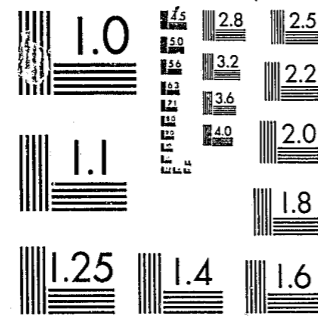


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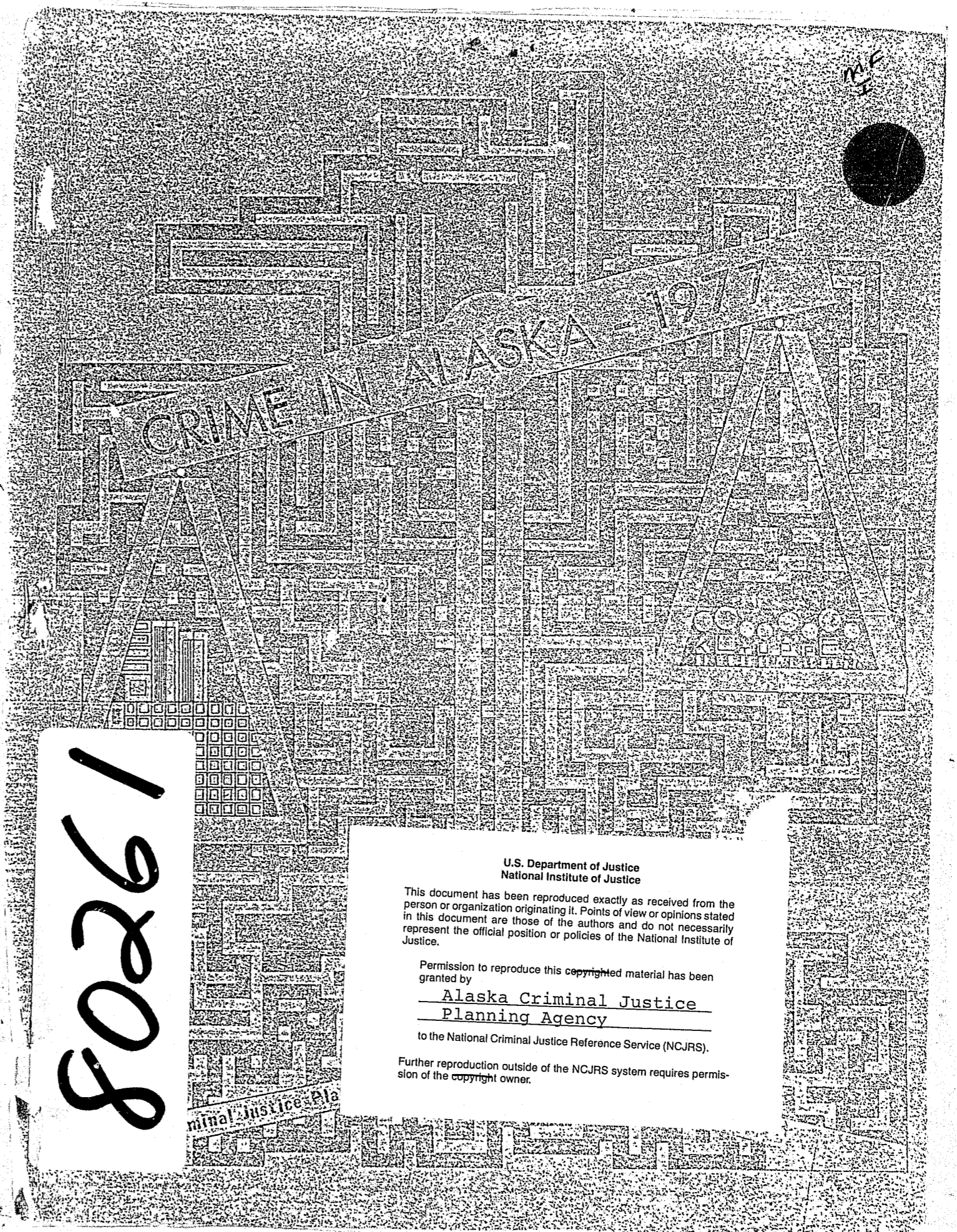

STATE OF ALASKA

The Criminal Justice Planning Agency is in its third year of publishing Crime in Alaska. Since our first publication, the number of agencies reporting statistics to CJPA has grown from nine to eighteen. This increase in reporting agencies has made it possible to improve the accuracy of our statistical analysis and more truly describe the crime which is occurring in our State.


The Research Section of CJPA has analyzed the 1977 Uniform Crime Reports for all of the reporting cities. Comparisons have been made with the statistics of previous years. This data should be useful to each agency in deciding how to allocate its resources.

The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration has just awarded a grant to CJPA which will enable us to tailor the Uniform Crime Reports to the needs of Alaska. The grant will also enable us to computerize the data we receive from you. Thus, when you have a request for information, we will be able to retrieve the data and reply to you much more quickly than has been possible in the past.

If there is any information we failed to include in Crime in Alaska or which you feel would be useful to you, please contact Susan Knighton or Lou Anne Maxwell, Research Analysts. If the data is available, they will be glad to provide you with any crime analysis you may require.

Thank you for the cooperation you have shown. The increase in reporting agencies is very gratifying and it is our hope that there will be a further increase in 1978.

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CRIME IN ALASKA

The major source of data used to measure the trend and distribution of crime in Alaska is the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. Under this program, statistics are compiled by law enforcement agencies as crimes are reported. Seven offense categories, selected because they represent the most common local problems, have been defined as Crime Index Offenses. They are serious both because of their nature and the frequency with which they occur. The offenses of murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault make up the violent crimes. The offenses of burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft make up the property crimes.

The UCR Program was established in 1930 by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) when the need was recognized for crime statistics through which they could gain a basic understanding of the nature and scope of the nation's crime problem. The FBI took over the responsibility of receiving, tabulating and publishing the crime statistics which are voluntarily submitted by police agencies.

The statistics are issued annually during August by the FBI in the publication, Crime in the United States. The statistics for Alaska are compiled by the research unit of the Criminal Justice Planning Agency and are presented to the Governor's Commission for the Administration of Justice preceding national publication.

Several problems exist within the UCR Program which bring it under criticism. One of these criticisms is that the population bases which are used in computing the crime rates are sometimes only estimates. This is especially true in non-census years. Also, crime may be either undiscovered and therefore unreported or, as recent victimization surveys have indicated, unreported even though discovered.

Despite these problems, UCR statistics do represent the basis for public awareness of crime and are the major source for a statistical understanding of the national crime problem. It is more reasonable to improve the existing program than to scrap it in favor of a new collection system which might, in the end, prove to be more fallible.

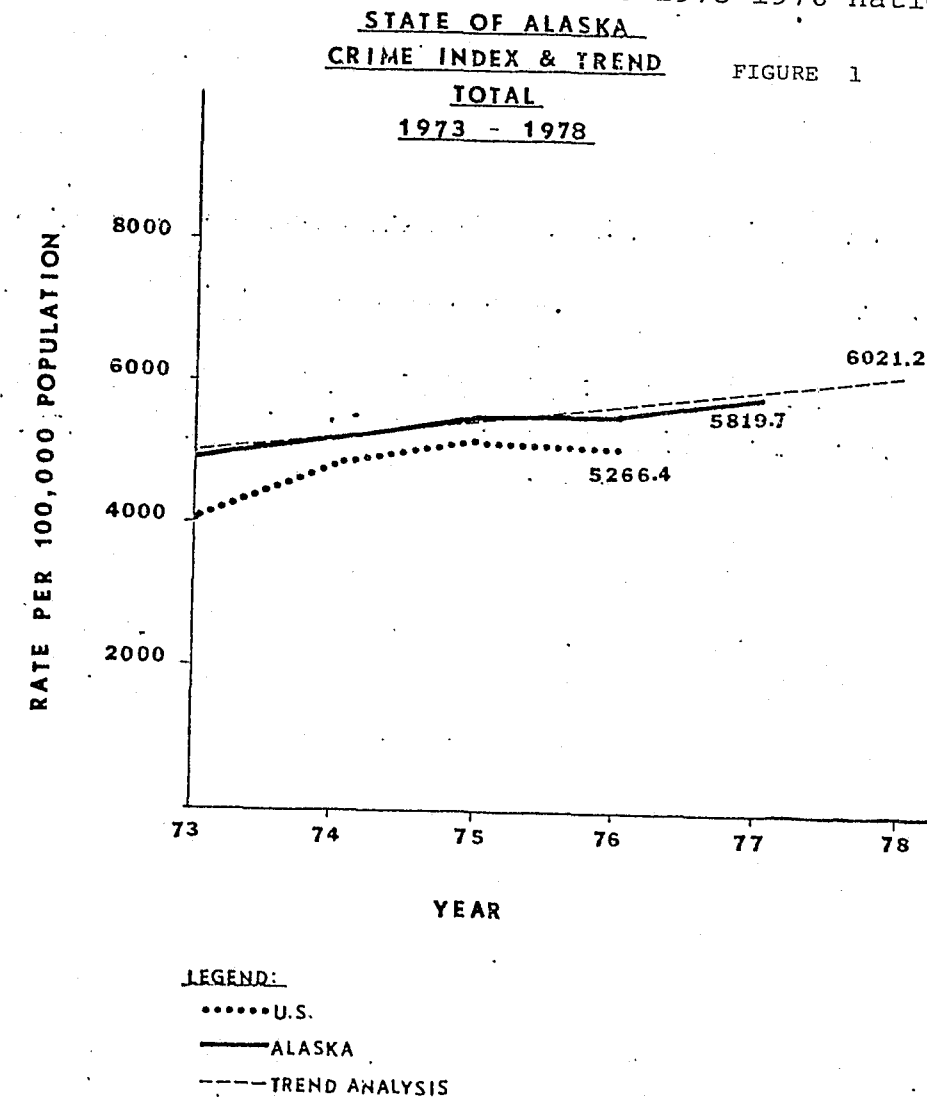
CRIME INDEX RATE

One of the basic measurements used in crime statistics is the crime index rate. This rate is defined as the number of incidents per 100,000 inhabitants. Since it relates the incidence of crime to the total population, it provides a means of comparing current and historical data for the State of Alaska and also allows us to compare our rates with nationwide data.

