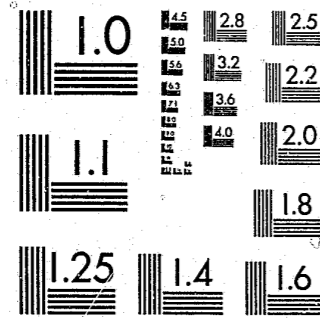

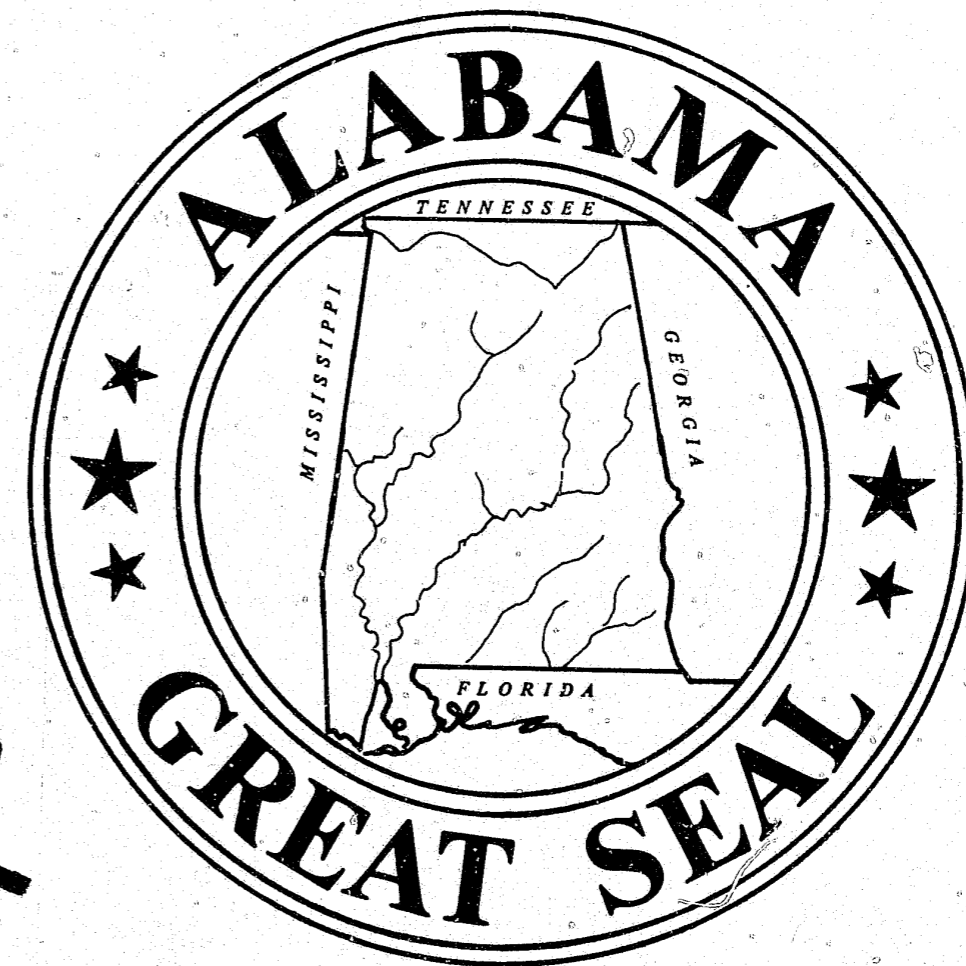


Dear Governor James:

