FOREWORD

Much has been accomplished during the past year to expedite the disposition of appeals filed in the appellate courts of Pennsylvania. But much more should be done.

For too long our courts, and particularly the appellate courts, have been operating in an archaic fashion. The institution of the panel system in the Superior Court in September 1978 was the most progressive step in the court's history. If the electorate approves the proposed constitutional amendment in the November 1979 election, which will permit the number of judicial personnel on the Superior Court to be increased, an urgently needed restructuring of the jurisdiction of the appellate courts can be effected and the efficiency of our entire court system will be vastly improved. I urge everyone interested in the proper administration of justice to do everything possible to ensure a favorable vote on this constitutional amendment.

During the coming months, our State Court Administrator's office will be taking a hard look at the time utilized for the disposition of civil cases in the trial courts. The National Center for State Courts will assist in this inquiry. The time period in the disposition of litigation must be reduced on all levels of the court system. To this end, my administration as Chief Justice of Pennsylvania is dedicated. I earnestly enlist your cooperation.



SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA MEMORANDUM

TO: The Chief Justice and Justices of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania

FROM: Judge Alexander F. Barbieri

Since my appointment as Court Administrator of Pennsylvania on December 15, 1974, the activities and operations of the State Court Administrator's Office have greatly expanded under statutes and rules of court to meet the needs of judicial systems within Pennsylvania. This Office, by providing a coordinating and unifying force behind the judicial systems, has become the focal point of the Pennsylvania Judicial System. Since 1974, important duties and services have been provided to the courts by this Office. They include benefits counselling, judicial educational programs, assignments of visiting judges, the establishment of a Judicial Planning Committee of which this Office serves as Secretariat, the monitoring of appellate court case flow, the processing of docket transcript forms, the establishment of a legislative liaison between the Judiciary and Legislature, the development of electronic data processing capabilities involving accounting, statistical, and case monitoring systems at the trial and appellate levels, the publication of an office procedures manual and a monthly judicial newsletter. The following is a report to you on the highlights of the activities which have taken place during the past year:

District Justices

At the inception of the system, district justices were not required to take continuing education courses. The AOPC instituted a program of continuing education which took two forms: regional seminars conducted at various times throughout Pennsylvania, and a formal training program at the Pennsylvania State University entitled "Institute for Courts of Initial Jurisdiction." Approximately 200 district justices attended the Institute on subjects such as evidence, search and seizure, crimes code and vehicle code. The educational programs were initially funded by the Governor's Justice Commission and subsequently by the General Assembly. On July 1, 1976, Act 204 became effective. This Act mandated that every district justice must complete a continuing education program each year equivalent to not less than 32 hours. In such courses, as approved by the Minor Judiciary Education Board, the Education Board conducted the continuing education program with this Office working as liaison with the Board. In June, 1978, the AOPC assumed a new relationship with the Minor Judiciary Education Board. The Judicial Code transferred the responsibility of administrating the Board to the AOPC. Since that time, we have assumed all administrative responsibilities of the Minor Judiciary Education Board and have taken a much more active role in planning and managing its educational programs. The staff of the Board is now under the administration of the AOPC.

The AOPC also handles the administration and operation of the realignment and recertification of magisterial districts. When the magisterial system first came into being, there were 595 magisterial districts. Currently, there are 556. The AOPC periodically reviews the requests for realignment of magisterial districts and, when necessary, makes recommendations to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania concerning the proposed realignments. The Deputy Court Administrator in charge of AOPC's minor judiciary responsibilities, is sometimes appointed by the Court Administrator to serve as hearing examiner and to make reports and recommendations concerning such matters. During the year, the office continued the maintenance of a district justice directory, containing the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all district justices, and including Pittsburgh Traffic Magistrates and Philadelphia Traffic Court judges. Work was started and continues on a Constable's Directory. This Deputy Court Administrator is also assigned to act as a liaison between the AOPC and the Minor Court Civil Procedural Rules Committee and Criminal Procedural Rules Committee. Proposed rules on uniform forms of procedures were discussed and comments concerning change were brought to the committee's attention. The minor judiciary deputy also represents the Court Administrator on the Governor's Highway Traffic Safety Council and participates in the meetings of that Council.

A major achievement took place during the year in the development of a district justice office procedures manual. Work on this project continued in 1978 into 1979. This extensive undertaking was achieved under a grant from the Governor's Highway Traffic Safety Council. Its purpose is to standardize and to make uniform district justices' procedures. These include a one-way accounting system designed to provide complete itemization, accountability and auditability of all monies for the Auditor General, county controller and municipal officials. The manual was prepared by a broad-based task force appointed by the Court Administrator composed of district justices, secretaries, court administrators, and state representatives from the State Department of Revenue and the Office of the Attorney General. The implementation of the manual will aid in training district justice personnel and will improve the efficiency of the administration and operation of cases processed by district justice courts. It is significant to note that the accounting portion of the manual, when fully implemented, will provide for the acceleration of deposit of monies into the State treasury, thereby greatly increasing the interest revenue which the Commonwealth can earn. It will also improve the flow of traffic cases and the accountability thereof.

Constables

In 1976, the Court Administrator appointed a Constables Task Force to make recommendations for the improvement of the constable system. On November 29, 1978, the Task Force filed its final report which contained numerous recommendations for modernizing the constable system in Pennsylvania. The report was well received and was published in the Pennsylvania Bar Quarterly.

In 1978, the AOPC sponsored the first constables statewide training program. A series of one-day seminars throughout Pennsylvania on basic constables' education was conducted by the AOPC. These seminars were well attended and led to plans for another series of seminars for constables scheduled to commence in 1979. The AOPC is pledged to continue and expand constables services and education. The minor judiciary deputy acts as liaison with the Pennsylvania Association of Special Court Judges and Pennsylvania State Constables Association.

Information Systems

1978 was a year of transition in information systems for the AOPC. During the year, the transfer of major processing activities from the Harrisburg to Philadelphia Office was completed and activities were expanded into the appellate court area. During the year, the designing, programming, documenting and processing of docket transcripts began. Also, designing and programming of an automated Superior Court system, with the possibility of such a system being utilized by other appellate courts was commenced. The data processing department continued to implement the financial, accounting and statistical modules of the State Judicial Information System. During the year, staff of the automation department provided technical assistance and guidance to county court information systems. It also designed programs and implemented on-line entry and retrieval of automated information. A major program undertaking during the year was the design of a system to interface with the state police (CLEAN) system concerning criminal histories. Currently, the original copy of the docket transcript form is sent to the state police. Hopefully, this information will be provided with computer tapes in order to make the operation more efficient.

District Court Administration

At the time of the Pennsylvania Constitutional Convention in 1967, only five judicial districts had Trial Court Administrators. They were: Delaware, Montgomery, Bucks, Philadelphia and Allegheny Counties. The Judiciary Article was sweepingly revised in the version adopted by the voters in 1968 and these changes resulted in the development of expanded administration services at the trial court level. At the present time 44 judicial districts have court administrators.

In 1970 the Pennsylvania Council of Trial Court Administrators (now the Pennsylvania Council of District Court Administrators) was organized. Since that time the Council has met annually with President Judges of the judicial districts. These conferences have been sponsored by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts and have played a significant role in the continuing development of professionalism in Court management in the Commonwealth. In recognition of this fact the Supreme Court, by order dated December 9, 1975, defined the duties and responsibilities of a district court administrator to include the following:

- 1. Implementation of policies set by the State Court Administrator.
- 2. Assistance to the State Court Administrator in setting statewide policies.
- 3. Preparation, submission and management of the budget for his court or courts.
- 4. Recruiting, hiring, training, evaluating and monitoring personnel of his court or courts.
- 5. Management of space, equipment and facilities of his court or courts.
- 6. Dissemination of information concerning, or of interest to his court or courts.
- 7. Procurement of supplies and services for his court or courts.
- 8. Custody and disbursement of funds for his court or courts.
- 9. Preparation of reports concerning his court or courts.
- 10. Jury management.
- 11. Study and improvement of caseflow, time standards, and calendaring.
- 12. Research and development of effective methods of court functioning, including in districts where feasible the mechanization and computerization of court operations.
- 13. Preparation and administration of trial calendars for all civil and criminal cases, including daily trial lists.
- 14. Responsibility for the assignment, listing and disposition of all arbitration matters.
- 15. General supervision of the minor judiciary system of the judicial district.

