 percent, while the Index crime rate (number of offenses per 100,000 inhabitants) went up 249 percent, to a rate of 1,783.1 in 1972.

● Violent Crime. Statewide, Violent Crimes accounted for 5 percent of all Index offenses during 1972. A total of 4,358 murders, forcible rapes, robberies, and aggravated assaults were reported in Wisconsin, 10 percent above 1971 and 246 percent higher than in 1960. The number of Violent Crimes per 100,000 inhabitants increased 202 percent over the 1960-1972 period, to a rate of 96.4 in 1972.

- Murder. 126 offenses in Wisconsin during 1972, up 2 percent from 1971 and 152 percent from 1960. Three victims per 100,000 Wisconsin inhabitants during the year. 90 percent cleared by arrest; highest solution rate for any Index crime.
- Forcible Rape. 376 offenses in Wisconsin in 1972, 9 percent higher than in 1971 and 245 percent above the 1960 level. Eight victims per 100,000 population during 1972. Second fastest increasing Index crime between 1971 and 1972.
- Robbery. 1,661 offenses in Wisconsin during 1972, up 18 percent from 1971 and up 408 percent since 1960. 37 robberies per 100,000 inhabitants in Wisconsin during the year. Fastest increasing

Index crime from 1971 to 1972 and second fastest between 1960 and 1972.

- Aggravated Assault. 2,195 offenses in Wisconsin in 1972, an increase of 5 percent over 1971 and 183 percent above the 1960 level. 49 victims per 100,000 inhabitants in 1972.

● Property Crime. Statewide, Property Crimes comprised 95 percent of all Index offenses during 1972. A total of 76,236 burglaries, major thefts, and auto thefts were reported in Wisconsin during 1972, 3 percent more than in 1971. These offenses increased 302 percent over the 1960-1972 period, and the Property Crime rate rose 252 percent to 1,686.6 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants in 1972.

- Burglary. 28,861 offenses in Wisconsin in 1972, up 3 percent from 1971 and 268 percent higher than in 1960. A crime rate of 639 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants in Wisconsin during 1972.

- Theft \$50 and Over. The total number of thefts involving property valued at \$50 or more was 36,854 in Wisconsin during 1972, a 4 percent increase from 1971 and a 429 percent increase since 1960. The Wisconsin crime rate for these major thefts was 815 offenses per 100,000 population during 1972. The increase in this offense between 1960 and 1972 was the fastest of any Index crime.

- Auto Theft. 10,521 crimes in Wisconsin in 1972, an increase of 155 percent from 1960, but the only Index offense showing a decrease (2 percent) between 1971 and 1972. An average rate of 233 motor vehicle thefts per 100,000 inhabitants in

Wisconsin during 1972. Highest rate of juvenile involvement in clearances of any Index crime, 65 percent.

- Property Stolen and Recovered. A total of \$24,086,526 worth of property was stolen in robberies, burglaries, thefts, and auto thefts during 1972; 39 percent of this value stolen was recovered. 85 percent of the value of locally stolen automobiles was recovered, the highest recovery ratio for any type of property.

- Clearances. Statewide clearance rate of 21 percent for all Crime Index offenses in 1972. 90 percent of all murders cleared by arrest, highest rate for any Index crime.

- Juvenile Involvement in Clearances. 44 percent of the solutions for Index crimes involved only persons under 18 as subjects. Juveniles were involved as subjects in clearances for auto theft most often, 65 percent of the time.

● Total Arrests. Law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin reported 169,090 arrests for 1972. Considering specific offenses, arrests were most frequently made for theft; the next highest number of arrests were recorded for drunkenness. A total of 5,554 arrests for narcotic drug law violations were made during 1972, 31 percent above 1971, and marijuana was the substance involved in 73 percent of these arrests in 1972.

- Adult Arrests. A total of 93,690 adult arrests were reported in Wisconsin during 1972, for a rate of 3,234.9 per 100,000 adult population. Arrests occurred most often for the offense of drunkenness, followed by arrests for disorderly conduct and for driving under the influence. Statewide, one-fourth of the adults arrested were under the age of 21, and 88 percent were males.

A total of 3,669 adult arrests for narcotic drug law violations were reported in Wisconsin during 1972; 72 percent of these arrests involved marijuana.

- Juvenile Arrests*. Statewide, 75,400 juvenile arrests were reported in 1972. This was a rate of 4,643.4 per 100,000 juvenile population. Persons under the age of eighteen were most frequently arrested for theft, resulting in a rate of 1,032.0 per 100,000 juvenile population. This offense was followed by arrests for running away and for disorderly conduct. Males comprised 73 percent of the juvenile arrests. Sixty-one percent of the arrests in Wisconsin were of youths between 15 and 17 years of age. A total of 1,885 narcotic drug law arrests were made, with marijuana being the predominant substance (77 percent). Disposition data received from Wisconsin law enforcement agencies indicated that 480 of every 1,000 juveniles arrested were handled within the department and released, 444 were referred to court or probation department, 49 to a welfare agency, and 27 to another police agency.

● Law Enforcement Employee Data. Agencies contributing UCR data directly to the Wisconsin Crime Information Bureau averaged one full-time civilian employee for every seven full-time officers, and a rate of 2.1 full-time employees per 1,000 inhabitants. Statewide, there were a total of 9,703 full-time law enforcement employees at the end of 1972. Assaults upon law enforcement officers in these agencies

* Juveniles are scored as having been "arrested" for purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, although under Wisconsin Statutes law enforcement custody of a child shall not be legally considered an arrest.

occurred at an average rate of 10.5 per 100 full-time officers during the year, and the death of one State Patrol Trooper in the line of duty was reported. A total of 884 assaults on enforcement officers was reported, and 42 percent of these involved some form of personal injury. Hands, fists, or feet were used as weapons in 81 percent of the assaults on officers. 27 percent of the assaults occurred when officers were responding to disturbance calls. Statewide, attacks were most prevalent during the month of April (17 percent), and slightly more than one out of every five assaults took place between 12:01 a.m. and 2:00 a.m. 82 percent of all the assaults on Wisconsin law enforcement officers were cleared by arrest.


COMPARATIVE TRENDS

This Section will focus on the general trend of criminality in Wisconsin in the recent past. "Crime" is, of course, measured basically in terms of the number of certain offenses coming to the attention of law enforcement agencies. The state as a whole can be divided into three major components-- Milwaukee, "Other Large Cities"*, and the "Remainder of Wisconsin"--for which historical data are available. Trends of groups of offenses (the Crime Index, Violent Crimes, and Property Crimes) are reviewed here, and an analysis of each offense is presented in the "CRIME INDEX OFFENSES" Section.

The Crime Index, which is the number of certain reported offenses, has traditionally been employed to measure the extent, fluctuation, and distribution of crime in our society. Seven crimes (murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft) comprise the Index. Figure 6 shows the trends in Wisconsin from 1960 to 1972. The number of Crime Index offenses reported to police has generally increased on a year-to-year basis since 1960. In 1972, the 3 percent increase from 1971 was considerably less than the increases in recent years. Statewide, Crime Index offenses rose 299 percent over the past twelve years to a total of 80,594 crimes. Wisconsin's population went up 14 percent since 1960 and the Index crime rate in 1972 was 1,783.1 offenses per 100,000 population, an increase of 249 percent over the same period.

 1961-1972





Milwaukee, by far the largest city in Wisconsin, accounted for 16 percent of the state's population in 1972. Crime in Milwaukee went down 4 percent from 1971, the first decrease since the 1 percent drop between 1960 and 1961. During 1972, the city reported 21,162 Index offenses, slightly more than one-fourth of those reported in the state. However, in recent years crime in Milwaukee has increased at slower rates than in Wisconsin as a whole. The number of Index offenses reported in this city rose 198 percent over the past twelve years, while its population declined 3 percent in the same time span. The 1972 Index crime rate, 2,945.5 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants went up 208 percent since 1960.

During 1972, the Other Large Cities in Wisconsin reported 23,750 Crime Index offenses. These municipalities as a group account for 24 percent of the state's population. Crime in the Other Large Cities has increased year-by-year at a relatively higher rate than statewide. In 1972, the number of Crime Index offenses increased 5 percent from 1971 and was 364 percent above the 1960 level. The total population for these eighteen cities rose 19 percent between 1960 and 1972 and their crime rate (2,161.4 in 1972) went up 291 percent.

Law enforcement agencies in the Remainder of Wisconsin reported 35,682 Crime Index offenses in 1972, a 6 percent increase from the previous year. This increase, however, was considerably lower than the 25 percent rise between 1970 and 1971. There were 346 percent more crimes reported in 1972 than in 1960 and the population in these areas of the state increased 18 percent during the same period. The Index crime rate in 1972 was 1,320.2, 277 percent above that in 1960.

The Crime Index is composed of seven offenses, diverse in terms of their emotional, physical, and economic impact on the victim. Four of the Index crimes (murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) have the element of face-to-face confrontation between victim and

perpetrator and are collectively referred to as "Violent Crimes". The remaining three Index offenses (burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft) as a group are called "Property Crimes". An important indicator of the nature of criminality is the Violent Crimes/Property Crimes ratio or, stated in another way, the proportion of Violent Crimes in the total Crime Index.

Violent Crimes represented 5-6 percent of the Index of Crime in Wisconsin between 1960 and 1972; there has been no consistent increase or decrease in this ratio throughout the period. Statewide, Violent Crimes accounted for 5 percent of all Index offenses in 1972. For the past twelve years crimes of violence have amounted to from 6-10 percent of the Index crimes reported by Milwaukee, and in 1972 the ratio was 7 percent. In the early 1960's, violent offenses comprised 3-4 percent of all Index crime in Other Large Cities, while a 6 percent ratio was representative of the years 1965-1970. In 1972, five out of every one hundred Index offenses in these municipalities were Violent Crimes. Since 1968, crimes of violence have accounted for 4 percent of the Index offenses in the Remainder of Wisconsin, a ratio slightly less than in the early 1960's.

Wisconsin cities between 50,000 and 250,000 population as a group reported six crimes of violence for every one hundred Index offenses during 1972. Agencies in Suburban Areas had a 5 percent proportion, Non-Suburban Cities, 4 percent, and the Rural Areas, 3 percent.

The nine Wisconsin CITIES 50,000-250,000 IN POPULATION are Appleton, Green Bay, Kenosha, La Crosse, Madison, Oshkosh, Racine, Wauwatosa, and West Allis.

SUBURBAN AREAS includes all reporting sheriffs' offices and all reporting police departments serving jurisdictions with less than 50,000 population in the Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area counties (Brown, Calumet, Dane, Douglas, Kenosha, La Crosse, Milwaukee, Outagamie, Ozaukee, Racine, Washington, Waukesha, and Winnebago).

NON-SUBURBAN CITIES includes all reporting city, village, and township police departments in non-SMSA counties.

RURAL AREAS includes all reporting sheriffs' offices in non-SMSA counties.

Thirty percent of the 80,594 Index offenses in Wisconsin were reported in the summer months of June, July, and August. February was the month having the fewest number of these crimes. In 1972, crimes of violence were most frequent in July and October; 9 percent were reported in each month. Law enforcement agencies indicated fewer Violent Crimes and Property Crimes in February than in any other month. As with the Index offenses, Property Crimes had a high frequency in the three summer months - 10 percent in each.

Statewide, 4,358 Violent Crimes were reported in 1972, up 10 percent from the previous year. These crimes have generally increased since 1963, although there was no noticeable change from 1968-1969 (Figure 7). Between 1960 and 1972, crimes of violence rose 246 percent and the rate increased 202 percent to 96.4 crimes per 100,000 inhabitants.

In 1972, Milwaukee reported 1,585 Violent Crimes, a long-term rise of 132 percent, and an increase of 8 percent from 1971. No consistent pattern of increases or decreases was evident over the twelve year span. The Violent Crime rate in Milwaukee for 1972 was 220.6, up 139 percent from 1960.

Other Large Cities in the state reported 1,258 crimes of violence during 1972. Annual rates of increase have been going down since 1969 to only a 3 percent rise between 1971 and 1972. The volume of Violent Crime increased 584 percent over the past twelve years, while the crime rate went up 475 percent during the same period to 114.5 offenses per 100,000 population.

