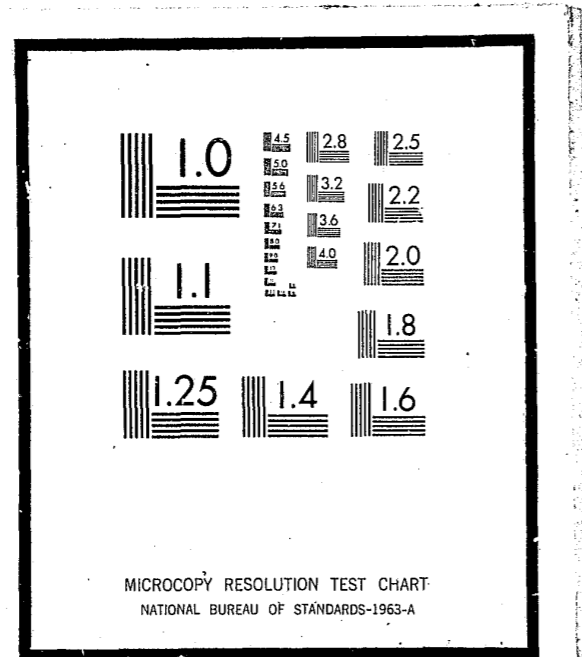

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COVERAGE OF THIS REPORT

This report presents information concerning sentenced prisoners admitted to, confined in, and released from State and Federal correctional institutions for adult felony offenders during calendar year 1963. It is part of the National Prisoner Statistics program, which is a voluntary reporting program initiated by the Bureau of the Census in 1926, and transferred to the Federal Bureau of Prisons in 1950.

Recipients of the 1962 bulletin in this series, "Prisoners in State and Federal Institutions," will note that changes have been made in the 1963 bulletin. Tables on month of commitment and on offenses of prisoners received from court have been added, several tables have been extensively revised, and the tables have again been renumbered.

These changes were made in the hope that they will further increase the usefulness of this annual report. We welcome comments and suggestions from the recipients with respect both to the changes made in this issue and to any suggested changes for future bulletins.

PRISON POPULATION DECREASES FOR SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR

On December 31, 1963, there were 217,280 sentenced prisoners confined in State and Federal institutions for adult felony offenders in the United States. This was a decrease of 0.7 percent from the 1962 prison population figure of 218,830, and a 1.3 percent decline from the record high figure of 220,149 prisoners confined at the close of 1961. Calendar year 1963 was only the third year since World War II in which the national prison population declined. (Chart 1 and Tables 1, 2, and 3)

The ratio of prisoners confined to the civilian population decreased from 118.3 per 100,000 on December 31, 1962, to 115.7 per 100,000 on December 31, 1963—the lowest figure since 1957, when the year-end ratio was 114.9 per 100,000. (Chart 1 and Tables 1 and 2)

State institutions reported a drop of only 0.4 percent in their prison population, as compared to a 0.8 percent decrease in 1962. Federal institutions recorded their first decrease in 15 years—a decline of 3.4 percent from the number of prisoners confined at the close of calendar year 1962.¹ (Chart 2 and Tables 1, 2, and 3)

PRISON POPULATION IN STATE INSTITUTIONS

The year-end prison population in State institutions in 1963 fell below the 1962 level in 27 States and the District of Columbia—and below the 1957 level in 11 States and the District of Columbia. Decreases of 8 percent or more below the 1962 level were reported by 8 States,² with Florida recording the largest decline—11.2 percent. Increases of 8 percent or more above the 1962 level were registered by 4 States—California, Colorado, New Hampshire, and Washington. Among the major geographical regions, the South had the greatest percentage drop, 3.7 percent, while the West, with 7.2 percent, recorded the largest percentage increase. (Table 4)

On a State-by-State basis, the ratio of prisoners confined to the civilian population was highest in Georgia, 181.4 per 100,000, and lowest in Rhode Island, 31.0 per 100,000.³ Regionally, the West had the highest ratio, 130.4 per 100,000, and the Northeast the lowest—76.9 per 100,000. (Chart 3 and Table 4)

COURT COMMITMENTS CONTINUE TO DECLINE

The number of prisoners received from court in State and Federal institutions also decreased for the second straight year, although the drop of 1.4 percent in 1963 was much smaller than the 4.7 percent decline recorded in 1962. Court commitments to State institutions in 1963 decreased by only 0.8 percent, as compared to a 5.5 percent decline in 1962. Federal institutions, on the other hand, reported a drop of 4.7 percent in their court commitments, after registering only a negligible decrease in 1962. (Chart 4 and Tables 3 and 4)