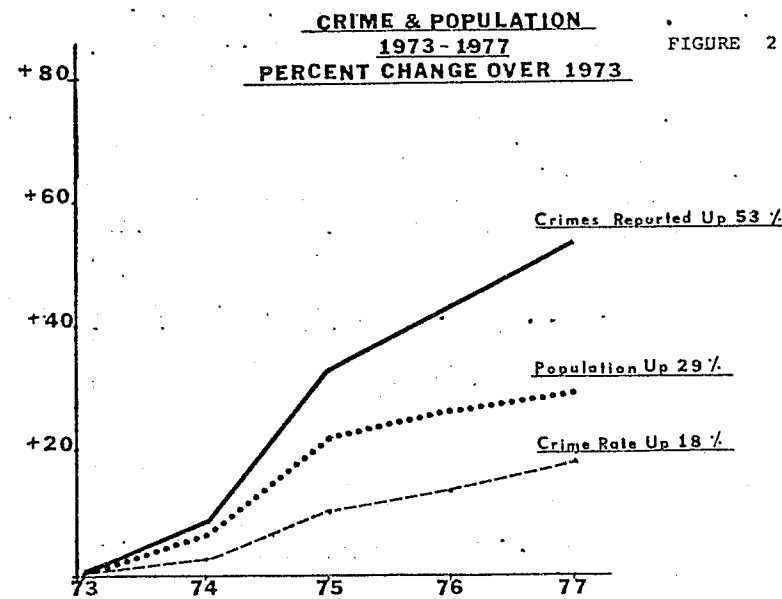
During 1977, the Crime Index rate for Alaska was 5819.7 per 100,000 persons. This represents a four percent increase over the 5,567.9 rate for 1976. It must be noted, however, that during 1977 there was an increase in the number of police departments submitting crime statistics to the Criminal Justice Planning Agency.

The new participants are Bethel, Kodiak, Palmer, Skagway, Soldotna, and Valdez. When the total crime rate of those police departments participating during both 1976 and 1977 are compared it is found that there was less than a one percent increase in the crime rate.

Figure 1 indicates the trend of the Alaskan Crime Index from 1973 to 1978, and compares it to the 1973-1976 nationwide rates.



There is a widely held theory that crime has run rampant in Alaska since the Trans-Alaska pipeline was begun. The following figure seems to disprove this statement. Since 1973, the population of Alaska has increased by twenty-nine percent and the number of crimes reported by fifty-three percent. The crime rate, however, has only increased eighteen percent. This means that the large increase in the state's population was not accompanied by a comparable increase in the crime rate. Our crime rate has historically been greater than the nation's, but the gap is closing.



This analysis can be expanded by discussing changes in the violent and property crime rates. Murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault are defined as violent crimes. Burglary, larceny/theft and motor vehicle theft are defined as property crimes.

Figures 3 and 4 illustrate the trend of violent and property crimes from 1973 to 1977. The percentage changes in the number of offenses reported and the crime rates are shown. The violent crime rate has increased by eighteen percent since 1973. During 1977, however, there was a downward trend in this rate. The property crime rate is increasing and showed an eighteen percent increase since 1973.

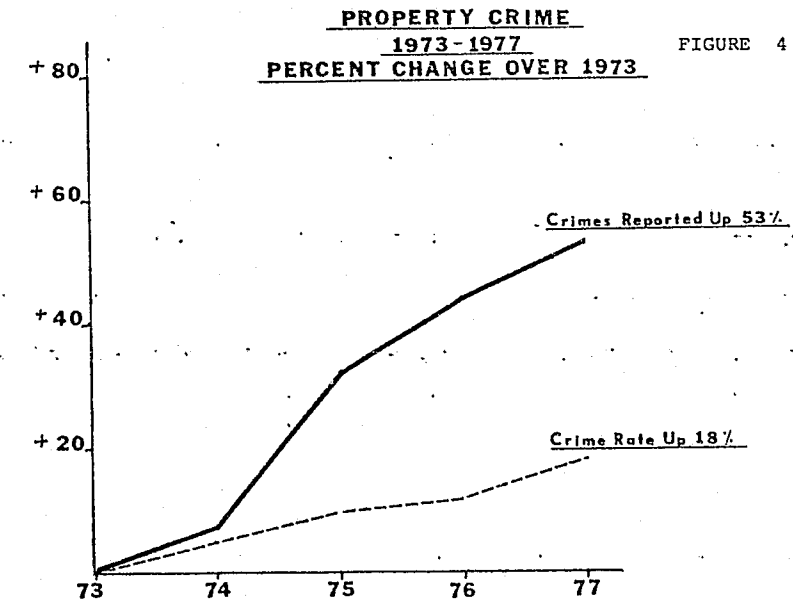
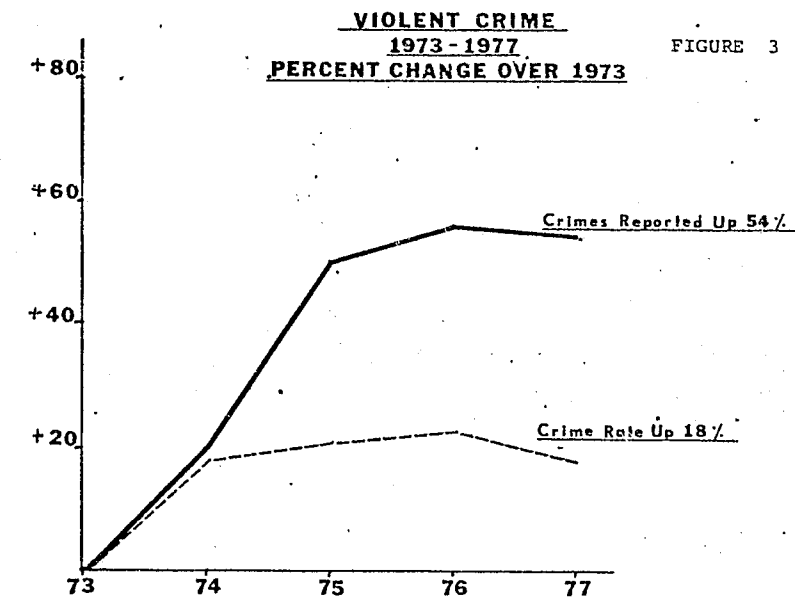


Table 1 shows a detailed breakdown of the reported offenses and crime index rates for 1973-1977. The statistics are broken down into the categories of violent, property, murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny/theft and motor vehicle theft.

In order to determine the trend of crime in Alaska, the crime index rates for 1973-1977 were used to make a straight-line projection for 1978. This projection shows that the total crime index is predicted to increase by three percent to 6,021.2 offenses per 100,000 persons. The crimes which show predicted increases are robbery, aggravated assaults, motor vehicle theft and larceny/theft.

Table 3 presents a comparison of Alaska's 1976 crime rates with the rates of states of similar size, the geographic division and the entire United States.

The State of Wyoming was selected because its population is comparable to Alaska's. Wyoming has the smallest population within the U.S. and Alaska the next smallest. It was found that Alaska's crime rate was forty percent greater than Wyoming's rate of 3,975.1 per 100,000 persons. It should be noted, however, that during 1975 Alaska's crime rate was fifty-three percent greater than Wyoming's.

Alaska is one of the states included in the Pacific Geographic Division. The remaining states are California, Hawaii, Oregon and Washington. When these rates are compared to Alaska's, it is found that Alaska's crime index rate was twenty percent lower than that of the division. The violent crime rate was twenty-two percent lower and the property crime rate was twenty percent lower.

When Alaska's rates were compared to those of the entire U.S., it was found that Alaska's total crime index rate was six percent greater. The violent crime rate was three percent greater and the property crime rate was six percent greater.

CRIME ANALYSIS OF ALASKA'S URBAN CITIES

Reported Offenses

Throughout the remainder of this report, the statistics for the Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketchikan police departments will be presented along with the statewide totals. The statistics for the respective Alaska State Trooper detachments have not been included since they are compiled at the broad detachment level and cannot be broken down further.

Table 5 presents the contribution of each city to the crime index offenses which were reported from 1974 to 1977. The statistics are broken down into the categories of total, violent and property crimes. The contribution of each city has remained relatively constant during this period. Detailed analysis for the state, each city and the rest of the state can be found in Tables 6 through 11.

Crime Rates and Trends

The 1974-1977 crime rates for Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketchikan are presented in Tables 12 through 15. The predicted rates for 1978 and the predicted percentage change between 1977 and 1978 are also presented.

Juneau has the greatest predicted change with sixteen percent. Anchorage is next with ten percent. Both Fairbanks and Ketchikan show predicted decreases with twenty-three percent and eleven percent respectively. Projected changes are also shown for each crime index offense, violent crimes and property crimes.

Tables 16 to 19 present comparisons of the crime rates for Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketchikan with other United States cities of similar size. These tables indicate that the crime rates for Alaskan cities are much greater than those of other U.S. cities. The rate for Anchorage is ninety-three percent greater than that of comparable cities in the lower 48, Fairbanks seventy-six percent greater, Juneau one hundred forty-eight percent greater, and Ketchikan one hundred seventy-three percent greater. Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketchikan showed improvement over 1975 when the same comparison showed differences of two hundred seventy-seven percent, one hundred seventy-six percent and two hundred twenty-three percent.

In order to compare the crime profiles of Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketchikan, Tables 20 through 21 have been prepared. The tables present rankings by the number of reported offenses, the 1977 crime rates and the change in crime rates between 1976 and 1977.

