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SUMMARY OF CRIME FACTORS

The statistics presented represent the volume of "actual" target crime reported to the Aurora Police Department during 1994. The target crime in this report is identified as murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny/theft, vehicle theft, and arson.

The Department reported criminal activity using both the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) and the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) guidelines. While UCR and NIBRS are tools to compare crime rates and trends of cities across the nation, they do not convey total criminal activity for each agency.

The UCR classifies incidents using the hierarchy rule; which reports only the most serious crime for each incident. In actual practice, two or more crimes may be involved in a single criminal episode (incident) and may have occurred in more than one District or Beat. The UCR was discontinued March 24, 1994. At that time, NIBRS was brought on-line with the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI) for use in Colorado. The NIBRS classifies all crimes within each incident.

Another significant difference between UCR and NIBRS is that UCR is a "static" system and NIBRS is a "dynamic" system. This means the crime totals in NIBRS may change as the information is updated. Because of this enhancement, the figures in the beat tables, which were printed at a later date, may not correspond with the year-to-date totals.

Knowledge of demographics is necessary before attempting to compare data between different Patrol Districts and Beats within the City of Aurora. The demographics could effect both the type and volume of crime. These factors are as follows:

Unless otherwise noted, all figures in the contents of this report represent actual numbers of offenses, victims, suspects, and arrests.

TARGET CRIME

VOLUME

During 1994, 20,576 actual target crimes were reported in Aurora. This represents an increase of 90 (.4%) when compared to 1993.

The target crimes were categorized as either violent crimes or property crimes. Violent crimes include murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crimes include burglary, theft, vehicle theft, and arson. The crime statistics will not reflect crimes such as vandalism and simple assaults.

VIOLENT CRIMES

A total of 4,275 actual violent crimes were reported in Aurora in 1994. This accounts for 20.8% of the target crimes handled by the Aurora Police Department during the last year. This represents a *decrease of 182 (-4.1%)* when compared to the previous year.

PROPERTY CRIMES

The number of actual property crimes reported in Aurora in 1994 totaled 16,301. This is an increase of 272 (1.7%) when compared to 1993.

CLEARANCES

According to UCR and NIBRS, offenses which are reported to the police and which are later determined through investigation to be false or baseless claims are unfounded. They are not counted as actual offenses.

Actual crime offenses are cleared in one of two ways: (1) arrests or (2) exceptionally cleared. An exceptional clearance occurs when some element beyond that of the Aurora Police Department precludes the arrest of the offender. Examples include the victim's failure to prosecute, or declination for prosecution by the appropriate prosecutor. Offenses which occurred in years other than 1994 can be cleared during the last year. Therefore, clearance rates do not directly correspond to reported crime rates and could exceed 100%.

During 1994, the Aurora Police department cleared 35.0% of the actual target crimes. The clearance rate for violent crime was 64.7% and 27.2% for property crimes.

ARRESTS

Arrests for target crime in the city totaled 6,369. Adults accounted for 64.7% (4,120). Arrests involving juveniles (age 17 and under) accounted for the remaining 35.3% (2,249).

Violent crime arrests accounted for 2,058 (32.3%) of the target crime arrests while property crime accounted for the remaining 4,311 (67.7%).

Adults accounted for 1,631 (79.2%) of the violent crime arrests and 2,489 (57.7%) of the property crime arrests. Juveniles accounted for the remaining 427 (20.8%) and 1,822 (42.3%) respectively.