Some judicial districts have begun the work of implementing the Judicial Code—Title 42 Pa.C.S. At least five counties have established, or are about to require the establishment of the Judicial and Related Account. Because of the impact of the Judicial Code on such management areas as personnel, budgets, calendaring, space and other aspects of operations of the judicial district, the implementation of the Judicial Code will create the greatest demand for effective use of management resources. This demand will continue for the foreseeable future, and the role of the district court administrator will become correspondingly more important.

Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges

The conference was formed in 1964 for several purposes: the promotion of the interest of justice throughout the Commonwealth by gathering studies and disseminating to its members information of interest to the judiciary; by presenting and conducting programs and meetings attended by persons interested in law and its procedure; by fostering and promoting the passage of desirable legislation; by cooperating with the Bar Associations, law schools and other groups and other worthwhile projects designed to improve the administration of law; by cooperating with the Chief Justice of Pennsylvania in any judicial conference; and in general to do such other things as necessary to implement its general goals. The Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts is the Secretariat to the Conference, as well as to the Juvenile Court Section of the Conference. In 1973, the cost of operating educational programs for the conference was included in the budget of the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts. At the present time, there are only 6 judges in the Commonwealth who are not members of the Conference. The 23 justices and judges of the appellate courts are honorary members and participate in conference business and attend many of its seminars.

In 1978, the Corrections Committee of the Conference, funded by a subgrant from the Pennsylvania Council on Crime and Delinquency, initiated a visitation program to see and study detention facilities in Pennsylvania. The Subcommittee on American Bar Standards for Criminal Justice of the Criminal Procedure Committee actively engaged in the comparable analysis of criminal standards of the American Bar Association and National Advisory Commission with Pennsylvania law and practice. This project is to be completed in June, 1979. The Domestic Relations Committee continued to work with the Pennsylvania Association of County Commissioners in drafting a cooperative agreement on the use of IV-D funds in Pennsylvania. The Economics Committee was extremely active in developing a program for increased compensation. The Judicial Code Committee continued to be active in dealing with updating the Judicial Act which was passed in 1976.

The Judicial Education Committee, in cooperation with the Pennsylvania College of the Judiciary and the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts, presented a full program of in-state judicial education for trial judges and related court personnel during 1978. The Labor Relations Committee continued its efforts in analyzing the effects of labor cases relating to courts. Regular legislative reports were published by the Legislative Committee. The Mental Health Committee opposed the closing of Farview State Hospital until maximum facilities could be provided for patients at that institution. The Minor Judiciary Committee undertook a study of the merger of the Philadelphia Municipal Court and Court of Common Pleas, in addition to a study of the constable system in Pennsylvania.

The Non-Judicial Functions Committee was concerned with the liability of judges in performing administrative responsibilities. As always, the Public Information Committee was very active in communicating with the media on the activities of the Conference. The Resolutions and Memorials Committee assumed the responsibility of providing special awards for senior judges for services rendered to the Commonwealth. During 1978, the Special Projects and Ideas Committee initiated a project to promote the efficient and effective administration of justice and to share salutory ideas concerning court management through the use of an "Idea of the Month" column in the Pennsylvania Judiciary News. This column has generated an enormous amount of interest in procedures adopted through many trial courts in the state.

Legal Services

Since the creation of the law department in 1975, it has provided direct representation to judicial defendants in over 800 cases. About 200 cases were routine mandamus or prohibition matters in state courts and about 15 have been complaints filed in courts of common pleas requiring trial there. During 1975 and 1976, the staff lawyers provided representation in 40 labor relations matters in behalf of trial judges in various counties and participated actively in litigation reaching the state Supreme Court, in which, in 1978, it was decided that the responsibility for collective bargaining involving county court employees was on the county government. The vast bulk of litigation, numbering over 500 cases, was tried or dismissed on motions in federal courts. These cases are primarily civil rights actions running the gamut, from simple complaints directed against judges, on theories of dissatisfaction with judicial decisions or conduct, to complex age, sex and race discrimination complaints involving the administrative personnel functions of various elements of the court systems.

Two matters have been brought to the Supreme Court of the United States which are now pending there and 25 cases have been successfully defended on appeal to the United States Court of Appeals. Approximately 60 in-court days are required of the legal staff per year. The number of responsive pleadings, motions and briefs filed in the federal courts numbers nearly 100 each year. In addition to the above, the law department performs other functions as well. In 1978, the staff responded to over 200 letters from district justices seeking guidance. Requests are also received from groups such as the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges, Official Court Reporters, State Law Librarian, and various rules committees. While this Office is not free to render legal opinions because of its role as the administrative arm of the Supreme Court, the Law Department tries to be helpful without propounding formal legal judgments.

Monitoring responsibilities mandated by such decisions of the federal courts as *Vecchione* and *Bertolet* have given the law department the additional duties of coordinating the effect of such decisions on the trial judiciary and drafting rules and regulations to absorb such effects. The staff has provided liaison as needed among various interest groups affected by these decisions. Also, the AOPC Staff Attorney serves on the faculty of the Pennsylvania College of the Judiciary lecturing on legal matters that concern the judiciary. These miscellaneous duties occupy about one-third of staff time, with the remaining two-thirds being devoted to litigation duties.

Legislation

The Special Assistant to the Court Administrator reports directly to the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania on the state matters of pending and proposed legislation which are of judicial interest. Various political issues relating to public opinion and a variety of concerns specific to state government are also reported. The Special Assistant is responsible for reviewing and analyzing all state legislation proposed by the Senate and by the House of Representatives. She is also responsible for drafting analyses of certain legislation which affects the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, Court Administrator's Office, appellate courts, trial courts and district justices. The movement of legislation of particular interest is monitored. The Court Administrator is kept advised of specific bills and of the course and direction taken or which should be taken to legislatively accomplish decided goals. The Assistant cooperates in response to requests, with legislative staff attorneys and executive directors of legislative committees for presentations at committee hearings on issues of judicial significance. She works closely with the Senate Caucus Secretary to ensure and enable swift confirmation of gubernatorial appointments to the bench. The Assistant also compiles legislative reports to the Court Administrator and key staff personnel. In 1978, with the approval of the Court Administrator, the legislative assistant commenced providing direct liaison services to the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges, by making legislative reports available to the leadership of that organization. In addition, in 1978, the Special Assistant was given the responsibility to monitor court-related press releases and news and offered advice to appellate and trial court judges on media approach and contact.

Judicial Education

In 1978, the Pennsylvania College of the Judiciary, under a \$130,000 grant from the Governor's Justice Commission, expanded its educational programs in cooperation with the Judicial Education Committee of the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges. For the first time in its history, the Pennsylvania College of the Judiciary offered programs to Juvenile Court Probation Officers, Juvenile Court Masters, and Domestic Relations Officers.

In 1978, the College conducted an orientation program for newly elected and appointed trial judges. It also conducted a domestic relations training program for family court judges and domestic relations officers in cooperation with DRAP, a President Judge/Court Administrator Conference in conjunction with the Pennsylvania Council of Trial Court Administrators, and an Orphans' Court Seminar held in cooperation with the Orphans' Court Section. The Administrative Office and Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges also provided an educational program at the Annual Meeting of the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges. In addition to in-state training programs provided for trial judges, the Administrative Office also administers funds on a selected basis for attendance of trial judges to regular, graduate and special courses conducted by the National Judicial College at Reno, Nevada, for the purpose of broadening the scope of learning achievements for trial judges. Perhaps the most significant achievement of the College was realized in its three-pronged refresher courses held at Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Carlisle, Pa. These courses achieved a total attendance of 90% of all trial judges. It is acknowledged that credit for this dramatic success must be given to the president judges who encouraged and made possible the attendance of their judges and to the judges and other faculty for their dedicated preparation and their presentations at the many sessions held.

The Pennsylvania College of the Judiciary, established during this administration, is designed to operate as a clearinghouse for the judiciary in the dissemination of judicial education material to meet new laws and court decisions. The College provides as part of its programs,

training manuals which are available to trial court judges, court administrators and other court-related personnel. The faculty for the Pennsylvania Conference of the Judiciary is drawn primarily from experienced jurists in the state, plus administrators, attorneys, and educators.