While decreases in Violent Crime were recorded for many of the years since 1960 in the remaining areas of Wisconsin, the number in 1972 was 285 percent above that in 1960. Agencies

in the Remainder of Wisconsin reported 18 percent more Violent Crimes in 1972 than in 1971, and 10 percent more in 1971 than in 1970. The 1972 rate for these crimes was 56.1, 226 percent higher than in 1960.


The three Crime Index offenses of burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft constitute Property Crime, and their collective trend is displayed in Figure 8. In Wisconsin, the number of Property Crimes increased each year since 1960, but only 3 percent from 1971 to 1972. These crimes went up 17 percent between 1970 and 1971. A total of 76,236 Property Crimes were reported in 1972, 302 percent above the number in 1960. The 1972 rate, 1,686.6, was a 252 percent increase from twelve years ago.

Milwaukee reported 19,577 Property Crimes in 1972, slightly more than one-fourth of all those recorded in the state. The city did, however, experience a 5 percent decrease from 1971, the first decline since the 1 percent drop between 1960 and 1961. The long-term rise for these offenses was 205 percent, and for the rate it was 215 percent, to 2,724.8 crimes per 100,000 population during 1972.

The volume of Property Crimes in the eighteen Other Large Cities went up 356 percent between 1960 and 1972, but the increase from 1971 to 1972 was only 5 percent. As a group these cities reported 22,492 offenses, one-third of the state total in 1972. The Property Crime rate was 2,046.9, 284 percent above the 1960 level.

Agencies in the Remainder of Wisconsin had a total of 34,167 burglaries, major thefts, and auto thefts come to their attention in 1972, 6 percent above the number in 1971. Property Crimes have increased each year since 1965, but in no consistent pattern. Since 1960, there has been a 350 percent rise in the number of these offenses. A 280 percent increase in the rate of

 1972 vs. 1960






 1961-1972





Property Crimes was experienced in these areas of Wisconsin during the 1960-1972 period, to a ratio of 1,264.2 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants in 1972.

GEOGRAPHY AND POPULATION

The numbers of crimes and arrests during 1972 in each of Wisconsin's eight Administrative Districts are presented in Figure 9. The Southeastern Administrative District accounted for 40 percent of the state's population, and law enforcement agencies in this district reported 41,941 Index crimes, 52 percent of all those recorded in Wisconsin. The Index crime rate of 2,332.7 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants was higher than in any other district. In 1972, two-thirds of the Violent Crimes in the state occurred in these seven counties, and the crime rate was 162.4, higher than in any other district. Property Crimes were also reported relatively more frequently by Southeastern District agencies.

A total of 36,779 arrests for Part I offenses were recorded in the state during 1972; the Southeastern District accounted for half of these. The Part I arrest rate in this district, 1,033.7, was more than a quarter higher than the rate in the next highest district. Fifty-six percent of the 118,005 arrests for Part II offenses were recorded in the seven counties of this district, for a rate of 3,704.3.

Crime statistics were relatively lowest in the Western Administrative District representing 3 percent of all Index crimes, 1 percent of the Violent Crimes, and 3 percent of the Property Crimes. Agencies in this region also reported fewer crimes per 100,000 population than any other district.

The lowest number of Part I arrests (979) occurred in the least populated Northwestern District, although the Western District experienced the lowest Part I arrest rate in the state, 474.6. Fewer arrests for Part II offenses occurred in the Western District (3,209) than in the other seven. The Lake Winnebago District had the lowest arrest rate, 1,487.9.

1972




Wisconsin counties were ranked in order, from highest to lowest, in terms of estimated 1972 population, Violent Crime rate, and Property Crime rate, and then grouped into quartiles (Figure 10). None of the counties in the highest population quartile ranked in the lowest Violent Crime rate quartile; however, Marathon, Fond du Lac, and Dodge Counties were in the lowest quarter in terms of Property Crime rate. Seven of the eighteen highest populated counties ranked in the second lowest quartile for Violent Crime rate and six were in the same quartile for Property Crime rate.


Grant, Waupaca, Sauk, Monroe, and Clark Counties, each in the second highest quartile according to population, were in the lowest quartile in terms of Violent Crime rate. Only three of the eighteen counties, Grant, Monroe, and Clark, ranked in the bottom quarter of the Property Crime rate ranking.

Many of the eighteen least populated counties, on the other hand, had disproportionately high crime rates. Vilas, Sawyer, Marquette, and Forest Counties were in the top quartile in both Violent Crime and Property Crime rates. Jackson and Florence Counties ranked in the highest quartile based on Violent Crime rate, and Bayfield, Adams, and Menominee Counties were in the second highest group. In terms of Property Crime rate, Waushara, Adams, Burnett, and Menominee Counties were in the top quartile and the counties of Price, Rusk, Bayfield, Washburn, Iron, and Florence were in the second highest group.

Langlade was the only county ranking in the top quartile in terms of Violent Crime rate of the eighteen counties in the next to least populated quartile. Oneida and Ashland Counties were in the highest Property Crime rate quartile.

Figure 11 depicts the relative impact of the five population components of Wisconsin on the state's total crime picture. In 1972, Milwaukee accounted for approximately one-sixth

 1972





of Wisconsin's population. The city recorded 26 percent of both the Index Crimes and Property Crimes, and 36 percent of the Violent Crimes in the state. Milwaukee reported 21 percent of the Part I arrests and 29 percent of the Part II arrests.

Nine Wisconsin municipalities have between 50,000 and 250,000 inhabitants and comprise 17 percent of the state's population. They reported 22 percent of the Index Crimes, 23 percent of the Violent Crimes, and 22 percent of the Property Crimes. The number of arrests for Part I offenses in these cities accounted for 22 percent of all those recorded in Wisconsin, and the arrests for Part II offenses made up 15 percent of the total.

In 1972, Suburban Areas of the state represented one-fourth of the total population. Agencies in these areas recorded 24 percent of the Index Crimes, and Property Crimes, in Wisconsin. Twenty-two percent of all Violent Crimes occurred in the Suburban Areas. Part I and Part II arrests comprised 26 percent of each of the respective state totals.

Non-Suburban Cities in Wisconsin accounted for 17 percent of the state's 1972 population but reported only one-tenth of the Violent Crimes. Thirteen percent of both the Index Crimes and Property Crimes happened in these municipalities. Their police departments reported 22 percent of all Part I arrests and 19 percent of Part II arrests.

Like the Suburban Areas, the Rural Areas of Wisconsin accounted for one quarter of the population; however, the crime incidence was considerably less in the Rural Areas. They recorded 15 percent of the Index Crimes, 9 percent of the Violent Crimes, and 15 percent of the Property Crimes. Part I arrests made by these sheriffs' offices comprised 9 percent of the state total, and their Part II arrests accounted for 11 percent.

Crime and arrest rates by size of city are presented in Table E. In 1972, the Index Crime rate decreased as population decreased. The number of Crime Index offenses per 100,000 inhabitants in cities under 5,000 inhabitants was slightly more than a third the rate in Milwaukee. The Part I arrest rate increased with city size up until the population group having 25,000-50,000 inhabitants and then decreased. No consistent pattern of increases or decreases was evident in the Part II arrest rate. The nine cities with 50,000-250,000 population together recorded 2,330.5 arrests per 100,000 inhabitants for Part II crimes, an average below that of all city size groups except the under 5,000 population category.

Table F shows group crime and arrest rates of law enforcement agencies in suburban and non-suburban regions. Generally, agencies in Suburban Areas reported higher average Index Crime rates, Part I arrest rates, and Part II arrest rates than non-suburban areas. However, non-suburban cities under 5,000 population showed a higher Index Crime rate than did suburban cities in this category. Two population groups, cities under 5,000 and cities between 5,000 and 10,000 inhabitants, had lower Part I arrest rates in the suburban region than in the non-suburban. Suburban cities between 5,000 and 10,000 population together recorded a lower average Part II arrest rate than did non-suburban cities of the same size.




VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - WISCONSIN

A total of 126 murders came to the attention of Wisconsin law enforcement agencies during 1972, an increase of 2 percent over the previous year. With an average of one murder every three days, this offense accounted for 3 percent of the state's violent crimes and less than 1 percent of all Index Crimes. The victimization rate of 2.8, measured in terms of murders per 100,000 population, remained the same from 1971 to 1972.

Slightly more than one-third of all murders in the state were reported during the months of July, August and September. More

of these crimes came to the attention of law enforcement agencies during July (17) than in any other month in 1972. April had the least number with only 6 reported during that month. Fewer murders (22) were reported in the second quarter of 1972 than in any other quarterly period.

The volume of murders statewide has increased by 152 percent since 1960, but it has not shown a consistent year-to-year increase or decrease over the years 1960 - 1972. The victimization risk in 1972 was 115 percent higher than the 1.3 victims per 100,000 population reported in 1960.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - POPULATION AND GEOGRAPHY

Since 1960, Milwaukee has recorded a higher percentage increase for both murder offenses and murder rate than either Other Large Cities*, Remainder of Wisconsin, or the state as a whole. Fifty-six murders occurred in the City of Milwaukee during 1972, 273 percent higher than in 1960, and the victimization rate rose 290 percent, to 7.8 murders for every 100,000 people in the city.

Other Large Cities in Wisconsin reported 21 murders in 1972, thirty-six percent fewer than in 1971. The number of murders increased thirty-one percent over 1960 in these eighteen cities, with a twelve percent rise in the murder rate. There were 1.9 murders per 100,000 population in 1972.

Law enforcement agencies in the Southeastern Administrative District reported 72 murders in 1972, eight percent below the 1971 number. This district also recorded the highest victimization rate; there were 4.1 murder victims per 100,000 population. With only 2 murders reported during 1972, the Lake Winnebago District

showed the sharpest decline in this offense (a decrease of 50 percent from 1971) and the lowest murder rate, .4 per 100,000 population.

Law enforcement agencies in the state's Rural Areas reported a 74 percent increase in murders between 1971 and 1972. The 33 crimes reported by these agencies during 1972 produced a rate per 100,000 population of 2.9. The number of reported murders in Wisconsin's Suburban Areas decreased 47 percent from 1971. The murder victimization rate for this population category was .9 per 100,000 inhabitants.


NATURE OF OFFENSE

Twenty-two of the murder victims in Wisconsin during 1972 were 18 years of age or younger and 31 percent were between the ages of 20 and 29. Over one-half of the state's murder victims were between ages 20 and 45. Sixty-two percent of the victims in Wisconsin were White, 36 percent Black, and the remaining Indian. Males represented two-thirds of the state's murder victims.

The type of weapon most frequently used in murders in 1972 was a firearm, 63 percent of the cases, and 72 percent of the firearms were handguns. Personal weapons, such as beating with hands or fists, were employed in 12 murders. Knives or cutting instruments were utilized as weapons in 15 percent of the offenses. Other weapons, such as blunt objects, garrottes, pillows, etc., were employed in 16 of the Wisconsin homicides.

Seventeen of the murders in Wisconsin involved spouse killing spouse; in 7 of these murders, the wife killed the husband and in 10

the husband killed the wife. Murders in the state most often occurred in the home or residence (56 percent of the time). The street was the next most common murder scene (17 percent) and then general business establishments. Five reported homicides were classified as justifiable under Uniform Crime Reporting guidelines. Three of these involved the killing of a person by a police officer in the line of duty, and the other two were killings of felons by private citizens. These justifiable homicides are excluded from this analysis.

CLEARANCES

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies cleared 90 percent of the murders in 1972, and persons under age 18 were involved in 10 percent of these clearances. Under Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, law enforcement agencies record the number of crimes cleared during the month in which the clearances are made. Offenses, on the other hand, are reported as they become known. It is, therefore, possible for an agency to clear more offenses during a month or year than actually occurred during the time period. An example of this is the experience of the Lake Winnebago Administrative District. Agencies in this district recorded a 1972 murder clearance rate of 150 percent, indicating that they had clearances for offenses originally reported in prior time periods. Two Administrative Districts had a 100 percent clearance ratio; however, the volume of homicides in each of these districts was relatively small. Agencies in the Southeastern Administrative District cleared 93 percent of their 73 murders (10 percent of these clearances involved only juveniles as subjects). Only 60 percent of the 5 murders in the Northwestern District were cleared by arrest, and two-thirds of these solutions involved only juveniles. The Lake Michigan, Western, West Central, and North Central clearances for murder had no exclusively juvenile involvements.