STOLEN PROPERTY

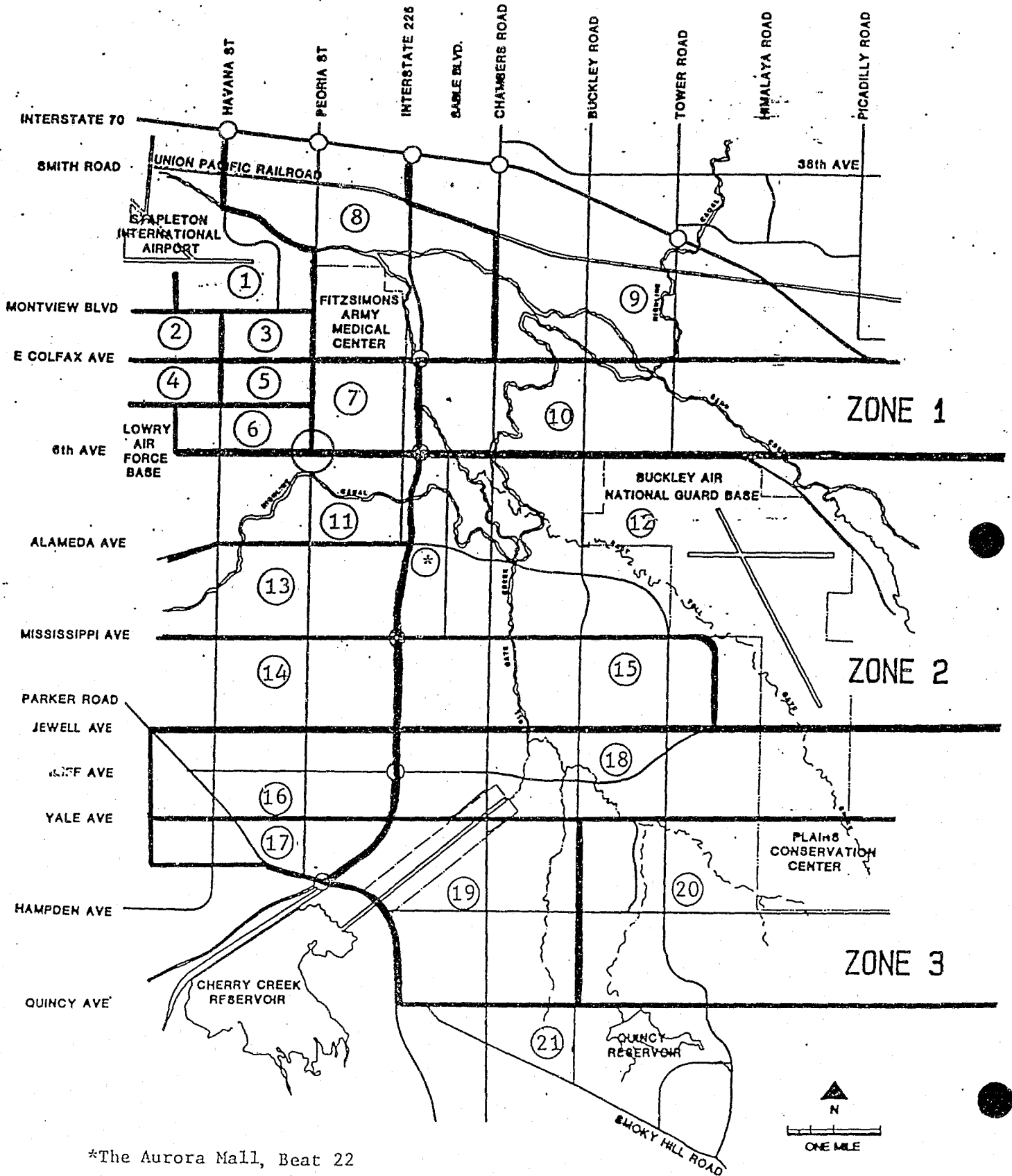
The total value of property reported as stolen in Aurora during 1994 was \$14,871,184 according to UCR and NIBRS. The amount recovered during the year was \$5,796,574 or 39.0% of the value stolen. The recovered property value includes property recovered in 1994 which was stolen in 1994 and in preceding years.

The property value stolen during 1994 represented an increase of \$882,992 or 6.3% when compared to the property value stolen in 1993. The amount recovered in 1994 represented a decrease of \$860,534 or -12.9% when compared to the property value recovered in 1993.