COURT COMMITMENTS EBB DURING THIRD QUARTER

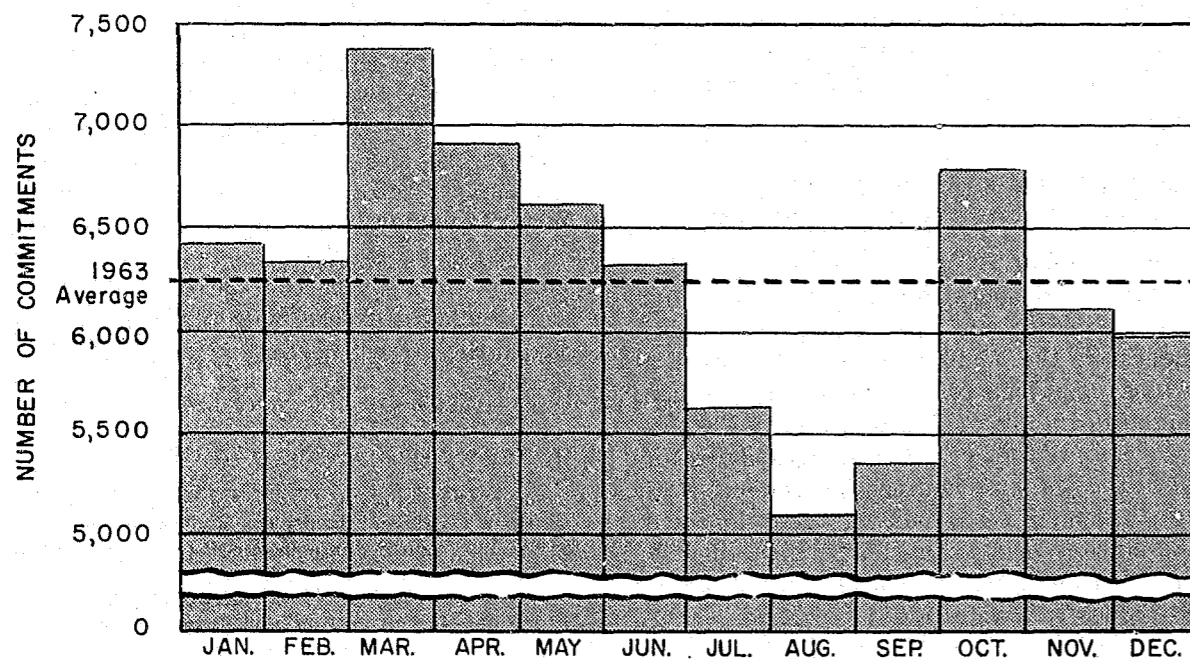
Fewer prisoners were received from court by State institutions during the third quarter of 1963 than during any other three-month period. Only 21.4 percent of the 74,942 court commitments to State institutions were received during this quarter, as contrasted to 26.9 percent in the first quarter, 26.5 percent in the second quarter, and 25.2 percent in the fourth quarter. March accounted for the highest percentage of the 1963 court commitments, 9.9 percent, while August, with 6.8 percent had the lowest commitment rate. (Figure 1 and Table 6)

OFFENSES AMONG COMMITMENTS

Prisoners committed for non-sexual offenses involving violence or threat of violence

FIGURE 1—COURT COMMITMENTS TO STATE INSTITUTIONS, BY MONTH: 1963



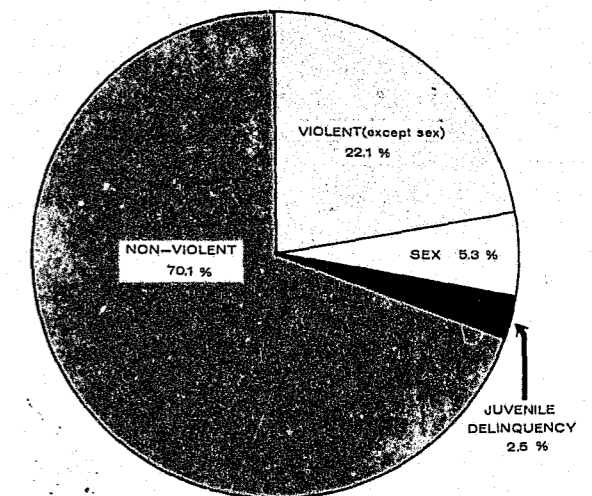

against persons comprised 22.1 percent of the total court commitments to State institutions during 1963, while 70.1 percent were committed for offenses in the "non-violent" category, and 5.3 percent for sexual offenses.⁴ (Figure 2, and Tables 6 and 7)

Among specific offenses, more than twice as many prisoners were committed for burglary—27.8 percent of the total commitments—than for any other crime. Other offenses comprising more than 10 percent of the court commitments were Embezzlement, Fraud and Forgery, 13.7 percent; Other Larceny, 12.1 percent; and Robbery, 11.1 percent. (Figure 3 and Tables 7 and 8)

NUMBER OF VIOLATORS RETURNED CONTINUES TO INCREASE

The number of releases returned to State and Federal institutions after violating the terms of their parole or other conditional release continued to climb—increasing by 9.7 percent in 1963 over 1962, and by 74.0 percent over 1955. The number of violators returned to State institutions increased by 10.7 percent over 1962, while the number returned to Federal institutions registered the smallest increase since 1955—only 0.4 percent. (Chart 5 and Tables 3 and 4)

RELEASES DECLINE

During 1963, the combined total of conditional and unconditional releases from State and Federal institutions fell by 1.0 percent from the 1962 total. State institutions reported their largest annual percentage decrease during the period 1955-1963—1.5 percent, while Federal institutions recorded their largest annual percentage increase during the same period—2.5 percent. (Charts 6 and 7, and Tables 3 and 4)

