
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

TO THE OKLAHOMA CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMUNITY:

In compliance with Title 74, Section 150.10 of the Oklahoma State Statutes, the Uniform Crime Reporting Division of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation has prepared the 1978 Annual Report, CRIME IN OKLAHOMA, by compiling Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) collected from Oklahoma law enforcement agencies. This report is hereby submitted for your review.

Since UCR data pertains to criminal events of specific geographic areas rather than to agencies' activities or management, it should not be used to evaluate or directly compare one agency to another. UCR data represents only a fraction of the activities and responsibilities encumbent upon today's law enforcement agency.

Oklahoma's Uniform Crime Reporting Program has now been in existence for five years gathering base data for future development of basic crime trend analysis. These statistics are now leading to in-depth examinations of the nature and extent of Oklahoma's criminal activity and the effects upon prevention and deterrence programs.

This publication has been made possible only through the continual cooperation of Oklahoma's law enforcement community, and they are to be highly commended for their efforts.

Law Enforcement Code of Ethics

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INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND

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The UCR Program was conceived, developed and implemented by law enforcement for the express purpose of serving law enforcement as a tool for operational and administrative purposes. Under the auspices of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), the UCR Program was developed in 1930. Prior to that date, no comprehensive system of crime information on a national scale existed. This was, primarily, due to the fact that the criminal statutes varied so greatly from state to state in their use of terminology to define criminal behavior. To overcome this problem, a set of definitions for specific criminal acts was devised. These definitions were developed following an in-depth research effort relative to each of the state criminal statutes extant. It was determined that law enforcement would tabulate the number of criminal acts as defined by the UCR Program as these acts were brought to the attention of law enforcement. Recognizing the problem of coping with mere volume, it was decided that only those criminal acts deemed serious would be counted. It was necessary to define "serious." In this regard, a criminal act is considered serious if it meets a set of criteria; namely, that the act would occur regardless of geographical location; that it would be an offense most likely to be reported to law enforcement; that it would affront the moral sensitivities of our society's rational being; and that it would occur with sufficient frequency so that counting it would be worthwhile statistically.

STATE UCR PROGRAM

During that period of time when UCR was still a concept, it was recognized that the individual states would also need crime information of particular interest to the state but of no great importance to the national view of crime. It was not until the latter part of the 1960's that funds became available for states to consider the development of their own individual reporting systems.

The purpose for a state UCR Program is multifaceted. First, with personnel administering a state program, more direct and meaningful contact with individual contributors is realized. Second, the ability to expand contributorship exists due to state personnel readily available to lend assistance. Third, mandatory participation insures a law enforcement agency will either enhance an already existent records system or will implant one capable of producing the needed data. Fourth, with state personnel reviewing information emanating from law enforcement contributors and this information being checked at the national level, the validity as well as completeness of data is further insured. Fifth, individual state programs can address problems that are unique to the state.

The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation assumed the statewide administration of the UCR Program on September 1, 1973. Since that time, seventeen (17) publications entitled CRIME IN OKLAHOMA have been disseminated. This document is the fifth annual report, presenting statistical information collected and compiled through the year 1978 with a comparative analysis of the years 1976 and 1977.

RATE OF INDEX CRIME

Index crimes in Oklahoma totaled 116,928 for 1978, constituting 4,060.0 offenses per 100,000. This represents an increase in the total number of index crimes of .3% over those reported in 1977.

LARGEST CATEGORY OF INDEX CRIME

Larceny-theft was the largest category of index crime reported in Oklahoma in 1978. There were 60,233 larcenies reported with a property loss of \$15,033,835. The number of larcenies decreased 3.5% over the year 1977. The dollar loss from larceny offenses increased 16.3% from the value stolen in 1977.

RATE OF VIOLENT CRIME

The number of violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery and felonious assault) for the year 1978 increased 12.9% over those reported for 1977.

RATE OF NONVIOLENT CRIME

Nonviolent crimes (breaking and entering, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft) reflect a .7% decrease over 1977.

VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN

Property valued at \$56,343,056 was reported stolen in 1978 as a result of 238 murders, 879 rapes, 2,519 robberies, 36,704 breaking and enterings, 60,233 larcenythefts and 9,969 motor vehicle thefts. Of this amount 35.6% was recovered. The total dollar loss increased by \$9,899,020 or 21.3% when compared to the loss reported during 1977.

NUMBER OF MURDERS

A total of 238 murders were reported in Oklahoma for 1978. The number of reported murders decreased .8% when compared to those reported in 1977.