Ranking by Number of Reported Offenses

Anchorage was first and Fairbanks second in all of the rankings by number of reported offenses. For the total crime index offenses reported, Ketchikan was ranked third and Juneau fourth.

Ranking by Crime Rate

Ketchikan was first and Anchorage second in the ranking by total crime index rate. Juneau was third and Fairbanks fourth.

Ranking by Crime Rate Change

Ketchikan had the greatest increase in crime rate between 1976 and 1977. Anchorage, Fairbanks and Juneau all showed decreases for the same time period.

CRIMINAL HOMICIDE (Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter)

Definition: This crime index offense is defined as the willful killing of another. As a general rule, any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. Suicides, accidental deaths, assaults to murder and attempted murders are not included.

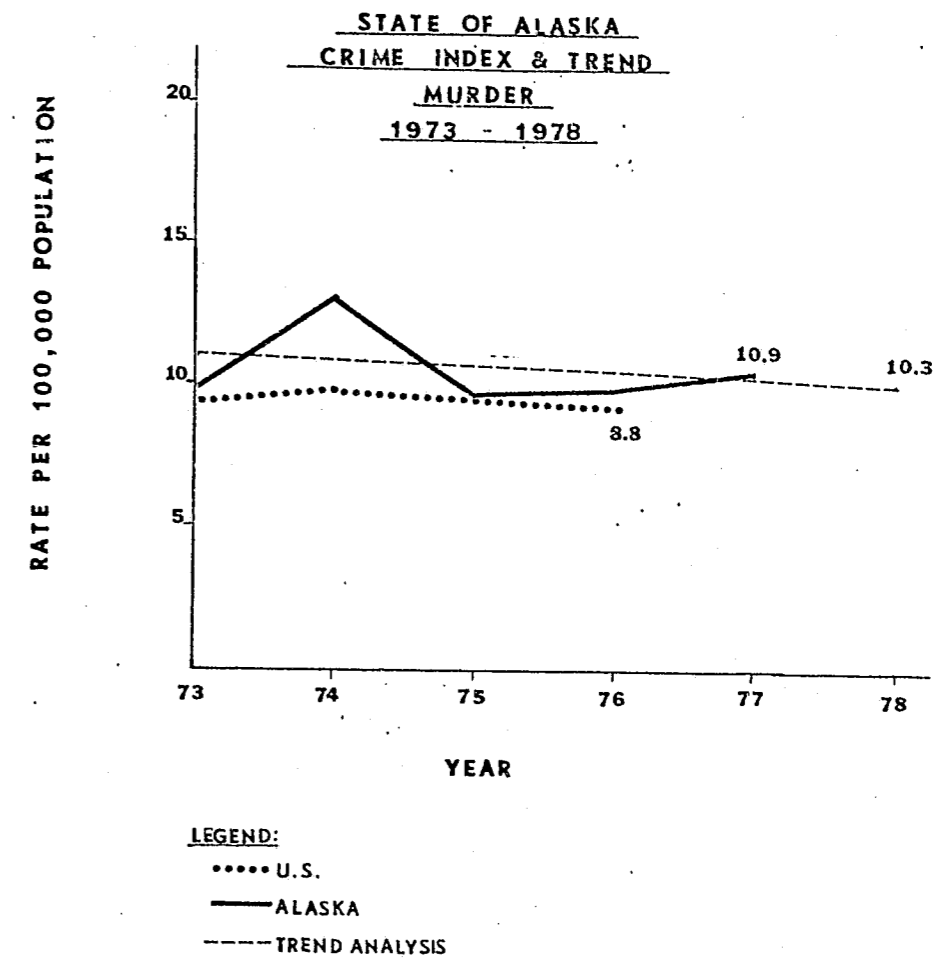
Volume: In 1977, there were forty-seven murders reported in Alaska. This is an increase of six over the forty-one murders in 1976. Murders represented three percent of the total violent crimes and less than one percent of the total crime index offenses. Table 22 shows that the number of reported incidents increased fifteen percent over 1976. The incidence of murder either showed no change or decreased in the urban areas and increased by forty-three percent in the rural areas.

Trend: In 1977, there were 10.9 murders for every 100,000 Alaskans. This is an increase of 11 percent over the 9.8 rate for 1976. Figure 5 indicates a predicted rate of 10.3 for 1978 which is a decrease of six percent.

Nature of Murder: Using additional information provided through the Uniform Crime Reports, the nature of murder in Alaska can be analyzed.

Of the forty-seven murders reported to law enforcement agencies, forty-three were verified and determined to be actual offenses. Seventy-two percent of the murder victims were male and twenty-eight percent were female. Forty-two percent were white, nineteen percent black, sixteen percent Indian, and twenty-three percent all other races. The largest number of murders (35%) occurred in the 18 to 29 age group. This is radically different from 1976, when eighty-two percent of the victims were male, sixty-eight percent white and thirty-one percent were in the 40 to 49 age group.

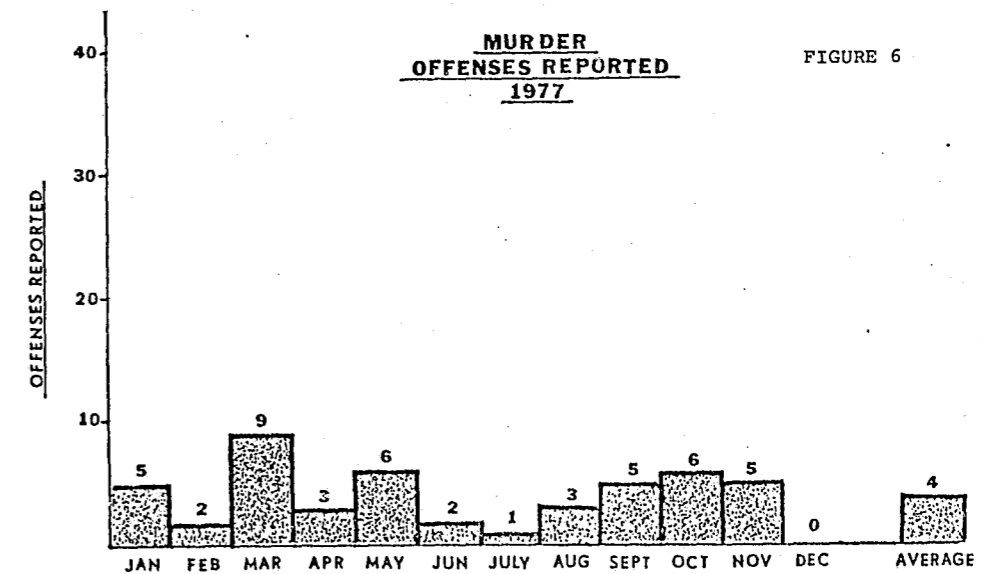

Clearance Rate: During 1977, seventy-two percent of the actual reported murders were cleared by arrest.

Persons Arrested: Of those persons arrested for murder, eighty-two percent were males and eighteen percent were females. Three percent were under the age of 18, thirty-eight percent between the ages of 18 and 24, and fifty-nine percent were 29 or older. Forty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, fifteen percent black, three percent Indian and thirty-eight percent all other races.

FORCIBLE RAPE

Definition: Forcible rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Actual rapes, assaults to rape and attempts to rape are included. Statutory rape is not included.

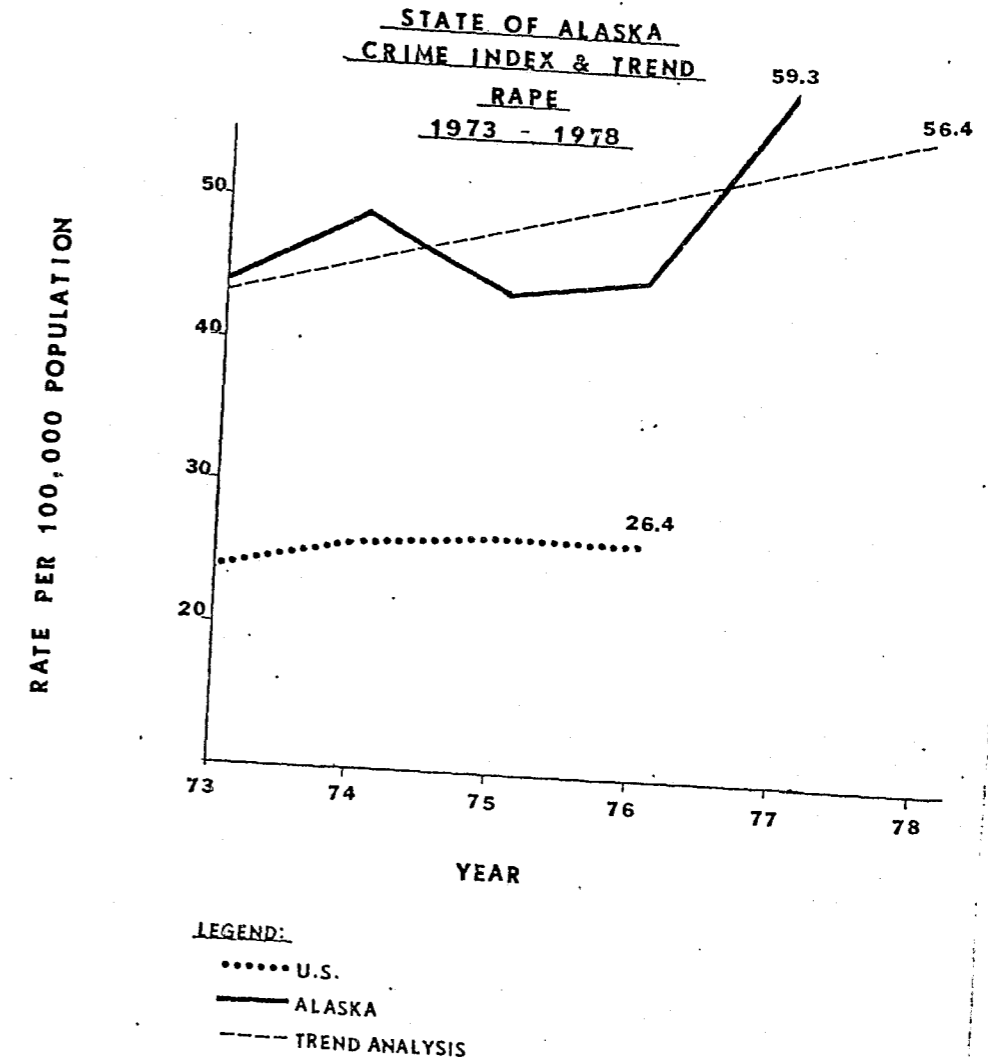
Volume: In 1977, there were 255 forcible rapes reported in Alaska. This represents an increase of 63 over the 192 reported during 1976. Rapes represented thirteen percent of the total violent crime and one percent of the total crime index offenses. Table 28 shows that the number of reported rapes increased thirty-three percent over 1976. Anchorage and the smaller cities showed the greatest increases with thirty-four and thirty-nine percent. Juneau and Ketchikan showed no change.