The number of court commitments and violators returned to State and Federal institutions during 1963 exceeded the number of conditional and unconditional releases by 1,683. However, this was more than offset by an excess of deaths, escapes, and other discharges over escapees returned and other admissions, resulting in a drop of 1,550 in the State and Federal prison population figure. (Table 5)

USE OF CONDITIONAL RELEASE METHODS

Prisoners released conditionally—i.e., to continue their sentence under supervision in the community—constituted 63.3 percent of all releases from State and Federal institutions in 1963.⁵ State institutions released 64.1 percent by conditional means, of whom 93.6 percent were released by parole. Federal institutions, on the other hand, released only

58.5 percent conditionally, and only 57.8 percent of these were by parole. (Tables 3, 5, and 10)

The Northeast had the highest percentage of conditional releases among the major geographical regions—81.7 percent. Among the States, New Hampshire and Washington had, respectively, 100 percent and 99.9 percent releases by conditional means, while Nevada and South Carolina, at the other extreme, conditionally released only 5.8 percent and 10.1 percent, respectively. In 32 States all of the conditional releases were by parole. (Chart 8 and Tables 4, 9, and 10)

FEMALE PRISONERS IN STATE AND FEDERAL INSTITUTIONS

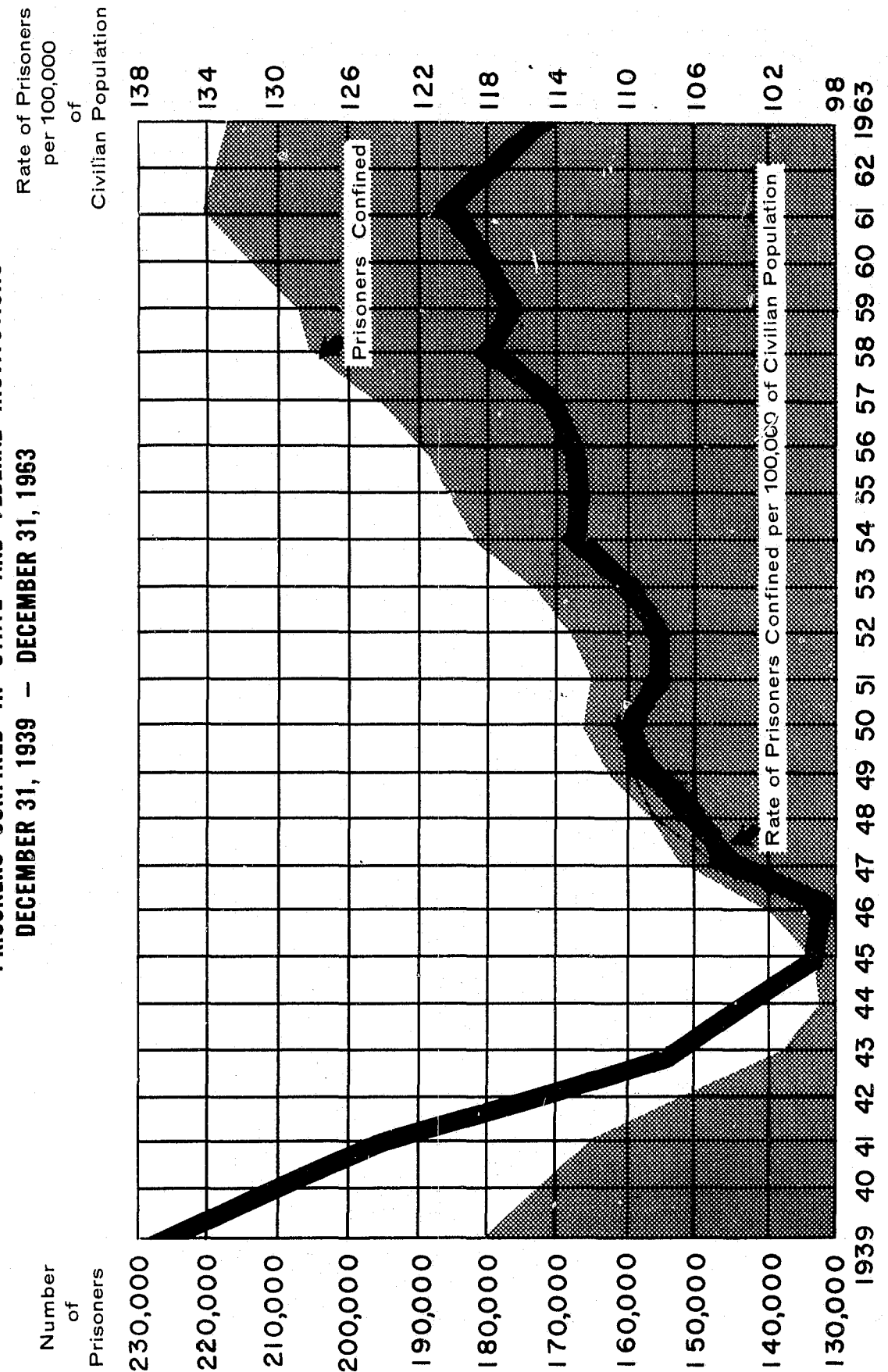
On December 31, 1963, there were 7,745 sentenced female prisoners confined in State and Federal institutions for adult felony offenders in the United States—a decrease of 3.3 percent from the 1962 year-end figure of 8,007. The number confined in Federal institutions declined by 1.9 percent, while State institutions recorded a drop of 3.4 percent in their female population. (Chart 9 and Tables 3, 5, and 11)