■NUMBER OF LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED OR ASSAULTED

Seven hundred thirty-one (731) law enforcement officers were assaulted during the year 1978. Assaults on officers showed a 5.4% decrease from the 773 officer assaults reported in 1977. Five (5) officers were killed in the line of duty during 1977 - 3 by felonious acts and 2 by accidental or negligent acts, and six (6) officers were killed in the line of duty during 1978 - 4 by felonious acts and 2 by accidental or negligent acts.

MRATE OF CRIME CLEARANCE

There was a 20.3% clearance rate for all index crimes reported in 1978. The clearance rate for 1977 was 19.6%.

■ARRESTS FOR INDEX CRIMES

A total of 22,793 arrests were made for index crimes constituting 15.5% of all arrests made in 1978.

A total of 146,726 arrests for all offenses were reported in Oklahoma for 1978. This is a numeric decrease of 10,851 or a 6.9% decrease over the year 1977.

Arrests of juveniles amounted to 14.7% of all persons arrested in 1978. This percentage represents the arrest of 21,594 juveniles.

DRUG ABUSE ARRESTS

There were 8,858 reported arrests for drug abuse violations. Of this number 19.3% were of persons under 18 years of age.

Possession of marijuana constituted 69.6% of the total drug abuse arrests while sale of marijuana constituted 14.7%.

■ALCOHOL RELATED ARRESTS

Alcohol related arrests (driving under the influence, liquor laws and drunkenness) constituted 51.7% of the total arrests reported in 1978. This percentage represents the arrest of 72,711 adults and 3,126 juveniles.

RATIO OF LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEES

In 1978 there were 5,661 full time law enforcement employees in the State of Oklahoma. This represents a 3.9% increase over the 5,447 reported in 1977. Oklahoma's 1978 police employee rate was 1.97 employees per 1,000 inhabitants as compared to 1.94 employees per 1,000 in 1977.

POPULATION

The estimated population in Oklahoma for 1978 was 2,880,000 as compared to 2,811,000 for 1977. This represents a 2.5% increase.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY CONTRIBUTORS

The total number of law enforcement agencies contributing to the Uniform Crime Reporting Program in Oklahoma was 296 in 1978. In 1977, 283 agencies reported. This number reflects a 4.6% increase in the total number of contributing agencies.

OKLAHOMA UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM



LEGISLATIVE MANDATE

The 1978 CRIME IN OKLAHOMA presents criminal justice information in terms of offenses known to the police and criminal arrest activity in accordance with guides and regulations prescribed by law.

The Oklahoma Legislature, in establishing the Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) statute, mandated the responsibility and authority for UCR data collection and dissemination to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. The portion of this statute relating to Uniform Crime Reporting is shown below:

SECTION 1. A uniform crime reporting system shall be established under the direction, control and supervision of the Director of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. The Director shall have the power and duty, by such rules and regulation as he may deem necessary, to collect and gather such information from such state, county, city and town law enforcement agencies as may be and is hereinafter prescribed in this act.

SECTION 2. The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation is hereby designated as the agency which shall collect, gather, assemble and collate such information as is prescribed by this act.

SECTION 3. All state, county, city and town law enforcement agencies shall submit a monthly report to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation on forms prescribed by the Bureau; which report shall contain the number and nature of offenses committed within their respective jurisdictions, the disposition of such matters, and such other information as the Bureau may require, respecting information relating to the cause and prevention of crime, recidivism, the rehabilitation of criminals and the proper administration of criminal justice.

SECTION 4. Upon receipt of such information the Director shall have such data collated and formulated and shall compile such statistics as he may deem necessary in order to present a proper classification and analysis of the volume and nature of crime and the administration of the criminal justice within this state.

OBJECTIVES

The fundamental objectives of the Oklahoma UCR Program are:

- (1) Inform the governor, legislature, other governmental officials and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in Oklahoma, its magnitude and its trends.
- (2) Provide law enforcement administrators with criminal statistics for administrative and operational use.
- (3) Determine who commits crimes by age, sex and race in order to find the proper focus for crime prevention and enforcement.
- (4) Provide base data and statistics to measure the workload and effectiveness of Oklahoma's criminal justice system.
- (5) Provide base data and statistics to measure the effects of prevention and deterrence programs.
- (6) Provide base data and statistics for research to improve the efficiency, effectiveness and performance of criminal justice agencies.
- (7) Provide data to assist in the assessment of societal and other causes of crime for the development of theories of criminal behavior.
- (8) Provide the FBI with complete UCR data to be included in the national crime reports.