Nature of Forcible Rape: During 1977, seventy-three percent of all forcible rapes were actual rapes by force. The remainder were attempts or assaults to commit forcible rape. Seventeen percent of the offenses reported to the police were determined to be unfounded or baseless claims, while the overall unfounded rate for crime index offenses was four percent.

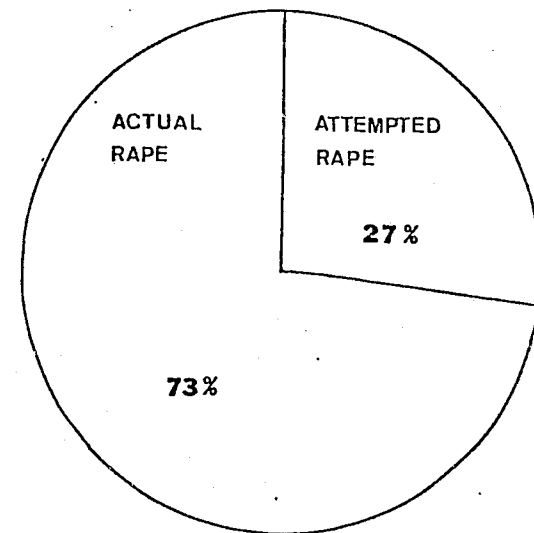

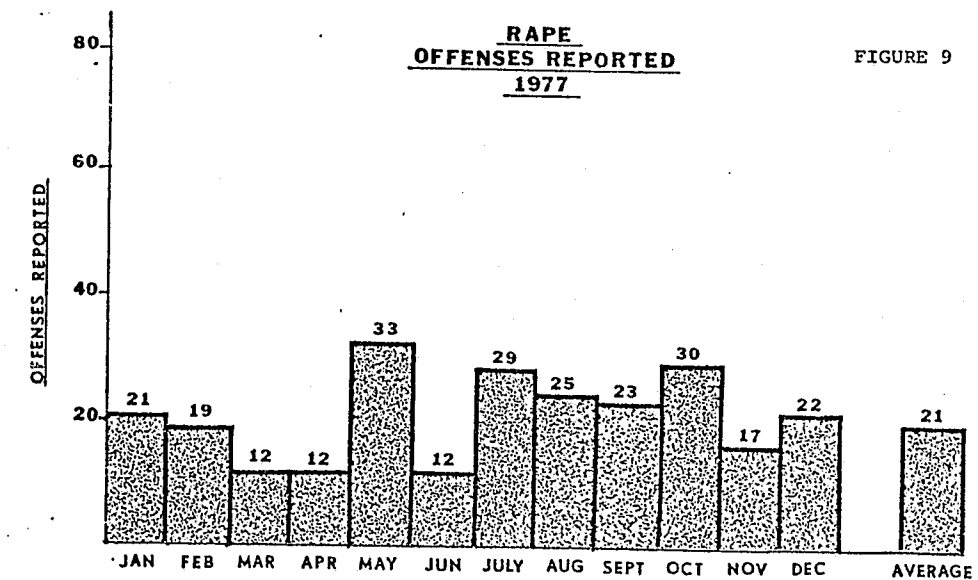

ROBBERY

Definition: Robbery is defined as taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person by force, threat of force, violence, or by putting the victim in fear. It is a vicious type of theft that takes place in the presence of the victim. The victim is directly confronted and threatened with force or the fear that force will be used.

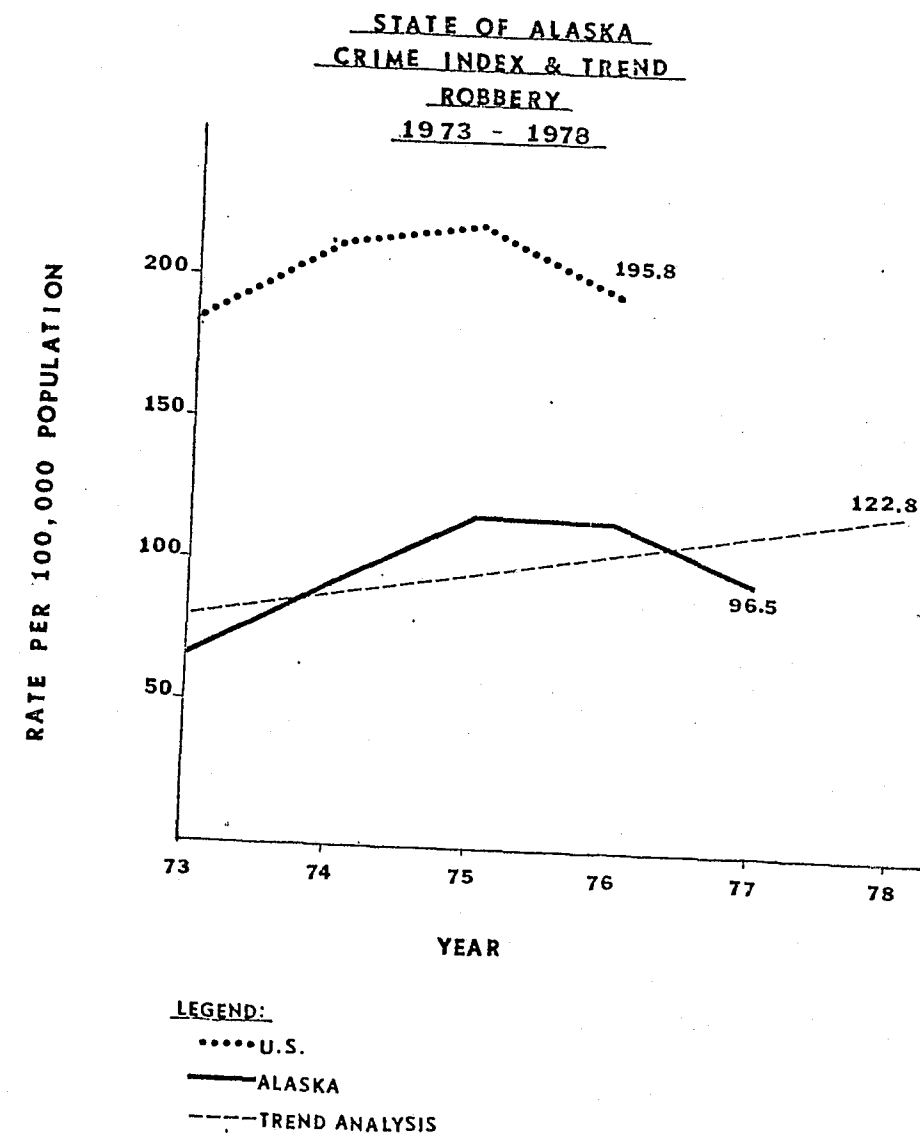
Volume: During 1977, there were 415 robberies reported in Alaska. This is a decrease of 71 from the 486 reported during 1976. Robberies represented twenty-one percent of the total violent crimes and two percent of the total crime index offenses. Table 30 shows that the number of robberies decreased fifteen percent from 1976. Anchorage, Fairbanks and Ketchikan showed decreases of fifteen, fifty-two and sixty-three percent, respectively, while Juneau showed a three hundred sixty-seven percent increase.

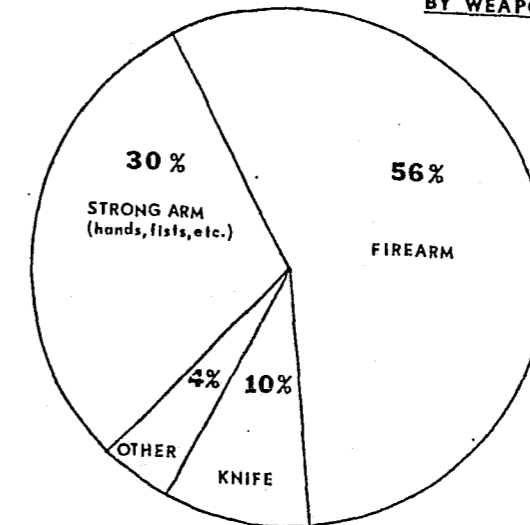

BY WEAPON - 1977

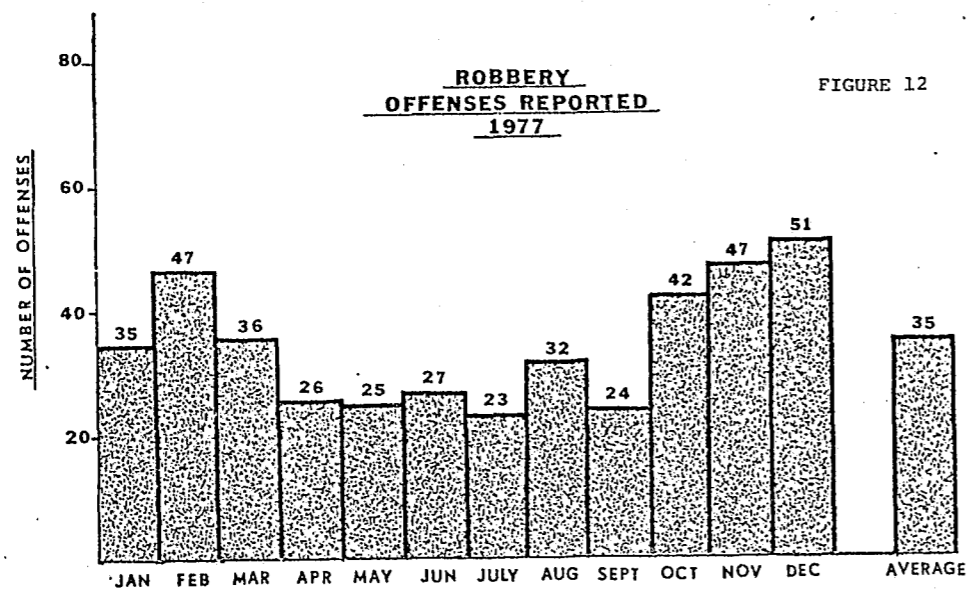

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Definition: Aggravated assault is defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury. It is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since serious personal injury would probably result if the crime was successfully completed. Simple assaults are not included.