Police agencies in cities with between 50,000 and 250,000 population cleared 100 percent of the reported murders. Ninety-

one percent of the 56 murders reported by the City of Milwaukee were cleared by arrest, and 8 percent of these clearances involved only juveniles. Law enforcement agencies in the state's Rural Areas cleared 82 percent of the 33 murders reported in 1972. Juvenile involvement in solutions was highest in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population (18 percent) and lowest in the Suburban Areas where no juveniles were exclusively involved as subjects.


PERSONS ARRESTED AND PERSONS CHARGED

A total of 152 persons were arrested for murder in Wisconsin during 1972, 20 of whom were under the age of eighteen.* Forty-five percent of the arrests were of persons under 25 years of age. Males accounted for 86 percent of all arrests for murder. Whites were arrested slightly more often than were Blacks, 50 percent vs. 48 percent of the total.

Disposition data received from Wisconsin law enforcement agencies for 1972 indicate that 46 percent of the persons charged with murder and disposed of by the courts were found guilty as charged. Eleven percent of those charged and prosecuted were found guilty of a lesser offense, and 27 percent were acquitted or dismissed. Juveniles referred to juvenile court accounted for 15 percent of the persons charged for murder and disposed of by the courts in 1972.

* Under Uniform Crime Reporting scoring procedures, it is possible for several persons to be arrested for the commission of the same offense and this results in only one clearance. Moreover, when both a juvenile and an adult are arrested for the same offense, juvenile involvement is not scored for purposes of the clearance. Arrests, on the other hand, are a tally of the total number of persons arrested.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - WISCONSIN

A total of 376 forcible rapes were reported to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies in 1972, slightly more than one per day. This offense represented 9 percent of the Violent Crimes in the state and one-half of 1 percent of the Index Crimes. The number of forcible rapes increased 9 percent between 1971 and 1972, and the rate per 100,000 total population rose 8 percent. There were 16.3 forcible rapes per 100,000 estimated Wisconsin female population in 1972. This was an increase of 7 percent over the analogous rate for 1971.

With only 3 minor exceptions, the number of forcible rapes reported to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies has usually increased on a year-to-year basis since 1960. There was a 245 percent increase in the volume of rapes between 1960 and 1972, and the rate per 100,000 total population rose 196 percent.

As was true for all Violent Crimes in general, more forcible rapes were reported during the months of July, August, and September than during any other quarterly period of 1972. Thirty-three percent of the rapes in 1972 were reported in this quarter, with the month of August having the greatest number of recorded forcible rapes (14 percent of the annual total). November was the month in which the fewest rapes came to the attention of the state's law enforcement agencies, with only 15 reported. Only 20 percent of the state's forcible rapes were reported during the fourth quarter of 1972.

Law enforcement administrators recognize that of all the Index Crimes, forcible rape is probably one of the most under-reported because of fear and/or embarrassment on the part of the victim. This analysis is limited to offenses as established by police investigation; therefore, complaints determined to be unfounded are not included.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - POPULATION AND GEOGRAPHY

The City of Milwaukee experienced a 16 percent decline in the number of forcible rapes between 1971 and 1972. With 87 reported rapes in Milwaukee, the victimization rate was 12.1 per 100,000 population. Law enforcement agencies in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population recorded the highest increase in the number of forcible rapes. The 105 rapes occurring in these cities during 1972 was an increase of 54 percent over the number reported in 1971.


The West Central District experienced the greatest increase in forcible rapes from 1971 to 1972. The 26 rapes coming to the attention of law enforcement agencies in this district was an increase of 117 percent over the number in 1971. Fewer rapes were reported to Lake Winnebago District agencies than to law enforcement agencies in any other Wisconsin Administrative District. County and municipal agencies in this district recorded a decrease of 62 percent in the volume of reported forcible rapes between 1971 and 1972.

From 1971 to 1972 the number of forcible rapes in Wisconsin's Other Large Cities* increased 46 percent. Crimes of this nature rose only 5 percent in the Remainder of Wisconsin (excluding the City of Milwaukee). Since 1960,





forcible rapes have increased 1,140 percent in the state's Other Large Cities and 146 percent in the Remainder of Wisconsin. The 1972 crime rates for these components of Wisconsin were 11.3 and 6.1 per 100,000 population, respectively.

CLEARANCES

Fifty-four percent of the forcible rapes reported to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies were cleared by arrest; juveniles were involved in 14 percent of these solutions. Sheriffs' offices in the state's Rural Areas cleared 71 percent of the rapes coming to their attention (10 percent of these clearances involved only juveniles as subjects). Law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin's Suburban Areas solved 40 percent of their reported forcible rapes, with 26 percent of these solutions involving only juveniles.


Western Administrative District law enforcement agencies cleared 90 percent of the rapes reported to them, and 11 percent of these solutions involved only persons under 18 years of age. The lowest clearance rate was recorded by agencies in the Lake Winnebago District (13 percent of the forcible rapes were cleared by arrest and no juveniles were solely involved in these clearances).

PERSONS ARRESTED AND PERSONS CHARGED

Law enforcement agencies throughout Wisconsin arrested a total of 188 persons for the offense of forcible rape. Two-thirds of these persons were 24 years of age or younger, and 18 percent were under the age of eighteen. Whites represented 68 percent of those arrested, Blacks accounted for 31 percent, and other races, 1 percent.

Of the total dispositions made for forcible rape in 1972, approximately one-third were found guilty as charged, 20 percent were acquitted or dismissed, 25 percent were juveniles referred to juvenile court, and 21 percent were found guilty of lesser offenses.


VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - WISCONSIN

During 1972, a total of 1,661 robberies came to the attention of Wisconsin law enforcement authorities, about 5 each day. This crime class accounted for 38 percent of the Violent Crimes and 2 percent of all Index Crimes. Both the number of robberies and the rate per 100,000 population increased from 1971; the number of robberies has gone up 18 percent and the rate has risen 17 percent.

Robbery offenses in the state increased 118 percent from 1966 to 1967, but in more recent years no consistent pattern is evident. Robberies have, however, increased 408 percent over the 1960 - 1972

1961-1972




ROBBERY

1972 vs. 1960



period, and the 1972 rate of robberies was 348 percent above that in 1960.

More offenses of robbery (481) came to the attention of Wisconsin law enforcement agencies during the months of October, November, and December than during any other quarter. The highest monthly numbers of robberies were reported during January, November, and December of 1972. Each of these months accounted for approximately 10 percent of the total number of these crimes reported during the year. The month of June had the fewest number of robberies, with only 6 percent being reported in that month. Twenty-three percent of the state's robberies became known to law enforcement agencies in both the second and third quarters of 1972.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - POPULATION AND GEOGRAPHY

The City of Milwaukee reported 45 percent of the state's 1972 total volume of robberies, an increase of 13 percent over the number in 1971. The 1972 robbery rate per 100,000 population of 104.1 was 391 percent higher than the rate in 1960. Law enforcement agencies in the Remainder of Wisconsin (excluding the state's 18 other Large Cities*) reported the largest increase in robberies between 1971 and 1972, 37 percent. Since 1960, the offense rate per 100,000 population has risen 213 percent, to a 1972 rate of 11.9 offenses per 100,000 population.

Seventy-eight percent of the robberies in Wisconsin were reported by agencies in the Southeastern Administrative District. The 1972 volume was 14 percent higher than that in 1971. Law enforcement agencies in the Western District reported a decrease of 8 percent in the number of these crimes from 1971. The rate per 100,000 population in this district was 5.3.

The sharpest increase in robberies occurred in Wisconsin's Suburban Areas. The total of 228 offenses reported in 1972 was 50 percent higher than the number recorded the previous year. Sheriff's offices in the state's Rural Areas had the fewest number of robberies come to their attention. Their robbery rate of 6.5 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants was the lowest of any Wisconsin population category.


NATURE OF OFFENSE

The type of robbery most often committed in Wisconsin during 1972 was street robbery, slightly more than one-third of the total. Commercial house robberies accounted for 26 percent of the 1,661 robberies reported in the state. In sixty-five percent of all robberies the perpetrator was armed, and in the remainder of the offenses no weapons (other than strong-arm tactics) were used.

In Wisconsin, robberies averaged a value loss of approximately \$299. Considering specific types of robberies, bank robberies averaged the highest dollar loss, \$3,250, and residence robberies were next with \$504. Persons in Wisconsin suffered at least a temporary value loss of approximately \$496,665 in 1972 as a result of robberies.

CLEARANCES

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies solved 51 percent of the state's robberies. The highest clearance rate for any of the 5 population categories in the state was recorded in the City of Milwaukee. Seventy-three percent of the robberies reported in this city were cleared by arrest. Only 31 percent of the robberies reported to law enforcement agencies in cities 50,000-250,000 in population were solved. Of the state's 8 Administrative Districts, the Western District cleared more robberies (91 percent) than any other district. The lowest solution rate was experienced by agencies in the Lake Winnebago District, with only 22 percent of their robberies cleared by arrest.

Juveniles were exclusively involved as subjects in 17 percent of the clearances in the state. No juveniles were involved in the solutions of robberies in the state's North Central District, and only 7 percent of the clearances in the Lake Winnebago District involved exclusively juveniles. Juvenile involvement in clearances was highest in the Lake Michigan District (24 percent of the solutions involved persons under the age of 18). Rural Area Sheriff's Offices reported only 7 percent of their robbery clearances as attributed to juveniles, while agencies in Cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population had a juvenile involvement rate of 28 percent.


PERSONS ARRESTED AND PERSONS CHARGED

Ninety-five percent of the persons arrested for robbery were males. Forty-five percent of the 1,015 persons arrested for robbery were White, 52 percent Black, and the remaining were of other races. During 1972, 65 percent were eighteen years of age or older, and 46 percent were between the ages of 18 and 24.

Persons formally prosecuted for robbery in Wisconsin were found guilty as charged 32 percent of the time. Only 2 percent

were found guilty of a lesser offense, while 24 percent were acquitted or dismissed and 42 percent were juveniles referred to juvenile court.

DEFINITION: *Aggravated Assault is defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another with the intent to inflict great bodily injury, usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious body harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury were the crime successfully completed. Attempted murders are included in this category. The number of offenses in this classification does not include assaults on law enforcement officers in the line of duty.*

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - WISCONSIN

On the average, six aggravated assaults were reported to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies each day in 1972, for an annual total of 2,195 offenses. Aggravated assault made up 3 percent of the Crime Index offenses and comprised 50 percent of the crimes of violence. The number of aggravated assaults was up 5 percent from the preceding year, and the rate of assaults per 100,000 inhabitants was 4 percent higher. Since 1960, offenses of this nature have increased 183 percent and the rate per 100,000 population has risen 148 percent.

During the third quarter of 1972, 28 percent of the state's aggravated assaults were reported by law enforcement agencies. The January - March quarter had the fewest numbers of these crimes recorded. Law enforcement agencies in the state reported more assaults during October than during any other month in 1972. Only 6 percent of the aggravated assaults in Wisconsin were reported in February.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - POPULATION AND GEOGRAPHY

Twenty-seven percent of the aggravated assaults in Wisconsin were reported by law enforcement agencies in the state's Suburban Areas.

The 15 percent increase in assaults in these areas was the sharpest of any in Wisconsin's 5 population categories. The offense rate per 100,000 population in the Suburban Areas was 52.3. Agencies in cities 50,000 to 250,000 as a group reported a 12 percent decrease in the number of assaults between 1971 and 1972. The 389 assaults reported to agencies in these cities yielded an aggravated assault rate of 52.4 per 100,000 population.

Law enforcement agencies in the Southeastern Administrative District reported 62 percent of the state's total volume of aggravated assaults in 1972. This number of assaults represents a 6 percent increase over the previous year and a 1972 rate of 76.0 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants. Agencies in the Lake Winnebago District showed the greatest decrease in assaults, 30 percent. There were 26.8 offenses per 100,000 population in this district.




