

#### BACKGROUND OF UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

#### NATIONAL UCR PROGRAM

Development of the current nationwide Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program began nearly it..., years ago. In 1930, crime counts were first requested from local police departments with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) designated by Congress to collect, compile and analyze the statistics. The Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) played a primary role in the origin and development of UCR and today serves in a strong advisory capacity. Standardized offense classification and counting procedures developed by the IACP are the basis for the UCR program. The National Sheriffs' Association (NSA) also serves in an advisory role to the national program. The publication, Crime in the United States, is the annual report by the FBI dealing with national crime statistics.

In recent years the FBI has actively assisted states in the development of state level UCR programs compatible with the national system.

#### SOUTH CAROLINA UCR PROGRAM

South Carolina was one of the first states to implement an operational state UCR program. The South Carolina Law Enforcement Division is the agency administering the program. The information collected and the uniform classifications under which it is collected are based directly upon the guidelines developed by the IACP and FBI.

Upon initiation of the South Carolina GCR program in July 1973, SLED in conjunction with the FBI, held workshops around the state to instruct or refresh the county and city law enforcement agencies on the scope of the program and the mechanics of completing the forms.

Since that time, SLED, along with the local law enforcement agencies, has instituted an incident-based records management system which has greatly enhanced and improved the quality of information gathered under the Uniform Crime Reports system. Under this new procedure crime data and other information gathered by municipal and county law enforcement agencies is collected and submitted to SLED on a daily, monthly and annual basis. This new system lends itself to a more complete and accurate crime reporting system which in most instances alleviates some of the paperwork with which many departments are now burdened. An additional advantage of using standard incident and booking reports will be realized from the uniformity of forms. Standardized reports facilitate the exchange of information between law enforcement agencies within the state. The forms have been included in the report writing classes taught at the South Carolina Criminal Justice Academy.

#### **ROBJECTIVES**

The fundamental objectives of the South Carolina Uniform Crime Reporting Program are:

- (1) To inform the Governor, Legislature, other governmental officials and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in South Carolina.
- (2) To provide law enforcement administrators with criminal statistics for administrative and other operational use.
- (3) To determine who commits crimes by age, sex, race and other attributes in order to find the proper focus for crime prevention and enforcement.
- (4) To provide base data and statistics to help measure the workload and effectiveness of the criminal justice system.
- (5) To provide base data and statistics for research to improve the efficiency, effectiveness and performance of criminal justice agencies.

A particular important goal of the state UCR program is is to return statistical information back to its contributors. With the implementation of the new incident reporting system, participating police agencies furnish data that are verified, analyzed and then returned to each jurisdiction in the form of monthly printouts. With the completion of the annual report, contributing agencies possess detailed information showing crime trends within their jurisdictions. This enables them to make important decisions in budgeting, manpower allocations and the identification of high crime areas.

This information is also forwarded by SLED to the FBI on a monthly basis for inclusion in the FBI's annual UCR publication.

#### REPORTING AND CLASSIFICATION

in reporting offenses to the Uniform Crime Reports program, offenses are classified according to standard defit ons (given in a later section of the report) that are used throughout the nation. The UCR definitions are deuned to insure that offenses with different titles under state and law are appropriately counted under the JCR program without regard to findings of courts or juries, since the statistics are gathered primarily to assist in sentifying areas of concern to law enforcement officers, and not meant to reflect the outcomes of inquests, earings or trials.

#### CRIME FACTORS

The presence of crime in our state's communities is a serious concern not only of the law enforcement profession, but of society at large. Historically, the causes and origins of crime have been the subjects of investigation by many disciplines, However, no definitive conclusions have yet been reached, Instead, a number of factors affecting the volume and type of crime that occurs from place to place have been delineated. Some of these are as follows:

> Density and size of community population and its surrounding area. Variations in composition of the population, particularly age structure.

Stability of population with respect to transient factors. Economic conditions, including job availability.

Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.

Climate.

Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.

Administrative and investigative emphasis of law enforcement.

Policies of other components of criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial,

correctional, and probational).

Attitudes of citizentry toward crime.

Crime reporting practices of citizenry.

These and other crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community, and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should no be made without first considering the individual factors present in each com-

Police cannot shoulder the entire burden of fighting crime. The same is true of the courts, correction agencies, and any other elements of the criminal justice system. Real progress against crime can be attained only when each individual recognizes that crime prevention is his personal responsibility, and acts accordingly.