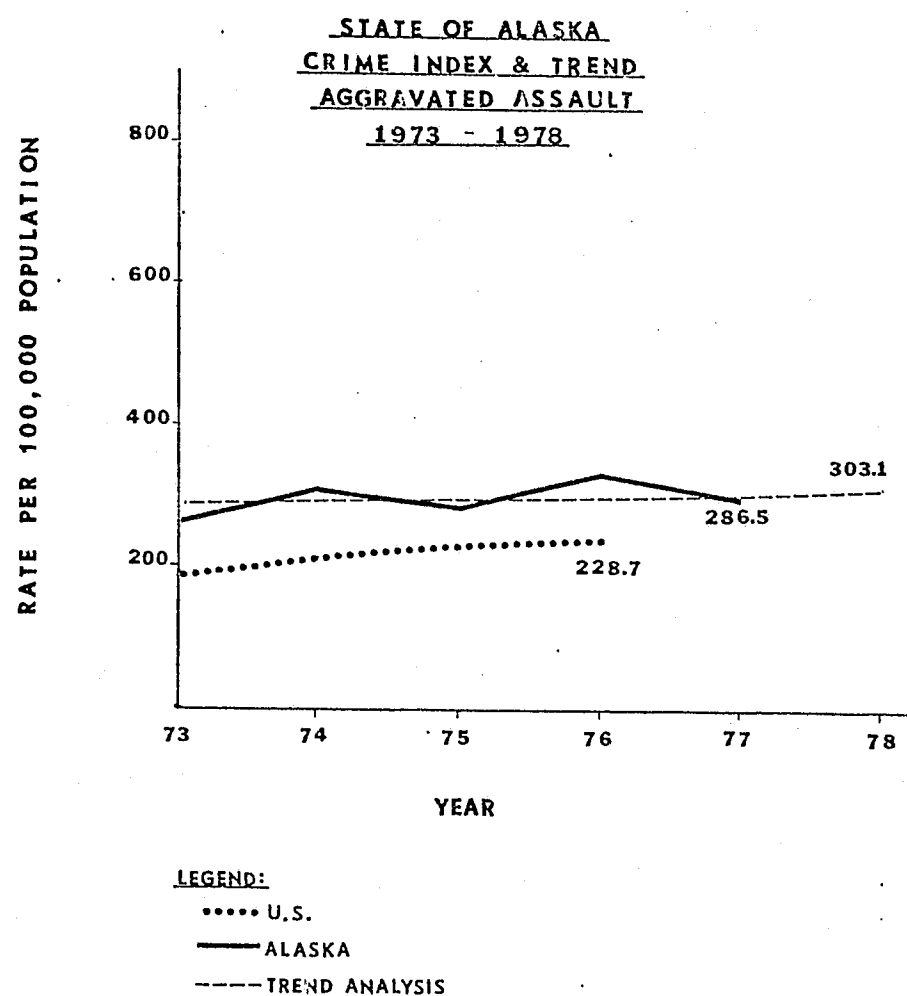
Volume: During 1977, there were 1,232 aggravated assaults reported. This represents a decrease of 32 from the 1,264 in 1976. Aggravated assaults represented sixty-three percent of the total violent crimes and five percent of the total crime index offenses. Table 33 shows that the number of aggravated assaults decreased by three percent from 1976.

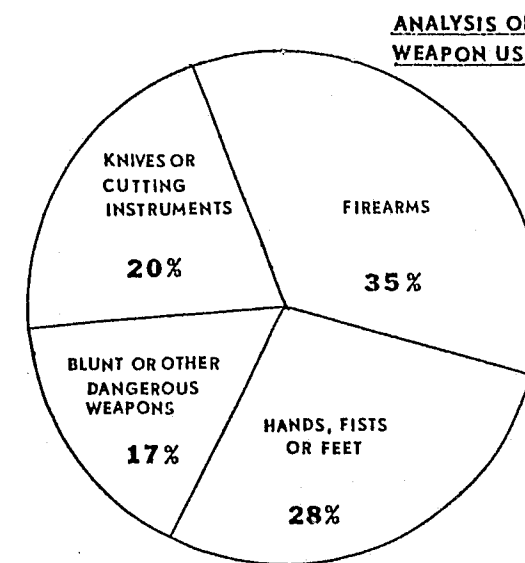

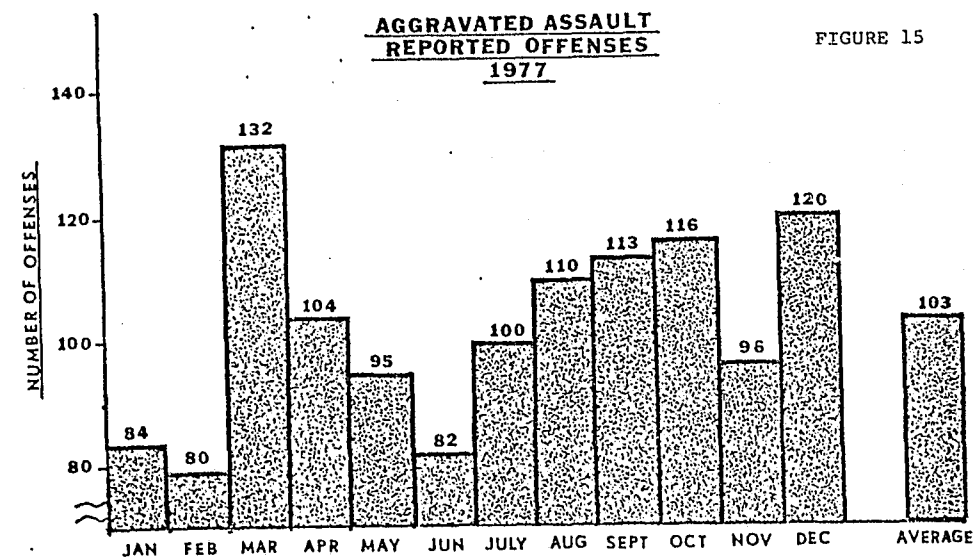
Figure 14 presents the statewide distribution of the weapons used in aggravated assaults.



Clearance Rate: In 1977, sixty-five percent of the actual reported aggravated assaults were cleared by an arrest.

Persons Arrested: Of the persons arrested for aggravated assault, ninety-two percent were males and eight percent females. Eleven percent were under the age of 18, thirty-three percent between the ages of 18 and 24, and fifty-six percent were 25 or older. Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, eight percent black, nineteen percent indian and twenty percent all other races.

Offenses Reported: Figure 15 indicates the months in which the aggravated assaults were reported.



BURGLARY

Definition: Burglary is defined as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. This includes entry involving force of any kind, entry using no force, and attempted entry involving force of any kind.

Volume: During 1977, there were 5,634 reported burglaries in Alaska. This was an increase of 1,096 over the 4,538 reported during 1976. Burglaries represented twenty-four percent of the total property crimes and twenty-three percent of the total crime index offenses. Table 35 shows that the number of burglaries increased twenty-four percent over 1976. Anchorage, Ketchikan and the smaller cities showed increases. Burglaries in Fairbanks decreased and Juneau showed no change.