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



Of the 3 population components of Wisconsin, only agencies in the Other Large Cities* reported a decrease (11 percent) in the volume of aggravated assaults between 1971 and 1972. Law enforcement agencies in the Remainder of the state (excluding Milwaukee) reported 45 percent of the total volume of aggravated assaults in 1972, with the number being 15 percent more than in the previous year. The 1972 rate per 100,000 population of 36.3 was 247% higher than the 1960 assault rate.

NATURE OF OFFENSE

In 1972, 43 percent of the serious assaults statewide were committed with the use of personal weapons such as hands, fists, and feet. Firearms were employed in 30 percent of the aggravated assaults, a knife or cutting instrument in 17 percent, and other dangerous weapons in 10 percent.

CLEARANCES


Statewide, law enforcement agencies cleared 62 percent of the aggravated assaults reported to them in 1972. Agencies in the Lake Michigan Administrative District solved 86 percent of their serious assaults, while only 56 percent of the assaults occurring in the Lake Winnebago District were cleared by arrest. Fifty-nine percent of the aggravated assaults occurring in the City of Milwaukee were cleared by arrest. The clearance ratio in the state's Non-Suburban Cities was 70 percent.

Twenty percent of the solutions of aggravated assaults in the state involved only juveniles as subjects. The North Central District agencies attributed 25 percent of their clearances to only juveniles. Four percent of the solutions


Juvenile involvement in clearances was highest (28 percent) in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population. Rural Area law enforcement agencies reported that only 10 percent of their solutions for assault were attributed to exclusively juveniles.

PERSONS ARRESTED AND PERSONS CHARGED

Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested in Wisconsin for aggravated assault were under 25 years of age, and 31 percent were between the ages of 25 and 39. Juveniles accounted for one-fourth of the arrests. The race breakdown indicated that, in 1972, 60 percent of those arrested for serious assaults were White, 37 percent were Black, and the remaining were of other races.

Disposition data received from Wisconsin law enforcement agencies in 1972 indicated that 41 percent of the persons charged with aggravated assault and disposed of by the courts were found guilty as charged. Only 8 percent of those charged and prosecuted were found guilty of a lesser offense, 21 percent were juveniles referred to juvenile court, and 30 percent were acquitted or dismissed.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - WISCONSIN

Approximately 79 burglaries occurred each day in Wisconsin during 1972, for a total of 28,861 offenses. This was a 3 percent increase from the previous year. The rate of burglaries, 638.5, was up 2 percent. Burglaries were the second most frequently occurring Index Crime in Wisconsin, comprising 36 percent of the Index Crimes and 38 percent of the Property Crimes. Since 1960, the volume of burglaries has risen 268 percent, and the rate per 100,000 population has increased 222 percent.

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies reported slightly more than 9 percent of the state's burglaries in the month of July.

The fewest number of burglaries were recorded during February; only 7 percent of the state's total were reported that month. Twenty-seven percent of these crimes came to the attention of the state's law enforcement agencies in the third quarter of 1972. During January, February, and March, agencies throughout Wisconsin reported 22 percent of the total volume of burglaries.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - POPULATION AND GEOGRAPHY

Agencies in Wisconsin's Other Large Cities* reported an increase of 9 percent in the volume of burglaries between 1971 and 1972. Since 1960, burglaries in these cities have increased 342 percent. Police departments and sheriffs' offices in the Remainder of Wisconsin recorded 51 percent of the total number of these crimes in the state during 1972, a decrease of 3 percent from the previous year. The volume of burglaries reported by agencies in the Remainder of the state has risen 265 percent since 1960. These two population components had respective 1972 burglary rates per 100,000 population of 835.4 and 543.9.

Cities with 50,000 to 250,000 population as a group experienced a 9 percent increase in the volume of burglaries from 1971 to 1972. The offense rate per 100,000 inhabitants for this population category was 955.3. Both Non-Suburban City and Rural Area law enforcement agencies recorded a 2 percent decrease in burglaries from 1971. Rural Areas accounted for 22 percent of the total volume of burglaries in Wisconsin during 1972.


Forty-two percent of the crimes of burglary were reported by law enforcement agencies in the Southeastern Administrative District. This total represents a 6 percent increase from 1971 and an offense rate of 674.9 per 100,000 population. The North Central District experienced a 13 percent decline in the number of these offenses in 1972.

NATURE OF OFFENSE

Residential burglaries accounted for 57 percent of all Wisconsin burglaries during 1972. For those residential burglaries where time of occurrence was specified, 60 percent occurred at night and 40 percent during the day. Of the nonresidential burglaries where time was known, 94 percent occurred at night and 6 percent during the day.




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



The average dollar loss from burglaries in Wisconsin was \$224, with an estimated loss at time of occurrence of over \$6.4 million. In 1972, the average dollar value loss in residential burglaries was about \$217. The average loss during a daytime residential burglary was approximately \$229 as compared to a \$242 loss at night. Unlike these residential burglaries, the average value loss of nighttime nonresidential burglaries (\$232) was considerably higher than those occurring during the day (\$138). Nonresidential losses due to burglaries amounted to an average of \$232.

CLEARANCES

Statewide, law enforcement agencies solved 24 percent of the burglaries occurring in 1972. Thirty-two percent of these types of crimes were cleared in the Southeastern Administrative District as compared to an 11 percent clearance ratio for agencies in the Northwestern District. Of the burglaries occurring in the City of Milwaukee, 54 percent were cleared by arrest. Police departments in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population had a burglary solution ratio of 15 percent.


Juveniles were involved as subjects in 62 percent of the clearances for burglary in the Lake Winnebago Administrative District, while only 38 percent of the solutions in both the Southeastern and Northwestern Districts were attributed to only persons under the age of 18. Police agencies in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population reported that 60 percent of their clearances for crimes of burglary involved only juveniles, as compared to 36 percent in the City of Milwaukee. Statewide, persons under 18 years of age were subjects in 44 percent of the solutions for burglary in 1972.

PERSONS ARRESTED AND PERSONS CHARGED

Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested for burglary were under the age of eighteen, and 88 percent were 22 years of age or younger. Of the 5,981 persons arrested for this crime, males accounted for 96 percent. Arrests of Whites outnumbered arrests of Blacks in our state by slightly more than 5 to 1.

Juveniles referred to juvenile court comprised 59 percent of the persons receiving dispositions for burglary during 1972. Twenty-eight percent of the persons charged and prosecuted were found guilty as charged, 10 percent were acquitted or dismissed, and 3 percent were found guilty of lesser offenses.

DEFINITION: Theft is the unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles of value without the use of force, violence, or fraud. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from autos, thefts of auto parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc. Beginning in January, 1972, thefts from temporary residence, recreation-type dwellings (i.e., camping tents, campers, camping trailers, houseboats, and similar recreational vehicles, trailers or dwellings) were included in this offense category. Previously these were classified as burglaries. For purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting, this offense category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, or worthless checks. Auto theft is a separate Index crime and, therefore, is also excluded. As a Crime Index offense, theft is limited to those in which the value of property stolen is \$50 or more.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - WISCONSIN

Thefts \$50 and over in value are the most voluminous Index crime. In 1972 there were 36,854 offenses of theft \$50 and over, 4 percent above 35,386 recorded in 1971. This crime makes up 48 percent of the Property Crimes and 46 percent of the Index Crimes. The theft crime rate rose to 815.4 offenses per 100,000

population, an increase of 3 percent over the 1971 rate. Statewide, from 1963 to 1971, the number of thefts \$50 and over in value increased at an annual rate of between 18 percent and 27 percent. The 4 percent rise in this offense between 1971 and 1972 represents the second lowest year-to-year increase in the volume of thefts over the past ten years.

In the third quarter of 1972, 31 percent of the total thefts \$50 and over in value were reported by Wisconsin law enforcement agencies. More of these crimes were recorded during July (11 percent) than during any other month. Seventeen percent of these crimes came to the attention of law enforcement agencies statewide in the first quarter of the year, with only 5 percent of the 1972 volume of thefts \$50 and over in value recorded during January.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - POPULATION AND GEOGRAPHY

The City of Milwaukee experienced a decrease of 7 percent in the number of thefts \$50 and over in value. One-fourth of these crimes in the state occurred in Milwaukee, yielding a rate of 1,280.8 thefts per 100,000 population. Law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin's Suburban Areas reported 27 percent of all major thefts in 1972, 13 percent above the number in 1971. The theft rate in these regions was 853.1 per 100,000 population.

Other Large Cities* in Wisconsin experienced virtually no change in the number of thefts \$50 and over in value from 1971 to 1972. There were 10,451 offenses reported by police departments in these cities for a theft rate of 951.1 per 100,000



population, 391 percent higher than the 1960 rate. Law enforcement agencies in the Remainder of Wisconsin reported a 14 percent increase in the number of these crimes over 1971 for a rate of 636.4 thefts \$50 and over in value per 100,000 population in 1972.

Over one-half of the major thefts occurring in the state took place in the Southeastern Administrative District. The 19,307 crimes of this nature represent a decrease of 1 percent from the 1971 number and a rate of 1,073.8 thefts \$50 and over in value per 100,000 population. Both the Lake Winnebago and Northwestern Districts experienced an increase of 27 percent in thefts of this nature. Their respective major theft rates were 592.4 and 725.6 per 100,000 population.

1961-1972











NATURE OF OFFENSE

Thefts from autos or of auto accessories comprised 26 percent of the 89,640 thefts (regardless of value) reported, and the average value loss of these specific types of thefts was \$99. Twenty-two percent of all thefts were from buildings. This type of theft also had a high average value loss of \$148. Dollar value losses for all thefts in Wisconsin during 1972 averaged \$96, with the total loss amounting to more than \$8.6 million. Forty-one percent of all thefts were major thefts (\$50 and over), 43 percent were in the \$5 to \$50 category, and 16 percent were under \$5 in value. The average value loss for each of these categories was \$209, \$23, and \$2.

CLEARANCES

Statewide, 40 percent of the clearances of thefts \$50 and over in value involved only persons under the age of 18 as subjects. Juveniles were involved in 49 percent of the clearances of these crimes in the Lake Winnebago District. One-third of the solutions for thefts \$50 and over in value in the West Central Administrative District were attributed to only persons under 18 years of age. Police agencies in cities 50,000 to 250,000 reported that 45 percent of their clearances of major thefts involved only juveniles. Thirty-five percent of the clearances for thefts \$50 and over in value in the state's Rural Areas involved only juveniles as subjects.


Law enforcement agencies throughout the state cleared 12 percent of the thefts \$50 and over in value during 1972. For this crime, the highest solution rate for any state Administrative District was recorded in the West Central District (14 percent of the thefts \$50 and over in value were cleared by arrest). The Southern and Northwestern Districts each cleared only 10 percent of their major theft offenses. Law enforcement agencies in the state's Non-Suburban Cities and the Rural Areas cleared 14 percent of the thefts \$50 and over reported to them in 1972. Agencies in Cities 50,000-250,000 in Population cleared only 9 percent of their major thefts.

PERSONS ARRESTED AND PERSONS CHARGED

A total of 24,830 persons were arrested in Wisconsin for committing thefts (regardless of value). Juveniles accounted for 67 percent of these, and persons 21 years old and under represented 84 percent. Whites comprised 87 percent of the arrests for theft, and 12 percent were Blacks. Sixty-nine percent of those arrested were males.

Persons formally prosecuted for theft in 1972 were found guilty of a lesser offense 2 percent of the time. Forty-seven percent were juveniles referred to juvenile court, 35 percent were found guilty as charged, and 16 percent were acquitted or dismissed.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - WISCONSIN

Auto theft was the only Crime Index offense to show a decrease in volume from 1971 to 1972. The annual total of 10,521 offenses was a decrease of 2 percent from the 1971 number. The motor vehicle theft rate of 232.8 offenses per 100,000 population in 1972 was 3 percent lower than the rate for the previous year. On the average, 29 auto thefts occurred each day in Wisconsin during 1972. Vehicle thefts accounted for 13 percent of the Index Crimes and 14 percent of the Property Crimes. Statewide, auto thefts have increased 155 percent since 1960, and the rate of these thefts per

100,000 population has risen 123 percent.