The number of women received from court by State institutions fell 3.4 percent in 1963, while the number of female conditional release violators returned increased by 5.2 percent. Female conditional releases increased by 0.3 percent in 1963, while the number released by unconditional means registered a 1.1 percent increase. (Chart 10, and Tables 3, 5, and 11)

Embezzlement, Fraud and Forgery, with 23.6 percent of the total commitments, was the predominant offense group among women received from court by State institutions. Homicide ranked second, with 12.1 percent of the commitments. (Figure 3 and Table 8)

⁵ "All releases" as used here and elsewhere in this publication includes only prisoners discharged conditionally or unconditionally—excluding such methods of departure as court orders, deaths, escapes, and authorized temporary absences.

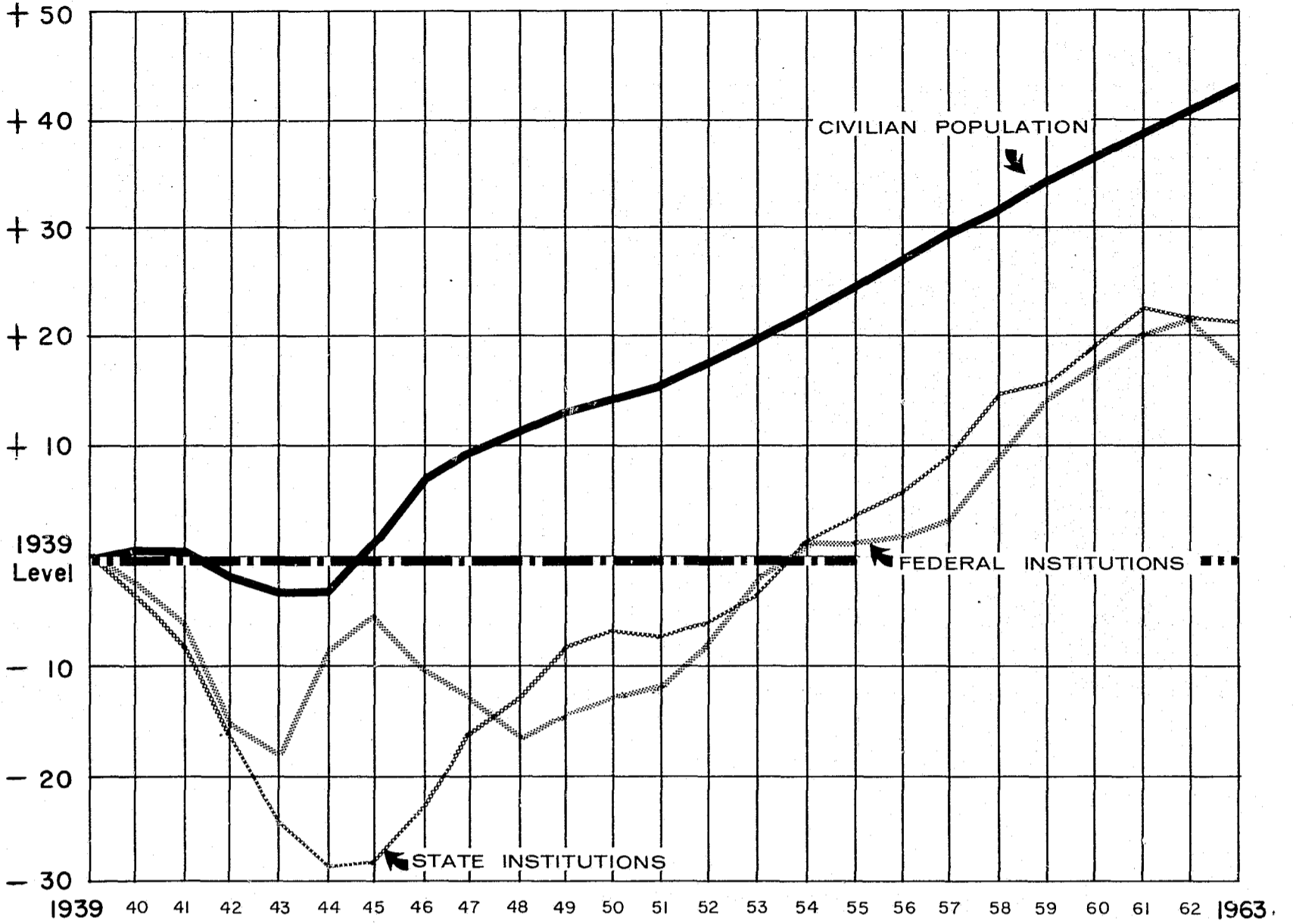
Chart 1 - PRISONERS CONFINED IN STATE AND FEDERAL INSTITUTIONS