Domestic Relations Task Force

Based on a recommendation made at the Domestic Relations Training Program in June, 1978, the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania appointed a Domestic Relations Task Force on July 13, 1978. The goal of the Task Force was to come up with recommendations whereby statewide standards could be established for the management of the Domestic Relations Sections and Divisions. The Task Force was expected to make a study of the various procedures that are now being used in different counties noting any differences. The report of the Task Force was to include how different procedures function and to what extent they are effective, efficient, modern and acceptable to authorities and persons involved as litigants or otherwise. It was felt that the refining and standardization of procedures would lead to the equalization of justice, equality of treatment and improvement in the impact that caseloads have in different counties on the use of judge time. A principle concern would be the reduction of judge time in managing domestic relations caseloads to the extent that the committee feels that the appropriate ends of justice will not be jeopardized or diminished. It was also hoped that the Task Force would address and report on the content and potential impact of provisions in the new Judicial Code. Membership on the Task Force represents a broad spectrum of persons in family law activities such as domestic relations officers, judges and attorneys. Since its appointment, members of the Task Force have met on a regular basis and have adopted the following reports:

Jurisdiction of Family Divisions, Amendments to the Judicial Code, a draft of the Cooperative Agreement under the Child Support Enforcement Program, and the Administration of Family Courts.

When the work of the Task Force is completed, it is expected that a complete report will be filed with the Court Administrator encompassing the above.

Court Reimbursement

Since 1971, the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania has been designated in Appropriation Acts of the General Assembly as the administrator of the court reimbursement program under which counties are reimbursed by the State for certain direct costs incurred in the administration and operation of county courts as reported in the counties' annual financial reports.

The Court Administrator of Pennsylvania is responsible for making the allocations and payments to the counties and to exclude all costs

which are not properly reported or included in the legislative categories to be funded.

Since 1971, the amount of appropriations has significantly increased for reimbursement purposes, although the total granted in any year has never been sufficient to cover all of the direct costs incurred by counties for court costs. Commencing in 1974, costs incurred by counties for resident appellate court judges and their court facilities have been paid from this appropriation.

The Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts has requested the General Assembly to increase the amount of reimbursement to cover the total amount of direct costs incurred by counties for the judicial systems.





REPORTS OF SUPREME COURT COMMITTEES AND RELATED COURT AGENCIES

CIVIL PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE

The adoption of the Judicial Code and its companion act, the Judiciary Act Repealer Act (JARA), both of which became generally effective on June 27, 1978, was one of the most important developments during the year, resulting in substantial increases in the volume of the Committee's work. Approximately six thousand sections of Purdon's Statutes, now scattered through various titles, have been affected by the Code. Many, dealing with practice and procedure, have been repealed. Others have been substantially reenacted into the Code but with their former procedural provisions omitted, leaving implementation to the rule-making power of the Supreme Court. JARA contemplates that this task is to be concluded by June 27, 1980, but provides a "fail safe" provision continuing prior practice under a repealed statute until suspended or governed by rule.

The Committee has in preparation rules governing procedure in declaratory judgments, compulsory arbitration, support, custody, service on nonresident individuals, associations, partnerships and corporations, appeals from administrative agencies, confession of judgment, judgment liens and revival, deficiency judgments, partition of personal and real property, tax and municipal claim procedures, and trial and post-trial practice. All of these subjects and many others have been affected in one way or another by the Judicial Code and JARA and will require either new rules or amendments to existing rules.

Technical amendments conforming the language of Definition Rule 76 and other

rules to the definitions of "general rule" and "local rule" as used in the Judicial Code became effective December 2, 1978.

The Rules of Civil Procedure governing Depositions and Discovery were completely amended and promulgated by the Court on November 20, 1978, to become effective April 16, 1979. For a detailed explanatory comment of the Committee, see 8 Pennsylvania Bulletin 3539 (December 16, 1978).

The Court also promulgated on November 20, 1978, effective April 16, 1979, new Rule of Civil Procedure 238 providing for the award of damages for delay in the disposition of actions for bodily injury, death or property damage. The defendant may avoid the imposition of damages by making a written offer of settlement. If the plaintiff does not accept the offer and fails to recover, exclusive of damages for delay, more than 125 percent of the offer, no damages will be awarded for the period after the date of the offer. The Committee's explanatory comment was published in 8 Pennsylvania Bulletin 2668 (September 30, 1978). Note: This rule is being attacked in litigation now pending.

Other recommendations circulated during the past year for changes in civil procedure were Recommendations Nos. 46 and 47. Recommendation No. 47, amending Ejectment Rules 1055 and 1056, Divorce Rule 1124(c) and Assumpsit Rule 1026, was promulgated by the Court on March 12, 1979. The proposed amendments and explanatory comments were published December 9, 1978 at 8 Pennsylvania Bulletin 3483.

Recommendation No. 46, published in 8 Pennsylvania Bulletin 3414 (December 2,

1978), proposing amendments to the Rules of Civil Procedure governing individual nonresidents, unincorporated associations, partnerships and corporations, evoked helpful comments and is being readied for presentation to the Court.

During the course of the year, the Committee continued to act as a clearing house for numerous suggestions for amendment submitted by members of the bench and bar and answered countless inquiries concerning the Rules of Civil Procedure from local courts and counsel and from courts and lawyers in sister states.

CRIMINAL PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE

The past year proved to be another active one for the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee as the Committee continued to carry out its assignment: advising and assisting the Supreme Court in carrying out the Court's constitutional mandate to prescribe general rules governing criminal practice and procedure with regard to all courts including district justice courts in the Commonwealth. Through its members. staff and subcommittees, the Committee continued as an advisory body making a wide variety of recommendations to the Court concerning suggested needs for criminal procedural rules revisions. Moreover, the Committee engaged in broader general studies in specific areas of criminal procedure that may warrant recommendations for future revision, and engaged as well in daily communication with individuals and groups connected with the criminal justice system.

Meetings, Membership and Staff: As has been its general practice, the Committee continued to meet at intervals of approximately every four to six weeks. Meetings typically last for two to three days. At each meeting a detailed written agenda, extensively researched by the Staff and circulated in advance of the meeting, is considered and discussed. Many of the agenda matters considered by the

Committee in 1978 came to the Committee's attention as a result of communication with interested members of the bench and bar. In this regard, the Committee continues to receive a steady flow of such communications, articulating perceived difficulties with the rules and containing suggestions for revisions.

In 1978 the full Committee met 15 meeting days. Additionally, extensive one-day subcommittee meetings were held; these related to specific rule areas assigned to various subcommittees. Staff contact meetings with the Chairman occur on a nearly daily basis. The extensive commitment of time on the part of Committee members, and the assistance and determination of Staff Counsel, again deserve the special appreciation of the Committee Chairman.

There were several changes in the Committee's membership during 1978, as three new members were appointed to the Committee early in the year. This brought the Committee's membership up to its largest number (seventeen) to date. Although the Committee has undergone a broad reconstruction in the last several vears it has retained its wide geographical and practical diversity. The membership presently consists of five state court trial judges, four defense attorneys, the head of a public defender association, four district attorneys, a lawyer who is a district justice, a lawyer who is a state legislator and a lawyer who is a law professor.

The Committee's full-time Staff remained intact during 1978, with Mark Lipowicz, Esq., continuing to serve as Secretary/Staff Counsel, and Margaret M. Cardamone, Esq. (who joined the staff at the end of the previous year) continuing in her capacity as Staff Counsel.

Amendments and New Rules of Criminal Procedure: The past year was again an active year for the Committee in terms of recommended amendments to the Rules of Criminal Procedure. Each of the 1978 amendments, in its proposal form, was published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*,

accompanied by a report describing the need for the change and some further background concerning each recommendation and its form. The publication also contained a Committee request for readers' commentaries on the proposed amendments. Included among the 1978 amendments was the promulgation of a new Subchapter (Chapter 200, Part IV, Investigating Grand Juries) containing a series of rules governing the convening and operation of investigating grand juries: The promulgation of these rules represented the first codification of investigating grand jury procedure in Pennsylvania. A brief description of these rules, along with the other 1978 amendments to the Rules of Criminal procedure, follows.

Chapter 200, Part IV, Investigating Grand Juries

Initial set rules (Rules 250 through 266) adopted June 26, 1978, to become effective January 1, 1979. Subsequently, The Investigating Grand Jury Act, Act of November 22, 1978, P.L., No. 271, was enacted on November 22, 1978. By Order dated November 28, 1978, the Supreme Court vacated the effective date of Rules 250 through 266, pending further notice by the Court. By Order datedJanuary 4, 1979, the Supreme Court vacated and superseded its June 26 and November 28 Orders, and promulgated the revised set of rules relating to investigating grand juries.

