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#### HIGHLIGHTS

## **ACQUISITIONS**

- 1. Admissions to state supervised adult probation declined for the third "successive year. There were 7,630 known admissions in 1977 but socio/demographic/program data for only 7,065 were reported. The latter figure is reflected in this report. (See Table 1.)
- 2. All Wisconsin counties placed adults under Division of Corrections probation supervision in 1977. Admission caseloads ranged from 2,505 in Milwaukee County to two in Menominee County. (See Table 2.)
- 3. Drug law violations accounted for slightly over one-fifth (22 percent) of the adults placed on probation. (See Table 3.)
- 4. More than one-half of the men and women were placed on probation for less than two years. (See Table 5.)
- 5. Six out of 10 men and 57 percent of women placed under supervision were under 25 years of age. (See Table 6.)
- 6. About four-fifths of the men and three-fifths of the women placed on probation were White. (See Table 7.)
- 7. Nearly three-fifths of the men and one-half of the women were single when placed on probation. (See Table 8.)
- 8. Nearly one-third of the men and 45 percent of the women were unemployed when placed under supervision. (See Table 9.)
- 9. About 10 percent of the men and women had monthly earnings of less than \$200, and nearly one-fourth of them had no reported income when placed on probation. (See Table 10.)

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#### ADULT PROBATION ADMISSIONS IN 1977

Wisconsin's judges may elect to sentence persons convicted of felonies (including murder) and misdemeanors to probation under the supervision of the State Department of Health and Social Services, Division of Corrections. Convicted felons may be placed on probation for not less than one year nor for more than the statutory maximum term of imprisonment for the crime, or for three years, whichever is greater. Misdemeanants may be placed on probation for not more than two years.

Adults from all of Wisconsin's 72 counties were placed under Division of Corrections probation in calendar year 1977. Ten counties (Bayfield, Buffalo, Burnett, Iowa, Juneau, Kewaunee, Lafayette, Marquette, Menominee, and Pepin) did not place any women under supervision. Five counties (Milwaukee, 2,505 cases; Waukesha, 431 cases; Racine, 323 cases; Dane, 276 cases; and Rock, 246 cases) accounted for more than one-half (54 percent) of all admissions.

Eighty-three percent of the persons placed on probation were men.

Offenses for which persons were placed on probation in 1977 have been grouped into five major categories: Offenses against persons, property offenses, drug offenses, sex offenses, and all other offenses. Tables 4 through 11 are arranged so that comparisons may be made among persons in the five major categories in terms of characteristics such as length of sentence, marital status, etc. Because of unreported data, these tables are based on total admissions of 7,009 persons.

#### Type of Disposition

There are three types of disposition possible in a probation case: An imposed and stayed sentence, a withheld sentence, and probation without conviction. An imposed and stayed sentence is one in which the court sentences the individual to a specified period of time in a correctional institution, stays the sentence, and places the individual on probation. If an alleged probation violation then occurs and revocation is recommended

by the probation and parole agent, the person has the right to request an administrative hearing. If, as a result of this hearing the decision to request revocation is upheld, a recommendation for revocation is made to the Secretary of the Department of Health and Social Services. If the Secretary concurs with the recommendation, the revocation becomes effective, and the individual may be sent to a correctional institution to serve the sentence originally imposed. If it is the decision of either the administrative hearing or the Department Secretary that revocation is unwarranted, the person may be reinstated on probation supervision. A person choosing not to exercise the right to an administrative hearing may be sent to a correctional institution to serve the sentence originally imposed by the court. Twenty-six percent of the men and almost one-fifth of the women placed on probation in 1977 received sentences of this type.

A person who receives a withheld sentence and who is found to have violated the terms of probation must be returned to the committing court for sentencing. Fifty-six percent of the men and 70 percent of the women received sentences of this type.

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Probation without conviction is a disposition used when individuals have pleaded guilty to or have been found guilty of violating certain provisions of the Uniform Controlled Substances Act. If the individual had not previously been convicted of any offense covered by provisions of the Act and had not been convicted on drug charges in other states or under Federal statutes, the court may choose to use probation without conviction. If that is the case, the court, without entering a judgment of guilt and with the consent of the individual, defers proceedings and places the person under probation with terms and conditions. If terms and conditions are fulfilled, the court discharges the individual and dismisses proceedings. If terms and conditions are violated, the court may enter a judgment of "guilty" and proceed to sentence under other provisions of the Act. A specific individual may be handled in this manner only one time. In 1977, three-fourths of the men and women involved in drug cases received probation without conviction, and this type of disposition was applied to 15 percent of all probation cases.

#### Period of Probation

Sentences of less than two years were received by 52 percent of the men placed under probation supervision in 1977. Four out of 10 men convicted of crimes against persons or property, 48 percent of those convicted of sex offenses, and 78 percent of those convicted of drug offenses received sentences of less than two years. Fifty-six percent of the women placed on probation received sentences of less than two years. Less than four percent of the men and women placed on probation received sentences of more than five years. (See Table 5.)

#### Age on Admission to Probation

Almost three-fifths (60 percent of the men, 57 percent of the women) placed under supervision were less than 25 years of age. Men in this age bracket accounted for 45 percent of the offenses by men against persons, 65 percent of the property crimes, 76 percent of the drug offenses, and 46 percent of the sex offenses. Women under the age of 25 were convicted of 38 percent of the crimes by women against persons, nearly half of the property offenses, 79 percent of the drug offenses and 70 percent of the sex offenses. Only three percent of the men and women placed on probation were 50 years of age or older. (See Table 6.)

#### Time Employed

Three out of 10 men and 46 percent of women placed under probation supervision in 1977 were reported to be unemployed. About 45 percent of the men and one-fourth of the women were reported as employed full-time. (See Table 9.)

#### Average Income

Nearly one-fourth of the men and women were reported as having had no income at the time of placement. Earnings of less than \$400 per month were reported by 21 percent of the men and 38 percent of the women. (See Table 10.)