Chart 2 - RATE OF GROWTH OF STATE AND FEDERAL PRISON POPULATIONS AND OF CIVILIAN POPULATION

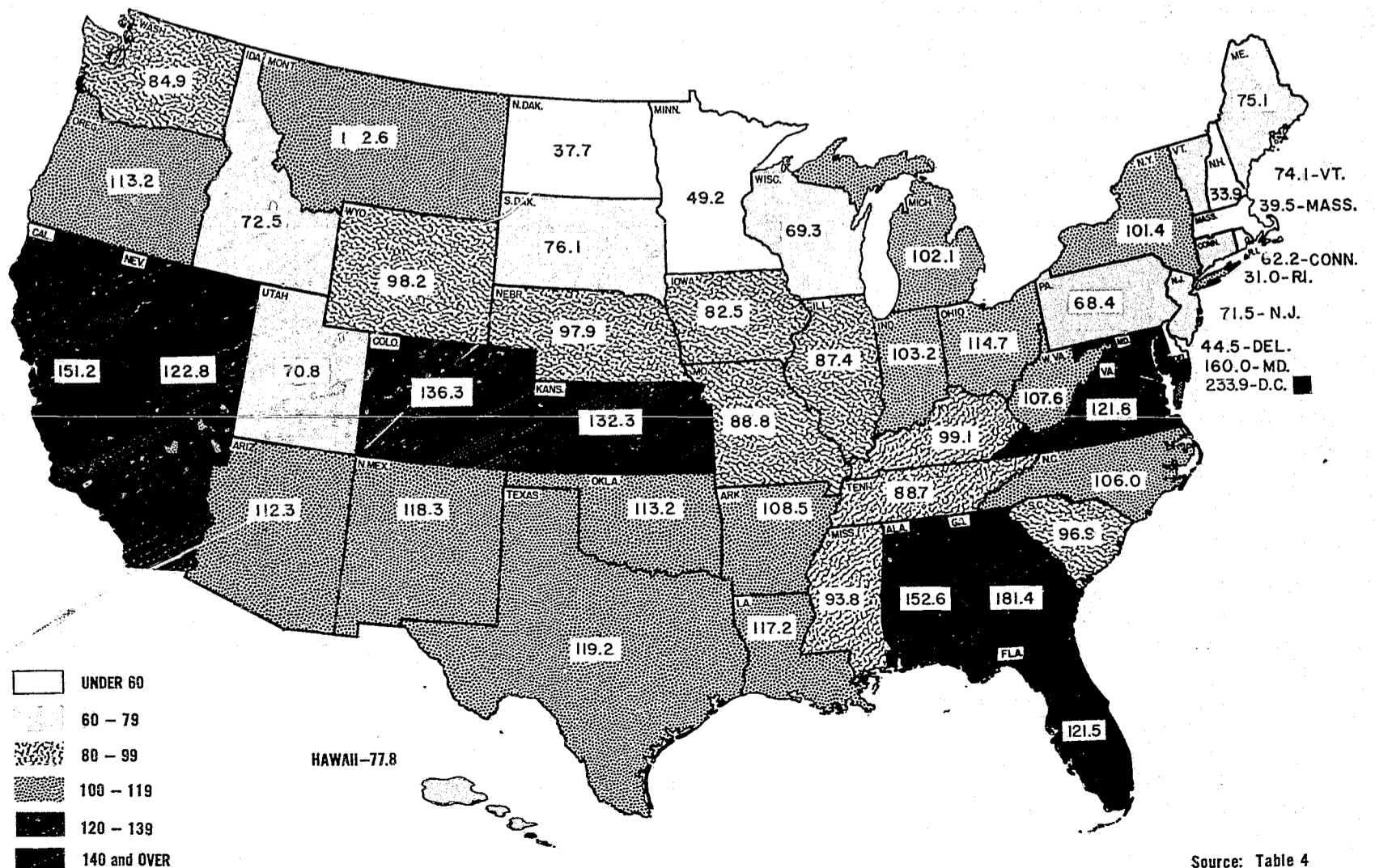

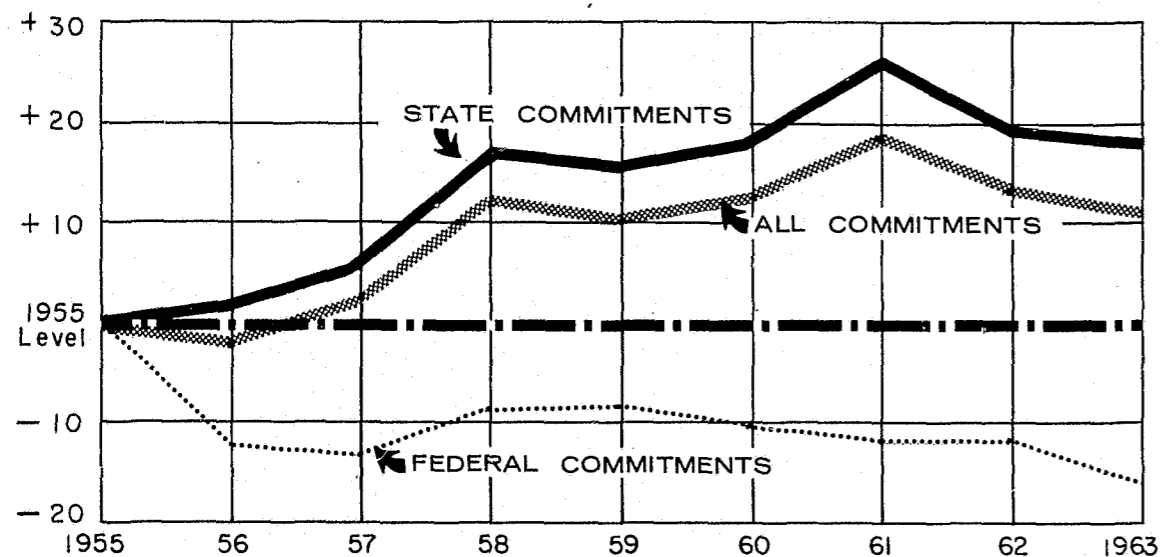