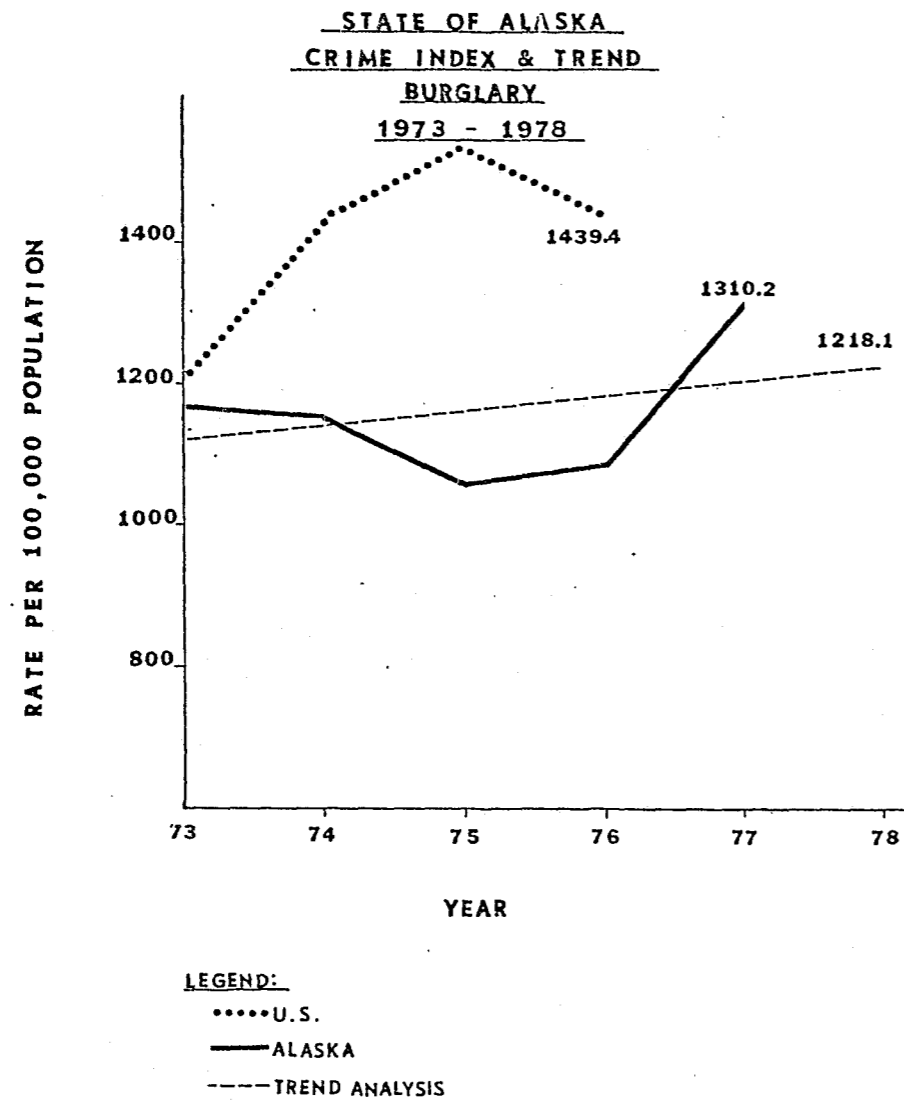

Trend: During 1977, there were 1,310.2 burglaries per 100,000 Alaskans. This is an increase of twenty-one percent over the 1,080.5 rate for 1976. Figure 16 indicates a predicted rate of 1218.1 for 1978 which is a decrease of seven percent.

Nature of Burglary: In 1977, the majority of the burglaries involved forcible entry into a structure. The distribution among forcible entry, unlawful entry and attempted entry is almost identical to 1976's distribution. The only difference is slight increase in the proportion of unlawful entries where no force was necessary to enter the structure.

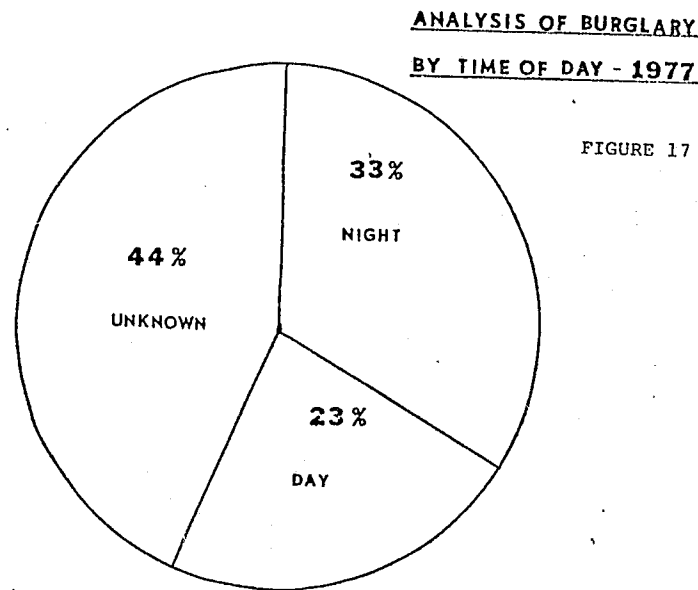

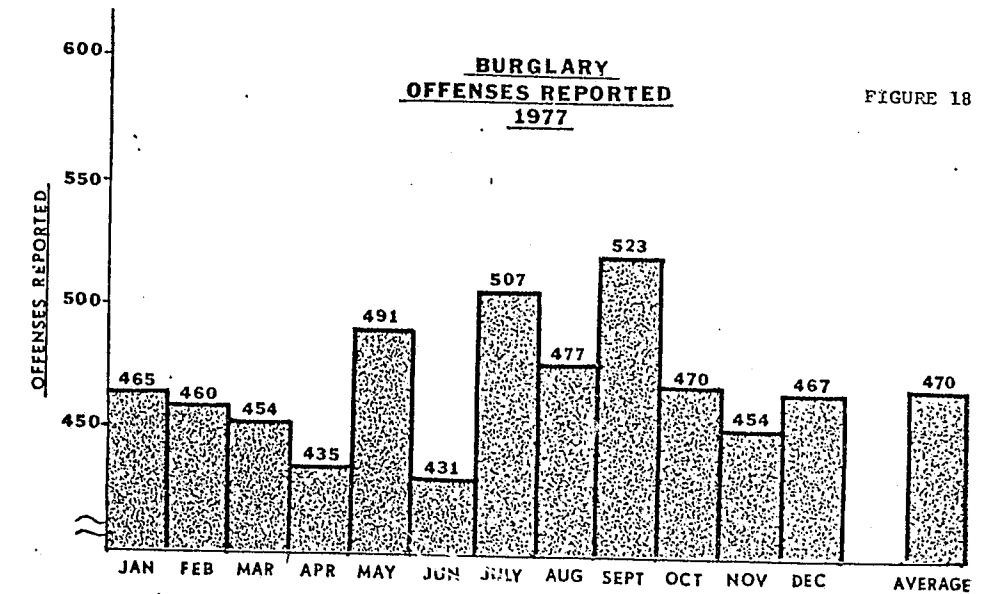

Clearance Rate: During 1977, seventeen percent of the actual reported burglaries were cleared by an arrest.

Persons Arrested: Of the persons arrested for burglary, ninety-three percent were males and seven percent were females. Sixty-three percent were under the age of 18, twenty-nine percent between the ages of 18 and 24, and eight percent 25 or older. Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, four percent black, seventeen percent indian and seventeen percent all other races.

Offenses Reported: Figure 18 indicates the months in which the burglaries were reported.



LARCENY-THEFT

Definition: Larceny-theft is defined as the unlawful taking of property without the use of force, violence, or fraud. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, theft of motor vehicle parts, and bicycle theft.

Volume: During 1977, there were 14,072 larceny-thefts reported in Alaska. This represents an increase of 255 over the 13,817 in 1976. Larceny-thefts represented sixty-one percent of the total property crimes and fifty-six percent of the total crime index offenses. Table 39 shows that the number of larcenies increased two percent over 1976. Ketchikan and the smaller reporting areas showed increases. Fairbanks and Juneau showed decreases and Anchorage showed no change.

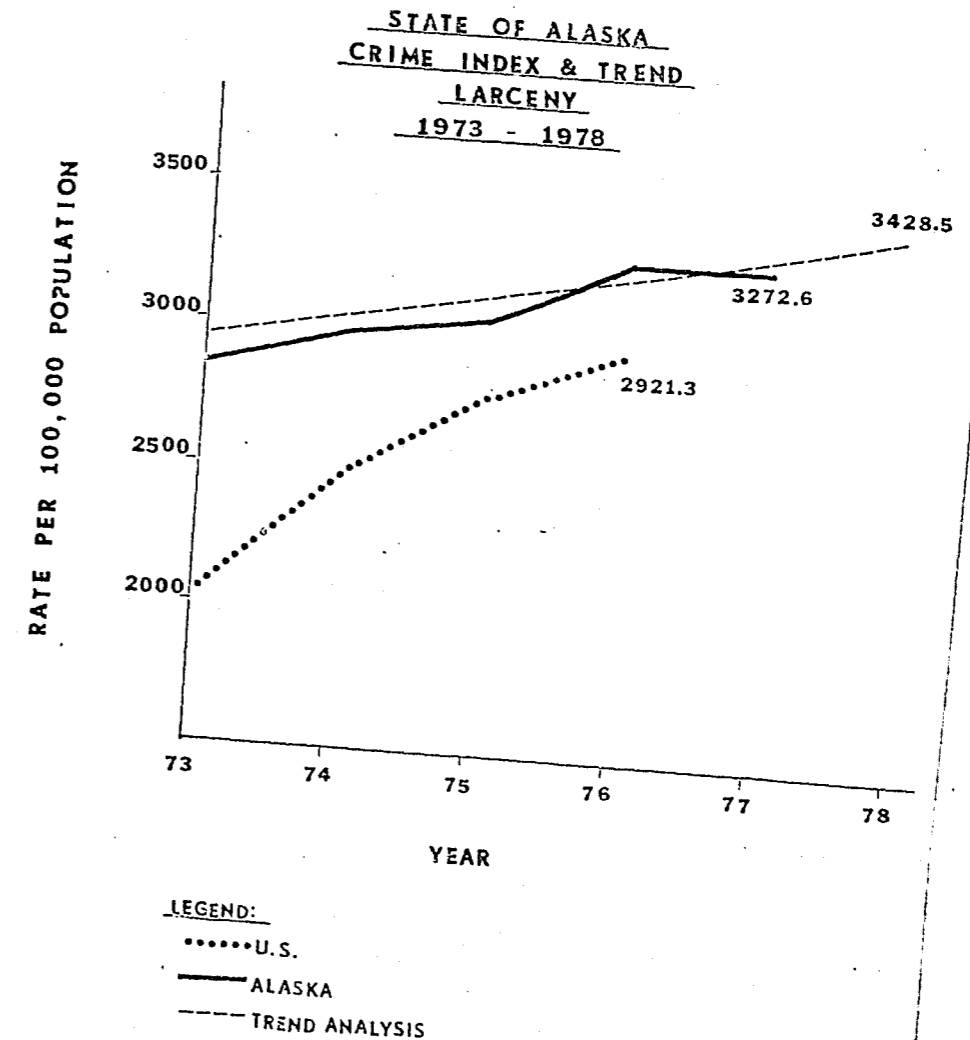

Trend: In 1977, there were 3272.6 larcenies for every 100,000 Alaskans. This is a decrease of one percent from the 3289.8 rate for 1976. Figure 19 indicates a predicted rate of 3428.5 for 1978 which is an increase of five percent.