REPORTING AND COLLECTION PROCEDURES

Under the Oklahoma UCR Statute, all state, county, city and town law enforcement agencies are required to submit crime reports.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Division in an effort to maintain quality and uniformity in the data received furnishes field representatives who provide training in Uniform Crime Reporting procedures. Because a centralized records system is necessary to the sound operation of any law enforcement agency and is an essential basis for crime reporting by the agency, the Uniform Crime Reporting Division provides technical assistance to any law enforcement agency in the establishment or maintenance of a police records system.

On a monthly basis, law enforcement agencies report the number of offenses that become known to them during the month in the following crime categories: murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. This count is taken from a record of all complaints of crime received by the law enforcement agency from victims, witnesses, other sources and/or discovered by agencies during their own operation. Whenever complaints of crime are determined through investigation to be unfounded or false, they are eliminated from the actual count. The number of "actual offenses known" in these crime categories is reported without regard to (1) whether anyone is arrested for the crime; (2) the stolen property is recovered; (3) the local prosecutive policy; or (4) any other restrictive consideration. Law enforcement agencies report on a monthly basis the total number of these reported crimes which they clear either by arrest or exceptional means. A separate count of crimes cleared which involve only persons under the age of 18 is also shown. To supplement the offense information such data as the value of property stolen and recovered, circumstances surrounding homicides, additional information concerning assaults on police officers and other pertinent information is collected.

In addition, monthly reports for all persons arrested on all criminal offenses are collected. These reports provide age, sex and race information on each person arrested with the adult and juvenile arrests separate.

On an annual basis, a report is submitted by each contributor concerning the number of persons formally charged by crime classification and the disposition of such charges. Law enforcement employee data specifically encompasses the number of sworn and civilian personnel and is collected annually.

VERIFICATION

A primary consideration in the collection of criminal statistics in the State of Oklahoma is the uniformity and accuracy of the data. The Oklahoma UCR Guide Manual and personal instruction by the UCR field representatives do not necessarily guarantee the accuracy of the reports submitted by the contributors. Additional verification is necessary.

Each report received is recorded, examined and verified for mathematical accuracy, and more importantly, for reasonableness. Validity and the possibility of duplication is checked numerous times to avoid misinformation.

Minor errors are corrected by telephone between the field representatives and reporting agency while substantial variations are adjusted through personal visits with individual contributing agencies. The personal contacts are invaluable to the accuracy and quality of reporting. Field representatives are engaged in a constant educational effort, and as such, provide a vital link between the UCR Program and the contributor.

USES OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA

Throughout history crime has generally been perceived as a serious social problem. Criminal behavior is one of the major domestic concerns in our nation today, and our citizens have the right to be informed of the full nature, magnitude and trend of the crime problem. Moreover, without such a disclosure it is impossible to assess the real costs of crime in our society. For, in the final analysis, it is the public who pays the costs - psychic, physical and economic - of criminality. They are the group who have their behavior patterns altered by their fear of attack, suffer the consequences of physical assault and have their possessions stolen or damaged. They pay higher insurance rates because of offenses against their property, as well as a higher price for goods and services due to business losses from organized and unorganized crime. The public has a right to know the complete extent of all these costs. Through their taxes they support the institutions of our criminal justice system and, as citizens in a democracy, they have the right and the obligation to appraise the allocation and effectiveness of limited governmental financial resources. Finally, both cooperation as individuals and group action by our citizens are required for crime reduction and the improvement of our criminal justice system. But cooperation and action will not be forthcoming unless and until they receive a more complete disclosure of the true nature of crime and criminal justice.

Effective solutions to the crime problem will depend on increased research to determine and assess the causes of crime and to develop and test theories of criminal behavior. All of these efforts require comprehensive and valid criminal statistics. Social scientists and professional criminologists require quantified data that will indicate who commits what types of crimes in order to establish typical "profiles" of criminals. Such profiles can help determine the proper focus and direction of crime prevention programs. However, studies of only limited applicability have been conducted to date, due to the lack of available quantified information.

Administrators at every level of the criminal justice process require information with which to measure their workloads, identify and solve operational problems and evaluate effectiveness. The lack of valid and complete statistics is critical when the needs of these managers are considered. Data are required for program planning, development, budgeting and evaluation, for estimating resource requirements and for allocating manpower and equipment. Information is also required to develop comparative norms of performance, for cost effectiveness studies and for establishing data bases with which to analyze the criminal justice system at the local level.

The usefulness of Uniform Crime Reports is extensive for law enforcement agencies. Information provided by the report can be applied to areas of statistics and hard data, as well as to aspects of planning and research.