PRISONERS CONFINED IN STATE INSTITUTIONS ON DECEMBER 31, 1963

Chart 4 - COURT COMMITMENTS TO STATE AND FEDERAL INSTITUTIONS

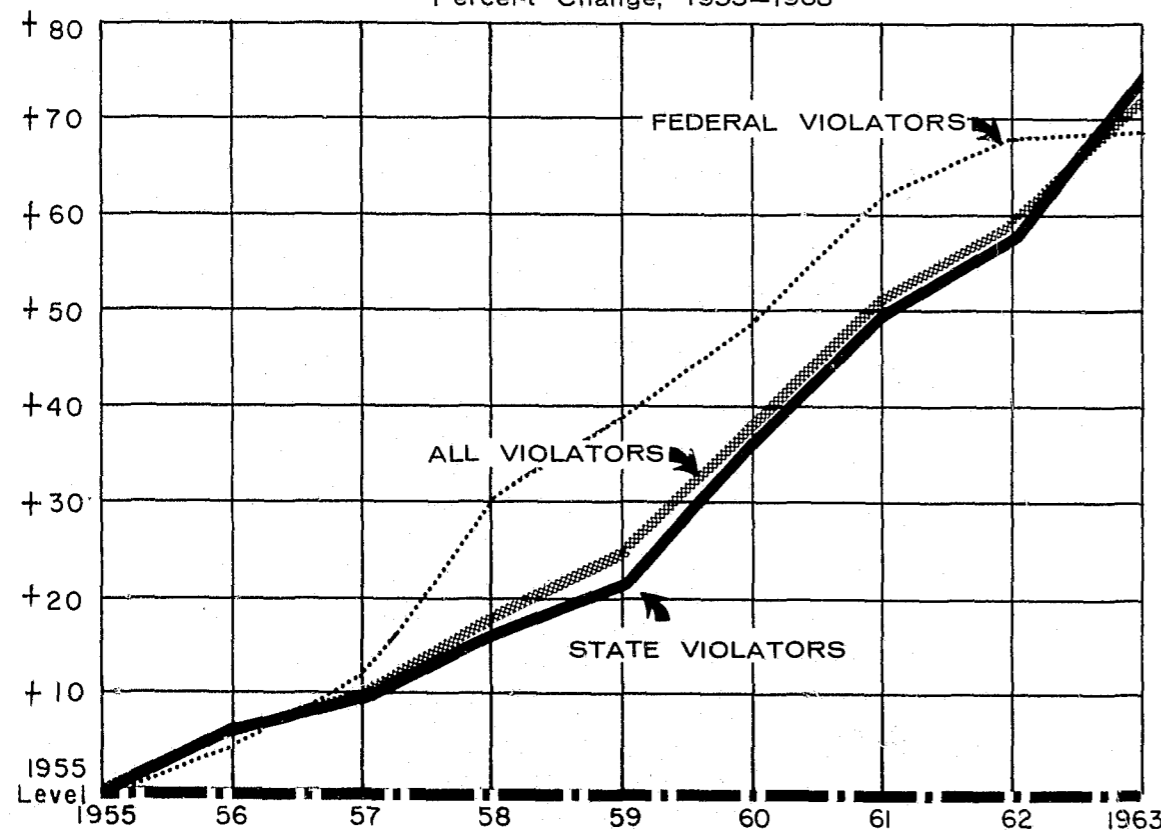

Chart 5 - CONDITIONAL RELEASE VIOLATORS RETURNED