Law enforcement agencies throughout Wisconsin reported 10 percent of all the auto thefts during October of 1972. February had the fewest number of recorded stolen motor vehicles with only 6 percent reported stolen in that month. Twenty-eight percent of the automotive thefts were reported during the third quarter of 1972 and only 21 percent were reported stolen during the months of January, February, and March.

VOLUME, RATE, AND TREND - POPULATION AND GEOGRAPHY

Of the three components of Wisconsin, only the City of Milwaukee had a decrease in the volume of auto thefts between 1971 and 1972. The 5,394 motor vehicle thefts in Milwaukee was a decrease of 10 percent from 1971. There were 750.8 auto thefts per 100,000 population in the City of Milwaukee during 1972. Police departments in the state's Other Large Cities* reported a 12 percent increase in thefts of this type from 1971 to 1972. Twenty-seven percent of the total volume of stolen motor vehicles in the state occurred in these cities for an auto theft rate of 260.4 per 100,000 population.

Along with the City of Milwaukee, the state's Non-Suburban Cities recorded a decrease (1 percent) in the number of stolen autos between 1971 and 1972. However, only 7 percent of the auto thefts in the state occurred in these cities. The 2,291 offenses reported in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population represents the highest increase in auto thefts of any Wisconsin population category. Sixteen percent more motor vehicles were reported as stolen in these cities in 1972 as compared with 1971. The crime rate for these cities was 308.6 per 100,000 population.


Law enforcement agencies in the Southeastern Administrative District reported 7,580 motor vehicles stolen during 1972, a decrease of 6 percent from the previous year. There were 421.6 auto thefts for every 100,000 persons in this district. The number of these offenses occurring in the Southeastern District represented 72 percent of the total volume of stolen autos in the state. Agencies in the North Central District recorded a 21 percent increase in auto thefts over 1971. Even with this high increase, the auto thefts in this district accounted for only 2 percent of the state total.

NATURE OF OFFENSE

During 1972, the average value of a stolen motor vehicle (including contents) at the time of theft was \$807, with a state-wide value loss of approximately \$8.5 million. Eighty-three percent of the autos stolen were recovered within the same jurisdiction (reporting area). The remaining vehicles were recovered by agencies outside of the jurisdiction from which the motor vehicles

1961-1972






AUTO THEFT

1972 vs. 1960


NUMBER OF OFFENSES

were stolen. Statewide, there were 9,445 motor vehicles recovered during 1972.

CLEARANCES

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies cleared 32 percent of the auto theft offenses in 1972. More than one-half of those offenses occurring in the North Central Administrative District were cleared by arrest, as compared to a 29 percent solution rate in the Southeastern District. Police departments in the state's Non-Suburban Cities were successful in solving 49 percent of their motor vehicle thefts. Slightly less than one-fourth of these offenses occurring in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population were cleared by arrest.

Juveniles were involved in 65 percent of the clearances for

vehicle thefts statewide. During 1972, the percent of these solutions involving only persons under 18 years of age was highest in the Southeastern Administrative District (71 percent) and lowest in the Northwestern District (22 percent). The City of Milwaukee experienced a juvenile rate of 77 percent while the state's Suburban Area law enforcement agencies reported 42 percent of their solutions for auto thefts involved only juveniles as subjects.

PERSONS ARRESTED AND PERSONS CHARGED


In 1972, juveniles accounted for 77 percent of all Wisconsin arrests for auto theft, and persons under the age of 21 amounted to slightly more than nine out of ten. A total of 3,213 persons were arrested for auto theft and, of these, 94 percent were males. Whites comprised 74 percent of those arrested, Blacks 22 percent, and other races the remainder.

Juveniles referred to juvenile court accounted for 76 percent of the dispositions made on persons charged with auto theft. Thirteen percent of the persons charged and prosecuted were found guilty as charged, 10 percent were acquitted or dismissed, and 1 percent were found guilty of lesser offenses.

CRIME INDEX OFFENSES
VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED
WISCONSIN

There was a total property value of \$24,086,526 stolen in robberies, burglaries, thefts, and auto thefts during 1972. Slightly less than two-fifths of this total dollar value stolen was recovered. Stolen automobiles (included are motor vehicles taken during robberies or burglaries) had the greatest proportionate value recovered, 85 percent. Only 7 percent of the value of stolen furs was recovered. Of all property stolen in 1972, miscellaneous articles (e.g., tools, furniture, appliances, sporting goods) represented 46 percent of the total value. Recovered motor vehicles accounted for 77 percent of the \$9,411,607 worth of property recovered in 1972. Less than 1 percent of the total value recovered involved furs. (See Figure 12)

Twenty-one percent of the Index Crimes reported during 1972 were cleared by arrest. The solution rate for the Violent Crimes in Wisconsin was 58 percent and for Property Crimes 19 percent. Clearances for the individual Index offenses ranged from a high of 90 percent for murder to a low of 12 percent for crimes of theft \$50 and over in value.


Juveniles were involved in 44 percent of the Crime Index offenses clearances in 1972. Persons under 18 years of age were subjects in 18 percent of the state's Violent Crime clearances, while 48 percent of the solutions of Property Crimes involved only people in this age group. Proportionately more juveniles were solely involved in solutions of auto thefts (65 percent) than in the case of any other Index Crime. Only one out of every 10 clearances for murder involved exclusively persons under the age of 18. (See Figure 13 and Figure 14)

The highest Index Crime clearance rate for any of Wisconsin's Administrative Districts was reported by law enforcement agencies in the West Central District.

One-fourth of the Index offenses reported to these agencies in 1972 were cleared by arrest as compared to a solution ratio of 15 percent in the Northwestern District. The City of Milwaukee recorded a clearance rate of 31 percent while police departments in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population cleared only 15 percent of the Index Crimes reported to them.

Law enforcement agencies in the state's Lake Winnebago District attributed 54 percent of their clearances for Index



offenses to only juveniles. Thirty-one percent of the solutions of these crimes in the Northwestern District involved only persons under 18 years of age as subjects. During 1972, cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population had a 53 percent juvenile involvement in the clearances for Index Crimes. Thirty-seven percent of these crimes cleared in the state's Rural Areas involved only persons under the age of 18 as subjects.

ARRESTS

TOTAL ARRESTS

Arrest statistics provide a measure of police activity as it relates to crime. However, law enforcement emphasis and arrest practices vary within the same department over the course of time, and from community to community. While arrests for the more serious crimes such as robbery and burglary are more likely the result of standard procedures, the volume and rate of arrests for offenses such as drunkenness, disorderly conduct, and non-aggravated assaults frequently can display considerable variation between agencies. Differences in administrative policies, as well as dissimilarities in local crime problems, are reflected in the arrest rates reported by individual law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin.

Arrest data received from law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin indicate that the largest number of arrests were made in July - 10 percent. Twenty-eight percent of the arrests in 1972 occurred in the third quarter of the year. Arrests were less frequent in January than in any other month, and the first quarter had the lowest number of arrests.

Table G presents the numbers of arrests and arrest rates in Wisconsin during 1972. A total of 156,786 arrests of adults and juveniles were recorded for the year, up 6 percent from 1971. The statewide rate for these arrests was 3,468.7. An additional 12,304 arrests of persons under eighteen years of age were reported for the exclusively juvenile offenses of curfew/loitering violations and running away. Considering specific offenses, arrests were most frequently made for theft. A total of 24,830 arrests were reported for this offense, an increase of 5 percent from the year before; the statewide rate was 549.3 arrests per 100,000 population. The next highest number of arrests were made for drunkenness (24,250), followed by arrests for disorderly conduct (20,751) and liquor law violations with 10,804.

Fifty-four percent of the adult and juvenile arrests were recorded in the Southeastern Administrative District during 1972, an increase of 2 percent from 1971 (Table H). This district also had the highest arrest rate in the state with 4,737.9 arrests per 100,000 inhabitants. The Western District had fewer arrests (4,191) than any other district in the state, a decline of 5 percent from the year before. Arrests rose 35 percent from last year in the West Central District to a total of 8,559 arrests.

Excluding juvenile arrests for curfew/loitering violations and running away, Milwaukee accounted for 27 percent of the state total and Suburban Areas comprised 26 percent. Non-Suburban Cities experienced a 13 percent increase in the number of arrests from 1971 and Milwaukee had a 4 percent decline. The Rural Areas had the lowest arrest rate in the state (1,467.7) and Milwaukee had the highest, 5,849.3 (Table I).

Juveniles are scored as having been "arrested" for purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, although under Wisconsin Statutes law enforcement custody of a child shall not be legally considered an arrest. Arrests, in the case of juveniles, include those who have committed a crime and are taken into custody under circumstances such that were the juvenile an adult, an arrest would be scored. All violations by persons under eighteen years of age are included, where some police or other official action is taken. Juveniles taken into custody for their own protection, such as in neglect cases, are not counted as being arrested if they have not committed a crime.

Figure 15 presents adult-juvenile proportions of arrests in Wisconsin. For the 26 specific crimes as a group, 39 percent of the arrests were of juveniles. There were six crimes where there were relatively more juveniles arrested than adults. Persons under eighteen years of age accounted for 87 percent of the arrests for vandalism and 77 percent of the auto theft arrests. Seventy-one percent of the arrests for arson were of juveniles, as were

approximately two-thirds of the theft and liquor law arrests. Young people also accounted for 63 percent of the arrests in the state for burglary.

Excluding arrests for curfew/loitering violations and running away, males accounted for 83 percent of the arrests in Wisconsin during 1972. Female arrests were proportionately highest for the offenses of prostitution and commercialized vice and, secondly, for fraud. Aside from forcible rape, female involvement was lowest in the offense of burglary. The highest proportionate male involvement was noted in crimes of burglary, robbery, and illegal weapons.

Arrests for prostitution and commercialized vice, fraud, and theft were proportionately lowest in terms of male involvement.


Considering these 26 specific offenses, the number of female arrests was highest for theft, followed by disorderly conduct and liquor law violations. The highest number of male arrests occurred for the offense of drunkenness. Male involvement was also high in arrests for disorderly conduct and theft.

In 1972, Whites were arrested proportionately most often, as compared with other races, for liquor law violations. Out of all the offenses, White involvement was lowest for the offense of robbery. Blacks were arrested most frequently, in percentage terms, for prostitution and commercialized vice and least often for liquor law violations. Indians were arrested proportionately most often

for drunkenness, and there was no Indian involvement in arrests for arson, embezzlement, and gambling.

Whites accounted for 83 percent of all arrests (excluding curfew/loitering law violations and running away); Blacks comprised 14 percent and Indians, 3 percent. The offense for which the highest number of Whites were arrested was theft, followed by disorderly conduct. Blacks and Indians were most frequently arrested for drunkenness.

ARRESTS OF ADULTS

In 1972, Wisconsin law enforcement agencies reported 93,690 adult arrests. Table J is a listing of these arrests in rank order, along with rates per 100,000 adult population. Drunkenness was the offense for which adults were most frequently arrested, comprising one-fourth of the adult arrests. The rate for this offense was 796.5. While these offenders are engaged in antisocial behavior and sometimes commit more serious crimes, frequently they are arrested solely for their own protection. If alternative methods of handling the problems of alcoholism were developed, it is possible that a considerable amount of the resources of law enforcement could be diverted.

In regard to specific offenses, arrests for disorderly conduct were second highest in number, followed by arrests for driving under the influence. Arrests for theft and narcotic drug law violations ranked fourth and fifth highest, respectively.

Generally, throughout the state, the number of adult arrests decreased as the age increased. One-fourth of the adults arrested in Wisconsin were under the age of 21, and 34 percent were in the 21-29 age category. Males comprised 88 percent of the adult arrests in 1972. Women were arrested proportionately most often for prostitution and commercialized vice, and then for theft. Eighty

percent of the adults arrested in Wisconsin were White, 17 percent were Black, and 3 percent were Indian or other races.

Milwaukee reported 35 percent of the adult arrests in Wisconsin during 1972. One-fifth of all arrests of adults were made in Suburban Areas, and 17 percent were made in Non-Suburban Cities. Police agencies in cities between 50,000 and 250,000 population reported 14 percent of the adult arrests, and Rural Areas accounted for 12 percent.