CLASSIFICATION OF UCR OFFENSES

Offense data consists of information that has been extracted from reports of Part I offenses that have been submitted by law enforcement agencies in the State of Oklahoma. Part I offense definitions are as follows:

- 1a. Murder The willful killing of a human being.
- 1b. Manslaughter The killing of a human being by the negligence of another.
- 2. Forcible Rape The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will, including attempts.
- 3. Robbery The forcible taking of the property of another against his will by violence and fear, including attempts.
- 4. Felonious Assault An offer or attempt with unlawful force or violence to do physical injury to another.
- 5. Breaking and Entering (Burglary) An unlawful or forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny, including attempts.
- 6. Larceny-Theft The unlawful taking of property with intent to deprive another of ownership.
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle.

Part II offenses are made up of all other crimes not classified as Part I crimes. Information on Part II offenses is only reported when an arrest has been made. For UCR purposes Part II crimes are as follows:

- 8. Other Assaults (not aggravated) Assaults and attempted assaults which are simple and minor in nature.
- 9. Arson Willful or malicious burning with or without intent to defraud, including attempts.
- 10. Forgery and Counterfeiting Making, altering, uttering, or possessing or attempts to make, alter or possess with intent to defraud. Anything which is made to appear true.
- 11. Fraud Fraudulent conversion of another's money or property by false pretenses.
- 12. Embezzlement Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.
- 13. Stolen Property All offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- 14. Vandalism Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.
- 15. Weapons; Carrying, Possessing, etc. All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers and all attempts to commit any of the offenses.
- 16. Prostitution and Commercialized Vice Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, and all attempts to commit any of these offenses.
- 17. Sex Offenses (except Forcible Rape, Prostitution and Commercialized Vice) Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals and the like, including attempts.
- 18. Drug Abuse Violations Includes all arrests for violations of state and local ordinances, subdivided into the categories of possession and sale/manufacturing of narcotic drugs.
- 19. Gambling Promoting, permitting or engaging in gambling.
- 20. Offenses Against Family and Children Nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.
- 21. Driving Under the Influence Driving or operating any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or drugs.
- 22. Liquor Laws State or local liquor law violations, except "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence."
- 23. Drunkenness Drunk and disorderly.
- 24. Disorderly Conduct Breach of peace (disorderly persons).
- 25. Vagrancy Not reported in Oklahoma.
- 26. All other Offenses All other violations of state and local laws.
- 27. Suspicion Not reported in Oklahoma.
- 28. Curfew and Loitering Laws Applicable to juveniles only.
- 29. Runaway Applicable to juveniles only.


INDEX CRIME OFFENSES


The following three graphs illustrate the variations of the 1976, 1977 and 1978 total number of offenses by month. This information is based on the Oklahoma Crime Index.


The first graph represents the total number of index crime offenses occurring each month, and the following two graphs take the analysis further with breakdowns of violent crimes and nonviolent crimes by month.

July of 1978 reflected the highest number of index crimes reported, 10,817, and the month showing the lowest reported offenses in 1978 was February with 7,976 index crimes.

A further breakdown of the 1978 index crime offenses shows that August had the greatest number of violent crimes with 937 offenses reported, and the lowest number of violent crimes occurred in January with 733 offenses reported. A monthly analysis of the nonviolent crimes indicates that July and February showed the highest and lowest number of offenses with monthly totals of 9,887 and 7,238 respectively.








CRIME CLOCKS





MURDER

MURDER - the unlawful killing of a human being in which the element of malice aforethought was present.

Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime is included. This index offense, as in all other crime index offenses, is scored by law enforcement officials on the basis of their investigation and does not include the findings of a court or the decision of a prosecutor. Manslaughters, suicides, accidental deaths and justifiable homicides are excluded in this category. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as assaults and not as murder.

1978 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 238 murders were reported by law enforcement agencies in the State of Oklahoma for the year 1978.

Murders accounted for approximately 2.4% of all violent index crimes and approximately .2% of all index offenses reported.


A total of 197 murders were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing an 82.8% clearance rate statewide.


The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for murder, approximately 25.9%, occurred in the 25-34 age category Of all persons arrested for murder, 62.3% were White, 29.7% were Negro, 7.6% were Indian and .4% were of other races.

Firearms were employed in 67.2% of all reported murders. The use of a knife or other cutting device was involved in 13.5% of the murders.

The murder of one family member of another accounted for 49 offenses or 20.6% of all murders. Of the 238 murders, 10.1% resulted from one spouse killing the other.

Of the 238 reported murders, 68.1% of the victims were acquainted with the offender.