POPULATION PROJECTIONS

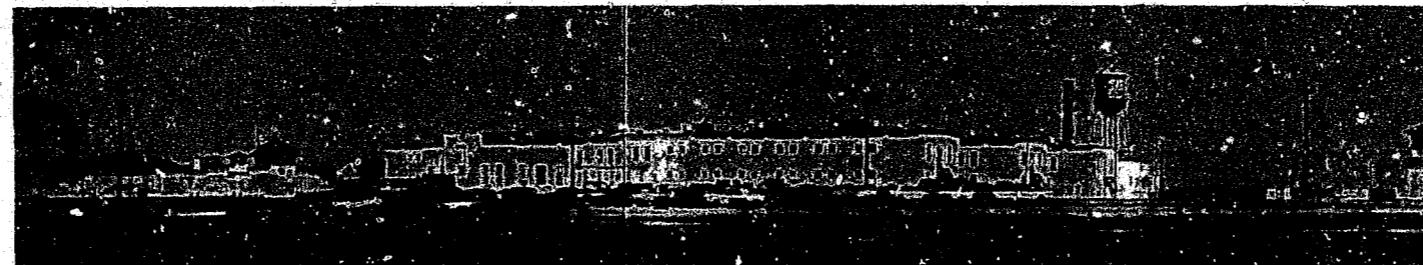