Characteristics of Wisconsin adult institution population are reviewed in reports published by the Bureau of Planning, Development and Research, Division of Corrections, Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services.

ARRESTS OF JUVENILES

Law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin had a total of 75,400 juvenile arrests in 1972. Theft was the offense for which juveniles were most frequently arrested, (Table K) resulting in a rate of 1,032.0 per 100,000 juvenile population; 22 percent of the arrests of young people were for this offense. Considering specific offenses, runaways accounted for the second highest number of arrests, followed by arrests for disorderly conduct. Arrests for liquor law violations and vandalism ranked fourth and fifth, respectively.

Arrests of persons between 15 and 17 years of age comprised 61 percent of all juvenile arrests in Wisconsin during 1972. The offenses of theft, arson, and vandalism each had a higher concentration of juveniles in the under 15 year old category than in the group 15-17 years old. Males accounted for 73 percent of all arrests of young persons; however, females were arrested more often than males for the offenses of running away and prostitution and commercialized vice. Statewide, 88 percent of the juveniles

arrested were White, one out of ten were Black, and 2 percent were Indian or other races.

Suburban Areas of the state reported 32 percent of all arrests of persons under eighteen years of age and Non-Suburban Cities accounted for 22 percent. Nineteen percent of the juvenile arrests were recorded by cities with 50,000-250,000 population, 18 percent by Milwaukee, and 9 percent by Rural Areas.


Data received from Wisconsin law enforcement agencies during 1972 indicate that for every 1,000 juvenile arrests made in the state, 480 cases were handled within the department and released. Another 444 out of 1,000 arrests resulted in referral to court or probation department, 49 to a welfare agency, and 27 to another police agency. Figure 16 displays the percentage distribution of juvenile dispositions in Wisconsin.

Information regarding juvenile institution population is contained in reports published by the Bureau of Planning, Development and Research, Division of Corrections, Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services.

NARCOTIC DRUG LAW ARRESTS

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies reported 5,554 arrests for narcotic drug law violations during 1972, a 31 percent increase from the previous year. Arrests for this offense rose 88 percent from 1971 in cities with between 50,000 and 250,000 inhabitants; in 1972, agencies in these cities reported 1,106 arrests for narcotic drug law violations. Milwaukee recorded 1,327 arrests for this offense and Suburban Areas had 1,387, an increase of 14 percent for each. Non-Suburban Cities as a group made 854 narcotic drug law arrests in 1972, up 17 percent from the year before. Arrests for these offenses in the state's Rural Areas rose 15 percent, to 817 in 1972.

WISCONSIN - 1972




Marijuana was the substance involved in 73 percent of all narcotic drug law arrests in Wisconsin (Figure 17). Opium, cocaine, and derivatives, and synthetic narcotics, each represented one out of every twenty arrests. Seventeen percent of the arrests involved other dangerous non-narcotic drugs (including inhalants). Juvenile arrests for narcotic drug law violations had a greater marijuana involvement than did arrests of adults, 77 percent as opposed to 72 percent. Synthetic narcotics were also more prevalent in juvenile arrests (6 percent) than adult arrests (5 percent). Only 2 percent of the juvenile arrests were for opium, cocaine, and derivatives, as opposed to 6 percent of the arrests of adults. About the same proportion of juvenile arrests as adult arrests involved other dangerous non-narcotic drugs.

Statewide, there were 3,669 adult arrests for narcotic drug law violations, a rate of 126.7 arrests per 100,000 adult population. Eighty-five percent of these persons were between the ages of eighteen and twenty-four. Males accounted for 88 percent of the adults arrested for narcotic drug law violations; 86 percent of the total were White. Milwaukee reported 28 percent of the arrests, for an arrest rate of 216.9, and Suburban Areas in the state comprised 21 percent of the adult arrests. Agencies in cities between 50,000 and 250,000 population recorded a rate of 142.9, Non-Suburban Cities had 100.2 arrests per 100,000 adult population, and the Rural Areas of the state had a rate of 82.4.

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies reported 1,885 arrests of persons under eighteen years of age for narcotic drug offenses in 1972, a rate of 116.1 arrests per 100,000 juvenile population. Seventy-eight percent of these arrests were of boys, and Whites comprised 95 percent of the total juvenile arrests. The majority of these arrests were of older juveniles, with 67 percent being sixteen or seventeen years of age, and 18 percent fifteen years old. Fifteen percent of the juvenile arrests for narcotic drug law offenses were made in Milwaukee, establishing a rate of 119.4. Suburban Areas accounted for one out of three total arrests in the state; the rate in these areas was 137.4 arrests per 100,000

juvenile population. Cities between 50,000 and 250,000 population recorded a rate of 161.2, Non-Suburban Cities had a rate of 128.5, and the Rural Areas reported 55.4 for their rate.



LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEE DATA

NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES

Data received from 231 police departments and sheriffs' offices throughout the state, as well as the Wisconsin State Patrol and the Department of Natural Resources - Law Enforcement Bureau indicate a total of 9,703 full-time law enforcement employees; full-time officers represented 87 percent of this total and civilians comprised 13 percent. Statewide, there were 1.9 officers per 1,000 population, and 0.3 civilians.

With the exception of Milwaukee, the average numbers of full-time employees per 1,000 inhabitants* were very similar for the various city size groups. The Rural Area sheriffs had a relatively small average ratio of employees per 1,000 population (1.0). Suburban Area sheriffs, on the other hand, had an average of 1.9 full-time employees per 1,000 inhabitants. In Wisconsin's cities, employee rates ranged from a high of 5.7 to a low of 0.1. (See Figure 18.)


Ninety-two percent of the full-time law enforcement employees in the state were males, and 8 percent were females. There were 8,451 full-time law enforcement officers throughout the state and 1,252 full-time civilian employees in 1972. Females represented 2 percent of all full-time officers, as compared to 46 percent of all civilian employees. Of the 8,968 male full-time employees, 92 percent were law enforcement officers. Twenty-two percent of all female law enforcement employees were full-time officers.

* Law enforcement employee ratios presented here should not be construed as being recommended. Determination of required law enforcement strength in any jurisdiction should be based on an assessment of the various factors which create the need for police service.

Table L shows the volume of Index crimes per full-time law enforcement employee, by population categories. Cities between 50,000 and 250,000 population reported approximately 15 Index offenses per full-time officer, while cities under 5,000 population experienced only 7 offenses per officer. Rural Area sheriffs had the highest average Index crimes/civilian employee rate (148). Statewide, the number of Index offenses per full-time law enforcement employee ranged from a high of 14.7 in cities with 50,000-250,000 population to a low of 7.1 in cities with less than 5,000 inhabitants. During 1972, the average number of Index Crimes per officer in the state was 9.7.

The average numbers of Part II arrests per full-time officer were considerably higher than the comparable ratios for Part I arrests, as is shown in Table M. Police agencies in cities of 25,000-50,000 population reported relatively high Part I and Part II arrests per full-time officer averages (7.8 and 20.8, respectively). In 1972, the average number of Part I arrests per full-time officer in Wisconsin was 4.4, and the number of Part II arrests per officer averaged 14.4. Arrest rates may vary from one community to another due to differences in police policy and practices, as well as differences in local crime problems. Many law enforcement officers have duties such as administration, records, and other non-field assignments such that they do not become involved in making the types of arrests recorded in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

DEATHS AND ASSAULTS OF LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

During August, 1972, a Wisconsin State Patrol Trooper was murdered while acting in the line of duty. This was the first such incident involving a State Patrol officer. Since 1960, Wisconsin has had eight other officers feloniously killed while acting in an official capacity.

Wisconsin law enforcement agencies reported a total of 884 assaults on officers in 1972, for a rate of 10.5 attacks per 100 full-time officers (Table N). Forty-five percent of these assaults occurred in cities 50,000 to 250,000 in population. Police departments in these cities reported the highest assault rate (32.6 assaults per 100 full-time officers) of any state population category. The lowest rate of assaults occurred in the state's Non-Suburban Cities where only 4.5 attacks were reported for every 100 officers. Sheriffs' offices in the state's Rural Areas reported only 52 assaults on officers (6 percent of the state total).

Eighty-two percent of all assaults on Wisconsin officers in 1972 were cleared by arrest. Clearance rates in the state's five population categories ranged from a high of 99 percent in Suburban Areas to a low of 62 percent in Cities 50,000-250,000 in Population. The City of Milwaukee recorded a solution rate of 97 percent. Both the state's Non-Suburban Cities and Rural Areas law enforcement agencies cleared 98 percent of their assaults on officers in 1972.

Injury* was sustained to officers in 42 percent of the assaults occurring statewide in 1972. Sixty-one percent of the attacks on police officers in the City of Milwaukee involved some form of personal injury, while only 29 percent of the

* In classifying an assault on an officer as being one "with injury", the extent or seriousness of the injury is not a consideration. A slight injury (sprain, bruise, etc.) is sufficient for the offense to be classified as one with injury.

assaults on officers in Cities 50,000-250,000 in Population caused injuries.

Statewide, there were 375 assaults with injury for a rate of 4.4 per 100 full-time officers. The rate of assaults on officers where no injury was involved was 6.0. Eighty-eight percent of the attacks where personal injury to the officer occurred were cleared by arrest. Assaults on officers where no injury was involved had a clearance rate of 77 percent.

The rate of personal injury was highest (51 percent) in the case of assaults with dangerous weapons other than firearms or cutting instruments (Table Q). During 1972, Wisconsin law enforcement officers sustained injury in 43 percent of the attacks with personal weapons such as hands, fists, or feet, 40 percent of the attacks with knives or other cutting instruments, and 17 percent of the attacks with firearms.

Personal injury resulted from 36 percent of the assaults, on officers operating from a one-man vehicle, 45 percent of the assaults on officers in a two-man vehicle, 46 percent of the attacks on detectives or officers on special assignment, and 47 percent of the assaults while on other* types of assignments (Table R). A total of 705 assaults occurred when one or more other officers were present, and personal injury resulted from 41 percent of these incidents. Officers assaulted when acting alone sustained injury one-half of the time.

Three-fourths of the total number of assaults occurred while officers were involved in one of the following four types of activities: responding to disturbance calls (27 percent), attempting other arrests (18 percent)**, civil disorders (17 percent), and handling, transporting, custody of prisoners (13 percent) (see Table O).

A clearance rate of 95 percent was recorded for assaults on law enforcement officers when responding to disturbance calls and an identical rate was recorded for assaults while attempting other arrests. Ninety-three percent of the attacks while engaged in handling, transporting, custody of prisoners were cleared, while only 21 percent of those during civil disorders were solved.

* The OTHER ASSIGNMENT category includes officers off duty but acting in an official capacity, uniformed officers on foot patrol, or officers responding to a situation in a motorized uniformed group of three or more.


** ATTEMPTING OTHER ARRESTS are those assigned or on-view situations in which, at the time of the assault, the specific activity is making or attempting to make an arrest for an offense other than those associated with disturbance calls, burglaries, robberies, civil disorders, or traffic.

Personal weapons were employed during 84 percent of the attacks when officers responded to disturbance calls, 90 percent of the attacks while attempting other arrests, and 95 percent of the assaults while engaged in handling, transporting, custody of prisoners (Table O). The only exceptions to the predominant use of personal weapons such as hands, fists, or feet in an attack on an officer occurred during civil disorders, where 54 percent of the weapons were of types other than knives, firearms, or personal weapons and during robberies in progress or pursuing robbery suspects (guns were used in 3 of the 4 assaults).

Forty-nine percent of the assaults on officers while responding to disturbance calls were incurred when operating from a two-man vehicle and 42 percent while assigned to a one-man vehicle (Table P). Forty percent of the attacks while attempting other arrests occurred to officers assigned to one-man vehicles; only 28 percent of the attacks during this type of activity involved officers in two-man vehicles. Assaults during civil disorders most often occurred to officers on detective or special assignments or other types of assignments, 87 percent. Officers in two-man vehicles sustained 24 percent of the assaults occurring while engaged in the handling, transporting, custody of prisoners, and those in one-man vehicles accounted for 32 percent.