Included among the major provisions of the new investigating grand jury Subchapter were the following rules, briefly highlighted:

New Rule 253 Composition And Organization of the Investigating Grand Jury

The rule establishes the initial composition of the investigating grand jury at 23 jurors plus 7 alternates. Under the rule, the alternates are present at sessions of the investigating grand jury. The rule also authorizes the substitution of alternate grand jurors when grand jurors are excused for cause. The rule also establishes that the

quorum of the investigating grand jury is 15 grand jurors.

Rule 263 (Disclosure of Testimony Before Investigating Grand Jury)

The rule deals with access to copies of transcripts and access to evidence and reflects the view that certain parties are by law required to receive certain portions of the transcript and that other parties should receive copies in order to carry out their official duties.

Other 1978 Amendments

New Rule 1410—Motion To Modify Sentence (adopted May 22, 1978, effective July 1, 1978)

This new rule established a procedure whereby any challenge to the sentence imposed must be made in the sentencing court in the first instance. Such challenge must be made within ten (10) days after imposition of sentence. Accordingly, the sentencing court is given the first opportunity to modify the sentence or correct any errors in connection with the sentence or its imposition. The detailed *Comment* which accompanies the rule outlines the interaction foreseen between this sentence modification request procedure and the present criminal appeals scheme and time-frame.

Rule 1405—Sentencing Proceeding (amended May 22, 1978, effective July 1, 1978)

The amendment to this rule codifies in rule form the requirement of Commonwealth v. Riggins, 474 Pa. 115, 377 A.2d 140 (1977), that, at the time of sentencing, the judge state on the record, reasons for the sentence imposed. The rule was also amended to require that the judge advise the defendant of the right to file a motion challenging the propriety of the sentence and that only the claims raised in the lower court may be raised on appeal.

Rule 1409—Violation Of Probation Or Parole: Hearing And Disposition (amended May 22, 1978, effective July 1, 1978)

The amendment to the rule requires that, in the event that probation is revoked and sentence is reimposed, the Rule 1405 requirements as to sentence reason articulation are applicable.

Rule 321—Challenge To Guilty Plea (amended May 22, 1978, effective July 1, 1978)

The rule was amended to delete the guilty plea sentence challenge provisions of the rule—the sentence challenge provisions of new Rule 1410 and amended Rule 1405 are also applicable to sentences imposed following a plea of guilty.

Rescission—Subchapter 350—Special Rules For Cases In Which Death Sentence Is Authorized (rescinded April 2, 1978, effective immediately)

This rescinded Subchapter (Rules 351-355) had governed the imposition of the death sentence in jury waiver and guilty plea contexts. These rules were originally promulgated pursuant to the Act of March 26, 1974, P.L. 213, No. 46, as amended by the Act of December 30, 1974, P.L. 1052, No. 345, 18 Pa. C.S. §§1311, 1312, and were rescinded in light of the Supreme Court's decision in *Commonwealth v. Moody*, 476 Pa. 223, 382 A.2d 442 (1977), declaring certain provisions of the Act unconstitutional.

Rule 319—Pleas and Plea Agreements (amended May 22, 1978, effective July 1, 1978)

The addition of a new paragraph (c) to this rule changed prior practice in Pennsylvania by providing that in cases in which the imposition of a sentence of death is not authorized, when a defendant enters a plea of guilty to a charge of murder generally, the judge before whom the plea was entered shall alone determine the degree of guilt. Under prior practice, the judge in this situation could convene a panel of three judges to determine the degree of guilt.

ORPHANS' COURT RULES COMMITTEE

The Committee prepared and will shortly recommend to the Supreme Court amendments to Rules 1 and 10. As an adjunct to Rule 10.1, forms will be recommended to be employed by registers of wills incident to their grant of letters. The proposed recommendations of the Committee were submitted to the Pennsylvania Bulletin and were published in the January 20 edition.

The Committee worked in close cooperation with registers of wills who, at their annual convention held in August, 1978, by formal action, approved the forms as then submitted to them. The Committee has also worked in close cooperation with a committee of the Philadelphia Bar Association.

The Committee remains of the opinion that further thought should be given to the employment of the manpower of our common pleas judges, so that the time of judges who only occasionally deal with questions requiring the expertise of an orphans' court judge is not unduly burdened, and so that those who are competent in orphans' court business will have provided the Supreme Court with their views before the Supreme Court is required to act on cases appealed from an orphans' court division.

MINOR COURT CIVIL PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE

The Committee met at Hershey, Pennsylvania, on April 7, 1978. At this meeting, the Committee considered, among other things, a number of drafts of proposed changes and additions to the Minor Court rules of conduct, office standards, and civil procedure proposed by the Reporter for the Committee. In general these changes involved the following:

(1) Deletion of material in the rules and notes referring to the pre-1970 minor judiciary.

(2) Deletion of comments to the rules, the only function of which was to

explain past changes.

(3) Deletion of statutory references in the rules and the notes to the rules concerning statutes which had been repealed by the Judiciary Act Repealer Act.

- (4) Supplying clarification with respect to those rules as to which experience had shown clarification was necessary.
- (5) Making those changes concerning jurisdictional and substantive matters indicated by the Judicial Code and the Judiciary Act Repealer Act.

As a result of this meeting, sixty-one rules changes were approved by the Committee. These proposed amendments were duly published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin for comment by interested persons. No comments having been received which required redrafting, the amendments were submitted to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania for approval.

During 1978, the Chairman of the Committee and the Reporter attempted to answer a considerable number of inquiries concerning the procedures that might be followed in view of the extensive repeal of statutes in the Judiciary Act Repealer Act to which reference had been made in the rules.

The enactment of the Judiciary Act Repealer Act (JARA) ended a two-year hiatus in the work of the Committee, which had deferred all significant projects awaiting completion of the Judicial Code project. The taking effect of the Judicial Code required several conforming amendments to the text of the Appellate Rules and a virtual rewriting of the tables of statutes suspended and the notes to the Appellate Rules. This work was embodied in the Committee's Recommendation No. 7, which was adopted by the Supreme Court on December 11, 1978.

Since the Appellate Rules are entirely new, the Committee anticipated that a number of clarifications and revisions would be required in light of experience. In December the Committee submitted its Recommendation No. 6 to the Supreme Court, proposing a wide range of revisions and corrections to the Appellate Rules.

At year end the Committee had under study a proposed new Pa. R.A.P. 921 to implement the act of November 26, 1978 (No. 319), which authorizes the defendant or the Commonwealth to petition for allowance of appeal to an appellate court with respect to the discretionary aspects of a sentence in a criminal matter. On January 18, 1979 the proposal was transmitted to the Supreme Court as Recommendation No. 8 of the Committee.

THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON APPELLATE COURT RULES

In March the Supreme Court, with staff assistance from the Committee, amended Pa. R.A.P. 3735 to permit the assignment of non-Commonwealth Court judges to the Commonwealth Court for the purpose of conducting jury trials.

On November 30, 1978 the Supreme Court adopted the Committee's Recommendation No. 4 relating to the subject of interlocutory appeals as of right.

JUDICIAL INQUIRY AND REVIEW BOARD

Reports and Recommendations have been filed with the Supreme Court in seven cases involving three judges (two Reports involving one judge) and three district justices. One judge was suspended pending termination of criminal proceedings. He has been tried and found guilty but appellate proceedings are pending.

^{*}The seventeen (17) Non Judicial complaints received were reviewed and rejected as being against persons or agencies not subject to the Board's jurisdiction.

The number of complaints received uring the reporting period has increased by approximately one-third. Although we do not yet have the figures from other states, based on last year's report to the American Judicature Society, our case load is exceeded only by New York.

Despite the increased volume we have been able to substantially reduce our backlog. Of the 30 cases remaining from the 1977 backlog of 111 cases, ten complaints are awaiting disposition of Reports and Recommendations filed with the Supreme Court and eight are awaiting outcome of criminal proceedings. Of the 298 complaints received during this reporting period, only 50 remain open.

The sources of complaints received during 1978 and accepted for investigation are as follows:

Disciplinary proceedings resulted in the filing with the Supreme Court of seven Reports and Recommendations during the current year. Two involving one judge were dismissed on the Board's recommendation. the Board vote being four for censure and four for dismissal. The Supreme Court approved the Board's recommendation for censure in one case. One judge who pleaded nolo contendere to criminal charges connected with record keeping of traffic offenses was suspended for seven months in addition to the eleven (11) month suspension involved pending conclusion of the criminal proceedings. Three cases are awaiting Supreme Court decisions. Briefs were filed and answered in two cases; oral argument was presented before the Board in two cases, and oral argument presented before the Supreme Court in one case.