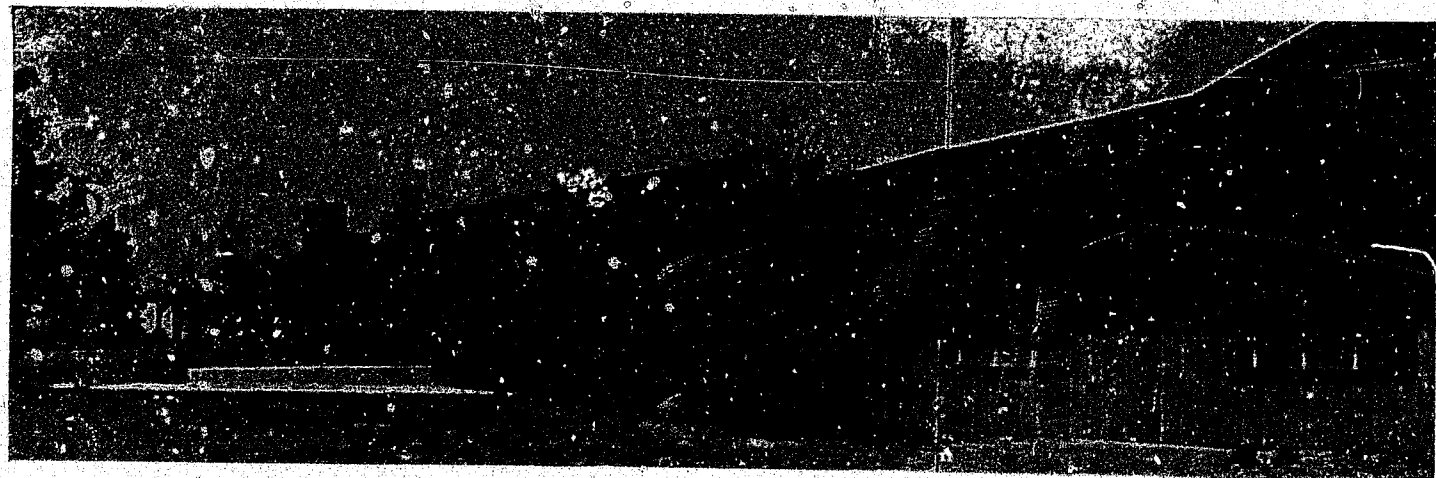

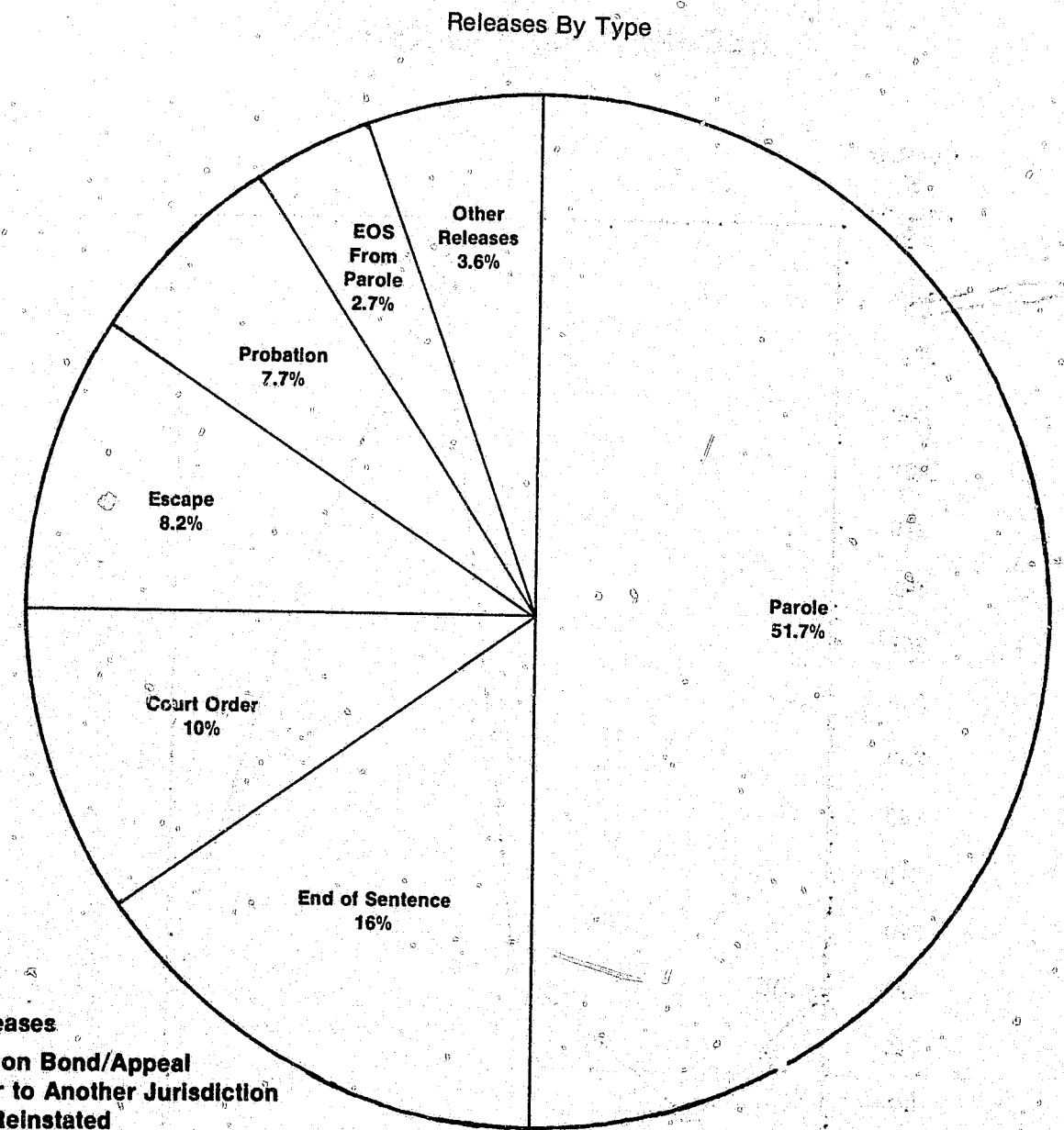