Nature of Larceny-Theft: During 1977, the majority of the larceny-thefts were from buildings (24%), shoplifting (18%) and from motor vehicles (19%). The average value of the property stolen was \$308 with total losses of \$4,183,540. Pocket-picking had the greatest loss per incident with \$405 and shoplifting had the lowest with \$32.

Persons Arrested: Of the persons arrested for larceny-theft, 74 percent were males and twenty-six percent were females. Fifty-four percent were under the age of 18, twenty-five percent between the ages of 18 and 24, and twenty-one percent were 25 or older. Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, six percent black, eighteen percent indian, and four percent all other races.

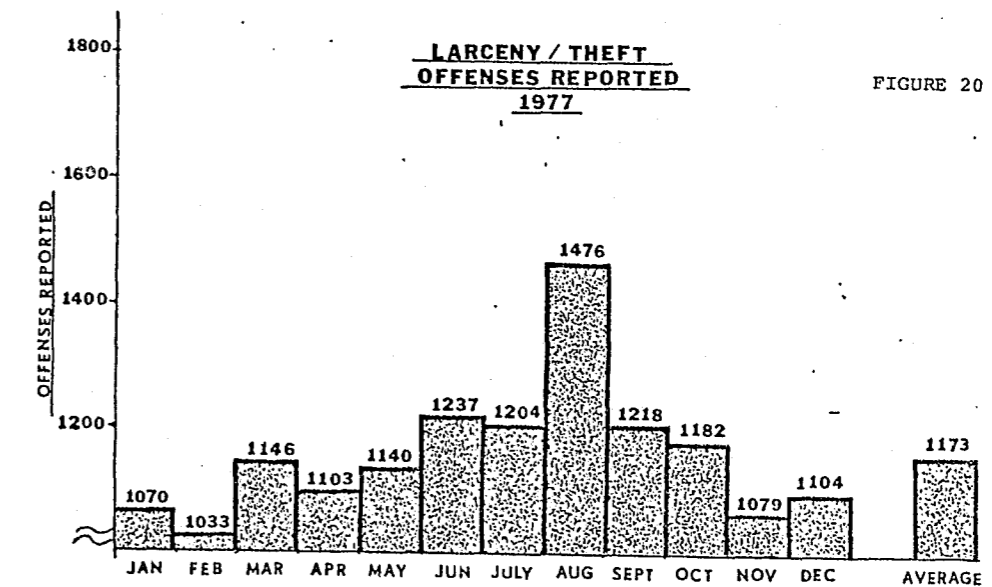

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition: Motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Volume: During 1977, there were 3,370 motor vehicles reported stolen in Alaska. This represents an increase of 323 over the 3,047 reported during 1976. Motor vehicle thefts represented fifteen percent of the total property crimes and thirteen percent of the total crime index offenses. Table 42 shows that the number of motor vehicle thefts increased eleven percent over 1976. There were increases in Anchorage and the smaller reporting areas. Decreases occurred in Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketchikan.

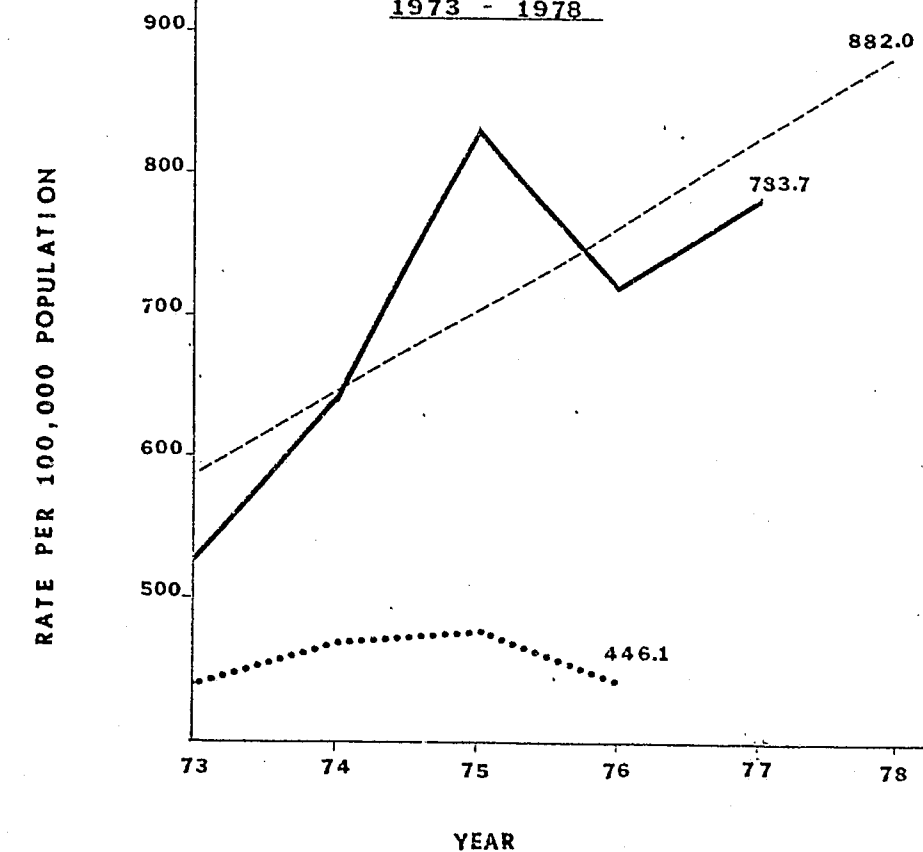

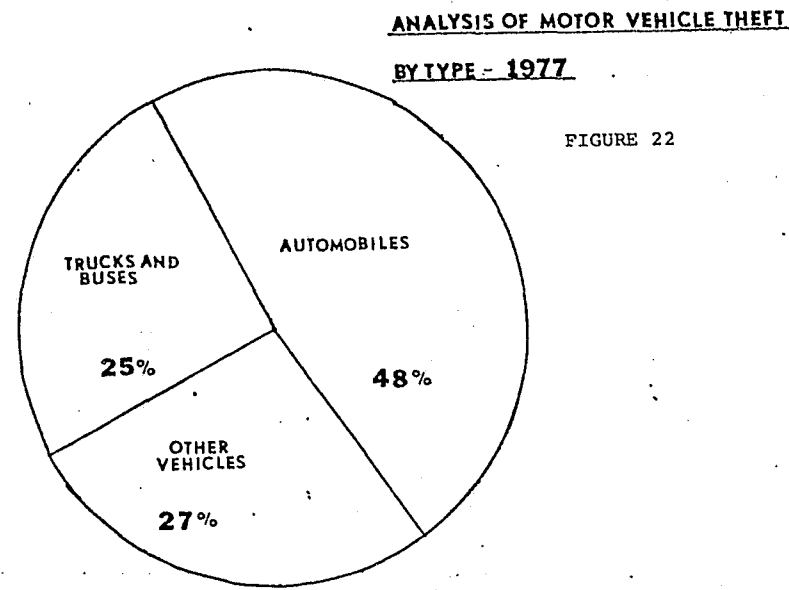
Nature of Motor Vehicle theft: During 1977, forty-eight percent of the motor vehicles stolen were automobiles, twenty-five percent trucks or buses and twenty-seven percent other vehicles such as snowmobiles and motorcycles. The total value of the property stolen was \$5,891,002 with an average of \$1,926 per vehicle.

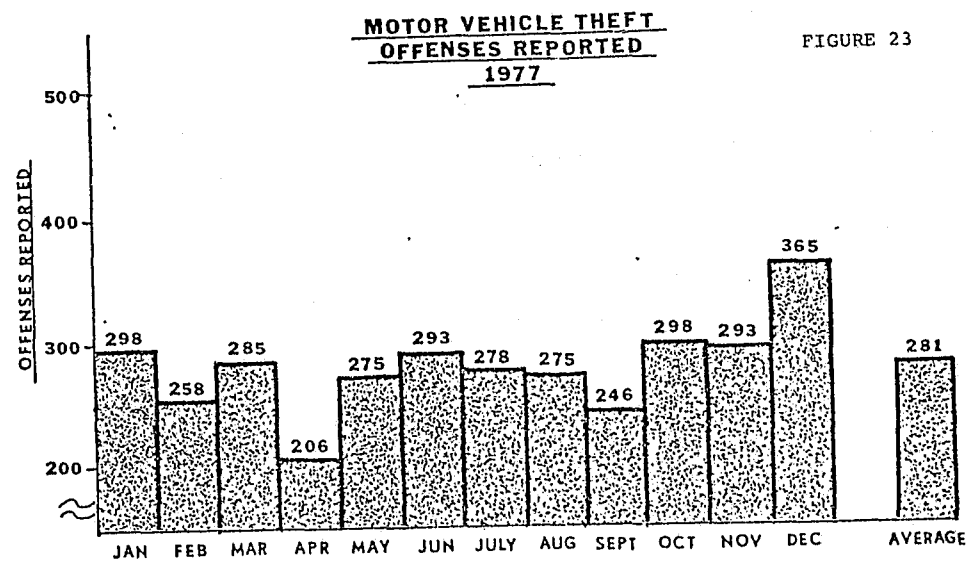

Clearance Rate: In 1977, twelve percent of the actual reported motor vehicle thefts were cleared by an arrest.

Persons Arrested: Of the persons arrested for motor vehicle theft, ninety-three percent involved males and seven percent females. Fifty-six percent were under the age of 18, thirty-one percent between the ages of 18 and 24 and thirteen percent were 25 or older. Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, four percent black, twenty-two percent indian and ten percent all other races.

Offenses Reported: Figure 23 indicates the months in which the motor vehicle thefts were reported.



PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED

Table 44 presents the value of the property stolen during 1977 while Crime Index offenses were being committed and the value of the goods which were recovered. Stolen motor vehicles accounted for forty percent of the total value stolen. This category was followed by miscellaneous goods (26%); currency, notes, etc. (10%), jewelry and precious metals (9%), and T.V., radios, cameras (7%).

The analysis of the value of the property recovered shows that motor vehicles had the greatest recovery rate with seventy-three percent. This was followed by miscellaneous goods (21%), clothing and furs (19%), firearms (18%) and currency, notes, etc. (13%).

Overall, \$13,635,931 worth of goods were stolen during the commission of Crime Index offenses and \$5,291,892 worth of these goods (39%) were recovered.

PART II CRIMES

As in 1976, the Alaska State Troopers and Juneau Police Department collected and submitted data about reported Part II crimes. The State Troopers jurisdiction covers a wide cross-section of the state's population and therefore is indicative of the statewide relationship between Part I and Part II crimes.

Table 45 presents an analysis of the Part I and Part II crimes reported to the State Troopers during 1975-1977. During 1977, Part I crimes accounted for fifty-five percent and Part II crimes for forty-five percent. The Part I crimes are accounting for an increasing portion of the offenses reported.

Those offenses which account for the majority of the Part II crimes are Driving While Intoxicated (12%), Vandalism (9%), Other Offenses (7%), Other Assaults (5%), Narcotic Drug Violations (2%), Carrying or Possession of Weapons (2%), and Embezzlement or Fraud (2%). The remainder represent one percent or less.

Those offenses which showed an increase over their contribution in 1976 are Driving While Intoxicated (+1%) and Vandalism (+1%). Narcotic Drug Violations and Other Offenses showed decreases of one and two percent, respectively. All other offenses stayed at the same rate of contribution.

Table 46 presents the distribution of the offenses reported to the Juneau Police Department. Part I crimes accounted for twenty-two percent and Part II crimes for seventy-eight percent of the total offenses reported during 1977. This distribution is radically different from 1976's but identical to 1975's.

During 1977, those offenses which accounted for the largest proportions were Disorderly Conduct (29%), Other Offenses (12%), Vandalism (9%), Liquor Law Violations (9%), Other Assaults (8%), Driving While Intoxicated (5%) and Narcotic Drug Violations (2%).

Those offenses which showed increases were Disorderly Conduct (+12%), Other Assaults (+6%), and Other Offenses (+2%). Narcotic Drug Violations (-2%), Vandalism (-2%), Liquor Law Violations (-1%) and Driving While Intoxicated (-1%) showed decreases.

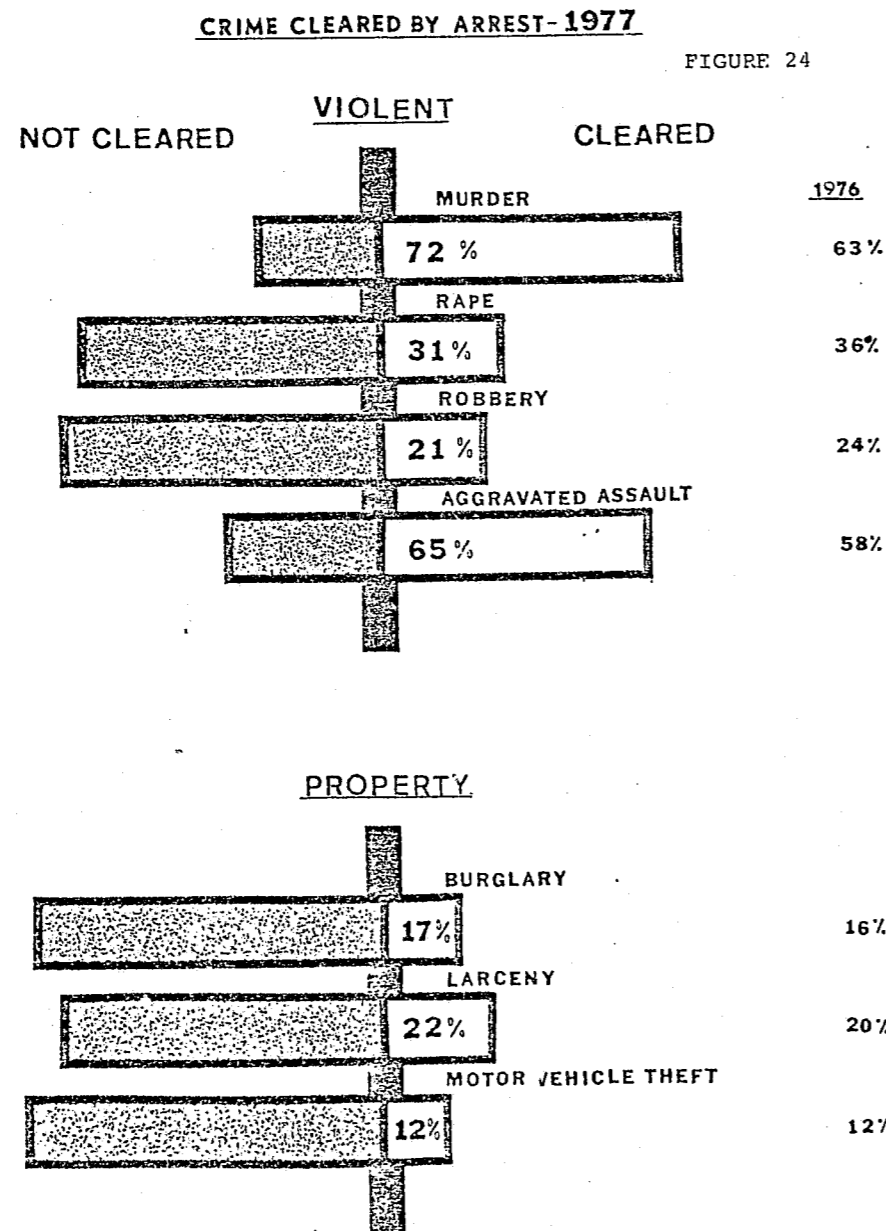

**CLEARANCE RATES
PART I OFFENSES**

During 1977, twenty-two percent of the actual reported offenses were cleared by arrest. This is more meaningful when viewed from the violent and property categories. Violent crimes had a fifty-one percent clearance rate while property crimes had a nineteen percent rate. Police are able to clear a higher percent of violent crimes because they receive more intensive investigative efforts and witnesses are usually available to identify offenders.

Figure 24 presents a graphic description of the clearance rates for 1977 and compares them to the 1976 rates. Table 47 presents a more detailed analysis.

Clearance Rates
Part II Offenses

During 1977, the Alaska State Troopers and the Juneau Police Department compiled the data necessary to compute the clearance rates for Part II offenses. As the State Troopers jurisdiction covers a wide and representative sample of the State's population, this data should be indicative of the rates for the entire state.

Table 48 shows that the Troopers clearance rate for Part II offenses was 60% in 1977 as compared with 59% in 1976. Those offenses with the highest rates were vagrancy (100%) Driving While Intoxicated (99%), Drunkenness and Disorderly Conduct (89%), Prostitution and Vice (88%). Those offenses with the lowest rates were Vandalism (16%), Arson (25%), Gambling (33%), and Other Offenses (39%).

Drug and Alcohol Related Arrests

Alcohol and drug-related crimes comprised 46% of the statewide arrests for 1977, but alcohol accounted for far more arrests than other drugs. Alcoholism and alcohol abuse are two of the state's most publicized problems. Every citizen is affected in some way by these problems if only in the taxes he or she pays to maintain the services necessary to deal with these problems.

Although the State's data is still deficient in many areas regarding alcohol abuse, efforts are now being made to correct the deficiency. With the new reporting forms the Criminal Justice Planning Agency is designing, the State will have sounder data to evaluate how much alcoholism and alcohol abuse impact the Criminal Justice System. Until that time approximations such as those in the following charts will have to suffice.

The statewide adult and juvenile drug arrests reported to the Criminal Justice Planning Agency decreased by 13% from 920 in 1976 to 797 in 1977. Adult arrests decreased by 28% from 560 to 403. Juvenile arrests increased by 9% from 360 to 394.

Adult arrests for possession of opium or cocaine and their derivatives increased by 4% from 54 to 56. Arrests for marijuana decreased by 6% from 220 to 206. Synthetic narcotic arrests decreased by 44% from nine to five. There was also a 57% reduction in arrests from 49 to 21 for other dangerous non-narcotics.

Adult arrests for the sale of drugs decreased in 1977. Arrests for the sale of opium or cocaine and their derivatives decreased by 56% from 101 to 44. Arrests for marijuana decreased by 32% from 93 to 63. Synthetic narcotic arrests decreased by 75% from eight to two, and arrests for other dangerous non-narcotic drugs decreased by 77% from twenty-six to six.

Juvenile arrests for possession of opium or cocaine and their derivatives decreased by 43% from seven to four arrests. Possession of marijuana increased by 22% from 276 to 337. There was an increase in possession of synthetic narcotics of 400% from one to five arrests and an increase in arrests for other dangerous non-narcotic drugs from eight arrests to nine (13%).

Arrests remained the same (three) for sale of opium or cocaine and their derivatives. They decreased by 50% from 60 to 30 for the sale of marijuana. Synthetic narcotic arrests increased by 300% from one to four. Arrests for the sale of other dangerous non-narcotic drugs decreased by 50% from four to two.

Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted

During 1977, 188 law enforcement officers were assaulted in Alaska --- an increase of 15% over 1976. 66 (35%) of these assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls. 47 (25%) occurred while officers were attempting other arrests. Of the officers assaulted, 29 (15%) sustained personal injury.

40 (21%) of the assaults took place between 12:01-2:00 a.m., 28 (15%) between 4:00-6:00 a.m., 26 (14%) between 8:00-10:00 p.m., 22 (12%) between both 2:00-4:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.-12:00 p.m.

138 (73%) of the assaults occurred while the officer was in a one-man vehicle. 35 (19%) occurred while the officer was in a two-man vehicle.