As illustrated in the following table, the victims of murder during 1978 were male in approximately three out of four instances. Approximately 69 out of 100 murder victims were White, 26 were Negro, 4 were Indian and I was of other races. The largest number of murders occurring in any ten-year age bracket was the 20 to 29 age group.

RAPE

RAPE - the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

Forcible rape differs from other violent crimes in that the victim, in many cases, is hesitant in reporting the offense to police. The rigors of court procedure and the embarrassment caused by the stigma placed on the crime has a deterrent effect on the victim's willingness to make the crime known to police.

For the purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting, rape is divided into two categories: (1) rape by force and (2) attempts to rape. Assaults to commit forcible rape are included in the index offense category of rape; statutory rape is not reported in this category.


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
A total of 879 forcible and attempted rapes were reported by law enforcement agencies in the State of Oklahoma for the year 1978.

Forcible rapes accounted for approximately 8.8% of all violent crimes and approximately .8% of all index offenses.

A total of 554 rapes were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, showing a 63.0% clearance rate statewide.

Of all persons arrested for rape, 55.2% were under the age of 25. In addition, 62.9% were White, 31.4% were Negro, 5.5% were Indian and .2% were of other races.





ROBBERY

ROBBERY - the felonious and forcible taking of property from the care, custody or control of a person or persons by violence or putting the person in fear and against his will.

In order for the crime of robbery to take place, the victim must be present. Robberies are reported in the following categories: gun, knife or cutting instrument, other dangerous weapon and strong arm robbery.

1978 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 2,519 robberies were reported by law enforcement agencies in the State of Oklahoma for the year 1978.


Robberies accounted for approximately 25.1% of all violent crimes and approximately 2.2% of all index crimes. A total of 1,119 robberies were cleared showing a 44.4% clearance rate statewide.


The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for robbery, 14.1%, occurred in the 25-29 age category. Of all persons arrested for robbery, 50.4% were White, 39.1% were Negro, 9.9% were Indian and .6% were of other races.

The largest number of actual offenses of robbery, 770 in number, occurred under the highway robbery category representing 30.6% of all offenses of robbery reported in 1978. The armed robber was responsible for over 66.1% of the total robberies.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of robbery totaled \$987,107 or 1.8% of the total value of property stolen during the year.

FELONIOUS ASSAULT

FELONIOUS ASSAULT - the unlawful attack or an attempt to attack through force or violence to do physical injury to another.

A felonious assault may be committed by a gun, knife or other cutting instrument, other dangerous weapon or through the aggravated use of hands, fists or feet. All assaults, where no weapon is used and resulting in minor injuries, are classified as nonfelonious assaults and are not counted in the crime index totals.


A total of 6,386 felonious assaults were reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1978.


Felonious assaults accounted for 63.7% of all violent crimes and 5.5% of all index crimes reported.

A total of 4,187 felonious assaults were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 65.6% statewide.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for felonious assault, 17.9%, occurred in the 25-29 age category. Of all persons arrested for felonious assault, 63.4% were White, 28.4% were Negro, 7.7% were Indian and .5% were of other races.

Of all types of felonious assaults the use of hands, fists and feet was the most prevalent, representing 1,900 offenses and comprising 29.8% of all felonious assaults.





BURGLARY

BURGLARY - any unlawful or attempted forcible entry of a structure to commit a felony or larceny, even though force may not be used to gain entry.

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the offense of burglary is divided into three categories: (1) forcible entry, (2) unlawful entry and (3) attempted forcible entry.

1978 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 36,704 burglaries were reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1978.

Burglaries accounted for 34.3% of all nonviolent crimes and 31.4% of all index offenses reported.

A total of 5,804 burglaries were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 15.8% statewide.

The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for burglary, 11.5%, occurred in the sixteen (16) year old age category.


Persons 18 years of age and under were accountable for 46.4% of all burglary arrests.


Of all persons arrested for burglary, 72.6% were White, 19.8% were Negro, 7.1% were Indian and .5% were of other races.


Of the three categories of burglary, forcible entry was the most prevalent, with 27,625 offenses reported. This figure represents 75.3% of the total burglaries committed. Unlawful entry (no force) constituted 18.4% while 6.3% were attempts.

The value of property stolen in actual offenses of burglary totaled \$18,089,610 or 32.1% of the total value of property stolen during the year 1978.

Residential burglaries accounted for 67.2% of the total offenses reported, with a total dollar loss of \$12,794,598. Where time could be determined, 33.3% of all residential burglaries occurred during the nighttime hours.

LARCENY

LARCENY - the unlawful taking of property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership without the use of force, violence or fraud.

