1974 CLIENT PROFILE MASSACHUSETTS HALFWAY HOUSES, INC.

(Brooke House, Temporary Housing, and Coolidge House)

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INTRODUCTION

The Massachusetts Department of Correction, in response to the prevailing disenchantment with effectiveness of traditional incarceration of offenders and the recognition of the valuable rehabilitative potential of Community resources, is moving towards a system of community correctional programs.¹

The Massachusetts system of community corrections was launched with the enactment of the 1972 Correctional Reform Act (chapter 777) which removed the legal barriers to community programming. Inmate institutional leaves (furloughs)² were allowed for up to 14 days per year and the work and educational release programs were expanded to create wider client eligibility. The most far reaching component of this Act, however, was the authorization of the establishment of small, separately operated community based facilities to which offenders could be transferred prior to their release on parole. These community facilities were either directly operated by or sub-contracted to the Department of Correction. 3

One example of a contract house is the program established by Massachusetts Halfway Houses, Inc. (MHHI), a private organization contracted in 1972 to provide 30 beds which would serve approximately 120 men during a 12 month period. At the time MHHI consisted of Brooke House and Tem-

porary Housing. In June of 1973 Coolidge House, a third MHHI facility was opened.

At its inception, MHHI accepted residents on a post-release basis only, (i.e., those offenders who had in fact been paroled). It was not until February of 1974 that MHHI accepted residents on a pre-release basis (i.e., residents within 18 months of their parole eligibility). This study is concerned with pre-release clients only.

This report is the first stage of a three part overall evaluation of residents admitted to MHHI on a pre-release basis during 1974. Included in this report are: Statistical data regarding the movement of population in and out of the pre-release programs, program termination data and a statistical breakdown of background characteristics of program participants. The second stage of the evaluation will be a comparison of commitment, background and criminal history variables between MHHI program completers and program non-completers. The third and final portion of the evaluation will be a one year recidivism follow-up for the 1974 release sample.

SAMPLES

During 1974 there were a total of 85 residents admitted to MHHI on a pre-release basis. The breakdown by house was as follows: Brooke House, 37; Temporary Housing, 6; and Coolidge House, 42. These figures represent those residents admitted to the facilities during 1974 and subsequently released from the program either during 1974 or the first six months of 1975. Admission figures by sending institution are summarized in Table I below.

For, comparative purposes, the total sample was divided into two groups; program completers and program non completers. A program completion was defined as any resident who successfully completed his stay at MHHI and was released to the streets either by permit of the parole board or a certificate of discharge. A program non-completion was defined as any resident who did not complete his stay at MHHI but was instead returned to his sending institution. When the total sample was divided in this fashion there were 57 program completions and 28 program non-completions. Table II, summarizes type of termination and institution returned to for the MHHI sample.

The reasons for return were varied. Some examples were; violation of house or departmental rules, inability to adjust, attempted or actual escape, a new arrest while on furlough or work release or any major disciplinary problem while at the facility. The specific reasons for return for the non completion sub sample are presented in Table III below.

On occasion a resident can be returned to an institution by his own request. For this reason the release group was defined in terms of program completion/non-completion rather that program failure.

DATA COLLECTION

Data collected for both samples consisted of commitment, social background and criminal history variables. This material was generated by the Massachusetts Department of Corrections Community Rehabilitation Systems (CRS) computerized data base. Booking and probation data was provided by the data base maintained by the Correction/Parole Information System Unit. A complete statistical breakdown by variable for the sample is documented in Table IV.