The judges' duties and responsibilities with respect to criminal contempt is in issue in two of the open cases and was in issue in one of the dismissed cases. The Board has always taken the position that the legality of the contempt proceeding is not the concern of a disciplinary body.

The Sixth National Conference for Judicial Conduct Organizations sponsored by the American Judicature Society was held in Phoenix, Arizona on November 8-11, 1978. Richard E. McDevitt, Esquire, our Executive Director, is active on the Advisory Committee. He was a faculty member and participated in the program of the Conference as Moderator of the panel discussion on "Confidentiality and Public's Right to Know."

COMMITTEE FOR PROPOSED STANDARD JURY INSTRUCTIONS

The 1978 Report of the activities of the Proposed Standard Jury Instructions Committee includes the following work of subcommittees:

Civil -Instructions Subcommittee. This Subcommittee met on March 19, 1978, and approved an amended instruction on contributory negligence (bearing in mind the Comparative Negligence Act), an amended note to the comparative negligence instruction, two amended instructions on concurring cases, amended note on the negative instruction on intervening or superseding cause, an amended instruction on circumstantial proof of negligence, two amended instructions on informed consent, instructions on fraudulent misrepresentation or nondisclosure and damages therefor, and instructions on intentional interference with contractual relations and the damages for that tort. During the remainder of the year, the Subcommittee considered a number of other proposed changes to the instructions as originally written, particularly those dealing with comparative negligence and legal cause, but these matters were not resolved. Also during the year, the Pennsylvania Supreme and Superior Courts handed down a considerable number of opinions which are being considered by the Committee.

Although this Subcommittee held no formal meeting during 1978, it was particularly active during that year in considering correspondence from the Reporter Staff suggesting changes in the criminal instructions made necessary by the large number of amendments to the Crimes Code passed by the General Assembly. There were ten of these, some requiring major changes or additions to the criminal instruction. With some modification, the draft instructions incorporating these new statutes were approved by the Criminal Instructions Subcommittee.

THE JUDICIAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Judicial Planning Committee of Pennsylvania was appointed by Chief Justice Michael J. Eagen on May 4, 1977, as authorized by Article V, Section 10(a) of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and Section 203 of the U.S. Congress Crime Control Act of 1976.

The Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts serves as Secretariat for the Judicial Planning Committee. The Committee has conducted extensive surveys of judges and other court-related personnel of Pennsylvania's Unified Judicial System and, based on these surveys and statewide conferences of judicial personnel, the Committee has developed annual judicial action plans for 1978 and 1979. The three programs included under this plan are: the Analysis of Court Practices and the Determination of Standards; Courts Management and Administrative Services; and Court Education Programs. These programs have been implemented by the Unified Judicial System utilizing state, local and, in some cases, federal funds.

THE LAWYERS' DISCIPLINARY BOARD

During 1978 there were 1,893 complaints received and 1,874 were disposed of by a number of types of dispositions such as dismissals, informal admonitions, private reprimands, or imposition of public discipline (i.e. public censure, suspension or disbarment). As of December 31, 1978 there was a total of 690 active complaints on hand requiring further action. New complaints averaging around 158 in number continue to be received each month.

The total number of attorneys registered to the end of December 1978 was 25,295, as compared to 23,834 attorneys for the year 1977—an increase of 1,461 attorneys. With this increase in the number of attorneys competing for the legal services required by the public and the increasing consumer protection attitudes prevalent in the land, the Board does not feel it is unrealistic to predict that the number of disciplinary complaints will increase rather than decrease in future years.

The preceding tabulation presents a summary of disciplinary actions for the various periods indicated.

In addition to the above a total of 5 disciplinary matters prosecuted were dismissed after hearing and review by the Board in 1978, for a cumulative total of 37 dismissed after hearing and review by the Board.

On December 31, 1978, there were 77 cases in various stages of formal proceedings which had not finally been determined and an additional 19 matters where formal prosecution of charges was determined necessary, but on which filing of petitions for discipline were pending.

The statistics presented above, however, do not present the complete story.

To cope with this volume of complaints and formal proceedings, it has been necessary to increase staff since the inception of the Board. Initially the staff consisted of a Chief Disciplinary Counsel and five Assistant Disciplinary Counsel, a Secretary of the Board, two Investigators and six secretaries in four office locations. Over the years an additional five Assistant Disciplinary Counsel, four Investigators and six secretaries have been added to staff. Salaries of staff plus benefits amount to approximately 70% of our operating expense. Operating expenditures to fund these changes have increased from an initial first full year figure of \$383,263 (FY 1974) to the current year's (FY 1979) estimated \$843.910. The annual assessment increased from \$25.00 to \$35.00 for FY 1975. Beginning with the Fiscal Year July 1, 1977, the annual assessment was increased to \$45.00.

As in previous years there is a tremendous amount of service performed voluntarily by the lawyers in the disciplinary system.

The Disciplinary Board is cognizant of the duties and obligations it has to the public and the legal profession alike.

During the year a great effort has been expended in reviewing the Pennsylvania Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement and the Disciplinary Board Rules under which we operate. Notice of proposed revisions has been given by publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and directly to key bar associations seeking comments on them. After review of comments received, a final draft recommending adoption of the proposed revisions will be submitted in the near future for consideration by the Supreme Court.

PENNSYLVANIA BOARD OF LAW EXAMINERS

On November 5, 1978, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania entered an Order amending rule 204 of the Pennsylvania Bar Admission Rules relating to admission of domestic attorneys on Motion, which added Paragraph (2) (v), which permits the Board to satisfy the five-year service requirement by serving as an attorney "on the legal staff of a business or non-profit association or entity regularly doing business in this Commonwealth and at least one other state."

During 1978, the Board conducted two examinations of two days each, one day being a Multi-State Examination and the other the Essay Examination. For the February, 1978 Bar Examination, 458 applicants sat and 358 passed, being 78.17% of whose who took the examinations. For the July, 1978 Bar Examination, 1903 applicants sat and 1697 passed, or 89.17% of those who took the Examination.

During 1978, the Board granted the applications of 67 out-of-state attorneys for admission to the Bar on motion.

During the year the Board continued its practice of holding meetings after each Bar examination with representatives of the six Pennsylvania law schools and the Bar's examining staff to review the essay questions, model answers and the grading methods applied to 25 examination papers picked at random. The Board has found this type of review and discussion with representatives of the law schools extremely helpful to the Bar examination process. The representatives of the law school have also found their experience valuable to them and they realize that the Board adopts many of their suggestions.

During the year there were 9 appeals to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court from the decision of the Board under Rule 203 denying applicants from unaccredited law schools the right to sit for the Bar Examination. Of these appeals one was granted, seven were denied by the Supreme Court, and one appeal was discontinued.

During the year there were three appeals to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court from the decision of the Board under Rule 205, in which the Board found that the applicants did not meet the equivalency requirements. The Supreme Court denied all three of these appeals.

During the year there was one appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court from the decision of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court affirming the decision of the Board of Law Examiners, in which an applicant from an unaccredited law school was denied the right to sit for the Bar Examination. This appeal was dismissed by the U.S. Supreme Court.

During the year another applicant who graduated from an unaccredited law school was denied the right to sit for the Bar Examination by the Board of Law Examiners. His appeal to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court was denied. This case is now on appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

During the year the Board held a hearing in the case of an applicant from an unaccredited law school and filed its decision denying the applicant the right to sit for the Bar Examination. No appeal from the Board's decision was filed to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

During the year the Board held a hearing on the application of an out-of-state attorney for admission on Motion and the Board denied the application. The applicant has recently appealed to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

JUVENILE COURT JUDGES' COMMISSION

The Juvenile Court Judges' Commission's Handbook for Juvenile Court Judges and Probation Departments was revised in 1978, and the revision was printed and distributed to Judges, Probation Officers and interested parties throughout the State.

Also in 1978, a new book, entitled the Juvenile Court Directory, was prepared; this book was printed and distributed to Juvenile Court Judges, probation officers, district attorneys, public defenders, and other interested parties. It contains a section on the Juvenile Court in each of the Judicial Districts, a section on related organizations and agencies, and a section on residential placement for juveniles.