For reporting purposes, larcenies are specifically categorized in crimes resulting from: (1) pocket picking, (2) purse snatching, (3) shoplifting, (4) larceny from a motor vehicle, (5) larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories, (6) bicycle thefts, (7) larceny from buildings and (8) larceny of any coin-operated machines. Any remaining crimes of larceny are classified in the "all other" category.

Larceny-theft, as an index offense, includes larcenies under \$50 in value.

1978 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 60,233 larcenies were reported by law enforcement agencies for the year 1978.

Reported larcenies accounted for 56.3% for all nonviolent crimes and 51.5% of all index offenses reported.


There were 9,844 larcenies cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared. This represents a clearance rate of 16.3% statewide.


The largest number of arrests for actual offenses of larceny, 9.9%, occurred in the 25-29 age category.

Persons 18 years of age and under were accountable for 45.4% of all larceny arrests.

Of all persons arrested for larceny, 70.4% were White, 22.8% were Negro, 5.6% were Indian and 1.2% were persons of other races.

During the year 1978 the value of property stolen in actual offenses of larceny totaled \$15,033,835. This constitutes 26.7% of the total value of property stolen.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT - the unlawful taking or attempted taking of a motor vehicle.

The term "motor vehicles" includes all vehicles which can be registered as such in the State of Oklahoma.

Thefts of farm equipment, bulldozers, airplanes and construction equipment are not included in the definition of a motor vehicle. Joyriding is included in this category.

Motor vehicle theft is divided into three categories for the purpose of these reports: (1) autos, (2) trucks and buses and (3) other vehicles.

1978 SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A total of 9,969 motor vehicle thefts were reported by law enforcement agencies in the State of Oklahoma during the year 1978.

Motor vehicle thefts made up 9.3% of all nonviolent crimes and 8.5% of all index offenses reported.

A total of 2,037 motor vehicle thefts were cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared, representing a clearance rate of 20.4% statewide.


The age group accounting for the highest percentage of persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 16.5%, occurred in the sixteen (16) year old category.


It is worth noting that 54.8% of all arrests for motor vehicle theft were juvenile arrests. Of the total juvenile arrests for motor vehicle theft, 77.6% were for the age groups fifteen (15), sixteen (16) and seventeen (17).

Of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, 76.0% were White, 13.7% were Negro, 9.9% were Indian and .4% were of all other races.

Of \$22,217,848 reported stolen in the motor vehicle theft category, \$15,735,826 was recovered, constituting a 70.8% recovery rate.

The average value of motor vehicles stolen during the reporting period was \$2,228.69.

STOLEN AND RECOVERED




Each month law enforcement agencies submit supplementary data pertaining to crimes from which money or property is stolen. These figures are subsequently compiled and analyzed, and the resultant figures provide information concerning the value of property stolen and recovered by type of property and offense.

The total value of property stolen in Oklahoma during 1978 was \$56,343,056. This is an increase of \$9,899,020 or 21.3% over the value stolen in 1977.

Law enforcement agencies were successful in recovering approximately 26.6% more property in 1978 than in 1977. The total value of recovered property for 1978 was \$20,079,944 or 35.6% of the total property stolen.

V OKLAHOMA ARREST DATA



The Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting Program requests the monthly submission of data concerning persons arrested in Oklahoma. A record of total arrest activity for criminal acts in both Part I and Part II classifications is collected and analyzed according to age, sex and race. With the exception of arrests for driving under the influence, traffic arrests are not reported.

A total of 146,726 arrests were reported in 1978, and of that total 21,594 were juvenile offenders. Arrests decreased 6.9% or 10,851 arrests over the 1977 figure of 157,577 total arrests.

A person is counted on the monthly arrest report each time he is arrested. A person may be arrested several times during the month such as in the crimes of public drunkenness, disorderly conduct and similar violations. It should also be noted that if a person is arrested for several different crimes at the same time, the arrest is shown only for the highest offense the person committed at that time.

Analysis of reported arrests for 1978 shows that 15.5% of all arrests occurred in the index offenses. The highest clearance rate of a particular index offense occurred in the murder category with 82.8% of all murders being cleared by arrest.


Alcohol-related arrests (driving under the influence, liquor laws and drunkenness) constituted 51.7% of the total arrests reported in 1978. This percentage represents the arrest of 72,711 adults and 3,126 juveniles. The highest percentage of all arrests occurred in the category of drunkenness. This category represented 32.7% of all arrests made in 1978.

CLEARANCE RATES

For crime reporting purposes, a crime index offense is cleared when (1) a law enforcement agency has identified the offender; (2) there is enough evidence to charge him and (3) he is actually take into custody. The arrest of one person may clear several crimes or the arrest of several persons may clear only one crime. The number of arrests and the number of clearances for any particular offense should not be compared as the numbers may not, and likely will not, be the same.