Personal weapons comprised slightly more than four-fifths of the weapons used during assaults on officers in 1972 (Figure 19). Three percent of the assaults involved knives or other cutting instruments, 5 percent involved firearms, and other dangerous weapons were used in 11 percent. Assaults with hands, fists, or feet represented 82 percent of all attacks involving injury. Firearms were employed in 2 percent of the assaults with injury, knives in 3 percent, and dangerous weapons other than guns or cutting instruments the remaining 14 percent.

Of all the assaults with personal weapons, 28 percent of these occurred when officers were responding to disturbance calls, 20 percent occurred while attempting other arrests, and another 16 percent of these attacks took place when engaged in handling, transporting, custody of prisoners (Table O). Seventy-nine percent of the assaults with dangerous weapons other than knives or firearms took place while officers were responding to civil disorders. Of all the attacks on law enforcement officers when firearms were used, over one-half (52 percent) took place while responding to disturbance calls. Another 26 percent occurred when officers were attempting arrests for crimes other than robberies, burglaries, disturbance calls, civil disorders, or traffic. Fifty-two percent of the cutting instrument assaults happened when officers responded to disturbance calls and another 20 percent during attacks by mentally deranged persons.

More assaults to officers occurred when operating from one-man vehicles (35 percent) than during any other type of assignment (Table R). Thirty-two percent of the attacks were incurred by officers working in a two-man vehicle, 11 percent while on detective or special assignments, and 22 percent of all assaults occurred while officers were on other types of assignments. Some form of personal injury resulted from 47 percent of the assaults on officers while on other assignments, 46 percent of the assaults while on detective or special assignments, and 45 percent of the attacks while operating from a two-man vehicle. Thirty-six percent of the assaults on officers in one-man vehicles involved personal injury.

One-third of the assaults on officers when assigned to one-man vehicles took place while responding to disturbance calls (Table P).

Assaults while responding to disturbance calls accounted for 43 percent of the attacks on officers operating from a two-man vehicle. Forty-one percent of the assaults on detec-


tives or officers acting on special assignments took place during civil disorders. Forty-six percent of the assaults on officers on other types of assignments occurred during civil disorders, and 24 percent of the attacks while on this type of assignment occurred while engaged in handling, transporting, custody of prisoners.

One-third of the total number of assaults on officers were reported during the months of April, May, and June. During the fourth quarter of 1972, the fewest number of these assaults was recorded (18 percent). Law enforcement agencies reported 17 percent of all assaults on officers during April, the highest frequency of any month. Only 39 assaults, out of an annual total of 884, were recorded in December.

Sixty-five percent of all the assaults on officers occurred between 8:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. Statewide, approximately one out of every 5 assaults took place during the two-hour span of 12:01 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. (Figure 20).

DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES WARDENS

During 1972, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (Law Enforcement Bureau) wardens made 9,862 arrests for various violations (Table S). For the past three years, resident arrests were most often made for hunting violations, and non-resident arrests were most frequently made for fishing violations. Fishing without a license accounted for 36 percent of the resident fishing violation arrests and seven out of ten of the non-resident fishing violation arrests. Resident arrests for hunting violations were made quite frequently for transporting a loaded or uncased firearm in or on a vehicle. Resident arrests for park violations have been increasing since 1970, with the highest number in 1972 resulting from entering or being in a state park after closed hours. Eighty-six percent of the resident arrests for snowmobile violations involved either operating a snowmobile without valid registration or failure or improper display of registration number or decal.

BACKGROUND

The computer printout tables contained in this Section were designed to furnish, to the extent possible, a ready comparison with statistical tables contained in the Federal Bureau of Investigation's *Crime in the United States* annual report. However, tables analogous to those contained in the nationwide document were not always developed for the State of Wisconsin, and the Wisconsin tables display some information not presented at the national level. These differences arise in an effort to make this *Crime and Arrests* volume of unique value to the reader. This report does not contain comparisons of Wisconsin with other selected states and the Nation. Data for other states were unavailable at the time of this writing, and consequently this comparative analysis will be subsequently issued as a *Supplemental Annual Report*.

Data are presented by political subdivisions (departments listed alphabetically within counties, counties listed alphabetically within Wisconsin Administrative Districts) and by population categories. Population categories for Wisconsin cities were designed to enable the grouping of departments roughly comparable in terms of populations served. The city size divisions are as follows: over 250,000 (Milwaukee), 50,000-250,000, 25,000-50,000, 10,000-25,000, 5,000-10,000, and under 5,000.

The Suburban Area category employed in the Wisconsin tables matches the definition used at the national level. Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA's) have been established nationwide to reflect regions of population concentration, and they are generally made up of an entire county or group of counties having at least one central city of 50,000 or more inhabitants, with the whole meeting the requirements of certain metropolitan characteristics. SMSA counties in Wisconsin include Brown, Calumet, Dane, Douglas, Kenosha, La Crosse, Milwaukee, Outagamie, Ozaukee,

Racine, Washington, Waukesha, and Winnebago.

Suburban Areas include all cities under 50,000 population, and all sheriffs' offices in these SMSA counties, and the category reflects crime problems in regions surrounding large population centers. Suburban cities are also included in other city size groups according to their population. The Rural Area in Wisconsin is defined as sheriffs' offices in non-SMSA counties. Similarly, Non-Suburban Cities are those outside of Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas. The term cities should be interpreted to refer to police departments serving cities, villages, townships, or university campuses.

Total Wisconsin, in terms of agencies reporting, is therefore conveniently either: All Cities + Suburban Area Sheriffs + Rural Areas + State Level Agencies or Cities over 250,000 Population (Milwaukee) + Cities 50,000-250,000 in Population + Suburban Areas + Non-Suburban Cities + Rural Areas + State Level Agencies. This latter breakdown of Wisconsin into five components is usually presented in the foregoing analysis (State level agencies are included in State totals as appropriate). The numbers of departments in each population category are as follows:

Milwaukee
Cities 50,000-250,000 in Population - 9 agencies
Suburban Areas - 76 agencies
Non-Suburban Cities - 86 agencies
Rural Areas - 59 agencies

Adult and juvenile populations were derived from estimated total populations as determined by the Wisconsin Department of Administration. The total population estimates used in this publication are based on those forwarded to Clerks of Wisconsin cities, villages, townships, and counties for purposes of 1972 state shared taxes distribution. Except in decennial Census years, and in the absence of special population counts, the numbers of adults and

juveniles in the (UCR reporting) jurisdiction served by a particular law enforcement agency are estimated. Some Wisconsin cities are in two or more counties and, for summarizations by geography, their total crimes, clearances, arrests, and populations were allocated to the county in which the majority of the population resided. University campus police departments were assigned to city population categories based on student population. However, for purposes of crime and arrest rate calculations in this document, their effective populations are zero. The total state population, where utilized, of 4,520,000 was the Bureau of the Census provisional estimate as of July 1, 1972.

This document assumes that each Wisconsin sheriff's office reported all Crime Index offenses coming to the attention of all law enforcement agencies in a county, with the exception of those occurring in the jurisdictions of, and consequently reported by, direct UCR contributors. That is, there were no agency crime counts that were not included in the reporting system. The 1971-1972 changes in the number of offenses known to law enforcement agencies have been reviewed in the foregoing analysis. Where statewide changes are referred to, calculations are based on the total number of offenses coming to the attention of all agencies in Wisconsin (estimated for 1971). Where changes for population categories or Administrative Districts of the state (e.g., Suburban Areas or Rural Areas) are considered, calculations are based on only those agencies that reported in both 1971 and 1972. This latter method was also employed in arriving at changes in the number of arrests, for the state as a whole, population categories, and Administrative Districts.

Long-term trend data regarding crime in Wisconsin were derived from annual editions of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's *Crime in the United States*. These volumes show statewide offense estimates for any two consecutive years adjusted, where required, to take into account changes in reporting practices. Historical data for Milwaukee and each of the "Other Large Cities" are

presented in these FBI reports and, once the state total had been established, the "Remainder of Wisconsin" was arrived at by the process of subtraction.

Throughout this document, the word "arrest" is used to connote official law enforcement contact with juveniles where crimes have been committed, in keeping with the definitional concept at the national level. Juveniles are scored as having been "arrested" for purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, although under Wisconsin Statutes law enforcement custody of a child shall not be legally considered an arrest.

CRIME INDEX OFFENSES

The occurrence of seven offenses, as known to law enforcement agencies, is customarily used to measure the extent, fluctuation, and distribution of crime in general. These offenses (murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft), when added together, make up the Crime Index or Index of Crime. The first four are collectively referred to as Violent Crimes, and the remaining three are called Property Crimes.

Table 1 shows the number of Crime Index offenses reported by each of the direct UCR contributors in Wisconsin during 1972. Offense rates are calculated to reflect the number of crimes per 100,000 population, with all populations being estimated. Counties are listed alphabetically within Wisconsin Administrative Districts. Cities are listed alphabetically within counties, preceding the respective sheriff's office.

The monthly trend of offenses is presented in Table 2. The number of offenses is indicated for each month, as well as the percent distribution.

GENERAL CRIME STATISTICS

Data to further delineate the nature of crime in Wisconsin are presented in this Section. Tables show the numbers of Part I offenses (negligent manslaughters and thefts under \$50 in value, in addition to the seven Index Crimes) reported by agencies as grouped into broad population categories, the offense rates per 100,000 inhabitants for these categories, the proportion of crimes cleared by arrest in each category as well as by individual departments, and the proportion of clearances involving exclusively juvenile subjects for both categories and individual agencies. Clearance ratios, and the extent of juvenile involvement in these clearances, are summarized by county and Wisconsin Administrative District.

Statewide robberies, burglaries, and thefts are broken down by type, and for each category, the number, percent distribution, and total and average dollar value is presented. Recovery ratios for various types of stolen property are shown.

Two tables indicate the number of persons formally charged in Wisconsin during 1972 for Part I and Part II crimes. The numbers of persons receiving legal dispositions during the year are also shown, along with the type of disposition.

ARRESTS* FOR PART I CRIMES

Law enforcement agencies score an arrest when a person is taken into custody for committing an offense within their own local jurisdictions (reporting areas). Arrests as reported include persons released without being formally charged. A juvenile, even though merely warned and released, is counted as having been "arrested" when the circumstances are such that, if he or she were an adult, an arrest would be tallied. While crime data relate to criminal events, arrest statistics relate to persons taken into custody. An individual may be arrested several times during the year for the same type of offense or for different types of crimes. Each arrest is scored. Several persons may be arrested for one crime, or the arrest of one person may clear several crimes.

The numbers of Part I arrests reported by Wisconsin law enforcement agencies are presented, along with the arrest rate per 100,000 inhabitants. Part I crimes are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, theft under \$50 in value, and auto theft. Data are summarized by geography and population categories. Part I arrests are presented on a monthly basis, with the number of arrests and percent distribution indicated for each month. Total, City, Suburban Area, and Rural Area Part I arrests are broken down by age, sex, and race. Adult Part I arrests (Total, City, Suburban Area, and Rural Area) are broken down by sex and race.

* Juveniles are scored as having been "arrested" for purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, although under Wisconsin Statutes law enforcement custody of a child shall not be legally considered an arrest.

ARRESTS* FOR PART II CRIMES

Law enforcement agencies score an arrest when a person is taken into custody for committing an offense within their own local jurisdictions (reporting areas). Arrests as reported include persons released without being formally charged. A juvenile, even though merely warned and released, is counted as having been "arrested" when the circumstances are such that, if he or she were an adult, an arrest would be tallied. While crime data relate to criminal events, arrest statistics relate to persons taken into custody. An individual may be arrested several times during the year for the same type of offense or for different types of crimes. Each arrest is scored. Several persons may be arrested for one crime, or the arrest of one person may clear several crimes.