The Commission collected statistical data on dispositions of juveniles from all 67 counties in 1978, and a 1978 report is in print and available for all interested parties.

Evaluations of 51 of Pennsylvania's Juvenile Probation Offices were conducted during 1978. These evaluations resulted in a series of recommendations for each office, in order to enable them to function in greater compliance with standards developed by the Commission.

The Commission distributed 61 grants totalling \$1,452,000 to 61 counties around the Commonwealth to enable them to improve and develop their juvenile probation services.

Fifteen training sessions on a variety of topics such as family counseling, foster home development, juvenile law, youth advocacy, and other related topics throughout the year were sponsored by the Commission. There were 359 juvenile probation officers attending these various training sessions.

The Commission developed its Newsletter from a semi-monthly to a monthly publication. This Newsletter is distributed to over 700 persons across the Commonwealth.

Major legislative activities in 1978 revolved around proposed legislation in four separate areas. Considerable time was spent representing the Commission through active participation with legislators and staff concerning: (1) legislation which would have provided reimbursement for court-operated programs for youth; (2) legislation which would have established that a group home for dependent children is a residential use of property, thus exempt from the jurisdiction of local zoning boards; (3) legislation governing criminal history record information and providing for the expunction of juvenile records under certain conditions; and (4) legislation restructuring the Department of Justice, establishing the Office of the elected Attorney General, and transferring the Commission to the Office of Attorney

General. In addition, other legislation which was introduced pertaining to juveniles was reviewed and analyzed and, where appropriate, contact was made with legislators and staff in an effort to impact the movement of the bill.

A synopsis and analysis of the codification of the Juvenile Act was prepared. This analysis and copies of the restructured Act were provided to Juvenile Court Judges and Chief Juvenile Probation Officers. In addition, a training session was conducted for Chief Juvenile Probation Officers on this matter.

A comprehensive analysis of the IJA/ABA Juvenile Justice Standards was completed, as was a formal position paper representing the views of the Commission in this matter. As a result of this work and contact with staff of the ABA, the Commission Chairman was invited to attend the ABA mid-winter meeting, where the Standards were considered for adoption by the ABA.

A concept paper and resultant grant-inaid application was prepared in an effort to standardize the basic forms being utilized by the Juvenile Courts in the Commonwealth.

PART IV

COURTS OF COMMON PLEAS JUDICIAL CASE VOLUME

COMMENT ON STATISTICS

"Nothing is good or bad but by comparison."

Thomas Fuller.

The quote which precedes this comment may be a reasonable one to bear in mind when reviewing the many tables which follow in this report. Unfortunately, the nature of the county court systems, with their many influencing factors, such as their economic, social, political and physical environments make it difficult to decide on a standard for comparison. For example, if two 2-judge counties are compared, having similar characteristics, but one having a year-end inventory three times the size of the other, is this county proportionately less efficient? The tables presented in this report merely provide a means for comparing the levels of the most visible activities within the courts: filings and dispositions. It may be reasonable to assume that a district which averages 200 cases per judge is busier than a district which averages 50 cases per judge, but is it four times busier or more, or less? For example, for the past several years, the AOPC has been involved in an ongoing study of county caseloads. The method of analysis is a technique called Delphi which is a means of developing quantitative measurements of the subject under consideration where no such measurements previously existed. Using these measurements along with year-end common pleas disposition and inventory figures, a number was calculated which provided a possible indication of activity levels on a per judge basis. The measurements were designed to account for some of the inherent

differences in each type of disposition. In this way, some level of standardization was achieved and each county was ranked according to its per-judge activity level. This ranking provides the AOPC with a limited means of assessing one county's performance relative to that of another county. By comparing the disposition and inventory levels simultaneously, it is possible to draw some reasonable conclusions about some counties. Where one county ranks first (highest) in perjudge dispositions and last (lowest) in per-judge inventories, then it is safe to assume that this county is busier than another county which ranks last in per-judge dispositions and first in per-judge inventories. Though such an actual situation may not exist, there are some parallels to it which enable such a conclusion to be reached.

In situations as extreme as the one cited above, comparisons are fairly clear-cut. But in reality, things are not always this simple. Differences in numbers are simply means of opening doors to inquiring why these differences exist. The monthly county reports which form the bases for the AOPC Annual Report provide statistics on only two stages: filing and disposition. With the utilization of data processing equipment, perhaps more information can be added to the reports which we receive and permit a comparison which differentiates good from bad.

DATA ANALYSIS

The number of new cases filed in the Courts of Common Pleas in 1978 was 296,033. This is an increase of 7,155 cases or 2.47 percent. Case

filings in 1978 were 1,039 per authorized judgeship. Common Pleas dispositions totaled 287,207 for an increase of 5,696 cases (2.02 percent). This represents an average of 1,007 cases per Common Pleas judge. The pending

Common Pleas inventory was 101,315 which is an increase of 4,698 cases. This inventory represents 355 cases per judge.

The following table shows how case volumes have changed over the past five years.*

The volume of filings indicates a distribution of cases similar to the previous four years. Criminal and domestic relations cases rank first and second in filings with the latter being very nearly equal to the former. Domestic relations dispositions did, in fact, exceed criminal dispositions. Divorce was the third highest area of activity.

The total Common Pleas figures for filings and inventory are the highest recorded since the start of the reporting system. Filings increased by a greater absolute number than dispositions, which would provide a rational explanation for the 4,700 case increase in inventory. The biggest

relative increases in filings were custody cases (+29.92%) and miscellaneous (24.21%); however, the largest absolute increase was in the domestic relations area (+5,266 cases or 10.34%). This accounted for 73.59% of the increase in total Common Pleas filings.

Both custody and miscellaneous cases provided the highest relative increases in dispositions (32.86% and 25.53%, respectively). However, the domestic relations increase of 4,785 dispositions compensated for the six categories of cases which decreased in dispositions. The total increase in dispositions was 5,696 cases.

Criminal Case Volume Common Pleas court criminal case filings decreased for the third consecutive year (4.3% less than 1977 figures), while dispositions also decreased. It was the second consecutive decrease in dispositions (7.27% less than 1977 figures). The steeper decline in dispositions resulted in an increase in inventory of 7.77% (approximately 1,800 cases more than 1977). With the exception of "other-dispositions, all categories decreased. Jury waivers decreased by nearly 1,300 cases, or 21%. As more counties begin to use

informations rather than the indicting grand jury, the grand jury dismissals decreased (the only increase recorded was for the "other" disposition category, and it was significant) for the third consecutive year. Cases disposed due to the 180-day rule also decreased by 7%. The increase of 60.07% in other dispositions was caused mainly by a May report from Allegheny County which dismissed 1,275 cases via Rule 1901. The five-year disposition breakdown is as follows:

Civil Case Volume Both civil filings and dispositions recorded decreases in volume for 1978 (-4.82% and -5.07% respectively). This resulted in a slight increase in inventory (1.69%). The following table provides a five-year breakdown of civil case dispositions. The large decrease in settlements after hearings was offset by the increases in non-jury trials and

settlements before hearings. An even larger decrease was recorded with "other" dispositions which dropped by 69.55%. This abrupt decline is probably the result of a considerably larger-than-normal volume of "other" dispositions in 1977 due to statewide field audits. The "settlement" disposition reached its highest figure in the past six years.

Domestic Relations The area of domestic relations typically represents one of the most active common pleas categories in terms of filings and dispositions. For the past six years, domestic relations filings have been the second most active category behind criminal. The same can be said about dispositions through 1977. In 1978, domestic relations dispositions exceeded criminal dispositions. In 1978, domestic relations accounted for 18.96% of all common pleas filings and 19.12% of all common pleas dispositions. Its inventory was 8.71% of total.

Caseload Projections For the past two years, the Administrative Office has attempted to get a handle on the nature of criminal and civil caseloads which the courts may be called on to adjudicate in the future. These projections are made for five-year periods on criminal and civil filings. Projections were initially made on dispositions in 1976 and due to the relative consistency of the judges, these were fairly accurate. However, since filings present a more representative picture of the potential caseload, the projections focused on these. Due to the many factors which influence the crime rate and civil case rate, the accuracy of these projections was suspect in some cases and outright

unreliable in others. However, there were some instances in which the projections were fairly accurate. Whether or not this is a coincidence, cannot be determined at this point, but as more data become available, it is hoped that these projections will become invaluable tools in the administration of each county's court operations.