Clearances are also reported in exceptional circumstances when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes formal charges, i.e., handling of juveniles, a double murder, suicide of the offender and other exceptional circumstances.




% OF OFFENSE CLEARED BY PERSONS UNDER AGE 18





COLLECTION OF DISPOSITIONS

The Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting Program requires the collection of the police disposition of juveniles. The purpose for this is to collect data that will be meaningful in the disposition being made of juveniles who are taken into custody or arrested by police. When an adult is arrested he is usually held for prosecution for some charge or is released for future handling in court. This is not necessarily the case with juveniles. Depending on the seriousness of the offense and the juvenile's prior record many are warned by the police and released to parents, relatives, friends or guardians. In certain instances juveniles are referred to the probation department or some other branch of the juvenile court. In other instances, juveniles are referred to welfare agencies, to other police agencies, or in the case of serious offenders, to criminal or adult court by waiver of the juvenile court.

The word "arrest" as it applies to juveniles is intended to mean the police handling of all juveniles who have committed a crime and are taken into custody under such circumstances that were the juvenile an adult, an arrest would have been made. Police "contacts" with juveniles where no offense has been committed are not counted as arrests. Instances wherein a juvenile is taken into custody for his own protection, such as in neglect cases, and where no crime is committed are not listed as arrests.

The Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting Program requires the collection of statistical information relating to law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty or by accidental means and the number of assaults made on Oklahoma law enforcement officers.

During 1978 six officers were killed in the line of duty - 4 by felonious acts and 2 by accidental or negligent acts.

A total of 731 assaults on state, county and municipal law enforcement officers in Oklahoma were reported for the year 1978. This represents a 5.4% decrease as compared to 773 assaults reported for 1977.

The following section sets forth a specific breakdown of Crime Index Offenses by each contributing law enforcement agency for the years 1976, 1977 and 1978.

It must be remembered that the total offenses reported are shown here, and the statistics are included for each month an agency reported before the final cutoff date of January 31, 1979. If the data reported appears insufficient, it is important to note that not all agencies submitted reports for the full thirty-six (36) months of 1976, 1977 and 1978. For an accurate representation of reporting, refer to Section VIII, Contributor Participation.

As is apparent, the delinquency of reports greatly hampers the Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting Program. In some states, crime trend data is only computed from those agencies that had a complete reporting record for that year or years. The Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting Program, however, in its continuing endeavor to provide complete criminal statistics for the State of Oklahoma, employs the total number of offenses reported in its criminal statistical analysis.

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

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HISTORY OF PROGRAM PARTICIPATION

Oklahoma has approximately three hundred (300) sheriffs' and police departments. During the year 1973 a monthly average of sixty-five (65) law enforcement agencies contributed UCR returns directly to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting Section in Washington, D.C.

The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation assumed the statewide administration of the UCR Program on September 1, 1973. Since that time, an astounding increase in the number of agencies who report directly to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation has been realized.

The table below sets forth the number of law enforcement agencies by type that have participated in the Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting Program for the years 1976, 1977 and 1978.

STATEMENT OF POLICY

The following regulations will be observed by this agency concerning the release of Uniform Crime Reporting statistical information. Employees of this agency will observe these procedures and will not deviate from this policy without the express consent of the Director of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. All information to be released will originate from the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, Uniform Crime Reporting Division and will be approved prior to being released by the Director of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation.

REGULATIONS

- 1. This agency will publish an annual report reflecting crime in Oklahoma. This report will be distributed to the Governor, to members of the Legislature, to the Attorney General, to law enforcement agencies or to any agency or committee dedicated to law enforcement or criminal justice work.
- 2. Published annual reports will be released to the above named agencies prior to their being released to individuals or agencies extraneous to the criminal justice community.
- 3. UCR Information Requests
 - A. Information contained in the published annual report may be released via phone, letter, etc., to any interested party only with the written consent of the agency whose statistics are requested.
 - B. All requests for unpublished information from agencies or individuals should be directed by letter to the Director of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. These special requests will be honored only upon the Director's authorization. No person or agency will be furnished statistical information which has not previously been published, concerning any individual agency's reports without the written consent of the Chief Administrator of that agency. The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation will maintain for one (1) year a copy of the information released along with the request and the authority for release.
 - C. Law enforcement agencies may receive interim, unpublished, specialized reports identifying their agency only providing the request is not unreasonable. Law enforcement agencies may also receive their respective county totals along with state or region totals. All requests should be directed to the Director of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation.