Inmate Population—Five Year Period



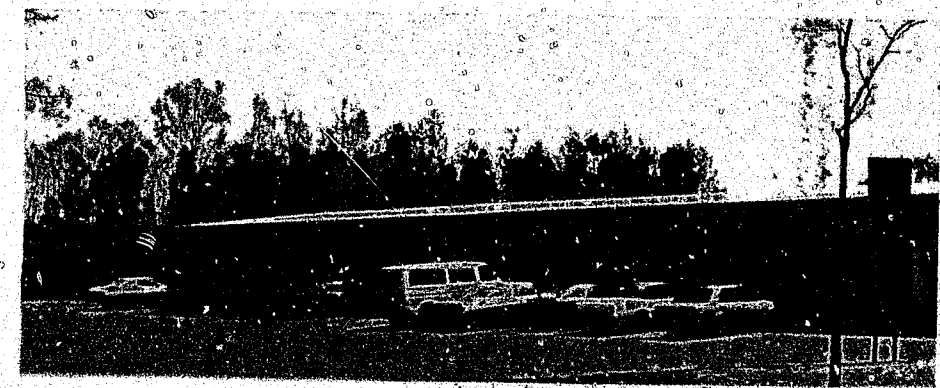

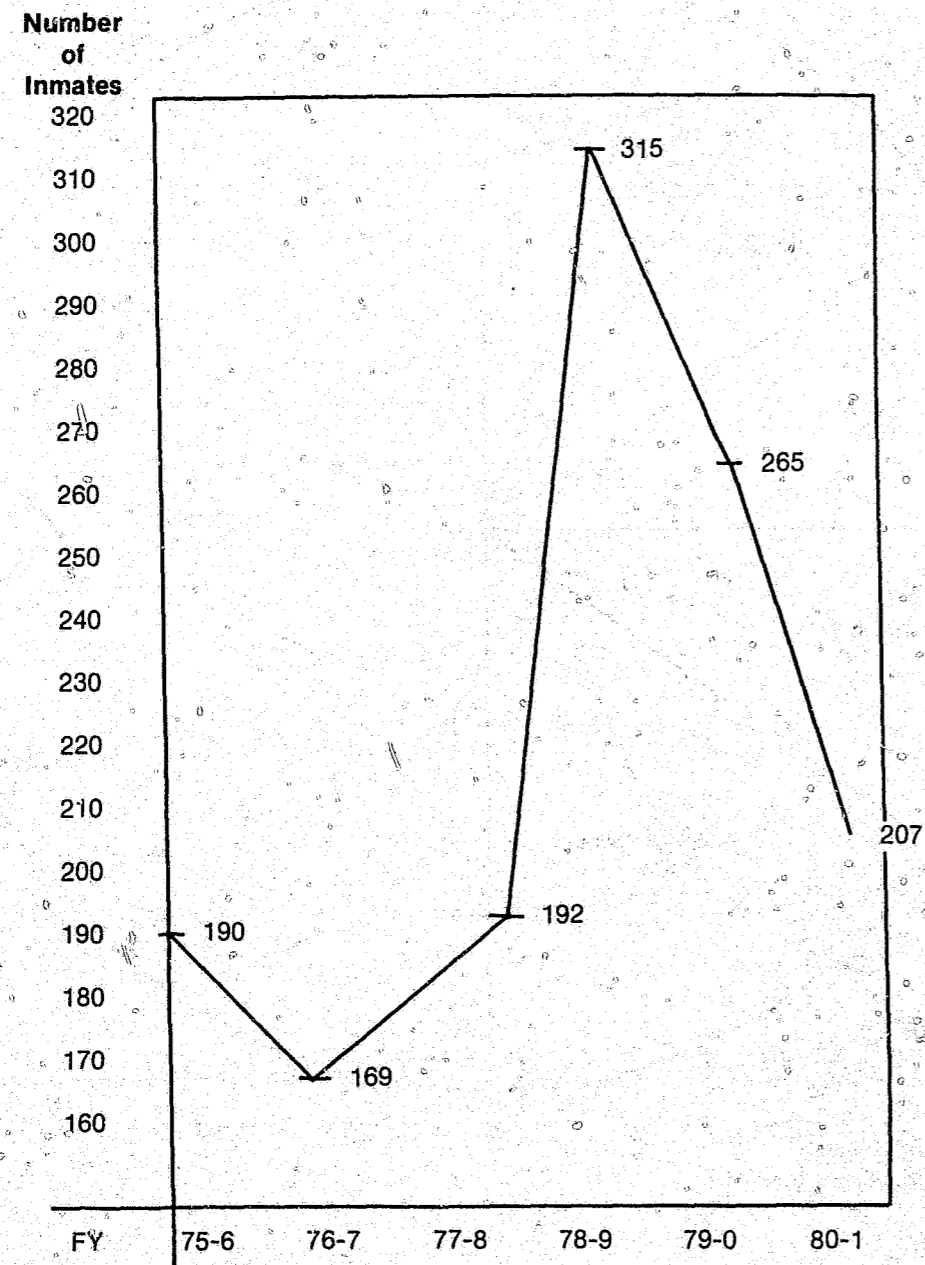

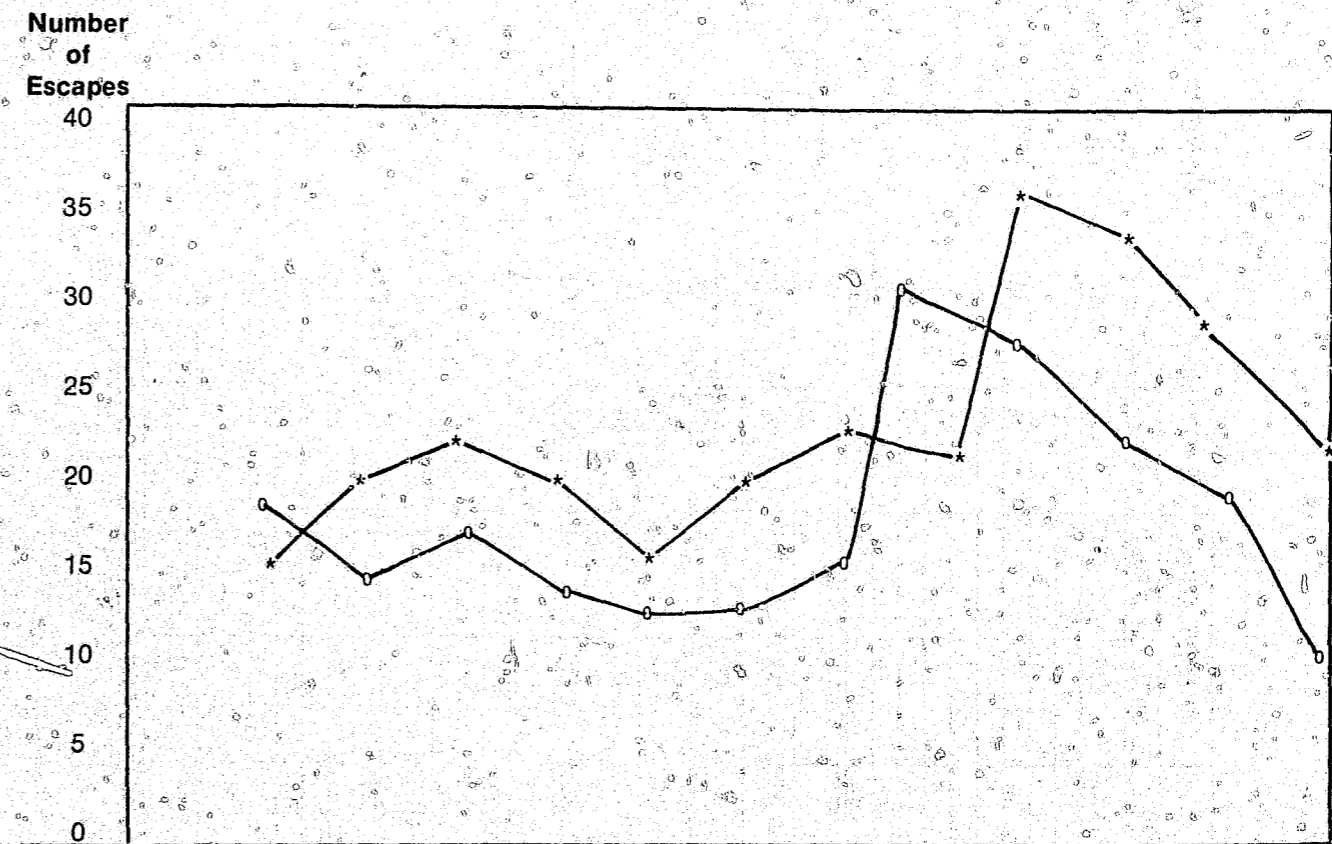