Criminal Projections Since some errors were positive and some were negative, it was decided to use the absolute values (ignoring the plus and minus signs) of each percentage error to calculate an average. This is done for the civilerrors also. The average criminal percentage error was 41.3349%. There were 11 underestimates averaging 20.4955% error and 56 overestimates averaging 45.4284%. The best projections were for Adams County (0.61% error), Tioga County (2.27%), Clearfield (-3.9%), Washington (4.79%), Bedford (4.83%), and Armstrong (5.03%). The worst projections were for Westmoreland (72.29%), Warren Crawford (77.37%),Columbia (83.33%)(85.71%), Carbon (87.7%), Forest (91.67%), Greene (97.89%), Beaver (93.08%), Indiana (105.5%), Clarion (108.76%), Pike (105.71%) and Perry (122.5%).

Civil Projections The average civil projection error was 41,3727% (practically equal to criminal). there were 34 underestimates averaging 22.5785% error and 33 overestimates averaging 60.7364% error. The best projections were: Washington (-1.6% error), Bradford (-1.63%), Lycoming (-1.28%), Jefferson (-3.57%), Blair (-4.87%), Wayne (-3.39%), and Northumberland (-4.76%). The worst projections were Perry (71.79%), Forest (84.21%), Luzerne (103.63%), Sullivan (120.0%), Lawrence (140.58%), Fayette (134.9%), Snyder (228.57%), and Cameron (500%). Some of these large percentages may lead one to reject the projections completely.

However, the yearly civil caseload of some of these counties is so small, that even the slightest deviation from the average can cause an enormous error. For example, the 500% error for Cameron County was the result of a 10 case overestimate. The Sullivan County error was the result of a six case overestimate. If these two counties are excluded from the civil projection errors, the average overestimate error drops from 60.7364% to 44.6548% and the total error drops from 41.3727% to 33.1072%.

Hopefully, the extra data from this year's activities will prove to be a stabilizing force on

these projections.

Status of Undisposed Criminal Cases In 1977, there were 23,511 cases pending at the end of the year. The corresponding figure for 1978 is 25,339. This is an increase of 1,828 cases or 7.77 percent. The volume of pending cases is represented by three stages: pending informations, pending trial and pending sentence. In lieu of informations, some

counties' inventories include pending indictments by a grand jury. In 1978, there were 19 counties reporting dispositions via the grand jury. However, most of these counties have since abolished it.

The following table shows a statewide threeyear comparison:

Consistency In Volume of Common Pleas Cases 1973-1978 The following tables provide some indication of how filings, dispositions and inventories vary for the past six years.

In the new cases category, criminal, juvenile and domestic relations show a wide range of volumes (maximum-minimum) while showing relatively large standard deviations*. As is evident from the dates recorded next to the maximum and minimum values, some peaks occurred several years ago while the valleys were recorded in 1977-1978. While it is true that total caseloads are consistently increasing from year to year, this is not true for all individual common pleas categories.

The same wide ranges were found for criminal, juvenile and domestic relations categories for dispositions. Some categories display a tendency toward "tightness." For example, arbitration dispositions have varied by about 2,200 cases with a standard deviation of 733 while averaging close to 29,000 cases per year. Civil and Orphans' Court cases show similar tendencies. For the six-year period, the minimum was 1973 while the maximum was in 1976.

There are no inventory variations in the magnitude of new cases and dispositions.

However, the largest ranges were recorded for divorce, criminal, civil, and arbitration. Divorce also had the largest standard deviation figure.

In most instances, the mean and median figures are relatively close. This indicates that the observations (yearly figures) are fairly close with no significant outliers.

*Standard deviation is a statistical term used to describe the variation (or lack thereof) of each observation around the average. According to the theories surrounding classical statistics, approximately 68% of all the observations in a distribution will be within plus or minus one standard deviation from the mean. Since each distribution is so small (6 observations per category), a realization of this heuristic may seldom occur. However, if this were an ideal situation, the theory would mean that 68% of all criminal inventory figures (for example) would lie within the interval 23,795 and 27,465. These figures are derived by first subtracting the standard deviation figure from the mean to arrive at the first figure and adding the standard deviation figure to the mean to arrive at the second figure.



PART V

PHILADELPHIA MUNICIPAL COURT JUDICIAL CASE VOLUME

In order to achieve a greater uniformity of presentation for this report, Philadelphia Municipal Court statistics have been kept totally distinct from Common Pleas statistics, including trial cases.

Criminal Trial Cases Defendant records received decreased for the third consecutive year while dispositions reached their lowest level since 1974. The decrease in the latter was quite severe which accounts for the significant increase in inventory (1,648 cases or 42.7 percent). Although Guilty Pleas recorded a 517 case increase, this was offset by nol prosses (—549) and A.R.D.'s (—1382). The number of defendants admitted to the A.R.D. program was the lowest in the five-year comparison period.

The inventory figure is the highest by nearly 1,000 cases over the next highest reporting period, 1974. In apparent contradiction to the drop in dispositions and the increase in inventory, judge days increased by 132 days, while visiting judges recorded 475 days (no visiting judge days were recorded in 1977). This type of irregularity appears to be characteristic of statistical trends shown in the Philadelphia Municipal Court. In 1975, defendant records received increased by over 3.100 cases while dispositions decreased by 1,100 cases. Despite this, inventory decreased by over 300 cases. In 1977, records received decreased by 700 cases while dispositions decreased by 1,500 cases. Inventory increased by about 160 cases. Judge days had increased by 217 days. However in

1978, judge days increased by 132 days while dispositions continued to drop (by 1.702 cases).

The Municipal Court of Philadelphia is a court of record with limited jurisdiction over actions at law. There is no right to jury trial in this court but parties have a right on appeal to a trial de novo in the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia including, where applicable, the right to a trial by jury. Municipal Court judges preside at arraignments and preliminary hearings and issue warrants in criminal cases. The court also has jurisdiction over trials of summary criminal offenses (except summary traffic offenses) and of other criminal offenses where the allowable prison term is not more than five years. In civil matters, the court has jurisdiction over all matters arising under the Landlord and Tenant Act and over most other civil actions where the claim does not exceed \$1,000. The Common Pleas Court has concurrent jurisdiction with the Municipal Court over all summary offenses and civil matters.

Civil Cases Both Code Enforcement and Landlord/Tenant proceedings recorded slight increases in activity over 1977. In both areas, dispositions increased by a greater percentage than filings causing inventories to decline. In Small Claims, activities declined. However, dispositions declined by a smaller percentage than filings, thus bringing about an inventory drop. It

was the third consecutive drop in inventory following a 100 percent increase in 1975.

The number of private criminal cases increased for the fourth consecutive year. Dispositions matched filings, thus leaving a zero inventory.

The number of cases presented for preliminary hearings declined for the fourth consecutive year, as did dispositions. The 1978 filings and dispositions were practically equal, so little change resulted in inventory.

In summary, Municipal Court activity on the whole appears to be decreasing, or at least levelling off. Criminal trial case filings have decreased for the third consecutive year, small claims recorded a dramatic drop, code enforcement has been fairly stable for the past four years, preliminary hearings declined for the fourth year in a row and, although private criminal cases are rising steadily, dispositions have always matched these, and a zero inventory was maintained. With the exception of criminal trial cases, Municipal Court judges have usually kept abreast of their caseloads with a few exceptions (Small Claims, 1975; Code Enforcement, 1977). Criminal trial case dispositions decreased sharply, despite an increase in judge days. This caused a large increase in inventory, possibly prompted by the large decrease in defendants admitted to the A.R.D. program.

PART VI

DISTRICT JUSTICE COURTS

JUDICIAL CASE VOLUME

The Pennsylvania District Justice Courts process the largest number of cases in the state with the exception of Pittsburgh Magistrates Courts and Philadelphia Traffic Courts. These special courts have the greatest interaction with the public, due to the scope of their jurisdiction. These are the courts that most directly impact the general population which adds to the importance of their performance and judicial image.

The District Justice is a judicial official who presides over certain civil, criminal and summary cases and is responsible for administration of the District Justice Office.*

Pennsylvania's District Justices have extensive criminal and civil jurisdiction. They have complete criminal jurisdiction over summary offenses, which are punishable by not more than a \$300 fine and/or a jail sentence not exceeding 90 days. Moreover, they have recently been granted jurisdiction to accept guilty pleas for many misdemeanors of the third degree, provided the misdemeanor is not the result of a reduced charge and personal injury and property damages are less than \$100. They have the power to decide most civil claims where the amount does not exceed \$2,000, exclusive of interest and costs. In addition, they have jurisdiction for

landlord/tenant matters. District Justices also preside over preliminary arraignments, fix and accept bail, issue warrants and conduct preliminary hearings.