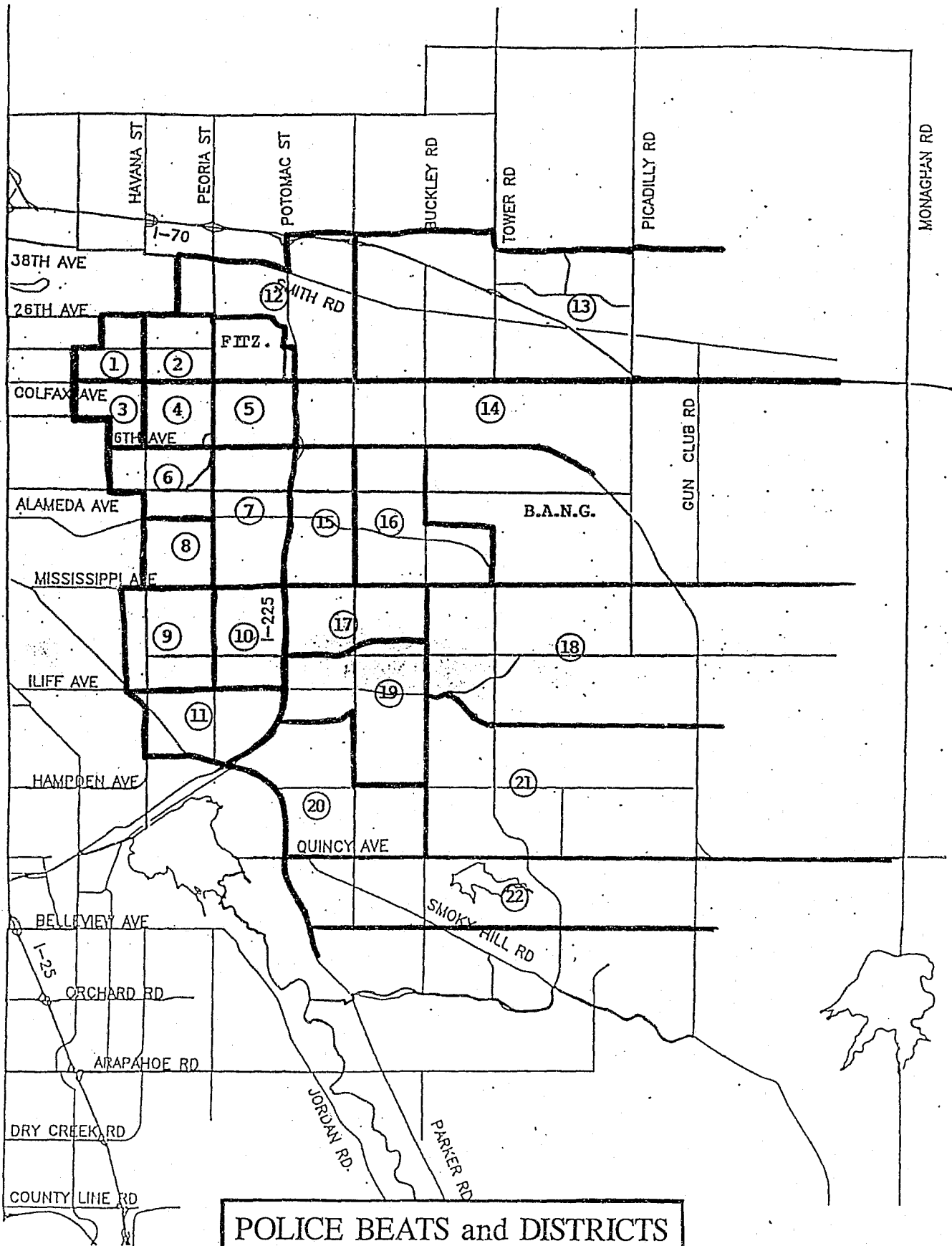

MURDER

According to UCR and NIBRS, murder is defined as the **willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another**. It includes any death which results from an argument, fight, assault, or during the commission of another crime. Excluded from this definition are attempts to commit murder, which are classified as aggravated assaults. Also excluded are justifiable homicides, suicides, accidental deaths, and deaths caused by negligence.

VOLUME

During 1994, there were thirteen (13) murders committed in Aurora. This is a *decrease of 6 (-31.6%)* when compared to 1993. All murder information was obtained from reading and analyzing the actual offense reports.

Investigation cleared eight (8) murders which included prior and current year offenses. This represented 61.5% of the murders in 1994. Juvenile arrests represent 37.5% of the total arrests for murder.