TO STATE AND FEDERAL INSTITUTIONS

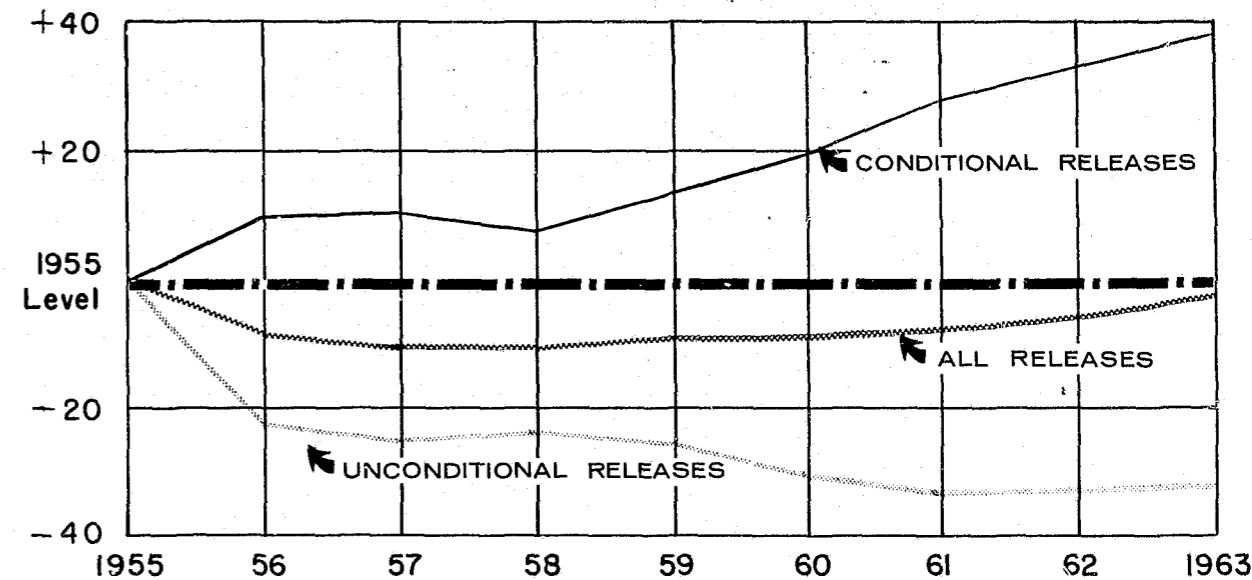

Chart 6 - PRISONERS RELEASED FROM FEDERAL INSTITUTIONS, BY TYPE OF RELEASE

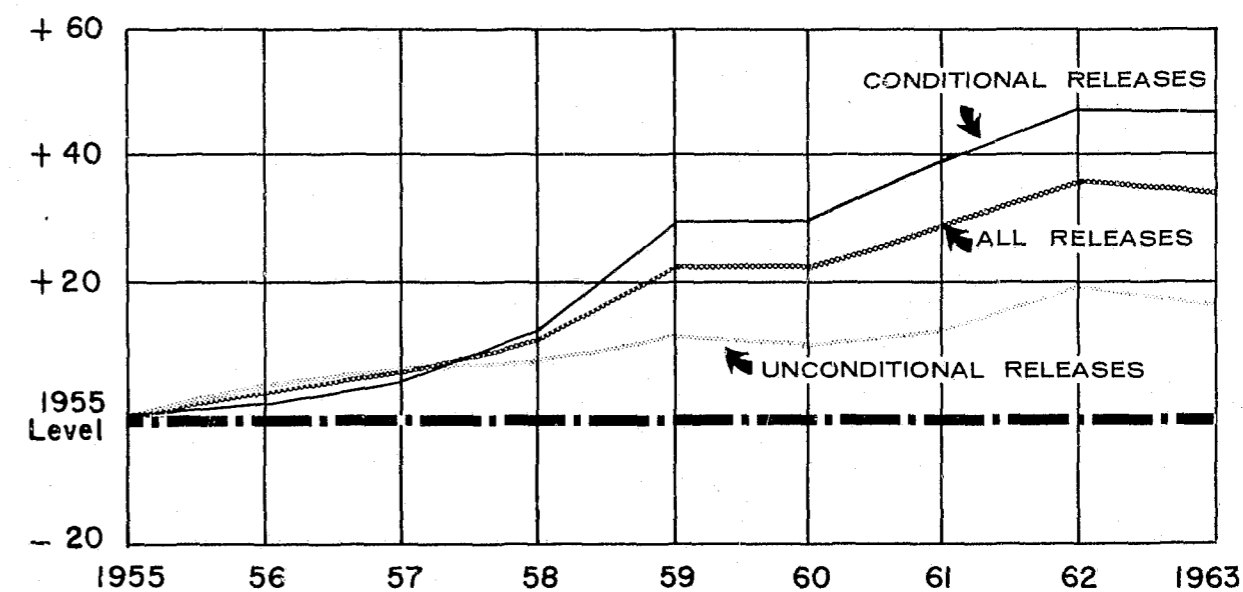