This year, for the first time, arrest warrant statistics were compiled. This was a result of a recommendation in the final report of the Constable Task Force appointed by this office (AOPC). It was hoped that by keeping the magistrates better informed of the arrest warrant activity in their offices, they could better control the distribution of warrants by constables and more efficiently and effectively make use of these and other process servers.

Filings For 1978 a total of 1,667,028 cases were filed in District Justice Courts. This is a 1 percent (80,084) increase over the previous year. Comparing total filings for 1978 to those for 1977, an increase of 5 percent is observed. When 1978 and 1975 figures are compared, a small decrease from the base year is noted. The following table presents yearly filings for the 1975-1978 period; also included is a comparison of the present year data to both the previous year data and the base year data of 1975.



Of the total of 1,667,028 cases filed last year: traffic citations represent 64 percent (1,069,492), 14 percent (227,824) were non-traffic citations, summary complaints accounted for 7 percent (11,818), 5 percent (90,338) were made up of misdemeanor/felony cases, and civil complaints (163,556) contributed the final 10 percent. Categorically, the percentages of cases filed in 1978 were equivalent to the filings in 1977, with the exception of a percentage point increase and decrease in the non-traffic and summary complaints categories respectively.

The majority of cases filed in District Court offices were summary cases (which include traffic, non-traffic, and summary criminal complaints). There was an increase of 79,114 filed over the previous year. For the 1975-1978 period, two trends in the data are clear. First, misdemeanor and felony filings have been decreasing each year by an average of 7,286 cases. There is a difference of 21,858 cases filed between 1975 and 1978. The second trend that is apparent is that civil case filings have been increasing each year by an average of 6,638 cases. There were 19,914 more civil cases filed in 1978 than in 1975.

The total statewide caseloads for special courts have been compiled and are presented in the following table.

In 1978, 2,647,722 traffic citations were filed in Pennsylvania. This is a slight increase over the previous year. Of this figure, Philadelphia Traffic Court represents 45.82 percent, while all District Justice Courts

accounted for 40.4 percent. Statewide, 227,824 non-traffic citations and 115,818 summary complaints were filed. In addition, there were 12,196 cases filed in Pittsburgh City Magistrates Courts. Eighty-five percent of misdemeanor/felony complaints were filed in District Justice Courts. These courts were responsible for 99 percent of the civil cases filed. Pittsburgh City Magistrates Courts contributed 15 percent of the misdemeanor/felony cases and 1 percent of the total civil filings.


Case Disposed In 1978, 1,477,922 cases were disposed by District Justice Courts. Due to differences in reporting procedures of disposed cases among the special courts and the limited jurisdiction of certain courts, comparative data in all categories are not available. However, traffic citation data are available.

In 1978, 1,532,999 traffic citations were disposed. District Justice Courts account for 62.23 percent of these cases, while Philadelphia Traffic Court disposed of the remaining 37.77 percent. Thirteen percent of all cases disposed (188,528) were non-traffic citations, a 3 percent increase from 1977. In the area of summary complaints, 4,998 more summary complaint cases were disposed of in 1978 than 1977, or an increase of 6% of all cases disposed. Misdemeanor/felony dispositions decreased by 5 percent from 1977, and represent 5 percent (or 83,897) of total dispositions for 1978. For the fourth consecutive year, civil dispositions increased over the previous year. These dispositions have been increasing by an average of 6,382 cases annually. The increase in 1978 was slightly below the average at 4,212 cases. A total of 158,289 civil cases were processed. When filings and dispositions for 1978 are compared on a statewide basis, 189,106 more cases were filed than disposed. Traffic citations constituted 61.06 percent of the undisposed cases for 1978.

This was the second year that district justices were permitted to accept guilty pleas on certain misdemeanors of the third degree. A statewide total of 3,180 of these cases were disposed by district justices. This is 956 cases more than

were disposed of last year, which was 2,224. The average number of these cases disposed by district justices for 1978 was 5.65; while the average for 1977 was 3.95. Only five counties in the state disposed of more than 100 of these cases: they were Dauphin (539), Chester (340), Lehigh (243), Westmoreland (136), and Allegheny (116). These counties accounted for 43.21 percent of cases within this category.

METHODOLOGY FOR REPORTING DISTRICT JUSTICE CASE VOLUME

Since April of 1974, the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts has been collecting aggregate statistical data from each of the 563 district justice courts within the Commonwealth. Statistics were originally collected on the Report of Proceedings forms (200-74, 201-74, and 202-74 forms). These have been expanded and revised into the present Monthly Statistical report (Form 200/78).

The statistical reports are prepared in district justice offices, by the district justice or staff. The number of cases filed and disposed each day are recorded on a daily worksheet (AOPC Form 200A-70). At the end of each month the total number of cases filed and disposed, are calculated and submitted to the District Justice Statistical Unit in Philadelphia. As data arrive, each report is screened for accuracy and completeness. When a question or problem occurs, a statistical unit staff member contacts the district justice office involved by telephone and resolves the difficulty. All reports originating from this office are based solely on data submitted by district justices. The Administrative Office appreciates the fine cooperation it receives from all the district justices and their personnel by submitting reports in a timely manner and assisting in the resolution of problems.

When all reports are screened and processed, the information is entered into a data processing system. With the use of a computer, data is compiled and case volume is monitored on a county and statewide basis. Periodically, reports concerning the filings and disposition of cases in district justice courts are prepared and distributed to district court administrators and president judges.

The Monthly Statistical Reports are a major component of the Pennsylvania State Judicial Information System (PSJIS). These reports enable the Administrative Office to evaluate the operation of Pennsylvania's judicial systems and are an

important management tool. The reports are intended to provide valuable detailed information concerning caseloads and to identify administrative problems among district justices on a statewide basis. This information can be used to effectively allocate resources within the judiciary and to increase efficienty. In a similar manner, district court administrators, president judges, county commissioners, and district justices have found other significant uses for the statistical data collected.

It is important to note that the Monthly Statistical report is designed to reflect the case volume actually processed through the offices of the 563 district justices. This report is not intended to reflect total office workload and activity, only to provide a record of the filings and disposition of cases and warrants in district justice offices.

The report is designed to cover six categories of actions within the jurisidiction of District Justices; (1) Traffic Citations; (2) Non-Traffic Citations; (3) Summary Complaints; (4) Misdemeanor/Felony Complaints; (5) Civil Complaints; and (6) Arrest Warrants. Each category contains two section, namely, number of actions filed and those disposed. A case is reported as filed when it is officially prsented to the district justice on a citation or complaint.

An adjustment is used to correlate filings and manners of dispositions as follows: to remove, for statistical purposes, multiple citations or complaints which have been disposed at one trial; to remove (for statistical purposes only) cases over six months old; and to remove summary cases filed with a Misdemeanor/Felony offense. If the case is reactivated at a later time, it is added as a new filing and shown disposed on the proper line at time of disposition.

A case is reported as disposed at the conclusion of the case or when adjudication has occurred. The disposition listed under each category vary with each type of offense. Identical disposition categories are used when the magistrate has summary jurisdiction. Disposition of Traffic Citations, Non-Traffic Citations, and

Summary Complaints are as follows: guilty by trial; guilty plea; not guilty by trial; prosecution withdrawn; substantive defect; unable to locate; and other. The following types of dispositions appear in the Misdemeanor/Felony Complaint category: guilty plea (Misdemeanor third degree only), bound to court after preliminary hearing, waiver of preliminary hearing, settlering, prosecution withdrawn, declared fugitive and other. The Civil Complaint disposition types follow: trial, settled at or before trial; judgement by default; dismissed without prejudice; complaint withdrawn; closed - no service; and other. Disposition for arrest warrants include: warrants returned-found: warrants returned-no service; and other.

All categories contain the disposition "other" which records dispositions not otherwise listed on the report. When this disposition is used, a written explanation regarding the case is requested.

The reporting procedure requires that a case be counted as filed during the month in which it is presented to the district justice. Cases which are filed with a district justice while on 24-hour assignment are counted as filed in office of the district justice who will ultimately hear the matter. Reporting practices require that dispositions be reported in the month in which prosecution of the charges cease, and not when fine and costs have been satisfied.