#### SOUTH CAROLINA CRIME INDEX

The tabulation presented in the tables, graphs, and charts in this publication indicate the volume, fluctuation, and distribution of crime in South Carolina on the basis of a crime index. The crime figures are categorized by agency, county and state on the basis of information submitted by police agencies from these areas. The seven offenses comprising the Crime Index are:

1 Murder

3. Robbery

5. Breaking Or Entering 7. Motor Vehicle Theft

2 Rape

4. Aggravated Assault

6. Larceny

Definitions of these seven offenses can be found elsewhere in this book under their separate headings.

The Crime Index is used as a basic measure of crime. The crimes were selected for use as an index on the basis of their serious nature, their frequency of occurrence and the reliability of reporting from citizens to law enforcement agencies. The offense of murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault are categorized as violent crimes. Offenses of breaking or entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft are classed as nonviolent crime. The crime index is the total of actual offenses that forme to the attention of law enforcement agencies.

In reviewing crime index figures the reader should keep in mind that there is currently no way of secermining the total number of crimes committed. The crime index has been established to measure only the instances of crime which come to the attention of law enforcement agencies. It is important to remember in reviewing the tables and graphs in this report that the volume of crime in a given area or municipality is related to the crime factors previously listed in this report.

#### CRIME RATES

The crime rate indicates the number of Index Crimes per unit of population, generally per 10,000. It should be noted that the rate only takes into consideration the numerical factor of population and does not incorporate any of the other elements which contribute to the amount of crime in a given community. The effect of changes in population on rates should be kept in mind when attempting to make a comparison of crime rates.

The population data used in this report are taken from the Federal-State Cooperative Program for Population Extimates. The figures are based upon final population counts available from the U.S.Bureau of Census, April 1, 1980.

#### PERCENT CHANGE

The percent changes in numbers of offenses and arrests from year to year are shown in a number of tables in this publication. The percent change shown after any 1979 figures reflect a comparison to information reported in

#### VIOLENT CRIME

Crime of violence include murder, rape robbery and aggravated assault, Violent crimes involve the element of personal confrontation between the victim and the offender and, because of their nature, are generally considered to be more serious than nonviolent crimes.

#### NONVIOLENT CRIME

For UCR purposes, nonviolent crimes include the offense of breaking or entering, larceny and motor vehicle theft. While these offenses generally do not involve personal danger to the victim, the value of property lost in these crimes is many times greater than violent crimes.

#### ARSON


The offense of arson, defined for UCR purposes as any willful and malicious burning of any type of property. is published in this report. It has not been included in any trend data, since 1980 was the first full year during which collection of arson data was attempted in South Carolina. Arson counts can be found in the section "Crime by County and Agency" as well as the "Arson" section,

#### PERCENT ROUNDING

Percentages shown in this publication may not add to 100 due to rounding.

#### **UPDATED DATA**

Any data published here concerning figures for prior years supersede those in previous reports.



The crime clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative requency of occurrence of the Index Offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of the Part I Offenses; rather it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

## CLEARANCE RATES

For crime reporting purposes, a crime index offense is cleared when a law enforcement agency has identified the offender, there is enough evidence to charge him and he is actually taken into custody. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of clearing one crime. Crime solutions are also recorded in exceptional circumstances when some element beyond law ment control precludes formal charges against the offender.

For the 1981 reporting period, 23.6 percent of all Index Crimes were cleared. The percentage of violent crimes classared was 59.1 percent, while the clearance rate for nonviolent crimes was 18.8 percent. These figures compare with a total clearance rate of 22.0 percent of all Index Offenses, a violent crime clearance rate of 56.2 percent, and nonviolent crime clearance of 17.3 percent for the year 1980.



## MURDER



Murder is defined as the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another except those cases classified as justifiable homicide. Under the UCR definition, justifiable homicides are specifically limited to the killing of an offender by a police officer in the line of duty or the killing of a felon by a private citizen. This definition does not take into consideration the findings of coroners' juries or other courts. Suicides are not defined as murders under UCR. Attempts to commit murder are classified as aggravated assaults.

#### 1981 SUMMARY

Firearms were used in 68.6 percent of the murders, cutting instruments in 16.6 percent, other weapons in 10.3 percent, hands and feet in 4.5 percent.

Males accounted for 78.9 percent of murder victims, females 21.1 percent, whites 45.3 percent and blacks 54.7 percent. Victims in the age range of 25 through 34 years accounted for 34 percent.