The numbers of Part II arrests reported by Wisconsin law enforcement agencies are presented, along with the arrest rate per 100,000 inhabitants. Part II crimes, as presented in this Section, are other assaults, arson, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property violations, vandalism, weapons offenses, prostitution and commercialized vice, sex offenses, narcotic drug law violations, gambling, offenses against the family and children, driving under the influence, liquor law violations, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, and other offenses (non-traffic) that do not fit into any of the preceding classes. Curfew and loitering violations and running away, usually categorized as Part II offenses, are not included here. They pertain exclusively to juveniles, and the numbers of these arrests are presented in the JUVENILE ARRESTS Section. Data are summarized by geography and population categories. Part II arrests are presented on a monthly basis, with the number of arrests and percent distribution indicated for each month. Total, City, Suburban Area, and Rural Area Part II

* Juveniles are scored as having been "arrested" for purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, although under Wisconsin Statutes law enforcement custody of a child shall not be legally considered an arrest.

arrests are broken down by age, sex, and race. Adult Part II arrests (Total, City, Suburban Area, and Rural Area) are broken down by sex and race.

The number of adult arrests for narcotic drug laws offenses are shown by agency and population categories, with rates based on the number of adult arrests per 100,000 adult population. Substance is also indicated.

JUVENILE ARRESTS*

Law enforcement agencies score an arrest when a person is taken into custody for committing an offense within their own local jurisdictions (reporting areas). Arrests as reported include persons released without being formally charged. A juvenile, even though merely warned and released, is counted as having been "arrested" when the circumstances are such that, if he or she were an adult, an arrest would be tallied. While crime data relate to criminal events, arrest statistics relate to persons taken into custody. A juvenile may be arrested several times during the year for the same type of offense or for different types of crimes. Each arrest is scored. Several young people may be arrested for one crime, or the arrest of one juvenile may clear several crimes.

The numbers of juvenile arrests reported by Wisconsin law enforcement agencies are presented, along with the arrest rate per 100,000 juvenile inhabitants. Arrests for both Part I and Part II crimes are indicated, including arrests for curfew and loitering violations and for running away. Data are summarized by population categories. Total, City, Suburban Area, and Rural Area juvenile Part I and Part II arrests are broken down by age, sex, and race.

The number of juvenile arrests for narcotic drug laws offenses are shown by agency and population categories, with rates based on the number of juvenile arrests per 100,000 juvenile population. Substance is also indicated. Another table shows the law enforcement disposition of juveniles arrested, by individual agency and population categories.

* Juveniles are scored as having been "arrested" for purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, although under Wisconsin Statutes law enforcement custody of a child shall not be legally considered an arrest.

APPENDIX

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT: A person 18 years of age or older.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT: An unlawful attack by one person upon another with the intent to inflict great bodily injury, usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious body harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury were the crime successfully completed. Attempted murders are included in this category. Assaults of law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty are excluded.

ARREST: Taking into physical or other legal custody for committing an offense in the local reporting jurisdiction. Arrests for all criminal offenses are scored. Arrests for traffic offenses, with the exception of driving under the influence, are not scored. Included are those persons released without having been formally charged. (See JUVENILE ARREST.)

ARREST RATE: The number of arrests for a particular offense, or group of offenses, per 100,000 population. The formula is

$$\frac{\text{Number of Arrests}}{\text{Population}} \times 100,000.$$

ARSON: Violations of Wisconsin Statutes and municipal ordinances relating to arson and attempted arson. In the event a death results from arson the incident would be classified as murder. If personal injury results, the situation would be classified as aggravated assault.

AUTO THEFT: The stealing of a motor vehicle, or driving the vehicle away without the owner's consent. Attempted auto thefts are included. Specifically excluded is the temporary use when the vehicle is actually returned by the user, and lawful access to the vehicle has been granted or can be assumed. This category includes thefts of motor-driven vehicles such as automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, and snowmobiles.

BURGLARY: Includes housebreaking, safecracking, or any unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. It is not necessary for force to be used to gain or attempt to gain entrance in order for the event to be classified as a burglary. Moreover, a loss does not have to occur in the case of an illegal entry for it to be counted.

CITIES: For purposes of this document, "cities" includes all reporting agencies except sheriffs' offices and state level law enforcement agencies. Police departments serving cities, villages, townships, and university campuses are included.

CLEARANCE (CLEARED BY ARREST): An offense is cleared, or solved for crime reporting purposes, when at least one person is arrested, charged with commission of the offense, and turned over to the court for prosecution. "Exceptional" clearances may be scored when certain conditions are met.

CLEARANCE RATE: The number of clearances divided by the total number of offenses, expressed as a percent. The formula is $\frac{\text{Number of Clearances}}{\text{Number of Offenses}} \times 100\%$.

COMMERCIALIZED VICE (INCLUDING PROSTITUTION): Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, including attempts.

CRIME INDEX: The total number of seven serious crimes that become known to law enforcement authorities. Crime Index offenses are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft. The Crime Index is generally used to measure the extent, fluctuation, and distribution of crime.

CRIME RATE: The number of offenses per 100,000 population. The formula is $\frac{\text{Number of Offenses}}{\text{Population}} \times 100,000$.

CURFEW-LOITERING (JUVENILES): Violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT: Committing a breach of the peace.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE: Limited to the driving or operating of any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

DRUNKENNESS: Offenses of drunkenness or intoxication, with the exception of "Driving Under the Influence" and "Liquor Laws".

EMBEZZLEMENT: Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

EMPLOYEES PER 1,000 POPULATION: The formula is: $\frac{\text{Number of Employees}}{\text{Population}} \times 1,000$.

FAMILY OFFENSES: Nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family and children, including attempts.

FORCIBLE RAPE: The carnal knowledge of a female through the use of force or the threat of force. Assaults or attempts to commit forcible rape are included; however, statutory rape (without force) is not counted. Crime counts in this category are limited to actual offenses of forcible rape or attempts as established by police investigation.

FORGERY (AND COUNTERFEITING): All offenses dealing with the making, altering, uttering or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true. Attempts are included.

FRAUD: Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Excludes forgeries and counterfeiting.

GAMBLING: Promoting, permitting or engaging in gambling.

ILLEGAL WEAPONS: Weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, including attempts.

INDEX CRIMES: Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft.

JUVENILE: A person under 18 years of age.

JUVENILE ARREST: Juveniles are scored as having been "arrested" for purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting procedures, although under Wisconsin Statutes law enforcement custody of a child shall not be legally considered an arrest. Arrests, in the case of juveniles, include those who have committed a crime and are taken into custody under circumstances such that were the juvenile an adult, an arrest would be scored. All violations by juveniles where some police or other official action is taken are included. Law enforcement contacts with juveniles where no offense has been committed are not scored as arrests. Juveniles taken into custody for their own protection, such as in neglect cases, are not scored as being arrested if they have not committed a crime. (See ARREST.)

JUVENILE INVOLVEMENT IN CLEARANCES: The number of clearances involving exclusively juveniles divided by the total number of clearances, expressed as a percent. The formula is $\frac{\text{Number of Clearances Involving Only Juveniles}}{\text{Number of Clearances}} \times 100\%$.

LIQUOR LAWS: With the exception of "drunkenness", and "driving under the influence", liquor law violations, State or local, are placed in this class. Attempts are included. Federal violations are excluded.

MURDER (AND NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER): Includes all willful killings without due process and is scored on the basis of police investigation as opposed to any decision of a court, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Deaths caused by negligence are not included in this category but are counted as manslaughters by negligence. Attempts or assaults to kill are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. The crime count for this offense classification also excludes suicides, accidental deaths, justifiable homicides, and murders of law enforcement officers in the line of duty.

NARCOTIC AND DRUG: Violations of State laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. Arrests are requested on the basis of the narcotics used.

NEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER: The killing of a human being by the act, procurement, or culpable negligence of another. As a general rule, the killing must result from an act performed with gross negligence.

NON-SUBURBAN CITIES: All reporting police departments in non-standard Metropolitan Statistical Area counties.

OTHER ASSAULTS: An unlawful attack by one person upon another which is not of an aggravated nature. Attempts are included. Assaults upon law enforcement officers in the line of duty are excluded.

OTHER OFFENSES: All other State or local violations excluding traffic, not elsewhere classified. Attempts are included.

PART I OFFENSES: The first of two major groups of crimes as established for Uniform Crime Reporting purposes. Offenses included are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, theft under \$50 in value, and auto theft. Both offenses known and arrest data are reported for the Part I offenses (arrests for theft are not broken down by value).

PART II OFFENSES: The second of two major groups of crimes as established for Uniform Crime Reporting purposes. In general, Part II crimes are those that are less severe, committed more frequently, or less apt to come to the attention of the police. Offenses included are other (non-aggravated) assaults, arson, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property, vandalism, weapons, prostitution and commercialized vice, sex offenses, narcotic drug laws, gambling, crimes against family and children, driving under the influence, liquor laws, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, all other offenses (except traffic) not elsewhere classified, curfew and loitering laws (juveniles), and running away (juveniles). Offenses known data are not collected for the Part II offenses, with the exception of other (non-aggravated) assaults.

PERCENT CHANGE: The formula is
$$\frac{\text{Value in Current Period} - \text{Value in Base Period}}{\text{Value in Base Period}} \times 100\%$$

PERSONS GUILTY AS CHARGED: Persons found guilty of (1) the same charge as was originally placed against them (If they were arrested for more than one charge or count, they must be found guilty of the most serious.), or (2) different charge with the same penalty as the original charge or with a greater penalty than the original.

PERSONS GUILTY OF LESSER OFFENSES: Persons found guilty of (1) lesser offense than the one charged, or (2) offense less than the most serious crime charged, if there was more than one charge. A lesser offense is one with a less severe penalty and may still be within the same crime classification.

PROPERTY CRIMES: Three Crime Index offenses that do not involve face-to-face confrontation between victim and perpetrator. They are burglary, theft \$50 and over in value, and auto theft.

ROBBERY: A vicious type of crime which takes place in the presence of the victim to obtain property or a thing of value from a person by use of force or threat of force. Assaults to rob and attempts are included. Robbery is a violent crime that sometimes results in injury to the victim. Both armed robberies where any weapon is used, and strong-arm robberies where no weapon other than a personal weapon is employed ("muggings"), are included in this category.

RUNAWAYS (JUVENILES): Involves apprehensions for protective custody.

RURAL AREAS: Sheriffs' offices in non-Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area counties.

SEX OFFENSES: (Except forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice.) Offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like, including attempts.

STANDARD METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREAS: Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA's) have been established nationwide to reflect regions of population concentration, and they are generally made up of an entire county or group of counties having at least one central city of 50,000 or more inhabitants, with the whole meeting the requirements of certain metropolitan characteristics. Wisconsin counties in Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas include Brown, Calumet, Dane, Douglas, Kenosha, La Crosse, Milwaukee, Outagamie, Ozaukee, Racine, Washington, Waukesha, and Winnebago.

STOLEN PROPERTY: Includes all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

SUBURBAN AREAS: All reporting sheriffs' offices and all reporting police departments serving jurisdictions with less than 50,000 population in Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas counties (Brown, Calumet, Dane, Douglas, Kenosha, La Crosse, Milwaukee, Outagamie, Ozaukee, Racine, Washington, Waukesha, and Winnebago). Suburban police departments are included in other population categories according to the size of their jurisdictions.

THEFT: Is the unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles of value without the use of force, violence, or fraud. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from autos, thefts of auto parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc. Beginning in January, 1972, thefts from temporary residence, recreation-type dwellings, (i.e., camping tents, campers, camping trailers, houseboats, and similar recreational vehicles, trailers or dwellings) were included in this offense category. Previously, these were classified as burglaries. For purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting, this offense category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, or worthless checks. Auto theft is a separate Index crime and, therefore, is also excluded. As a Crime Index offense, theft is limited to those in which the value of property stolen is \$50 or more.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING: A program for the collection, analysis, and dissemination of law enforcement statistics. Uniform classifying and scoring procedures have been established to facilitate comparisons between jurisdictions and various time periods. Mandatory Uniform Crime Reporting in Wisconsin is authorized by law (1969 Wisconsin Statutes 165.83 and 165.84).

VAGRANCY: Vagrancy, begging, loitering (persons age 18 and over), and vagabondage.

VANDALISM: Consists of the willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control, by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local ordinance. This offense covers a wide range of malicious behavior directed at property and includes attempts.

VIOLENT CRIMES: Four Crime Index offenses that involve face-to-face confrontation between victim and perpetrator. They are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

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