PERCENT CHANGE, 1955-1963

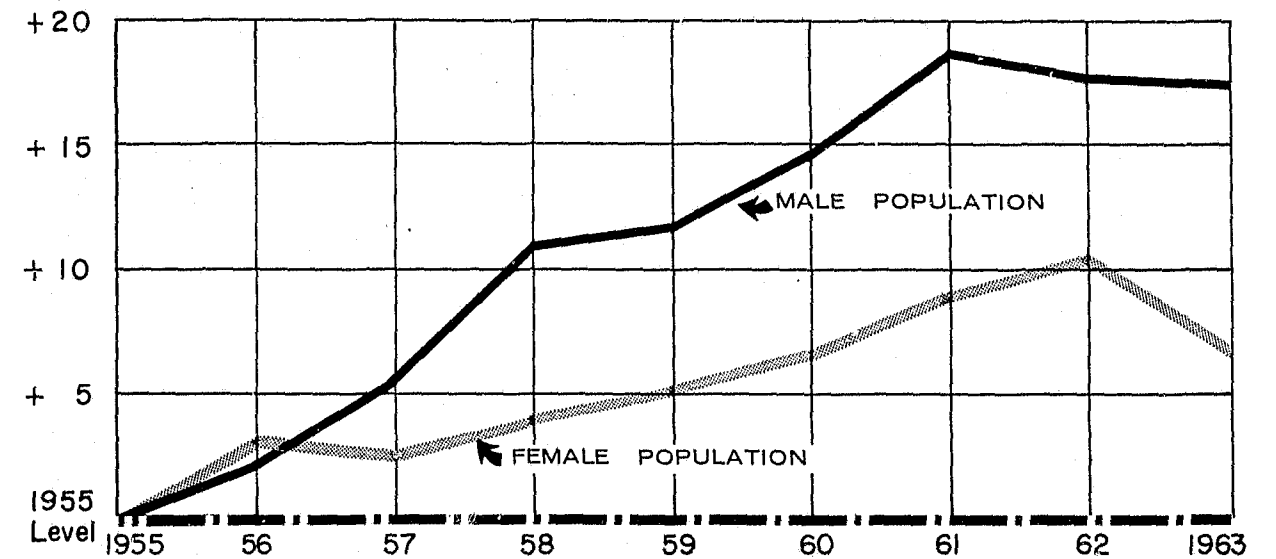
Chart 8 - PRINCIPAL METHODS OF CONDITIONAL RELEASE FROM STATE INSTITUTIONS: 1963

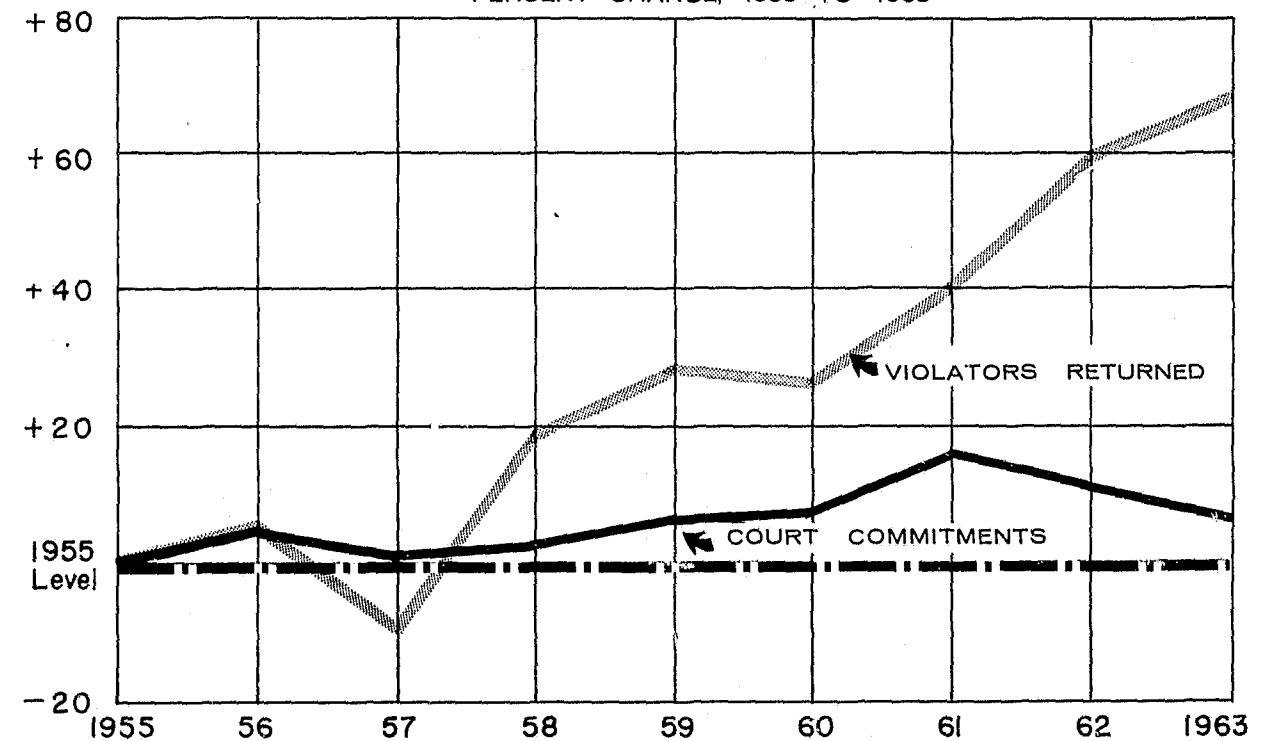