It was apparent at the initiation of the UCR Program that the quality of the program was somewhat limited, because obviously not every crime can be accounted for. When analyzing UCR data it must be remembered that these statistics are based upon offenses reported or known to the police.

In many instances and for varying reasons citizens do not report crimes. Victims may consider the offenses to be of little consequence; they believe there is nothing the police can do about them; or they fear retaliation from offenders because they have shared willingly in such offenses as illegal sex acts, gambling or drug use. Consequently, information concerning some offenses is never entered in the present statistical reporting system. A national survey conducted for the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice indicates that half the victimizations are not reported to law enforcement authorities.

Oftentimes law enforcement agencies themselves question the merit of the UCR Program. A common complaint concerns jursidiction when a sheriff's department is called upon to investigate a crime within city limits and makes an arrest in connection with the offense. The sheriff's department feels it is necessary to score the offense, but under UCR guidelines the city must report the offense, the clearance and the arrest. It must be remembered that Uniform Crime Reports are not activity reports, but are for the purpose of measuring the extent and type of crime by geographic location.

The information gathered and disseminated by this report is the most accurate crime information currently available in Oklahoma. Caution has been exercised in the past and will continue to be practiced when the subject of direct comparisons are suggested. The primary reason for this caution is caused by a great number of socio-economic problems. Likewise, when comparing offense and arrest data, it should be remembered that crimes relate to events, while arrests relate to persons. A single crime may involve several criminals, several offenders and several victims.

Set forth below are some additional conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place. These same conditions will also affect the amount of crime actually reported.

- 1. Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
- 2. Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.
- Economic status and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population including commuters, seasonal and other transient types.
- 5. Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.

- Educational, recreational and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of the police force.
- Standards governing appointment to the police force.
- 9. Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.
- 10. Attitude of the public toward law and enforcement problems.
- 11. The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

Because they are influenced by many variables, current methods of gathering and reporting offense and arrest data provide a less than complete picture of criminality in our society. However, despite these shortcomings, there is at present no other information system available that will more adequately perform this task.

ANNUAL LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEE DATA 1978

The figures represented below are the compilation of forms sent to all reporting law enforcement agencies throughout the state on an annual basis. These figures relate the number of full-time police employees, both officers and civilians. The figures include all full-time, sworn personnel with full arrest power including the chief, sheriff or other head of department with the only exception being persons performing guard or protection duties who are not paid from police funds, i.e., school crossing guards, special officers and merchant police. The figures below do not include employees of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation or the Oklahoma Highway Patrol.

Civilian employees include persons such as clerks, radio dispatchers, meter maids, stenographers, mechanics, etc., provided these persons are full-time employees of the agencies. Persons not paid from police funds are not included. Persons receiving salaries from federal grants are not included.

In 1978 Oklahoma's police employee rate was 1.97 employees per 1,000 inhabitants as compared to 1.94 employees per 1,000 in 1977.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT- For Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person 18 years of age or over.

ARREST RATE - The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 100,000. Arrest rates are computed in the same manner as crime rates.

CLEARANCE RATE - The number of clearances reported for Part I Offenses. Divide number of clearances by number of offenses to determine clearance rate.

CLEARED BY ARREST - For UCR purposes, an offense is cleared by arrest or solved when at least one person is (1) arrested, (2) charged with the commission of an offense and (3) turned over to court for prosecution.

CRIME FACTORS - Conditions which affect the amount and type of crime that occurs in a geographical area.

CRIME INDEX - The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a given geographical area. Crime classifications used in the index are: (1) murder, (2) forcible rape, (3) robbery, (4) felonious assault, (5) breaking and entering, (6) larceny-theft and (7) motor vehicle theft. Each of these offenses is referred to as an "Index Offense."

CRIME RATE - The number of Index Offenses reported for each unit of population, generally per 100,000. Crime rates are computed for communities with varying populations by dividing the number of Index Crimes by the population and multiplying the answer by 100,000.

EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE - A crime solution or clearance recorded when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against an offender.

JUVENILE - For Oklahoma Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.

NONVIOLENT CRIME - Consists of the Index Offenses of Breaking and Entering, Larceny-Theft and Motor Vehicle Theft.

PART I OFFENSES - The first of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part I Offenses are by their nature more serious and/or occur most frequently. The monthly tabulation of Part I Offenses provides a count of "offenses known."

PART II OFFENSES - The second of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part II Offenses are generally less serious in nature and/or occur less frequently. Monthly tabulations of Part II Offenses are limited to arrest information only.

VIOLENT CRIME - Consists of the Index Offenses of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