RAPE

According to UCR and NIBRS, rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a person forcibly and/or against the person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth). This offense includes the forcible rape of both males and females. If force was used or threatened, the crime is classified as forcible rape regardless of the age of the victim.

Volume

During 1994, 151 forcible rapes were reported to the Aurora Police Department. This total represents a *decrease of 15 (-9.0%)* when compared to 1993.

According to NIBRS, 64.9% of the victims knew the offenders, 30.6% were strangers to the victim and the relationship was unknown in the remaining 4.5%.

The Clearance rate for this category is 53.0% for 1994. Adults accounted for 76.8% of the city's rape arrests while juveniles accounted for the remaining 23.2%.

ROBBERY

According to UCR and NIBRS, robbery is defined as the taking or attempting to take, anything of value under confrontational circumstances from the control, custody, or care of another person by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear of immediate harm. The victim can be either a business or an individual.

Volume

During 1994 a total of 631 robberies were committed in Aurora. This is a decrease of 109 (-14.7%) when compared 1993.

Investigation cleared 28.9% of the robberies. Adult arrests accounted for 46.6% (88) while juvenile arrests accounted for the remaining 53.4% (101). The two combined represent one hundred eighty nine (189) robbery arrests.

Total value of property taken during robberies in 1994 was \$460,990.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

According to UCR and NIBRS, aggravated assault is defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another wherein the offender uses a weapon or displays it in a threatening manner, or the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness. Aggravated assault includes: assaults or attempts to kill or murder; poisoning; assault with a dangerous or deadly weapon; maiming, mayhem, assault with explosives; and assault with disease. All assaults by one person upon another with the intent to kill, maim, or inflict severe bodily injury with the use of any dangerous weapon are classified as aggravated assault. Simple assaults are not included in this total.

Volume

In 1994 there were 3,480 aggravated assaults in the City of Aurora. The number of offenses decreased 52 (-1.5%) when compared to 1993.

According to NIBRS the victim knew the offender in 64.8% of the aggravated assaults, 26.8% were strangers to the victim and the relationship was unknown in the remaining 8.4%.

A total of 71.7% of the aggravated assaults were cleared in 1994. Adults accounted for 82.9% of the city's aggravated assault arrests while juveniles accounted for the remaining 17.1%.

BURGLARY

According to UCR and NIBRS, burglary is defined as the unlawful entry into a building or other structure with the intent to commit a felony or a theft. For UCR purposes, offenses locally known as burglary (any degree); unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; and safecracking should be classified as burglary. Burglary almost always includes some type of larceny offense. Burglary offenses are further categorized as residential or non-residential.

VOLUME

During 1994, a total of 2,909 burglaries were reported in the City of Aurora. The number of offenses increased 168 (5.8%) when compared to 1993.

A total of 13.1% of the burglaries were cleared in 1994. Adults accounted for 41.6% of the city's arrests while juveniles accounted for the remaining 58.4%.

According to UCR and NIBRS, the total property value stolen during the commission of burglaries for 1994 was \$3,273,466.

LARCENY/THEFT

According to UCR and the NIBRS, larceny/theft is defined as the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession, or constructive possession, of another person. Included in this offense are shoplifting, bicycle theft, larceny from vehicle and theft of auto parts, among others. Not included are auto thefts, con games, fraud, and forgery.

Volume

During 1994, a total of 11,633 larceny/thefts were reported in Aurora. The number of offenses increased 121 (1.1%) when compared to the same period in 1993.

The Department cleared 30.7% of the larceny/theft offenses in 1994. Adult arrests accounted for 60.0% of the larceny/theft arrests while juvenile arrests accounted for the remaining 40.0%.

According to UCR and NIBRS, the total property value stolen during the commission of a larceny/theft for 1994 was \$3,741,630.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

According to UCR and NIBRS, motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft of a motor vehicle. Included is all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned, including joyriding.

Volume

During 1994, a total of 1,479 motor vehicle thefts were reported to the Aurora Police Department. This represents a decrease of 10 (-0.7%) when compared to 1993.

A total of 28.3% of the vehicle thefts were cleared in 1994 compared to 21.8% in 1993. Adults accounted for 52.6% of the city's vehicle theft arrests while juveniles accounted for the remaining 47.4%