Persons killed during armed robberies accounted for 11.2 percent of all victims.

Alcohol was known to have been present in 30.2 percent of all murders, while drugs were known to have been connected with 5.4 percent of all murders.



## RAPE



Forcible Rape, by UCR definition, is the carnal knowledge of a female through the use or threat of force. Assaults to rape or attempts to commit rape are included in this category. One offense is counted for each victim of rape. Statutory rapes and other types of sexual assaults are not counted as rapes under the UCR program.


### 1981 SUMMARY

During 1981 the number of rapes increased 0.1 percent compared to those reported in 1980. Forcible rape accounted for 70.3 percent and attempted rape 29.7 percent.

In 56.8 percent of all rapes the offender was known to the victim.

Dangerous weapons were employed in 21.2 percent of all rapes.



## ROBBERY



Robbery, for UCR purposes, is defined as the unlawful taking of the property of another through the use or threat of force. Robbery is a violent crime in which the element of personal confrontation between the victim and offender is present. Attempts to rob are included in the robbery count. Armed robberies, those involving weapons, and strong-arm robberies, those not involving weapons, make up the two major categories. One robbery is counted for each distinct operation, regardless of the number of victims present at the time.

#### 1981 SUMMARY

Armed robberies accounted for 60.6 percent of all robberies, while strong-arm accounted for 39.4 percent.

Highway robberies (roads, streets, alleys, etc.) accounted for 35.2 percent of all robberies, while general commercial establishments accounted for 26.7 percent, service stations 5.3 percent, convenience stores 9.2 percent, residences 14.3 percent, banks (including those on bank grounds in which the bank itself was not the target) 1.3 percent and miscellaneous premises 7.9 percent.

Firearms were used in 37.5 percent of all robberies, cutting istruments in 13.9 percent, other dangerous weapons in 9.1 percent and hands, feet, etc. in 39.4 percent.

There were 33 murders reported as occurring during robberies.



## AGGRAVATED ASSAULT



Aggravated Assault, for UCR purposes, is defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another with the intent of inflicting serious bodily injury. Aggravated Assaults are frequently accomplished through the use of or threatened use of dangerous weapons. However, assaults resulting in serious injury from the use of hands or feet also are counted in this category. Attempts to assault are counted here since it is not necessary that injury result whenever a dangerous weapon is employed. Attempts to commit murder are classified under this category. One offense is counted for each victim of agggravated assault.

### 1981 SUMMARY

There were 14,892 aggravated assaults reported during 1981. This offense accounted for 8.9 percent of all index crimes.


Dangerous weapons were used in 88.6 percent of all aggravated assaults, hands and feet in 11.4 percent.

During 1981, aggravated assaults decreased 1.1 percent over those reported in 1980.

## BREAKING OR ENTERING



Breaking or entering for UCR purposes, is defined as the unlawful entry of a structure with intent to commit a felony or theft. It is not necessary that force be used in gaining entry in order for the offense to be classified as an unlawful entry. Neither is it necessary that property loss occur in an unlawful entry or forcible entry for the crime to be counted in this category. Attempts to unlawfully enter a structure are also counted. One offense is counted for each distinct operation.

### 1981 SUMMARY

Of the three categories of breaking or entering, forcible entry accounted for 83.4 percent, unlawfully entry for 8.2 percent and attempted forcible entry for 8.5 percent.


Residential structures accounted for 61.7 percent of these offenses.

## 1981 BREAKING OR ENTERING BY PREMISE AND TIME OF DAY



## LARCENY



Larceny, for UCR purposes, is defined as the unlawful taking of the property of another without the use of force or fraud. Larceny does not have the element of unlawful entry. This offense category includes such crimes as shoplifting, purse-snatching, stealing items from vehicles and the like. Larceny does not include thefts by fraud, forgery, embezzlement or similar crimes. Motor Vehicle thefts fall under a separate category and are not counted as larcenies. Attempts to commit larceny are included in this category. One offense is counted for each distinct operation, regardless of the number of victims.

#### 1981 SUMMARY

Individual offenses of larceny in which property stolen amounted to \$200 or more accounted for 32.4 percent of all larcenies, those in which the value stolen was from \$50 to \$200 accounted for 30.8 percent and those which the value stolen was less than \$50 for 36.8 percent.

Offenses of shoplifting accounted for 12.4 percent of all larcenies, thefts of items from within motor vehicles 12.0 percent and thefts of motor vehicle parts or accessories for 21.9 percent.



## MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT



Motor Vehicle theft, for purposes of UCR, is defined as the theft of a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface of the land but not on rails. Motor vehicles include automobiles, trucks, motorcycles and the like. This category does not include boats, airplanes or specialized items such as farm equipment, tractors, construction equipment, bulldozers, etc. These specialized items are counted under the larceny category. Motor Vehicle theft does not include using a vehicle without the owner's consent if prior consent or lawful access has been granted. Obtaining vehicles through fraud or failure to return rented vehicles are not included in this category. Attempts to steal motor vehicles as well as "joyrides" are counted as motor vehicle thefts. One offense is counted for each vehicle stolen.

#### 1981 SUMMARY

During 1981, the number of reported motor vehicle thefts decreased 7.2 percent over those reported in 1980.

Automobiles accounted for 66.1 percent of this category, trucks and buses for 11.1 percent, and other vehicles (motorcycles, etc.) for 22.8 percent.

Of vehicles originally stolen in South Carolina, there were 4,274 recovered during 1981.



Arson, Under the UCR definition, is the willful and malicious burning or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud, any structure, vehicle, private property or public property of any kind.

The U.S. Congress passed legislation in October of 1978 requiring the collection of data concerning the offense of arson as a Part I Crime Index Offense in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Consequently, during 1979 the South Carolina UCR Program developed its own arson collection program. The reporting of arson data in South Carolina is enhanced by the cooperation of local fire service agencies.

The year 1980 was the first full year South Carolina systematically collected, classified and counted arsons, regardless of whether they occurred in conjunction with other offenses. During that period there were 1,330 arsons reported for a total property loss of approximately \$7,600,000.

## OFFICERS ASSAULTED



During 1981 there were 963 assaults upon law enforcement officers, an increase of 0.7 percent from those reported during 1980. Of these, 38.0 percent occurred while the officers were responding to disturbance calls, 23.6 percent while the officers were attempting to make general arrests, 14.3 percent while making traffic stops and 7.6 percent while investigating suspicious persons.

Of the 963 officers assaulted, 8.0 percent were assaulted with firearms, 4.3 percent with cutting instruments, 8.4 percent with other weapons and 79.3 percent with hands, feet, etc.

Some degree of injury was sustained by 16.7 percent of officers assaulted, 75.2 percent of these injuries caused by hands, feet, etc.

Of the 963 assaults on officers, 42.4 percent occurred between the hours of 8:00 PM and 2:00 AM.



## 1981 OFFICERS ASSAULTED BY ACTIVITY





During 1981 no South Carolina police officers were willfully killed in the line of duty.

## ARRESTS

The Uniform Crime Reports Program requires a daily reporting of data concerning persons arrested in the state. Records of arrests for criminal acts in both Part I and II crime classes are received from state, county and municipal law enforcement agencies in South Carolina and are classified by offense category and arranged according to age, sex and race of persons arrested. Traffic arrests, except driving under the influence, are not reported. A total of 144,019 arrests for Part I and Part II crimes was reported during the year 1981, a 2.7 percent increase from the 140,185 arrests reported for the year 1980.

A person is counted on the arrest report each time he is arrested or summoned. It should be kept in mind that the volume of arrests may vary from time to time due to differences in local arrest procedures and policies. It should be noted that a person may be arrested several times during a given month for the same or different offenses. This occurs frequently for such crimes as public drunk, disorderly conduct and similar violations. A juvenile is counted as "arrested" when the circumstances are such that if he or she were an adult, an arrest would be counted, or when law enforcement action or other official action is taken beyond a mere interview, warning or admonishment.

When reviewing arrests figures it should be remembered that arrest counts do not reflect the specific number of persons arrested since as has been pointed out, one individual may be arrested several times during any given month or year. However arrest data is useful in measuring the extent of law enforcement activity in a given geographical area as well as providing an index for measuring involvement in criminal acts by the age sex and race of the offenders

Analysis of reported arrests for the year 1981 indicates that 19.9 percent of all arrests during the year were for Part I offenses (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, breaking or entering, larceny, motor vehicle theft). Arrests for larceny comprised the highest percentage of Part I arrests, amounting to 51.1 percent, while arrest for drunkenness comprised 25.1 percent of Part II arrests. Persons arrested for alcohol and drug violations constituted 43.5 percent of all arrests made during the calendar year 1981.
